SETTING THE SCENE

- Indiana heads on the road for the first time in 2017 on Saturday, Sept. 9, against Virginia at Scott Stadium (61,500; Natural Grass). Kickoff is set for 3:30 p.m. EDT and ACC Network Extra will broadcast the game.
- The Hoosiers have won eight of its last nine non-conference games, including three straight on the road (Missouri, Wake Forest and Florida International).
- Virginia leads the all-time series 2-0 with a 47-7 victory in Charlottesville on Oct. 10, 2009, and a 34-31 triumph in Bloomington on Sept. 10, 2011.
- IU is 6-14 all-time against ACC foes with its last win coming at Wake Forest, 31-24, on Sept. 26, 2015.
- Indiana concluded its home-and-home series with the Demon Deacons in 2016, which makes this the third straight year an ACC opponent has appeared on the schedule.
- Junior running back **Mike Majette** (Woodbridge, Va./Woodbridge Senior) is the lone Hoosier from Virginia.

THE COACHES

- Tom Allen** made his debut as Indiana head coach at the 2016 Foster Farms Bowl. He was named IU's 29th head coach on Dec. 1, 2016. The New Castle, Ind., native joined the Hoosiers as associate head coach/defense on Jan. 15, 2016. A 2016 Broyles Award nominee, Allen engineered one of the top defensive turnarounds in the country, as Indiana improved substantially in every major statistical category. (full bio on page 15)
- Bronco Mendenhall is 3-10 in his second season as Virginia head coach. Mendenhall owns a 102-53 (.658) record in his 13th overall year with a previous stop at BYU (2005-15).

NEWS & NOTES

- IU threw for 420 passing yards against No. 2 Ohio State, tied for the seventh-most in program history and the most ever by a Hoosiers team vs. the Buckeyes.
- Quarterback **Richard Lagow** completed 40 passes, second in program history, on 65 attempts, the most in program history, for 410 yards, fifth in program history, with three touchdowns.
- He is the only player in Indiana history to post two 400-yard passing games in his career.
- Wide receivers **Simmie Cobbs Jr.** (11-149-1) and **Luke Timian** (10-72-0) became the third duo in IU history to record double-digit receptions in the same game, and the first since 2010 (Damarlo Belcher and Tandon Doss).
- Linebacker **Tegray Scales** finished with a game-high 12 tackles (9 solo), his fourth-straight game in double digits and the 11th of his career.
- Since the start of 2016 Scales owns 10 10-plus tackle games, which shares second nationally. He leads all defenders with 23.5 tackles for loss and 102 solos, and shares seventh with 138 total stops during that span.

TEAM

• **Tom Allen** is the second Indiana head coach to open his career against two ranked teams (No. 19 Utah, No. 2 Ohio State). In 1957, Bob Hicks faced No. 4 Michigan State, No. 16 Notre Dame and No. 8 Iowa.

• Six true freshmen saw the field in the season opener against No. 2 Ohio State: C **Harry Crider**, RB **Morgan Ellison**, DL **Juan Harris**, TE **Peyton Hendershot**, CB **Raheem Layne** and **LeShaun Minor Jr.**

• IU has met eight top 10 teams in its last 23 games and played three of them to a one-score game.

• The Hoosiers have faced three additional top 20 teams in that span. They defeated No. 17 Michigan State (2016), took No. 14 Michigan (2015) to double overtime and fell to No. 19 Utah, 26-24, in the 2016 Foster Farms Bowl.

• Indiana appeared in the 2016 Foster Farms Bowl on the heels of a trip to the 2015 New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

• The Hoosiers made consecutive bowl games for the first time since 1990-91 and the fourth time in school history (1986-87, 1987-88, 1990-91), while making their 11th overall appearance.

• IU finished the regular season 6-6 and 4-5 in the Big Ten East. It was the 11th time in school history Indiana recorded back-to-back years with six-or-more wins and the first time since 1993-94.

• It marked the 16th time the Hoosiers reached four Big Ten victories and the first time since 2001 (4-4). The four conference wins are tied for the eighth-most in program history.

• Linebacker **Tegray Scales** (SI.com) collected second team All-America honors. He became the first Indiana linebacker to receive All-America recognition since 1987 (Van Waiters).

• Offensive lineman Dan Feeney, a third-round draft pick of the Los Angeles Chargers, was named an Associated Press first team All-American.

• Feeney became just the fourth player and first offensive lineman in program history to be recognized as a two-time first team All-American and just the third to earn first team honors in back-to-back years.

• It marked the third straight year (5 honorees) at least one Hoosier made his way on to an All-America team: 2015 - Feeney and current Packers offensive lineman Jason Spriggs (1st team); 2014 - current Falcons running back Tevin Coleman (unanimous and consensus selection).

• Indiana matched 2015's program record with 12 standouts recognized by the Big Ten.

• Feeney led the way with first team honors from the coaches and media. Cornerback **Rashard Fant** and Scales earned second team accolades.

• Defensive tackle Ralph Green III, linebacker Marcus Oliver, safety **Jonathan Crawford** and husky **Marcelino Ball** received honorable mention.

• The six defensive honorees are a school record.

• Wide receivers Ricky Jones and Mitchell Paige, quarterback **Richard Lagow**, running back Devine Redding and wide receiver **Nick Westbrook** also earned honorable mention.

• Ball and left tackle **Coy Cronk** were named to the 2016 247Sports True Freshman All-American team.

• Five IU freshmen were recognized on 2016 All-Big Ten Freshman teams. Ball and Cronk made the ESPN.com and BTN.com teams.

• Running back **Tyler Natee**, cornerback **A'Shon Riggins** and kick returner **Devonte Williams** earned honorable mention from BTN.com.

• Feeney was taken by the Chargers in the third round (71st selection) of the 2017 NFL Draft. He became the seventh Hoosier drafted since 2014 and the fourth, one each from 2014-17, to go off the board in the first three rounds.

• Wide receiver Cody Latimer was selected 56th overall by Denver (2014), Coleman 73rd by Atlanta (2015), Spriggs 48th by Green Bay (2016) and Feeney.

• The last time IU had a draftee in the opening three rounds over four straight seasons was from 1992-95.

• Nine Hoosiers are currently in the NFL: Coleman (Falcons), Feeney (Chargers), Howard (Bears), DL Darius Latham (Raiders), Latimer (Broncos), Redding, OL Rodger Saffold (Rams), Spriggs (Packers) and QB Nate Sudfeld (Eagles).

• Head coach **Tom Allen's** radio show, *Inside IU Football with Tom Allen*, will be held Wednesday evenings at 7:05 p.m. ET on the IU Radio Network. Don Fischer, who is in his 45th season as The Voice of the Hoosiers, hosts the show live from the Bloomington Holiday Inn.

OFFENSE

- Indiana returned seven starters, 25 letterwinners and 103 career starts on offense.
- **Mike DeBord** is in his first season as IU's offensive coordinator. He also serves as the Hoosiers associate head coach and tight ends coach.
- Since his arrival in Bloomington, DeBord has preached P.E.T. to his offense - protect the ball, explosive plays and tempo.
- IU opened 2017 with 420 passing yards against No. 2 Ohio State, tied for the seventh-most in program history and the most ever by a Hoosiers team vs. OSU.
- DeBord spent the 2015 and 2016 seasons as offensive coordinator at the University of Tennessee, where the Volunteers averaged 35.8 points per game.
- UT finished 2016 with a school record 63 total touchdowns and 473 total points. The Volunteers, one of four teams to end the year in the top half of the SEC in scoring, passing, rushing and total offense, ranked 24th nationally (2nd in the SEC) with 36.4 points per game and 35th in red zone offense (87.8 percent).
- He owns 35 years of coaching experience, including 16 bowl appearances, with stints as head coach at Central Michigan University (2000-03), offensive coordinator at the University of Michigan (1997-99, 2006-07), and assistant coach with the Chicago Bears (2010-12) and the Seattle Seahawks (2008-09).
- DeBord owns a 70-20 (.778) overall record, including a 43-14 (.754) conference mark, in his eighth year as an FBS offensive coordinator.
- All five quarterbacks DeBord has mentored as a coordinator - Tom Brady (Michigan), Joshua Dobbs (Tennessee), Brian Griese (Michigan), Chad Henne

- (Michigan) and Drew Henson (Michigan) - have reached the NFL.
- He has coached 51 overall players who have moved on to the NFL, including seven tight ends.
 - DeBord served as Michigan's offensive coordinator from 1997-99 and again in 2006-07. In his first season as coordinator, the Wolverines won the national championship and DeBord was named Sporting News National Assistant Coach of the Year.
 - In 2016, IU finished second in the Big Ten in passing offense (273.8) and third in total offense (426.0).
 - Three members of that offense moved on to the NFL, led by offensive lineman Dan Feeney, a third-round draft pick of the Los Angeles Chargers.
 - Running back Devine Redding is with the Kansas City Chiefs and wide receiver Mitchell Paige joined Feeney on the Chargers in the preseason.
 - Indiana's wide receivers were ranked preseason No. 8 nationally and the top unit in the B1G by Lindy's.
 - That group is led by preseason first team All-Big Ten selections **Simmie Cobbs Jr.** and **Nick Westbrook**.
 - Cobbs secured a Phil Steele preseason second team All-America nod and Westbrook is on the Biletnikoff Award Watch List.
 - Quarterback **Richard Lagow** is on the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and the Senior Bowl Watch Lists.
 - Running back **Devonte Williams** is on the Paul Hornung Award Watch List and offensive lineman **Coy Cronk** is a third team Athlon preseason All-Big Ten pick.

QUARTERBACKS

- Fifth-year senior **Richard Lagow** enrolled in 2016 spring classes, participated in practice and started all 13 games one season ago.
- Coaches and teammates alike praised Lagow's leadership and development throughout the 2017 spring and preseason camp, and he showed everyone why in the season opener vs. No. 2 Ohio State.
- Lagow completed 40 passes, second in program history, on 65 attempts, the most in program history, for 410 yards, fifth in program history, with three touchdowns.
- The 410 passing yards are the most for any Hoosier ever against the Buckeyes and the most for any quarterback against OSU since Nov. 30, 2013 (Devin Gardner, 451).
- It marked Lagow's second 400-yard game to make him the first IU quarterback to surpass the mark twice.
- On the Indiana single-game lists, he owns three of the top seven spots in yardage, two of the top three in attempts and two of the top four in completions.
- Lagow earned a spot on the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award and the Senior Bowl Watch Lists, and Lindy's ranked his right arm as the strongest in the Big Ten.
- He was named the Hoosiers most outstanding offensive player this spring and served as a counselor at the 2017 Manning Passing Academy.
- In 2016, Lagow finished 253-of-438 (57.8 percent) for 3,362 yards with 19 touchdowns, 17 interceptions, two rushing TDs and one receiving score.

- An honorable mention All-B1G honoree, he sat second in the league in passing yards per game (258.6, 28th nationally), third in yards per completion (13.3, 32nd) and completions (19.4, 39th), fifth in touchdowns (19), and sixth in total offense per game (250.3) and passing efficiency (128.8).
- Lagow is second at IU in single-season passing yardage, third in attempts, tied for third in 300-yard games (3), fourth in completions and total offense (3,176), and sixth in passing TDs.
- The 6-6 gunslinger set the Indiana single-game record with 496 yards against Wake Forest, the most in the Big Ten and the 12th-most nationally in 2016.
- Lagow threw for 394 yards on 28-of-40 (70.0) and three scores in the Rutgers win. The 394 yards rank seventh all-time at IU.
- He played two seasons at Cisco (Texas) Community College, where he left as the top-ranked, pocket-passing junior college quarterback by ESPN.
- **Nick Sheridan** is in his first season as Indiana's quarterback coach after three years as an offensive graduate assistant at the University of Tennessee.
- He was named one of the nation's top 30 coaches under 30 years of age by 247Sports.

WIDE RECEIVERS

- Indiana returned 180 receptions, 2,929 yards and 16 touchdowns from five receivers this season.
- Three of those wideouts gave No. 2 Ohio State all it could handle in the 2017 opener.
- **Simmie Cobbs Jr.** and **Luke Timian** became the third duo in IU history and the first since 2010 to record double-digit catches, while **Donavan Hale** joined Timian with career-bests in grabs and yardage.
- Cobbs hauled in a career-high 11 balls (T-11th in program history) for 149 yards, his fifth-career 100-yard game (T-10th in program history), with one TD.
- Timian netted 10 receptions for 72 yards, while Hale added five for 67 in first career starts for both.
- The Hoosiers did all this damage without 2016's leading receiver, **Nick Westbrook**, who sustained an injury on the game's opening kickoff.
- Westbrook (2017) and Cobbs (2016) each garnered spots on the Biletnikoff Award Watch Lists and the duo make Indiana one of two teams in the B1G with two wideouts in the top eight in active career yardage - Cobbs (4th - 1,298) and Westbrook (8th - 1,064).
- IU boasts a tall and athletic receiving corps as Cobbs and Hale stand 6-4 and Westbrook 6-3.
- Cobbs, who broke his ankle on his first play from scrimmage last season, ranks sixth in program history with 1,035 yards in 2015.
- Westbrook, came up five yards shy of joining Cobbs as the seventh Hoosier to reach the 1,000-yard mark. His 995 yards in 2016 are seventh in IU lore.
- The Lake Mary, Fla., native is the lone Big Ten receiver on this year's Biletnikoff list after he caught 54 passes for an 18.4 average and six touchdowns one season ago.
- Cobbs was a Phil Steele second team preseason All-American, Lindy's No. 19 wideout nationally and a first team All-Big Ten selection by both, while

- Westbrook was a preseason first team all-league pick and Street & Smith's choice for best hands in the B1G.
- Westbrook ranked second in the conference in yardage (38th nationally), third in average per catch (T-27th), seventh in receptions and tied for seventh in scores in 2016. He averaged 79.3 yards per game (3rd in the Big Ten) and 4.2 receptions per game (T-8th).
 - The honorable mention All-Big Ten selection led the B1G in 40-plus yard catches (7, T-15th nationally), shared first in 70-yarders (2, T-8th), finished second in 30-yarders (11, T-19th), shared second in 60-yarders (2, T-24th) and 10-yarders (37), and shared third in 50-yarders (3, T-29th) and 20-yarders (16, T-35th).
 - Westbrook posted three 100-yard games, which shared third in the league.
 - Cobbs, also a 2016 Maxwell Award Watch Lister, made 60 receptions (8th in the Big Ten) for the 1,035 yards (3rd) and four touchdowns in 2015.
 - The Oak Park, Ill., native averaged 79.6 yards (3rd in the Big Ten), 4.6 catches per game (9th) and 17.2 yards per grab (3rd).
 - Cobbs posted four 100-yard games, which shared third in the Big Ten and fifth on Indiana's all-time list.
 - **Timian**, a redshirt junior who earned a scholarship during 2017 preseason camp, made 19 receptions for 277 yards and one score last year, and he owns 31 career catches for 400 yards and two TDs.
 - **Hale**, a junior out of Largo, Fla., posted 13 grabs for 210 yards and one touchdown as a sophomore after he brought in one pass for 10 yards as a freshman.
 - Redshirt junior **J-Shun Harris II** made his return against the Buckeyes. Harris earned a spot on the 247Sports Big Ten All-Freshman team in 2014 after he pulled in 18 balls for 168 yards and two scores.
 - He tore his right ACL during 2015 summer workouts and his left ACL during 2016 preseason camp.

TIGHT ENDS

- In addition to his play-calling duties, **Mike DeBord** oversees the Hoosiers tight ends.
- DeBord has coached seven tight ends who have moved on to the National Football League.
- He served as tight ends coach for the Seattle Seahawks in 2009, when John Carlson set franchise records for receptions and receiving yardage by a tight end, and for the Chicago Bears from 2010-12.
- Senior **Ian Thomas** was named the offense's most improved player following 2017 spring practice and earned the Iron Hoosier Award as the tight end's most valuable player during 2017 summer workouts.

- He showed why he earned those honors in the season opener vs. No. 2 Ohio State, where he pulled in five balls for 53 yards and two touchdowns.
- Thomas played in all 13 games one season ago and made three catches (28 yards), with two coming in the Foster Farms Bowl against Utah.
- He joined IU after two seasons at Nassau C.C. in Garden City, N.Y., where he was rated the No. 2 junior college tight end nationally by ESPN.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- In the last two NFL Drafts, tackle Jason Spriggs and guard Dan Feeney were day two selections.
- Spriggs went to the Packers with pick No. 48 in 2016 and Feeney was selected by the Chargers with pick No. 71 in 2017.
- The duo became the fifth and sixth first team All-American offensive linemen in program history.
- Feeney became the first offensive lineman and just the sixth player in program history to earn All-America status over back-to-back campaigns.
- In his first season as IU's run game coordinator and offensive line coach, **Darren Hiller** brings 23 years of coaching experience to Bloomington.
- Hiller spent 2016 as co-offensive coordinator, run game coordinator and offensive line coach at the University of South Florida.
- He has coached 20 players who went on to the NFL, including tackle Kofi Amichia, a sixth-round selection by the Packers in the 2017 NFL Draft.
- The Hoosiers returned four linemen with starting experience - redshirt junior guard **Wes Martin** (20 games), sophomore tackle **Coy Cronk** (14), junior

- tackle **Brandon Knight** (6) and redshirt sophomore guard **Simon Stepaniak** (3).
- Martin (2015) and Cronk (2016) each earned freshman All-American honors.
- A West Milton, Ohio, native, Martin started all 13 games at right guard last season and played in all 13 at right guard with six starts as a freshman.
- He earned the Iron Hoosier Award as the offense's MVP during 2017 summer workouts.
- Martin is a two-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree and a 2016 CoSIDA Academic All-District V selection.
- Cronk started all 13 games at left tackle, an Indiana true freshman record for an offensive lineman.
- Knight played in 11 games at tackle and tight end as a true freshman in 2015, and started six at right tackle and eight overall in 2016 before he suffered a season-ending injury.
- Stepaniak made a pair of starts at right guard last year and played in 12 games. He earned the Iron Hoosier Award as the offensive line's MVP during 2017 summer workouts.

RUNNING BACKS

- **Mike Hart** took over as Indiana's running backs coach on March 3, 2017.
- The University of Michigan's all-time rushing leader, Hart spent three years with the Indianapolis Colts before entering the coaching ranks in 2011.
- In his six seasons as a coach, Hart has tutored three 1,000-yard rushers, two Mid-American Conference (MAC) Freshman of the Year and the 2014 MAC Offensive Player of the Year, Jarvion Franklin.
- Prior to IU, Hart led the running backs at Syracuse University, Western Michigan University (2014-15) and Eastern Michigan University (2012-13).
- The Hoosiers returned six backs with game experience, led by junior **Mike Majette**. He has 367 career rushing yards on 83 attempts (4.4 average).
- Majette has caught 16 passes for 153 yards with one touchdown.
- Redshirt sophomore **Devonte Williams** added 167 yards last season on 48 rushes, while sophomore **Tyler Natee** led all returnees with 237 yards on 61 carries and two touchdowns.
- Each of the Hoosiers last four featured running backs have reached the NFL - Devine Redding (Kansas

- City), Jordan Howard (Chicago), Tevin Coleman (Atlanta) and Stephen Houston (New England, Pittsburgh and Baltimore).
- Indiana is one of five FBS schools (San Diego State, Arkansas, Baylor and Oklahoma) with at least four 1,000-yard rushers from 2014-16: Coleman (2,036 in 2014), Howard (1,213 in 2015) and Redding (1,012 in 2015 and 1,122 in 2016).
- Redding (2015-16) became the fourth Hoosier to record back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons and the first since Vaughn Dunbar (1990-91).
- Coleman (2015) and Howard (2016) became the first Indiana running backs to be drafted in consecutive years since 1990-92. Coleman was picked in the third round and Howard in the fifth round.
- In 2014, Coleman became the 18th player in FBS history to rush for 2,000 yards (2,036), which set a school record, is 16th on the FBS all-time list and is sixth in Big Ten history.
- The Tinley Park, Ill., native was Indiana's third unanimous and consensus All-American in 2014, finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award.

DEFENSE

- Indiana returned nine starters, 31 letterwinners and 169 career starts on defense.
- **Tom Allen**, who has continued to call the defense this season, engineered one of the top defensive turnarounds nationally one year ago in his debut season as defensive coordinator.
- IU's defense improved substantially in every major statistical category (chart below) against a schedule featuring four top 10 opponents, a program first.
- The Hoosiers held their opponents to 380.1 total yards, an improvement of 129.4 yards over 2015, the largest improvement in the country.
- Indiana limited its foes to 94.1 fewer passing yards, also first nationally, and 10.4 fewer points, which ranked fifth nationally.
- IU gave up 23 fewer touchdowns than in 2015.
- A nominee for the 2016 Broyles Award, which honors college football's top assistant coach, Allen led a program record six defensive players to All-Big Ten honors and the program's first All-American at linebacker since 1987, **Tegray Scales**, who earned second team honors from SI.com.
- Scales and cornerback **Rashard Fant** earned second team all-league accolades, and defensive

- tackle **Ralph Green III**, linebacker **Marcus Oliver**, safety **Jonathan Crawford** and husky **Marcelino Ball** received honorable mention recognition.
- Allen stresses to his defenders the importance of takeaways and their magic number per game is three.
- The defense reached that number four times in 2016, with a season-high four (3 FR, 1 INT) vs. Utah in the Foster Farms Bowl.
- Indiana's defense boasted the top returning production in the FBS according to Bill Connelly of SB Nation and his S&P+ rankings heading into 2017.
- IU's secondary was ranked fourth in the Big Ten and 20th nationally by Phil Steele.
- Scales is on six watch lists – Chuck Bednarik, Bronko Nagurski, Lott IMPACT, Butkus, Big Ten and Senior Bowl – and honored on nine preseason All-America teams, highlighted by a first team spot by ESPN and Street & Smith.
- Fant is on five watch lists – Chuck Bednarik, Bronko Nagurski, Senior Bowl, Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and Wuerffel Trophy – and recognized on five preseason first team All-Big Ten teams.
- Ball, Crawford and defensive end **Greg Gooch** earned preseason All-Big Ten recognition.

LINEBACKERS

- **Tegray Scales** earned second team All-America honors from SI.com in 2016 and became the first Hoosiers linebacker recognized on an All-America team since Van Waiters (3rd team) in 1987.
- He picked up right where he left off with a game-high 12 tackles, his 11th career double-digit game and fourth consecutive, and nine solos in the 2017 opener vs. No. 2 Ohio State.
- Since the start of the 2016 season, Scales owns 10 10-plus tackle games, which shares second nationally. He leads all defenders with 23.5 tackles for loss and 102 solos, and shares seventh with 138 total stops during that span.
- One of the 2016 team captains, Scales led the nation with 93 solo stops and 23.5 TFLs, and he finished first in the Big Ten with 126 tackles (10th nationally).
- The senior owns the second spot on the program's single-season tackles for loss list, shares ninth in total

- tackles, is ninth with 33.5 career stops for loss and his 12 career sacks are 2.5 shy of a share for 10th.
- His nine double-figure tackle games in 2016 led the league and ranked third nationally. Scales added seven sacks, a pick-6 and one forced fumble.
- The Cincinnati native was named Indiana's 2016-17 Male Athlete of the Year, IU's 2016 Football Most Valuable Player and the 2016 Foster Farms Defensive Player of the Game.
- Scales is on six 2017 watch lists – Chuck Bednarik, Bronko Nagurski, Lott IMPACT, Butkus, Big Ten and Senior Bowl – and honored on nine preseason All-America teams, highlighted by a first team spot by ESPN and Street & Smith.
- Sports Illustrated listed him as the 49th-ranked player in the country, while Lindy's ranked him the No. 3 inside linebacker nationally.
- In addition to his 11 double-digit tackle games, Scales has three multi-sack games.

THE START CHART

- Indiana returned 169 career starts from 18 players on defense and 103 career starts from 11 players on offense for a total of 272 career starts from 29 different players.
- The secondary is the team's most experienced unit with 114 career starts among 14 different players.
- Ten safeties account for 67 of the 111 starts, while four cornerbacks have started 46 times.
- On offense, the offensive line is the most experienced unit with 45 career starts among six different players, while five wide receivers have started 37 times.
- Across both lines, IU owns 91 career starts among 11 different players.

LINEBACKERS (CONT.)

- Entering his senior campaign, **Chris Covington** emerged in the spring and preseason camp on the outside next to Scales.
- He earned the Iron Hoosier Award as the linebacker's MVP during 2017 summer workouts and posted seven stops, five solo, with a pass breakup and quarterback hurry against the Buckeyes.
- Covington appeared in all 13 games one year ago and made 29 tackles, 19 solo, with two sacks, three tackles for loss and one forced fumble.

- In his first career start at No. 3 Michigan in game 11, he recorded a career-high six stops, all solo, with his first career sack and first career forced fumble.
- Covington moved from linebacker to quarterback during 2014 preseason camp. He appeared in five games at QB in 2014 before he suffered a season-ending ACL injury.
- The Chicago native returned to linebacker for his sophomore season and played in the final eight games of the campaign.

SAFETIES/HUSKY

- Indiana returned 65 starts and 170 games played among 10 safeties.
- **Marcelino Ball** (75), **Jonathan Crawford** (71) and **Tony Fields** (70) finished third, fourth and fifth, respectively, on the team in tackles and combined for 13 takeaways (7 interceptions, 5 fumble recoveries and 1 one forced fumble) in 2016.
- A year after Crawford collected 2015 Campus Insiders Freshman All-America honors, Ball was named a 247Sports True Freshman All-American.
- Both players captured Big Ten All-Freshman team honors from ESPN.com and BTN.com.
- Crawford, a Phil Steele preseason second team All-Big Ten selection, topped the Hoosiers with seven takeaways (4 FRs and 3 INTs) and led the league and shared second nationally in fumble recoveries.
- An All-Big Ten honorable mention selection, Crawford accounted for all three of the Hoosiers takeaways in the win over Purdue, as he picked off two passes and recovered a fumble.
- He was the lone Big Ten player and just the ninth FBS player with three takeaways in a game in 2016.
- In 27 career games (all starts), the junior has 152 tackles (96 solo), 1.5 TFLs, eight PBUs and is the current team leader with 11 takeaways, seven interceptions and four fumble recoveries.
- Crawford paced the team with four INTs, the third-most for a true freshman in IU history, in 2015. He shared third in the conference with the four picks and ranked first among all conference freshmen and tied for fourth among all freshmen nationally.
- The Largo, Fla., native led league true freshmen with 76 overall tackles (2nd among all freshmen) and 48 solo stops (1st among all freshmen).
- An honorable mention All-Big Ten selection, Ball started 12 games and played in all 13 at the Hoosiers husky position during his true freshman campaign.

- He led all Big Ten freshmen in tackles and finished sixth overall, first among B1G true freshmen and third among true freshmen nationally with 60 solo stops.
- The 18-year old finished third on the team in tackles, solos, interceptions (2, tied) and pass breakups (8). Ball added 4.5 tackles for loss and one fumble recovery.
- He opened his 2017 campaign with a career-high tying 10 tackles, his second career double-digit game, with seven solos and a half-TFL against No. 2 Ohio State
- Football is in the Ball family as Marcelino is the younger brother of Marcus, a former NFL defensive back who played at the University of Memphis (2009-10), Reggie, Jr., a quarterback at Georgia Tech University (2003-06) and Raeshon, a defensive back at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga (2006-08).
- **Chase Dutra** has appeared in 31 career games with nine starts at safety. He has collected 146 tackles, 103 solo, with 6.5 for loss, three forced fumbles, two recoveries, three interceptions and seven pass breakups.
- In 2015, he was second on the team and 19th in the Big Ten in league play only with 7.4 tackles per outing.

CORNERBACKS

- Indiana returned 44 starts and 102 games played among four cornerbacks.
- **Rashard Fant** is the NCAA's active career leader and IU's all-time leader with 49 passes defended and 45 pass breakups in 39 games.
- A second team All-Big Ten selection in 2016, the Atlanta native topped the Big Ten in PBUs (17, T-2nd nationally) and passes defended (20, 3rd nationally).
- He also led the Big Ten and finished second nationally with 22 pass breakups in 2015.
- The fifth-year senior shared the team lead with three interceptions (68 yards), including a 34-yard pick-6 at Florida International, and made 33 tackles, 29 solo, and one tackle for loss.
- Fant tallied four games with multiple pass breakups and has 10 overall in his career.
- He entered 2017 on five watch lists – Chuck Bednarik, Bronko Nagurski, Senior Bowl, Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and Wuerffel Trophy – and honored on five preseason first team All-B1G teams.
- Street & Smith listed Fant as the No. 10 cornerback in the country, while Lindy's ranked him as the Big Ten's top cover corner.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- Assistant defensive coordinator/defensive line coach **Mark Hagen** is in his second stint at Indiana.
- A Carmel, Ind., native, Hagen was a four-year letterwinner (1987, 89-91), two-time second team All-Big Ten selection, three-time Academic All-Big Ten winner, 1992 Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient and a captain at linebacker for the Hoosiers.
- He owns 25 years of coaching experience, including 21 in the Big Ten and the SEC, has coached in 12 bowl games and mentored 20 NFL standouts.
- The IU defense limited its opponents to 35.3 fewer rushing yards per game last season.
- Hagen oversaw a young and deep group in 2016, in which five linemen collected at least five tackles for loss, nine registered at least one sack and six made their collegiate debuts.
- The defensive line accounted for 17 of the team's 33 sacks in 2016, including 14 of the team's 23 (60.8) in Big Ten play.
- Seniors **Greg Gooch** and **Nate Hoff** lead the group. Gooch earned the Iron Hoosier Award as the defense's MVP during 2017 summer workouts.

- The Atlanta native graduated in December 2016 with a degree in SPEA management and is currently pursuing his master's degree in public affairs.
- **A'Shon Riggins** earned 2016 BTN.com All-Freshman team honorable mention after he played in 12 games with eight starts.
- Riggins collected 37 tackles, 35 solo, with one sack, two TFLs, one interception (31 yards), nine pass breakups (2nd on the team) and one forced fumble.
- The Hamilton, Ohio, native recorded all of his passes defended (10) in Big Ten play, which shared sixth in the league, and posted two multi-PBU games.
- Redshirt sophomore **Andre Brown Jr.** returns after a medical redshirt season last year.
- Brown started eight times and appeared in nine games as a true freshman in 2015, where he made 35 tackles, 27 solo, with one fumble recovery and four pass breakups.
- Junior **Tyler Green** has appeared in 19 games with three starts. He has 26 career tackles, 22 solo, with one for loss, two PBUs and one forced fumble.

- The Longwood, Fla., native played linebacker his first two seasons in Bloomington and enjoyed a smooth transition to defensive end in 2016.
- Gooch started 12 times and collected 26 tackles, 15 solo, one sack, 5.5 tackles for loss and one forced fumble. He has played in 38 career games.
- Hoff, a fifth-year senior, started all 13 games in 2016 and owns a defensive line-leading 72 stops, six sacks and 15.5 TFLs in 38 career games (23 starts).

- The 2016 Big Ten Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year **Griffin Oakes** is in his third season as starter.
- Oakes shares the Indiana field goals made record of 53 with Mitch Ewald (2010-13). He is third with 112 extra points made and 271 total points.
- The fifth-year senior is 53-of-73 on field goals (73.2 percent) and 112-of-118 on extra points (94.9).
- He made 16 field goals in 2016, including the game-winner over No. 17 Michigan State and a three-field goal effort against Ball State, which marked his seventh career game with three-or-more field goals.
- The 16 field goals share fourth on the program's single-season list and his 33 PAT's are 10th.
- Oakes became the first Indiana kicker to collect the Big Ten's Kicker of the Year honor and the first Hoosiers kicker to earn first team All-Big Ten honors since Austin Starr in 2007.
- The Greenwood, Ind., native hit 24-of-29 field goals (82.8 percent) and 53-of-57 extra points. He averaged 62.9 yards on 91 kickoffs with 52 touchbacks.
- Oakes set a single-season IU record in field goals and total points for a kicker (3rd overall with 125) and was second in PATs. He sits second in B1G single-season history in total points for a kicker and is tied for fifth in field goals.
- Redshirt sophomore kick returner **Devonte Williams** earned a spot on the 2017 Paul Hornung Award Watch List.

- He is 10th on IU's all-time kick return yardage list with 1,116 yards.
- A 2016 BTN.com All-Freshman team selection, Williams returned 39 kicks for 784 yards, which ranks fifth on the school's single-season list, in 11 games. The 784 yards led the Big Ten and ranked 13th nationally.
- Redshirt sophomore punter **Haydon Whitehead** kicked in his first American football game ever in the season opener vs. No. 2 Ohio State.
- Whitehead downed the Buckeyes three times inside the 20-yard line and averaged 41.0 on nine punts with a long of 49.
- He enrolled in 2017 spring classes and participated in practice.
- The 21-year old played Australian Rules Football for 15 years. He made his first trip to the United States when he took his official visit to IU in December 2016.
- Whitehead trained under Nathan Chapman and John Smith at Prokick Australia, a training ground for punters and kickers in Melbourne.
- Prokick has produced the past four Ray Guy winners (2013-16), including all three finalists in 2016, in addition to current Steelers punter Jordan Berry.
- Junior **Dan Godsil** is back for his third season as the Hoosiers long snapper. Phil Steele named Godsil a preseason fourth team All-American and a first team All-Big Ten selection.

- Tom Allen was named Indiana University's 29th head football coach on Dec. 1, 2016. He made his head coaching debut in the 2016 Foster Farms Bowl.

- The New Castle, Ind., native joined the Indiana staff as associate head coach/defense on Jan. 15, 2016.

- Engineered one of the top defensive turnarounds in the country in 2016. IU's defense improved in every major statistical category against a schedule featuring four top 10 opponents, a program first.

- The Hoosiers held their opponents to 380.1 total yards, an improvement of 129.4 yards over 2015, the largest improvement in the country.

- Indiana limited its foes to 94.1 fewer passing yards, also first nationally, and 10.4 fewer points, which ranked fifth nationally.

- IU gave up 25 fewer touchdowns than in 2015.

- A nominee for the 2016 Broyles Award, which honors college football's top assistant coach, Allen led a program record six defensive players to All-Big Ten honors and the program's first All-American at linebacker since 1987, Tegray Scales, who earned second team honors from SI.com.

- Scales and Rashard Fant earned second team all-league accolades, and Ralph Green III, Marcus Oliver, Jonathan Crawford and Marcelino Ball received honorable mention recognition.

- Over the last 22-plus years, the teams for which Allen has been a member of the coaching staff have posted a combined record of 222-70 (.760).

- A 25-year coaching veteran, Allen was the defensive coordinator at the University of South Florida in 2015.

- South Florida posted an 8-5 record and earned a trip to the Miami Beach Bowl. Allen mentored three all-conference selections and the American Athletic Conference's top scoring defense (19.6 points per game in league play).

- Served as head coach at Ben Davis High School (2004-06), defensive coordinator at Ben Davis (1998-03) and Marion High School (1997), and earned his master's degree at IU (2002).

- In his lone season in Tampa, USF tied for 13th nationally in tackles for loss (7.5 per game), tied for 14th in interceptions (17), tied for 24th in turnovers gained (25), tied for 26th in sacks (2.62), 31st in rushing defense (141.4), 34th in passing efficiency defense (118.76) and 35th in scoring defense (22.9).

- Spent the 2012-14 campaigns as linebackers coach and special teams coordinator at Ole Miss. He coached All-SEC linebackers Serderius Bryant and Denzel Nkemdiche.

- The Rebels closed out 2014 with a 9-3 record and ranked No. 9 after they met No. 6 TCU in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. Ole Miss spent nine weeks in the Associated Press top 10 with a high-water mark of No. 3.

- In 2014, the Rebels led the nation in scoring defense (13.8) and allowed a national low 18 touchdowns.

- Ole Miss topped the SEC in five categories and ranked in the top 20 nationally in 11, including 10th in red zone defense, 11th in tackles for loss (7.5), 12th in turnovers gained (28), 13th in total defense (321.2) and 13th in defensive touchdowns scored (4).

- Worked with defensive coordinator Dave Wommack to help guide a huge improvement in the Rebels defense, which ranked last in the SEC in total defense before their arrival in 2011. Learfield's strategic affiliation with Team Services, LLC, also affords its partners a distinct advantage in the areas of venue consulting, naming rights and market research.



DON FISCHER

This marks the 45th year that Don Fischer has been the radio play-by-play "voice" of Indiana University football and men's basketball games. The past 30 years, Fischer has worked as an independent contractor and is currently serving the Indiana University Radio

Network owned by Learfield Communications out of Jefferson City, Mo.

In addition to broadcasting the games, Fischer hosts the weekly coaches radio talk shows for both the football and men's basketball programs and has a daily show, Monday through Friday, from September through March. The daily show is called "IU Sports Today" and is syndicated throughout the state of Indiana. Fischer also offers stations a weekly talk show about IU football and basketball that airs in several markets around the state during the school year.

Fischer does freelance sportscasting, which for the past 23 years has included being the preseason television voice of the Indianapolis Colts.

During his 44 years with IU, Fischer has been named Indiana Sportscaster of the Year 28 times by two different organizations. The National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association has awarded him 24 times, while the Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association has named him its honoree four times.

In October of 2010, Fischer was one of eight inductees into the Indiana Broadcast Pioneers Richard M. Fairbanks Hall of Fame. The Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association (ISSA) inducted Fischer into the ISSA Hall of Fame in 2004.

He has won several awards for best play-by-play performance, and he has been honored by Indiana University with the J.W. Bill Orwig Medal, that goes to non-alumni for distinguished service to the University.

Fischer also has been named an Honorary "I" Man. In addition, the City of Indianapolis, and the State of Indiana have each honored Fischer with a special "Recognition Day" for his service and abilities as the play-by-play broadcaster for IU.

He has broadcast nearly 1,900 Indiana University games - a total that includes eight bowl games, four NCAA basketball championship games and two N.I.T. championship games.

From 1973 through 1987, he worked for ABC Radio, Canada's CBC and several additional major market radio stations, including WIRE in Indianapolis, as their source for reports during the month of May coverage of the Indianapolis 500. During that period, Fischer also served WIRE and Network Indiana, a statewide news network, as their sports director.

A native of Rochelle, Ill., Fischer has been in the radio business for 50 years. His previous broadcast experience includes stops in Butte, Mont.; Ottawa, Ill.; Springfield, Ill.; and Terre Haute, Ind.

Fischer has four sons and 11 grandchildren. Don and his wife, Susy, reside in Greenwood, Ind.



BUCK SUHR

Buck Suhr rejoined the Indiana University Football Radio Network as color commentator in 2010. Suhr, who served in the same capacity from 1997-2001, reunited with the Voice of the Hoosiers, Don Fischer, and Joe Smith (pre-game, post-game and halftime).

Suhr was a member of the Hoosier football program for 18 years as a running backs coach and administrator. He spent 12 seasons (1984-95) as running backs coach under IU's all-time winningest coach, Bill Mallory. After his stint as a coach, where he tutored All-America selections Anthony Thompson

and Vaughn Dunbar, Suhr was named administrative assistant to the head coach and athletic director from 1996-2001.

As running backs coach, Suhr helped direct one of the nation's most productive rushing attacks. From 1984-95, the Hoosiers had three different 1,000-yard rushers who topped that mark on six separate occasions. In 1988, the IU offense rushed for a then-school record 2,963 yards. During his tenure, Suhr coached Thompson, the 1989 Heisman Trophy runner-up, along with Dunbar and Alex Smith, the 1994 UPI National Freshman of the Year.

Suhr and his wife, Jane, are the parents of one son, Errek, and the deceased Jenny Suhr. Errek played in 74 games and earned four letters as a guard for the IU men's basketball program from 2004-07.

They have four grandchildren: Addy, Hayden, Taylor and Mack.



JOE SMITH

Joe Smith is in his 35th year with the IU Radio Network. He has handled pre-game, halftime, and post-game duties for Indiana football and men's basketball since 1983. Smith, the sports director of WGCL-AM 1370 in Bloomington, is in his

49th year of radio broadcasting in Bloomington. He began his broadcasting career in 1969 at WAIK Radio in Galesburg, Ill. From 1973-89, Smith worked on "RFD-4 Agri-Business Show" on WTTV-4 with the late Bob Cook. In 1998, Smith was named Indiana Sportscaster of the Year and in April 2003, he was inducted into the Indiana Sportswriters/Sportscasters Hall of Fame. Smith handled the IU TV Warmup Shows from 1978-82 and hosted several IU Coaches Shows from 1983-96 and again from 2002-04.

In June 2004, Smith received the J.W. Bill Orwig Medal that goes to non-alumni for distinguished service to the University.

POST-GAME NOTES

- **Richard Lagow's** 410 yards passing is the fourth time he has surpassed the 300-yard passing mark. He is the only player in IU history to have two 400-yard passing games in his career. The fifth-year senior is also the first quarterback to record 400-plus yards against Ohio State since Devin Garnder's 451 on Nov. 30, 2013.

- Lagow's 65 pass attempts are a single-game Indiana record.

- Lagow threw for three touchdowns, his fourth career three-touchdown game. He finished the game 40-of-65 for 410 yards and three touchdowns. The 40 completions rank second all-time at IU while the 410 yards are fifth.

- Wide receivers **Simmie Cobbs Jr.** and **Luke Timian** become the third duo in IU history to record double-digit receptions, and first since Tandon Doss (15) and Damarlo Belcher (10) vs. Michigan in 2010.

- Cobbs came back from a season-long injury to score his fifth career touchdown and recorded his fifth 100-yard game. He ended with a career-high 11 receptions for 149 yards and a touchdown.

- Timian notched career-highs in both receptions (10) and yards (72).

- In his first season with the Hoosiers in 2016, **Ian Thomas** caught three balls for 28 yards. He opened the 2017 season tonight with 53 yards on five receptions and his first career touchdown catch on the first possession score. He added another score in the third quarter.

- Junior wideout **Donavan Hale** also had career-high marks with 67 yards and five receptions.

- Redshirt freshman quarterback **Peyton Ramsey** saw his first career action, completing 2-of-3 passes for 10 yards and also rushing for 10 yards on three attempts.

- Redshirt freshman **Taysir Mack** made his first career catch for 14 yards.

- Senior linebacker **Tegray Scales** recorded 10-plus tackles for the 11th time of his career. It was also the fourth-straight game in which he had 10-plus tackles dating back to last season. The linebacker finished with a game-high 12 tackles (9 solo).

- Sophomore husky **Marcelino Ball** had 11 tackles (8 solo) – his second career double-digit tackle game. He also added a half-TFL.

- Indiana's defense forced four three-and-outs in the first half.

- Fifth-year senior **Griffin Oakes'** three points put him in sole possession of third place (271) for the most points in an Indiana career. He passed Antwaan Randle El (270) with his three extra points.

- Redshirt sophomore **Haydon Whitehead** made his debut at punter, downing the Buckeyes inside-the-20 three times. He averaged 41.0 yards a punt with a long of 49 yards.

- **Hunter Littlejohn** (redshirt sophomore), **Delroy Baker** (redshirt junior), Timian, Hale, **Mike Majette** (junior), and **Brandon Wilson** (redshirt sophomore) all made their first career starts.

- The Hoosiers scored a touchdown on their opening possession, a feat they did four times last season.

- Indiana played host to College Gameday and the first ESPN Megacast outside of the College Football Playoff Semifinal and National Championship games.

- A sellout crowd of 52,929 is tied for the fourth highest attended game in program history.

- Lee Corso was presented with the Bill Orwig Award at the end of the first quarter. The award recognizes outstanding contributions made by a non-alumnus to IU Athletics and is named for the former AD (1961-75). A 2010 IU Athletics Hall of Fame inductee, Corso coached the Hoosiers from 1973-82 and led the program to its first bowl victory, 38-37, over No. 9 BYU in the 1979 Holiday Bowl.

- Indiana opened their season on a Thursday night for the fifth time (2009, 2010, 2013, 2015) in eight years and the fourth time (2009, 2010, 2013) in Memorial Stadium history.

- This is the 11th time IU opened the season against a ranked team and the first time in Bloomington.

- For the first time since 1996, a Big Ten matchup was played on the opening weekend of the season.

- Redshirt junior **Wes Martin**, Scales, Lagow, and senior **Greg Gooch** served as tonight's game captains.

- The Hoosiers won the opening coin toss and deferred.
