- ▶ The Irish posted a 1–2 record on ABC last year, defeating Syracuse but losing to Florida State and Arizona State.

#### **RADIO**

- ► IMG College Sports is the exclusive national rights-holder for Irish football radio broadcasts. Notre Dame games will be broadcast to 117 affiliates by Don Criqui (play-by-play), Allen Pinkett (analysis) and Jeff Jeffers (sideline). This broadcast can be heard live on SiriusXM Satellite Radio (channel 129).
- ► The broadcast will be preceded by a one hour pre-game show hosted by Tony Castricone with Criqui, Pinkett and interviews conducted by Jack Nolan. It will be followed by a national post-game show hosted by Castricone, Criqui and Pinkett.
- ▶ All games can be heard in South Bend on WSBT 96.1 FM & 960 AM, and Sunny 101.5 FM.

- Virginia has sold out all non-season tickets for Saturday's game which will likely be played before a sellout crowd.
- Notre Dame has played in front of sellout crowds in 275 of its previous 324 games (.849) overall. Notre Dame has played before 646 sellouts in 925 total games (.698) since 1930. The Irish have sold out 292 of their last 293 home games dating back to 1964.

- Notre Dame leads the series with Virginia, 1-0.
- ▶ The teams faced off at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey on Aug. 31, 1989, with the Irish claiming a 36-13 victory in Kickoff Classic VII.

Head coach Brian Kelly, a veteran in his 25th season as a collegiate head coach, brings a championship tradition to his sixth year as the 29th head football coach at the University of Notre Dame.

Currently the third-winningest active coach in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision, Kelly has guided the Irish to 46 wins over his tenure. Kelly is the first coach to ever take Notre Dame to a bowl game in each of his first five years at the helm.

His 140 victories as a head coach since 2001 are more than all but two active FBS head coaches — Oklahoma's Bob Stoops and Ohio State's Urban Meyer.

#### **KELLY'S HEAD COACHING RESUME**

- ► Twenty-third college coach to reach 200 career victories with at least five years of service or 50 victories at a school that was classified as a major college at the time
- Second-youngest and fifth-fastest coach to ever reach 200 career victories with at least five years of service or 50 victories at a school that was classified as a major college at the time
- Only coach in school history to lead the Irish to at least eight victories over each of his first five seasons
- Only two-time winner of The Home Depot Coach of the Year Award (2009, 2012)
- First coach in school history to lead the Irish to bowl games during each of his first five seasons
- First coach to take Notre Dame to bowl games in five straight seasons at any stage in his career since Lou Holtz (1987-95)
- First coach with five consecutive seasons of at least eight wins since Lou Holtz reached the milestone seven straight years (1987-93)
- ► Recorded the seventh-most wins (89–30) among active NCAA FBS coach since 2006
- Owns the seventh-best winning percentage (.752) among active NCAA FBS coaches since 2007
- Ranks third and eighth among active NCAA FBS coaches in career victories (217) and career winning percentage (.736), respectively
- Led Notre Dame to an undefeated regular season in 2012 -- its first undefeated regular season in 24 years (1988)
- Guided Notre Dame to the 2013 Bowl Championship Series title game and its highest national ranking (No. 4/3) to close a season since 1993 (No. 2/2)
- Oversaw the first football program to be ranked number one in the football polls and first in NCAA GSR graduation rates while also playing for the BCS title
- Swept just about every possible coach of the year award in 2012 -- Home Depot, Associated Press, Walter Camp Football Foundation, Sporting News, Liberty Mutual and American Football Coaches Association
- Only the second Irish coach to win 12 games in a season (Lou Holtz also did it in 1988)
- Continued focus on academics as Notre Dame won the 2014 American Football Coaches Association Academic Achievement Award with a 100 percent graduation rate for the freshmen football student-athlete class of 2007
- Career record includes a first five seasons at Notre Dame where he has fashioned a 45-20 record that
  has included nine losses by a combined 29 points (3.2 per game)
- ► Helped the Irish win 38 of their last 51 games dating back to 2011
- ► Three seasons at Cincinnati from 2007–09, including a 34–6 record (.850) and two straight outright BIG EAST Conference title teams that earned BCS appearances in 2008 (FedEx Orange Bowl) and 2009 (Allstate Sugar Bowl)
- ► Three seasons at Central Michigan University from 2004–06, including a 19–16 overall record (.542) featuring a 9–4 mark and Mid-American Conference title in 2006
- ► Thirteen seasons at Grand Valley State University from 1991–2003, including a 118–35–2 record (.767) highlighted by NCAA Division II national championships in 2002 (14–0) and 2003 (14–1)
- An overall record of 217-77-2 (.736) in those 25 seasons as a head coach
- A record of 16-7 (.696) record in postseason play as a head coach

#### **EIGHT IS GREAT FOR KELLY**

- ► Head coach **Brian Kelly** has won at least eight games in each of his first five seasons with the Irish.
- ► Kelly is the first Irish coach to win eight games in each of his first five seasons. Setting the previous high, **Dan Devine** began his career with the Irish by posting four straight seasons with at least eight wins from 1975-78
- ▶ Before Kelly's current run, no Notre Dame head coach had posted five consecutive eight-win seasons at any junction of his career since **Lou Holtz** reached the milestone seven straight years from 1987–93.
- ► Kelly is the first coach in Notre Dame history to lead the Irish to a bowl game in each of his first five seasons. He joins Holtz as the only coaches to guide Notre Dame to bowl berths in five consecutive years at any juncture of their tenures at the school.
- ▶ With 45 wins through his first five years at Notre Dame (2010–14), Kelly has won more games at this stage of his Irish career than any coach other than Holtz's 46.

#### **KELLY BEATS ELITE TEAMS**

- ▶ **Brian Kelly** is 9-9 (.500) against Associated Press Top 25 teams as the head coach at Notre Dame and 19-13 (.594) overall.
- ▶ Of the 65 coaches at contract bowl eligible schools who has faced at least 10 AP-ranked teams, Kelly's career .594 winning percentage ranks sixth among his peers.
- ▶ He is one of just 12 coaches at contract bowl eligible schools who has faced at least 10 AP-ranked teams at his current job and is at least .500 against them.

#### **KELLY RANKS AMONG TOP ACTIVE COACHES NATIONALLY**

- Now in his sixth year at Notre Dame, **Brian Kelly** has helped the Irish secure a 37–6 record when entering halftime with a lead and a 34-4 mark when leading after three quarters.
- ▶ Kelly is 180-12 in his coaching career when taking a lead into the fourth quarter and 116-6 since 2001. He owns a 170-16 record when taking a lead into halftime, including a 115-8 mark since 2001.
- ► Each of Kelly's last nine teams have participated in a bowl game, encompassing each of his five Notre Dame teams, each of his three Cincinnati teams, and his final team at Central Michigan (2006).
- ► Each of Kelly's last 10 teams have finished the year with a winning record, including his 6-5 Chippewah squad in 2005.
- ► Every team of Kelly's head coaching tenure, except for his first Central Michigan team that went 4-7 on 2004, has finished at .500 or better (23 out of 24 years).
- ► Kelly is 147-29 when scoring first.
- ► Kelly is 172-26-1 when outrushing his opponent.
- ► Kelly is 128–12 when his team wins the turnover battle.
- ► Kelly is 42–16–2 in games decided by three points or less.
- ► Kelly is 61–20 in the month of November, including a 25–8 mark since 2006.
- ► Kelly is 65-7 when his team scores a defensive or special teams touchdown.
- ► Kelly is 138-10 when his team scores 30+ points, including a 78-2 mark with 40+ points.
- ► Kelly is 142-6-1 when his team allows 19 points or less.
- ► Kelly is 157-42-1 coming off a victory.
- ► Kelly-coached teams owned a 57-game winning streak in games where they held their opponents to less than 20 points, which ended in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl loss to Florida State (18-14). Kelly's previous such loss came on Dec. 8, 2001, when North Dakota edged Grand Valley State, 17-14, in the NCAA Division II title game.
- ► Kelly-coached teams have won 79 of their last 80 games when holding their opponents to less than 20 points.
- ► Since 2001, Brian Kelly has the third-most wins among all active Football Bowl Subdivision coaches, trailing only Oklahoma's Bob Stoops (150) and Ohio State's Urban Meyer (143):

#### **SCHEDULE NOTES**

- Notre Dame plays nine of its 12 regular-season games against schools from "Power 5" conferences (the Atlantic Coast Conference. Big Ten Conference, Big 12 Conference, Pacific-12 Conference and Southeastern Conference). No school plays more than 10 such games with most of the 22 who do residing in the Big 12 and Pac-12. Both of those leagues play nine conference games.
- ► The Irish open with three consecutive games against "Power 5" schools in Texas (Big 12), Virginia (ACC) and Georgia Tech (ACC) before facing Massachusetts of the Mid-American Conference. Notre Dame is one of just three schools nationally to open with three straight "Power 5" teams, joining South Carolina and Texas-San Antonio. The Gamecocks begin their 2015 season with North Carolina, Kentucky and Georgia while UTSA opens with Arizona, Kansas State and Oklahoma State. Both South Carolina and UTSA, like Notre Dame, play a non-"Power 5" team in week four.
- Notre Dame is one of just three NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision programs to have not faced a non-FBS opponent since the current setup was established in 1978. The two other remaining schools that have yet to play a non-FBS opponent are USC and UCLA.
- ▶ Nine of Notre Dame's 12 regular-season opponents in 2015 were bowl-eligible last year.
- Notre Dame will not play a team from the Big Ten during the regular season for the first time in a century. The last Irish schedule which did not include a Big Ten member is the team's 1916 slate. That 1916 schedule did include current Big Ten members Michigan State and Nebraska but neither was a member of the conference then. The familiar conference returns to the Irish slate in 2016 when Notre Dame plays host to Michigan State on Sept. 17.
- ► The Irish will face six ACC schools this year, the most teams from one league in a single season of Notre Dame football history. The Irish have previously faced five teams from the same conference on several occasions, most recently in 1992 when Notre Dame faced five Big. Ten teams (Michigan, Michigan State, Northwestern, Penn State and Purdue). The Irish are set to face ACC foes Virginia (Sept. 12), Georgia Tech (Sept. 19), Clemson (Oct. 3), Pittsburgh (Nov. 7), Wake Forest (Nov. 14) and Boston College (Nov. 21).
- Not only will Notre Dame face six ACC teams in 2015, but the Irish will face the two which the media thinks will be the best doing so in the first five weeks of the season. At the annual ACC Football Kickoff event in July in Pinehurst, North Carolina, a poll of 158 media members in attendance chose Clemson and Georgia Tech to win the league's Atlantic and Coastal divisions, respectively.
- ► It is believed that the 2015 schedule will mark the first time in school history where Notre Dame will not face a fellow independent. Navy, an independent fixture on the Notre Dame schedule since 1927, has joined the American Athletic Conference for this season. Notre Dame will bring an all-independent game back to its schedule on Nov. 12, 2016, when it faces Army at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas for the annual Shamrock Series contest. BYU joins Army and Notre Dame as the only independents in 2015. UMass is playing its final season in the Mid-American Conference this year and will join the independent ranks for 2016.
- Notre Dame faces just one opponent for the first time this fall, UMass. This year marks the seventh time in head coach **Brian Kelly**'s six years at Notre Dame where the Irish have added a fresh face to the all-time opponents roll. Notre Dame faced both Tulsa and Utah for the first time in 2010, USF and Wake Forest debuted in 2011. Temple was added in 2013 while Notre Dame squared off with Louisville for the first time in 2014.
- ► Since the NCAA began ranking strength of schedule in 1977, the Irish have 12 top-four finishes in that category, including ranking first in 1978, 1985, 1987, 1989, 1995 and 2010; third in 1986, 1999, 2003; and fourth in 1979, 1990 and 2012 in the NCAA toughest schedule standings.

### **2015 NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL NOTES**

#### **NOTRE DAME - VIRGINIA SERIES NOTES**

- Notre Dame and Virginia have only met once before, with the Irish claiming a 36-13 victory on Aug. 31, 1989, at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford. New Jersey in Kickoff Classic VII.
- ▶ The game served as Notre Dame's season-opener following on the heels of its 11th consensus national championship season. Before the game, head coach **Lou Holtz** said that "we have a better chance to repeat as national champions than anyone else in the country. But our chances to win the national championship this year aren't any better than anyone else's." The 1989 Irish would go 12–1, losing at No. 7 Miami in the regular-season finale. The Irish upset No. 1 Colorado in the Orange Bowl but finished at No. 2 in the final AP Poll behind the Hurricanes. Notre Dame were crowned national champions by Berryman, Sagarin and others, giving the school one of its 11 unclaimed national titles.
- In that 1989 game against Virginia, current Irish defensive backs coach **Todd Lyght** had two interceptions and also broke up a pass. The Irish raced out to a 33-0 halftime lead and cruised to the win. **Tony Rice** completed seven of his 11 passes for 147 yards and a touchdown while running for 70 more yards and a TD. **Ricky Watters** led the Irish with 80 rushing yards and a TD. **Raghib "Rocket" Ismail** caught five passes for 121 yards.
- ► The game attracted a then-Giants Stadium collegiate record crowd of 77,323.
- As a part of Notre Dame's 12-year scheduling agreement with the ACC, the Cavaliers are slated to travel to Notre Dame Stadium in 2019 and 2024 while the Irish will return to Charlottesville in 2021.

#### **NOTRE DAME - VIRGINIA CONNECTIONS**

- ► The Irish boast two student-athletes from the commonwealth of Virginia, RB **C.J. Prosise** (Petersburg / Woodberry Forest) and DL **Doug Randolph** (Richmond / Woodberry Forest). LB **Greer Martini** also played at Woodberry Forest, although he is from Cary, North Carolina.
- ► Virginia does not have any student-athletes from Michiana.
- Notre Dame offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach **Mike Sanford** was born in Lexington, Virginia where his father, also named **Mike Sanford**, served as an assistant coach at VMI from 1981-82.
- ► Three Virginia coaches have worked at Notre Dame. Associate head coach for defense **Jon Tenuta** served as Notre Dame's assistant head coach and linebackers coach in 2008, adding the title of defensive coordinator in 2009. Cavalier offensive line coach **Dave Borbely** served as Notre Dame's offensive line coach from 1998-2001. He is a native of Hammond, Indiana. Virginia defensive line coach **Jappy Oliver** coached the Irish defensive line from 2005-08. Oliver also served as defensive line coach at Grand Valley State in 1988 under Irish head coach **Brian Kelly**. He also served as assistant head coach at Buffalo from 2010-13 under Notre Dame offensive assistant **Jeff Quinn**, then head coach of the Bulls
- ▶ Virginia assistant AD for media relations **Jim Daves** worked in Notre Dame's sports information office from 1986-92, including the lone previous meeting between Notre Dame and Virginia.
- ▶ In his career as a head basketball coach, Virginia director of athletics **Craig Littlepage** only faced the Irish once. His Rutgers team fell by a 75–62 score to Notre Dame on Feb. 16, 1988, in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Coming out of high school, Littlepage was recruited to Penn by future Notre Dame head coach **Digger Phelps**, then a Quakers assistant.
- ▶ Irish defensive line coach **Keith Gilmore** held the same role at Illinois in 2012 while Virginia running backs coach **Chris Beatty** was the Illini's co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.
- ▶ Both Virginia (1971-81) and Notre Dame (1981-87) were led by **Gene Corrigan** who served as director of athletics at each school. Gene is the father of current Notre Dame men's lacrosse head coach **Kevin Corrigan** who has guided the Irish to championship weekend in four of the last six years. Kevin is a Virginia graduate.
- ▶ A number of players from Notre Dame and Virginia either attended the same high school or hail from the same hometown.

#### **NOTRE DAME'S NATIONAL FOOTPRINT SEES A NEW STEP**

- Saturday's game will mark Notre Dame's first game played in the commonwealth of Virginia.
- ▶ Virginia will become the 36th state to play host to a Notre Dame football game. The Fighting Irish have also played internationally in Dublin, Ireland (1996 and 2012 vs. Navy) and Tokyo, Japan (1979 vs. Miami).
- ▶ Virginia will be the first new state to join the roll of Irish hosts since West Virginia. The Mountaineer State first welcomed Notre Dame on Oct. 21, 2000, when the Irish downed West Virginia in Morgantown, 42–28.
- Notre Dame has yet to play a game in: Alaska, Arkansas, Delaware, Idaho, Kentucky, Maine, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wyoming. Kentucky will become the 37th state to welcome Notre Dame when the Irish play at Louisville on Labor Day, Sept. 2, 2019.
- ▶ In 2015, Notre Dame will play in three of the four states which refer to themselves with the colonial term "commonwealths" as opposed to being "states." In addition to this week's game at Virginia, the Irish will play twice in the commonwealth of Pennsylvania (at Temple on Oct. 31 and at Pittsburgh on Nov. 7) and once in the commonwealth of Massachusetts (vs. Boston College at Fenway Park in Boston on Nov. 21). The Irish do not have a game this year in the commonwealth of Kentucky.

#### NOTRE DAME VS. THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

- Notre Dame owns a .695 winning percentage (134–58–3) against teams that currently make up the Atlantic Coast Conference, with 69 of those 195 games coming against Pittsburgh the most of any opponent.
- This week's meeting with Virginia is the first of six games for the Irish this season against Atlantic Coast Conference competition the most times Notre Dame has ever opposed a single conference's teams in one season.
- ▶ The Irish went 2-2 against the ACC last year, defeating Syracuse (Sept. 27) and North Carolina (Oct. 11), but losing at No. 2 Florida State (Oct. 18) and against Louisville (Nov. 22).
- This is the second year of a 12-year scheduling agreement that will see the Irish play 10 ACC teams over each two-year period.
- ► Notre Dame's annual ACC opponents and sites through 2025 can be found on page 16.
- ► Since **Brian Kelly** took over as Notre Dame head coach in 2010, Notre Dame is 12-4 (.750) against current ACC competition with the lone blemishes being losses to Florida State in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl, at Pittsburgh on Nov. 9, 2013, at Florida State on Oct. 18, 2014, and vs. Louisville on Nov. 22, 2014.
- ► The Irish own a .500-or-better all-time record against 10 of the 14 ACC schools. Notre Dame has never played Virginia Tech and owns losing records against only Florida State (2-6-0), Louisville (0-1-0) and North Carolina State (0-1-0).
- Notre Dame has played four different ACC schools at least 20 times, Pittsburgh (69 meetings), Georgia Tech (34), Miami, Fla. (25) and Boston College (22). Only the Big Ten can claim more such series with six.

#### **IRISH ON A PRETTY GOOD RUN**

- ➤ Since opening the 2011 season with an 0-2 record, Notre Dame has won 38 of its last 51 games—good for a .745 winning percentage. The Irish tie for the 14th-best winning percentage in the nation since Sept. 17, 2011.
- Notre Dame boasts a 30-10 record in its 40 outings since the start of the 2012 season. There are only 14 Football Bowl Subdivision teams which can beat that lofty 30-win mark during the past three years and only 12 that eclipse Notre Dame's .750 winning percentage since 2012.
- The Irish are one of 11 teams in the nation with at least eight wins in each of the last five seasons (2010–14). joining Alabama, Boise State, Florida State, LSU, Nebraska, Northern Illinois, Oklahoma, Oregon, Stanford and Wisconsin.
- Notre Dame's run of winning eight games in each of the past five seasons (2010–14) is its best clip since winning at least eight games for seven straight years from 1987–93.

#### NO TURNOVERS = VICTORIES

- Notre Dame is 17-0 under **Brian Kelly** when playing an entire game without committing a turnover.
- Notre Dame has won its last 17 games in which it failed to commit a turnover. The Irish have not lost a game with no turnovers since Oct. 17, 2009, when USC upended Notre Dame, 34-27.
- Notre Dame is 31-4 in its last 35 games in which it failed to commit a turnover.
- ► The Irish have did committed a turnover on Opening Day for the last three years. Notre Dame did not turn the ball over against either Temple (2013), Rice (2014) or Texas (2015). The Irish have played 219:02 worth of Opening Day football since its last turnover, a Parrish Gaines interception of **Everett Golson** in the second quarter of the 2012 season opener against Navy in Dublin, Ireland.

#### RIGHT DOWN TO THE WIRE

- Notre Dame has become accustomed to thrilling finishes. The Irish have been involved in 39 games decided by seven points or less since the start of the 2009 campaign. In fact, 20 of the last 30 losses for the Irish have been decided by a touchdown or less, including nine by a field goal or less.
- Notre Dame has played in 61 all-time games where the winning points have occurred in overtime or the game's final minute of regulation. Curiously, 15 have come since the 2008 season, including Notre Dame's 31–28 victory over No. 22 LSU in the 2014 Music City Bowl a game decided on a 32-yard field goal by **Kyle Brindza** as time expired.
- Notre Dame has played 29 games decided by a touchdown or less since the arrival of Brian Kelly. The Irish went 2-5 in the first seven such games under Kelly, but have since gone 16-6.
- ▶ Under **Brian Kelly**, Notre Dame is 12–9 (.571) in games decided by four points or less. When the halftime score differential is four points or less, the Irish are 12–3 under Kelly.
- ▶ When trailing after three quarters, Kelly and the Irish own a 7-13 mark, a winning percentage of .350 that ranked eighth among all FBS schools since 2010 entering the 2015 season.

#### **IRISH MAKE REFEREE'S WORK EASY**

- Notre Dame was good about keeping things quiet for officiating crews in 2014 as they had to throw precious few flags.
- ▶ The disciplined Irish ranked 13th nationally for fewest penalty yards (487), 12th for fewest penalty yards per game (37.5) and 16th for fewest penalties (58).
- ► Conversely, Notre Dame's opponents yielded 696 penalty yards last fall, generating a difference of 209 yards (16.1 yards per game) of field position gained by the Irish.
- ► The Irish were flagged for fewer penalty yards in nine of its 13 games last fall.
- ► Curiously, Notre Dame has done better under Brian Kelly when committing more penalties than its opponents. When the Irish have fewer penalty yards, the team is 23–12 (.657) since 2010, but Notre Dame stands at 22–7 (.759) under Kelly when opponents have fewer penalty yards and 1–1 when penalty yards are tied.

#### ALMOST PERFECT BALANCE

- Once again in 2014, the Irish were almost exactly balanced on play calls. Notre Dame has had 463 passing plays and 484 rushing plays, a mere 51.1 percent lead towards runs.
- In 2013, Notre Dame had 440 rushing attempts and 429 passing attempts, giving the Irish a balanced 50.6 percent run attack.
- ▶ Adjust the eight sacks that the NCAA considers rushing plays and the 2013 numbers would have been even closer as Notre Dame would have 432 rushing attempts and 437 passing plays, a 50.3 percent tilt towards passing.

#### **WELCOME HOME!**

- Three additions to the Notre Dame football coaching and support staffs this season also happen to be three former Irish greats who now aim to return their alma mater to glory, while a fourth coaching staff addition spent part of his childhood around the team.
- ► Arguably the best defensive back Notre Dame has produced, **Todd Lyght** was a two-time consensus All-American and a starter on the 1988 national championship team. The fifth overall pick in the 1991 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams, Lyght played in the league for 12 years. He earned All-Pro accolades and won a Super Bowl ring with the Rams in Super Bowl XXXIV.
- ▶ **Autry Denson** is the new running backs coach for the Irish. A three-year starter and two-time team Most Valuable Player, Denson starred for Notre Dame from 1995-98. He is the all-time leading rusher in school history with his 4,318 yards.
- Former Irish quarterback **Ron Powlus** has rejoined the Irish this year as the program's director of player development. Powlus is charged with helping the intellectual, social and spiritual development of the team's student-athletes. He is the program's primary point of contact with the student welfare and development and academic services for student-athletes in addition to holding a role coordinating community service projects.
- Another familiar addition to the staff is offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach **Mike Sanford**. Sanford's father, also named Mike, served as Notre Dame's quarterbacks coach from 1996-98. The younger Sanford attended Penn High School in Mishawaka while his father helped mentor Irish passers, including Powlus.

#### **GREAT FOR TELEVISION**

- Notre Dame has appeared on national or regional television in 276 consecutive games entering the Virginia game.
- ► The Irish have made 394 appearances on network television more than any other school.

#### **2015 NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL NOTES**

#### **FIVE CAPTAINS NAMED FOR 2015 SEASON**

- ► On August 27, Notre Dame head coach **Brian Kelly** announced five captains for the 2015 team, senior defensive lineman **Sheldon Day**, graduate cornerback **Matthias Farley**, graduate center **Nick Martin**, graduate linebacker **Joe Schmidt** and junior linebacker **Jaylon Smith**.
- ► The five-player captain contingent is the largest season-long collection of captains for the Irish since 2007, when **Tom Zbikowski**, **Travis Thomas**, **John Carlson**, **John Sullivan** and **Maurice Crum Jr.** served as team captains.
- ▶ Day and Martin are the 20th and 21st different two-time captains in program history after previously serving in the role in 2014, with Smith joining the duo to represent three Indiana natives among the 2015 captains.
- Martin's brother and current Dallas Cowboys offensive lineman, **Zack Martin**, was also a two-time Notre Dame captain in 2012–13. The Martins become the first pair of brothers to serve as team captains for the Notre Dame football team over multiple seasons, and are only the second brother combination in program history to be named captain along with **Bob Golic** (1978) and **Mike Golic Sr.** (1984).
- Three of the captains, Day (Indianapolis), Martin (Indianapolis) and Smith (Fort Wayne) are from Indiana.

#### **TEN FRESHMEN DEBUT**

- Notre Dame played 10 freshmen on Opening Day in its 38-3 win over Texas. That list includes RB Josh Adams, CB Nick Coleman, LB Te'von Coney, DB Nicco Fertitta, TE Alizé Jones, WR Equinameous St. Brown, PR C.J. Sanders, DL Jerry Tillery, RB Dexter Williams and PK Justin Yoon.
- Adams made perhaps the most significant contribution after starting RB **Tarean Folston** was lost for the season due to a first quarter injury against the Longhorns. Adams ran the ball five times for 49 yards a two touchdowns. He became the first Irish freshman running back to score a touchdown on his first carry at Notre Dame Stadium since **Art Best** did so on a 56-yard run against Purdue in 1972. He became the first Notre Dame freshman runner with two TDs in a game since **Darius Walker** did so against Pittsburgh on Nov. 13, 2004.
- ▶ Yoon connected on all five of his extra-point attempts and also made a 38-yard field goal while missing from 45. He became the first freshman kicker to make a field goal for Notre Dame since **Nick Tausch** hit a pair on Oct. 31, 2009, against Washington State in the inaugural Shamrock Series game at the Alamodome in San Antonio, Texas.
- ► Tillery recorded a sack for a four-yard loss.

#### IRISH MARCH FULL FIELDS TO CORRAL LONGHORNS

- Notre Dame had two touchdown drives of at least 90 yards in its 38-3 win over Texas on Sept. 5.
- ► In the first quarter, the Irish marched 95 yards on nine plays to paydirt, capped by a 14-runTD rush by **Josh Adams**. In the third quarter, Notre Dame needed just five plays to go 90 yards, keyed by a 66-yard TD pass from **Malik Zaire** to **Will Fuller**.
- ► The last time the Irish had a pair of TD drives of at least 90 yards came during a 49-28 win at Purdue on Oct. 1, 2005. Both of those drives were capped by one-yard TD plunges by **Rashon Powers-Neal**.

#### **GROUND GAME GETS A WORKOUT**

- Notre Dame's may have racked up 313 passing yards against Texas on Sept. 5, but the Irish also ran the ball 52 times against the Longhorns for 214 yards. The Irish closed the 2014 season by running the ball 51 times in their Music City Bowl win over No. 22 LSU, giving the team 103 total rushing attempts over consecutive games.
- ▶ This combination of games marks the first time that the Irish have run the ball at least 50 times in consecutive games since 2005 when the Irish ran it 50 times at Purdue on 0ct. 1 and then 52 times against USC on 0ct. 15 after a bye week.
- ► The last time the Irish ran the ball more than 103 times in consecutive games came in 2001 when Notre Dame ran the ball 59 times at Boston College on Oct. 27 and then posted 45 running plays at home on Nov. 3 against Tennessee.

#### **OFFENSIVE LINE PAVES THE WAY**

- ▶ Notre Dame returns three starters from last year's offensive line. Left tackle **Ronnie Stanley** (27 career starts) center **Nick Martin** (25) and right guard **Steve Elmer** (18) have combined for 70 career starts. The Irish also return right tackle **Mike McGlinchey**, who made his first career start in the Music City Bowl victory over No. 22 LSU.
- Martin, Stanley and Elmer each started all 13 games in 2014, but only Stanley started every game of the season at the same position left tackle. Martin started games at both center and left guard, while Elmer started games at both right tackle and right guard.
- With **Quenton Nelson** starting at left quard, Notre Dame's starting offensive line averages 6 feet 5.6 inches tall and 313.2 pounds.
- ► Stanley, a senior, has made 27 career starts. He started all 13 games at right tackle in 2013 and slid over to left tackle for 2014, replacing first-round NFL Draft pick **Zack Martin** of the Dallas Cowboys.
- Notre Dame's Offensive Lineman of the Year in 2014, Stanley recorded 16 knockdown blocks and yielded just one sack the fewest of any Irish offensive lineman. Stanley faced some of the top defensive linemen in the country a year ago, including Michigan's Frank Clark, Arizona State's Marcus Hardison, Louisville's Sheldon Rankins and Lorenzo Mauldin, Stanford's Henry Anderson, USC's Leonard Williams and LSU's Daniel Hunter. That group of seven opposing players combined for 92.5 tackles for loss and 46 sacks during the 2014 season, but managed just six tackles for loss and two sacks in their outings against the Irish.
- ▶ On Aug. 30, 2014, against Rice, Stanley became the first Irish player other than Zack Martin to start at left tackle since **Matt Romine** on Oct. 16, 2010.
- Martin has made 25 career starts. He started each of the first 11 games in 2013 before to a knee injury suffered against BYU on Nov. 23, 2013, forced him to miss the Stanford game and Pinstripe Bowl contest with Rutgers. Martin returned to the starting lineup for the 2014 season opener against Rice at center. Against Syracuse (Sept. 27), Nick Martin started at left guard, his first career start at a position other than center, and remained there for the rest of the 2014 season.
- A two-time team captain, Martin earned a spot on the watch lists for the Lombardi Award, Outland Trophy and the Rimington Trophy.
- ▶ Elmer started four games at right guard in 2013 as a freshman. He began the 2014 campaign as the starter at right tackle but shifted back inside to right guard for the Syracuse game. Elmer has maintained that starting role to this day.

Irish Among

- ► McGlinchey emerged as the starter at right tackle after playing in 13 games last fall as **Christian Lombard**'s top backup with one start.
- ▶ While Notre Dame's starting offensive linemen had 68 career starts entering the season, the second unit of **Hunter Bivin**, **Alex Bars**, **Sam Mustipher**, **Colin McGovern** and **Mark Harrell**, has no career starts among them.
- ► The unit helped pave the way for 527 yards of total offense against Texas in the season opener on Sept. 5, yielding just one sack.

#### TOUGH TO BEAT WHEN WINNING THE RUSHING BATTLE

- ► Since the start of the 2005 season, Notre Dame has won 54 of its past 59 games when recording more rushing yards than its opponent, including a 5–1 mark in 2014.
- ► Sixth-year head coach **Brian Kelly** has his own fairly remarkable run when his teams outrush their opponents. He is 172-26-1 in his career and 35-5 at Notre Dame when winning the rushing battle.
- ► The Irish were 5-2 in 2013 when outrushing their opponents a year after Notre Dame outrushed 10 of its 13 opponents in 2012 and went 9-1 in those games.

#### **30 IS THE WAY TO CARRY THE DAY**

- The number 30 had proven critical when predicting Notre Dame's overall success until recently.
- Notre Dame had a run of 26 consecutive games where it did not lose a game in which it had at least 30 rushing attempts snapped on Oct. 18, 2014, at No. 2 Florida State. The Irish ran the ball effectively against the Seminoles, gaining 157 yards on 35 carries (4.5 average) but lost a game for the first time when carrying the ball at least 30 times since an 18–14 defeat vs. Florida State in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl in Orlando. However, the Irish remain 28–3 (.903) in its last 31 games when it has ran the ball at least 30 times.
- ► Conversely, Notre Dame has lost its last eight games when rushing the ball less than 30 times, dating back to a 59-33 win over Air Force on Oct. 8, 2011, when the Irish ran the ball 29 times for 266 yards.
- The Irish went 8-3 in 2014 when rushing the ball at least 30 times. Notre Dame carried the ball at least 30 times in each of its first 10 games along with its Music City Bowl win over No. 22 LSU.

#### **DOUBLE CENTURY GROUND GAME**

- Notre Dame is 34-3 since the start of the 2002 season when it gains 200 or more yards rushing.
- ► The Irish opened the 2015 season by rushing for 214 yards in its 38-3 win over Texas.
- ▶ Notre Dame capped its 2014 season in style with 263 rushing yards in a Music City Bowl win over No. 22 LSU. Only Auburn and Mississippi State (both 268) ran for more yards against the Tigers last year.
- ► The Irish ran for 281 yards against Rice on Aug. 30, 2014. That sum marked the team's best total since rushing for 376 yards against Miami on Oct. 6, 2012, in a Shamrock Series contest at Soldier Field.
- Notre Dame ran for at least 200 yards seven times in 2012, including six of the last nine contests.
- ▶ The Irish had not posted more 200+ yard rushing games in a single season since 1996 when Notre Dame registered nine games with at least 200 yards rushing.

#### **IRISH HANG ONTO THE FOOTBALL**

- Notre Dame's running backs have established an impressive resume for holding onto the football since the arrival of head coach **Brian Kelly**. The Irish trio of **Cam McDaniel**, **Tarean Folston** and **Greg Bryant** toted the rock 316 times in 2014 and only lost a fumble twice.
- Notre Dame running backs have lost 12 fumbles over 1,796 carries since 2010, an average of just one lost fumble for every 149.7 carries, or one every 5.4 games.
- ► Here is a look at the success Irish running backs have had in terms of ball security since the arrival of head coach **Brian Kelly**:

#### **NEW FACES ABOUND AT RUNNING BACK**

- ► **Tarean Folston** started 10 of Notre Dame's 13 games a year ago and started the 2015 season opener against Texas, however the junior was lost for the season in the first quarter of that game, suffering a knee injury on this third carry. The Doak Walker Award watch list member proved to be dependable running the ball last fall and also proved to be a good pass target out of the backfield.
- ► He led Notre Dame in carries (175), rushing yards (889), rushing yards per game (68.4) in 2014, and ranked second on the team with six rushing TDs. Folston's 889 rushing yards were the most by an Irish sophomore since **Darius Walker** ran for 1,196 yards in 2006. Folston rushed for over 100 yards in four of Notre Dame's last seven games.
- ► Senior **C.J. Prosise** is next in line at running back after spending his Irish career prior to this year as a slot receiver. Prosise proved that he's a legitimate candidate for a starting role when he ran for 64 yards on 12 carries in the 2015 Blue–Gold game and displayed a rare combination of size (6-foot–0.5-inch, 220 pounds), power, elusiveness and speed.
- Prosise gained 98 yards rushing on 20 carries against Texas in his first action as a running back. He also caught a six-yard pass.
- ▶ Prosise played in all 13 games and started six times (Syracuse, Stanford, North Carolina, Florida State, Navy and Northwestern) at wide receiver a year ago. He not only led all Notre Dame receivers with an average of 17.8 yards per catch, but he also led the Irish in total special teams tackles (11), kickoff return tackles (eight) and punt return tackles (three). Prosise even added 126 yards rushing on 10 carries. He became the first Notre Dame player with at least 500 yards receiving and 100 yards rushing in the same season since Golden Tate's consensus All-America campaign in 2009.
- ▶ Showing his big play potential, Prosise recorded three of Notre Dame's five receptions of at least 50 yards, four of the team's 11 receptions of at least 40 yards and 10 receptions of at least 20 yards. He registered four plays (three receptions and one rush) of 50 yards or longer. This grouping includes a 78-yard TD reception on the second play from scrimmage against Navy (Nov. 1) and a 50-yard TD run in the Music City Bowl win over No. 22 LSU (Dec. 30).
- ► Two heralded freshmen could contribute at running back. **Josh Adams** and **Dexter Williams** will work into the playing rotation, especially with the loss of Folston.
- Adams ran the ball five times for 49 yards and a pair of TDs in the win over Texas. He became the first freshman Notre Dame running back since Darius Walker in 2004 to score two TDs in a single game.
- ▶ Williams ran the ball seven times for 24 yards against the Longhorns in his collegiate debut.

#### **WIDE ARRAY OF WIDE RECEIVERS**

- Notre Dame's wide receiving crop has some of its deepest talent of any positional group in a team which is deep in many places.
- ▶ Junior **Will Fuller** entered 2015 on the heels of the best sophomore receiving season in school history. His 15 TD receptions, 76 catches and 1,094 receiving yards a year ago were the most in school history by a sophomore and led the 2014 Irish in all three categories.
- Fuller is on preseason watch lists for both the Biletnikoff and Walter Camp awards.
- ► Fuller wasted no time in showing his big-play abilities in 2015, catching seven passes for 142 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the season-opener against Texas on Sept. 5.
- ▶ In 2014, Fuller ranked third in the FBS in TD catches, 21st in receiving yards, 23rd in receiving yards per game (84.2), tied for 24th in total TDs (15) and 34th in receptions per game (5.8). He had at least one touchdown catch in 11 of 13 games, and eight of his 15 TD catches went for at least 20 yards.
- ► Fuller, who already ranks tied for eighth in school history with 18 career TD grabs has eclipsed 100 yards receiving in five games, including three of the team's last five contests. He has had a catch of at least 30 yards in eight of Notre Dame's last 14 games, and registered three of Notre Dame's six receptions of at least 50 yards over that time. In 2014, Fuller became the fourth player in school history with a pair of TD receptions of 72 yards or longer (Nick Eddy in 1964, Tim Brown in 1986, and Golden Tate in 2009).
- Last year, Fuller recorded five of Notre Dame's 11 receptions of at least 40 yards, 19 receptions of at least 20 yards, 51 of his 76 receptions went for a first down or touchdown and 17 of his 19 third-down receptions went for a first down or touchdown.
- ► Senior **Chris Brown** (39 for 548, one TD in 2014) played in all 13 games last season and started every contest with the exception of Michigan and Syracuse. He ranked second on the Irish in receiving yards, second in receiving yards per game (42.2) and third in receptions. Brown registered four receptions of at least 30 yards, nine catches of at least 20 yards, 24 of his 39 receptions went for a first down or touchdown and eight of his nine third-down receptions went for a first down or touchdown.
- ▶ Junior **Corey Robinson** (40 for 539, five TDs in 2014) is another popular target at wide receiver.
- ▶ The high-flying son of basketball Hall of Famer David Robinson played in all 13 games in 2014 and started against both Michigan and Syracuse. Robinson ranked second on the Irish in receptions and TD catches, as well as third in receiving yards. He registered 10 receptions of at least 20 yards, 32 of his 40 receptions went for first downs or touchdowns and 10 of his 11 receptions on third down went for first downs or touchdowns.
- ▶ Robinson excelled in the classroom as well. He became the first sophomore at an NCAA Division I institution to earn first-team Academic All-America honors since 2008 and just the fourth sophomore to attain first-team status since 2002. Robinson is the first Irish player named a first-team Academic All-American since **Manti Te'o** and **Mike Golic Jr.** in 2012. He became the second Irish sophomore football player to earn first-team Academic All-America status, and the first since **Joe Heap** in 1952.
- ▶ The starting slot receiver position remains up for grabs as **Amir Carlisle** and **Torii Hunter Jr.** continue to vie for the top spot. Both played regularly against Texas on Sept. 5 in the 2015 season opener. Carlisle caught three passes for 55 yards while Hunter Jr. earned the start and snared a pair of passes for 31 yards.
- ► Carlisle, a former running back, started six games last season (Rice, Michigan, Purdue, No. 11 Arizona State, Louisville and USC) his first year at the position. He recorded the third-most starts of any wide receiver on the team. Carlisle ranked sixth on the Irish in receiving yards, fifth in receiving yards per game (25.8) and sixth in receptions.
- Carlisle also serves as Notre Dame's primary kick returner. He registered 35 kickoff returns for 761 yards in 2014, including a season-best 47-yard return versus Purdue.
- Hunter (7 for 65, one TD in 2014) lost his freshman season in 2013 to lingering effects of a broken leg and then missed each of the first three games of 2014 due to a groin injury but is healthy entering 2015.

- ► Four freshmen have battled hard during preseason camp for places in the wide receiver rotation and could be rewarded. **Miles Boykin, Jalen Guyton, Equanimeous St. Brown** and **C.J. Sanders**. all showed why they were such highly-rated recruits in August.
- ► St. Brown found a spot on the two-deep for Texas behind Fuller. He played in the game but did not make a catch. Sanders tried his hand at returning punts against the Longhorns in addition to lining up at wide receiver.

#### **COMBINATION OF TIGHT ENDS GIVES IRISH OPTIONS**

- Notre Dame has become "Tight End U" recently as each of the last six starting tight ends for the Irish have been NFL Draft picks, five of them being either first or second round NFL Draft picks, an esteemed roll that includes **Anthony Fasano** (2006 second round Dallas), **John Carlson** (2008 second round Seattle), **Kyle Rudolph** (2011 second round Minnesota), **Tyler Eifert** (2013 first round Cincinnati), **Troy Niklas** (2014 second round Arizona) and **Ben Koyack** (2015 seventh round Jacksonville).
- ► Head coach Brian Kelly can utilize a slew of options at this position which sees the Irish list a four-way "or" for the backup spot.
- ▶ Junior Durham Smythe holds the starting tight end role. Smythe also holds the only receptions among the Irish tight end unit, making a seven-yard grab at Arizona State on Nov. 8, 2014, and a six-yard grab on Sept. 5 against Texas.
- Listed behind Smythe are sophomore **Tyler Luatua**, sophomore **Nic Weishar**, graduate **Chase Hounshell** and freshman **Alizé Jones**. The four all have different strengths in terms of blocking, passcatching and route running. Kelly stated during preseason camp that he'll likely use multiple tight-end sets to take full advantage of the versatility in this roster segment.
- ▶ Of the four, only Luatua had collegiate playing experience at tight end prior to 2015. The Californian saw action in 10 games in 2014, mainly on special teams and in two-tight end sets.
- ▶ Hounshell converted to tight end from defensive line during spring practice. He spent the first four years of his time at Notre Dame with that unit, appearing in 11 games while making six tackles.
- ▶ Weishar and Jones both made their collegiate debuts against Texas on Sept. 5 and appear ready to contribute after a strong pair of preseason camps.

#### **MALIK'S MYSTIQUE**

- Notre Dame junior Malik Zaire put forth one of the best Notre Dame Stadium starting debuts by a quarterback against Texas on Sept. 5. In his first home start, and second overall, Zaire completed 19 of 22 passes for 313 yards with three touchdowns. Zaire's .864 completion percentage ranks second in school history for a single game, eclipsed only by the .909 (10 of 11) mark posted by **Steve Beuerlein** against Colorado on Sept. 22, 1984.
- Against TexasZaire was 13-for-14 for 273 yards on passes thrown at least 10 yards in the air
- ► Zaire's magnificent home debut is rivaled by perhaps only **Terry Hanratty** (16 of 24, 303 yards, three TDs) in a 26-14 victory over No. 8 Purdue in 1966 and **Tom Clements** going 17 of 24 for 287 yards and two TDs against Purdue in 1972.
- ► Zaire became just the fifth Notre Dame player to throw for over 300 yards in a season opener, joining Hanratty (1966 vs. Purdue), **Jarious Jackson** (1999 vs. Michigan), **Jimmy Clausen** (2009 vs. Nevada) and **Tommy Rees** (2013 vs. Temple).
- ➤ Zaire made his first career start count as he earned Most Valuable Player accolades for helping lead the Irish past No. 22 LSU in the 2014 Music City Bowl. Zaire ran the ball 22 times for 96 yards against the Tigers while also completing 12 of 15 passes for 96 yards and a touchdown. Zaire also threw a block downfield which helped spring **Tarean Folston** free for a second quarter TD.
- ► Zaire has been named to both the Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award watch lists.
- Eaire was 21 of 35 for 266 yards, one TD, no interceptions in seven games last fall. He added 187 yards rushing on 33 carries, including a pair of TD runs. Zaire registered a 56-yard run in the season-opening victory over Rice (Aug. 30) his first career snap in a Notre Dame uniform. He saw extensive playing time in the season-finale at USC (Nov. 29) in relief of **Everett Golson**. Zaire, who led the Irish on five drives against the Trojans, helped the Irish to a pair of touchdown drives. He completed nine of 20 passes for 170 yards, including a 49-yard pass play. Zaire also ran for 18 yards on six carries, including a long run of 14 yards and an 11-yard TD rush.
- ▶ Aside from Zaire, no Notre Dame player had thrown a collegiate pass before 2015. Sophomore **DeShone Kizer** holds down the backup role at quarterback. He serves as Notre Dame's holder on special teams and threw one incomplete pass against Texas on Sept. 5. Freshman **Brandon Wimbush** is also vying for that top backup position. **Montgomery VanGorder**, son of defensive coordinator **Brian VanGorder** will assume graduated senior **Charlie Fiessinger**'s role in relaying plays from the sideline to the field.

#### **NO NEED TO GET ACQUAINTED ON DEFENSE**

- ▶ The Irish are blessed with a wealth of both returning starters on defense in addition to a large number of players with experience in reserve roles.
- ▶ Notre Dame returns 10 of its 11 regular starters from 2014 with the lone exception, graduated CB **Cody Riggs**, being replaced in 2015 by **KeiVarae Russell** who started all 26 games in 2012–13 but missed the '14 campaign.
- ▶ The Irish used 20 starters on defense over the course of an injury-riddled season and 17 of them return this fall. The 2015 Irish have 19 defensive players with career starting experience with the inclusion of Russell and **Jarrett Grace** (injured in '14).
- ▶ Notre Dame's defense entered the 2015 season with a combined 203 career starts.
- ▶ The Irish return players who accounted for 89.6 percent of the team's '14 tackles, 92.5 percent of its tackles for loss and 100 percent of its sacks from last fall.

#### **DEFENSE PRETTY STINGY ON THE SCOREBOARD**

- Notre Dame's defense has allowed two offensive touchdowns or less in 35 of its last 57 games. The lrish have actually allowed one offensive TD or less in 24 of those outings, including 18 of the last 40 games.
- Notre Dame has allowed an average of 20.77 points/game over the last six seasons combined, which ranks as the 14th-best average over 2010-15 of any team in the Football Bowl Subdivision.

#### THE 300 CLUB

- Notre Dame has allowed 300 yards of total offense or less in 20 of its last 46 games.
- Notre Dame has won 16 straight games when limiting its opponent to 300 yards of total offense or less. The Irish are 25–2 under Brian Kelly when their opponent fails to eclipse the 300-yard mark of total offense.
- Notre Dame has held 41 percent of its opponents (27) in the **Brian Kelly** era (66 games) to less than 300 yards of total offense.
- ► The Irish held Texas to just 163 yards of total offense on Sept. 5. It marked the best performance by the Notre Dame defense since holding Washington to 124 yards in Seattle on Oct. 25, 2008.

#### **KEY TO IRISH DEFENSIVE SUCCESS IS STOPPING THE RUN**

- ► Carrying the ball across the goal line has not been a regular occurrence for Irish opponents of late.
- ► The Irish kept Texas out of the end zone in the 2015 season opener and yielded just 21 rushing touchdowns in 2014, building upon a recent trend.
- Notre Dame's defense allowed four rushing TDs in 2012 (and the first did not come until the eighth game of the year). The Irish were the only team in the Football Bowl Subdivision that did not allow a rushing TD over its first seven games of the season. Notre Dame still led the FBS in fewest rushing TDs with four.
- Notre Dame allowed just 13 rushing TDs in 2013, which ranked 15th in the FBS.
- ► Since the start of the 2011 season, only three teams have allowed fewer rushing TDs than Notre Dame's 46.

- Notre Dame has given up 47 rushing touchdowns over its last 57 games (dating back to the Tulsa game in 2010). Even more amazing, only 28 of those rushing TDs have come from an opposing running back.
- Even crazier, 20 of the last 41 rushing TDs against the Irish have come from quarterbacks.
- Over the last 61 games, only 22 running backs have recorded a rushing TD against Notre Dame.

#### **IRISH RANKED 15TH NATIONALLY IN INTERCEPTIONS**

- Notre Dame's defense ranked among the best in the nation last year in interceptions. The Irish stood tied for 15th in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 16 interceptions in 2014.
- ▶ Nine different Notre Dame players intercepted a pass in 2014. **Cole Luke** and **Matthias Farley** shared the team lead with four.
- Notre Dame intercepted at least one pass in each of its first 11 games last year before failing to intercept a USC pass on Nov. 29. At that point, the Irish boasted an active streak of 14 consecutive games with an interception, last failing to pick off a pass on Nov. 9, 2013, at Pittsburgh.
- Notre Dame's streak of 14 consecutive games with an interception stood as the longest active run in the FBS entering the USC game.
- Notre Dame has not registered a longer streak of consecutive games with an interception since 2001-02 (20 games).

#### **SHARING THE WEALTH ON SACKS**

- ▶ When LB **Nyles Morgan** split a sack against No. 22 LSU in the Music City Bowl, it exemplified the diversity of pass pressure sources seen by Notre Dame's defense in 2014.
- ▶ With the addition of Morgan to the roll, 16 different Notre Dame players factored in a sack in 2014.
- ► The 16 players to record a sack stood as the most for the Irish since 1987 when Notre Dame also saw 16 different players sack an opposing quarterback.
- ► The 2015 season opener against Texas saw four Notre Dame defenders record a solo sack in **Sheldon Day, Romeo Okwara, Jaylon Smith** and **Jerry Tillery**.

#### **DEFENSIVE LINE UNDERGOING FACELIFT**

- The Irish return four starters on their defensive line but lost one of them for the season when tackle **Jarron Jones** suffered a season-ending knee injury during preseason camp.
- The unit's unequivocal leader is preseason All-American and two-time team captain **Sheldon Day**.
- ▶ An Indianapolis native, Day ranked second on the Irish in quarterback hurries (nine) last year and tied for second in tackles for loss. He also finished tied for first among all Notre Dame defensive linemen in tackles with 40.
- ▶ **Romeo Okwara** enters his second season as a defensive lineman after spending his first two years as an outside linebacker. He played in all 13 games and started 12 a year ago, leading Notre Dame in sacks.
- ▶ Another returning starter on the defensive line, **Isaac Rochell** has the ability to play both inside, as evidenced by his performance in the Music City Bowl victory over No. 22 LSU, as well as on the edge.
- ▶ Rochell was one of three Irish defensive players who started all 13 games in 2014. He ranked tied for third among all defensive linemen in tackles, tied for second on the team in tackles for loss and fourth on the Irish with two and a half sacks. Rochell added a team-best 10 quarterback hurries.
- ▶ Jones played and started on the defensive line in each of the first 11 games last year before suffering a foot injury. He tied Day for the most tackles by an Irish defensive lineman with 40 and tied for second on the team with seven and a half tackles for loss.

- ▶ Replacing Jones' reps will be a combination of sophomore **Daniel Cage** and early-enrollee **Jerry Tillery**. Cage played in 11 games a year ago, making four tackles. He earned the start on Opening Day against Texas and made three tackles. A high school All-American, Tillery stands 6 foot 6.5 inches tall at 305 pounds. Tillery's emergence this spring caught the eye of many around the Irish program. Initially recruited by Notre Dame as an offensive lineman, Tillery displayed an impressive combination of power, strength and footwork that will lead to immediate playing time this fall. He made his collegiate debut against Texas and recorded a sack.
- Sophomores **Jonathan Bonner**, **Jay Hayes** and **Andrew Trumbetti** are the top reserves as the 2015 season begins. Trumbetti saw the most playing time of that trio as a freshman, appearing in 12 games with a start in the Music City Bowl against No. 22 LSU. Trumbetti made 21 tackles on the year, 5.5 of them for a loss. Hayes played in the final three games of '14 as injuries decimated the front lines of the unit. Bonner did not play as a freshman last fall.
- Adding yet another level of experienced depth to the defensive line is junior **Jacob Matuska**, who played in seven games last year with a start at USC (Nov. 29), and sophomore **Grant Blankenship** who saw action in 11 games as a freshman.

#### LINEBACKERS THE BACKBONE OF ELITE DEFENSE

- ▶ Notre Dame could have the best linebacking unit of any school in the country, one led by preseason first-team All-American **Jaylon Smith**.
- ▶ Smith, a 2014 Associated Press second team All-America selection and Butkus Award finalist, started all 13 games last year and led the Irish in total tackles, solo tackles (65), assisted tackles (47) and tackles for loss. Smith ranked tied for second on the team with three and a half sacks.
- ► Smith made athletic plays all over the field against Texas on Sept. 5, leading the Irish with seven tackles, including an eight-vard sack. Smith also contributed a pass pressure.
- ▶ Smith reached the double-digit tackle plateau on four separate occasions in 2014, including each of the last three games of the regular season. The last Irish player with 10 or more tackles in three straight games was **Manti Te'o** in 2012 (had 10+ tackles in four straight games). Smith was the first Notre Dame player to record 100 tackles in a season since Te'o had 113 in 2012, and was the first Irish sophomore to record 100 tackles in a season since Te'o had 133 in 2010.
- ▶ Dubbed by Smith as the **Joe Montana** of Notre Dame's defense, a complex pro-style scheme under the direction of defensive coordinator **Brian VanGorder**, graduate **Joe Schmidt** returned to the lineup in 2015.
- ▶ A former walk-on who is now a team captain, Schmidt was one of college football's great stories last season before an injury against Navy (Nov. 1) sidelined him for the remainder of the year. Schmidt was voted Most Valuable Player by his teammates despite missing the season's final five games. The graduate started each of the first eight games of the year and led the Irish in tackles and solo tackles (42) to that point.
- ▶ With Schmidt in the lineup on a full-time basis last year (the first seven games), Notre Dame allowed 19.1 points per game, 102.7 rushing yards per game and 345.6 total yards per game. Without him over the final five games of the year, the Irish allowed 42.1 points per game, 234.0 rushing yards per game and 476.2 total yards per game.
- Another interesting story is the third starting linebacker, converted wide receiver **James Onwualu**. While Onwualu's story failed to garner nearly as much attention as Schmidt's, he developed into a reliable option in just his first season at the position.
- ▶ Onwualu played in all 13 games in 2014 and started eight contests. He recorded career bests in both tackles (seven) and tackles for loss (2.0) in the victory over Navy.
- ► Slated to play behind Onwualu, sophomore **Greer Martini** saw action in all 13 games in 2014 and started against both Navy and USC. In his first career start, Martini collected a career-best and team-high nine tackles, including six solo stops, in the victory over the Midshipmen.
- ▶ A Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) and Sporting News Freshman All-American in 2014, **Nyles Morgan** played in 12 games as a rookie and started each of the last four games of the season after Schmidt's injury. His 47 stops were tied for the eighth-most in single-season school history by a freshman.
- Morgan became the fifth Irish player to earn a spot on the FWAA Freshman All-America Team since the inception of the squad in 2001. Morgan collected 39 tackles over Notre Dame's final five games of the year, including three straight outings with at least 10 stops to end the regular season.
- ► The most interesting, and potentially most beneficial, news surrounding the Music City Bowl wasn't solely Notre Dame's victory over No. 22 LSU. It was the significant progress gained by **Jarrett Grace**, who returned to the practice field in December.
- ▶ A graduate student, Grace spent his first couple seasons with the Irish behind Te'o. He played significant snaps over the first three games of the 2013 campaign and eventually ascended into a starting role by week four. He had registered 41 tackles, but suffered four separate fractures in his right leg on Oct. 5, 2013, against Arizona State.

- ► Grace underwent two different surgeries and missed the rest of the '13 season as well as the entire 2014 campaign. He made drastic strides forward during Notre Dame's spring practice is finally able to contribute on the field. Grace made one tackle in the win over Texas on Opening Day, seeing time both at linebacker and on special teams.
- ▶ The Irish also got a boost of energy and athleticism at the position with the addition of early-enrollee freshman **Te'von Coney**. Coney battled his way through a tough field to earn a spot on the Texas two-deep backing up Smith. He made two tackles against the Longhorns in his collegiate debut.

#### **CORNERING THE OPPOSITION**

- ► The only defensive position group to lose a starter from 2014 with the graduation of **Cody Riggs**, the cornerback unit actually got stronger with the return of preseason All-American **KeiVarae Russell**.
- ▶ Russell (109 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, 0.5 sack, three interceptions, one fumble recovery, 10 pass breakups over his career) started all 26 games for the Irish over the 2012 and 2013 seasons. In '12, Russell earned Freshman All-America honors from FWAA, CBS Sports.com, Sporting News and Scout.com. He was not enrolled at the University in 2014.
- Russell made three tackles and shared on a tackle for loss in his return to the Irish lineup against Texas on Sept. 5.
- ▶ The opposite corner post is manned by junior **Cole Luke**. Luke started all 13 games last season, and ranked sixth on the Irish in tackles and solo stops (33). He either led the team or tied for the team lead in interceptions, pass breakups and passes defended. Luke's 11 PBUs were the most in a single season by a Notre Dame player since **Raeshon McNeil** in 2008. In fact, an Irish player has not registered more than 11 PBUs since **Dave Waymer** had 12 in 1978.
- Luke, who ranked tied for 20th in the FBS with 15 passes defended in 2014, was one of 11 players in the country with at least 11 PBUs and four interceptions. Luke turned in his best career performance in the victory over No. 14 Stanford (Oct. 4). Luke picked off two passes, the first two of his career, added a sack, forced fumble, pass breakup and four tackles.
- ▶ An experienced veteran in junior **Devin Butler** (23 tackles, one interception, one forced fumble, four pass breakups in 2014) provides incredible depth and flexibility for Notre Dame's defensive scheme as a whole.
- ▶ A pair of talented freshmen turned heads during preseason camp. **Nick Coleman** earned a place on the two-deep behind Luke. He made two tackles against Texas in his collegiate debut. **Shaun Crawford** was progressing towards a regular role in 2015 but was lost for the season to an injury suffered midway through preseason camp.

#### **SAFETY IN NUMBERS**

- Much like all of Notre Dame's defensive units, the safety position features a glut of talented players waiting to help the team led by starters **Max Redfield** and **Eiljah Shumate**.
- ▶ Redfield started 11 of 13 games a year ago. He finished second on the team, and first among defensive backs, in tackles. Redfield registered six tackles and his first career interception in the 31–0 shutout of Michigan. Redfield posted double-digit tackle games against North Carolina (10), No. 11 Arizona State (10) and No. 22 LSU (career-high 14).
- ▶ Shumate also started 11 contests in 2014. He moved into a starting role following the injury to **Austin Collinsworth** two days prior to the season-opening victory over Rice. Shumate led the Irish with a then career-best 10 tackles, an interception, a pass breakup and a quarterback hurry in the 31-0 romp against Michigan (Sept. 6). He collected a career-best 13 tackles, including nine solo stops, at USC (Nov. 29).
- ▶ One of the team's most versatile talents, graduate **Matthias Farley** (53 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks, four interceptions, one pass breakup in 2014) helps solidify the safety position while also maintaining the ability to play cornerback or nickelback.
- ► Farley's contributions over his career have been vastly under-appreciated. He has played in all 40 games and started 23 over the last three-plus seasons. Only Smith has started more games for Notre Dame on the defensive side of the ball.
- ► Farley started 11 games at safety as a sophomore in 2012 on an Irish defense that helped Notre Dame reach the Bowl Championship Series National Championship Game. He started eight games at safety in 2013 and four contests at nickel in 2014 while also playing a role on most of Notre Dame's special teams units.
- ▶ In 2014, Farley tied for the team lead in interceptions, ranked second in sacks, fifth in TFLs and fifth in tackles. He was one of only four players in the FBS and just two defensive backs with at least four interceptions and three and a half sacks.
- Sophomore **Drue Tranquill** (33 tackles, 1.0 tackle for loss, 0.5 sack, one interception, one fumble recovery, one blocked punt in 2014), who missed the spring recovering from a torn ACL suffered against Louisville (Nov. 22), played in 11 regular-season games and started three (Navy, Northwestern and Louisville). He was one of four true freshmen (Martini, Morgan and Trumbetti) to start on defense.

## **2015 NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL NOTES**

- ▶ The Irish gained some veteran experience at safety over the offseason with the addition of graduate **Avery Sebastian** following his graduation from California. Sebastian played in 32 career games for the Golden Bears and made six starts at safety. He recorded 96 career tackles, including 51 solo stops, three passes defended, two interceptions, two tackles for loss and one forced fumble. Unfortunately, Sebastian was injured in the season-opener against Texas and will miss about half of the season.
- ▶ Sebastian led Cal in tackles three times over his career, including a career-best 14 stops against Arizona State as a sophomore in 2012. He registered 10 tackles and an interception in the first half alone of the 2013 season opener versus Northwestern before an injury sidelined him the rest of the '13 campaign. Sebastian had 10 stops and a tackle for loss in a '12 meeting at Utah.

#### **SOME NEW FACES ON SPECIAL TEAMS**

- ► The Irish have a new kicker and punter in 2015 after graduating two-year starter at both positions, **Kyle Brindza**.
- Freshman **Justin Yoon** handles the field goal and extra point chores. Yoon grew up in Nashville, Tennessee but attended Milton Academy in Milton, Massachusetts where he would become the top kicking prospect in the nation as rated by 247Sports and No. 2 by ESPN.
- ➤ Yoon is the first freshman kicker for the Irish since **Nick Tausch** in 2009.
- ► Sophomore **Tyler Newsome** has taken over at punter after the strong-legged Georgian intently spent his freshman year as Brindza's understudy. He also handles kickoffs.
- ► Shifty freshman **C.J. Sanders** has an opportunity to make an impact on special teams as he earned the punt return job with a strong preseason camp. Sanders also remains in contention for kickoff return duties along with **Amir Carlisle** (38 career kick returns, 35 in 2014) and **C.J. Prosise**.
- Sophomore quarterback **DeShone Kizer** is in his first season as the starting holder for placement kicks.
- ▶ Other than Carlisle, the lone returning starting specialist is long snapper **Scott Daly**. The senior performed flawlessly in 2014 on 52 point-after attempts, 24 field-goal attempts and 51 punts.

- ▶ The first episode of "Onward Notre Dame", titled "Prelude: 2015," made its debut on Monday, Aug. 31. Chronicling the team's preseason camp and an offseason trip taken by several student-athletes to South Africa, the program reaired on NBCSN at 4:30 p.m. EDT on Sept. 2.
- ► The second half-hour documentary this fall is titled "A Season Begins" and will follow the team and quarterback **Malik Zaire** through preparations for the 2015 season opener against Texas. The show will debut on NBCSN at 7 p.m. EDT and repeat at 4:30 p.m. EDT on Sept. 17.
- ▶ "Onward Notre Dame: Mutual Respect" debuts at 6:30 p.m. EDT on Oct. 5, examining the unique history of the rivalry between Notre Dame and Navy who will play that Saturday to continue the nation's longest uninterrupted intersectional college football rivalry. The show will repeat on NBCSN at 4:30 p.m. on Oct. 7 and again at 2:30 p.m. EDT on Oct. 10, leading into NBCSN's live pregame coverage from inside Notre Dame Stadium.
- ▶ The 2015 Shamrock Series game against Boston College at Fenway Park will be particularly special for head coach **Brian Kelly** who grew up in suburban Boston and attended Assumption College in nearby Worcester, Massachusetts. - ▶ A TV crew of about a dozen people daily has been attached to the program since August 12 and has followed the team's coaches and players in football, academic, social and family settings showing the every-day live of the Guglielmino Athletic Complex's diverse denizens. Weekly episodes will feature the preparation for the previous Saturday's matchup, the intensity of the sidelines on game day and the rigors of balancing athletics with classwork during the grueling season.

#### REMEMBERING FATHER TED

- ► The Irish are wearing decals on the back of their helmets this year honoring Rev. **Theodore M. Hesburgh**, C.S.C. who passed away on Feb. 26, 2015, at the age of 97.
- The decals are a black circle with the name "Fr. Ted" in white letters and have adorned the uniforms of all Notre Dame athletic teams since the day after his passing. Notre Dame's coaches and sideline support staff are wearing similar "Fr. Ted" lapel pins on game days.
- ► Hesburgh served as the University's president from 1952-87, although his role in building Notre Dame into one of the nation's top universities is just a part of his distinguished legacy. Hesburgh served four Popes and nine Presidents, holding 16 presidential appointments, including serving as the chairman of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. He chaired the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics from 1990-2003. Hesburgh received the Medal of Freedom from President Lyndon Johnson in 1964, the same year in which he famously held hands and sang "We Shall Overcome" with Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. during a civil rights rally at Chicago's Soldier Field.

#### **AWARD NAMED FOR JOE MOORE**

- Regarded as the best offensive line coach in modern college football history, former Irish assistant coach **Joe Moore** is the namesake of the Joe Moore Award which debuts in 2015.
- ▶ The only major college football award to honor a unit, the Joe Moore Award will be presented to the nation's most outstanding offensive line.
- ▶ Best known for his stints at Pittsburgh (1977–85) and Notre Dame (1988–96), Moore died in 2003.
- ▶ The chairman of the Joe Moore Award voting committee is Notre Dame alumnus **Aaron Taylor**, the 1993 Lombardi Award winner and, later, a Super Bowl champion with the Green Bay Packers. The committee will include only people who have played or coached the position including all current Football Bowl Subdivision offensive line coaches.

#### **CAMPUS CROSSROADS PROJECT CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY**

- ► Construction on the Campus Crossroads Project, a \$400 million project that will use the University of Notre Dame's iconic football stadium as a hub for new facilities supporting academic and student life initiatives, began on November 23, 2014, the day after the home finale against Louisville.
- ▶ The Campus Crossroads Project is the largest building project in the University's 172-year history, integrating the academy, student life and athletics with the construction of more than 750,000 square feet in three new buildings attached to the west, east and south sides of the University's iconic football stadium, at a projected cost of \$400 million.
- ▶ The plan features three new structures attached to and serving the stadium a west building for student life services, including space for student organizations, a recreation center and career center; an east building for the anthropology and psychology departments and a digital media center; and a south building for the Department of Music and the Sacred Music at Notre Dame program. The east and west buildings also will include some 3,000 to 4,000 premium seats for the football stadium with supporting club amenities.
- ▶ The project also will enhance the football fan experience on game days. A variety of premium seating options both indoor and outdoor and mostly club seats will be available on three upper levels on the east and west sides. A hospitality area also is planned for the new building on the south end of the stadium.
- ▶ The most visible change at Notre Dame Stadium will involve the addition of a video board at the top of the south end of the venue, along with ribbon boards along the east and west sides of the stadium.
