utive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media. He did not just wait for constituents to come to Virginia, he actively took the Cavalier program to the public.

London embraced a groundbreaking 18-episode television production entitled "The Building of a Program" that gave an all-access look at UVa football. He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He quickly defined the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

Mike London's plans to build the Virginia football program made remarkable progress during his second season in 2011.

The Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. A total of five Cavalier players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrious Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

Virginia's 2011 squad ranked No. 4 in the ACC in total offense at 399.8 yards per game and rose to No. 3 in total defense at 351.7 yards allowed per game. The Cavaliers were one of just two ACC teams to be ranked in the top four of both of those key statistical categories.

In the spring of 2012 DE Cam Johnson was selected by the San Francisco 49ers to mark the 29th consec-

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years and student-athletes were heavily involved in community service projects and outreach programs.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. His first edition of Virginia football produced a 4-8 record but achieved a number of milestones that showed positive progress.

The Cavalier offense ranked third in the ACC at 404.8 yards per game after finishing last in 2009 at 269.6 yards per game. Senior Marc Verica led the league's fourth-best passing attack, finishing with 2,799 yards in the air, marking the third-best season mark in UVa history. Wide receivers Dontrelle Inman and Kris Burd became the first UVa wide receiving duo to each total a minimum of 40 receptions in a season. They also recorded over 600 yards receiving, also a program first for a wide receiver tandem.

Keith Payne led a much-improved rushing attack that featured two of the ACC's most productive runners. Payne led the ACC with 14 rushing touchdowns, 16 total touchdowns and an 8.7 points per game scoring average.

Honorable mention All-American Chase Minnifield anchored the UVa defense in 2010, earning first-team All-ACC honors. Minnifield's two interceptions helped spark the Cavaliers' upset of No. 22 Miami, giving UVa its first win over a ranked team



since 2008. Minnifield finished the year No. 2 in the ACC and No. 6 in the nation with six INTs.

Offensive lineman Morgan Moses earned freshman All-America honors by helping the Cavaliers go 13 consecutive quarters without allowing a quarterback sack.

Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered

15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a

bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina have seven children, Michael, Jr., Brandon, Kristen, Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. The 51-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.

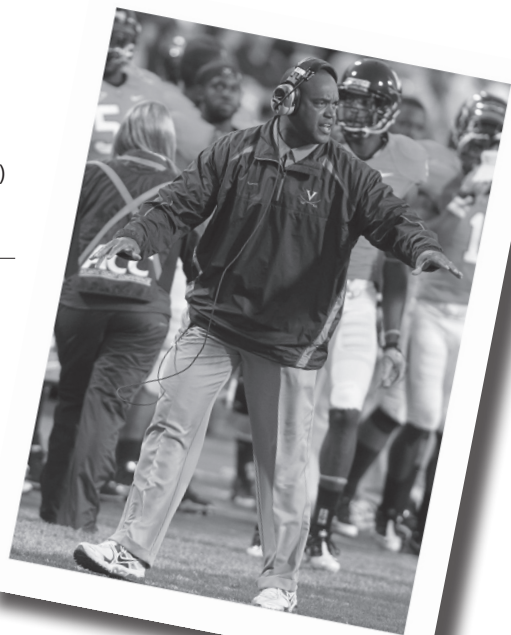

JIM REID

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH /
DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

In 2011, his second year as the defensive coordinator at Virginia, Jim Reid did a remarkable job improving the Cavalier defense.

Led by first-team All-ACC selections Chase Minnifield (CB) and Matt Conrath (DT), the Cavaliers finished the season ranked No. 3 in the ACC in total defense, which was 40th among all FBS programs. In 2010, when Reid first took over the UVa defense and converted it from a 3-4 to a 4-3, Virginia was No. 10 in the ACC and No. 78 in the NCAA in total defense.

Reid returned to the Commonwealth to join head coach Mike London's staff for the 2010 campaign after a two-year stint in the NFL with the Miami Dolphins.

London served as the recruiting coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Richmond during Reid's first two seasons as the Spiders' head coach (1995-96).

Reid joined London's staff after spending the 2008 and 2009 seasons as the outside linebackers coach for the Miami Dolphins. In Reid's first season overseeing the Dolphins' outside linebackers, Joey Porter produced a career-high 17.5 sacks, a figure that ranked second in the NFL during the 2008 season, as Miami hoisted the AFC East Division Championship banner for the first time in eight seasons. It also was the most-ever sacks by a Dolphins linebacker and third-most overall. For his performance, Porter was named to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first Dolphins outside linebacker to earn this accolade since Bryan Cox in 1992.

Of Reid's 38 seasons as a coach, almost half were spent as a head coach, most recently at VMI, where he guided that program in the two years preceding his appointment with the Dolphins. He also served as head coach at Massachusetts from 1986-91 and Richmond from 1995-2003. Reid returns to the Commonwealth where he spent 14 of his 37 career seasons.

In Reid's six years as the head coach at UMass, the school produced a composite record of 36-29-1 as he guided the Minutemen to three Yankee Conference titles. In 1988 and 1990, he was named the Yankee Conference Coach of the Year.

His nine-year run at Richmond included a pair of Atlantic 10 Conference championships and five finishes in the Top 20 in the FCS ranks. He also was selected as the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year on two occasions (1998, 2000) and the Yankee Conference Co-Coach of the Year once (1995). Reid left Richmond as the program's third-winningest coach with 48 victories, including leading the Spiders in 2000 to their first 10-win season in program history.

Prior to taking over the head spot at UMass, Reid spent the previous 13 seasons at the school as an assistant, including the first two as a graduate assistant. Six of those 13 seasons resulted in a Yankee Conference title. Following his tenure at UMass, he spent the next three seasons as a defensive coordinator, the first two at Richmond (1992-93) and the final one at Boston College (1994), helping the Eagles to the Aloha Bowl Championship. After his stint as head coach with the Spiders, Reid spent the 2004 season as an assistant at Syracuse when the Orange were Big East Co-Champions, appearing in the Tangerine Bowl, and 2005 as an assistant at Bucknell.

Reid, a native of Medford, Mass., earned a bachelor of science in education from Maine in 1973 where he was a three-year starter as a safety on the school's football team (1970-72). He earned a master of science in sport management from Massachusetts in 1975. He and his wife, Judy, have two daughters, Meghan and Molly, and a son, Matt.



BILL LAZOR

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR /
QUARTERBACKS / WIDE RECEIVERS

Bill Lazor is the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks and wide receivers coach on the Virginia football staff. He has done a remarkable job in his first two seasons at Virginia, boosting the Cavaliers' productivity as one of the top programs in the ACC.

In 2010, Virginia ranked third in the ACC at 404.8 yards per game after finishing last in 2009 at 269.6 yards per game. In 2011 the Cavaliers were close to matching that number, ranking No. 4 in the ACC at 399.8 yards per game.

Lazor came to Virginia after seven seasons in the NFL, most recently as the quarterbacks coach in 2008 and 2009 with the Seattle Seahawks. Incorporating an offensive scheme that he developed while working for some of the most successful coaches in NFL history has helped to develop players and been a part of the program's turn around under head coach Mike London.

In 2011 Lazor helped to develop sophomore quarterback Michael Rocco and freshman quarterback David Watford into a position where either player could direct the UVa offense. Rocco finished the season with 2,671 passing yards, the most by a UVa quarterback in their first starting season and ranks No. 4 all-time for a season by any Cavalier quarterback.

In 2010 senior Marc Verica led the league's fourth-best passing attack, finishing with 2,799 yards in the air, marking the third-best season mark in UVa history. Wide receivers Dontrelle Inman and Kris Burd became the first UVa wide receiving duo to each total a minimum of 40 receptions in a season. They also recorded over 600 yards receiving, also a program first for a wide receiver tandem.

Keith Payne led a much-improved rushing attack that featured two of the ACC's most productive runners. Payne led the ACC with 14 rushing touchdowns, 16 total touchdowns and an 8.7 points per game scoring average.

With the Seahawks, Lazor guided Pro Bowler Matt Hasselback for two seasons under head coaches Mike Holmgren and Jim Mora, Jr., respectively. Prior to his stint in Seattle, Lazor spent four seasons with the Washington Redskins. During the 2006 and 2007 seasons Lazor was the quarterbacks coach for legendary head coach Joe Gibbs. In his first two seasons in Washington, Lazor was an offensive assistant. Lazor got his NFL start in 2003 under Dan Reeves as the Atlanta Falcons offensive quality control coach.

Lazor's last collegiate stop was as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Buffalo in 2001 and 2002, just after the Bulls rejoined the FBS ranks in 1999. Prior to his days heading the Bulls offense, Lazor spent seven seasons at his alma mater, Cornell. He started as a part-time assistant in 1994 and progressed to the passing game coordinator, recruiting coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 1999 and 2000. He also spent time as the running backs, tight ends, wide receivers and junior varsity head coach during his tenure with the Big Red.

A 1994 graduate of Cornell with a bachelor of science degree in human development and family studies, Lazor was a three-year starting quarterback and graduated with 26 passing and total offensive program records. An All-Ivy League performer, Lazor was a 1993 team captain and team most valuable player as a senior, leading to an invitation to play in the 1994 Epson Ivy Bowl in Tokyo, Japan.

Lazor is a member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and the NFL Coaches Association (NFLCA). The Scranton, Pa., native and his wife Nicole, have a son, Nolan, and a daughter, Marin.



ANTHONY POINDEXTER

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR / SAFETIES

One of the greatest players in Virginia football history, the 2011 season was Anthony Poindexter's eighth year at UVa and third season on the defensive side of the ball. He oversees the safeties and is the special teams coordinator.

Poindexter was UVa's running backs coach for five years on Al Groh's staff. He was also the assistant special teams coordinator the last four seasons of the Groh era.

In 2011, Poindexter's unit helped hold opponents to a completion percentage of just 53.7 percent, the second lowest mark in the ACC. Rodney McLeod led the team with four interceptions, including three at Maryland. He became the first UVa player to accomplish that feat since Poindexter in 1996. McLeod earned honorable mention All-ACC accolades in 2011.

Under Poindexter in 2009, UVa's defensive backs helped the Cavalier defense rank No. 4 in the ACC and No. 21 in the nation in pass defense. Highlighting the group of defensive backs was second-team All-ACC honoree Ras-I Dowling and Chris Cook, who was drafted in the second round (34th overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings.

In 2008, as the head of the running backs, Poindexter saw senior tailback Cedric Peerman conclude one of the most productive careers in school history. Peerman, who played in the Senior Bowl after earning honorable mention All-ACC honors, finished as the 19th most productive back in UVa history, rushing for 1,749 yards and 15 scores.

Poindexter started his UVa coaching career as a graduate assistant on offense in 2003. He returned to his alma mater the year before as a graduate assistant coach for strength and conditioning.

During the 2007 season, Poindexter helped UVa to become one of the best running attacks in the ACC prior to the loss of Peerman to a season-ending injury after six games. Peerman was averaging 113.2 yards per game after five contests before suffering his foot injury. Mikell Simpson then stepped up for UVa and scored eight TDs for the Cavaliers in the final six games of the season, including a school-record 96-yard scoring play in the 2008 Gator Bowl.

In 2006, Poindexter helped UVa's running game average 122.76 yards per game during the second half of the season, powered by TB Jason Snelling. Snelling led the 'Hoos with 772 yards on 183 carries for seven touchdowns. On special teams he worked with Chris Gould, who expanded his role from punter to place-kicker and kickoff specialist. Gould dropped 27 punts inside the 20-yard line to rewrite the school record. He also drove more than 70 percent of his kickoffs into the end zone, resulting in 20 touchbacks.

In 2005, Poindexter guided the Cavaliers to 1,608 yards of rushing and 18 touchdowns, led by senior Wali Lundy's eight touchdowns. Hampered by an injury early in the season, Lundy rebounded to rush for a career-high 113 yards against Temple. In the upset of No. 24 Georgia Tech, Lundy became UVa's all-time career TD leader. He is also only the third player in ACC history to score 50 career touchdowns.

In 2004 Poindexter helped the Cavaliers to the second greatest improvement in rushing average (112.6) in ACC history. UVa's rushing improvement was second best in the nation. The Cavaliers scored a school record 34 rushing touchdowns, led by tailback Wali Lundy's 17 trips to the end zone. All-ACC tailback Alvin Pearman came on late in the season to become the ACC's second-leading rusher. He earned first-team All-ACC honors for the first time after leading the conference with five 100-yard games. Both Lundy and Pearman rank in the top 10 in rushing in school history.

Regarded as one of the fiercest hitters in the game during



his collegiate career (1994-98), Poindexter earned first-team All-America honors at safety his junior and senior seasons. He also was chosen the 1998 ACC Defensive Player of the Year and is one of only three players in school history to earn first-team All-ACC recognition three times.

He finished his career with 342 career tackles, the ninth-most in school history and tops among ACC defensive backs. He is tied for fifth in school history with 12 interceptions.

As a freshman, Poindexter helped make perhaps the biggest single defensive play in school history when he and teammate Adrian Burnim stopped Florida State tailback Warrick Dunn inches from the goal line on the game's last play to preserve a 33-28 win over the second-ranked Seminoles. With the victory, Virginia ended FSU's four-year, 29-game conference winning streak since joining the league in 1992.

Unfortunately, Poindexter's senior season ended prematurely when he injured his left knee in the seventh game of the season and later underwent reconstructive surgery. Poindexter was selected by the Baltimore Ravens in the seventh round of the 1999 NFL draft. He spent two seasons with the Ravens before ending his pro career with the Cleveland Browns.

To honor his legacy at UVa, Poindexter's No. 3 jersey was retired on Oct. 10, 2009, prior to Virginia's 47-7 triumph over Indiana at Scott Stadium.

Poindexter earned his degree in anthropology from Virginia in 1999.

Poindexter and his wife, Kimberly, have three children - Morocca, Anthony, Jr. and Chloe.

JEFF HANSON

RECRUITING COORDINATOR / DEFENSIVE LINE

The 2011 season was Jeff Hanson's second year at Virginia after working for two seasons under Mike London at Richmond as his assistant head coach/recruiting coordinator/defensive line coach, helping the Spiders to the 2008 FCS National Championship and a share of the 2009 CAA crown.

Hanson has done a remarkable job turning the Cavalier defensive lines into one of the top units in the ACC and, at the same time, coordinating the UVa recruiting efforts to help attract some of the nation's top high school student-athletes. On the recruiting front, Hanson has worked tirelessly with London to reestablish ties with high school coaches in the state and the results have been noticeable on National Letter of Intent day.

Hanson helped Virginia land back-to-back recruiting classes in 2011 and 2012 that were ranked among the top 30 in the nation.

In 2011, Hanson's defensive line proved to be both tough to run against and aggressive in getting after opponent quarterbacks in passing situations.

Senior Matt Conrath was honored as a first-team All-ACC selection. He spearheaded a unit that ranked No. 3 in the ACC in total defense and No. 5 in defending the run. In 2011 the Cavaliers held opponents to 139.5 rushing yards per game. The season before Hanson joined the staff, the UVa defense surrendered 173.8 rushing yards per contest (2009).

Hanson returned to London's staff at Richmond in February 2008 after a one-year stint at VMI. He played for the Spiders and graduated in 1972 and has enjoyed three separate stints on the Spiders' football coaching staff, serving from 1971-79 under Frank Jones and Jim Tait and again from 1989-2006 under Jim Reid and Dave Clawson.

As the Spiders' defensive line coach, Hanson guided Lawrence Sidbury and Sherman Logan to arguably the most prolific season by a tandem of defensive ends in Richmond history. Sidbury, an All-American, and Logan combined for 17.5 of the



team's 36 sacks in 2008 and each earned all-league honors in the CAA.

Boasting 39 years of collegiate coaching experience - 28 with Richmond - Hanson spent 2007 with Reid at VMI where he was the Keydets' defensive line coach and the program's Chief of Staff.

A native of Beloit, Wis., Hanson graduated from Beloit High School in 1967 and came to Richmond as a linebacker. He played on the 1968 Tangerine Bowl championship team and coached the 1971 Tangerine Bowl team.

Hanson remained with the Spiders as a graduate assistant, coaching the freshmen defensive lineman from 1971-73 while completing his degree in physical education and his master of education. Hanson then became a full-time member of Richmond's staff, working with the tight ends and receivers during his first year and with the defense for the next four seasons.

Hanson and his wife DeDe have three daughters, Laurie, Kristin and Katie.

VINCENT BROWN

LINEBACKERS/
ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

In 2011 Vincent Brown completed his second season on Mike London's UVa staff as the linebackers coach. Prior to the start of the season he added the duties of assistant special teams coordinator to his responsibilities.

Brown is in his second stint at Virginia and is working with London for the third time in his career after previously working with him at Richmond.

In 2011 Brown's linebacking corps played a big part in UVa finishing third in the ACC in total defense and No. 5 against the run. Junior inside linebacker Steve Greer earned second-team All-ACC honors after leading the team with 103 total tackles. Outside linebacker LaRoy Reynolds was second on the team with 88 tackles.

Brown's stint coaching for London at Virginia is not his first experience with Cavalier football. He was a graduate assistant at Virginia during the Cavaliers' 2007 season, which culminated with a Gator Bowl berth.

Brown joined London at Richmond in February 2008, where he was the linebackers coach. He coached Richmond's three starting linebackers in 2009 to all-league honors as the Spiders shared the CAA crown.

Brown guided a corps of linebackers during Richmond's 2008 FCS National Championship season that was arguably the most talented in the league, with All-American Eric McBride and all-conference pick Collin McConaghy. McBride posted his second-straight season with 100+ tackles, while sophomore Patrick Weldon emerged as the team's second-leading tackler.

Prior to his start in collegiate coaching, Brown served as an inside linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys in 2006. Brown played for the New England Patriots for eight seasons before retiring in 1995. Brown's nickname as a player was "The Undertaker."

He earned NFL All-Pro honors in 1991, 1992 and 1993. During his professional career he recorded 16.5 sacks, had 10 interceptions and scored one touchdown.

Brown's previous coaching experience includes a four-year stint as an assistant coach at Meadowcreek High School near Atlanta. He was also the school's assistant AD for one year.

A native of Atlanta, Brown played at Mississippi Valley State where he earned Kodak All-America honors as a senior in 1987. He was a second team AP All-American as a junior. A three-time all-conference pick, he broke the school's record for career tackles with 570 stops while leading the team in tackles his last three seasons. He graduated with a degree in criminal justice.

After being selected in the second round of the 1988 NFL Draft, Brown went on to start 103 of 123 career games for the Patriots, logging 811 tackles, 16.5 sacks and 10 interceptions.

Brown and his wife Chandra have four children, Dane, Vincent III, Raven and Jorian.



MIKE FARAGALLI

RUNNING BACKS

The 2011 season was Mike Faragalli's second year at UVa as the running backs coach. He previously worked with Mike London for two seasons at Richmond.

In 2011 Faragalli helped to develop the one-two punch of tailbacks Perry Jones and Kevin Parks. They combined for 1,624 yards and 14 touchdowns during the season. Jones was second on the team with 48 receptions.

In 2010 Faragalli saw Keith Payne lead the ACC in scoring with 14 touchdowns en route to gaining 749 yards. Jones piled up 646 yards that season in his first extensive playing time.

Faragalli came to UVa after serving London as his offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for two seasons at Richmond. During his two seasons with the Spiders, quarterback Eric Ward enjoyed two prolific seasons en route to the 2008 FCS National Championship and the 2009 CAA title. During Faragalli's tenure as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Ward amassed 5,102 passing yards, 749 rushing yards, 32 passing scores and 12 more touchdowns on the ground. Ward completed 64 percent of his passes (419-of-659) under Faragalli's tutelage.

Faragalli, who possesses extensive college and pro experience, came to the Spiders from Lafayette College where he served for eight years in the same position, taking the offensive reigns at Lafayette in 2000 and his impact was immediately felt. He implemented a passing attack that was ranked either first or second in the Patriot League in five of his first six seasons as offensive coordinator and the Leopards captured three conference championships in the process.

Four of his student-athletes earned major Patriot League postseason awards, as tailback Jonathan Hurt was the Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year in 2006 and Joe McCourt achieved the same honor in 2004 after being named Rookie of the Year in 2001. Phil Yarberough was named the 2000 Offensive Player of the Year and quarterback Marko Glavic earned 2000 Rookie of the Year honors.

Faragalli sandwiched two four-year stints as the offensive coordinator at Bowling Green around one season as the head coach of the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts in 1995. Faragalli has a wealth of CFL experience, serving as the offensive coordinator with three different clubs from 1985-1990. He spent one season in Montreal and two in Hamilton - winning the 1986 Grey Cup championship with Hamilton as a 27-year old - and three in Edmonton.

Guiding an explosive Bowling Green offense, the Falcons led the Mid-American Conference in scoring offense in four of his eight seasons and never ranked lower than third in total offense. He played a significant role in the development of quarterbacks Erik White, the conference MVP in 1991 and 1992, and Ryan Henry, fourth on the MAC list with 46-career touchdown passes.

Prior to his tenure at Bowling Green, his three seasons at Edmonton were under his father, Joe, where the Eskimos advanced to the Western Conference title game in each of the three years. He also played a role in the development of quarterback Tracy Ham, the CFL Most Valuable Player in 1989, helping lead Hamilton to the Grey Cup.

Faragalli began his coaching career at Rhode Island in 1979 and later coached at Wisconsin and William & Mary. He coached the receivers during each of those three stints. A 1980 graduate of URI with a bachelor of arts degree in secondary education, Faragalli played defensive back for the Rams.

Faragalli and his wife Kathryn have four children, Joseph, Phillip, Theresa, and Laura.



SHAWN MOORE

TIGHT ENDS

The 2011 season was Shawn Moore's second year as UVa's wide receiver coach after making his collegiate coaching debut in 2010. In the spring of 2012, he switched to coaching the tight ends at Virginia.

Moore is well known at Virginia, where he was a standout quarterback during his collegiate career.

Moore's ability to teach and develop the receiving corps at Virginia has been reflected in the results the unit posted during his first two seasons with his alma mater.

In 2010 the tandem of Kris Burd and Dontrelle Inman both caught more than 50 balls and combined for 109 receptions and 1,614 yards and eight scores. They became the first 50-50 combination in school history.

In 2011 Burd led the team with 66 catches and Tim Smith, who redshirted the 2010 season due to injury, became a big-play threat, averaging 17.1 yards on 33 receptions.

Moore entered the collegiate coaching ranks for the first time after four seasons as the quarterbacks coach at St. Albans School in Washington, D.C. Moore also served at St. Albans as the Dean of Students for the lower grades.

The former UVa signal caller completed his final collegiate season in 1990 holding 41 school, ACC and NCAA individual records and still holds many program records, including most total offense in a career (7,897 yards) and touchdowns responsible for in a career (83).

Moore appeared in three bowl games for the Cavaliers and helped UVa to the 1989 co-ACC Championship and an appearance in the 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl, the program's first-ever New Year's Day bowl game. As a senior, Moore guided the Cavaliers to the program's first No. 1 national ranking and a second straight New Year's Day bowl game, the 1991 Sugar Bowl.

Tying the highest finish ever by an ACC player at the time, Moore finished fourth in voting for the 1990 Heisman Trophy. He also garnered first-team All-America honors on the Football Writers Association of America and Kodak (American Football Coaches Association) All-America teams. The All-America honors made Moore the first ACC quarterback to earn first-team All-America honors since NC State's Roman Gabriel in 1961. Moore also earned second-team All-America honors by the AP, UPI and The Sporting News.

A decorated collegiate career also included being named the "1990 Exemplary Player of the Year" by Street & Smith's magazine and the Downtown Athletic Club of New York for athletic performance, academic achievement and leadership. Moore finished second for the Walter Camp Foundation National Player of the Year Award in 1990.

A dual threat in the backfield, Moore was the only Division I-A quarterback in 1989 to pass for more than 2,000 yards and rush for more than 500 yards. He finished his UVa career throwing for 6,629 yards on 421-of-762 passing, including 55 touchdowns and 32 interceptions. On the ground Moore accumulated a career mark of 1,268 rushing yards on 415 attempts, including 28 scores, for a total offense of 7,897 yards and 83 touchdowns.

Moore was chosen as a senior to participate in the Japan Bowl, Hula Bowl and the East-West Shrine games, leading up to his selection by the Denver Broncos in the 11th round of the 1991 NFL Draft. Moore played with the Broncos from 1991-93 before heading to the Arizona Cardinals in 1994. Moore concluded his professional career in 1995 with the CFL's Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Calgary Stampeders. The consummate athlete, Moore was also drafted by the Montreal Expos in the 71st round of the 1991 Major League Baseball amateur draft, after not playing the sport since high school.



Since retiring as a player, Moore worked as an enforcement representative for the NCAA (1997-2000), a scout for the XFL (2000-01), associate athletics director at Howard (2001-03) and the director of sports partnerships for USA Football (2003-06) before taking his most recent position at St. Albans.

Moore is on the board of directors for Virginia's Ridley Scholarship Fund. Active in the community, Moore is annually involved with Multiple Sclerosis walks every year, as well as a member of the Washington D.C. Big Brother program.

The Martinsville, Va., native earned a bachelor of arts degree in psychology from Virginia in the spring of 1990, prior to his senior campaign. Moore has one son, Mike, who is a freshman on the 2012 UVa squad.

SCOTT WACHENHEIM

OFFENSIVE LINE

The 2011 season was Scott Wachenheim's second year at Virginia. He coached the offensive line in 2011 after mentoring the tight ends during his first year with the Cavaliers.

Starting the same five players all season, Wachenheim's line helped fuel an impressive Cavalier running game. Virginia rushed for 2,107 yards, the highest total since the 2004 campaign.

Senior offensive guard Austin Pasztor was named a second-team All-American by the Associated Press and first-team All-ACC, while offensive tackle Oday Aboushi was a second-team All-ACC pick. Wachenheim's players picked up ACC Lineman of the Week honors five times during the season for their performances.

Wachenheim has 24 years of coaching experience and spent the 2009 campaign as the tight ends coach with the Washington Redskins.

Wachenheim returned to the Commonwealth where he spent three seasons (2006-08) as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Liberty in Lynchburg, Va., under former UVa associate head coach Danny Rocco. Prior to the 2007 campaign, Rocco increased Wachenheim's responsibilities, naming him assistant head coach.

As the offensive coordinator at Liberty in 2008, the Flames went 10-2 on the way to a second straight Big South Conference championship, while averaging 33.7 points and 446.7 yards per game. The latter total ranked ninth in the Football Championship Subdivision and marked the second year in a row Liberty led the conference in total offense as they averaged 429.6 yards a game in 2007, while scoring 42.6 points per contest.

Highlighting Wachenheim's offense during his three years at Liberty was three-year starting running back Rashad Jennings, a seventh round selection by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the 2009 NFL Draft. A Walter Payton Award finalist and consensus first-team All-America selection, Jennings set Big South career records for rushing yards (3,633), attempts (633) and touchdowns (42).

Prior to his days with the Flames, Wachenheim spent 12 years as a member of Ken Hatfield's coaching staff at Rice in Houston, Texas. He spent the last five years with the Owls as offensive coordinator.

Wachenheim helped Rice build a dominant ball control offense which ranked among the nation's best during his tenure.

During the 2004 season, Rice led the nation in rushing offense (306.5 yards per game), and the Owls' 2003 squad ranked second in the country, racking up a school record of 3,800 rushing yards. In 2001, Wachenheim's direction enabled Rice to break the school record for points scored (333) and total offense (4,846 yards).

Prior to joining the Rice staff, Wachenheim served as recruiting coordinator, offensive tackles and tight ends coach at Utah State (1992-93). He culminated his tenure at the school with a Big West Conference title and a Las Vegas Bowl victory in 1993.



Wachenheim got his collegiate coaching career started in 1984. After graduating from the Air Force Academy with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, he served as offensive coordinator of the Air Force Academy's junior varsity squad. He then went on to complete his military requirements.

Wachenheim returned to the coaching ranks at Arkansas in 1989-90, helping the Razorbacks to a Southwest Conference championship and a Cotton Bowl invitation. Additionally, Wachenheim earned his master's degree in athletic administration from the school in 1991.

Wachenheim spent the 1991 football season at Colorado under the leadership of head coach Bill McCartney, helping the Buffaloes win the Big 8 Conference championship and earn a berth in the Blockbuster Bowl.

As a player, Wachenheim was a four-year starter (1980-83) on the offensive line at the Air Force Academy. He earned first-team All-Western Athletic Conference and honorable mention All-American honors his senior year. The 1983 Falcons finished with a 10-2 season record, were ranked second in the nation in rushing offense, and were tabbed as the nation's 13th-ranked team overall.

A native of Woodland Hills, Calif., Wachenheim and his wife, Karla, have two sons: Kyle and Tyson. His son Tyson is a tight end at Christopher Newport University.

CHIP WEST

CORNER BACKS / ASSISTANT RECRUITING COORDINATOR

Chip West completed his second year at Virginia in 2011 coaching the Cavalier cornerbacks. Based on postseason recognitions and the NFL Draft, it has been one of the most talented spots on the Cavalier roster during his watch.

In February of 2012, head coach Mike London added the title of Assistant Recruiting Coordinator to West's duties.

West helped Virginia land back-to-back recruiting classes in 2011 and 2012 that were ranked among the top 30 in the nation. West is responsible for recruiting the Tidewater/Peninsula area in Virginia and the eastern half of North Carolina.

West was named the Atlantic Coast Conference's recruiter of the year for 2011 by 247Sports and was one of eight finalists for the organization's national recruiter of the year honor.

In 2011 senior cornerback Chase Minnifield earned All-ACC honors for the second straight year while being coached by West. Minnifield ended his career with 13 interceptions.

While blessed with a veteran on one side of the field, West worked hard in 2011 to develop the talents of freshman Demetrious Nicholson, the state's high school player of the year in 2010. Nicholson started all 13 games, recorded two interceptions and finished fourth on the team with 60 tackles.

In 2010 West coached Ras-I Dowling. Despite missing much of the season due to injury, Dowling was a second-round pick by the New England Patriots.

In addition to his on-field coaching duties, West is respected by his peers as one of the top recruiters in the mid-Atlantic region. His background in the eastern part of the state has allowed Virginia to reestablish a strong recruiting presence in one of the area's most storied high school football regions.

A Hampton, Va., native, West most recently was the assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach for head coach Bobby Wilder at Old Dominion. He was responsible for recruiting the Hampton Roads and Tidewater areas for the Monarchs. ODU went 9-2 in 2009 in its first season as a NCAA FCS program.

Prior to joining the staff at Old Dominion, West coached at James Madison for three seasons (2004-2006) overseeing the defensive backs, including free safety Tony LeZotte, a 2005 All-



American and Atlantic-10 Defensive Player of the Year, as well as the Atlantic 10 co-rookie of the year as a freshman. The Dukes won the NCAA Division I-AA national championship in 2004, finishing 13-2. In 2006 JMU returned to the FCS playoffs, losing in the first round at Youngstown State.

West coached the defensive backs at Fordham in 2003 when the Rams were 9-3. He served as the wide receivers coach at Colgate for four years and worked as a graduate assistant at West Virginia. Colgate shared the 2002 Patriot League title with Fordham, finishing with a 9-3 overall record and a 6-1 league mark. The Raiders led the Patriot League in 2002 in total offense, averaging 392.5 yards per game, including 215.0 yards per game passing. In 1999 Colgate won the Patriot League title and competed in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

As a graduate assistant at West Virginia for two seasons, West worked with the defense as the Mountaineers participated in the Carquest and Insight.com bowls.

West played football at Kecoughtan High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in computer information systems from Livingstone College, and his master's in physical education from West Virginia while working as a graduate assistant coach. West was an all-CIAA wide receiver at Livingstone.

He has a son, Justin, and a daughter, Jada.

EVAN MARCUS

DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL TRAINING & PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Evan Marcus joined the Virginia football staff prior in 2011 as the program's Director of Football Training and Player Development. Marcus returned to the UVa program after spending the previous four years working in the National Football League. He served as UVa's head strength coach for four football seasons from 2003-06.

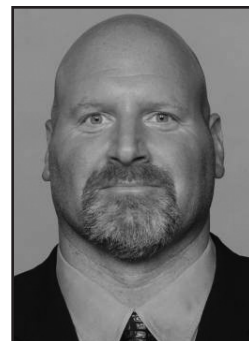
For the three years Marcus was the Miami Dolphins' head strength and conditioning coach. Prior to that he served in the same capacity with the Atlanta Falcons during the 2007 season. In those roles he managed the physical development of the team's players, including strength and conditioning, flexibility, nutrition, agility and speed improvement.

Marcus' four years at the NFL level allows him to bring some innovations and new approaches to the Cavalier program.

Marcus started in the NFL as the assistant strength coach with the New Orleans Saints from 2000-02. He held assistant strength and conditioning posts on the collegiate level at Arizona State (1991-92), Rutgers (1993), Maryland (1994), Texas (1995-97) and Louisville (1998-99).

Marcus oversee a complete renovation of the strength and training room in the McCue Center during the spring of 2012 that doubled the amount of workstations for student-athletes and incorporated additional resources to facilitate more efficient workout routines. The area also received a complete makeover with new graphics and color schemes.

Marcus is a 1990 graduate of Ithaca College, where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree in exercise science. He lettered three times as an offensive tackle on the school's football team and was a starter on the 1988 NCAA Division III National Championship team. The native of Union, N.J., went on to earn his master's degree in higher education from Arizona State in 1992. Marcus and his wife, Lori, have a son, Jake, and a daughter, Anna.



MARQUES HAGANS

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

In 2011 Marques Hagans served his first season on Mike London's coaching staff as a graduate assistant coach, working with the offense.

Hagans was a four-year letterwinner at UVa from 2002-05 and currently is No. 7 all-time in passing at UVa with 4,877 passing yards. He finished his career at No. 5, but has since been passed by Jameel Sewel and Marc Verica, the two starting quarterbacks to follow him in Charlottesville. Hagans is No. 5 all-time at UVa in total offense with 5,779 yards and his 2005 season ranks No. 3 all-time with 2,802 total yards. Only his predecessor, Matt Schaub, had better seasons (2002 & 2003) in the UVa annals in regards to total offense.

The St. Louis Rams selected Hagans in the fifth round (144 overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. He spent three seasons with the Rams before being picked up by the Kansas City Chiefs for the 2009 campaign. Hagans finished the 2009 season with the Washington Redskins and was released in the summer of 2010 after injuring himself in off-season workouts.

Hagans is a native of Hampton, Va., and graduated from Hampton High School after spending two years at neighboring Bethel High School. As a junior at Hampton, Hagans led the Crabbers to the state championship in Group AAA, Division 5 of the Virginia High School League in 1998. Hampton advanced to the state semifinals in Hagans' senior season in 1999.

Hagans graduated with a degree in anthropology from UVa in 2005 and is pursuing a graduate degree in professional studies when the summer session commences.

Hagans currently resides in Charlottesville with his wife, the former Lauren Swierczek, a former Cavalier women's basketball player. The couple welcomed their son, Christopher, into the world in April.



MIKE SAINT GERMAIN

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Mike Saint Germain joined the Virginia football staff in the spring of 2012 as a graduate assistant coach. Saint Germain works with the offensive line and tight ends.

The past three years Saint Germain served on the football staff at Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa. He tutored the defensive line all three seasons and was promoted to a full-time position in the summer of 2011. He helped the Diplomats achieve back-to-back winning seasons in 2009 and 2010 and consecutive appearances in ECAC Bowl Games.

Saint Germain earned three varsity letters at Lafayette College, breaking into the starting lineup on the offensive line as a sophomore. That season, he helped clear the way to let the Leopards' amass over 200 yards per game on the ground. As a junior, Saint Germain was the only Leopard to start all 12 games on the offensive line. He earned All-Patriot League first team honors for a team that led the conference with 244.3 passing yards per game.

As a senior, Saint Germain started all 12 of Lafayette's games en route to a Patriot League Championship and NCAA playoff berth. He repeated as an All-Patriot first team and was named an All-ECAC first team choice and a first team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and CollegeSportingNews.com. The Associated Press and Football Gazette named him a third-team All-American.

Saint Germain started his coaching career at Morristown (N.J.) High School in 2007. At Morristown, Saint Germain worked with the Colonials' offensive and defensive lines, as well as tight ends, helping the 2007 team to a 9-2 record and playoff appearance.

A history major, Saint Germain graduated from Lafayette College in 2007. In 2008 he played for the Austin Wranglers in the Arena 2 Football League.



BRAD ROBBINS

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Brad Robbins is in his third year with the UVa football program and his first as an on-field graduate assistant. Robbins works with the linebackers and safeties.

A native of Big Stone Gap, Va., he graduated from UVa-Wise with a degree in business administration in 2010.

At UVa-Wise, Robbins played both football and baseball for four years after transferring from Western Carolina. He was a three-time All-Appalachian Athletic Conference selection in baseball. In 2010 he was a second-team NAIA All-American as a designated hitter. In his final season on the UVa-Wise football team, he passed for 3,022 yards and 22 TDs to earn All-Mid South honors.

Robbins was an all-state selection at Powell Valley High School. His father, Phil, won more than 300 games as the school's head coach and is a member of the Virginia High School League Hall of Fame and was the high school coach of UVa's all-time career rushing leader, Thomas Jones.

Robbins is married to the former Terri Gordon.



JONATHAN LEWIS

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Jonathan Lewis enters his first season with the UVa football program after a five-year career in the NFL and will assist with the defensive line and help prepare scouting reports for the coaches.

Lewis was a four-year letterwinner at Virginia Tech as a defensive tackle before being selected in the sixth round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals. He also spent time with the Raiders, Jaguars and Seahawks.

The All-ACC performer appeared in 53 career games for the Hokies, starting 42, and amassing 203 career tackles. A native of Richmond, Va., Lewis was a US Army All-American while at Varina High School.

Lewis graduated from Virginia Tech in 2005 with a degree in residential property management. He and his wife, Tiffany Lewis, were married in 2010.
