Noting ACC Football

ACC 5-4 Versus Top 10 in 2014 The ACC, which faces No. 1 Ohio State and No. 6 Auburn next weekend posted a 5-4 record against non-conference AP Top 10 foes in 2014. The five wins were the most of any of the Power Five conferences last year.

ACC Has 12 Games Against Top 25 In 2015, the ACC will play a total of 12 games against non-conference teams ranked in the AP and Coaches preseason Top 25, including 11 games against teams in the Top 14. That is the most of any conference nationally.

Preseason Watch Lists & The ACC The ACC had the most selections to 2015 preseason watch lists for four national awards: the Manning Award (QBs), the John Mackey Award (TEs), the Lou Groza Award (PKs), and the Danny Wuerffel Trophy (Community Service). The ACC tied for the lead in most selected to the Davey O'Brien (QBs) preseason watch list.

ACC One of Three with Three

The ACC is one of three conferences to have three teams ranked in the Top 16 of this week's preseason Associated Press Top 25 with Florida State (10), Clemson (12) and Georgia Tech (16).

89 Players Drafted in 2014-15 Over the last two years, the ACC, which tied for most first round draft picks in 2015 with nine, has had 89 players drafted. That total, the second most of any conference, is 16 more than the next closest league.

ACC Schools & FWAA 75th Team Current ACC schools had a total of 15 of their former All-Americans selected for the FWAA 75th Anniversary Team. That total is the secondhighest total of any conference.

ACC Kicks Off 63rd Season with All-Time High 14 Games UNC-USC Opens, Virginia Tech and #1 Ohio State Closes Weekend on ESPN Louisville vs. #6 Auburn in Chick-fil-A Kickoff; ESPN's GameDay to Blacksburg

The Atlantic Coast Conference begins its 63rd season of football with a nationally televised game between North Carolina and SEC foe South Carolina on Thursday, Sept. 3 (ESPN, 6 p.m.). in Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C., and concludes on Labor Day Monday night when Virginia Tech hosts No. 1-ranked Ohio State in another nationally-televised game on ESPN (8 p.m.), this one from Lane Stadium in Blacksburg, Va....In between, the Conference will play 12 games, marking the first time the league has 14 games on a single weekend...ACC schools will take part in a pair of kickoff contests

as the UNC-USC matchup will be the inaugural Belk College Football Kickoff Game and on Saturday, Louisville will take on No. 6 Auburn in the annual Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. That game will be nationally televised on CBS (3:30 pm)...The Belk Kickoff Game matches the Tar Heels, coached by Larry Fedora and led by QB Marquise Williams, against South Carolina, coached by Steve Spurrier...It marks the second time in three years the two border-state rivals have opened the season; as the pair met in the season lid-lifter in 2013 in

Columbia...It is one of four ACC games slated for the first Thursday of the season as Wake Forest, coached by Dave Clawson, and led by QB John Wolford, hosts Elon at BB&T Field (7 p.m., ESPN3)...Georgia Tech, coached by Paul Johnson and led by QB Justin Thomas, hosts Alcorn State at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta (7:30 p.m., ESPN3) and Duke, coached by David Cutcliffe and led by junior QB Thomas Sirk, travels to face Tulane at Yulman Stadium in New Orleans (9:30 pm, CBSSN)...On Friday, Syracuse begins its 127th football season as coach Scott Shafer's club, led by senior QB Terrel Hunt, hosts Rhode Island at the Carrier Dome (7 p.m., ESPN3)...On Saturday, the ACC will have eight games on the docket, as Clemson head coach **Dabo Swinney** begins his eighth year hosting instate foe Wofford at Memorial Stadium (12:30 pm, ACC Network)...The 13thranked Tigers will be led by prolific sophomore QB Deshaun Watson...The Terriers are coached by Mike Ayers, who is 18th on the all-time NCAA FCS wins list with 193 triumphs...Boston College head coach Steve Addazio begins his third season as head coach of the Eagles, who hosts Maine at Alumni Stadium (1 pm, ESPN3)...BC will be led by QB Darius Wade, who makes his starting debut, and sophomore RB Jon Hilliman...The Narduzzi era begins at Pitt Saturday, as former Michigan State defensive coordinator Pat Narduzzi leads the Panthers against Youngstown State (1 p.m., ESPN3) at Heinz Field...Narduzzi is a native of Youngstown, Ohio, who began his collegiate career at Youngstown State where his father was head coach for 11 seasons (1975-85) ... The Panthers are led by RB James Conner, who has run for more yards (2,564) than any other ACC back in their freshman and sophomore seasons...Youngstown is coached by Bob Pelini, whose offensive coordinator Shane Montgomery is a former NC State standout...Mike London begins his sixth season as head coach at Virginia, facing a tough task as the Cavaliers open with 13th-ranked UCLA at the Rose Bowl in a nationally televised contest (3:30 pm, FOX) in Pasadena, Calif....Saturday's game marks the second straight year the two teams have faced each other as season-opening opponents, as the Bruins, coached by Jim Mora, took a close 28-20 decision in Charlottesville last year... The Cavaliers will be led by junior QB Matt Johns...At the same time, Louisville, coached by Bobby **Petrino**, will face the 6th-ranked Auburn Tigers, at the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game in Atlanta's Georgia Dome (3:40 p.m., ESPN)... The Cardinals had the nation's sixth-ranked defense a year ago.

The Hokies are led by QB Michael Brewer and a defensive unit, this year featuring CB Kendall Fuller and DE Dadi Nicolas, that has ranked second nationally in total defense over the last 11 years.

- **0** The number of games that are expected to have freshmen quarterbacks start in the ACC in the opening weekend of the season. In 2014, freshmen quarterbacks started 40 games for ACC schools.
- .778 The winning percentage of NC State head coach **Dave Doeren** in games decided by four or fewer points (7-2). That is the highest among any active head coach in the FBS.
- **.923** The career field-goal percentage of Florida State **PK Robert Aguayo**, who leads all active placekickers with 20 or more career attempts. Aguayo has made 48 of his 52 career field goal attempts, including 27 of 30 in 2014.
- **No. 1 -** Over the past three years, defenses designed by new Pitt head coach **Pat Narduzzi** led the nation in total defense, allowing just 282.58 yards per game in a 40-game span at Michigan State.
- **2** The number of first-time starters at quarterback for the ACC this week in Boston College sophomore **Darius Wade** and Duke redshirt junior **Thomas Sirk**.
- **3** Despite only having played two varsity seasons, Virginia Tech All-American **CB Kendall Fuller** ranks 3rd among all FBS returnees nationally in passes defended with 34. Fuller has eight career interceptions and 26 pass breakups.
- **4.6** The TD pass to interception ratio for NC State's **Jacoby Brissett**, which is fourth-best among all returning QBs in the FBS. Brissett threw 23 touchdown passes with only five interceptions in 370 pass attempts last year. The 1.35% interception rate is the sixth-best in ACC history.
- **5** The number of ACC players selected to ESPN's preseason All-American team. Chosen from the ACC were Pitt WR Tyler Boyd, North Carolina G Landon Turner, Duke S Jeremy Cash, Virginia Tech CB Kendall Fuller and Florida State PK Roberto Aguayo.
- **6** ESPN's **College Football GameDay** is making its sixth appearance at Virginia Tech this Labor Day Monday Night. The game marks the 81st time a current ACC team has played a game at the site of the

iconic college football show.

- **10** In his five seasons as head coach at Louisville, **Bobby Petrino** has not led the Cardinals to less than nine wins in a year, averaging exactly 10 victories a year.
- 12 The number of ACC teams with a quarterback that started at least one game for them last year. The list includes Clemson (Watson), Florida State (Maguire), Georgia Tech (Thomas), Louisville (Gardner, Bonnafon, Bolin), Miami (Kaaya), North Carolina (Williams), NC State (Brissett), Pitt (Voytik), Syracuse (Hunt, Long), Virginia (Johns), Virginia Tech (Brewer) and Wake Forest (Wolford).
- **16.9** Since Paul Johnson brought his spread option attack to Georgia Tech in 2008, the Yellow Jackets have run for more yards than any other FBS team nationally. In that time, Tech has totalled 29,060 yards on the ground or 16.9 miles, averaging 309.15 yards per game, which is also the best in the nation during that time.
- **19 -** Over the past two seasons **Duke** has compiled 19 wins, the most for the Blue Devil program in a two-year span bettering the previous high of 17 wins in 1938-39 and 1935-36.
- **24 Florida State** has won 24 consecutive games against ACC opponents, dating back to a 17-16 loss at NC State in 2012. The Seminoles set the record for most consecutive ACC wins. They established the mark by winning their first 29 league games from 1992 until a loss at Virginia in 1995.
- **34** The number of touchdowns North Carolina junior **QB Marquise Williams** accounted for rushing (13) and passing (21) in 2014. That's tied for the 9th highest single-season total in ACC history.
- **58** The number of victories to which Florida State head coach **Jimbo Fisher** has led the Seminoles in his first five seasons as head coach in Tallahassee. His winning percentage of .841 (58-11) is the best of any ACC coach with three or more seasons.
- **76** The number of 2014 pass receptions for Clemson freshman wide receiver **Artavis Scott**. Scott's total was the third-best in ACC history for a freshman, bettered

- only by Pitt's Tyler Boyd (85) in 2013 and former Clemson WR Sammy Watkins (82) in 2011.
- **102.6** The average number of yards for **Pitt RB James Conner** in his 26 collegiate games. That average would rank 5th-best in ACC history. Over his last 14 games, Conner has averaged 147.9 yards a contest with 28 TDs.
- **128** This week's **ACC Network Game** of the Week--syndicated by Raycom and featuring Clemson and Wofford, will be seen in 128 markets nationally, including 81 of the top 100 markets in the nation.
- 130 The ACC had 130 nominations to preseason watch teams for the 2015 season. The league led all conferences in players selected to the Manning (QB), Groza (PK), Mackey (TEs) and Wuerffel (Community Service) watch lists and tied for first or finished second for four others (O'Brien, Bednarik, Thorpe, Guy).
- **145.9** The pass efficiency rating in 2014 of Miami true freshman **QB Brad Kaaya**, who led the ACC and ranked second nationally among all freshmen signal-callers in pass efficiency. He also led the ACC in TD passes with 26.
- **165** Beginning his 19th season as a head coach, Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** has won 165 games at Tech, Navy and Georgia Southern. He ranks 10th nationally among all active FBS head coaches.
- **273** The number of career victories for Virginia Tech head coach **Frank Beamer**. That is the most of any active FBS head coach and ranks sixth on the NCAA's FBS all-time list. Beamer trails only the icons of the game in career wins in Joe Paterno (409), Bobby Bowden (377), Paul "Bear" Bryant (323), Glenn "Pop" Warner (319) and Amos Alonzo Stagg (314).
- **294.41** Over the past 11 years, **Virginia Tech's** defense, coordinated by **Bud Foster**, ranks second nationally among all teams in total defense, allowing just 294.41 yards per game in 147 total games. Only Alabama has been better (271.78). Tech's opponent this week, Ohio State, is sixth in that time in total defense, averaging 304.99 yards per contest in 143 games.

Home Sweet Home for Noles' Fisher, Tigers' Swinney

Florida State head coach **Jimbo Fisher** and Clemson head coach **Dabo Swinney** have both enjoyed coaching in the cozy and imposing confines of the Seminoles' Doak Campbell Stadium and the Tigers' Memorial Stadium, also known as Death Valley. Now, after five seasons as head coach of the Seminoles, Fisher's teams have won 18 of 20 ACC games at home, a winning percentage of .900, the best by any ACC coach with a minimum of five seasons on the job. Swinney is right behind as his teams have won 23 of his first 26 home ACC games, a winning percentage of .885, They are both just ahead of legndary FSU coach Bobby Bowden, who also won more ACC home games than any other coach, with 62 triumphs in his 18

years in the league.

Cutcliffe Leading Duke to Unprecedented Success

Duke's **David Cutcliffe** is leading the Blue Devils to success unprecedented in the school's history. Cutcliffe has led Duke to three consecutive bowl game appearances, a first in Blue Devil history. He has also led Duke to 19 wins over the past two seasons, the most in a two-year span since Duke began playing football in 1888. In his seven seasons, Cutcliffe has led Duke to almost as many wins (40) as the program experienced in the 18 years (43) before he took over the reins in Durham



Boston College's Steve Addazio Leads Eagles to Back-to-Back Bowl Bids

In his two seasons as the head coach at Chestnut Hill, Steve Addazio has led Boston College to back-to-back bowl appearances utilizing a physical ground game and a hard-hitting defensive unit. In each of his first two years, Addazio has had a player lead the nation in rushing. In 2013, tailback Andre Williams led the nation and set an ACC single-season record with 2,177 yards. On year later, QB Tyler Murphy led all quarterbacks nationally, rushing for 1,184 yards, while setting an ACC rushing mark for signal-callers. Last year, BC was one of just three schools (Oklahoma and Toledo were the others) that ranked in the nation's Top 15 in rushing defense (2nd) and rushing offense (14th).



North Carolina's Fedora Putting Points on the Board for the Tar Heels

After three seasons with Larry Fedora as head coach, North Carolina has topped the 40-point mark 15 times and bettered 30 points 24 times in 38 games. His Tar Heel teams have averaged 35.4 points per game. In the previous 13 seasons before Fedora came to Chapel Hill, UNC had averaged just 23.3 points per game, a 14-point difference. Also, in his first three seasons, UNC has averaged 446 yards per game of total offense. That compares with the previous 13 seasons when the Tar Heels averaged just 349.25 yards per game on offense. Fedora's first three Tar Heel teams bettered the previous school mark for scoing. UNC scored a school-record 487 points in 2012 and tallied 425 points in 2013 and 432 in 2014. Previously, the school had only topped 400 points once. The school put up 421 points in 1993.



NC State's Dave Doeren: Winning the Close Ones

Now in just his third season as head coach at NC State, Dave Doeren has already made a name for himself on the national stage. After winning 23 of his first 27 career games as a head coach at Northern Illinois, he an 8-5 mark in 2014, winning its final three games, including a 34-27 win over Central Florida in the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl. Doeren's teams are 7-2 (,778) in games decided by four or fewer points That's the best winning percentage in such games by any Power 5 coach. Doeren guided State to three wins by a touchdown or less in 2014.



Noting ACC Football

ACC's Labor Day Monday TV Ratings Success for ESPN

Throughout its 10-year history, the ACC's Labor Day Monday night appearance on ABC and now ESPN, has been a ratings success. The 10 games have averaged a 4.6 rating. The 2010 Virginia Tech-Boise State telecast garnered a 7.3 rating and was seen by more households, at the time, than any ESPN college football telecast in history. The 7.3 rating was the highest Monday night rating (without the full-circle additions) and tied for the second-highest rated regular season college football telecast on ESPN since 1994. The initial regular season Miami-FSU matchup in 2004 featured a 5.9 rating on ABC. One year later, the network enjoyed a 6.5 mark. In 2006, in the rivalries' first appearance on ESPN, the cable network put the broadcast on all of its channels --named a "Full Circle telecast"--thus creating a 7.6 cumulative rating. Eight of the 10 games have been nailbiters as well as the average margin of victory in those eight games has been just 4.5 points with two of the games going into overtime.

ACC Set To Open 2015 Playing 14 Games For the First Time

For the first time since it expanded to its current 14-team allignment for football for the 2013 season, the Atlantic Coast Conference will play 14 games on a single weekend. The ACC will have all non-conference contests beginning on Thursday, Sept. 3 with four games, starting with North Carolina facing South Carolina at 6 p.m. Syracuse will host Rhode Island in the lone Friday night game. The league will then have eight games on Saturday, Sept. 5, followed by the weekend-wrapping Labor Day Monday night contest that features No. 1-ranked Ohio State travelling to Lane Stadium in Blacksburg, Va., to face Virginia Tech at 8 p.m. The previous high for league games on a weekend was 13, accomplished on the opening weekend of the 2013 and 2014 seasons.

ESPN's College Football GameDay Coming To Blacksburg on Labor Day Monday

Iconic College Football Show Comes to Virginia Tech for the Sixth Time

Virginia Tech will host ESPN's College GameDay built by the



Home Depot for the sixth time when the Hokies host top-ranked Ohio State at Lane Stadium in Blacksburg on Labor Day Monday night. This marks the 13th time Virginia Tech has played in a game from where GameDay has emanated.

Tech is hosting a No. 1 team in the defending national champion Buckeyes for the first time in its history. A year ago, Tech was the only team to defeat Ohio

State, downing the Buckeyes, 35-21, in Columbus, Ohio.

This year's appearance by GameDay is the first visit since the show originated from Blacksburg on September 1, 2007. That day, GameDay came to Virginia Tech just five months after the Virginia Tech tragedy as a special tribute.

GameDay has orginated from two bowl sites where Virginia Tech was playing since 2007, the 2010 Orange Bowl and the 2011 Allstate Sugar Bowl as well as the 2009 Chick-fil-A Kickoff game against Alabama in Atlanta and a 2007 Tech away game with LSU.

Including Monday night, current ACC schools have hosted College GameDay a total of 34 times, while current ACC schools have appeared 81 times on the sites where College GameDay has been held. Florida State has hosted GameDay more than any other ACC school (11) followed by the Hokies and Miami (6), Clemson (3), Boston College, Georgia Tech and Pitt (2 each) and North Carolina and NC State (1).

Florida State has hosted more ESPN College GameDays (11) than any school nationally with the exception of Ohio State (13) and Florida (12).

Current ACC Schools Have 15 Selected to FWAA 75th Anniversary Football Team

Current ACC Schools Have Second Highest Total of all Conferences

The current schools of the Atlantic Coast Conference had a total of 15 former All-American players—the second second-highest total of any conference nationally—named to the Football Writers of America (FWAA) 75th Anniversary football team announced Thursday.

Pitt led all ACC schools with five selections, followed by Florida State (3), Miami (2) and Boston College, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, NC State and Virginia Tech with one selection each.

The FWAA, which was founded in 1941, has picked an annual All-America team since the 1944 season, making it the second longest continuously selected team in major college football.

The 75th Anniversary team celebrates the association's All-American teams from near the end of World War II through 2014.

Using current conference affiliations, the Big Ten led all conferences with 19 selections, followed by the ACC (15), the SEC (13), the Big 12 (12) and the Pac-12 (7).

Pitt's James Conner: Racking Up the Yards

Pitt junior RB James Conner established himself as one of the top running backs in ACC history last fall, totalling 1,765 yards--the third-best single season total in league history--while also shattering the ACC single season mark for touchdowns with 26 by five TDs. Over his last 14 games, the Erie, Pa., native has run for 2,070 yards in 335 carries (6.2 avg.) and 28 TDs, averaging 147.9 yards per game. He ended 2014 ranked sixth nationally in rushing yards per game (135.8) and seventh in total rushing yards. Conner enters the 2015 season ranking fifth on the ACC career yards per game list, averaging 102.6 yards a game with 2,564 yards in just 25 games.

Florida State's Aguayo: The Nation's Most Accurate Placekicker

Florida State junior PK Roberto Aguayo enters the 2015 season as the nation's most accurate placekicker. Aguayo has made 48 of his 52 career attempts, a field-goal percentage of .923, which is the best nationally for kickers with 20 or more career attempts. He has made 149 consecutive PATs and ranks 27th on the ACC career scoring list with 293 points in just two seasons. The ACC record for career field-goal percentage is held by NC State's Marc Primanti, who made 31 of 33 career attempts, a .939 mark. Aguayo was named the Lou Groza Award-winner as a redshirt freshman and was a finalist for the Award last year.

Duke's Ross Martin, who is on the Groza Watch List this year also ranked in the Top 10 in terms of accuracy, making .825 of his three-point attempts, good enough for sixth.

The ACC & ESPN Thursday Night: A Great College and ACC Tradition

When North Carolina meets South Carolina on Thursday night (6 p.m.) at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C., in the inaugural Belk College Football Kickoff Game, the battle will be the 94th contest involving an ACC team on ESPN on Thursday night. It will also mark the second time in three seasons that the two border state rivals have opened the college football season on ESPN on Thursday. Two years ago, the Tar Heels and the then sixth-ranked Gamecocks opened the year at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia with USC emerging with a 27-10 victory.

North Carolina is 7-6 overall on Thursday nights on ESPN, most recently defeating Duke, 45-20, on Nov. 20th of last year. The Tar Heels will be making their second neutral-site appearance in Charlotte at Bank of America Stadium on Thursday night, having defeated NC State, 10-6, on Nov. 11, 1999. At the time, the stadium was named Ericsson Stadium. In all, the Tar Heels are 7-4 overall on the road and at neutral sites on ESPN Thursday nights.

Virginia Tech has won more games (20) on ESPN Thursday Night than any other ACC team. The Hokies of Frank Beamer will travel to Georgia Tech later this year (Nov. 12) for their only Thursday appearance this year. The Hokies are 20-9 overall on ESPN Thursday night.

Georgia Tech has hosted more Thursday night games than any other ACC school, a total of 19. The Yellow Jackets actually began the Conference's Thursday night tradition, which, more often than not, has featured high drama. Tech hosted Virginia on Sept. 19, 1991, at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta, utilizing a 34-yard field goal by Scott Sisson on the game's final play to record a 24-21 victory. The Yellow Jackets are 11-16 overall on Thursday night ESPN games.

Miami has the highest winning percentage (.857) of any ACC team on ESPN Thursdays, having posted an 18-3 mark, including a 7-2 record on the road. The Hurricanes have been better at home, with an 11-1 record in the Old Orange Bowl (8-0) and at Sun Life Stadium (3-1). The only UM loss at home came in 2011, when Virginia snapped the Canes' 10-game home win streak with a 28-21 verdict.

In all, after this week's game, ACC teams will have made 164 appearances on ESPN's Thursday night package.

After the Hokies and Yellow Jackets, Miami leads in total appearances with 21, followed by Pitt (20), NC State (19), Louisville (19), Clemson (14), Florida State (14), North Caolina (13), Boston College (12) and Virginia (12).

When Maryland was a member of the ACC, the Terrapins played in 13 Thursday ESPN games, 10 of them at home.

There have been many great moments in the Thursday night series, including the 2007 game when 2nd-ranked Boston College rallied to beat 8th-ranked Virginia Tech, 14-(Continued)

10, behind a pair of touchdown passes from QB Matt Ryan in the game's final two minutes and 11 seconds. That game still stands as the only ESPN Thursday night meeting of ACC opponents that were both ranked in the Top 10 nationally.

The 2009 season featured a pair of thrillers, both involving North Carolina. The Tar Heels and Seminoles were involved in an offensive gut-wrencher, as FSU overcame a 24-6 third-quarter deficit to capture a 30-27 triumph. A week later, UNC upset 14th-ranked Virginia Tech, 20-17, on the game's final play, a 22-yard field goal by placekicker Casey Barth.

The 2010 match-up between Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech was a classic a see-saw battle decided when the Hokies' David Wilson returned a kickoff 90 yards for a toucchswn with 2:23 remaining. Perhaps the most memorable Thursday night moment and biggest upset on the Thursday night ESPN package was 24th-ranked Virginia's win over second-ranked Florida State in 1995. That game snapped the Seminoles' 29-game Conference winning streak, which began when FSU joined the ACC in 1992.

Miami still has claim to the highest-rated game on Thursday night, when it met 10th-ranked Houston in an early season showdown in 1991. The Hurricanes and Cougars drew a 6.5 national rating as Miami took a lopsided 40-10 triumph.

The highest-rated Thursday ESPN battle between two ACC teams was the 1995 Virginia-Florida State telecast, which resulted in a 6.1 rating. Louisville recorded a pair of strong ratings while a member of the Big East in 2006, a 5.33 in downing West Virginia and a 5.03 in losing to Rutgers.

This week's game is the first of five ACC Thursday ESPN contests this year. Louisville hosts Clemson in a big Atlantic Division clash on Sept. 17 followed by Miami travelling to Cincinnati of the American Athletic Conference on Oct. 1. The Tar Heels make their second Thursday night appearance of the year when they travel to Pitt on Oct. 29 and Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech wrap things up in Atlanta on Nov. 12 in a Coastal Division matchup at Bobby Dodd Stadium.

ACC Football Kickoff Media Tabs Clemson to Unseat Florida State For ACC Football Title

VILLAGE OF PINEHURST, N.C. -- Clemson is the preseason favorite to claim the Atlantic Coast Conference football championship, according to a poll of 158 media members in attendance at the 2015 ACC Football Kickoff at Pinehurst Resort.

The Tigers were also picked over three-time defending ACC champion Florida State to capture the Atlantic Division, while Georgia Tech was favored to repeat as the Coastal Division winner.

Clemson quarterback Deshaun Watson, who established himself as one of the nation's rising stars as a true freshman last season, was voted the 2015 ACC Preseason Player of the Year.

The Tigers were picked the likely overall champions of the ACC on 84 ballots, followed by Florida State with 41 and Georgia Tech with 20. Virginia Tech (7 votes), North Carolina (3), Miami (2) and NC State (1) rounded out the balloting.

In the Atlantic Division preseason voting, Clemson received 101 first-place votes and led with 1,032 total points. Florida State received 56 first-place votes and finished second with 992 points, while Louisville had one first-place vote and was third in the voting with 746 points. Georgia Tech was selected the likely Coastal winner by 96 voters and finished with 991 total points, followed by Virginia Tech with 44 first-place votes and 841 points. Miami received seven first-place votes and was third with 632 total points.

Clemson Headlines 2015 All-ACC Preseason Football Team With Five Players Selected

VILLAGE OF PINEHURST, N.C.— Clemson led all schools with five selections to the 2015 All-Atlantic Coast Conference Preseason Football Team announced July 23.

The team was selected by a vote of 163 media members who were credentialed for the 2015 ACC Football Kickoff at Pinehurst Resort.

Clemson sophomore quarterback Deshaun Watson, who was voted the ACC Preseason Player of the Year, is joined on the All-ACC preseason team by Tiger wide receivers Mike Williams and Artavis Scott, offensive guard Eric Mac Lain and defensive end Shaq Lawson.

Florida State and Virginia Tech each placed four student-athletes on the 2015 All-ACC preseason team, while Pitt had three selected.

Watson, who threw for 1,466 yards and 14 touchdowns despite being limited to eight games and five starts last season due to injuries, is joined in the offensive backfield by running backs James Conner of Pitt and Shadrach Thornton of NC State.

Conner, a 2014 All-American and the reigning ACC Player of the Year, led the conference and ranked among the nation's leaders with 1,765 yards rushing and an ACC-record 26 touchdowns as a sophomore. Thornton, a rising senior, ranks 10th in NC State history with 2,369 career rushing yards and 12th all-time among Wolfpack ball-carriers with 16 career rushing touchdowns.

Clemson's Williams and Scott are joined on the preseason All-ACC wide receiving corps by Pitt junior Tyler Boyd, the the first player in ACC history to compile 1,000 receiving yards in both his freshman and sophomore seasons. Williams joined Boyd as one of four ACC players with at least 1,000 receiving yards in 2014, and Scott was close behind with 965.

Preseason All-ACC tight end recognition goes to Virginia Tech's Bucky Hodges, a redshirt sophomore who broke in last season with 45 receptions for 526 yards

and six TDs. He is joined on the offensive line by Florida State's Roderick Johnson and Pitt's Adam Bisnowaty at tackle. North Carolina's Landon Turner and Clemson's Mac Lain man the guard spots, while Duke's Matt Skura was selected at the center position.

Three defensive ends were selected due to ties in the voting, with Virginia Tech's Dadi Lhomme Nicolas joining Clemson's Lawson and Louisville's Sheldon Rankins. Adam Gotsis of defending Coastal Division champion Georgia Tech is a choice at defensive tackle, along with Virginia Tech's Luther Maddy.

Florida State's Terrance Smith, Wake Forest's Brandon Chubb and Louisville's James Burgess form the preseason All-ACC linebacker corps.

The secondary features a trio of returning All-Americans in cornerbacks Jalen Ramsey of Florida State and Kendall Fuller of Virginia Tech, as well as Duke safety Jeremy Cash. Virginia's Quin Blanding, the 2014 ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year, also earned a spot at safety on the preseason team.

The special teams include junior All-America placekicker Roberto Aguayo, whose 293 total points in two seasons already ranks eighth on Florida State's all-time list. Wake Forest's Alex Kinal earned the spot at punter, while North Carolina's Ryan Switzer is the choice at return specialist.

Pitt's Conner led the overall voting, being chosen by 148 of the 163 media members casting ballots. Florida State's Aquayo received 141 votes.

Boyd, Conner, Aguayo, Fuller and Ramsey were all named first-team All-ACC last year, while Scott, Williams, Nicolas, Gotsis, Smith, Cash, Blanding and Kinal all earned second-team All-ACC. Switzer, Hodges, Turner, Skura and Rankins were 2014 third-team All-ACC selections.

ACC Divisional Tiebreaker

If more than one team in the same division is tied for the best winning percentage in its Conference games, the procedures listed below will be followed to determine the division's representative in the ACC Championship Game:

Two-Team Tie:

- 1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
- 2. Win percentage of the tied teams within the division.
- 3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall win percentage. (Divisional and non-divisional) and proceding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken from first-to-last using the league's tiebreaking procedures.
- 4. Overall win percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
- 5. Combined win percentage vs. all non-divisional opponents.
- 6. Win percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based on their order of finish (overall conference win percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based upon their divisional order of finish.
- 7. The tied team with the higher ranking by the College Football Playoff Selection Committee following the conclusion of regular season games. (If both tied teams are not ranked in the ranking by the College Football Playoff Selection Committee, the higher ranked team in the Amway Coaches Poll (including others receiving votes). 8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw. (as administered by the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee.)

Three-Team (or More) Team Tie:

(Once a team is eliminated from the tie, the tie-breaker procedures restart for the remaining teams. If the three (or more) team tie can be reduced to two teams, the two-team tiebreaker format will then be applied.)

- 1. Combined head-to-head win percentage among the tied teams.
- 2. Win percentage of the tied teams within the division.
- 3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference win percentage, and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken first to last, using the league's tie-breaker policies.
- 4. Combined win percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
- 5. Overall win percentage versus non-divisional opponents.
- 6. Win percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish (overall win percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional opponents based upon their divisional order of finish.
- 7. The tied team with the highest ranking by the College Football Playoff Selection Committee following the conclusion of regular season games, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five or fewer places of the highest ranked tied team. In this case, the two-team tiebreaker procedure shall be applied between the top two ranked tied teams. If none of the tied teams are ranked in the rankings of the College Football Playoff Committee, the higher ranked team in the officially released Amway Coaches poll (including others receiving votes), following the conclusion of regular season games, unless the second of the tied teams is within five or fewer places of the highest ranked team. (For the sake of clarity, the team receiving the second-most votes but not ranked in the Top 25 would be ranked 27th.) In this case the two-team tiebreaker procedure shall be applied between the top ranked tied teams.
- 8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee.



COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF, ACC BOWL LINEUP



The College Football Playoff begins its second year of operation after a highly-acclaimed first season in 2014-15. The Playoff features the top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal is played during the New Year's holiday with the National Championship Game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

The College Football Playoff selection committee chooses the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game. The selection committee will announce its rankings each week on Tuesdays beginning this year on Nov. 3. The final rankings will be announced on Sunday, Dec. 6.

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls: the Chick-fil-A Peach, Goodyear Cotton, Fiesta and Capital One Orange Bowls; the Rose Bowl presented by Northwestern Mutual and the Allstate Sugar Bowl. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

ACC Bowl Quick Selection Order

(The ACC is in the second year of six-year contracts with its current bowl partners. The current College Football Playoff format is a 12-year agreement)

College Football Playoff (four teams)

If the ACC Champion is not in one of the semifinal games this year, it will appear in one of the Playoff "host" bowls, either the Fiesta or Chick-fil-A Peach, since the Capital One Orange Bowl will serve as a semifinal site this year. There is no limit on how many teams the College Football Playoff may choose from a particular conference.

Capital One Orange BowlThe ACC champion, if not in the College Football Playoff, would normally play in the Capital One Orange Bowl against the highest-ranked and available team from Notre Dame, the SEC or the Big Ten. With the Capital One Orange Bowl serving as a Playoff semifinal this year, the CFP Selection Committee will determine the game (Chick-fil-A or Fiesta) and opponent for the ACC champion if that team is not in the Playoff.

Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl

Only if the ACC opponent in the Capital One Orange Bowl in a non-semifinal year, is a team from the Big Ten. This will not occur in 2015 due to the fact that the Orange Bowl this year is a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff.

Russell Athletic Bowl

Has first pick of ACC teams in 2015 after the College Football Playoff and the Host Bowls.

The One-Win Rule Applies Only to Notre Dame

The ACC's bowl selection will no longer be bound by the rigidity of a "one-win rule" but will have a general list of criteria to emphasize regionality and quality matchups on the field. A one-win rule does apply to Notre Dame's participation in the ACC Bowl structure. Notre Dame is now eligibile for ACC Bowl selection beginning with the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl and continuing through the league's bowl selections. However, Notre Dame must be within one win of the ACC available team which has the best overall record, in order to be chosen. In other words, if an ACC team was 9-3, a 7-5 Notre Dame team could not be chosen in its place. Notre Dame would have to be 8-4 to be chosen over a 9-3 league team.

ACC Bowl Expenses And Revenue

The Atlantic Coast Conference shares all bowl revenues. Each school is provided an initial expense allotment. The Conference will share in the cost of unsold tickets for participating bowl institutions. After all bowl expense allotments and ticket reimbursements are subtracted from the total bowl revenue, the remaining revenue is distributed evenly among ACC schools.

The ACC In Overtime

The ACC & Overtime

When Boston College and Penn State ended regulation tied at 24-24 in the Pinstripe Bowl, they played the 71st game featuring an ACC team that has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 71 overtime contests, a large portion of them--29--have been played in September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 19 times in November, while 12 have been played in October, three in August, six in December and two in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl). Of the 71 overtime contests, 35 have been ACC games while 36 nonconference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 38-24 advantage in the 62 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 37-34 record. Fifty-two of the games were decided in the first overtime with 14 games in double overtime and five in triple overtime.
