FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Saturday marks the second time UVA and Notre Dame have meet in football. It's the first meeting between these schools that will be played on either the Notre Dame campus, or the Grounds of UVA.
- Gene Corrigan is the former Director of Athletics at both Virginia and Notre Dame. After serving as AD at Notre Dame, Corrigan went on to serve as the commissioner of the ACC.
- QB Matt Johns threw for 238 yards in UVA's opener at No. 13 UCLA. Johns has eclipsed the 200-yard plateau in three of his four career starts. He becomes the first Cavalier to throw for 200 yards or more in at least three of his first four career starts since Matt Blundin between the 1989-91 seasons. Blundin recorded at least 200-yards passing in each of his first four career starts.
- Taquan Mizzell was one of two running backs with at least 100 yards receiving (OU - Joe Mixon) the first week.
- UVA has 13 student-athletes that have already graduated, the most in the country.

VIRGINIA ENTERTAINS NATIONALLY-RANKED NOTRE DAME IN HOME OPENER

- The University of Virginia opens its 85th season of play at Scott Stadium on Saturday when the Notre Dame Fighting Irish invade Charlottesville.
- Notre Dame is making its first trip to the Commonwealth in its storied history.
- Virginia is 90-28-7 (.748) all-time in home openers through the years.
- The Cavaliers have done well in the first home game of the season under head coach Mike London, winning four of five. The lone loss came in last year's home opener against then-No. 7 UCLA.
- Overall, UVA has won 24 of its last 30 home openers, including 12 straight from 1985-96.
- Saturday's game is the 445th all-time football game inside Scott Stadium.

VIRGINIA TO HONOR MEN'S CAPITAL ONE CUP VICTORY

- During a timeout in the first quarter of Saturday's game there will be an on-field presentation to honor Virginia winning the Men's Capital One Cup for the 2014-15 academic year.
- During the break between the first and second quarter the UVA men's soccer team will be honored for its 2014 NCAA title team. During a break in the second quarter the UVA men's tennis team will be honored for its 2015 NCAA title. During a break during the third quarter the UVA baseball team will be honored for its 2015 NCAA title.
- UVA became the first ACC athletics program to win three NCAA men's titles in one academic year.

NOTHING CAVALIER ABOUT UVA'S SEPTEMBER SCHEDULE

- With September games against UCLA, Notre Dame and Boise State, UVA is the only program in the nation that will play three nationally ranked opponents this month from the *Associated Press* preseason poll.
- UCLA entered the season No. 13, while Notre Dame came in at No. 11 and Boise State at No. 23.
- UVA plays Notre Dame and Boise State at Scott Stadium in 2015 where the Cavaliers are 4-5 all-time under head coach Mike London against ranked teams in Charlottesville.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Players are available for interviews each Monday, depending on class schedules. If you have specific player interview requests, they should be directed to Vincent Briedis in the UVa Athletics Media Relations office by Noon Sunday.

Requested defensive players and defensive coaches will be available for telephone interviews Tuesday, while offensive players and offensive coaches will be available Wednesday.

No player or coach interviews will be arranged after Wednesday during game week.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Coach London will hold his postgame press conference in the media room, while requested players and assistant coaches will be brought to the media room to meet with media representatives after London. UVa athletics media relations personnel will take player requests during the fourth quarter of each game.

Virginia's locker room is closed to media following games, both at home and on the road.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

THE CAVALIER MASCOT

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WAH

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wah" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

THE CORRIGAN CONNECTION

- Virginia and Notre Dame are uniquely connected through Gene Corrigan.
- Corrigan served as the Director of Athletics at both Virginia (1971-81) and Notre Dame (1981-87) before becoming the commissioner of the Atlantic Coast Conference (1987-97).
- Corrigan, a former Duke lacrosse player, was the head coach for UVA men's lacrosse (1959-67) and men's soccer (1958-65).
- As the commissioner at the ACC, Corrigan brought Florida State into the league.
- Corrigan's son, Kevin, is a UVA alum and the current men's lacrosse head coach at Notre Dame.
- As the Athletics Director of UVA he hired his niece, Debbie Ryan, as the women's basketball coach of the Cavaliers in 1977. Ryan went on to a Hall of Fame career in Charlottesville and won 739 career games. Ryan retired from coaching in 2011.
- Corrigan resides in the Charlottesville area.

VIRGINIA - NOTRE DAME CONNECTIONS

- UVA offensive line coach Jappy Oliver and Notre Dame head coach Brian Kelly spent the 1988 season at Grand Valley State together. Oliver was the defensive line coach and Kelly was a graduate assistant working with the defensive backs.
- UVA's assistant head coach and running backs coach Chris Beatty worked on the same staff in 2012 at Illinois with current Notre Dame defensive line coach Keith Gilmore. Beatty was co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Illinois in 2012, while Gilmore was the defensive line coach.
- Virginia assistant AD for media relations Jim Daves worked in Notre Dame's sports information office from 1986-92, and has a ring from the Irish's national championship season in 1988. Daves was in the press box working for Notre Dame the only previous time these teams met in 1989.

LUCK OF THE IRISH AND OPENING SEASON VS. RANKED TEAMS

- Virginia opens the 2015 season facing UCLA (13) and Notre Dame (9), marking the first time the Cavaliers have faced ranked opponents in the first two games of the season since 1989.
- Ironically UVA played Notre Dame during that 1989 stretch too. Notre Dame was No. 2 in the nation at the time of the game. The next week UVA traveled to State College and beat No. 12 Penn State, 14-6.

CURRENT LINKS TO THE 1989 NOTRE DAME GAME

- DE Mike Moore may not have been alive the last time Virginia and Notre Dame met in football, but his father Shawn was the Cavaliers' starting quarterback.
- The former UVA All-American quarterback, Shawn Moore, only completed 10-of-22 passing for 85 yards, two interceptions and two touchdowns against the Irish. Shawn Moore went on to earn first-team All-ACC honors in 1989 and lead UVA to the Citrus Bowl.
- Former UVA defensive back, Tony Covington, currently is the color analyst on each football radio broadcast on the Virginia Sports Network. Covington played in the 1989 game and accounted for five tackles.

VIRGINIA COACHES THAT SPENT TIME WITH THE IRISH

- Three of UVA's assistant coaches spent at least one season on staff at Notre Dame over the years.
- UVA's associate head coach for defense and defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons with the Irish. He was an assistant head coach and linebackers coach.
- Tenuta also served as the defensive coordinator in 2009 and helped the Irish defense improve in all defensive categories. That season he also coached 2012 Heisman Trophy runner-up Manti Te'o to a freshman All-American season.
- UVA defensive line coach Jappy Oliver coached Notre Dame's defensive line from 2005-08, working alongside Tenuta in 2008. Some of his prized pupils were Victor Abiamiri, Chris Frome, Derek Landri and Tevor Laws.
- UVA offensive line coach Dave Borbely spent the 1998-2001 seasons with the Irish as their offensive line coach. Some of his prized pupils were Jeff Faine and Mike Gandy.

FUTURE GAMES WITH NOTRE DAME

- Because of Notre Dame's scheduling agreement with the ACC, UVA and the Irish are slated to meet four times between 2015 and 2024.
- After Saturday's game, UVA and Notre Dame will meet at Notre Dame Stadium on Sept. 28, 2019.
- The Fighting Irish return to Charlottesville in 2021, while UVA makes another journey to Notre Dame, Ind., in 2024.

WELCOME TO THE COMMONWEALTH

- Saturday's game is Notre Dame's first football game in the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- UVA, however, has played in the state of Indiana on two previous occasions. UVA played at then-No. 1 Purdue on Sept. 21, 1968. Most recently, UVA played at Indiana on Sept. 10, 2011.

Last Meeting

Defending national champion Notre Dame began the 1989 season by scoring on its first six possessions to build a 33-0 halftime lead against Virginia in the Kickoff Classic at Giants Stadium.

The Irish outgained the Cavaliers 333-60 in first half total offense. Virginia scored twice in the second half but fell short, 36-13, in the nationally televised game.

Virginia tailback Marcus Wilson shared game-high rushing honors with Notre Dame's Ricky Watters with 80 yards rushing.

There were 77,323 fans that saw the game, which at the time was a college attendance record at Giants Stadium.

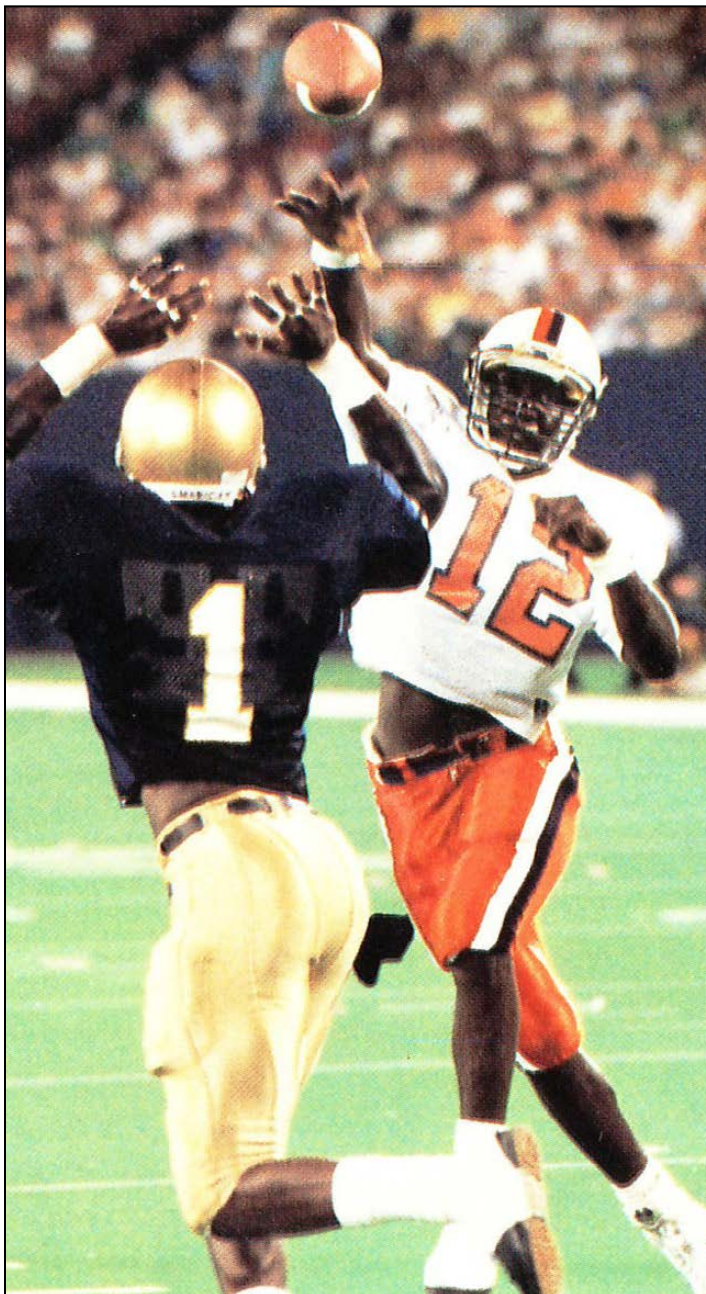

T.J. THORPE OUT WITH A BROKEN CLAVICLE

- WR T.J. Thorpe, a graduate transfer from North Carolina, will be sidelined approximately 10 weeks dating back to Aug. 13 after breaking his right clavicle.
- Thorpe transferred to Virginia after playing three seasons at North Carolina. He appeared in 34 games for the Tar Heels and had 42 career receptions for 574 yards and five touchdowns. He missed UNC's 2012 season due to a broken foot he suffered during preseason training camp. Thorpe graduated from North Carolina with a degree in exercise and sport science and enrolled at Virginia last spring.

VIRGINIA'S STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE UNDER LONDON

- Since Mike London became UVa's head coach prior to the 2010 season, 40-of-55 FBS opponents went on to play in a bowl game.
- Six additional FBS opponents did not play in bowl games during that span due to NCAA sanctions (Penn State, Miami, North Carolina, USC), or turned down their lone invite (Louisiana Tech).
- In total, 46-of-55 FBS opponents of UVa from 2010-14 have been bowl-eligible.
- UVa was one of four FBS programs from 2014 to play 10 teams that went on to play in bowl games. Alabama, Arkansas and Vanderbilt were the others.
- In 2013 UVa became only the second school in college football history to face 11 opponents that went on to play in bowl games. Florida State in 2002 is the other.

NEW ON THE SIDELINES

- Coach Mike London's staff will feature two new assistant coaches: Chris Beatty is the team's assistant head coach and running backs coach, while Dave Borbely is the offensive line coach.
- Beatty, a native of the Commonwealth (Centerville), comes to UVa after two seasons at Wisconsin.
- Borbely returns to UVa where he spent the 2006-09 seasons. Since his last tenure in Charlottesville Borbely spent four years under Charlie Strong at Louisville and won a NCAA DII title at Colorado State-Pueblo in 2015.

- The two early arriving Cavaliers continue a trend of high school seniors electing to graduate early/complete requirements to graduate and enroll at Virginia for the spring semester. - UVa has a roster of 110 players.
- Of those 110 players, 68 are either freshmen, redshirt freshmen or sophomores.
- That comes out to 61.8 percent of Virginia's 2015 roster.

- UVa is 251-181-12 all-time at Scott Stadium.
- 2015 is the 85th season the Cavaliers have played at Scott Stadium.

A MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL CONNECTION TO THIS CAVALIER TEAM

- LS Tyler Shirley is first cousins with Daniel Hudson, currently a right-handed pitcher with the Arizona Diamondbacks. Hudson has been with the Diamondbacks since 2010.
- QB Connor Brewer's older brother, Charles, spent part of the 2013 season in the Major Leagues with the Diamondbacks. The right-handed pitcher appeared in four career games that season.
- Ironically, Hudson and Charles Brewer didn't play together in the Major Leagues. Hudson missed the entire 2013 season after undergoing Tommy John Surgery.
- Connor's big brother, Charles, is the first Phoenix-area prospect in franchise history to be drafted by the Diamondbacks and to go through their system and appear in the Big Leagues for them.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 444 games in the historic venue. UVa's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 251-181-12.

SMOKE MIZZELL LOOKS TO ELEVATE IN 2015

- Virginia junior running back Taquan "Smoke" Mizzell is poised for a breakout season after backing up UVa's No. 5 all-time rusher Kevin Parks the past two seasons.
- Mizzell is off to a solid pass-catching start, grabbing eight catches for 100 yards and a touchdown at No. 13 UCLA in the opener.
- Mizzell led all ACC running backs in 2014 with 39 pass receptions.
- Mizzell, who battled a leg injury in 2013, has 125 career rushes for 509 yards and three touchdowns.
- A big pass-catching threat for UVa, Mizzell leads all returning Cavaliers with 76 career receptions.
- Mizzell averaged 23.1 yards per kick return in 2014 and posted 555 career kick return yards through 2013 and 2014 as he watched Darius Jennings break the school record for kick return yardage.
- Mizzell was UVa's first five-star recruit since 2005 when offensive guard and current Baltimore Raven Eugene Monroe came to Virginia.
- Mizzell's elusiveness at Virginia Beach's Bayside High School earned him the nickname "Smoke" en route to being named a *Parade* All-American.

THE "JACKSON FIVE" - UVA OFFENSIVE LINE BOASTS DEPTH

- The offensive line unit could be aptly named the "Jackson Five," surrounding center Jackson Matteo.
- Matteo returns after a broken foot cost him the final seven games of the 2015.
- Matteo, who also started a game at left tackle in 2014, is poised to return to center to bolster an offensive line that brings back a lot of experience and ability to mix and match at each offensive line position.
- OT Jay Whitmire returns to active duty after missing 2014 with a back injury. Whitmire owns 13 career starts between right guard and right tackle.
- OT Eric Smith (21) and OG/C Ross Burbank (16) own the most career starts of all offensive players. OT Michael Mooney (10), OG Ryan Doull (6) and OT Sadiq Olanrewaju (2) also have starting experience.
- OG Jack McDonald and OT Jack English have significant play experience from 2014 on the offensive line as well. A redshirt in 2014, C Eric Tetlow gained valuable experience along the line as a true freshman in 2013.
- Redshirt freshman Jake Fielner can play guard and tackle. Fielner came out of spring practice atop of the depth chart at right tackle.

UVA OFFENSE AIMS TO REVERSE SCORING TREND

- UVa looks to reverse recent scoring trends in 2015.
- UVa hasn't been in the Top 80 in national scoring average since 2010.
- UVa did score its most points per game during the Mike London era in 2014.

- During an August teleconference, head coach Mike London said that two true freshmen will play in 2015.
- Seeing time at WR in 2015 will be David Eldridge (Beaumont, Va.) and Olamide Zaccheaus (Philadelphia, Pa.).
- Zaccheaus was the only one who appeared at UCLA and made one catch.

JACOB RAINEY IS A STUDENT ASSISTANT

- Jacob Rainey, a junior, assists offensive coordinator Steve Fairchild with the quarterbacks as a student assistant.
- Jacob Rainey, a quarterback from Woodberry Forest in Virginia, had his right leg amputated after a freak injury in a scrimmage in 2011.
- Rainey suffered a dislocated right knee, but while he was hospitalized the news got far worse. An artery in his lower right leg had been severed, cutting off circulation. Over the next week, Rainey underwent four surgeries as doctors tried to save his leg. They were unsuccessful.
- A week after Rainey was tackled on a routine play, doctors amputated his right leg above the knee.
- As word of Rainey's ordeal spread, he was inundated with letters and gifts from well-wishers, including Alabama football coach Nick Saban, Green Bay Packers linebacker Clay Matthews and current New England Patriot Tim Tebow, who was quarterback for the Denver Broncos at the time.
- Tebow reached out to Rainey and wanted to meet in person. On Dec. 24, Rainey, along with his father and older brother, attended the Broncos' game in Buffalo as Tebow's guests.
- Rainey's experience and inspiring story was documented an episode of ESPN's series E:60.
- The Woodberry Forest quarterback returned to the field in 2012 and played with a prosthetic leg, throwing two touchdowns on nine passes.
- UVa WR Canaan Severin changed his number prior to the 2014 season from 84 to 9 in honor of his friend. Rainey wore number 9 at Woodberry Forest.

NICHOLSON IS HEALTHY AND READY FOR 2015

- Senior CB Demetrious Nicholson is finally healthy and ready to go in 2015 after missing 18-of-19 games during the 2013 and 2014 seasons.
- Nicholson started in the opener at UCLA and made seven tackles. It was his 32nd career start.
- Nicholson is now the veteran of the Virginia defense, starting the first 30 games of his career since he stepped foot on Grounds prior to the 2011 season.
- An injury in the third quarter against Ball State led him to miss the final seven games of the 2013 season.
- Of the 2,055 defensive plays Virginia lined up for since the opening game of the 2011 season until the injury against Ball State, Nicholson played 1,981 of those plays, meaning from Sept. 3, 2011 through Oct. 5, 2013 he played 96.39 percent of UVa's defensive plays.
- Nicholson tried to play against Kent State in 2014, starting his 31st career game. He made five tackles and recorded one interception in the end zone.
- After the Kent State game Nicholson had to shut it down for the remainder of the season and was granted a medical hardship for the 2014 season.
- Since Nicholson's injury against Ball State, he has lined up for only 59 of UVa's 1,298 defensive plays (4.54 percent) through the 2014 season.
- In 2011 Nicholson became the first freshman to start the season-opener at the cornerback position since Kevin Cook in 1986, when the Cavaliers faced South Carolina in Scott Stadium.

NICHOLSON IS ONE OF THE ACC'S BEST

- Senior CB Demetrious Nicholson enters the 2015 season with 28 career pass breakups, the most of any active ACC player.

BLANDING DOUBLES UP THE TACKLES

- UVa's Quin Blanding tallied 10 tackles in the opener at UCLA.
- Blanding now has six double digit tackles games over 13 collegiate games.

BLANDING LOOKS TO BUILD ON FRESHMAN YEAR

- UVa's Quin Blanding led UVa with 123 tackles in 2014, setting a UVa freshmen record.
- The 2015 preseason All-American was named the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2014.
- His 123 tackles ranked No. 2 in the ACC and No. 1 among the nation's freshmen (true and redshirt).
- Blanding was the only freshman in the nation that led his team in tackles.
- Ahmad Brooks previously held the UVa freshman record for tackles with 117 in 2003.
- Four previous Cavaliers led UVa in tackles as a freshman: Ahmad Brooks (T/2003), Charles McDaniel (T/1982), Steve Greer (R/2009) and P.J. Killian (R/1990).

- Henry Coley and Daquan Romero were lost to graduation, while Max Valles left two years early to enter the NFL Draft. Only junior Zach Bradshaw has started a game at linebacker for the Cavaliers, getting the nod against Georgia Tech in 2013 as a true freshman.

- While the the linebackers may only boast one career start entering 2015, the defensive line and secondary own 121 career starts.
- CB Demetrious Nicholson enters the year with the most career starts with 31. DT David Dean had 23 career starts, while CB Maurice Canady had 22 career starts to round out the top returning starters.

DEFENSIVE TRUE FRESHMEN THAT WILL SEE TIME

- During an August teleconference, head coach Mike London said that five true freshmen may play in 2015 on the defensive side of the ball.
- Seeing time at LB in 2015 will be Eric Gallon (Lakeland, Fla.), Dominic Sheppard (Miami, Fla.) and C.J. Stalker (West Chester, Ohio). Cornerback Myles Robinson (Olney, Md.) and safety Juan Thornhill (Alta Vista, Va.) will also see time per London.
- In the opener at UCLA only Stalker played of the group.

TENUTA GAVE UVA'S DEFENSE AN AGGRESSIVE MAKEOVER IN 2013 AND IT CONTINUES TODAY

- Virginia's associate head coach for defense and defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta is a UVa alum and has brought an aggressive makeover to the Cavaliers since he came home to Charlottesville in 2013.
- UVa over the six seasons prior to Tenuta UVa had the sixth-worst turnover margin in the nation (-35). In 2012 UVa recorded only four interceptions, the fewest by a Virginia Cavalier team since the birth of the forward pass.
- Tenuta said prior to the 2013 season that "we want to create problems for the front five and never let the quarterback set his feet in the passing game."
- UVa over the past few seasons has been near the bottom nationally in turnover margin and sacks per game – Tenuta wants to change that.
- During Tenuta's first season at UVa the Cavaliers boasted Anthony Harris, who led the nation in interceptions. Eli Harold was No. 4 in the nation among underclassmen with 8.5 sacks.
- Tenuta enters his 35th season of collegiate coaching and his 19th as a defensive coordinator. He has had stops in the ACC, Big Ten, Big 12 and at Notre Dame and looks to continue to create turnovers and sack numbers that have declined in recent years at UVa prior his return.

IAN FRYE RETURNS AS ONE OF ACC'S BEST

- Senior Ian Frye enters his final year on Grounds after one of the nation's better seasons.
- Frye, a Lou Groza Award semifinalist in 2014, nailed 22 field goals. The 22 field goals ranked No. 2 in the ACC and No. 2 all-time at UVA for a season.
- In 2014 Frye booted the third-longest game-winning field goal in program history with his 42-yarder against No. 21 Louisville.
- Frye's range can reach 50+ and owns the third-longest made field goal in program history, connecting on a 53-yard field goal as time expired in the first half against BYU in 2013.
- That 2013 kick is tied with Connor Hughes, who hit his 53-yarder in 2003 against Wake Forest.
- The program record is 56 yards by Kenny Stadlin in 1984 against Virginia Tech and matched by Rafael Garcia vs. Texas in 1995.
- Coach London put Frye on scholarship during the spring semester of 2014.

- Also, while 10 months Mackay was in attendance when UVA stopped Florida State's Warrick Dunn at the goal line to solidify the Cavaliers' victory over the Seminoles, FSU's first-ever setback in ACC play after 29-straight wins.

DID YOU KNOW?

- UVa sophomore Quin Blanding was named by his mother Cory Lee after the movie titled "The Mighty Quinn," starring Denzel Washington and Mimi Rogers. It was the first movie she saw following a checkup during her seventh month of pregnancy and the moment held significant meaning to her. At that checkup the doctor's told her they thought they saw a hole in Quin's head and that it appeared to them his cerebrum wasn't connected. Quin was born completely healthy. Cory named him Quin with one "n" instead of two in recognition of that moment during pregnancy. She knew he will be all right and that he will be the mighty one.
- Blanding's father, Kevin, played football at NCAA Division II Glenville State (W.V.) for current Arizona football head coach Rich Rodriguez.
- David Dean's father, Shawn, also played at Glenville State under Rodriguez and was teammates with Blanding.
- UVa WR Canaan Severin changed from number 84 to number 9 prior to the 2014 season in honor of UVa student assistant Jacoby Rainey. Rainey wore number 9 as the Woodberry Forest quarterback where a freak game accident forced the amputation of his leg. After the accident Rainey was featured on an episode of E60 and was a guest of then-Denver QB Tim Tebow at a game in Buffalo.
- UVa head coach Mike London's younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back for Virginia from 1992-95. Paul played a major part during UVa's NCAA record streak of 39 straight games with at least one interception. The streak ran from Nov. 6, 1993 through Nov. 29, 1996.
- UVa's oldest living football alum, Dr. John Risher, turned 105 years old this year; he also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew on game day.
- CB Demetrious Nicholson has been growing his signature dread locks since the summer of 2005, just before he entered the sixth grade.
- WR Kyle Dockins also has been growing his dread locks since the sixth grade, dating back to 2006.
- Junior CB Kelvin Rainey has two brothers that have played FBS football. His older brother Johnathan played at New Mexico (2008-11), while his other older brother Derrick played at Arizona (2010-13).
- DE Trent Corney's older brother, Taylor, won the Bronze at the 2009 Pan American Junior Championships in the Decathlon. Taylor has also been ranked in the Top 10 in the world in the Decathlon.
- Matt Johns made his collegiate debut as the UVa holder in 2013. The first time Johns made it into a college game he had to hold in the rain on Ian Frye's 53-yard field goal in the 2013 season-opening win over BYU. Frye's kick sailed through as time expired in the first half, tying the third-longest field goal in UVa history.
- Arizona head coach Rich Rodriguez has a connection to four Virginia Cavaliers. DT David Dean's father, Shawn Dean, and FS Quin Blanding's father, Kevin Blanding, were teammates together at Glenville State where Rich Rodriguez was the head coach.
- Rodriguez held David after he was born and said to Shawn Dean, "Make sure this boy comes and plays for me one day."
- QB Connor Brewer spent the last two seasons playing for Rich Rodriguez at Arizona.
- SS Kelvin Rainey's older brother, Derrick, spent four seasons (2010-13) playing at Arizona with his last two under Rodriguez. In 2013 Kelvin Rainey's brother, Derrick, was teammates with Brewer.

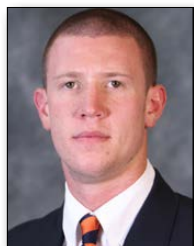

JOHNS TOPS 200 YARDS AT UCLA

- Matt Johns threw for 238 yards in the season opener against No. 13 UCLA at the Rose Bowl.
- Johns has eclipsed the 200-yard passing plateau in three of his first four career starts.
- He becomes the first Cavalier to do that since Matt Blundin between the 1989-91. Blundin recorded at least 200-yards passing in each of his first four career starts.

JOHNS IS VIRGINIA'S STARTING QUARTERBACK

- Matt Johns finished spring football as the No. 1 signal caller for UVa.
- While Johns played well over half of the 2014 season-opening game against then-No. 7 UCLA, he became the fourth-different starting quarterback the Cavaliers have had in four seasons (2012-15).
- Johns was the fifth-string quarterback in 2012, moved up to third string in 2013 and was the back-up in 2014.
- Johns made three starts in 2014 when Greyson Lambert was injured, going 2-1 with victories over Kent State and Pitt.

JOHNS SHINED OFF THE BENCH VS. UCLA IN 2014 OPENER

- Matt Johns threw his first collegiate passes against then-No. 7 UCLA in the 2014 season opener.
- His first collegiate pass came on UVa's final drive of the second quarter, he connected with Canaan Severin for 32 yards.
- The next play he rushed for nine yards before stepping out of bounds.
- Johns capped the drive on the very next play with a 29-yard scoring strike to Andre Levrone, the first collegiate touchdown for both Cavaliers.
- Johns finished the game 13-of-22 for 154 yards and two touchdowns.
- The UCLA game marked the second time Johns played quarterback for the Cavaliers.
- Johns played quarterback against VMI in 2013, but only handed the ball off.

A LOOK BACK AT COLLEGE FOOTBALL HISTORY ON THE GROUNDS OF UVA AS THE COLONNADES AT LAMBETH FIELD CELEBRATE 102 YEARS

- The colonnades at Lambeth Field turn 102 in 2015. The playing surface at Lambeth Field hosted Virginia football from 1902 until Scott Stadium opened up in the midst of the 1931 season on Oct. 15, 1931.
- Lambeth Field is the location where the American game of football that we know today, played from youth league all the way up to the NFL, was first played.
- It all started in 1909 with the death of UVA's Archer Christian.
- Christian died in 1909 as a result of injuries sustained in a football game at Georgetown on Nov. 13, 1909. Christian's death highlighted 29 football related deaths during the 1909 season. Papers from all over the country carried the front-page headline of Christian's death.
- Former UVA President Edwin A. Alderman and the father of UV athletics, William Lambeth, went to New York City to meet with other presidents and administrators from other big time universities to discuss how they could make the game of football safer.
- At the time there was legislation happening in Washington to make it illegal to play the game of football in America.
- A new rules committee that was appointed from that meeting in New York City included Lambeth and the father of American football, Walter Camp.
- Lambeth noted to the committee, which met almost on a monthly basis, that the two deaths he had seen personally were due to exhaustion. At the time there were no substitutions, if you came out you could no longer return. The original game had a lot of pulling and pushing. Players were not considered down until they really couldn't move under the pile. Lambeth suggested that the game be split into four quarters, totaling 15 minutes a piece and that players could substitute back in. Walter Camp's notes from the committee meetings credit Lambeth, in the margins, with these changes.
- The committee asked Lambeth to take the new rules back to the University of Virginia and experiment with them during the spring of 1910.
- On the Grounds of the University of Virginia, under the watchful eye of William Lambeth, a new version of American football, divided into four quarters was played for the first time in history.
- Other notable rules that were played for the first time that spring at Lambeth Field were: seven men required on the line at the time of the snap, players could no longer push or pull the ball carrier and the forward pass could now be made across the line of scrimmage.
- Virginia football returned to its roots at Lambeth Field during camp in 2013, 2014 and 2015, taking part in various scrimmages and practices on the hallowed ground.

Mike London enters his sixth season at Virginia with a team that returns 10 starters and more than 40 lettermen and a commitment to returning the Cavaliers to postseason play. The focus is on finishing after last year's team produced a 5-7 record that included several close losses that could have easily resulted in wins for UVa. Having relied on a number of underclassmen on the roster the past

two years, London hopes that those talented, and now seasoned players, are ready to help the program turn the corner.

The Cavaliers face one of the nation's top schedules in 2015 with the season opener at UCLA and early home games against Notre Dame and Boise State in Scott Stadium. London preaches to his team that "To be the best, you have to beat the best!" and he has his charges eager to take on the challenging slate.

Knowing London's backstory, it is easy to understand why he is so optimistic as well as why his players enjoy and embrace his coaching approach.

A former Richmond police detective, London's time in law enforcement dealing with the entire spectrum of human emotions and actions has provided a wealth of experience that he draws on to assist players both on and off the field. There are few stressful situations he has not faced - including having a loaded pistol pointed at him and the trigger pulled, only to have the weapon malfunction and not discharge its potentially lethal round.

London also had the remarkable opportunity to save one of his daughter's lives when he was identified as a perfect match for her rare bone marrow disorder. That opportunity is one reason why London is an advocate of servitude and makes sure his players understand and embrace the concept of giving back through a variety of community services activities. One of the most visible is the team's annual bone marrow donor registration drive as part of the national "Get in the Game, Save a Life" initiative. During his time at UVa more than 600 names have been added to the national bone marrow registry.

London's biography includes plenty of chapters of football success on the field as well.

In the spring of 2014, defensive end Eli Harold was selected by the San Francisco 49ers and outside linebacker Max Valles later went to the Oakland Raiders to mark the 32nd consecutive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

During the 2014 season true freshman safety Quin Blanding earned freshman All-America honors and was named the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year.

In 2011, London led Virginia to one of its most outstanding seasons as the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. Five of his players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrious Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media.

He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He defines the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years. Those results have continued to improve and during the spring of 2014, his players once again set a high mark for its GPA.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. Success has been a big part of the

Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/ American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texans. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach

and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage. The 53-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.
