The Overview

The University of Louisville will hit the road for the first time this season, and for the first time as members of the ACC, when the Cardinals travel to Charlottesville, Va., to face Virginia on Sept. 13 at 12:30 p.m. The game will be televised by the ACC Network (WAVE 3 in Louisville).

The Cardinals moved to 2-0 after a 66-21 win last Saturday over Murray State. Louisville amassed 603 yards of total offense, and five running backs combined to rush for 325 yards, which was the most yards rushing since 2008 in a 38-26 win against Kansas State (Sept. 17), when the Cardinals combined for 303 yards.

Freshman **L.J. Scott** carried 11 times for 126 yards and one score, while sophomore **Brandon Radcliff** added 97 yards and two touchdowns.

Sophomore **Will Gardner** received his second start, but played sparingly, going 13-for-22 for 133 yards and two scores, while freshman **Reggie Bonnafon** made his collegiate debut in impressive fashion, going 8-for-11 for 112 yards and one score, while also running for a pair of touchdowns.

The defense put together its second-straight stellar performance, holding Murray State to 292 yards of total offense and just 41 yards on the ground.

The Cavaliers evened their record at 1-1 with a decisive 45-13 win over Richmond at home. The Cavaliers forced seven turnovers in the wins, recording three interceptions and forcing four fumbles.

The Series

Saturday's game will be the third football meeting between Virginia and Louisville, with each team winning on its home field. This will be the first encounter since the Cardinals won 30-28 in 1988, while the Cavaliers won 16-15 the following season in Charlottesville, Va. Despite being opposite division, the Cardinals and Cavaliers are permanent league opponents.

Head Coaches

Bobby Petrino - Louisville: Bobby Petrino improved to 43-9 in his five seasons at Louisville and 85-30 in his seasons as a collegiate head coach. He guided the Cardinals to a 41-9 record from 2003-06, which included a Conference USA title in 2004 and a BIG EAST championship in 2006. The Cardinals defeated Wake Forest in the school's BCS appearance in 2007.

Mike London - Virginia: Mike London is 19-32 in his fifth



season as head coach of the Cavaliers and is 43-37 overall as a collegiate coach. A 1983 graduate of Richmond where he played as a defensive back. London became the second UVa head coach to make his debut for the Cavaliers against his alma mater.

Against the ACC

The Cardinals are playing their first season as members of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Louisville bolsters a 34-48-1 on-field mark against the current 14-team football alignment of the ACC after the season-opening 31-13 win over Miami on Sept. 1. The Cardinals have played all but two of the ACC's football schools (Georgia Tech & Clemson) and their first ACC opponent was Miami on Nov. 11, 1933, a 33-7 win for the Hurricanes. The Cardinals will play Clemson for the first time in school history on Oct. 11. Louisville has won its last two meetings against ACC competitiors with a pair of wins coming versus Miami. Syracuse is the last ACC school to defeat the Cardinals in 2012. Here how the Cardinals have fared versus ACC competition: Boston College 3-3; Clemson; Duke 1-0; Florida State 2-12; Miami (Fla.) 3-9-1; North Carolina 4-3; North Carolina State 3-1; Pittsburgh 8-8; Syracuse 6-6; Virginia 1-1; Virginia Tech 2-5: Wake Forest 1-0.

History with Virginia

The Cardinals are 3-6 against teams from the state of Virginia. Louisville is 1-1 against the Cavaliers and 2-5 versus Virginia Tech. The last time the Cardinals faced a team from Virginia was the 2006 Gator Bowl when the Hokies defeated Louisville 35-24.

Cardinals in League Road Openers

Louisville hits the road for the first time this season when the Cardinals face Virginia in the first-ever road contest in the ACC. Since joining Conference USA in 1996, the Cardinals are 10-8 in their first league road game of the season. Head coach Bobby Petrino was 2-2 in the first conference road game when he coached at Louisville from 2003-06.

Next Up

The Cardinals will head out of conference again when they travel to Miami to face FIU on Saturday, Sept. 20. It will be the fourth meeting in the last four years. The Cardinals own a 2-1 series advantage, including a 72-0 win last season at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.

Louisville vs. Murray State

True freshman quarterback **Reggie Bonnafon** ran for two touchdowns and threw for one in Louisville 's 66-21 win over Murray State.

Bonnafon was 8-of-11 for 112 yards and rushed for 22 yards, while starter **Will Gardner** was 13-of-22 for 133 yards and two scores in the win. Freshman running back **L.J. Scott** recorded his first career 100-yard game by tallying 126 yards and one score.

The defense held the Racers to 292 yards, including 41 yards rushing. **Charles Gaines** recorded his first interception of the season and the Cardinals recorded a pair of sacks.

Louisville Player Highlights

- Senior running back **Dominique Brown** leads the Cardinals in rushing with 183 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He carried 33 times for 143 yards in the opener versus Miami.
- Senior **Eli Rogers** has registered 10 receptions for 110 yards in the first two games of the season, averaging 11.0 yards per catch.
- Twelve different players caught passes in the 66-21 win over Murray State, with senior wide receiver **Kai DeLa Cruz** tying a career-best with four receptions for 53 yards and a touchdown.
- Junior safety **James Sample** is tied for the team lead with nine tackles and an interception, while linebackers **Keith Kelsey** and **James Burgess** have also tallied nine stops.
- Sophomore running back **Brandon Radcliff** rushed for a career-high 97 yards in the win over Murray State.

Virginia vs. Richmond

Matt Johns and Greyson Lambert each led two touchdown drives and Harold turned one of seven Richmond turnovers into a 22-yard touchdown return as the Cavaliers ended a 10-game losing streak. It dates to last September when they beat VMI, like Richmond, a member of the FCS.

Lambert, a team captain who started for the second week in a row, directed a 14-play, 76-yard drive to Kevin Parks' 3-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, then threw a 29-yard scoring pass to Severin early in the fourth quarter.

Johns finished 4 for 7 for 65 yards with a TD and an interception. Lambert was 13 of 15 for 102 yards with the TD, and both said winning matters more to them than who gets to lead the way.

Virginia Player Highlights

- Quarterback **Greyson Lambert** is second in the nation in completion percentage at 76.3 percent. He is 29-for-38 for 214 yards in the first two games of the season. **Matt Johns** has also played quarterback in the first two games, throwing for 219 yards and three touchdowns.
- The Cavaliers forced seven turnovers in the win over Richmond and have nine sacks in the first two games.
- Max Valles ranks ninth nationally in sacks with 3.5 sacks and has forced a fumble. The Cavaliers rank seventh in the country in sacks and third in tackles for loss.
- Virginia is tied for 22md nationally in rushing defense, allowing 87.5 yards per game.
- Taquan Mizzell leads the Cavaliers in receptions through the first two contests with 11 receptions for 43 yards. He is also averaging 27.3 yards a kickoff return.

HEAD COACH BOBBY PETRINO



BOBBY PETRINO

Head Coach • 5th Year • Carroll College

One of the nation's best offensive minds is returning home.

University of Louisville Vice President/Director of Athletics Tom Jurich announced on Jan. 9 Bobby Petrino as the Cardinals' football coach. The Cardinals' head coach from 2003-06, Petrino led UofL to an unprecedented 41-9 record in four seasons on the sidelines and currently boasts an 83-30 record at the collegiate level.

During his time at Louisville, Petrino directed the program to a bowl game each year, but more significantly, guided the school to its first BCS victory - a 24-13 win over Wake Forest in the FedEx Orange Bowl. The 41 wins over that four-year span were the most in school history and featured an average margin of victory of 26.0.

He also showed the ability to develop players, as Petrino had 14 selected in the NFL Draft, including Amobi Okoye, who was the 10th overall selection in 2007 by the Houston Texans. Eric Wood, who was recruited by Petrino, was the 28th selection by the Buffalo Bills in 2009. Michael Bush, a fourth-round pick by the Oakland Raiders, amassed 2,514 rushing yards in three-plus seasons with the Cardinals.

Coupling his success at Louisville and Arkansas, Petrino has led his teams to seven bowl games in nine years, including both Louisville's and Arkansas' first BCS bowl games. His programs have achieved four 10-win seasons along with top-10 finishes nationally three times. His 2006 Louisville squad and 2011 Arkansas team concluded with No. 5 rankings in the Associated Press polls.

During Petrino's time at Louisville, he coached the Bronko Nagurski and Ted Hendricks Award winner Elvis Dumervil, who led the nation in sacks (20) and forced fumbles (10) on his way to earning All-America honors in 2006. During that same season, Bush scored 24 touchdowns and became the school's first 1,000-yard rusher since 1999.

While the head coach of three different programs, Petrino's offenses have compiled a 100-yard rusher on 99 occasions and a 300-yard passer 66 times over the last 15 seasons.

In four years at the helm of UofL's program, Petrino's offenses produced some of the greatest numbers in college football history. During his time, the Cardinals averaged over 34.0 points per game in all four years, including a best of 49.8 points per game in 2004. He also averaged 43.4 points per game in 2005. In 50 games at Louisville, Petrino's teams scored 30 or more points 36 times: 30 or more points eight times; 40 or more on 15 different occasions; and 50 or more points 13 times.

Petrino directed the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST title in 2006, Louisville's second year in the league. He guided that squad to a 12-1 record, which tied the 2013 squad for the most wins in school history. The Cardinals ended the year with their highest national ranking in school history, finishing No. 5 in the Associated Press poll and sixth in the USA Today poll. The Cardinals opened the year going 8-0, including a win over third-ranked West Virginia, and catapulted to as high as No. 3 in the nation.

Hired for the first time at Louisville in 2003, Petrino took the reins of a program that finished 7-6 a year prior and drove the school to a 9-4 mark that resulted in an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Petrino became the first Louisville head coach to win nine games in their first season.

By the end of his first year, Petrino's team led the league and ranked among the nation's best in total offense, rushing, and scoring. The Cardinals ranked fifth in the nation in total offense (488.9), 10th in rushing (228.2), and 15th in scoring offense (34.6). Louisville set six Conference USA records, including the mark for total yards after the Cardinals racked up 779 yards, including 445 rushing yards, in a 66-45 win over Houston.

The 2004 campaign was one of the best in school history, with Petrino leading the Cardinals to an 11-1 record that culminated in a Conference USA title and a 44-40 Liberty Bowl over 10th-ranked Boise State. The Cardinals led the nation in total offense (539.0) and scoring offense (49.8), scored 50 or more points seven times and set an NCAA record by scoring 55 or more points in five straight games.

After a 9-3 season in 2005, Petrino took Louisville to an unprecedented level the following season, finishing with a 12-1 record and a 24-13 victory over Wake Forest in the Orange Bowl. The 12 wins were the most in school history, besting a previous high of 11 set during Petrino's second season.

Prior to returning to Louisville, Petrino spent one season as head coach at Western Kentucky, where he helped WKU finish the regular season with an FBS school record eight wins while closing the season on a four-game winning streak. The team also set a new school record for total offense (5,502 yards) and passing first downs (141) in a season.

Before joining the Hilltoppers' program, Petrino spent four seasons at Arkansas where he led the Razorbacks to a 34-17 record, going 29-10 in his final three years, increasing his win total in each of his four seasons with Arkansas.

LAST TIME OUT

Louisville backup quarterback **Reggie Bonnafon** ran for two touchdowns and passed for another and the No. 25 Cardinals scored on nine straight possessions in a 66-21 victory over Murray State on Saturday night. After an opening-game test by Miami on Monday night, Louisville cruised past its downstate opponent. The Cardinals followed a first-possession punt with the offensive outburst first-year coach Bobby Petrino envisioned, and the list of contributors was long. Besides Bonnafon's two TDs, three other Louisville backs rushed for scores. Three receivers caught TD passes from the true freshman and sophomore starter **Will Gardner**, who threw two in just over a quarter of action. The Cardinals had 357 yards at halftime, 21 more than they totaled against Miami as they outgained the FCS-level Racers 603-292. Bonnafon ran for touchdowns of 8 and 16 yards and threw a 27-yard TD pass to Michaelee Harris. **Brandon Radcliff** rushed for second-half touchdowns of 7 and 5 yards, and freshman **L.J. Scott** ran for 126 yards and a 1-yard TD on 11 carries. Senior **Dominique Brown** added a 2-yard TD run before Louisville's underclassmen picked up where he left off

LOUISVILLE ENTERING FIRST SEASON IN THE ACC

Louisville officially joined the ACC on Monday night when it opened the 2014 season by defeating Miami 31-13 at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium. The ACC is Louisville's fifth different conference affiliation. Louisville joined the Missouri Valley Conference in 1963 before becoming a football independent from 1974-95. The Cardinals became members of Conference USA in 1996 and spent nine seasons in C-USA before joining the BIG EAST Conference in 2005. UofL would spend eight years in the BIG EAST and one season in the American Athletic Conference a year ago.

LOUISVILLE ON FOUR-GAME BOWL STREAK

Louisville has played in four-straight bowl games for the second time in school history. After missing bowl games in 2007-2009, the Cardinals have appeared in bowl games the last four seasons (2010-13). Louisville had a nine-game postseason streak from 1998-2006. Louisville also appeared in bowl games in 1958, 1970, 1977, 1991 and 1993.

CARDINALS UP TOTAL OF TRUE FRESHMAN TO EIGHT

Head coach Bobby Petrino played three true freshmen in the season-opening win over Miami on Sept. 1. He upped that total to eight when five more made their collegiate debuts versus Murray State on Saturday night. He played eight in 2003, six in 2004, three in 2005, four in 2006, and the same pattern held up in Louisville's 2014 opener versus Miami, where he trotted out just three on Monday night. Cornerback **Trumaine Washington**, running back **L.J. Scott** and tight end **Charles Standberry** quarterback **Reggie Bonnafon**, defensive back **De'Eric Culver**, defensive lineman **Henry Famurewa** and wide receivers **Cameron Polk** and **Javonte Bagley**. Nine of those 24 players listed below made NFL rosters at some point during their career.

11 CARDINALS MAKE THEIR LOUISVILLE DEBUTS VS MIAMI; 21 MORE VERSUS MURRAY STATE

In the first two games of the season, a total of 32 Cardinals have made their collegiate debuts. Eleven different Cardinals made their Louisville debut in the win over Miami and 21 more in the 66-21 victory over Murray State. Head coach Bobby Petrino played three true freshmen (mentioned above), but eight others played for the first time in a Louisville uniform. Offensive lineman **Kelby Johnson**, safety **James Sample**, defensive back **Chucky Williams**, defensive back **George Clements**, defensive lineman **Pio Vatuvei**, center **Tobijah Hughley**, wide receiver **Dontez Byrd**, and linebacker **Trevon Young.** Johnson, Williams and Clements all made their debuts on special teams, while Sample started at safety and Hughley was the team's starting center. Byrd and Vatuvei contributed off the bench.

SEVEN CARDINALS MAKE INITIAL STARTS

The Cardinals had six different players make their first career starts in Louisville's 31-13 win over Miami on Sept. 1, with three coming on each side of the football. On defense, defensive tackle **DeAngelo Brown**, linebacker **Keith Kelsey** and safety **James Sample**, while defensive tackle **Pio Vatuvei** made his first start against Murray State. Center **Tobijah Hughley**, wide receiver **James Quick**, and sophomore **Will Gardner** each earned their first career starts on Sept 1.

CARDINALS ON EIGHT-GAME WINNING STREAK

Louisville increased its winning streak to eight games with a 66-21 win over Murray State on Saturday night. The win extended the Cardinals' winning streak, which is the second-longest streak in the nation behind Florida State's 18-game streak. The Cardinals moved to the second-longest streak in the country after Michigan State was defeated by Oregon.

PETRINO EXTENDS HOME STREAK TO 20

Head coach Bobby Petrino has been amazing at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium as head coach of the Cardinals. The fifth-year head coach at Louisville is 24-1 all-time at home since taking over the program, but is currently riding a long streak at home. With the 66-21 win over Murray State on Saturday, Petrino extended his home winning streak to 20 games and hasn't lost at home since Nov. 15, 2003 in a 37-7 loss to Memphis. During that streak, the Cardinals have recorded wins of 20 or more points 17 times.

THIRD-HIGHEST TOTAL FOR PETRINO

Head coach Bobby Petrino is no stranger to scoring points, and his team showed that last Saturday in the win over Murray State. The Cardinals scored a 66-21 win over the Racers, marking the third-highest point total for a Petrino coached team — all coming at Louisville. Petrino's squad tallied 70 points in a win over Cincinnati in 2004, 69 versus North Carolina in 2005 and 66 versus Houston in Petrino's first season in 2003. The 66 points scored by the Cardinals on Saturday night marked the eighth time in Petrino's career that one of his teams scored 60 or more points in a game.

CONSECUTIVE GAMES SCORING STREAK

Louisville is currently riding a consecutive game scoring streak that spans 175 games dating back to the 2000 season. The streak ranks as the third longest in the ACC behind Virginia Tech (245) and Georgia Tech (212).

PETRINO JUST AS SUCCESSFUL ON THE ROAD

Head coach Bobby Petrino has been extremely successful at home, but his teams have been just as productive on the road. Petrino owns a 17-6 record on the road during his tenure with the Cardinals and has won seven of his last eight road contests with the Cardinals. He takes his team on the road for the first time this season, and is 4-0 in road openers as the leader of the Cardinals. He was 9-9 at Arkansas and Western Kentucky on the road.

PETRINO OWNS NATION'S LONGEST HOME-WINNING STREAK

Head coach Bobby Petrino picked up his 20th-straight home win last Saturday night, which is the longest streak by a head coach in the nation. Northern Illinois has won 27-straight home games, but with three different coaches. Fresno State's Tim DeRuyter has won 13-straight home contests.

CARDINALS LOOK FOR SEVENTH-STRAIGHT ON THE ROAD

The Cardinals hit the road for the first time this season when they travel to Charlottesville to face the Cavaliers of Virginia. With a victory Saturday, the Cardinals would win their seventh consecutive true road game, a feat not accomplished by the program since they won six from 2002-03. The Cardinals won two straight games in 2003 and four during the 2002 campaign. Petrino was 10-5 in league play on the road during his previous tenure with the Cardinals.

PETRINO'S NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

Head coach Bobby Petrino has dominated non-conference foes throughout his 10 season as a head coach. He owns a 38-6 record versus non-league foes, including a 17-3 mark at Louisville. As head coach of the Cardinals, Petrino has won six-straight non-conference games, with the last loss coming to Virginia Tech 35-24 in the 2006 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

PETRINO DOMINATES UNRANKED OPPONENTS

Head coach Bobby Petrino has been extremely successful versus unranked opponents during his tenure at Louisville. With the 66-21 win over Murray State on Saturday night, Petrino is 39-5 against unranked foes while at Louisville, and has won 18-straight games against unranked foes, last losing to USF 45-14 during the 2005 season.

SEASON-OPENING SUCCESS

In 10 full seasons as a head coach at the collegiate level, Bobby Petrino has never lost a season-opening game. Petrino's teams haven't just squeaked by their opponents on the season's first week, they've been dominant, winning the games by a combined score of 395-159.

TWO FORMER CARDINALS RETURN AS COACHES

Former Louisville football players Kolby Smith and L.D. Scott will each make their Louisville coaching debut on Sept. 1 when the Cardinals open up the 2014 season versus Miami. Smith, who will coach the running backs, and Scott, the team's defensive line coach, both played under head coach Bobby Petrino at Louisville. As a running back from 2003 to 2006, Smith amassed more than 1,800 rushing yards and 18 scores. Scott played four seasons as a defensive lineman, his best season being his 41-tackle senior campaign in 2009.

GRADUATED CARDINALS

Louisville has done an oustanding job of graduating its players over the last four seasons, and when the 2014 season kicks, the Cardinals will have seven players who will have their degrees in hand. Below is a list of the players who will have graduated when the Cardinals face Miami to open the season.

THREE ENROLLED IN THE SPRING

Louisville added three newcomers during 2014 spring drills. The trio of January enrollees included one mid-year junior college transfer (**Trevon Young**, OLB from lowa Western) and two high school early enrollees (**L.J. Scott**, RB from Marion Harding HS and **Cameron Polk**, WR from Hamilton Southeastern HS).

HOME COOKING LIFTS CARDINALS

The Cardinals have been one of the best teams in the country at home over the last three seasons. With the win over Murray State on Saturday night, the Cardinals have won 14 of their last 16 home games and are currently

riding a four-game home streak. Louisville has gone 8-1 in the last two seasons, with its only loss a 38-35 decision to UCF last season.

NFL DRAFT

The Cardinals saw four former UofL players selected in the 2014 NFL Draft, including three first-round picks Calvin Pryor (18th overall to the New York Jets), Marcus Smith (26th overall to the Philadelphia Eagles) and Teddy Bridgewater (32nd overall to the Minnesota Vikings). Preston Brown was the fourth Cardinals selected when he was picked by the Buffalo Bills with the 73rd pick in the third round. Louisville and Texas A&M were the only two schools with three first round selections.

25-3 OVER THE LAST THREE SEASONS

The Cardinals have enjoyed one of the best three-year stretches in college football. Louisville has gone 25-3 over that span, going 11-2 in 2012, 12-1 last season and opening the year with a win. It marked the first time that the Cardinals won 11 or more games in consecutive seasons and the 12 wins last year tied a school record. The Cardinals won their 25th game over a three-year period with the victory over Murray State on Saturday night. The 25 wins over that span, which is tied for the second-best total in the nation during that span.

POINT-EXPLOSION

Louisville led Murray State 45-7 at the half, marking the Cardinals' most points in an opening half since scoring 49 against the Racers before the break on Aug. 30, 2007. With the 66 points on Saturday, Louisville has reached 50 points under head coach Bobby Petrino on 10 occasions at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium (most recently Sept. 9, 2006, against Temple). Louisville finished the game with 66 points, the first time the Cardinals have reached the 60-point plateau since posting 72 against FIU on Sept. 21, 2013.

PETRINO 24-1 AT PAPA JOHN'S CARDINAL STADIUM

Head coach Bobby Petrino put together an impressive record at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium in his first tenure with the Cardinals. In his first four seasons, Petrino compiled a remarkable 24-1 home mark, including a school record 20-game winning streak, which is still intact. Petrino's lone blemish was a 37-7 loss to Memphis on Nov. 15, 2003. After his lone home loss to the Tigers, Petrino's teams never faltered again. Under Petrino, the Cardinals are averaging 45.0 points per game at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium and have scored over 50 points on 10 occassions.

for its fifth-straight bowl appearance and its 14th in the last 17 years this season. After missing bowl games from 2007-09, the Cardinals have advanced to four straight, incuding a 36-9 win over Miami, the Cardinals' week one opponent. Head coach Bobby Petrino took the Cardinals to four-straight bowl appearances from 2003-06, including the school's first BCS appearance in 2006.

THREE-STRAIGHT 10 OR MORE WINS

Louisville posted a 12-1 record in 2013, giving the Cardinals 10 or more victories in each of the last two seasons and the Cardinals are going for a school record third-straight double-digit win total. The Cardinals went 11-2 in 2012 under Charlie Strong and he posted a 23-3 record over the last two seasons. Head coach Bobby Petrino is seeking his fifth-straight nine or more win seasons as the head coach at Louisville. He went 9-4 in 2003, 11-1 in 2004, 9-3 in 2005 and 12-1 in 2006. Petrino is looking to tie John L. Smith for the school record for taking their teams to five-straight bowl appearances. Smith guided the Cardinals to bowl in each of his five seasons at the helm from 1998-2002. Petrino took his teams to bowl in 2003-06, incuding the school's first BCS appearance following the 2006 season.

CAPTAINS NAMED FOR THE 2014 SEASON

Five leaders have been chosen by their peers on the University of Louisville football team to be team captains for the 2014 season. Head coach Bobby Petrino announced the captains to the team before the season. Representing the team this year will be three juniors and a pair of seniors. Senior linebacker **Lorenzo Mauldin**, from Atlanta, Ga., and Maynard Jackson High School; junior defensive lineman **Sheldon Rankins**, from Covington, Ga., and Eastside High School; junior cornerback **Charles Gaines**, from Miami, Fla., and Central High School; junior quarterback **Will Gardner**, from Douglas, Ga., and Coffee High School; and senior center **Jake Smith**, from Jacksonville, Ala., and Jacksonville High School. The five have combined for 120 games played and 71 starts, with Smith leading the way with 38 starts. He started all 38 games and was a first team all-conference honoree a year ago. Mauldin has appeared in 36 career contests and 20 starts. He was a second team all-league selection last year. Gaines, a first team All-American Athletic Conference honoree, has played in 20 games with 10 career starts.

CARDS SELL RECORD NUMBER OF SEASON TICKETS

Anticipation is growing at a record pace for the University of Louisville football's inaugural season in the Atlantic Coast Conference. School officials announced that all season tickets have been sold, as a record 46,149 tickets have been purchased for the Cardinals' 2014 home slate. The number of season tickets sold has increased over the last five years, dating back to the stadium's expansion in 2010. Louisville's previous record for season tickets sold was in 2013, when 45,627 were sold.

PETRINO IN SEPTEMBER

Fast starts have propelled the Cardinals to winning seasons under Bobby Petrino. In his first term as the head coach at Louisville, Petrino is 14-1 in the month of September when leading the Cardinals, and have scored 30 or more points in 12 of those games. His only loss came in 2005 when the Cardinals were upset by South Florida 45-14 in Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, Fla. Petrino is 6-0 during the month of September at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium. During his entire coaching career, Petrino is 34-3 during the calendar's ninth month.

PETRINO IN CONFERENCE PLAY

It was hard to find fault in anything head coach Bobby Petrino did during his first stint at the University of Louisville. Petrino's teams were excellent in conference play from 2003-06, posting a 23-6 record and winning a pair of conference titles. Petrino guided the Cardinals to an 8-0 mark in their last season in Conference USA, which resulted in a league title. Louisville also won the BIG EAST in 2006 and received the league's automatic BCS bid.

PETRINO IN NON-CONFERENCE PLAY

Head coach Bobby Petrino's conference record was solid, but his non-conference record was even better. In four seasons with the Cardinals, Petrino's teams were a remarkable 20-3 in non-conference action. He owns a seven-game winning streak againt non-league foes while at Louisville, with his last loss coming in the 2006 Gator Bowl against Virginia Tech.

PETRINO VERSUS RANKED FOES

Head coach Bobby Petrino has made a number of appearances versus ranked foes during his coaching career. He owns a 13-17 record all-time against teams ranked in the 25. He posted a 3-6 record while at Louisville and went 10-11 during his four years at Arkansas. He defeated 15th-ranked Wake Forest in the 2007 Orange Bowl in his final game as the Louisville head coach.

While continuing its ascent on the field, Louisville has established itself as the standard-bearer in academic performance at all levels of college football. Louisville recorded a perfect APR rating, joining Texas as the only two programs in the country to record perfect ratings.

PETRINO PUT 17 CARDS IN THE PROS

Head coach Bobby Petrino has had success of developing players throughout his career, especially during his time at Louisville. Seventeen Cardinals coached by Petrino over his four-year stint were drafted into the NFL. Petrino didn't have anyone drafted after his first season, but the 2005 draft saw a school record six players get selected, including running back Eric Shelton who went in the second round to Carolina. Amobi Okoye was a first-round selection in 2007 by the Houston Texans and Eric Wood was a first-round pick by the Buffalo Bills.

With eight starters returning returning on offense, head coach Bobby Petrino knew he had an opportunity to light up the scoreboard. Louisville is averaging 48.5 points per game after the first two contests, which is the 11th-best total in the nation. The Cardinals tallied 66 points on Saturday versus Murray State and 31 in the opener versus Miami on Sept. 1. The 97 total points is the third-best opening two-game total in Petrino's tenure. He tallied 120 points in 2006 when his 12-1 team posted 58 in the opener versus Kentucky and 103 with Arkansas in 2011.

CHRISTIAN SCORES AGAIN

It's no secret that head coach Bobby Petrino loves to the use the tight end, and it has been evident in the first two games of the season. Senior tight **Career Receiving Yards** end Gerald Christian is second on the team with nine catches for 91 yards and a team-leading two touchdowns, which is tied for 16th nationally. He caught three passes for 32 yards versus Murray State and caught a one-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Will Gardner. Christian established a new career-high with Petrino calling the plays in the opener versus Miami, catching a career-high six passes for 59 yards and a touchdown, scoring on a 10-yard pass from Gardner to put the final points on the board in the 31-13 victory. His previous high for receptions was five against Eastern Kentucky last season. Christian caught 28 passes for 426 yards and four scores last season.

STREAKING TO 200

Known for his consistently powerful offenses, Petrino has had an offense pass for over 200 yards in 47 of their last 50 games and 100 overall games. Prior to the Navy game last season (198 yards), the last time a Petrino quarterback did not eclipse the 200-yard mark was Sept. 26, 2009 at No. 3 Alabama. Additionally, over his 115 career games, Petrino's offenses have surpassed 200 yards on the ground 42 times and have rushed for and passed for over 200 yards in 32 of those games. Additionally, in 100 of his 115 career games as a head coach, his offenses have passed for at least one touchdown.

EXTRA TIME

Preparation and details are among the qualities that make Bobby Petrino among the nation's elite coaches. Petrino's attention to detail and game planning come across even more when he has extra time to prepare for an opponent. During his collegiate head coaching career, he is 30-10 (.750) when having more than one week to prepare for a game (including season openers, bye weeks and bowl games). Petrino's first opportunnity came in the opener when he had a whole summer to prepare and will have four chances to spend more than a week preparing for an upcoming opponent in 2014.

He went 5-for-5 for 50 yards on the Cardinals' first scoring drive of the season.

Scott (1 TD), the Cardinals combined for six rushing touchdowns. It is tied for the fourth most by a team in school history (6 vs. Army in 2004; 6 vs. East Carolina in 2004). The last time that Louisville had two players rush for at least two touchdowns apiece in a game was on Oct. 21, 2006, when current running back coach Kolby Smith and Anthony Allen each rushed for two scores against Syracuse.

BONNAFON MAKES IMPRESSIVE DEBUT

Freshman quarterback **Reggie Bonnafon** sat out the opener, but he made a splash Saturday night. Entering the game in the second quarter, Bonnafon led a three-play drive that he ended with an eight-yard run, his first touchdown of his career. He would come back on the next drive and toss his first touchdown pass of his career when he hooked up with **Michaelee Harris** for a 27-yard touchdown pass. Bonnafon would later add a 16-yard touchdown run. He finished the game 8-of-11 through the air for 112 yards and rushed five times for 22 yards. He finished the game with three touchdowns and is the first freshman quarterback to have three scores in a game since Teddy Bridgewater had three against USF on Nov. 25, 2011. Bonnafon's two rushing scores are the most by a first-year quarterback since Bridgewater had a pair against Connecticut on Nov. 19, 2011.

CARDS GET BALL AND SCORE

After scoring one of their first nine possessions for the season, the Cardinals have exploded since that point. Louisville scored on its final three drives in the win over Miami on Sept. 1. After punting on its first drive of the game versus Murray State, the Cardinals scored touchdowns on their next six drives, and would tally a field goal and touchdowns on their next three possessions. Louisville has scored on 14 of its 25 possessions this season.

PERFECT IN THE REDZONE

The Cardinals have been automatic in the red zone, going 13-for-13 this season. Louisville leads the country with a perfect percentage inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Louisville was a perfect 4-for-4 versus Miami on Sept. 1 and followed with a perfect 9-for-9 against Murray State last Saturday. Other than being perfect inside the red zone, the Cardinals have scored 12 touchdowns on their first 13 tries.

45 IS A HIGH

The Cardinals' offense was clicking on all cylinders last Saturday, scoring 45 points in the first half of the 66-21 win over Murray State. The 45 points were the most in the first half by a Bobby Petrino-coached squad. He tallied 42 versus Eastern Michigan at Arkansas in 2009, and at Louisville, scored 42 in a half versus Temple in 2006 and Cincinnati in 2004.

OFFENSE AVERAGES 40-PLUS UNDER PETRINO

Head coach Bobby Petrino has a reputation of putting points on the board, and his University of Louisville tenure has made that evident. In his four-plus seasons, Petrino's teams have scored 2.156 points in 52 games, which is an average of 41.5 points per game. He tallied 491 points in 2006 in guiding the Cardinals to a 12-1 recoerd and scored 597 points (49.8 per game) in 2004 when the Cardinals ended the year at 11-1. During that season, the Cardinals scored 50 or more points in five-straight games.

WHAT CAN BROWN DO FOR YOU

Senior running back **Dominique Brown** carried the load in the season opener against Miami on Sept. 1. Brown reached new career-highs for rushes and yards in the 31-13 win over Miami. He carried the ball 33 times for 143 yards and a score. It was the third 100-yard game of his career and the first since he rushed for a previous career-best 137 yards on 27 carries in a win over Houston last season. Brown was a workhorse for the Cardinals in the second half, carrying the ball 20 times for 89 yards, 41 of which came in the fourth quarter. The Cardinals are 3-0 when Brown rushes for 100 yards in a game. Brown's 33 carries were the most since Darius Ashley ran 33 times in a 17-9 loss at West Virginia in 2009.

PARKER ENTERS YEAR THIRD IN TDS

Senior wide receiver **DeVante Parker**, who is out for the next 6-to-8 weeks, has an opportunity to re-write the records books at UofL this season. The product of Ballard High enters 2014 with 113 receptions for 1,920 yards and 28 touchdowns in his first three seasons. He needs 22 receptions to crack the school's top list and stands 10th in receiving yards and third in touchdowns. Parker needs six scores to break the school mark for receiving touchdowns, breaking lbn Green's (1996-99) school record of 33. Parker tied a school record last season with 12 touchdowns.

PARKER HOPES FOR ANOTHER MILESTONE

In the Louisville record books, **DeVante Parker** ranks third in touchdown receptions with 28 and tied for 10th in yards, but Parker is attempting to climb up the rankings of another receiving list. The product of Ballard High is tied for ninth with five career 100-yard receiving games. He is tied with Jamie Asher (1991-94) and Parker needs two more to tie Mario Urrutia (2005-07) for eighth place. Arnold Jackson (1997-00) holds the school record for career 100-yard receiving games with 15.

RUSH HOUR

The Cardinals put their running game on display Saturday night in the win over Murray State. The Cardinals carried the ball a season-high 49 times for 325 yards and six touchdowns, averaging 6.6 yards per carry. The 300 yards on the ground were the most by the Cardinals since 2008 when they totaled 303 yards in a win over Kansas State. Against Murray, freshman **L.J. Scott** carried 11 times 126 yards and a touchdown. He had the run of the game when he scampered 68 yards and averaged 11.5 yards a carry. Sophomore **Brandon Radcliff** carried 15 times for a career-best 97 yards, averaging 6.5 yards a carry. Senior **Dominique Brown** carried five times for 40 yards. The Cardinals have a pair of 100-yard rushers in the first two games of the season after Brown rushed for 143 versus Miami and Scott totaled 126 against Murray State.

BIG-PLAY PARKER

Senior wide receiver **DeVante Parker** is definitely known as one of the top big-play wide receivers in the nation. During his illustrious career, Parker has recorded 113 career receptions, and of those catches 32 have gone for 20 or more yards, including 18 touchdowns. Last season, Parker tallied 13 catches and six touchdowns of greater than 20 yards and totaled 14 receptions and eight touchdowns in 2012. The Louisville native averages 16.9 yards per reception, which is tied with Harry Douglas (2004-07) for fifth all-time.

VETERAN OFFENSIVE LINE

Senior offensive linemen **Jake Smith**, **John Miller**, and **Jamon Brown** have become three of the Cardinals' most consistent and dependable players over the course of their careers. Earning starting roles as freshmen, center Jake Smith and guard John Miller have tallied 40 and 36 starts, respectively, and have made 35 starts as a duo. Left tackle Jamon Brown made his first start in 2011, and has started every game since the beginning of 2012, totaling 30 for his career. After all starting the Miami game, Smith, Miller, and Brown have started 25 games alongside one another.

ROGERS STEADY IN PARKER'S ABSCENCE

Senior wide receiver **Eli Rogers** has been a model of consistency for the Cardinals over the last three season, and has showed that through the first two games. Starting at wide receiver the first two games, Rogers has caught a team-leading 10 passes for 110 yards, and has caught five or more passes in 13 iof 40 career games. Rogers has recorded over 40 receptions in each of the last three seasons and has 141 receptions for 1,605 yards and nine touchdowns. With 141 career receptions, Rogers needs two receptions to tie Deion Branch for ninth-place in school history. A product of Northwestern High, Rogers' best season came in 2012 when he totaled a career-best 46 receptions for 505 yards and recorded a career-high 536 yards last season.

OUICK STEP

In the abscence of senior wide receiver **DeVante Parker**, sophomore **James Quick** was going to be the guy to step up and fill some of Parker's lost production, and that's what the talented wideout from Trinity High in Louisville, Ky., did in the opener. Making his first career start, Quick caught a career-high three passes for 40 yards and also had a 12-yard rush. He caught a 25-yard pass from **Will Gardner**, the second-longest reception of his career. Playing in nine games last season, Quick caught six passes for 73 yards, and he recorded half of that total in the opener.

PETRINO WANTS TO RUN THE FOOTBALL

Everyone usually gets confused with premise of Bobby Petrino's offense, thinking he throws the ball all over the field. While he likes to throw the football, his offense is predicated on running the football. During his four-year tenure, Petrino's teams averaged 212.8 yards per game on the ground and totaled 171 rushing touchdowns during that span. Louisville averaged 250.4 yards per game in 2004 and averaged 228.2 in 2003. Petrino's teams are 37-3 when rushing for over 200 yards in a game and 19-1 when tallying more than 250 yards. The Cardinals are averaging 46.0 attempts and 227.5 yards per game through the first two contests, and have seven rushing scores. Louisville rushed for 325 yards on Saturday night against Murray State.

Head coach Bobby Petrino is no stranger to 300-yard rushing games during his five years with the Cardinals. Through 52 games, Petrino's teams have totaled 10 300-yard rushing games after the 325-yard performance last Saturday against Murray. When the Cardinals rush for over 300 yards in a game, they average 57.3 points per game. It was the fifth-highest total under Petrino. The Cardinals rushed for a school-record 445 yards in 2003 versus Houston in a 66-45 win at home.

DYER READY FOR REBOUND SEASON

There was no better running back in the country in 2010 and 2011 than Michael Dyer, who starred at Auburn, guiding the Tigers to

the 2011 national title, and Dyer wants to regain that form this season. Dyer, who was named the BCS Most Valuable Player in th title win over Oregon, ran for 143 yards. He led Auburn in rushing and finished 20th nationally with 1,242 yards and 10 scores in 2011, registering six 100-yard games. In his freshman season in 2010, Dyer was named to the SEC All-Freshman Team after he ran for 1,093 yards. However, the 2013 season, was not what he expected after transferring to Louisville. He played in eight games where he ran for 223 yards and two scores. He opened the season with a 44-yard touchdown in the 49-7 win over Ohio, but his season was cut short due to injury.

HIGH PERCENTAGE

Head coach Bobby Petrino knows how to make a quarterback successful. In his four previous years at Louisville, Petrino's quarterbacks always completed passes at a high level, so far through two games, the Cardinal quarterbacks have been accurate. Through the first two games, the guarterbacks are completing 67.2 percent of their throws, and have tossed 67 passes without an interception. Will Gardner is completing 66.0 percent of his passes, which ranks 40th nationally. He completed 20-of-28 passes in the opener verus Miami and was 13-of-22 versus Murray State. Freshman Reggie Bonnafon was 8-of-11 for a 72.7 completion percentage. In Petrino's first four seasons at Louisville, all of his starting quarterbacks completed 61.0 percent or higher of their passes. Stefan LeFors completed 61.8 percent of his throws in his first year as a starter in 2003 and came back the following year to lead the nation in completion percentage with a 73.5 percentage. Brian Brohm completed 68.8 percent of his passes in 2005 and 63.6 percent in Louisville's 12-1 season in 2006.

HUGHLEY EARNS SCHOLARSHIP

Junior **Tobijah Hughley** earned his first career start in the opener versus Miami on Monday night, A walk-on from Lafayette High School in Lexington, Ky., Hughley was awarded a scholarship by head coach Bobby Petrino on on Aug. 27 in his office following practice.

SPREADING THE WEALTH

The Cardinals were fortunate to get a lot of production from a lot of different players Saturday night in the win over Murray State. Playing four quarterbacvks, the Cardinals completed 25-of-39 passes for 278 yards and three touchdowns. The quarterbacks completed passes to a season-high 12 different receivers, with seven different players catching two or more passes. Nine different players have caught two or more passes this year through the first two contests.

PETRINO NO STRANGER TO TWO-QUARTER-BACK SYSTEM

Head coach Bobby Petrino isn't afraid to play two quarterbacks as he did in 2004 when the Cardinals had Stefan LeFors and Brian Brohm as the two signal-callers. Lefors would start the game and Petrino would typically insert Brohm into the lineup in the second quarter. LeFors had a great season, throwing for 2,596 yards and 20 touchdowns, while completing 71.5 percent of his throws. Brohm appeared in 11 games, passing for 819 yards and six toucdowns, while completing 67.3 percent of his passes. Heading into 2014, Petrino is faced with the luxury of having a pair of talented quarterbacks this year sophomore

Will Gardner and true freshman **Reggie Bonnafon**, and could use the same rotation to get both quarterbacks playing time this season.

DELA CRUZ TIES CAREER-HIGH

With senior **DeVante Parker** out of the lineup, the Cardinals were in need of wide receivers to step up, and that's what senior **Kai DeLa Cruz** did on Saturday night versus Murray State. He tied his career-high with four receptions for 53 yards and a touchdown, opening the scoring with a 12-yard touchdown reception from **Will Gardner**. DeLa Cruz caught four passes for 116 yards and two scores in the 2013 opener versus Ohio.

RUN TO WIN

Run to win is one of head coach Bobby Petrino's slogan for his teams, and that's exactly what they did in the fourth quarter to ice the 31-13 win over Miami on Sept. 1. The Cardinals put the game away with a 14-play, 67-yard drive that took 7:47 off the clock to secure the final points of the game — a 10-yard pass to **Gerald Christian** from **Will Gardner**. On the drive, running back **Dominque Brown** carried nine times for 38 yards, which included a two-yard run on fourth and one. The Cardinals ran the ball 11 times during that 14-play drive that resulted in a passing touchdown.

THIRD-DOWN SUCCESS

The Cardinals were one of the better teams in the nation last year on third down, and they showed they might be just as impressive this year after the first two games of the season. Louisville is converting on 56.0 percent of their third downs last season and have been just as efficient in the first two games. Louisville ranks 19th nationally on third down, converting 18-of-34 for 52.9 percent. The Cardinals converted 11-of-19 versus Murray State after a 7-for-15 perfromance versus Miami on Sept. 1.

RADCLIFF ADDS TO CROWDED BACKFIELD

The Cardinals have a croweded backfield this year with five legitimate starting tailbacks. Sophomore **Brandon Radcliff** made that look true with his career-best performance against Murray State. Entering the season with 90 career yards and one touchdown, Radcliff surpassed that total in just one game, rushing a career-high 15 times for 97 yards and a pair of scores. He scored on a seven-yard run in the third quarter and closed the scoring with a five-yard scamper in the fourth quarter.

TAKE CARE OF THE FOOTBALL

Through the first two games of the season, the Cardinals have done of good job of not turning the football over. Louisville is tied for the lead nationally without having thrown an interception this season. Both **Will Gardner** and **Reggie Bonnafon** have combined to throw 67 passes without tossing a pick. Gardner has thrown 50 passes in his first two games, while Bonnafon went 8-for-11 in his collegiate debut.

HOLDING THE BALL

Head coach Bobby Petrino plays a ball control offense, and knows how to win the time of possession. After two games, the fifth-year coach is winning the time of possession battle in a big way. Louisville leads the nation in time of possession, holding the ball for an average of 37:per game. In scoring 66 points against Murray State, the Cardinals held the football for 42:09 in the win. The Cardinals had sixc drives of over four minutes

against the Racers.

GET THE LEAD AND HOLD IT

Head coach Bobby Petrino can score points, which his teams have proven time and time again. However, one thing has also proved true throughout his career — once he gets the lead, he rarely gives it back. In Petrino's nine-plus seasons as a head coach, he is 66-6 when leading after the first quarter and 75-8 when taking the lead into the locker roon at halftime. When holding the lead after three quarter, his teams are just as dominating with a 78-6 mark.

25 IS THE NUMBER

Head coach Bobby Petrino just coached his 115th career game after the 66-21 win over Murray State. During his career, he has scored a lot of points, but when he scores at least 25 points in a game during his career, his teams usually win. He holds a 72-6 record when he teams tally 25 or more points in a game.

BALANCED ATTACK

One thing that head coach Bobby Petrino has displayed throughout his career is to be balanced on offense, and that has been the case through two games this year. The Cardinals are averaging 227.5 yards on the ground and 247.0 yards through the air. In Petrino's first four seasons at Louisville, he averaged better than 180.0 yards on the ground and 250.0 yards through the air in each of his four seasons. WALLACE CONTINUES TO CLIMB THE CHARTS

Junior placekicker **John Wallace** continues to climb up the school's all-time field goals made list. In three years as the placekicker, Wallace has connected on 38-of-47 field goal attempts for his career, which is third in school history. He needs just six more field goals to tie Nate Smith for second on the school's all-time list. He tied his career-long of 45 yards in the win versus Murray State on Saturday. Wallace is coming off his best season a year ago, where he narrowly missed tying the school record of 21 field goals made. Wallace connected on 20-of-24 field goal attempts and was a perfect 9-for-9 from 30-39 yards. He is a perfect 16-of-16 for his career. The native of Elizabethtown, Ky., closed out the 2013 season by hitting all three of his attempts in the Russell Athletic Bowl win over Miami.

CARDS ON THE RETURN

Louisville is ranked in the top 15 in the nation in kickoff returns after the first two games of the season. The Cardinals are 12th in the country, averaging 29.3 yards a return this year. Junior **Corvin Lamb** is fourth in the nation in kickoff return average, averaging 37.8 yards after his 97-yard return for a touchdown versus Miami on Sept. 1. He is only one of five players to return a kickoff for a touchdown this season.

CARDS LOOK TO REPEAT AS NATION'S TOP DEFENSE

Defensive coordnator Todd Grantham will have his work cut out

for him if the Cardinals hope to repeat as the nation's top defense. Last season, the Cardinals ended the year ranked first in total defense (251.5), sacks (3.25), third down defense (26.7) and rushing defense (80.7). They also ended the year ranked second in scoring defense (12.2 ppg). Louisville held eight opponents to less than 100 yards rushing and four teams to less than 200 yards of total offense. In the two wins this season, the Cardinals have proved they might be ready for a repeat performance. Louisville is allowing 268.0 yards of total offense this season, including just 55.0 yards versus the run. The Cardinals allowed 70 yards on the ground to Miami and just 41 in the win over Murray State on Saturday.

FIRST-DOWN LESS

Miami secured its initial first down of the game with less than a minute left in the first quarter. The Hurricanes finished with just 12 for the game through 56 plays. Murray State had just 14 first downs in the game on Saturday, giving the opposition just 26 first downs in the first two contests, which ranks 16th in the country.

MURRAY STATE SNAPS STREAK

Last season, the Cardinals allowed eight first-quarter points all season, resulting in two field goals and a safety. In the 31-13 win over Miami on Sept. 1, the Cardinals held the Hurricanes out of the end zone. However, the Racers scored the first first quarter score on the Cardinals since a win over Rutgers (Nov. 29, 2012). Murray State scored on a 57-yard pass with 6:17 remaining in the first quarter to cut the lead to 14-7.

SIXTH AGAINST THE RUN

The Cardinals enter Saturday's game versus Virginia sixth nationally versus the run after holding their first two opponents to just an average of 55.0 yards per game and the Cardinals are one of 17 teams to not allow a touchdown on the ground this season. Louisville is allowing just 2.4 yards per carry this season, which is ranked 22nd in the country.

GOOD GAINES

Junior cornerback **Charles Gaines** has a nose for the football in his first two seasons at cornerback. Last season, he recorded a team-high five interceptions, which was the most since the 2010 season. He recorded his sixth interception in 15 games when he picked off a pass against Murray State on Saturday.

A GOOD SAMPLE

With the graduation of two all-conference safeties in Calvin

Pryor (a first-round pick of the New York Jets) and Hakeen Smith, the Cardinals had a huge void at safety. Head coach Bobby Petrino recognized that need and signed James Sample out of Patterson, Calif. Sample has started both games and has made and made an immediate impact. In becoming the ACC Co-Defensive Back of the Week, Sample led the Cardinals with eight tackles and recorded the first interception of the season. He leads the team in tackles with nine. A former safety at Washington, the 6-foot-2, 200-pounder played for the Huskies in 2011 and 2012. Sample played in three games in 2012, and also saw action in two games in 2011 before his season ended early due to an injury. Before signing with Louisville, Sample attended American River College in California and will be eligible next season with two years of eligibility remaining. Scholastically, Sample played at Grant High, where he was a first-team All-CIF San Joaquin Section as a senior, and was also named first-team All-Metro by the Sacramento Bee. He was selected first-team All-Delta Valley Conference and first-team All-NorCal by NorCalPreps.com.

STELLAR THIRD-DOWN PERFORMANCE

The Cardinals had one of the nation's stingiest third down defenses last season, and the team looks to be on track to continue that trend in 2014. As the nation's top defensive unit a season ago, the Cardinals held their opponents to 46 third down conversions on 172 attempts, good for a 27 percent conversion rate. In the first two games of the season, Louisville ranks seventh in the country in third-down defense, allowing opponents to convert just 20.0 percent of their opportunities. Louisville held Murray State to just 4-of-12 on third down after yielding just 1-for-13 against Miami.

BURGESS EXCELS IN NEW DEFENSE

The Cardinals will be solid at the linebacker position with juniors **James Burgess** leading the way. Playing in a new 3-4 defense, Burgess has been all over the field in the first two games. He is tied for the team lead with nine tackles and owns a pair of tackles for loss and one sack. Burgess is in his third year as a starter and is coming off a career season. He recorded a career-best 71 tackles and eight tackles for loss last season. The native of Homestead, Fla, recorded six games with seven or more tackles and recorded an interception versus Rutgers. Brown is coming off a serious knee injury after playing in three games last year. He was a freshman All-American in 2011 after recording 57 tackles and one forced fumble.

GRANTHAM TAKES OVER THE DEFENSE

The Cardinals' defense faces a tough task of trying to replace seven starters on defense, but it is fortunate to have one of the best defensive coordinators in the country taking over the reins. Todd Grantham takes over the defense this season and brings a remarkable resume to the sidelines. Grantham comes to Louisville after four years at Georgia in the SEC and 11 years in the National Football League. In four seasons at Georgia, Grantham had outstanding defenses. He had the fifth-ranked defense nationally, and were 10th against the pass and 11th in rushing defense in 2011, and was eighth in pass defense and fourth in pass efficiency defense in 2012. Grantham's defense was fifth in the country in interceptions and seventh in turnovers gained in 2011.

MAULDIN RETURNS AS SACK ARTIST

Senior **Lorenzo Mauldin** plays with a lot of energy and has shown an ability to get to the quarterback. Mauldin was second on the team a year ago in sacks and finished 19th nationally in sacks with a career-high 9.5. Mauldin has yet to record a sack in his first two games, but he is causing havoc, recording seven tackles and two tackles for loss, while tying for the team lead with two quarterback hurries.

NO 100 YARDS

The Cardinals have been stout against the run over the last two seasons, leading the country last season against the run and are sixth this season. Louisville has allowed 100 yards rushing just five times in the last 15 games, with Cincinnati becoming the last team to crack the 100-yard barrier. The Bearcats rushed for 124 yards in the regular-season finale a year ago. Louisville hasn't allowed a back to rush for 100 yards since Central Florida's Storm Johnson tallied 109 yards nine games ago.

- Louisville's contest against Miami marked the football program's first game as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference.
- Louisville game captains were Lorenzo Mauldin, Charles Gaines, Jake Smith, and Will Gardner.
- Miami won the toss and deferred to the second half. Louisville received the ball to start the game.
- Attendance was 55,428, a Papa John's Cardinal Stadium record. The previous high 55,386, set versus Kentucky on Sept. 2, 2012.
- Louisville now has won four-consecutive season openers, dating back to the 2011.
- Louisville's victory over ACC foe Miami marked the school's second-consecutive win over a conference member in a league debut (lost 26-6 to North Texas State on Sept. 28, 1963, in Missouri Valley; lost 24-7 to Southern Miss on Sept. 28, 1996, in C-USA; lost 45-14 to USF on Sept. 24, 2005, in BIG EAST; won 30-7 over Temple on Oct. 5, 2013, in AAC).
- Louisville is unbeaten in its last seven games, dating back to Oct. 26, 2013. The streak started with a 34-3 win over USF in Tampa, Fla.
- Louisville moved to 77-26 all-time in Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.
- Under head coach Bobby Petrino, the Cardinals moved to 23-1 in Papa John's Cardinal Stadium.
- Louisville is now 24-3 over its last 27 games.
- The Cardinals limited Miami to only 70 yards (on 27 carries). The last time an opponent failed to reach at least 100 yards on the ground was Nov. 29, 2012, when Rutgers logged just 54 yards.
- Louisville held Miami to 1-for-13 on third-down conversions.
