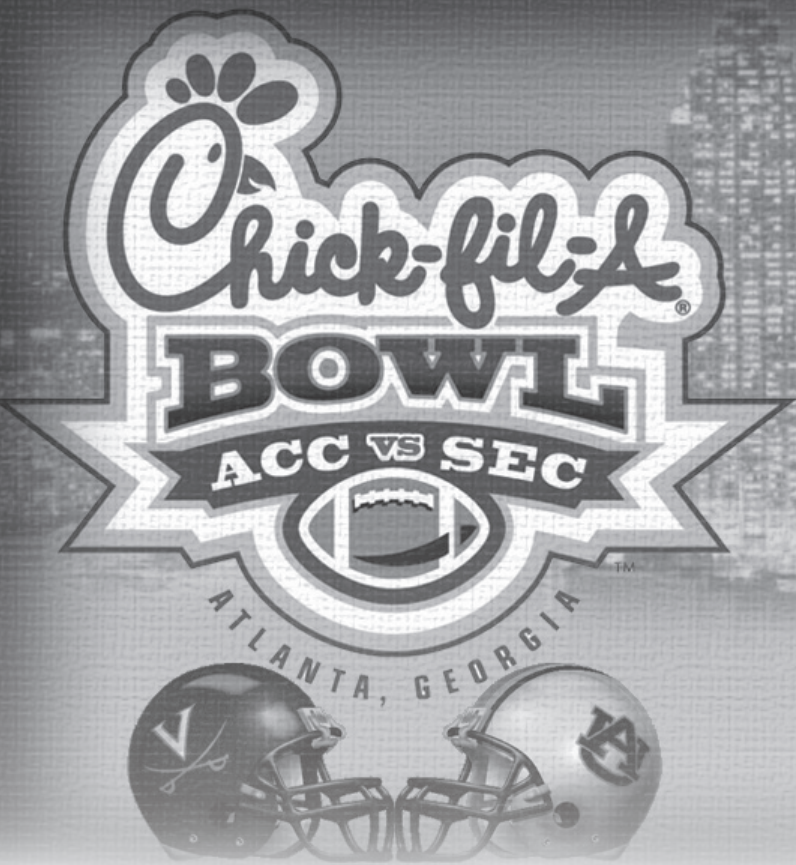

The 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl is the Cavaliers' 18th bowl appearance overall and the first under second-year head coach Mike London. The Cavaliers are 7-10 all-time in bowl games since making their first bowl appearance in the 1984 Peach Bowl.

The Cavaliers dropped a heartbreaker to Texas Tech, 31-28, at the Konica Minolta Gator Bowl, UVa's most recent appearance in 2007.

The Cavaliers gained a dramatic come-from-behind 34-31 victory over Minnesota in the 2005 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl in Nashville, Tenn.

Former head coach George Welsh guided the Cavaliers to a 4-8 bowl record at UVa from 1982-2000, while former head coach Al Groh posted a 3-2 record from 2001-09.

FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Auburn's first football coach Dr. George Petrie received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Virginia in 1887 and when organizing Auburn's first football team in 1892, he used his alma mater's orange and navy blue colors as inspiration for an institution that had no official school colors at the time. His contributions to Auburn didn't end there; Petrie was the founder of the school's history department, graduate school and athletics department, as well as the author of the Auburn Creed.
- Former UVA tailback Tiki Barber and former Hall of Fame Coach George Welsh have been enshrined in the Chick-fil-A Bowl Hall of Fame. Barber was the offensive MVP of the 1995 game, while Welsh was the coach of the 1984, 1995 and 1998 games.
- The Chick-fil-A Bowl will be UVA's first game indoors since beating Syracuse in the Carrier Dome, 27-24, on Sept. 17, 2005. Virginia is 2-2 all-time when playing indoors, including 1-1 at the Georgia Dome. UVA also played in the Superdome in the 1991 Sugar Bowl.
- UVA is 10-13 all-time in stadiums that at the time of the contest were active NFL stadiums. Eight of the 14 NFL stadiums UVA has played in are still active today. UVA's win over Miami at Sun Life Stadium in October halted a three-game losing streak in active NFL edifices.
- Virginia is the first program in the nation to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season – institutions with seven national championships combined.

VIRGINIA AND AUBURN TO DO BATTLE IN 2011 CHICK-FIL-A BOWL ON NEW YEAR'S EVE

- The Virginia football team will face Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl in Atlanta, Ga., on New Year's Eve (Dec. 31) at 7:30 p.m. The game will be televised nationally by ESPN.

THE VIRGINIA-AUBURN SERIES

- Virginia and Auburn have met twice, with each winning on the opponents' home field in 1997 and 1998:

- Safeties coach and special teams coordinator Anthony Poindexter appeared at safety in both meetings with Auburn (1997 & 1998). Poindexter registered 10 tackles in the Scott Stadium game in 1997. During the last meeting with both teams, UVA's 19-0 win at Auburn's Jordan-Hare Stadium, Poindexter had four tackles and an interception.
- Other notables from UVA's last meeting with Auburn were current Kansas City Chiefs running back Thomas Jones, who rushed for 100 yards and one score, and former UVA quarterback Aaron Brooks, who tossed for 220 yards and one scoring strike.

VIRGINIA VS. THE SEC

- Virginia is 31-47-6 all-time against current members of the SEC, however only 7-17 when the opponent was an active member of the SEC at game time.
- Auburn is the first SEC team UVA has played since facing South Carolina in 2003.
- Auburn marks the fifth time UVA has faced an SEC team in a bowl game. Three of those bowl games (1995 Peach & 1998 Chick-fil-A Peach, 2000 Jeep O'ahu) were against Georgia. The 1991 Sugar Bowl was against Tennessee.

NOTING VIRGINIA IN BOWL APPEARANCES

- UVA's appearance in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl marks the program's fourth time at the Atlanta bowl game (1984, 1995, 1998, 2011), which is now the most appearances by the Cavaliers at any bowl game. UVA has been to the current Champs Sports Bowl three times, twice when it was named the Carquest Bowl (1994 & 1996) and then most recently as the Micronpc.com Bowl in 1999. The Cavaliers have been to the Gator Bowl twice (1991 & 2007) and the Continental Tire Bowl twice (2002 & 2003), which is now the Belk Bowl.
- During Mike London's stint as an assistant coach on Al Groh's Virginia staff (2001-04, 06-07), the Cavaliers were 2-2 in bowl games, with wins in the 2002 & 2003 Continental Tire Bowl and setbacks in the 2004 MPC Computers Bowl and the 2008 Gator Bowl.

VIRGINIA'S CONNECTIONS TO THE CHICK-FIL-A BOWL; ATLANTA

- Former UVA tailback Tiki Barber and head coach George Welsh are in the Chick-fil-A Bowl Hall of Fame. Barber was the 1995 game's offensive MVP and Welsh led UVA to wins in the 1984 and 1995 games, going 2-1 in his career at the Atlanta bowl.
- Current UVA safeties coach and special teams coordinator Anthony Poindexter played in the 1995 Peach Bowl, but an ACL tear against NC State in 1998 prevented him from playing in UVA's last appearance in the Atlanta bowl game.
- Head coach Mike London's younger brother, Paul London, played in the 1995 Peach Bowl as a defensive back. He had five tackles and one pass breakup in UVA's 34-27 triumph over Georgia.
- Virginia offensive coordinator Bill Lazor knows the Georgia Dome well. He began his seven-year career in the NFL with the Atlanta Falcons' quality control coach for Dan Reeves in 2003. He stayed in Atlanta until taking a quarterbacks coach position with the Washington Redskins under legendary head coach Joe Gibbs in 2006.
- UVA linebackers coach Vincent Brown is a native of Atlanta, Ga. Brown spent eight years as a player in the NFL with the New England Patriots after an All-American career at Mississippi Valley State.
- Chris Slade, a former UVA All-American and New England Patriots veteran, has been the sideline reporter for the Virginia Sports Radio Network for the past three seasons. Slade is a resident of Atlanta.

CAVS CRACK AP RANKINGS FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2007

- With its No. 24 ranking in the Nov. 20 *Associated Press* top 25, Virginia made its first appearance in the poll since being ranked No. 21 on Dec. 2, 2007.
- It was the 29th AP poll conducted during London's tenure. It was the quickest into any UVA coach's time that the Cavs have cracked the rankings. UVA made it for the first time under Al Groh in the final survey of the 2002 season, the 35th of his administration. The first appearance by anybody in Virginia history came on Nov. 13, 1984, the 44th poll conducted in George Welsh's tenure.

UVA GOES BOWLING FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2007

- With eight wins this season, Virginia is bowl eligible for the first time since 2007. UVA's five ACC victories are its most since finishing 6-2 in league play in 2007.
- Virginia has won four road games in 2011, the most since winning four in 2007.

VIRGINIA RUSHING GAME CONTINUES TO PRODUCE

- Virginia is averaging 165.3 rushing yards per game. That number is the second-highest amount put up by the Cavaliers in the past 12 seasons. During that time only the 2004 team (242.8) had a higher rushing average than this current 2011 squad.
- Virginia rushed for 1,672 yards in 2010 through 12 games. Thus far through 12 games UVA has rushed for 1,984 yards, surpassing its 2010 total and representing the most team rushing yards since 2004 (2,914).

PERRY JONES CONTINUES TO PUT UP IMPRESSIVE NUMBERS IN 2011

- Jones has 883 rushing yards in 2011, needing 117 more rushing yards to become the first Cavalier since Alvin Pearman (1,037) in 2004 to rush for at least 1,000 yards in a season. He would become only the second Cavalier to reach the milestone in a season in the past 11 seasons.
- Jones needs 66 rushing yards to pass John Papit's (949) total from 1950 and move into the Top 15 in the UVA annals for rushing yards in a season.
- Jones has 1,346 all-purpose yards this season. That number is UVA's best since Alvin Pearman led the ACC in 2004 with 1,938.
- With 2,740 all-purpose yards in his career, Jones needs 100 more all-purpose yards to crack the all-time Top 15 at UVA, passing Ken Merritt (2,840).
- Jones is a perfect 3-for-3 registering a first down when rushing on fourth down, tops on the team.
- For his career, Jones has 1,538 career rushing yards. That total ranks No. 25 on the all-time UVA list. Next up at No. 24 is David Sloan with 1,567 yards.

NOTING JONES AS A RECEIVER ...

- At Florida State (Nov. 19), Jones set a career-high with nine receptions. Jones finished the 2010 season with 31 receptions for 224 yards. This season he has 41 catches for 416 yards.
- His 78-yard reception at Miami (Oct. 27) was the longest of his career and the longest for the Cavaliers this season.

... AND AS A PASSER

- Jones' 37-yard TD pass at Miami (Oct. 27) to Tim Smith was the first pass attempt, completion and TD toss of his career. The duo also had the same Jones to Smith hookup when they were teammates at Oscar Smith HS.
- It was the first scoring "option play" for UVA since Vic Hall's 5-yard pass to Joe Torchia at Clemson in 2009.
- Jones becomes the first Cavalier since Vic Hall in 2009 to rush for a TD, pass for a TD and catch a reception for a TD in the same season.

KEVIN PARKS RANKED 10TH AMONG FBS FRESHMEN FOR RUSHING

- Virginia redshirt freshman running back Kevin Parks is having an immediate impact on the Cavaliers' offense. Parks has rushed for 661 (60.1 yards per game) this season which ranks 96th in this week's NCAA stats, 10th among all FBS freshmen and second among ACC freshmen. His eight rushing touchdowns are the third-most of any FBS freshman running back and set a Virginia freshman record.
- With three touchdowns against William & Mary in the season opener, Parks became the first Cavalier to rush for three touchdowns (overall) since Keith Payne's four touchdowns in 2010 vs. Richmond and first Cavalier to rush for three touchdowns (in his collegiate debut) since Bob Davis in 1964.
- With 114 yards rushing in his collegiate debut against William & Mary, Parks became the 64th different Cavalier to have passed the century mark in rushing yards while wearing a UVA uniform.
- Parks followed up his season-opening performance with two rushing touchdowns at Indiana on Sept. 10 and 98 rushing yards at UNC on Sept. 17.

KEVIN PARKS SETS FRESHMAN TDs RECORD

- Kevin Parks has eight rushing touchdowns this season, setting a Virginia school record for rushing touchdowns in a season by a freshman. The previous high was seven by Howard Petty (1983) and Marcus Wilson (1987).

PARKS AND RANDOLPH AMONG ACC LEADERS IN SCORING

- Kevin Parks (TDs) and Robert Randolph (kicking) both are among the ACC's leaders in scoring for their respective categories – Parks averages 4.9 points per game (eighth) and Randolph registers 6.2 points per game (ninth).

VIRGINIA O-LINE THE SAME FOR 12-STRAIGHT GAMES

- The Virginia Tech contest marked the 12th-consecutive contest that the Virginia offensive line has had the same five starters - OG Austin Pasztor, OT Oday Aboushi, OG Luke Bowanko, C Anthony Mihota and OT Morgan Moses. The last time the same five players started an entire season on the offensive line at UVA was 2004.

RICHARDSON 7-FOR-7 ON THIRD DOWN RUSHES

- Clifton Richardson has seven rushes on third down and all seven have resulted in a first down.
- He is third on the team behind Jones and Parks with 333 rushing yards (27.8 per game).

ROCCO'S 200-YARD GAMES

- Sophomore QB Michael Rocco passed for a career-high 307 yards at Maryland (Nov. 5). He has reached the 200-yard plateau in six games this season.
- Rocco is connecting on 61.0 percent (61-of-100) of his passes on third and fourth down, including a perfect 3-of-3 on fourth downs.
- Seven of Rocco's 11 touchdown passes have come on a third down situation.
- Six of Rocco's 11 TD passes have gone for a minimum of 35 yards (35, 37, 38, 41, 53, 78).

ROCCO ECLIPSES 2,000 PASSING YARDS

- Michael Rocco's 211 passing yards at FSU pushed his career total to 2,502 - making him the 20th player in UVA history to pass for over 2,000 in a career.
- He now sits at No. 6 in the UVA annals for passing yards in a season. Here is who is next on the list:

- Rocco's 307 passing yards against Maryland was the 35th time a UVA quarterback passed for at least 300 yards.
- With 2,382 yards of total offense, Rocco is also No. 14 all-time at UVA in total offense for a season.

ROCCO'S FIRST TWO VICTORIES

- Michael Rocco was the first UVa quarterback to win his first two career starts since Tim Sherman in 1996. Sherman was a senior taking graduate classes in 1996 and led UVa to victories in the season's first four games, including over then No. 13 Texas.
- At 19 years of age and a true sophomore, Rocco is the youngest UVa QB to win his first two career college starts according to records dating back to 1939. The next closest in age is Symmion Willis who as a redshirt sophomore won his first five career starts in 1993 at the age of 20.

ROCCO SHINES IN FIRST-CAREER START

- Making his first career start on Sept. 3 vs. William & Mary, UVa QB Michael Rocco went 8-of-8 in the first quarter, finding seven different receivers. Rocco started the game 11-of-11 passing until his attempt to Kris Burd with 2:19 left in the opening half was batted away by a Tribe defender.

- Entering the 2011 season with 25 career passing attempts, Rocco completed 21-of-29 attempts for 174 yards.
- Rocco became the sixth Virginia quarterback since 1955 to pass for at least 170 yards in their first-career start. Here is a breakdown of the most passing yards by a Virginia QB in their first-ever start:

KRIS BURD MOVING UP RECEIVING CHARTS

- Kris Burd now ranks No. 6 all-time in the UVa annals in career receiving yards with 2,087.
- Burd has made at least once catch in 35 of the last 36 games for the Cavaliers. The only game in the streak where Burd did not make a reception was the 2009 contest at Miami where UVa had only 75 passing yards.

BURD'S 100-YARD GAMES

- Kris Burd registered the eighth 100-yard receiving game of his career and fourth of 2011 vs. Virginia Tech (Nov. 26).
- With eight career 100-yard receiving games, Burd is tied for second place on the all-time UVa list.
- Burd needs one more 100-yard receiving game to match Germane Crowell's (1995-97) school-record nine 100-yard receiving games.

PLENTY OF OPTIONS

- Virginia had 10 different receivers catch at least one pass against William & Mary (Sept. 3) and at UNC (Sept. 17).
- In all, 14 different UVa receivers have caught passes in 2011.
- In 2010 UVa used 19 different receivers, which matched the most by a Cavalier team since the 1959 season.

FIRST DOWN STATS

- Of Kris Burd's 60 receptions on the season, 43 have resulted in a first down. That is a rate of 71.7 percent.
- 18 of those first down receptions by Burd came while the Cavaliers were already in a first down situation.

MORE ON FIRST DOWNS

- UVa has averaged 20.6 first downs per game which ranks No. 3 in the ACC behind Clemson (22.4) and Virginia Tech (21.1) and is No. 53 in the nation.
- UVa's opponents are averaging only 16.9 first downs a game, which ranks as the third-fewest in the ACC and No. 17 nationally.

WAHOOS IMPROVE TO 3-4 ON TWO-POINT CONVERSION ATTEMPTS

- Virginia has been successful on 3-of-4 two-point conversion attempts this season. The three successful attempts are the most by a UVa team since the 2002 squad was 3-of-6. UVa's lone unsuccessful try was on the only attempt by the normal PAT unit. The regular UVa offense is a perfect 3-of-3.

VIRGINIA'S BIG PLAYS

- Virginia has 52 offensive plays that have gone for 20 yards or more. Twelve of those (23.1 percent) have resulted in TDs.

RANDOLPH AMONG CAREER ACTIVE LEADERS IN FIELD GOAL PERCENTAGE

- Senior PK Robert Randolph has connected on 45-of-59 (76.27 percent) field goal attempts in his career, a percentage which currently ranks second in the UVa record books.
- His 45 FGM rank third in UVa history (No. 1 Connor Hughes 66, No. 2 Rafael Garcia 58).
- Randolph made a career-high four field goals against William & Mary and at Indiana. He had a streak of 10-straight makes in 2010.
- Randolph, who scored on a fake field goal at Duke in 2010, was one of only two kickers to record a touchdown last season in FBS play. He's the only ACC kicker to find the end zone since at least the 2005 season.

PRO STYLE OFFENSE PAYS DIVIDENDS

- Virginia's 527 yards of total offense at Maryland (Nov. 5) marked only the third time UVA amassed over 500 yards of total offense since Sept. 24, 2005, when the Cavaliers had 511 yards in a 38-7 victory over Duke. UVA had 536 yards of total offense against Indiana in 2009 and 643 yards of total offense at Duke in 2010.
- UVA has amassed more than 400 yards of total offense in 11-of-24 games since offensive coordinator Bill Lazor brought his pro-style attack to Charlottesville. The Oct. 22 game vs. NC State (249 yards) and UVA's 2011 (241 yards) and 2010 (291 yards) season finales are the only games during the Mike London tenure where the Cavaliers failed to amass at least 300 yards of total offense.
- UVA is No. 4 in the ACC and No. 51 in the nation with an average of 396.8 total yards per game.

JONES: 170 CARRIES BEFORE FIRST FUMBLE

- Perry Jones' lost fumble in the fourth quarter against Indiana (Sept. 10) was the first lost fumble of his career. Jones had carried the ball 170 times without a lost fumble until Indiana recovered and scored on Sept. 10.

JENNINGS CONTINUES TO SHOW DIVERSITY

- Darius Jennings made his collegiate debut in impressive fashion against William & Mary - the true freshman had a team-best three plays that went for 20 or more yards. All three came from three different avenues - punt return (27 yards), reception (26 yards) and kick return (21 yards).
- Jennings has 548 kickoff return yards on the season. He is the 14th player in UVA history with 500 return yards in a season. Five of those players have accomplished the feat since 2005. The 2008 season is the lone season in the past six seasons without a 500-yard kick returner.

BURD AND SMITH FIRST RECEIVERS WITH 100 YARDS IN SAME GAME SINCE '96

- Kris Burd (112) and Tim Smith (101) against Maryland became the first UVA receiving duo to collect over 100 receiving yards in the same game since Terrence Wilkins (141) and Kevin Coffey (111) did so against Virginia Tech in 1998.

DID YOU KNOW?

- UVA QB Michael Rocco and WR Dominique Terrell share a unique bond as both from 2006-08 could be spotted at Liberty football games watching their older brothers play together for the Flames. Zach Terrell and Chris Rocco were teammates for three years together in Lynchburg where current UVA offensive line coach Scott Wachenheim was the offensive coordinator.
- Ausar Walcott has a unique story behind the meaning of his name first name. His mother, Pamela Robinson, named him Ausar, which is a derivative of Osiris, the Egyptian god of the afterlife. Osiris is classically depicted with two large ostrich feathers at either side, ironic since Ausar has stated over his life people have told him it looks like he runs like an ostrich.
- 2011 marks the fourth season in a row that UVA has seven home games on the schedule.
- Chase Minnifield's full name is Chase Onassis Minnifield. His father, former NFL Pro Bowler Frank Minnifield, named him after Chase Manhattan Bank and Aristotle Onassis with the purpose of wanting Chase to always strive for success and excellence. Frank also said that "we figured it wouldn't hurt by having Minnifield attached on the end."
- Cornerback Demetrious Nicholson has been growing his signature dread locks since the summer of 2005, just before he entered the sixth grade.
- Freshman DB Brandon Phelps is living in the exact same dorm room that his father, Gary, occupied during his freshman season at UVA. Gary Phelps lettered in 1982 and 1983 for head coach George Welsh.
- Cavalier TE Colter Phillips has two brothers who also played college football - Andrew was a former guard at Stanford and Paul is a redshirt freshman tight end at Indiana.
- Air Force Academy graduate and UVA assistant coach Scott Wachenheim was awarded his bachelor's degree by then-President Ronald Reagan
- WR Jacob Hodges served as a team manager for two years (2008, 2009).
- Sophomore CD Drequan Hoskey ran track at Virginia in 2010 and competed at the ACC and NCAA Championships.
- UVA's oldest living football alum, Dr. John Risher, turned 101 years old this year; he also works in the press box on the UVA stats crew on game day.
- UVA's Homecoming game against Georgia Tech on Oct. 15 celebrated to the day the 80th birthday of Scott Stadium. UVA hosted VMI on Oct. 15, 1931 in the inaugural game in the hallowed edifice. Dr. Risher's only season playing for UVA was the 1931 campaign and he was on the sidelines for that inaugural game.

UNDER THE LIGHTS

- UVa is 12-7 in night games since 2006, including a 6-2 mark in Scott Stadium.

UVA 24TH IN NATION IN TACKLES FOR LOSS PER GAME

- UVa is No. 24 in the nation with an average of 6.92 tackles for loss per game.
- Cam Johnson and Matt Conrath lead all Cavaliers with 11.0 tackles for a loss.

THIRD DOWN DEFENSE

- UVa is No. 2 in the ACC and No. 16 nationally in third down defense, limiting opponents to a 33.2 percent (60-of-181) success rate on third down.

MCLEOD'S THREE INTERCEPTIONS AT MARYLAND MOST SINCE 1996

- Rodney McLeod intercepted three passes at Maryland on Nov. 5. He became the first Cavalier to intercept three passes in a game since current assistant coach Anthony Poindexter against NC State in 1996.
- McLeod has a team-best four INTs on the season and six for his career.
- He was the fourth FBS player this season to record three interceptions in a single game.

MINNIFIELD MOVES UP CAREER LIST

- With his third interception of the 2011 season vs. Duke (Nov. 12), Minnifield moved into sole possession of sixth-place on UVa's all-time interceptions ledger with 13 career picks.
- His 13 interceptions rank him tied for second in FBS among active career leaders (as of Dec. 3).
- Minnifield needs one interception to tie No. 5 Kevin Cook's 14 picks from 1986-89.
- Keith McMeans (1987-90) holds the UVa career interceptions record with 17.

NICHOLSON WASTES NO TIME MAKING AN IMPACT ON 'D'

- Freshman CB Demetrious Nicholson was the first true freshman to start a season-opening game for UVa since Branden Albert in 2005 against Western Michigan at Scott Stadium.
- He is the first true freshman to start on defense since Ahmad Brooks opened up the 2003 season at linebacker in Scott Stadium against Duke.
- Nicholson also became the first freshman to start the season-opener at the cornerback position since Kevin Cook did so in 1986, when the Cavaliers faced South Carolina in Scott Stadium.
- Nicholson has two interceptions this season - vs. William & Mary and Georgia Tech.
- He has started all 12 of the Cavaliers' 2011 contests.

MINNIFIELD'S 2011 HONORS

- Virginia senior cornerback Chase Minnifield has been named the recipient of the second annual Pop Warner National College Football Award. The nation's largest and oldest youth football organization, Pop Warner Little Scholars, Inc., announced the award on Dec. 5. The award, established in 2010, recognizes a Pop Warner alumnus who has made a difference on the field, in the classroom and in his community.
- Minnifield has been recognized as one of 10 NCAA football bowl subdivision student-athletes who excel both on and off the field and were tabbed as finalists for the football Lowe's Senior CLASS Award.
- To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - classroom, character, community and competition.
- Minnifield is one of two players from the ACC on the list of 10 finalists. Dawson Zimmerman (punter) of Clemson also represents the ACC on the list.
- Minnifield is one of 15 semifinalists for the Jim Thorpe Award and one of eight semifinalists for the Lott IMPACT Trophy. He is on the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List and a nominee for the 2011 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team.
- Minnifield was also named a 2011 *Playboy* Preseason All-American.

UVA SECOND IN ACC; TIED FOR 6TH IN NATION IN RED ZONE DEFENSE

- UVa is tied for No. 6 in the nation and No. 2 in the ACC in red zone defense as opponents are only scoring at a 70 percent clip inside Virginia's red zone (31 scores on 44 drives).

UVA HAS FORCED A TURNOVER IN 11 OF 12 GAMES THIS SEASON

- UVa has forced at least one turnover in 11 of its 12 games this season. Seven of the 11 games UVa had at least one INT on defense, failing only to do so at UNC, vs. Southern Miss and at Miami, at Florida State and against Virginia Tech.
- The regular-season finale against Virginia Tech was the only contest of 2011 that the 'Hoos failed to force a turnover.

LONDON IMPROVES TO 4-0 IN SEASON OPENERS

- In his career as a head coach, Mike London has won all four of his season openers: 2008 at Elon and 2009 at Duke while at Richmond and 2010 vs. Richmond and 2011 vs. William & Mary while at Virginia.
- With the Cavaliers' 40-3 win over William & Mary in the season opener, Mike London became the fourth Uva coach since 1931 to win his debut as head coach of the Cavaliers and then win the season-opening game the following year.

NOTING THE FLORIDA STATE VICTORY

- UVa won for the first time at Florida State and improved to 1-8 all-time in Tallahassee.
- UVa became the first school in the nation to win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season.
- By holding FSU scoreless in the first quarter, UVa became the first opponent of the Seminoles in 2011 to hold them scoreless in the opening stanza. FSU was last held scoreless in the first period on Oct. 28, 2010 against NC State.
- UVa won three games in the month of November for the first time since the 1999 season.

NOTING THE MIAMI VICTORY

- Mike London's first ACC victory and first ACC road victory as the head coach at UVa both came over Miami. The Cavaliers topped then-No. 22 Miami at Scott Stadium, 24-19, in 2010. UVa's recent 28-21 victory at Sun Life Stadium was London's first road ACC victory and it snapped a seven-game road conference losing streak.
- It was Miami's first home loss on an ESPN Thursday night game as it entered the game at 10-0. UVa became only the third team in 18 tries to beat Miami in a ESPN Thursday night game.
- Michael Rocco's 78-yard touchdown pass to Perry Jones was the longest UVa completion and longest TD pass from a Virginia QB since Dan Ellis hit RB Thomas Jones for an 84-yard scoring strike against Buffalo on Nov. 13, 1999, a span of 146 games since a UVa QB tossed as long a pass.
- Rocco's scoring strike is the longest via the pass since a trick play in UVa's first-ever game inside the Orange Bowl against Miami in 2005. Wide receiver Emmanuel Byers

UVa'S BIG RUSHING DAY

- UVa rushed for a season-high 274 yards vs. Georgia Tech; the Cavaliers rushed for 240 yards in their season opener vs. William and Mary. It marked the most rushing yards against Georgia Tech this year, topping Maryland's 246-yard rushing day vs. the Yellow Jackets.
- UVa's 274 yards were the team's most since a 348-yard rushing day vs. Duke on Oct. 23, 2004.
- It was the first time Georgia Tech has been out rushed by its opponent since Iowa did it to them during the 2009 season in the 2010 Orange Bowl.

DEFENSE COMES UP BIG AGAINST GT

- Virginia's defense held Georgia Tech to a then-season low 296 yards. The Yellow Jackets' previous low was 386 last week against Maryland.
- Georgia Tech came into the game with 45 plays of 20 yards or more; GT had just five (UVa had four plays of 20+ yards).
- Virginia held Georgia Tech scoreless in the first quarter for the first time this season. UVa is outscoring its opponents 47-7 in the first quarter this year.
- UVa held Georgia Tech to 272 rushing yards, matching the Yellow Jackets' season low, set last week against Maryland.
- UVa allowed just 24 yards passing, the fewest surrendered by the Cavaliers since they gave up 17 on Nov. 17, 1979, at home against North Carolina.

NOTING THE INDIANA VICTORY

- With a 34-31 win at Indiana in Week Two, Virginia won its first road opener since beating Syracuse in 2005.
- UVa's victory at Indiana was the program's first on the road at a Big Ten school. UVa won at Penn State in 1989, but the Nittany Lions didn't join the league until 1990.
- UVa won its first non-conference road game since beating Middle Tennessee in 2007.
- Virginia won a road game for the first time since winning at Maryland in 2009.
- UVa won its third-consecutive game against a Big Ten Conference school: Indiana (2011 and 2009) and Minnesota (2005).
- UVa's successful 2-point conversion (Rocco to Freedman) was the second since 2003 when Matt Schaub ran for one against Wake Forest.

LOPSIDED OPENING VICTORY

- Virginia topped William & Mary in the season opener 40-3, giving UVa a 37-point margin of victory. The triumph was the most lopsided opener for the Cavaliers since they dismantled Kansas on the road to start the 1990 season, 59-10.
- Current UVa wide receivers coach Shawn Moore was UVa's starting QB for the 49-point victory when he was 16-of-27 for 254 yard passing with 3 TDs.

PHILLIPS BROTHERS NOMINATED FOR COURAGE IN SPORTS AWARD

- Cavalier TE Colter Phillips and his brothers Andrew, Paul and Willy were nominated for America's Choice Honor for Courage in Sports. The America's Choice Honor recognizes individuals that have overcome monumental challenges to achieve greatness in the world of sports.
- The Phillips brothers – all standout football players – showed incredible resilience and courage during and after their father's death in the fall of 2010. Just 13 years old at the time, Willy, one of four crash survivors, assisted the other passengers and flagged down help – all with a severely fractured ankle and broken nose.
- Coming from a family deep in athletic prowess, the three elder brothers were all playing Division I college football at the time of the crash – Andrew, then a Stanford offensive lineman; Colter, a tight end for Virginia; and Paul, a tight end for Indiana.
- The brothers continued to thrive on and off the field in dedication to their late father – Andrew was named 2010 All Pac-10 Honorable Mention and is now pursuing a master's degree at UVa's McIntire School of Commerce; Colter was recently named to the 2011 John Mackey Award preseason watch list; red-shirt freshman Paul received scout team player of the year honors in 2010; and Willy continues to fight through rehabilitation from the crash. He can walk, bicycle and swim, but his injured left foot still prevents him from running. He attends Charlottesville's St. Anne's-Belfield.

VIRGINIA COACHES PARTICIPATE IN 'COACH TO CURE MD' EFFORT

- In their game against Southern Miss (Sept. 24), the Virginia coaching staff wore Coach to Cure MD patches to raise awareness and funding for Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy research. Fans are encouraged to donate online at www.CoachtoCureMD.org.

VIRGINIA FLIPS ONE FOR 'THE GIPPER'

- In honor of President Reagan's 100th birthday, Virginia joined nearly 5,000 NFL, college and high school football teams across America participating in the Ronald Reagan Centennial National Football Coin Toss in its game against Southern Miss.

- Of the 120 FBS schools, only Austin, Texas - Houston, Texas, Tampa, Fla., and Miami, Fla., can join Lynchburg, Va., with multiple native sons starting at QB to kickoff the 2011 season.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 420 games in the historic venue. UVa's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 241-167-12.

SEASON RECAP

When the media converged at the Pinehurst Resort in North Carolina for the ACC Kickoff in July, not much was expected from UVa as the Cavaliers were picked to finish No. 5 in the Coastal Division. The consensus was Virginia head football coach Mike London had the ship going in the right direction in only his second season at the helm, but few would have guessed the immediate success UVa was going to have after winning seven combined games over the 2009 and 2010 campaigns.

Four months later London was crowned ACC Coach of the Year after leading UVa to an 8-4 overall record and a chance to play for the Coastal Division crown on the final day of the Cavaliers' regular season. Along the way UVa became the first program in the nation to win road games in the same season at Miami and Florida State, programs with a combined seven national championships. Virginia was ranked for the first time since 2007 and snapped a 13-game losing streak in the month of November, a mark also dating back to 2007. UVa broke the streak and won three in the year's 11th month, a first since 1999.

Virginia's berth in the Chick-fil-A Bowl is UVa's 18th bowl appearance and first since going to the Gator Bowl during the 2007 campaign. Eight Cavaliers earned All-ACC distinction, the most since 2004. The success of the year is evident by the play on both sides of the ball.

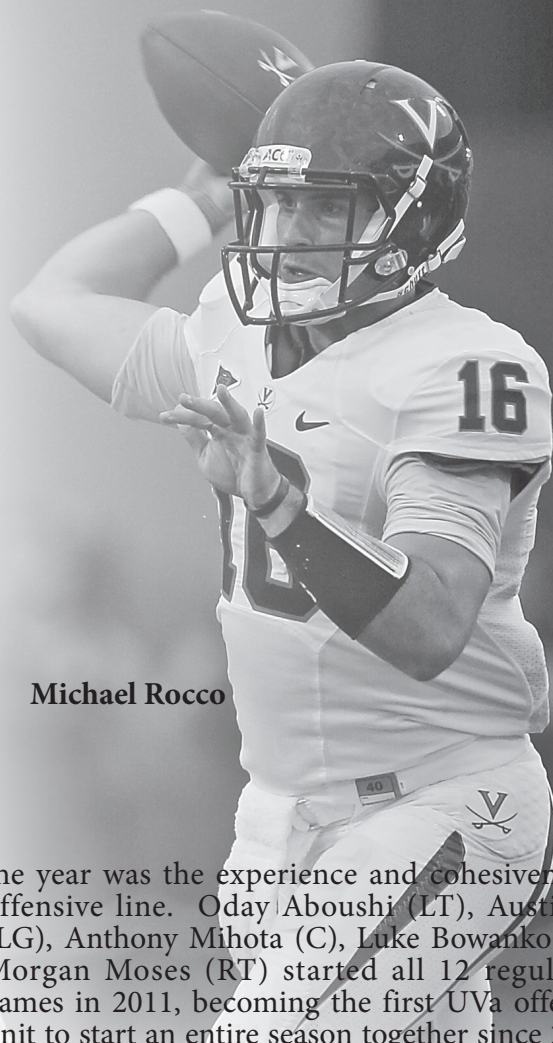
Offense

When London came back to Charlottesville after the 2009 season, the Cavaliers were coming off a year where its total offense ranked last in the ACC and 118th nationally. London lured offensive coordinator Bill Lazor from the NFL ranks and UVa's offensive production has skyrocketed ever since. UVa finished the 2010 season No. 3 in the ACC and No. 37 in the nation in total offense. Prior to the Cavaliers' setback to Virginia Tech in the season finale this year, the Cavaliers were once again No. 3 in the ACC and a Top 30 offense nationally.

The prognosticators might not have known what to make of the UVa offense entering the year. On the eve of 2011 preseason camp it was unknown who was going to be the starting quarterback for the season-opening game on Sept. 3 against William & Mary.

On the Monday prior to the opener, the depth chart was released with true sophomore Michael Rocco officially penciled in as the starting quarterback. Rocco went on to start all 12 regular-season games, and at 19 years of age, become the youngest UVa quarterback to win his first two career starts. His 2,359 yards passing are the most by a UVa quarterback in his first season starting. He also led last-minute scoring drives for come-from-behind road victories at Indiana and then-No. 23 Florida State.

While the quarterback position was in flux over the summer, one thing that was certain entering

the year was the experience and cohesiveness of the offensive line. Oday Aboushi (LT), Austin Pasztor (LG), Anthony Mihota (C), Luke Bowanko (RG) and Morgan Moses (RT) started all 12 regular-season games in 2011, becoming the first UVa offensive line unit to start an entire season together since 2004. The results have been evident as the rushing attack has flourished for 1,984 yards, the most coincidentally by the UVa team since that same 2004 season. Aboushi (second-team) and Pasztor (first-team) were awarded All-ACC honors. Mihota was an honorable mention honoree.

Perry Jones and Kevin Parks have been sparks coming out of the backfield. Jones has rushed, caught and passed for a touchdown in a season where he has amassed 1,346 all-purpose yards. Sharing time with Parks in the backfield, Jones has rushed for 883 yards and five touchdowns. Parks has added 661 rushing yard, as well as eight rushing scores, a school record for a freshman. Combined, the duo averages 26.4 carries per game and they have accumulated 1,544 rushing yards, 13 rushing touchdowns and a 4.9 yards per carry average.

Jones, an All-ACC honorable mention selection, has etched himself as the No. 2 receiving option, hauling in 41 catches for 416 yards and three scores. Atop the UVa statistics is Kris Burd with 60 receptions for 810 yards and one touchdown. Burd has solidified himself as the No. 2 all-time receiver at UVa with 156 career receptions. His 2,087 career receiving yards reside at No. 6 all-time in the UVa annals. A reliable target, Burd has made receptions in 35 of UVa's last 36 games. Tim Smith has been a solid option with 33 catches for 565 yards and three touchdowns.

Defense

While the offense flourished in the first season of the London era, the defense struggled in 2010 as the switch was made from a 3-4 defensive scheme to a 4-3 look. Safeties became linebackers, linebackers became defensive ends and defensive ends moved to defensive tackles. The talent was there, but the learning curve in 2010 placed the Cavaliers 78th nationally in total defense and No. 10 in the ACC. Experience on the field and another year in defensive coordinator Jim Reid's system, coupled with hard work and determination, were keys as UVa moved up to No. 30 in the nation and No. 3 in the ACC in total defense in 2011.

UVa's defense was first recognized Oct. 15 when it stifled then-No. 12 and previously unbeaten Georgia Tech, holding the Yellow Jackets to their lowest offensive output (296) of what had been a 6-0 season. Georgia Tech managed just 24 yards of passing and 272 yards of rushing, at the time both its lowest totals of the season. In fact, UVa outrushed Georgia Tech, 274-272, the first time an opponent had done that to the Yellow Jackets since the 2009 season when Iowa trumped the Yellow Jackets in the Orange Bowl.

Part of UVa's defensive success has been starting out games strong. UVa opponents have scored only 17 points on the Cavaliers in the first quarter. That number is the lowest in the nation among all FBS schools. Only Southern Miss and Virginia Tech scored touchdowns, while Maryland kicked a field goal in the first quarter against Virginia.

Defensive tackle Matt Conrath and cornerback Chase Minnifield were named first-team members on the All-ACC squad, while linebacker Steve Greer was a second-team honoree. Safety Rodney McLeod was an honorable mention pick.

Greer leads UVa with 103 tackles, while Conrath's 64 stops are No. 3 in the ACC among defensive linemen and No. 2 among defensive tackles. Minnifield is No. 2 in the nation among active FBS players with 13 career interceptions, including three this season. His interception for a touchdown helped lead UVa in a win over Duke, 31-21. The senior cornerback has seven tackles for a loss and is No. 1 on the squad with eight pass breakups. Minnifield also has 50 tackles on the year, including his most notable stop of Florida State's Bert Reed on a 68-yard reception, racing 50-plus yards to stop the Seminole on the one-yard line. Instead of the Seminoles taking a 17-7 lead, UVa forced the field goal and later won the historic game, 14-13, the Cavaliers' first victory in Tallahassee in nine tries.

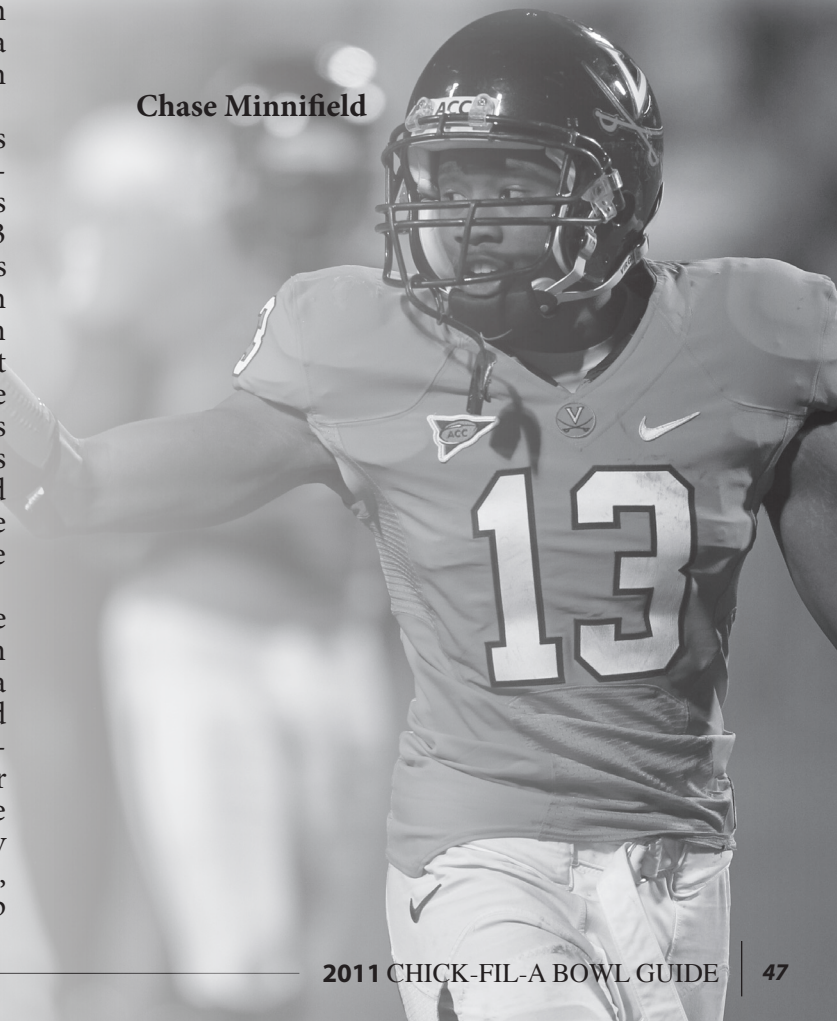
Big plays in close games have come from everyone on the defensive side of the ball. It started with Cam Johnson's strip sack and fumble recovery of Indiana in the closing minutes to set up a game-winning field goal. McLeod's defensive breakup of a two-point conversion attempt in overtime preserved a win over Idaho. McLeod later had three interceptions in the second half at Maryland to put the game away. La'Roy Reynolds, who is second on the team with 81 stops, made a tackle for a loss on a fourth-and-short deep

in UVa territory at Miami, to help secure the Cavalier victory. Along with Minnifield's interception for a touchdown against Duke and the Florida State tackle, and subsequent defensive stand in the final minute, UVa's defense has created some exciting moments for Cavalier fans in 2011.

Chick-fil-A Bowl

Virginia makes its fourth trip to Atlanta for bowl season. The Cavaliers are 2-1 all-time in the Chick-fil-A Bowl. UVa posted wins in 1984 over Purdue (27-24) and in 1995 over Georgia (34-27) when the game was known as the Peach Bowl. UVa's lone loss came to Georgia (35-33) in the 1998 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. UVa is 1-3 against members of the SEC in bowl games, with three of the four games coming against the Georgia Bulldogs.

Recap (AP)

Kevin Parks rushed for 114 yards and three touchdowns and Robert Randolph kicked four field goals to lead Virginia to a 40-3 romp over William & Mary on Saturday night in the season opener for both teams.

The Cavaliers also got a big boost from their much-maligned defense, which held the Tribe to 169 yards of offense and produced two turnovers that led to 10 points. The Tribe converted only 2 of 14 third-down situations.

Virginia's Michael Rocco, making his first career start, completed his first 11 passes and finished 21-of-29 for 174 yards.

William & Mary was unable to cross midfield until 8 minutes remained in the game. The Tribe used three quarterbacks who combined to complete only 11 of 34 passes for 121 yards and one interception.

A 34-yard field goal by Drake Kuhn with 4:34 left accounted for the Tribe's only points.

A 97-yard drive on Virginia's first possession of the second half took the wind out of the Tribe and gave the Cavaliers a 20-0 lead when Parks scored on a 1-yard run. The Cavaliers added another touchdown by Parks and a field goal to make it 30-0 after three quarters.

The Cavaliers led 13-0 at halftime, thanks in part to the accurate arm of Rocco, a sophomore who was 14-of-18 in the first half for 92 yards.

When Virginia's opening drive stalled at the Tribe's 15, Randolph booted the first of his four field goals, a 32-yarder. He later added a 48-yarder on the final play of the opening half, along with 26- and 42-yarders in the second half.

The Cavaliers also scored on a 19-yard touchdown run by Parks midway through the second quarter. Sharing the running duties with junior Perry Jones, the redshirt freshman accounted for 78 of his rushing yards in the first half.

Virginia outgained the Tribe 212-52 yards in the first half, allowing William and Mary only four first downs.

Virginia finally stole a road win.

Defensive end Cam Johnson ripped the ball right out of Edward Wright-Baker's hands with 1:13 left in Saturday night's game, setting up a 23-yard field goal from Robert Randolph to give the Cavaliers a 34-31 come-from-behind win at Indiana.

Second-year coach Mike London improved to 1-5 all-time outside of Charlottesville, and it came with another shocking twist in a bizarre game.

Indiana (0-2) seemed poised to give new head coach Kevin Wilson his first victory after rallying from a 20-point second half deficit by turning three late turnovers into three touchdowns and 31-23 lead with just 6:34 to play.

Virginia (2-0), however, had the answer.

The Cavaliers drove down the field, getting a 3-yard touchdown run from Perry Jones to close to 31-29. Michael Rocco connected with tight end Paul Freedman, who twisted his way into the end zone for the tying 2-point conversion.

It still wasn't over.

Indiana got the ball back with 1:36 and was playing to win in regulation. But on third-and-3 from the Hoosiers' 23, Wright-Baker took a seven-step drop and had barely set up in the pocket when the untouched Johnson raced around the corner. Wright-Baker never saw Johnson, who stripped the ball as both players fell to the ground at the Indiana 14.

Four plays later, Randolph trotted onto the field and lined up between the hash marks for the winning kick.

Kevin Parks carried 11 times for 37 and two touchdowns, while Jones carried 22 times for 78 yards and the one score.

Indiana, which trailed 23-3 early in the third quarter, got an 8-yard TD run from Matt Perez midway through the quarter to make it 24-10. Perez made it 23-17 on a 1-yard run, just five plays after Virginia lost a muffed punt at its own 19.

On the next series, Jones was stripped by Jarrell Drane, and Lawrence Barnett scooped up the bouncing ball and sprinted 54 yards to give Indiana its first lead at 24-23. It was Indiana's first fumble return for a TD since Sept. 20, 2008.

Then Chase Hoobler forced Rocco into a bad pass that was picked off by Greg Heban, his second of the game, and Indiana converted that into a juggling 18-yard TD pass from Wright-Baker to Duwyce Wilson for a 31-23 lead with 6:34 to play.

But the Cavaliers, who scored 10 points in the final 32 seconds of the first half, tied the score, got the turnover and made the field goal to win it.

Bryn Renner threw two touchdown passes and Ryan Houston ran for two scores to help North Carolina beat Virginia 28-17.

Giovani Bernard ran for 102 yards to lead a strong ground attack for the Tar Heels (3-0, 1-0), who won their first Atlantic Coast Conference opener in 11 years. Dwight Jones and Jheranie Boyd each had TD catches as the UNC offense put together an efficient and relatively mistake-free afternoon.

Virginia (2-1, 0-1) moved the football, but the Cavaliers repeatedly squandered opportunities in the first half that could've made this a different game. Instead, they managed only a 41-yard touchdown catch by Max Milien in the third quarter and a 4-yard keeper by Michael Rocco with 5:09 left.

The Cavaliers finished with 468 total yards to outgain the Tar Heels (401). They also ran for 170 yards against a defense that ranked third nationally by allowing 30 yards per game. But they couldn't stop Bernard -- who had runs of 29 and 40 yards -- in a ground attack that finished with 222 yards on 41 carries.

Bernard, a redshirt freshman who missed last season with a knee injury, finished with his first 100-yard game on just 12 carries.

North Carolina hadn't won an ACC opener since winning at Wake Forest in 2000, a skid that outlasted the tenures of two head coaches and constantly kept it fighting uphill in the league standings. But the Tar Heels are now 3-0 for the second time in three seasons while interim coach Everett Withers remains unbeaten since taking over after the firing of Butch Davis a week before preseason camp.

Houston punched in a pair of touchdowns at the goal line and had just 17 yards on nine carries in a role reminiscent of his past seasons as a short-yardage finisher. Renner had a perfectly thrown 18-yard touchdown to Boyd near the front left pylon for North Carolina's first score, then threw a 17-yard scoring pass to Jones -- who managed to get a foot down in bounds of the left side of the end zone -- to push the lead to 21-3 on the opening drive of the second half.

The Tar Heels also forced their first three turnovers of the season. Defensive lineman Sylvester Williams recovered a fumbled snap in the first half, and then safety Matt Merletti intercepted two overthrown passes from Rocco in the final 3 minutes to seal it.

Virginia, meanwhile, had first-half drives end with a missed 45-yard field goal, a fourth-down stop and the fumbled snap.

Southern Mississippi held on for a 30-24 victory against Virginia at Scott Stadium.

Virginia (2-2) had closed to within a field goal on David Watford's 1-yard TD pass to Jeremiah Mathis and his 2-point conversion pass to Kris Burd with 5:18 left, but Lampley's huge catch-and-run led to a 27-yard Danny Hrapmann field goal with 1:31 left.

After picking up one first down on its ensuing possession, Virginia gave up the ball on downs.

Southern Miss (3-1) beat the Cavaliers for the second straight time and beat a BCS-level school on the road for the first time in five tries.

Playing from behind most of the game, they seemed poised to make a dramatic rally when Watford drove them 76 yards for the score with 5:18 to play. But then Davis made all the key plays, hitting Kelvin Bolden for 13 yards on third-and-9 from his 41, and Lampley for the big gainer from the same spot after a personal foul negated a big gain and moved the ball back.

After the Golden Eagles eventually settled for their final field goal, Watford scrambled 15 yards for one Virginia first down, but he missed on third- and fourth-down passes to end it.

Davis finished 27 for 41 for 313 yards with no interceptions. He threw touchdown passes of 32 and 3 yards to Bolden and a 20-yarder to Ryan Balentine.

The Golden Eagles intercepted Michael Rocco three times, and while the turnovers led to only one field goal for the visitors, they kept Virginia's defense on the field.

On fourth-and-15 from their 8 in the second quarter, trailing 13-7, Hrapmann, the punter, rolled right in the end zone as if he was going to do a rugby kick, saw green and took off. He gained 31 yards and a first down, keeping alive a 14-play, 87-yard drive that featured two third-down conversions and a short pass that Balentine took 20 yards for a touchdown.

An exchange of punts found the Cavaliers starting at their own 1, and coach Mike London sent Watford in at quarterback. Three plays netted 2 yards, and Jimmy Howell's punt set the Golden Eagles up at the Virginia 35. A 23-yard connection from Davis to Lampley highlighted the 8-play drive, and Davis found Bolden with no one near him on third-and-goal from the 3 for the TD.

The Cavaliers scored on consecutive drives to go ahead 13-7. Rocco scored the first touchdown on a 6-yard keeper, and after the defense held, he led the team on a 69-yard drive in six plays. Perry Jones had a 20-yard run in the drive, a 15-yard personal foul helped too, and redshirt freshman Kevin Parks scored from the 9, running over defenders near the goal line.

Underdog Idaho went for the win instead of forcing a second overtime, and Brian Reader's two-point conversion pass fell incomplete as error-prone Virginia escaped with a 21-20 victory.

Virginia (3-2) overcame a blocked punt for a touchdown, an interception, two fumbles and a slew of mental errors to win a game they desperately needed before they head into the meat of their Atlantic Coast Conference schedule.

The freshman combination of quarterback David Watford and receiver Dominique Terrell clicked for Virginia in overtime. After a facemask penalty pushed the Cavaliers back to the 27, Watford hit Terrell in the right flat. Terrell broke a tackle and outran the secondary to the end zone.

The Vandals responded with a 23-yard pass to a diving Armauni Johnson in the back of the end zone.

But rather than kick the point-after, Idaho went for the win on the road. Reader dropped back and was flushed from the pocket, and he lofted a pass that was swatted down just inside the end zone.

Idaho forced the overtime when Daniel Micheletti scooped up a blocked punt and ran it in from 4 yards out, and Reader hit Marsel Posey for the two-point conversion with 3:11 left in the game.

Mistakes by the Cavaliers allowed the Vandals to hang around. Jones, who finished with 110 yards on 21 carries, and Clifton Richardson lost fumbles and Watford's first series ended when his deep pass on second-and-1 was intercepted.

All the Vandals could manage offensively, however, were field goals of 19 and 42 yards by Trey Farquhar.

Neither team could get anything going in the third quarter, and the fourth quarter started with the first of two missed field goal attempts by Virginia's Robert Randolph. Idaho responded with a quick march deep into Virginia territory, highlighted by a nifty reverse-field 20-yard run by Princeton McCarty and a 44-yard pass from Reader to Mike Scott to the Cavaliers 7.

Two plays later, Dom Joseph intercepted a Reader pass in the end zone.

Virginia's Chase Minnifield also intercepted a pass in the fourth quarter to set the Cavaliers up at the Idaho 46, but that opportunity ended with another Randolph miss from 36.

The Cavaliers finished with 496 yards of total offense to 296 for Idaho, and Virginia wideout Kris Burd had a career-high 123 yards receiving on eight catches.

Recap (AP)

Perry Jones ran for 149 of Virginia's 272 yards on the ground and the Cavaliers slowed Georgia Tech's triple option better than anyone has all season, limiting it to 296 yards of total offense as UVA topped the Yellow Jackets, 24-21.

The Cavaliers (4-2, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) sealed the victory by holding onto the ball for the final 6 minutes, making five first downs to get inside the Yellow Jackets' 5.

But they didn't need to score, and when quarterback Michael Rocco took a knee for a 3-yard loss on the game's final play, thousand of fans surged onto the field at Scott Stadium.

Georgia Tech (6-1, 3-1), off to its best start since 1966, came in with one of the nation's top offenses, but as Maryland did last week in a narrow loss, Virginia tried to force quarterback Tevin Washington to beat them. He carried 26 times for 115 yards and two TDs.

Washington completed just 2 of 8 passes for 24 yards, threw a costly interception late in the first half leading to the decisive field goal and accepted the blame for the loss afterward.

Kevin Parks ran for one touchdown for Virginia, Rocco hit Tim Smith for a 37-yarder and Clifton Richardson had a 22-yard run, all in the first half, as Virginia built a 24-14 lead.

Georgia Tech almost struck very quickly to start the second half, with Washington running 85 yards on the first play from scrimmage, but the play was called back by a penalty.

The Yellow Jackets then did it the hard way, using 19 plays and converting two fourth-and-1 plays and a fourth-and-5 before Washington scored on a 1-yard run. The fourth-and-5 was initially a fourth-and-10, but defensive tackle Nick Jenkins was called for being offside, and Washington ran for 23 yards on the next play to the Cavaliers' 5. He scored two plays later.

The teams traded punts the rest of the way until Virginia took over at its 23 with just under 6 minutes left. Jones started with runs of 11 and eight yards, caught an 18-yard pass from Rocco to convert a third-and-6 from the Virginia 49 and the Cavaliers never gave it up.

Virginia gained 407 yards against former coach Al Groh's 3-4 defense.

The Yellow Jackets erased a 14-0 deficit with two touchdowns in 98 seconds in the second quarter. Washington capped an 80-yard drive with a 7-yard touchdown run, and Rod Sweeting intercepted a Rocco pass three plays later and returned in 32 yards for the tying touchdown.

Freshman David Watford came on at quarterback for one series for Virginia, and led a 72-yard scoring drive with a big assist from Richardson, also a freshman. He bulled his way for a first down on third-and-1, and also carried it the last 22 yards for the go-ahead touchdown.

When Minnifield intercepted a deep pass by Washington on the ensuing series, Rocco came back and led them 41 yards in eight plays to Robert Randolph's decisive 36-yard field goal.

Virginia struck quickly at the start with two touchdowns in the first 8:20.

The Cavaliers drove 73 yards after the opening kickoff, a drive kept alive by Rocco's 14-yard pass to Jones on third-and-4 from the Yellow Jackets' 42 and his 8-yard pass to Tim Smith on third-and-3 from the 23. Two plays later, Parks took it in from the 6, his seventh score.

The Yellow Jackets were penalized twice on their opening series, riling up the small crowd at Scott Stadium, and when Rocco hit Smith for 37 yards and a 14-0 lead, it got really loud.

Mike Glennon threw for three touchdowns and David Amerson intercepted two passes, returning one for a clinching touchdown, as North Carolina State defeated Virginia 28-14.

North Carolina State (4-3, 1-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) came into the game off a bye week looking for a second-half season turnaround while Virginia (4-3, 1-2) was trying to avoid a letdown after last week's upset win over Georgia Tech, which was ranked 12th. Last year, the Cavaliers followed an upset win over a ranked Miami team with four losses to end the season.

The Cavaliers have employed a two-quarterback rotation this season with sophomore Michael Rocco and freshman David Watford, and it was mostly ineffective against the Wolfpack. After Rocco led Virginia on its first touchdown drive, which ended with his 5-yard pass to Clifton Richardson, Watford came in on the Cavaliers' next possession and promptly threw the first of his three interceptions.

Rocco couldn't get much going after that, so Watford got most of the work in second half, with mixed results. He briefly gave the Cavaliers hope by throwing a 60-yard touchdown pass to Tim Smith, but two more interceptions followed.

The biggest interception came in the fourth quarter with the Cavaliers trailing 21-14 and backed up deep in their own territory. Watford's pass was deflected by Smith and grabbed by Amerson, who ran 12 yards and dived into the end zone with 6:08 left.

Any hopes of a Virginia comeback ended on the Cavaliers' next possession, when Brandon Bishop picked off another Watford pass that bounced off the hands of wideout Kris Burd. Virginia's defense held, but North Carolina State recovered a muffed punt by Dominique Terrell.

The Cavaliers never got to Glennon, who had been sacked 17 times, but they did intercept him twice.

Virginia also couldn't muster much against a banged-up North Carolina State defense. The Wolfpack was starting its fourth defensive line combination in six games because of injuries, but Virginia managed only 249 total yards and 124 yards on the ground.

North Carolina State had 345 yards, 231 through the air.

Glennon was 20 of 36 passing, and James Washington had 82 yards on 25 carries for the Wolfpack.

Watford finished 4 of 16 for 89 yards, and Rocco was 7 of 19 for 36 yards for Virginia.

One of the few bright spots for the Cavaliers was special teams play in the first half. Khalek Shepherd returned the opening kickoff 48 yards to midfield, the longest return of the season for the Cavaliers, and Chase Minnifield blocked a field goal.

A fake field goal. A halfback option for a touchdown. A 53-yard catch-and-run on a screen for a score, and 78-yard reception by a running back who slipped out wide for another.

Michael Rocco passed for 226 yards and two scores, running back Perry Jones threw one touchdown pass and caught another, and the Cavaliers held off Miami 28-21 to snap a seven-game Atlantic Coast Conference road losing streak.

On a night where the explosive play carried the Cavaliers, simple, gritty football saved the day. LaRoy Reynolds stopped Miami's Mike James in the backfield on fourth-and-2 at the Virginia 15 with 2:10 remaining, and the Cavaliers (5-3, 2-2) held on from there.

Jacory Harris completed 21 of 30 passes for 311 yards and three touchdowns for Miami (4-4, 2-3), which saw its two-game winning streak snapped and saw its chances in the Coastal Division take a huge hit. Tommy Streeter caught seven of Harris' passes for a career-best 176 yards and two touchdowns for the Hurricanes.

Miami took over with 7:12 left, needing a touchdown to tie, and went 37 yards in nine plays. Reynolds got past the Miami line and wrapped up James on the game's biggest play, and the Hurricanes didn't get the ball back until 25 seconds remained after a Virginia punt.

And for Miami, it was a little bit of deja vu. In all four losses this season, the Hurricanes had chances in the fourth quarter -- all those defeats coming in one-possession games, where one failed play made the difference.

Still, the Hurricanes nearly tied it with 9 seconds left, Harris looking for Streeter in the end zone, a 45-yard pass that was barely tipped away -- and had Harris going to the sideline in pain after the play. Stephen Morris came into the game and got Miami to the 32 with 4 seconds left, then scrambled and found Eduardo Clements inside the Virginia 10 as time expired.

Down 20-7 with less than a minute left in the third quarter, it looked like long odds for Miami as well. That's when Streeter went over two Virginia defenders for a 51-yard touchdown catch, getting the Hurricanes within 20-14.

Right on cue, Virginia came back with yet another big play -- Jones slipping out wide, then darting back into the middle and catching a short pass that turned into a 78-yard touchdown from Rocco that put the Cavaliers up by 14 with 14:08 left.

Perry Jones ran for 139 yards and two touchdowns, Michael Rocco threw for two scores, and Virginia beat Maryland 31-13 to become bowl eligible for the first time since 2007.

The Cavaliers (6-3, 3-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) trailed 13-7 before scoring the game's final 24 points. By winning four of its last five games, Virginia has reached the mandatory six-victory plateau necessary to earn a bowl invite.

Jones scored on the game's initial play from scrimmage and added a 1-yard touchdown run in the pivotal third quarter, when the Cavaliers outscored the Terrapins 14-0 to take a 28-13 lead. He had 100 yards rushing in the first half alone.

Maryland (2-7, 1-5) committed five turnovers in its fifth straight loss under first-year coach Randy Edsall.

Rocco completed 23 of 36 passes for 307 yards in his second game since coach Mike London ditched a two-quarterback rotation.

With Virginia up 14-13 in the third quarter, London kept his offense on the field for a fourth-and-goal at the Maryland 1. Jones bounced off left tackle for a touchdown, ending a 95-yard drive that lasted nearly six minutes.

O'Brien responded with a 39-yard completion to Quintin McCree, but two plays later the quarterback threw an ill-advised pass that was intercepted by Rodney McLeod at the Virginia 27.

That led to a 17-yard touchdown pass from Rocco to Max Milien, and a fourth-quarter field goal made it 31-13 with 13:38 left.

Midway through the second quarter, the Terrapins stuffed Virginia running back Kevin Parks on a fourth-and-1 at the Maryland 40. The Terrapins got a first-and-goal at the 2, but couldn't push the ball into the end zone and called upon Ferrara to kick a field goal.

Rocco then foiled a blitz with a 34-yard touchdown pass to a wide-open Parks, capping a four-play drive that took only 67 seconds.

Michael Rocco threw two touchdown passes and Chase Minnifield returned an interception for a touchdown as Virginia ended a three-game losing streak against Duke with a 31-21 victory.

Virginia ended its three-year losing skid against Duke (3-7, 1-5), who has lost five straight games.

Rocco hit Jeremiah Mathis for a 6-yard touchdown and Kris Burd for a 38-yarder. Perry Jones scored on a 1-yard dive as Virginia outscored Duke 17-7 in the third quarter.

Khalek Shepherd's 43-yard kickoff return set them up at the 44, and Rocco hit Max Milien for 21 yards on the first play. A 22-yard pass to Paul Freedman moved the ball to the Blue Devils' 1, and Jones scored on the next play.

After Duke punted, the Cavaliers started their next drive with gains of 9, 15, 18 and 16 yards, but they stalled at the Blue Devils' 12 and Robert Randolph kicked a 29-yard field goal.

Duke's Will Snyderwine missed two field goals, including a 34-yarder in the fourth quarter.

Duke pulled even at 21 when Conner Vernon beat Minnifield for a 51-yard catch to the Virginia 3. The Blue Devils sent Anthony Boone in at quarterback to try to run it in, and he gained 2 yards and then fumbled. The play was initially ruled a touchdown, with Duke recovering in the end zone, but was overturned and placed at the 1. After two sneaks by Renfree yielded nothing, Juwan Thompson ran it in easily on fourth down. It was Thompson's second touchdown.

Minnifield had given Virginia the lead, intercepting Renfree on the opening series of the third quarter and returning it 54 yards for a touchdown. It's was his 13th career pick.

Virginia pulled even at 14-14 just before halftime when Rocco hit Burd along the left sideline and Burd tight-rope down the chalk line for a 38-yard touchdown, his first this season.

The Blue Devils scored on consecutive possessions to go ahead 14-7. The first came three plays after Virginia took a 7-0 lead. Renfree hit Donovan Varner over the middle, and Varner split the Cavaliers defense and outran them all on a 64-yard scoring pass. On the play, Varner tied Clarkston Hines' school record of 189 receptions. He later moved into the lead alone.

After the Cavaliers went three-and-out, Renfree hit Braxton Deaver for 41 yards and the Blue Devils drove to the Cavaliers' 4 before losing a yard and then two incompletions by Renfree.

The second came on fourth-and-4 from the 5, and Virginia safety Corey Mosley appeared to have cleanly knocked the ball away from Varner. The officials didn't agree, calling Mosley for pass interference, and Thompson ran it in from the 1 two plays later to make it 14-7.

It looked as if the game was over. A couple of times, at least. Virginia players and coaches celebrated ... a few times.

In the final 38 seconds, a costly facemask penalty gave Florida State (No. 25 BCS, No. 23 AP) a crucial first down and a replay ruling gave the Seminoles a few extra seconds to attempt a potential game-winning kick.

Still, Virginia escaped the weirdness to upset Florida State 14-13 and set up a showdown with rival Virginia Tech next week for a berth in the Atlantic Coast Conference championship game.

The facemask penalty on Virginia's Cam Johnson allowed the Seminoles to convert a fourth down and a pass initially ruled complete in bounds that would have killed the clock was overturned by replay and ruled incomplete with 8 seconds left.

Florida State's Dustin Hopkins missed a 42-yard field-goal attempt with 3 seconds left.

Kevin Parks gave Virginia the one-point lead, by running 10 yards for a touchdown with 1:16 left.

Virginia (8-3, 5-2) snapped Florida State's five-game winning streak with its fourth straight win.

Hopkins, who missed a game-winner last year against North Carolina and then kicked a 55-yard winner the following week to beat Clemson, had kicked a pair of field goals earlier in the game.

Greg Reid's 35-yard punt return set up Hopkins' 26-yard field goal with 54 seconds left in the half to give the Seminoles a 10-7 lead at halftime.

The Seminoles (7-4, 5-3) had tied the game at 7 with 4:49 left in the half when Manuel hit backup tight end Ja'Baris Little on a 1-yard touchdown pass. It was the first career touchdown for Little, who was one of 16 Seminole seniors playing their final game at home.

Virginia capitalized on a Manuel fumble and scored on the first play of the second quarter to grab a 7-0 lead on Rocco's 7-yard pass to Perry Jones. Rocco had completed 9 of his first 12 passes for 107 yards by the time Virginia finished up its 79-yard scoring drive.

Rocco was elusive for most of the game, driving Virginia 75 yards on five plays in just 37 seconds for the winning touchdown. The sophomore quarterback completed 22 of 31 passes for 238 yards.

The Cavaliers, who averaged 187.6 yards rushing a game, managed just 78 against Florida State's run defense, which ranked fourth nationally going into the game.

Virginia Tech won the ACC Coastal Division by defeating Virginia 38-0 at Scott Stadium.

David Wilson added two second-half touchdown runs for the Hokies, who led 14-0 at the break and drove 79 yards with the opening series of the third quarter, and then let their defense do the rest.

Virginia, which came in averaging better than 177 rushing yards, finished with 30 on 26 carries. They had just 241 yards overall, and quarterback Michael Rocco was sacked four times and intercepted twice.

The Cavaliers (8-4, 5-3) had won four straight and seemed ready to finally challenge their state rival, but without a running game, Rocco was under steady pressure. He also fumbled on a sack.

Thomas hit Marcus Davis for 36 yards on the Hokies' first play from scrimmage, and Wilson broke off a 17-yard run on the next play. A 5-yard run by Wilson and 15-yard facemasking penalty on Chase Minnifield moved the Hokies to Virginia's 14, and Thomas ran it in from there.

Virginia tried to answer, driving to the Hokies' 6, but on fourth-and-2, the Cavaliers elected to go for it, and Kevin Parks was tripped up by Jack Tyler after gaining only a yard.

Virginia had no answer for Thomas early or Wilson late, and when the Hokies drove 79 yards for a touchdown to open the third quarter, extending their lead to 21-0, the largest crowd of the season at Scott Stadium (61,124) grew quiet -- except for the Hokies fans.

Wilson capped the drive with a 27-yard burst off the left side. He added a 38-yard run up the middle for another touchdown early in the fourth quarter, and fans headed for the exits.

Following an exchange of punts, which found the Hokies starting at their own 4, Thomas twice converted third-down plays with first-down runs, then hit Davis again, this time for 52 yards.

On third-and-8 from the Virginia 16, he hit Jarrett Boykin over the middle for the TD.

Minnifield, one of 31 fourth- or fifth-year players honored by Virginia before the game, had three 15-yard penalties in the first half, but one was waved off because Davis beat him for the 36-yard catch, and another on a deep ball was negated by a holding call against the Hokies.

J.R. Collins' interception of Rocco and return to the Cavaliers' 6 set up the last touchdown, Thomas' 7-yard pass to Davis. He finished with five catches for 119 yards.

A coach with a national championship on his resume, Mike London has brought great energy and passion to the Cavalier program and made an immediate impact, generating a newfound enthusiasm for Virginia football.

London's plans to build the Virginia football program made remarkable progress during his second season in 2011. The Cavaliers posted an 8-4 record and finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark. Virginia was one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game and received a bid to play Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games the Cavaliers won in the final seconds. Along the way Virginia became the first program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season. For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. A total of five Cavalier players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors.

Since taking over the Virginia program, London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches.

When he took over the Cavalier program in December 2009 he did not wait for constituents to come to Virginia, he actively took the Cavalier program to the public. London embraced a groundbreaking 18-episode television production entitled "The Building of a Program" that gave an all-access look at UVa football.

The past two years his team has held spring practice and a coaches clinic in the Virginia Beach and Northern Virginia areas to build support and interest in some of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

London defines the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The adoption of those principles has generated immediate results. Last spring the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years and team members have become heavily involved in community service projects and outreach programs as part of the program's 'Hoos in the Ville' initiative.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program that finished 3-9 the season before he became head coach.



His first edition of Virginia football produced a 4-8 record but achieved a number of milestones that showed positive progress. The Cavalier offense ranked third in the ACC in offense after finishing last in 2009. UVa upset No. 22 Miami, giving the team its first win over a ranked team since 2008.

The Cavalier offense ranked third in the ACC at 404.8 yards per game after finishing last in 2009 at 269.6 yards per game. Senior Marc Verica led the league's fourth-best passing attack, finishing with 2,799 yards in the air, marking the third-best season mark in UVa history. Wide receivers Dontrelle Inman and Kris Burd became the first UVa wide receiving duo to each total a minimum of 40 receptions in a season. They also recorded over 600 yards receiving, also a program first for a wide receiver tandem.

Keith Payne led a much-improved rushing attack that featured two of the ACC's most productive runners. Payne led the ACC with 14 rushing touchdowns, 16 total touchdowns and an 8.7 points per game scoring average.

Honorable mention All-American Chase Minnifield anchored the UVa defense in 2010, earning first-team All-ACC honors. Minnifield's two interceptions helped spark the Cavaliers' upset of No. 22 Miami, giving UVa its first win over a ranked team since 2008. Minnifield finished the year No. 2 in the ACC and No. 6 in the nation with six INTs.

Offensive lineman Morgan Moses earned freshman All-America honors by helping the Cavaliers go 13 consecutive quarters without allowing a quarterback



sack. The streak began the first game Moses started for the Wahoos.

Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year by both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texans. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November 1984 to July 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks

in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina have seven children, Michael, Jr., Brandon, Kristen, Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. The 51-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.

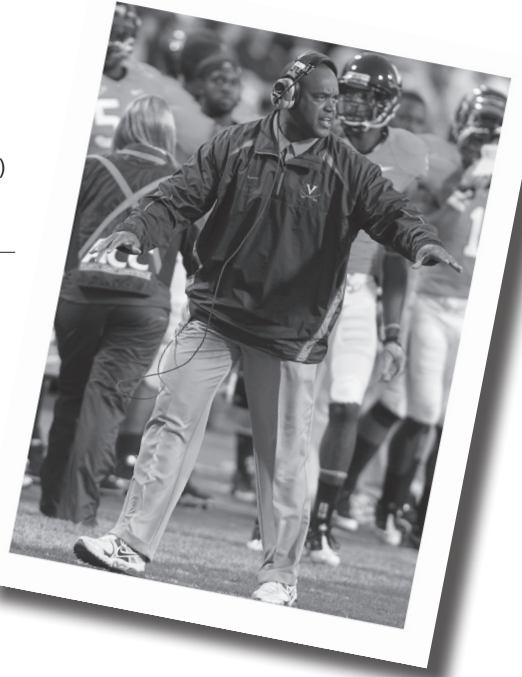

JIM REID**ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH /
DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

In his second year as the defensive coordinator at Virginia, Jim Reid did a remarkable job improving the Cavalier defense.

Led by first-team All-ACC selections Chase Minnifield (CB) and Matt Conrath (DT), the Cavaliers finished the regular season ranked No. 3 in the ACC in total defense, which was 30th among all FBS programs. In 2010, when Reid first took over the UVa defense and converted it from a 3-4 to a 4-3, Virginia was No. 10 in the ACC and No. 78 in the NCAA in total defense.

Reid returned to the Commonwealth to join head coach Mike London's staff for the 2010 campaign after a two-year stint in the NFL with the Miami Dolphins.

London served as the recruiting coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Richmond during Reid's first two seasons as the Spiders head coach (1995-96).

Reid joined London's staff after spending the 2008 and 2009 seasons as the outside linebackers coach for the Miami Dolphins. In Reid's first season overseeing the Dolphins' outside linebackers, Joey Porter produced a career-high 17.5 sacks, a figure that ranked second in the NFL during the 2008 season, as Miami hoisted the AFC East Division Championship banner for the first time in eight seasons. It also was the most-ever sacks by a Dolphins linebacker and third-most overall. For his performance, Porter was named to the AFC Pro Bowl squad, the first Dolphins outside linebacker to earn this accolade since Bryan Cox in 1992.

Of Reid's 37 seasons as a coach, almost half were spent as a head coach, most recently at VMI, where he guided that program in the two years preceding his appointment with the Dolphins. He also served as head coach at Massachusetts from 1986-91 and Richmond from 1995-2003. Reid returns to the Commonwealth where he spent 14 of his 37 career seasons.

In Reid's six years as the head coach at UMass, the school produced a composite record of 36-29-1 as he guided the Minutemen to three Yankee Conference titles. In 1988 and 1990, he was named the Yankee Conference Coach of the Year.

His nine-year run at Richmond included a pair of Atlantic 10 Conference championships and five finishes in the Top 20 in the FCS ranks. He also was selected as the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year on two occasions (1998, 2000) and the Yankee Conference Co-Coach of the Year once (1995). Reid left Richmond as the program's third-winningest coach with 48 victories, including leading the Spiders in 2000 to their first 10-win season in program history.

Prior to taking over the head spot at UMass, Reid spent the previous 13 seasons at the school as an assistant, including the first two as a graduate assistant. Six of those 13 seasons resulted in a Yankee Conference title. Following his tenure at UMass, he spent the next three seasons as a defensive coordinator, the first two at Richmond (1992-93) and the final one at Boston College (1994), helping the Eagles to the Aloha Bowl Championship. After his stint as head coach with the Spiders, Reid spent the 2004 season as an assistant at Syracuse when the Orange were Big East Co-Champions, appearing in the Tangerine Bowl, and 2005 as an assistant at Bucknell.

Reid, a native of Medford, Mass., earned a bachelor of science in education from Maine in 1973 where he was a three-year starter as a safety on the school's football team (1970-72). He earned a master of science in sport management from Massachusetts in 1975. He and his wife, Judy, have two daughters, Meghan and Molly, and a son, Matt.

**BILL LAZOR****OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR /
QUARTERBACKS**

Bill Lazor has done a remarkable job in his two seasons at Virginia, boosting the Cavaliers' productivity as one of the top programs in the ACC.

In 2010 Virginia ranked third in the ACC at 404.8 yards per game after finishing last in 2009 at 269.6 yards per game. Heading into the Chick-fil-A Bowl the Cavaliers are close to matching that number, ranking No. 4 in the ACC at 396.8 yards per game.

Lazor came to Virginia after seven seasons in the NFL, most recently as the quarterbacks coach in 2008 and 2009 with the Seattle Seahawks. Incorporating an offensive scheme that he developed while working for some of the most successful coaches in NFL history has helped to develop players and been a part of the program's turn around under head coach Mike London.

This season Lazor helped to develop sophomore quarterback Michael Rocco and freshman quarterback David Watford into a position where either player could direct the UVa offense. Rocco enters the Chick-fil-A Bowl with 2,359 passing yards, the most by a UVa quarterback in their first starting season. Junior tailback Perry Jones enters the bowl game just 117 yards short of the 1,000-yard mark for the year.

In 2010 senior Marc Verica led the league's fourth-best passing attack, finishing with 2,799 yards in the air, marking the third-best season mark in UVa history. Wide receivers Dontrelle Inman and Kris Burd became the first UVa wide receiving duo to each total a minimum of 40 receptions in a season. They also recorded over 600 yards receiving, also a program first for a wide receiver tandem.

Keith Payne led a much-improved rushing attack that featured two of the ACC's most productive runners. Payne led the ACC with 14 rushing touchdowns, 16 total touchdowns and an 8.7 points per game scoring average.

With the Seahawks Lazor guided Pro Bowler Matt Hasselback for two seasons under head coaches Mike Holmgren and Jim Mora, Jr., respectively. Prior to his stint in Seattle, Lazor spent four seasons with the Washington Redskins. The 2006 and 2007 seasons Lazor was the quarterbacks coach for legendary head coach Joe Gibbs. In his first two seasons in Washington, Lazor was an offensive assistant. Lazor got his NFL start in 2003 under Dan Reeves as the Atlanta Falcons offensive quality control coach.

Lazor's last collegiate stop was as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Buffalo in 2001 and 2002, just after the Bulls rejoined the FBS ranks in 1999. Prior to his days heading the Bulls offense, Lazor spent seven seasons at his alma mater, Cornell. He started as a part-time assistant in 1994 and progressed to the passing game coordinator, recruiting coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 1999 and 2000. He also spent time as the running backs, tight ends, wide receivers and junior varsity head coach during his tenure with the Big Red.

A 1994 graduate of Cornell with a bachelor of science degree in human development and family studies, Lazor was a three-year starting quarterback and graduated with 26 passing and total offensive program records. An All-Ivy League performer, Lazor was a 1993 team captain and team most valuable player as a senior, leading to an invitation to play in the 1994 Epsom Ivy Bowl in Tokyo, Japan.

Lazor is a member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and the NFL Coaches Association (NFLCA). The Scranton, Pa., native and his wife Nicole, have a son, Nolan, and a daughter, Marin.



ANTHONY POINDEXTER

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR / SAFETIES

One of the greatest players in Virginia football history, Anthony Poindexter is in his eighth season at UVa and third-year on the defensive side of the ball. He oversees the safeties and is the special teams coordinator.

Poindexter was UVa's running backs coach for five years on Al Groh's staff. He was also the assistant special teams coordinator the last four seasons of the Groh era.

This year Poindexter's unit has helped hold opponents to a completion percentage of just 53.8 percent, the second lowest mark in the ACC. Rodney McLeod led the team with four interceptions, including three at Maryland. He became the first UVa player to accomplish that feat since Poindexter in 1996. McLeod earned honorable mention All-ACC accolades in 2011.

Under Poindexter in 2009, UVa's defensive backs helped the Cavalier defense rank No. 4 in the ACC and No. 21 in the nation in pass defense. Highlighting the group of defensive backs was second-team All-ACC honoree Ras-I Dowling and Chris Cook, who was drafted in the second round (34th overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings.

In 2008 as the head of the running backs, Poindexter saw senior tailback Cedric Peerman conclude one of the most productive careers in school history. Peerman, who played in the Senior Bowl after earning honorable mention All-ACC honors, finished as the 19th most productive back in UVa history, rushing for 1,749 yards and 15 scores.

Poindexter started his UVa coaching career as a graduate assistant on offense in 2003. He returned to his alma mater the year before as a graduate assistant coach for strength and conditioning.

During the 2007 season Poindexter helped UVa to become one of the best running attacks in the ACC prior to the loss of Peerman to a season-ending injury after six games. Peerman was averaging 113.2 yards per game after five contests before suffering his foot injury. Mikell Simpson then stepped up for UVa and scored eight TDs for the Cavaliers in the final six games of the season, including a school-record 96-yard scoring play in the 2008 Gator Bowl.

In 2006 Poindexter helped UVa's running game average 122.76 yards per game during the second half of the season, powered by TB Jason Snelling. Snelling led the 'Hoos with 772 yards on 183 carries for seven touchdowns. On special teams he worked with Chris Gould, who expanded his role from punter to place-kicker and kickoff specialist. Gould dropped 27 punts inside the 20-yard line to rewrite the school record. He also drove more than 70 percent of his kickoffs into the end zone, resulting in 20 touchdowns.

In 2005 Poindexter guided the Cavaliers to 1,608 yards of rushing and 18 touchdowns, led by senior Wali Lundy's eight touchdowns. Hampered by an injury early in the season, Lundy rebounded to rush for a career-high 113 yards against Temple. In the upset of No. 24 Georgia Tech, Lundy became UVa's all-time career TD leader. He is also only the third player in ACC history to score 50 career touchdowns.

In 2004 Poindexter helped the Cavaliers to the second greatest improvement in rushing average (112.6) in ACC history. UVa's rushing improvement was second best in the nation. The Cavaliers scored a school record 34 rushing touchdowns, led by tailback Wali Lundy's 17 trips to the end zone. All-ACC tailback



Alvin Pearman came on late in the season to become the ACC's second-leading rusher. He earned first-team All-ACC honors for the first time after leading the conference with five 100-yard games. Both Lundy and Pearman rank in the top 10 in rushing in school history.

Regarded as one of the fiercest hitters in the game during his collegiate career (1994-98), Poindexter earned first-team All-America honors at safety his junior and senior seasons. He also was chosen the 1998 ACC Defensive Player of the Year and is one of only three players in school history to earn first-team All-ACC recognition three times.

He finished his career with 342 career tackles, the ninth-most in school history and tops among ACC defensive backs. He is tied for fifth in school history with 12 interceptions.

As a freshman, Poindexter helped make perhaps the biggest single defensive play in school history when he and teammate Adrian Burnim stopped Florida State tailback Warrick Dunn inches from the goal line on the game's last play to preserve a 33-28 win over the second-ranked Seminoles. With the victory, Virginia ended FSU's four-year, 29-game conference winning streak since joining the league in 1992.

Unfortunately, Poindexter's senior season ended prematurely when he injured his left knee in the seventh game of the season and later underwent reconstructive surgery.

Poindexter was selected by the Baltimore Ravens in the seventh round of the 1999 NFL draft. He spent two seasons with the Ravens before ending his pro career with the Cleveland Browns.

To honor his legacy at UVa, Poindexter's No. 3 jersey was retired on Oct. 10, 2009, prior to Virginia's 47-7 triumph over Indiana at Scott Stadium.

Poindexter earned his degree in anthropology from Virginia in 1999.

Poindexter and his wife, Kimberly, have three children – Morocca, Anthony, Jr. and Chloe.

JEFF HANSON

RECRUITING COORDINATOR / DEFENSIVE LINE

Jeff Hanson is in his second season at Virginia after working for two years under Mike London at Richmond as his assistant head coach/recruiting coordinator/defensive line coach, helping the Spiders to the 2008 FCS National Championship and a share of the 2009 CAA crown.

Hanson has done a remarkable job turning the Cavalier defensive lines into one of the top units in the ACC and, at the same time, coordinating the UVa recruiting efforts to help attract some of the nation's top high school student-athletes. On the recruiting front, Hanson has worked tirelessly with London to reestablish ties with high school coaches in the state and the results have been noticeable on National Letter of Intent day.

In 2011 Hanson's defensive line proved to be both tough to run against and aggressive in getting after opponent quarterbacks in passing situations.

Senior Matt Conrath was honored as a first-team All-ACC selection. He spearheaded a unit that ranked No. 3 in the ACC in total defense and No. 4 in defending the run. In 2011 the Cavaliers held opponents to 128.3 rushing yards per game. The season before Hanson joined the staff, the UVa defense surrendered 173.8 rushing yards per contest (2009).



Hanson returned to London's staff at Richmond in February 2008 after a one-year stint at VMI. He played for the Spiders and graduated in 1972 and has enjoyed three separate stints on the Spiders' football coaching staff, serving from 1971-79 under Frank Jones and Jim Tait and again from 1989-2006 under Jim Reid and Dave Clawson.

As the Spiders' defensive line coach, Hanson guided Lawrence Sidbury and Sherman Logan to arguably the most prolific season by a tandem of defensive ends in Richmond history. Sidbury, an All-American, and Logan combined for 17.5 of the team's 36 sacks in 2008 and each earned all-league honors in the CAA.

Boasting 38 years of collegiate coaching experience - 28 with Richmond - Hanson spent 2007 with Reid at VMI where he was the Keydets' defensive line coach and the program's Chief of Staff.

A native of Beloit, Wis., Hanson graduated from Beloit High School in 1967 and came to Richmond as a linebacker. He played on the 1968 Tangerine Bowl championship team and coached the 1971 Tangerine Bowl team.

Hanson remained with the Spiders as a graduate assistant, coaching the freshmen defensive lineman from 1971-73 while completing his degree in physical education and his master of education. Hanson then became a full-time member of Richmond's staff, working with the tight ends and receivers during his first year and with the defense for the next four seasons.

Hanson and his wife DeDe have three daughters, Laurie, Kristin and Katie.

VINCENT BROWN

LINEBACKERS/
ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

Vincent Brown is in his second season on Mike London's UVa staff as the linebackers coach. In 2011 he added the duties of assistant special teams coordinator.

Brown is in his second stint at Virginia and is working with London for the third time in his career after previously working with him at Richmond.

In 2011 Brown's linebacking corps played a big part in UVa finishing third in the ACC in total defense and No. 4 against the run. Junior inside linebacker Steve Greer earned second-team All-ACC honors after leading the team with 103 total tackles. Outside linebacker LaRoy Reynolds was second on the team with 81 tackles.

Brown's stint coaching for London at Virginia is not his first experience with Cavalier football. He was a graduate assistant at Virginia during the Cavaliers' 2007 season, which culminated with a Gator Bowl berth.

Brown joined London at Richmond in February 2008, where he was the linebackers coach. He coached Richmond's three starting linebackers in 2009 to all-league honors as the Spiders shared the CAA crown.

Brown guided a corps of linebackers during Richmond's 2008 FCS National Championship season that were arguably the most talented in the league, with All-American Eric McBride and all-conference pick Collin McConaghy. McBride posted his second-straight season with 100+ tackles, while sophomore Patrick



Weldon emerged as the team's second-leading tackler.

Prior to his start in collegiate coaching, Brown served as an inside linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys in 2006. Brown played for the New England Patriots for eight seasons before retiring in 1995. Brown's nickname as a player was "The Undertaker."

He earned NFL All-Pro honors in 1991, 1992 and 1993. During his professional career he recorded 16.5 sacks, had 10 interceptions and scored one touchdown.

Brown's previous coaching experience includes a four-year stint as an assistant coach at Meadowcreek High School near Atlanta. He was also the school's assistant AD for one year.

A native of Atlanta, Brown played at Mississippi Valley State where he earned Kodak All-America honors as a senior in 1987. He was a second team AP All-American as a junior. A three-time all-conference pick, he broke the school's record for career tackles with 570 stops while leading the team in tackles his last three seasons. He graduated with a degree in criminal justice.

After being selected in the second round of the 1988 NFL Draft, Brown went on to start 103 of 123 career games for the Patriots, logging 811 tackles, 16.5 sacks and 10 interceptions.

Brown and his wife Chandra have four children, Dane, Vincent III, Raven and Jorian.

MIKE FARAGALLI

RUNNING BACKS

Mike Faragalli is in his second season at UVa as the running backs coach. He previously worked with Mike London for two seasons at Richmond.

This year Faragalli has helped to develop the one-two punch of tailbacks Perry Jones and Kevin Parks. They combined for 1,544 yards and 13 touchdowns during the season.

Jones was second on the team with 41 receptions.

In 2010 Faragalli saw Keith Payne lead the ACC in scoring with 14 touchdowns en route to gaining 749 yards. Jones piled up 646 yards that season in his first extensive playing time.

Faragalli came to UVa after serving London as his offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for two seasons at Richmond. During his two seasons with the Spiders, quarterback Eric Ward enjoyed two prolific seasons en route to the 2008 FCS National Championship and the 2009 CAA title. During Faragalli's tenure as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Ward amassed 5,102 passing yards, 749 rushing yards, 32 passing scores and 12 more touchdowns on the ground. Ward completed 64 percent of his passes (419-of-659) under Faragalli's tutelage.

Faragalli, who possesses extensive college and pro experience, came to the Spiders from Lafayette College where he served for eight years in the same position, taking the offensive reigns at Lafayette in 2000 and his impact was immediately felt. He implemented a passing attack that was ranked either first or second in the Patriot League in five of his first six seasons as offensive coordinator and the Leopards captured three conference championships in the process.

Four of his student-athletes earned major Patriot League postseason awards, as tailback Jonathan Hurt was the Patriot



League Offensive Player of the Year in 2006 and Joe McCourt achieved the same honor in 2004 after being named Rookie of the Year in 2001. Phil Yarberough was named the 2000 Offensive Player of the Year and quarterback Marko Glavic earned 2000 Rookie of the Year honors.

Faragalli sandwiched two four-year stints as the offensive coordinator at Bowling Green around one season as the head coach of the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts in 1995. Faragalli has a wealth of CFL experience, serving as the offensive coordinator with three different clubs from 1985-1990. He spent one season in Montreal and two in Hamilton - winning the 1986 Grey Cup championship with Hamilton as a 27-year old - and three in Edmonton.

Guiding an explosive Bowling Green offense, the Falcons led the Mid-American Conference in scoring offense in four of his eight seasons and never ranked lower than third in total offense. He played a significant role in the development of quarterbacks Erik White, the conference MVP in 1991 and 1992, and Ryan Henry, fourth on the MAC list with 46-career touchdown passes.

Prior to his tenure at Bowling Green, his three seasons at Edmonton were under his father, Joe, where the Eskimos advanced to the Western Conference title game in each of the three years. He also played a role in the development of quarterback Tracy Ham, the CFL Most Valuable Player in 1989, helping lead Hamilton to the Grey Cup.

Faragalli began his coaching career at Rhode Island in 1979 and later coached at Wisconsin and William & Mary. He coached the receivers during each of those three stints. A 1980 graduate of URI with a bachelor of arts degree in secondary education, Faragalli played defensive back for the Rams.

Faragalli and his wife Kathryn have four children, Joseph, Phillip, Theresa, and Laura.

SHAWN MOORE

WIDE RECEIVERS

Shawn Moore is in his second season as UVa's wide receiver coach after making his collegiate coaching debut in 2010. Moore is well known at Virginia, where he was a standout quarterback during his collegiate career.

Moore's ability to teach and develop the receiving corps at Virginia has been reflected in the results the unit has posted during his first two seasons with his alma mater.

In 2010 the tandem of Kris Burd and Dontrelle Inman both caught more than 50 balls and combined for 109 receptions and 1,614 yards and eight scores. They became the first 50-50 combination in school history.

In 2011 Burd led the team with 60 catches heading into the Chick-fil-A Bowl and Tim Smith, who redshirted the 2010 season due to injury, became a big-play threat, averaging 17.1 yards on 33 receptions.

Moore entered the collegiate coaching ranks for the first time after four seasons as the quarterbacks coach at St. Albans School in Washington, D.C. Moore also served at St. Albans as the Dean of Students for the lower grades.

The former UVa signal caller completed his final collegiate season in 1990 holding 41 school, ACC and NCAA individual



records and still holds many program records, including most total offense in a career (7,897 yards) and touchdowns responsible for in a career (83).

Moore appeared in three bowl games for the Cavaliers and helped UVa to the 1989 co-ACC Championship and an appearance in the 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl, the program's first-ever New Year's Day bowl game. As a senior, Moore guided the Cavaliers to the program's first No. 1 national ranking and a second straight New Year's Day bowl game, the 1991 Sugar Bowl.

Tying the highest finish ever by an ACC player at the time, Moore finished fourth in voting for the 1990 Heisman Trophy. He also garnered first-team All-America honors on the Football Writers Association of America and Kodak (American Football Coaches Association) All-America teams. The All-America honors made Moore the first ACC quarterback to earn first-team All-America honors since NC State's Roman Gabriel in 1961. Moore also earned second-team All-America honors by the AP, UPI and The Sporting News.

A decorated collegiate career also included being named the "1990 Exemplary Player of the Year" by Street & Smith's magazine and the Downtown Athletic Club of New York for athletic performance, academic achievement and leadership. Moore finished second for the Walter Camp Foundation National Player of the Year Award in 1990.

A dual threat in the backfield, Moore was the only Division I-A quarterback in 1989 to pass for more than 2,000 yards and rush for more than 500 yards. He finished his UVa career throwing for 6,629 yards on 421-of-762 passing, including 55 touchdowns and 32 interceptions. On the ground Moore accumulated a career mark of 1,268 rushing yards on 415 attempts, including 28 scores, for a total offense of 7,897 yards and 83 touchdowns.

Moore was chosen as a senior to participate in the Japan Bowl, Hula Bowl and the East-West Shrine games, leading up to his selection by the Denver Broncos in the 11th round of the 1991 NFL Draft. Moore played with the Broncos from 1991-93 before heading to the Arizona Cardinals in 1994. Moore concluded his professional career in 1995 with the CFL's Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Calgary Stampeders. The consummate athlete, Moore was also drafted by the Montreal Expos in the 71st round of the 1991 Major League Baseball amateur draft, after not playing the sport since high school.

Since retiring as a player, Moore has been an enforcement representative for the NCAA (1997-2000), a scout for the XFL (2000-01), associate athletics director at Howard (2001-03) and the director of sports partnerships for USA Football (2003-06) before taking his most recent position at St. Albans.

Moore is on the board of directors for Virginia's Ridley Scholarship Fund. Active in the community, Moore is annually involved with Multiple Sclerosis walks every year, as well as a member of the Washington D.C. Big Brother program.

The Martinsville, Va., native earned a bachelor of arts degree in psychology from Virginia in the spring of 1990, prior to his senior campaign. Moore has one son, Michael.

SCOTT WACHENHEIM

OFFENSIVE LINE

Scott Wachenheim is in his second season at Virginia and coached the offensive line in 2011 after mentoring the tight ends during his first year with the Cavaliers.

Starting the same five players all season, Wachenheim's line helped fuel an impressive Cavalier running game. Virginia rushed for 1,984 yards, the highest total since the 2004 campaign.

Senior offensive guard Austin Pasztor was named a second-team All-American by the *Associated Press* and first-team All-ACC, while offensive tackle Oday Aboushi was a second-team All-ACC pick.

Wachenheim's players picked up ACC Lineman of the Week honors five times during the season for their performances.

After serving only as the tight ends coach in 2010, he will work with the offensive line in 2011. Wachenheim owns 22 years of collegiate coaching and most recently spent the 2009 campaign as the tight ends coach with the Washington Redskins.

Wachenheim returned to the Commonwealth where he spent three seasons (2006-08) as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Liberty in Lynchburg, Va., under former UVa associate head coach Danny Rocco. Prior to the 2007 campaign, Rocco increased Wachenheim's responsibilities, naming him assistant head coach.

As the offensive coordinator at Liberty in 2008, the Flames went 10-2 on the way to a second straight Big South Conference championship, while averaging 33.7 points and 446.7 yards per game. The latter total ranked ninth in the Football Championship Subdivision and marked the second year in a row Liberty led the conference in total offense as they averaged 429.6 yards a game in 2007, while scoring 42.6 points per contest.

Highlighting Wachenheim's offense during his three years at Liberty was three-year starting running back Rashad Jennings, a seventh round selection by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the 2009 NFL Draft. A Walter Payton Award finalist and consensus first-team All-America selection, Jennings set Big South career records for rushing yards (3,633), attempts (633) and touchdowns (42).

Prior to his days with the Flames, Wachenheim spent 12 years as a member of Ken Hatfield's coaching staff at Rice in Houston, Texas. He spent the last five years with the Owls as offensive coordinator.

Wachenheim helped Rice build a dominant ball control offense which ranked among the nation's best during his tenure.

During the 2004 season, Rice led the nation in rushing offense (306.5 yards per game), and the Owls' 2003 squad ranked second in the country, racking up a school record of 3,800 rushing yards. In 2001, Wachenheim's direction enabled Rice to break the school record for points scored (333) and total offense (4,846 yards).

Prior to joining the Rice staff, Wachenheim served as recruiting coordinator, offensive tackles and tight ends coach at Utah State (1992-93). He culminated his tenure at the school with a Big West Conference title and a Las Vegas Bowl victory in 1993.

Wachenheim got his collegiate coaching career started in 1984. After graduating from the Air Force Academy with a bach-



elor's degree in civil engineering, he served as offensive coordinator of the Air Force Academy's junior varsity squad. He then went on to complete his military requirements.

Wachenheim returned to the coaching ranks at Arkansas in 1989-90, helping the Razorbacks to a Southwest Conference championship and a Cotton Bowl invitation. Additionally, Wachenheim earned his master's degree in athletic administration from the school in 1991.

Wachenheim spent the 1991 football season at Colorado under the leadership of head coach Bill McCartney, helping the Buffaloes win the Big 8 Conference championship and earn a berth in the Blockbuster Bowl.

As a player, Wachenheim was a four-year starter (1980-83) on the offensive line at the Air Force Academy. He earned first-team All-Western Athletic Conference and honorable mention All-American honors his senior year. The 1983 Falcons finished with a 10-2 season record, were ranked second in the nation in rushing offense, and were tabbed as the nation's 13th-ranked team overall.

A native of Woodland Hills, Calif., Wachenheim and his wife, Karla, have two sons: Kyle and Tyson.

CHIP WEST

CORNER BACKS

Chip West is in his second year at Virginia coaching the Cavalier cornerbacks. Based on postseason recognitions and the NFL Draft, it has been one of the most talented spots on the Cavalier roster during his watch.

In 2011 senior cornerback Chase Minnifield earned All-ACC honors for the second straight year while being coached by West. Minnifield enters the Chick-fil-A Bowl second in the nation among active players with 13 career interceptions.

While blessed with a veteran on one side of the field, West worked hard in 2011 to develop the talents of freshman Demetrious Nicholson, the state's high school player of the year in 2010. Nicholson started all 12 games, recorded two interceptions and finished fourth on the team with 56 tackles.

In 2010 West coached Ras-I Dowling. Despite missing much of the season due to injury, Dowling was a second-round pick by the New England Patriots.

In addition to his on-field coaching duties, West is respected by his peers as one of the top recruiters in the mid-Atlantic region. His background in the eastern part of the state has allowed Virginia to reestablish a strong recruiting presence in one of the area's most storied high school football regions.

A Hampton, Va., native, West most recently was the assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach for head coach Bobby Wilder at Old Dominion. He was responsible for recruiting the Hampton Roads and Tidewater areas for the Monarchs. ODU went 9-2 in 2009 in its first season as a NCAA FCS program.

Prior to joining the staff at Old Dominion, West coached at James Madison for three seasons (2004-2006) overseeing the defensive backs, including free safety Tony LeZotte, a 2005 All-American and Atlantic-10 Defensive Player of the Year, as well as the Atlantic 10 co-rookie of the year as a freshman. The Dukes won the NCAA Division I-AA national championship in 2004,



finishing 13-2. In 2006 JMU returned to the FCS playoffs, losing in the first round at Youngstown State.

West coached the defensive backs at Fordham in 2003 when the Rams were 9-3. He served as the wide receivers coach at Colgate for four years and worked as a graduate assistant at West Virginia. Colgate shared the 2002 Patriot League title with Fordham, finishing with a 9-3 overall record and a 6-1 league mark. The Raiders led the Patriot League in 2002 in total offense, averaging 392.5 yards per game, including 215.0 yards per game passing. In 1999 Colgate won the Patriot League title and competed in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

As a graduate assistant at West Virginia for two seasons, West worked with the defense as the Mountaineers participated in the Carquest and Insight.com bowls.

West played football at Kecoughtan High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in computer information systems from Livingstone College, and his master's in physical education from West Virginia while working as a graduate assistant coach. West was an all-CIAA wide receiver at Livingstone. He has a son, Justin, and a daughter, Jada.

MARQUES HAGANS

GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Marques Hagans is in his first season on Mike London's coaching staff and serves as a graduate assistant coach, working with the wide receivers and tight ends.

Hagans was a four-year letterwinner at UVa from 2002-05 and currently is No. 7 all-time in passing at UVa with 4,877 passing yards. He finished his career at No. 5, but has since been passed by Jameel Sewell and Marc Verica, the two starting quarterbacks to follow him in Charlottesville. Hagans is No. 5 all-time at UVa in total offense with 5,779 yards and his 2005 season ranks No. 3 all-time with 2,802 total yards. Only his predecessor, Matt Schaub, had better seasons (2002 & 2003) in the UVa annals in regards to total offense.

The St. Louis Rams selected Hagans in the fifth round (144 overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. He spent three seasons with the Rams before being picked up by the Kansas City Chiefs for the 2009 campaign. Hagans finished the 2009 season with the Washington Redskins and was released in the summer of 2010 after injuring himself in off-season workouts.

Hagans is a native of Hampton, Va., and graduated from Hampton High School after spending two years at neighboring Bethel High School. As a junior at Hampton, Hagans led the Crabbers to the state championship in Group AAA, Division 5 of the Virginia High School League in 1998. Hampton advanced to the state semifinals in Hagans' senior season in 1999.

Hagans graduated with a degree in anthropology from UVa in 2005 and will begin to pursue a graduate degree in professional studies when the summer session commences.

Hagans currently resides in Charlottesville with his wife, the former Lauren Swierczek, a former Cavalier women's basketball player. The couple was recently married in Mexico.



GORDIE SAMMIS

GRADUATE ASSISTANT



Gordie Sammis is in his second season as a graduate assistant on the Cavalier staff and works with the offensive line and tight ends. A 2007 Virginia graduate, Sammis played for the Cavaliers from 2003-07 as an offensive guard, appearing in 34 games during his career.

Sammis was one of seven true freshmen to play during the 2003 season. He was granted a redshirt for the 2004 campaign and played in six contests as a sophomore in 2005, primarily on special teams. He was awarded his first letter following the 2006 campaign when he played in all but two games.

As a senior Sammis played in the final 11 games of the season including the 2008 Gator Bowl to earn his second letter. That season he started against Pittsburgh and Middle Tennessee, both UVa victories, due to an injury to Eugene Monroe that forced some movement on the offensive line.

Following his graduation, Sammis worked as a football coach and weight room assistant at the Pingry School in Martinsville, N.J., until July of 2009. He interned with the Warren police department for four months in the fall of 2009. Sammis then resumed work on his graduate degree at UVa's Curry School of Education in 2009 in administration and supervision.

A prep All-American at Immaculata High School in Flemington, N.J., Sammis played in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl.

Peach Bowl

Dec. 31, 1984—Atlanta, Ga.
Virginia 27, Purdue 24



Using a potent rushing attack and an stifling second-half defense, Virginia stormed back from a 10-point half-time deficit to defeat Purdue 27-24 in the 1984 Peach Bowl. Playing in their first bowl ever, the Cavaliers completed the season at 8-2-2. Virginia was ranked 17th by The Associated Press and 20th by United Press International in the final polls.

The first half was all Purdue as quarterback Jim Everett threw for three touchdown passes to give the Big Ten opponent a 24-14 lead.

UVa's two touchdowns came on an 11-yard run by tailback Howard Petty and a three-yard pass from quarterback Don Majkowski to tight end Geno Zimmerlink. The Boilermakers contained Virginia's running game, holding running backs Petty and Barry Word to a combined 68 yards rushing in the first half.

In the second half Virginia managed to establish its running game and create a pass rush to disrupt Everett with a variety of blitzes. It worked and Purdue did not score in the final two quarters. On a crucial fourth quarter drive—with Purdue driving for a possible go-ahead touchdown—Ray Daly, the game's defensive MVP, preserved the Cavalier lead by intercepting an errant Everett pass.

Virginia's rushing attack was sparked by the blocking of linemen Jim Dombrowski and Bob Olderman, as the Cavalier backfield of Majkowski, Petty, and Word kept the Purdue defense off balance with a combination of sweeps, dives, and options. Churning out nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half, the Cavalier offense was virtually unstoppable, moving the ball consistently up the field. By the end of the game, Petty—the game's offensive MVP—had gained 114 yards on 21 carries while Word added 86 yards on 17 carries.

After a one-yard touchdown run by Majkowski and a 19-yard field goal by UVa kicker Kenny Stadlin, the Cavaliers and the Boilermakers were deadlocked at 24 midway through the fourth quarter. UVa then drove down to the Purdue one-yard line before Stadlin converted a 22-yard field goal with 7:17 remaining in the game to provide the winning margin.

All American Bowl

In what was billed as a high scoring, offensive shootout between Virginia quarterback Scott Secules—the ACC's top-rated passer—and BYU's Sean Covey, the Cavaliers relied instead on a conservative run-oriented attack and several big defensive stands to defeat pass-happy BYU, 22-16, in the 1987 All American Bowl at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala.

Virginia captured its second bowl victory in as many tries to finish the 1987 season with an 8-4 overall record.

Hoping to keep Covey and a host of talented BYU receivers on the sidelines as long as possible, Virginia successfully controlled the tempo of the game, mixing hard-nosed rushing by running backs Kevin Morgan (82 yards), Marcus Wilson (77 yards) and Durwin Greggs (33 yards) with timely passing by Secules (10 completions for 162 yards and one TD)—the game's MVP.

Trailing 3-0 after BYU's initial drive in the first quarter, Virginia answered on its next possession with a two-yard TD run by Secules. The Cavaliers added another touchdown—this time on a 25-yard run by Morgan—to go up 14-3 at the half.

BYU opened the scoring in the third quarter with an eight-yard run by Fred Whittingham, but the Cougars' two-point conversion attempt failed. Virginia then widened its lead in the fourth quarter with a 22-yard touchdown pass from Secules to wide receiver John Ford. Secules' PAT fake allowed Marcus Wilson to get open in the end zone for a two-point conversion reception, giving the Cavaliers a 22-9 lead.

BYU's second touchdown—a one-yard pass from Covey to Whittingham—closed the gap to 22-16 before the UVa defense rose to the occasion to preserve the victory. In one of the game's biggest plays, Virginia held on downs with 3:50 left as defensive end Sean Scott tackled Covey just short of a first down on BYU's own 46-yard line. Earlier in the game—in the Cougars' first possession of the third quarter—Virginia halted BYU on fourth-and-goal at the Cavalier two-yard line.

"Without those plays, we don't win," said head coach George Welsh afterwards.

Florida Citrus Bowl

Illinois 31, Virginia 21



Virginia capped a season of giddy firsts with a New Year's Day showdown against Big Ten runner-up Illinois in the 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl in Orlando, Fla.

Making their first-ever New Year's Day bowl appearance, the Cavaliers suffered only their third loss of the season with a 31-21 defeat. The setback did little, however, to detract from a success-filled campaign that included the school's first 10-win season as well as a share of Virginia's first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference Championship.

Although the Illini had the advantage in total offense (497 yards to 322) and time of possession (34:30 to 25:30), the game remained close most of the way, as the two teams combined for seven turnovers and failed to capitalize on a number of scoring opportunities.

In the end, it was Illinois—behind a solid running game and the passing of quarterback Jeff George—that prevailed.

The NFL's number-one draft pick in 1990 by the Indianapolis Colts, George was named the game's Most Valuable Player after completing 26 of 38 passes for 321 yards and three touchdowns. He was intercepted once.

Virginia's attack was centered around quarterback Shawn Moore, who accounted for 225 yards in total offense for the Cavaliers. He completed 17 of 27 passes for 191 yards while throwing two touchdowns and two interceptions. Moore also rushed 15 times for 34 yards and was named the team's offensive MVP.

After a first-quarter score by Illinois, Virginia tied the game 7-7 in the second quarter with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Moore to wide receiver Tim Finkelston. Illinois then took the lead for good after scoring on a key fourth-and-goal situation. George faked a handoff to fullback Howard Griffith—who dove into the end zone—and then hit wide-open tight end Dan Donovan for the go-ahead touchdown. Illinois added a 34-yard field goal with no time remaining on the clock to lead 17-7 at intermission.

Illinois led 24-7 in the third quarter before Virginia answered with a two-yard touchdown run by tailback Marcus Wilson. Following another Illinois touchdown in the fourth quarter, Virginia closed out the scoring with a four-yard touchdown pass from Shawn Moore to Herman Moore.

Freshman defensive end Chris Slade was UVa's defensive MVP. He recorded a game-high 11 tackles, including a 19-yard sack of George.

USF&G Sugar Bowl

Tennessee 23, Virginia 22



For 59 minutes and 29 seconds, Virginia didn't trail Tennessee in the 1991 USF&G Sugar Bowl. Unfortunately for the Cavaliers, the game lasts 60 minutes.

After leading the entire contest—including a 16-0 halftime cushion—Virginia allowed 20 points in the final quarter, to fall to Tennessee 23-22 in the 1991 Sugar Bowl. The Volunteers scored the winning touchdown with 31 seconds left in the game. The Cavaliers closed their season 8-4 after a 7-0 start and a number-one national ranking for three consecutive weeks.

Everything seemed to go right for UVa in the first half. Virginia had possession of the ball for nearly 22 minutes. The defense held a strong UT offense to just 125 total yards, eight first downs and no points. Virginia's Nikki Fisher and Terry Kirby combined for over 100 rushing yards and quarterback Shawn Moore completed nine of 14 passes.

The second half was a different story.

Tennessee erupted for 339 total yards in the half and scored touchdowns on all three possessions in the fourth quarter. The Cavaliers touched for 139 second-half yards but did not complete a pass the entire half.

Moore, suffering from a late-season thumb injury, did not complete a pass in eight attempts in the second half.

The lack of an effective passing game also took away from Virginia's other explosive offensive weapon—All-America wide receiver Herman Moore. He caught two passes for 13 yards in the first quarter.

Possibly the turning point of the game came late in the third quarter. UVa led 16-3 and had the ball first-and-10 on the Tennessee 17-yard line. Three plays later, Shawn Moore was intercepted at the Vols' six-yard line with 35 seconds left in the quarter.

Tennessee marched 94 yards for a touchdown, cutting the lead to 16-10. Virginia responded with a field goal to move ahead 19-10. The Vols came right back with an 80-yard scoring drive but UVa again responded with another field goal to make it 22-17 with 2:31 left in the game.

Tennessee then marched 79 yards in two minutes to go ahead 23-22. Virginia took over on its 38-yard line with 31 seconds left and Matt Blundin was inserted at quarterback. He threw an incomplete pass, was sacked and was intercepted to end the game and Virginia's season.

Gator Bowl

Oklahoma 48, Virginia 14



Departing from its traditionally conservative run-oriented game plan in favor of a more wide-open offensive attack, Big Eight Conference power Oklahoma rolled to a decisive 48-14 victory over Virginia in the 1991 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

For UVa, the loss snapped an eight-game unbeaten streak and was a disappointing ending to an otherwise outstanding season. Making its third consecutive bowl appearance and fourth in five years, the Cavaliers finished the 1991 season with an 8-3-1 record.

After punting to end its first possession of the game, Oklahoma opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 10-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Cale Gundy to tight end Joey Mickey. The Sooners then scored touchdowns on each of their next four possessions to run up a 34-0 second-quarter lead.

Virginia managed to get on the scoreboard with 2:24 remaining in the first half when quarterback Matt Blundin completed a 22-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Tyrone Davis. The Cavaliers had an opportunity to score again seconds later when UVa defensive end Mike Frederick recovered an Oklahoma fumble on the Sooners' own 22-yard line, but the OU defense held the Cavaliers on downs.

Oklahoma engineered two more touchdown drives in the third quarter to put the game out of reach. Virginia closed the scoring with a 23-yard fourth-quarter TD pass from Blundin to wide receiver Terrence Tomlin.

The Sooners' offensive strategy was executed to near-perfection by Gundy, who completed 25 of 31 passes for 329 yards and two touchdowns without an interception. He was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Tailback Mike Gaddis led Oklahoma's rushing attack with 20 carries for 104 yards and three TDs.

Oklahoma controlled possession for nearly 38 minutes, piled up 618 yards in total offense and picked up 36 first downs. Virginia was held to a season-low 243 yards in total offense and managed just 13 first downs.

Blundin—the 1991 ACC Player of the Year—completed 12 of 26 passes for 142 yards and two touchdowns with one interception.

Carquest Bowl

Virginia fell to Boston College 31-13 in the 1994 Carquest Bowl, as a disappointing second-half performance enabled the Eagles to pull away after leading by four points at halftime. UVa, making its third New Year's Day bowl appearance in five years, finished the season with a 7-5 record.

Boston College quarterback Glenn Foley—named the game's Most Valuable Player—overcame a shaky first-half start, finishing with 391 yards and three passing touchdowns to spark the Eagles' victory.

The lead changed hands several times in the first 30 minutes before Boston College gained a 17-13 halftime advantage. Despite committing two first-half turnovers, BC also held the edge in total offensive yards (309 to 238), time of possession (16:01 to 13:59) and first downs (17 to 12). Virginia missed two field goals (37 and 29 yards) and an extra-point attempt.

UVa grabbed the early momentum on the third play of the game when linebacker Jamie Sharper tipped a Foley pass into the hands of Randy Neal. Neal returned the interception 19 yards to the BC 19-yard line. Tailback Jerrod Washington ran 11 yards for a touchdown two plays later, giving Virginia a 7-0 lead just over a minute into the game.

Trailing 10-7 midway through the second quarter, Virginia drove 91 yards in 12 plays to briefly retake the lead on a seven-yard touchdown run by fullback Charles Way. The extra-point attempt failed as UVa was held scoreless the rest of the game.

Boston College took the ensuing kickoff and drove 80 yards in nine plays for a touchdown to complete the first-half scoring. The Eagles reached the end zone on a five-yard pass from Foley to split end Clarence Cannon. Foley and Cannon also teamed up for a 78-yard touchdown pass play earlier in the second quarter.

UVa's best scoring opportunity of the second half came after Boston College failed on fourth-and-one from its own 49-yard line fewer than four minutes into the third quarter. The Cavaliers failed to capitalize, unable to pick up a first down on fourth-and-three from the BC 30-yard line.

The game seemed to quickly unravel for Virginia from that point on as Boston College took over on downs and scored five plays later on Foley's third touchdown pass of the game. The Eagles added a rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter to provide the final margin of victory. UVa managed just 60 yards of total offense and four first downs in the second half.

Not even a cold, driving rain that drenched both teams and transformed a grass football field into a virtual mud bath by halftime could dampen Cavalier spirits following Virginia's convincing 20-10 win over Texas Christian at the Poulan/Weed Eater Independence Bowl.

With the victory, Virginia finished the 1994 campaign with a 9-3 record and ended a four-game bowl losing streak. The victory also helped Virginia gain its highest final season rankings (15th) since the AP began conducting its final poll after the outcome of bowl games in 1965. In addition, the 1994 Cavaliers distinguished themselves by becoming only the third team in UVa history to win nine or more games.

Virginia relied on a dominating defense and a balanced offensive attack to overwhelm the Horned Frogs. The Cavaliers outgained TCU 436 to 191 in total offensive yards and controlled the ball for over 32 minutes.

Leading the Cavaliers' aerial assault was quarterback Mike Groh—named Offensive Player of the Game—who completed 14 of 23 passes for 199 yards and a touchdown with two interceptions. Tailback Kevin Brooks led all rushers with 114 yards on 17 carries while fullback Charles Way rushed for 90 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, Virginia limited TCU's high-powered offense to just 65 yards passing and 126 yards rushing. Defensive end Mike Frederick was named Defensive Player of the Game after finishing with four tackles.

The Cavaliers scored twice in the second quarter to take a 10-3 half-time lead. Rafael Garcia opened the game's scoring with a 20-yard field goal with 10:20 remaining in the first half. Virginia later scored on a six-yard touchdown run by Way. UVa's touchdown drive was set up by a 52-yard run by Brooks. It was the longest non-scoring run in the bowl's history.

UVa opened up a commanding 20-3 lead in the third quarter on a 37-yard touchdown pass from Groh to wide receiver Tyrone Davis and a 32-yard field goal by Garcia.

Following a one-yard touchdown pass play by Texas Christian early in the fourth quarter, Virginia held TCU scoreless the rest of the way to seal the win.

Peach Bowl

Over 20,000 deliriously happy Virginia fans rocked Atlanta's Georgia Dome as Demetrius "Pete" Allen returned a kickoff 83 yards for the game-winning touchdown with 57 seconds remaining in UVa's 34-27 victory over Georgia in the 1995 Peach Bowl.

Virginia finished the season with a 9-4 record, clinching its second consecutive nine-win season. The Cavaliers were ranked 16th in the final AP poll and 17th in the final *USA Today*/CNN coaches' poll.

The victory was a fitting finale to one of the most suspenseful seasons in UVa football history. Virginia played seven games during the 1995 regular season that were decided in the final moments, including three which were decided on the last play.

Only seconds before Allen's spectacular return, Georgia defensive tackle Jason Ferguson picked up a Cavalier fumble behind the line of scrimmage and ran 10 yards for the game-tying score. Georgia was penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct following the touchdown, forcing the Bulldogs to kick off from their own 20-yard line.

Although UVa never trailed in the game, the Bulldogs outgained the Cavaliers 525 yards to 256 yards in total offense. UVa managed to capitalize on big plays from its defense and special teams, however, to take a commanding 14-0 first quarter lead. Linebacker Skeet Jones—named the Defensive Player of the Game—set up UVa's first scoring drive by intercepting a pass and returning it 28 yards to the Bulldog seven-yard line. Barber scored three plays later on a one-yard run.

Virginia began its second scoring drive from the Georgia 14-yard line after James Farris blocked a punt which was recovered by Josh Nowocin. Kevin Brooks rushed five yards for a score three plays later.

Virginia led 24-14 at halftime following a Georgia touchdown with 19 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

In addition to his late-game heroics, Allen caught an 82-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Mike Groh to give Virginia its biggest lead, 24-6, late in the second quarter. Allen led the Cavaliers in receiving with five catches for 111 yards and a touchdown. Groh completed 10 of 20 passes for 156 yards and a touchdown.

Miami defensive back Tremain Mack stole the show in the Hurricanes' 31-21 victory over Virginia in the 1996 Carquest Bowl. Named the game's MVP, Mack returned a first-quarter Cavalier fumble 79 yards for a touchdown and scored again in the second quarter on a 42-yard interception return. He also blocked a Virginia field goal attempt in the third quarter.

Making its eighth bowl appearance in the last 10 years, Virginia finished the 1996 season with a 7-5 overall record.

The Hurricanes set the tone early, capping their first possession of the game with a 70-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Ryan Clement to wide receiver Yatil Green. Miami bolted to a 14-0 lead on Mack's recovered fumble return before the Cavaliers answered with a 29-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Aaron Brooks to wide receiver Germane Crowell.

Miami led 24-7 at halftime, following a second-quarter field goal and Mack's second touchdown of the game.

Early in the third quarter UVa safety Anthony Poindexter blocked a punt and Virginia recovered the ball on the Miami one-yard line. The Cavaliers scored one play later on a quarterback sneak by Brooks.

Virginia was in good position to score again midway through the third quarter after driving deep into Miami to the six-yard line, but the Cavaliers' 29-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Mack.

UVa got the ball back two plays later after cornerback Ronde Barber intercepted his second pass of the day and returned it to the 50-yard line. Virginia then marched to the Miami 27-yard line only to have another field goal attempt—this time from 44 yards out—blocked. The Hurricanes went on to score to take a 31-14 lead with 10:14 remaining in the game.

Following the ensuing kickoff, Virginia put together a six-play, 51-yard scoring drive that culminated in a three-yard touchdown run by tailback Thomas Jones with 7:57 left to play.

Poindexter led the Cavalier defense with 11 tackles, including six solo stops. He also recovered a fumble in addition to blocking a punt.

Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl

For the second time in four years, Virginia and Georgia clashed in the Peach Bowl in front of a sellout Georgia Dome crowd. The ending to the sequel was not nearly as satisfying for Cavalier fans, however, as 19th-ranked Georgia overcame a 21-0 first-half deficit and withstood a late Virginia rally to defeat 13th-ranked UVa 35-33.

UVa trailed 35-27 in the fourth quarter before quarterback Aaron Brooks scored on a 30-yard run with 1:34 left in the game. Virginia's two-point conversion attempt failed, but the Cavaliers regained possession when defensive back Devon Simmons recovered the ensuing onside kick at UVa's own 47-yard line. Virginia then drove to the Georgia 31, setting up a potential game-winning 48-yard field goal attempt by Todd Braverman with 19 seconds remaining, but his kick drifted wide right.

Georgia quarterback Quincy Carter threw three second-quarter interceptions, all of which led to Virginia touchdowns. Running back Anthony Southern rushed two yards for UVa's first score with 10:30 left in the first half following a 26-yard interception return by linebacker Wali Rainer. On Georgia's next possession, Carter was intercepted by defensive back Adrian Burnim at the Cavaliers' 31. Virginia scored six plays later on a 43-yard pass from Brooks to wide receiver Terrence Wilkins. A 22-yard interception return by defensive back Tim Spruill set up UVa's third touchdown, a 24-yard scoring strike from Brooks to tailback Thomas Jones.

The Bulldogs capitalized on a blocked punt just before the half, taking over on downs at the UVa 49-yard line and scoring six plays later on an 11-yard pass. Georgia added two more touchdowns in the third quarter to tie the score at 21 before Virginia answered with a 67-yard touchdown pass play from Brooks to Wilkins, who broke free from several defenders on his way to the end zone. UVa missed the extra-point and led 27-21 late in the third quarter.

Georgia regained the lead 28-27 early in the fourth quarter on a two-yard scoring run by running back Olandis Gary and later added a one-yard touchdown run by Carter with 7:01 left to play.

Brooks completed 12 of 32 passes for 226 yards and three touchdowns with one interception. He also rushed 14 times for 88 yards and one touchdown. Jones led the Cavaliers with 96 yards rushing on 23 carries.

Sparked by the versatile play of quarterback Kurt Kittner, Illinois handed Virginia its worst postseason loss in school history, defeating the Cavaliers 63-21 in the Micronpc.com Bowl at Pro Player Stadium.

Virginia finished the 1999 season with a 7-5 overall record.

Kittner, who completed 14 of 24 passes for 254 yards and one interception, was named the bowl's Most Valuable Player. He scored the game's first touchdown on a one-yard run with 9:42 remaining in the first quarter. Later, in the second quarter, he caught a 30-yard scoring pass from wide receiver Brandon Lloyd and threw for touchdowns of 61 yards and one yard to halfback Jameel Cook.

Illinois scored 28 unanswered points in the second quarter, capitalizing on two blocked punts, to build a commanding 42-7 halftime lead. Adding to Virginia's woes, starting offensive linemen Noel LaMontagne and Josh Lawson were both injured in the first half and did not return.

Illinois scored touchdowns on nine of 14 possessions and amassed 611 yards in total offense, compared to 380 by the Cavaliers.

Virginia tailback Thomas Jones rushed 23 times for 110 yards and scored on a seven-yard run to tie the game at seven with 7:24 left in the first quarter. Jones also led UVa with five receptions for 31 yards.

Quarterback Dan Ellis completed 15 of 32 passes for 146 yards and one interception to lead the Virginia passing attack. He threw a five-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Kevin Coffey in the third quarter. Ellis was replaced late in the fourth quarter by David Rivers, who completed two of three passes for 62 yards, including a 55-yard touchdown strike to backup quarterback/wide receiver Will Thompson with 1:43 left to play.

Shannon Taylor led UVa with eight tackles. Byron Thweatt recovered a fumble, while Dwayne Stukes intercepted a pass. Donnie Scott averaged 45 yards on four punts, including a long of 53 yards.

Jeep O'ahu Bowl

Georgia 37, Virginia 14



In the final game of the "George Welsh era" Virginia fell to Georgia 37-14 in the Jeep O'ahu Bowl. UVa finished the season with a 6-6 record, snapping its ACC-record streak of 13 consecutive seven-win seasons.

Welsh, the winningest coach in Virginia and ACC football history, announced his retirement at the end of the 2000 regular season. He compiled a 19-year record of 134-86-3 at UVa, including a conference-record 85 ACC wins. Welsh led the Cavaliers to 12 bowl games, including UVa's first bowl trip ever—the 1984 Peach Bowl.

Georgia scored on three of its first four possessions of the game to take a 17-0 first quarter lead. Splitting time at wide receiver and quarterback for the Bulldogs, Terrence Edwards was named the bowl's Most Valuable Player after gaining 176 all-purpose yards (79 receiving, 97 rushing). He scored on a 40-yard reverse in the first quarter, after the Bulldogs kept the drive alive with a fake punt play, and later ran 57 yards to set up a touchdown in the second quarter.

Making the most of its opportunities, Georgia recovered a Cavalier fumble in UVa's end zone for a first quarter touchdown and returned another Virginia fumble four yards for a score in the fourth quarter.

Virginia cut Georgia's lead to 17-7 early in the second quarter, scoring on a 14-yard lateral from backup quarterback Bryson Spinner to Demetrius Dotson. The Cavaliers drove 97 yards in just five plays, sparked by a 78-yard pass from Spinner to wide receiver Tavon Mason.

Trailing 24-7 at the half, UVa scored again late in the third quarter when linebacker Byron Thweatt picked up a Georgia fumble and raced 58 yards to paydirt. The Bulldogs held UVa scoreless after that, however, while tallying their final two touchdowns within a span of 16 seconds (on a pass play and the fumble recovery return) early in the fourth quarter.

Spinner, who went most of the way at quarterback after starter Dan Ellis injured his ankle during Virginia's opening series, completed 14 of 22 passes for 153 yards with two interceptions. Matt Schaub replaced Spinner late in the fourth quarter, completing six of 10 passes for 47 yards.

Continental Tire Bowl

Virginia 48, West Virginia 22



Virginia made its first bowl appearance under head coach Al Groh a memorable one, dominating No. 15 West Virginia 48-22 in the inaugural Continental Tire Bowl. The game was played in front of a sell-out crowd of 73,535 fans. It marked the second-highest attendance figure for a first-year bowl game in NCAA history.

Finishing with a 9-5 record (6-2 ACC), Virginia clinched its first nine-win season since 1998 and was ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press poll.

Trailing 10-7 at the end of the first quarter, the Cavaliers tallied 31 unanswered points to take a commanding 38-10 lead with 6:48 left in the third quarter.

Among the many Cavaliers who excelled was true freshman tailback Wali Lundy—the game's Most Valuable Player—who totaled 239 all-purpose yards. In addition to rushing for a game-high 127 yards and two scores, he caught five passes for 76 yards and two touchdowns. He also had a 36-yard kickoff return.

Lundy accounted for UVa's first score in the first quarter when he caught a 14-yard pass from backup quarterback Marques Hagans. Hagans took a lateral from quarterback Matt Schaub and then threw across the field to Lundy in the end zone. Lundy later capped the game's scoring with a 31-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. He also scored on a four-yard run and on a 48-yard pass play from Schaub.

In addition to his touchdown pass, Hagans scored on a 69-yard punt return to open up a 21-10 Cavalier lead midway through the second quarter.

Connecting on five of his first six passes of the game, Schaub finished 16 of 22 passing for 182 yards and a touchdown. The ACC Player of the Year also rushed for 39 yards, including a one-yard TD run.

Virginia played most of the game without star wide receiver Billy McMullen, who left the game in the first quarter with an injured elbow. He caught one pass for eight yards, giving him 210 career receptions—the second most in ACC history.

Freshman place-kicker Connor Hughes, who assumed UVa's kick scoring duties late in the season, connected on field goals of 27 and 30 yards.

Linebacker Angelo Crowell had a team-high 14 tackles, followed by safety Jer-ton Evans with eight.

Quarterback Matt Schaub threw for 244 yards and a touchdown to lead the Cavaliers to a 23-16 win over Pittsburgh in UVa's second straight trip to the Continental Tire Bowl. Playing in his final game, Schaub was named the game's MVP.

After stopping Pittsburg on four straight plays from the UVa one-yard line, the Cavaliers needed just four plays to drive the length of the field for the game's first score. Schaub capped the drive by finding tight end Heath Miller for a 52-yard touchdown, the 56th of his career, setting a new school record.

After Pittsburgh responded with a score, Virginia used a 51-yard run by Alvin Pearman on a drive that ended with Wali Lundy's one-yard plunged into the end zone.

Pittsburgh drove 85 yards in 10 plays, however the Panthers missed the extra point and Virginia maintained its lead at 14-13. Connor Hughes' 44-yard field goal as time expired at the end of the half extend the lead to 17-13.

On the opening series of the second half, Pitt was intercepted by Robbie Catterton, who returned the ball 24 yards to the Pitt 18-yard line. That play set up a 30-yard field goal by Hughes that pushed UVa's lead to six points. Pittsburgh responded with a field goal drive of its own to trail 20-16. The Panthers had a chance to further chip away at the lead with 7:51 remaining, but Pittsburgh's missed a 36-yard field goal attempt.

Virginia then mounted its final scoring drive of the day, as Lundy rushed 27 yards on six carries and Schaub connected on three of four pass attempts to set up Hughes' third field goal of the day, a 39-yard score with 2:28 remaining.

Pittsburgh looked for a late scoring drive to tie the game. William Ferguson gave the Panthers excellent field position with a 45-yard kickoff return to the Pitt 48-yard line. On the first play of the drive, the Cavalier defense forced their second turnover of the day to end the threat. A Brennan Schmidt sack caused Rutherford to fumble, and the ball was recovered by Kai Parham. It was the fifth sack of the day by the Virginia defense.

In addition to Schaub's 244 yards through the air, the Cavaliers compiled 196 yards rushing led by Pearman's 104 yards and Lundy's 90 yards. Pearman also made a team-high six catches, while Miller led UVa with 84 receiving yards on four catches.

The Cavalier defense held Panther wideout and Heisman Trophy runner-up Larry Fitzgerald to 77 yards on five catches, snapping his NCAA record 18-game touchdown reception streak. Linebackers Parham and Brooks led Virginia with 13 and 12 tackles, respectively.

Fresno State rallied from a 14-point deficit to hand Virginia a 37-34 loss in overtime at the MPC Computers Bowl in Boise, Idaho. The Bulldogs tied the game in the final seconds of regulation before winning in overtime.

The Cavaliers scored touchdowns on their first three offensive series. Alvin Pearman capped UVa's first drive with a 13-yard touchdown run to give the Cavaliers the early 7-0 lead.

Fresno State's Paul Pinegar connected with Adam Jennings for a 13-yard score to tie the game before Virginia regained the lead less than two minutes later. Michael Johnson's 47-yard kickoff return plus a 17-yard run by Pearman and a 21-yarder by Jason Snelling gave the Cavaliers first-and-goal. Two plays later, Michael McGrew scored on a 7-yard toss from Marques Hagans.

In the second quarter the Cavalier offense put together a 12-play, 66-yard drive to extend the lead to two touchdowns. The drive was capped by an 8-yard Hagans touchdown run. The Bulldogs closed the Cavalier advantage to 21-10 at the half as Brett Visintainer connected on a 49-yard field goal as time expired in the half.

A 22-yard touchdown pass from Pinegar to Jermaine Jamison cut the Cavalier lead to 21-17 in the third quarter. UVa benefited by a pass interference penalty to help set up a 33-yard field goal by Connor Hughes to go up 24-17.

Fresno State tied the game at 24-24 early in the fourth quarter as Pinegar threw a 22-yard touchdown pass to Mark Wood. Virginia then drove 80 yard, capped by a 20-yard touchdown run by Wali Lundy, to lead 31-24.

Fresno State drove the length of the field and on fourth down, Pinegar found Jaron Fairman for the tying score with 11 seconds remaining.

The Cavaliers had the first possession in overtime and took the lead on a field 26-yard field goal by Hughes. On the first play for Fresno State, Pinegar connected on a pass to tight end Stephen Spach who fought his way to the goal line for the winning touchdown.

Hagans led the Cavalier offense with a team high 85 yards rushing while completing 18 of 30 pass attempts for 162 yards. Pinegar led Fresno State by completing 23 of his 36 attempts for 235 yards and five touchdowns.

Making its fourth consecutive bowl appearance, Virginia used a dramatic fourth-quarter effort to defeat Big Ten opponent Minnesota 34-31. Trailing 31-24 with 12:16 to play, UVa quarterback Marques Hagans connected on three passes for 71 yards to set up Wali Lundy's two-yard scoring run to tie the game.

Later in the fourth quarter Hagans threw an interception that gave Minnesota the ball back at Virginia's 38-yard line. A Gopher punt pinned Virginia at its own three-year line with just five minutes to play.

Hagans redeemed himself and drove UVa down the field. With 1:08 to play Virginia kicker Connor Hughes booted a 39-yard field goal that proved to be the game winner. UVa cornerback Marcus Hamilton came up with an interception in the endzone to end Minnesota's comeback effort.

Hagans, who had fumbled a punt at the start of the fourth quarter to set up the Gophers final score, was named the game's offensive MVP. He completed 25 of 32 pass attempts for a career best 358 yards, the fifth best passing game by a UVa quarterback and a school bowl record. Tight end Tom Santi, playing in his hometown, had his best day as a Cavalier, piling up 128 yards on five catches.

Ranked as the nation's second-best rushing team (279.9 ypg.), Minnesota relied on its passing game to take a 14-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

UVa finally scored when Hagans directed a 67-yard drive capped by his six-yard touchdown pass to Deyon Williams with 2:46 remaining in the first quarter.

Minnesota responded when Cupito threw his third TD pass, a 57-yarder to Jared Ellerson, but put the Gophers back up by two touchdowns at 21-7. Hughes booted his first field goal at the end of the half to close the gap to 21-10.

Virginia drove 84 yards in 13 plays to open the third quarter with a seven-yard scoring run by Lundy to make the score 21-17. Minnesota went up 24-17 following a field goal but the Cavaliers tied the game with four minutes left in the quarter when Hagans connected with Fontel Mines for a two-yard score.

Lundy's two scores gave him 53 touchdowns during his career, making him the ACC's career leader in touchdowns.

The Virginia defense, led by Kai Parham's 14 tackles, managed to shut down the Minnesota offense in the second half. The Gophers rushing game was held to 198 yards, 82 below their average, including only 74 rushing yards in the second half.

Alex Trlica kicked a 41-yard field goal with seven seconds left to give Texas Tech a 31-28 come-from-behind victory over No. 21 Virginia in the Gator Bowl.

Tech rallied from a 28-14 fourth quarter deficit behind its aggressive pass offense and quarterback Graham Harrell, who set several Gator Bowl records. He completed 44 of 69 passes for 407 yards, all records, plus three TDs.

With eight minutes to play the Cavaliers seemed to have things sewn up when Texas Tech failed to convert on fourth down from the one-yard line. Getting the ball back with 5:38 to play, Harrell drove the Red Raiders 51 yards in just over two minutes to pull within 28-21 when he connected with All-American wideout Michael Crabtree from the 20-yard line.

Tech tied the score just 21 seconds later after forcing a fumble at the UVa four-yard line. After holding UVa on downs, Tech got the ball back with 2:11 left on the clock and drove 30 yards for the winning field goal.

Virginia jumped out to a 21-7 lead thanks to stellar play on defense and tailback Mikell Simpson, who ran for 170 yards on 20 carries - including a NCAA bowl-record 96-yard TD run - and caught another touchdown.

However, Virginia's offense wasn't the same after losing quarterback Jameel Sewell at the start of the fourth quarter. While he completed just 14 of 23 passes for 78 yards and a TD, Sewell carried nine times for 32 yards as the Cavaliers finished with 249 yards on the ground.

After UVa tight end Johnathan Stupar caught a 2-yard scoring pass in the first quarter, the Cavaliers sandwiched a pair of safeties around Simpson's long run to take an 18-7 lead. Chris Gould's 23-yard field goal at the end of the first half pushing UVa's advantage to 21-7. Texas Tech managed the only score during the third quarter to close the gap to 21-14 before Cavalier backup quarterback Peter Lulich hooked up with Simpson for an 11-yard touchdown pass that proved to be the team's final points.
