## Virginia Tech Faces No. 1 Alabama; No. 8 Clemson Hosts No. 5 Georgia North Carolina Opens 2013 Season at No. 6 South Carolina on Thursday Night Pitt Hosts No. 11 Florida State in Panthers' ACC Lid-Lifter

The Atlantic Coast Conference begins its 61st year of football with a new look--Pitt and Syracuse have joined the fray to bring the conference to 14 gridiron teams--and a big opening week challenge as ACC teams face three Top Ten foes on its initial football weekend for only the second time in league history...In all, the conference will play 13 games over four days, all of which will be available nationally, ending with Pitt hosting its first ACC football game on Labor Day Monday Night when the Panthers of coach **Paul Chryst** welcome the 11th-ranked Florida State Seminoles, coached by **Jimbo Fisher**, to Heinz Field (ESPN, 8 pm) in Pittsburgh...Well before that, however, Coach **Larry Fedora** brings his North Carolina Tar Heels to 6th-ranked South Carolina's Williams-Brice Stadium to open the season on Thursday night in a nationally televised game (ESPN, 6 pm)...Thirty minutes later, Wake Forest's **Jim Grobe** begins his 13th season in Winston-Salem as the Demon Deacons host Presbyterian at BB&T Field (ESPN3, 6:30 pm)...One day later on Friday, Miami, led by third-year head coach **Al Golden**, hosts Florida Atlantic at Sun Life Stadium in Miami Gardens (8 pm, ESPNU)...The Hurricanes return 19 starters this fall, the most of any ACC team...On Saturday,

Boston College's new head coach **Steve Addazio** makes his debut at Alumni Stadium as the Eagles host Villanova (ESPNNews, Noon) and Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** begins his 6th year on the Flats as his Yellow Jackets face Elon at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta (ESPN3, Noon)...In Raleigh, N.C., the **Dave Doeren** era begins at NC State as the Wolfpack host Louisiana Tech at Carter-Finley Stadium in the first ACC Network (12:30 pm) telecast of the year...At the same time, Maryland begins its final season in the ACC when the Terrapins, coached by **Randy Edsall**, host FIU (RSN, 12:30 pm) at Capital One Stadium at Byrd Field... An intriguing matchup of two old-time eastern foes then takes place at MetLife Stadium in the Meadowlands, when Syracuse, under new head coach **Scott Shafer**, faces off with Penn State (ABC, 3:30 pm) in the 71st renewal of this series...At the same time in Charlottesville, Va., **Mike London** begins his fourth season as head of the Cavaliers, hosting BYU at Scott Stadium (ESPNU, 3:30 pm)...In Durham, N.C., **David Cutcliffe** begins his 6th season at Duke as his Blue Devils host cross town rival NC Central at Wallace Wade Stadium (ESPN3,

4 pm)...Saturday's action concludes with a pair of high-powered contests as Virginia Tech meets No. 1-ranked Alabama in the annual Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta (ESPN, 5:30 pm)...The Hokies are coached by **Frank Beamer** who is, with 258 career victories, the winningest active coach in the NCAA's FBS, while the Crimson Tide, seeking its third straight National Championship, are led by Nick Saban, who has four national titles to his credit...A few miles to the northeast of Atlanta, 8th-ranked Clemson, led by coach **Dabo Swinney** and All-America QB **Tajh Boyd**, host 5th-ranked Georgia in the renewal of a once-consistent rivalry at Memorial Stadium in Clemson (ABC, 8 pm)... Though this game marks the 63rd contest between the interstate neighbors, it is only their third since 1995...In addition to the Bulldogs, the Tigers are hosting ESPN's GameDay show for only the second time in school history as the game matches Top Ten opponents in Death Valley for only the second time...Over the last two years, ranked SEC teams have been beaten only seven times, but Clemson has recorded three of those wins.

## ESPN's GameDay Coming to Clemson *Tigers Hosts College*

### *GameDay for Second Time*

College GameDay is coming to an ACC city this week as it makes its second appearance in Clemson prior to the game with the 8th-ranked Tigers and the 5th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs. This will mark the fifth time Clemson has appeared in a game where GameDay has hosted its show. This is the first time that ESPN College GameDay has been to Clemson since October 21, 2006 when Georgia Tech was the opponent on Clemson's Homecoming. Like the game in 2006, GameDay will be held in the middle of the Clemson campus on Bowman Field. Bowman Field was the first site of Clemson home football games. In all, ACC schools have hosted College GameDay a total of 28 times, while ACC schools have appeared 69 times on the sites where College GameDay has been held. Florida State has hosted GameDay more than any other ACC school (8), but not by much. Miami and Virginia Tech have each hosted the coveted show six times.

## ACC's Labor Day Monday TV Ratings Success for ESPN



Throughout its eight-year history, the ACC's Labor Day Monday night appearance on ABC and now ESPN, has been a ratings success. The seven games have averaged a 6.45 rating. The 2010 Virginia Tech-Boise State telecast garnered a 7.3 rating and was seen by more households, at the time, than any ESPN college football telecast in history. The 7.3 rating was the highest Monday night rating (without the full-circle additions) and tied for the second-highest rated regular season college football telecast on ESPN since 1994. The initial Miami-FSU matchup in 2004 featured a 5.9 rating on ABC. One year later, the network enjoyed a 6.5 mark. In 2006, in the rivalries' first appearance on ESPN, the cable network put the broadcast on all of its channels --named a "Full Circle telecast"--thus creating a 7.6 cumulative rating. Each of the eight games have been nailbiters as well as the average margin of victory has been just 3.8 points with two of the games going into overtime.

The Hokies earned a Championship Game berth in 2005, 2007, 2008, 2010 and 2011, with the Yellow Jackets appearing in 2006, 2009 and 2012.

**.889** - The winning percentage for Clemson at home against ACC competition under its current head coach, **Dabo Swinney**. In his time as head of the Tigers, Clemson is 16-2 against ACC foes in Clemson's Memorial Stadium.

**.963** - Clemson **PK Chris Catanzaro** has made 26 of his last 27 field goal attempts, a .963 percentage. He had a school-record string of 20 field goal attempts without a miss in 2012.

**2** - Miami sophomore **RB Duke Johnson** finished 2nd nationally in kickoff returns, averaging 33.0 yards a return in 2012, including a pair of 95-yard returns for TDs. Johnson averaged 171.7 yards of all-purpose yardage, the 3rd-best mark by an ACC freshman and the 11th-best season average by an ACC player.

**3** - The number of Top 10 teams **the ACC** will face in the first weekend of the 2013 football season. North Carolina opens the year with a game at 6th-ranked South Carolina (AP) on Thursday, Aug. 29 (6 pm), while Virginia Tech will face No. 1-ranked Alabama on Saturday, Aug. 31, at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta (5:30 pm) and 8th-ranked Clemson hosts 5th-ranked Georgia on Saturday night (8 pm).

**3B** - The ACC will feature three new head coaches in 2013. **Dave Doeren**, who led Northern Illinois to a 12-1 record, its 2nd straight MAC Championship and a berth in the Discover Orange Bowl, takes over at NC State; **Steve Addazio**, who led Temple to a 13-11 record in 2011 and 2012, including a 9-4 mark in 2011, assumes the head coaching position at Boston College; and **Scott Shafer**, the former Syracuse defensive coordinator, becomes the head coach for the Orange this fall.

**3.8** - The average margin of victory for the eight previous ACC games on ABC and then ESPN's Monday Night Football. Two of the games have gone into overtime, including last year's 20-17 Virginia Tech win over Georgia Tech. This year Florida State makes its sixth appearance on the ACC's Monday night telecast, while Pitt makes its ACC debut.

**4** - **Virginia** is one of four teams nationally (FAU, Iowa and Cal are the others) that enter the 2013 season without a quarterback on its roster who saw action in 2012, though projected starter David Watford did letter in 2011.

**5** - Pitt **DT/NG Aaron Donald** led all ACC players in selection to preseason watch lists for national awards. Donald was named to five different national awards lists: The Outland Trophy, The Bednarik Award, the Nagurski Award, the

Lombardi Award and the Lott IMPACT Award

**7** - In the first eight years of divisional play in the ACC, **the Atlantic Division** holds a 7-game edge over the Coastal Division, 78-71, a .523 winning percentage in 149 games. That figure includes 7 ACC Championship games.

**8** - The number of non-conference games which **ACC teams** will play against teams ranked in the pre-season Top 10 of the Associated Press, the most of any conference nationally. ACC teams will face No. 1 Alabama (Virginia Tech), No. 3 Oregon (Virginia), No. 5 Georgia (Clemson, Georgia Tech), No. 6 South Carolina (North Carolina, Clemson) and No. 10 Florida (Miami, Florida State). ACC schools will play six games against Top Six teams and a total of 11 games against teams ranked in the AP preseason Top 25.

**7.9** - Wake Forest junior **WR Michael Campanaro** averaged 7.9 catches per game in 2012, the 2nd-highest average in ACC history for a single-season. Despite missing two games with an injury, Campanaro had 79 catches in 10 games for the Demon Deacons.

**19** - **Miami** returns 19 starters from last year's team which finished 7-5 and 5-3 in the ACC, the most returning starters of any ACC team.

**31** - In his first three seasons as Florida State's head coach, **Jimbo Fisher** has guided the Seminoles to 31 victories and a 31-10 overall record. Only Fisher's predecessor at FSU, Bobby Bowden (33) won more games in his first three seasons in the league, though Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer and Maryland's Ralph Friedgen also won 31 games each in their first three ACC seasons.

**40.6** - In his first season as head coach at North Carolina, **Larry Fedora** led the Tar Heels to a 40.6 scoring average, the best in school history and the 6th-best scoring average in ACC history.

**44.6** - The punting average in 2012 for Duke freshman **P Will Monday**, who earned All-ACC honors as a punter on both the ACSMA and the ACC head football coaches teams'. Monday placed 19 of his 66 punts inside of Duke's opponents' 20-yard lines and booted a Belk Bowl-record 79-yarder against Cincinnati, one of 20 of his punts which carried 50 or more yards.

**81.97** - Boston College junior **PK Nate Freese** leads all ACC kickers in career accuracy. Freese, who has made 50 of 61 career three-point attempts, has made 81.97 percent of his field goal attempts and ranks 8th nationally among all active kickers in the NCAA's FBS.

**89** - In just two seasons as a starter, Clemson **QB Tajh Boyd** has passed and run for 89 touchdowns, the 3rd-best career mark in ACC history, trailing only Philip Rivers (112, 2000-03) and Russell Wilson (93, 2008-10), both of NC State.

Boyd broke his own ACC single-season TDR mark last year with 46 scores, rushing and passing.

**106** - The other half of Duke's sophomore kicking duo, as a true freshman in 2012 **PK Ross Martin** set an ACC single-season record for freshmen in points by kicking. Martin made 20 of his 23 field goal attempts (.870) and 46 of 47 of PATs for 106 points, breaking the old ACC freshman mark of 97 points set by FSU's Dustin Hopkins in 2009.

**139** - Clemson junior **WR Sammy Watkins** heads into his junior season with a 139 career catches, the most by an ACC player after his sophomore season.

**154.59** - The career pass efficiency rating for North Carolina junior **QB Bryn Renner**. Renner, who has completed 516 of 774 passes (.667) for 54 TDs and only 20 interceptions. His pass efficiency rating would be an ACC record if maintained through the 2013 season. The current record is 151.15, set by Florida State's Chris Weinke.

**172.4** - Maryland sophomore **WR Stefon Diggs** averaged 172.4 yards of all-purpose yardage in 2012, the 2nd-best mark by an ACC freshman. It was also the 10th-best mark in league history. His 848 receiving yards was also the 3rd-best single-season mark by an ACC freshman, which is even more impressive when you consider the Terrapins' injury woes at QB last year.

**230** - The number of consecutive games in which **Virginia Tech** has scored, the longest current streak and longest streak in ACC history. **Georgia Tech** holds the next longest streak at 198 games, which is also current.

**258** - Virginia Tech head coach **Frank Beamer** has a total of 258 coaching victories in his career and leads all active NCAA FBS head coaches. With the Hokies' win over Rutgers in the 2012 Russell Athletic Bowl, Beamer passed former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards for 6th place on the NCAA FBS all-time wins list. The late Joe Paterno (298) is next on the list.

**2,001** - Syracuse' tailback tandem of junior **Jerome Smith** (1,171) and senior **Prince-Tyson Gulley** (830) combined to rush for 2,001 yards last year for the Orange, more than any other tandem in the ACC last fall.

**6,000** - For the first time in its history, the ACC returns five quarterbacks who each have topped 6,000 career passing in Clemson's **Tajh Boyd** (8,053), Wake Forest's **Tanner Price** (6,666), North Carolina's **Bryn Renner** (6,456), Boston College's **Chase Rettig** (6,257) and Virginia Tech's **Logan Thomas** (6,096).

**20,362** - Since **Paul Johnson** brought his spread option offense to Georgia Tech for the 2008 season, no other school in the FBS has run for more yards than have the Yellow Jackets. In the five ensuing seasons, Georgia Tech has run for 20,362 yards.



# ACC ATLANTIC DIVISION TEAM NOTES ACC



**Steve Addazio** is set for his first year as head coach of the Eagles and his third as a collegiate head coach ... But Addazio is no stranger to college football after spending 24 years as an assistant coach and coaching in 12 postseason bowl games – including six BCS bowl games in the past 17 seasons ... Senior **WR Alex Amidon** enters the 2013 season on the Biletnikoff Award Watch List after establishing himself as one of the nation's top receivers last fall ... Amidon established single-season school records for receptions (78) and receiving yards (1,210) en route to All-ACC honors in 2012 ... He finished the season ranked 11th among all FBS receivers – and second in the ACC – for receiving yards per game (100.8) ... Senior **LB Kevin Pierre-Louis** earned spots on the 2013 Preseason All-ACC team and the Nagurski Trophy Watch List following a 2012 season in which he ranked seventh in the ACC in tackles with 85 in nine games.



ACC preseason favorite Clemson is ranked eighth in the nation in the preseason AP and USA Today polls, the highest preseason ranking for the program since 1988 ... The Tigers finished the 2012 season with an 11-2 record and a number-nine ranking in the same poll ... Clemson achieved the high preseason ranking despite a roster that includes just 10 scholarship seniors ... **QB Tajh Boyd** and **WR Sammy Watkins** are both on the Walter Camp Player of the Year Watch List for 2013 ... Boyd has also been listed on the watch lists for the Maxwell Award and for the Davey O'Brien Award ... Watkins has also been on the list for the Maxwell and the Biletnikoff Awards ... Boyd earned 2012 ACC Player of the Year honors and was the media's choice for 2013 Preseason Player of the Year at last month's ACC Football Kickoff ... Watkins was the ACC Freshman of the Year in 2011.



The defending conference champion Seminoles led all schools with six selections on the 2013 Preseason All-ACC Team selected by the media ... The selections included senior **CB Lemarcus Joyner**, who made the team as a safety last year but has changed defensive backfield positions heading into this season ... Joyner made the pre-season team with 32 votes at the cornerback position, but also received an additional 11 votes at safety ... The Seminoles, picked second behind Clemson in the 2013 Atlantic Division preseason media poll, will have a bit of a new look this season with at least 13 new starters and six new assistant coaches ... Fourth-year head coach **Jimbo Fisher** owns a 31-10 record at FSU, and his .756 winning percentage ranks eighth among active FBS coaches ... Fisher's first three seasons as head coach saw the Seminoles score a total of 1,387 points ... The 2013 FSU coaching staff boasts a combined 197 years of collegiate coaching experience and 126 bowl game appearances.



The Terrapins return 70 percent of their offensive and defensive two-deep from the end of last season ... Maryland will be a more experienced team this fall after a 2012 season in which 15 true freshmen saw action ... **WR Stefon Diggs** looks to build upon a 2012 freshman season in which he amassed 848 receiving yards ... Diggs' total was the most by a freshman in school history and the third-most by an ACC rookie ... Six bowl teams from last season appear on the Terps' 2013 schedule, including ACC opponents Florida State (Discover Orange Bowl), Clemson (Chick-Fil-A Bowl), Syracuse (New Era Pinstripe Bowl), Virginia Tech (Russell Athletic Bowl) and NC State (Music City Bowl) ... **QB C.J. Brown**, coming off a knee injury that forced him to miss the 2012 season, boasts three of the top eight rushing performances by a quarterback in Maryland school history ... Senior **DB Dexter McDougle** enters the 2013 season as the leader of the defensive unit with 24 consecutive career starts and 137 career tackles.



At 41 years of age, the Wolfpack's **Dave Doeren** is the youngest head coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference ... Doeren's total of 23 wins as head coach at Northern Illinois in 2011 and 2012 tied for second-most nationally among current FBS coaches behind the 25 games won by Alabama's Nick Saban ... Doeren's Northern Illinois squad rushed for 3,335 yards in 2012, while Wolfpack first-year offensive coordinator **Matt Canada** oversaw a Wisconsin ground attack that amassed 3,309 yards a season ago ... Each member of the 2013 Wolfpack coaching staff hails from one of those two programs with the exception of running backs coach **Deshaun Kitchens**, who was a member of NC State's staff in 2012 ... NC State's season opener vs. Louisiana Tech on Aug. 31 will be the first of eight home games for the Wolfpack, which will play a total of 10 games in the state of North Carolina this season ... The Wolfpack's four-game road slate includes short trips to in-state conference rivals Wake Forest and Duke, as well as ACC games at Florida State and Boston College.



The **Scott Shafer** head coaching era officially kicks off when the Orange faces Penn State in New York's College Classic at MetLife Stadium on Aug. 31 ... However Shafer's presence in the program has been felt since 2009, when he was named defensive coordinator for former head coach Doug Marrone ... Shafer was promoted to lead the program in January 2013 after Marrone departed to lead the NFL's Buffalo Bills ... **RB Jerome Smith's** 1,171 rushing yards last year were the most of any returning player that will take the field for an ACC team this season ... Syracuse has had a 1,000-yard rusher in each of the past five seasons ... Leading the blocking for Smith this season will again be the anchor of the offensive line – senior **C Macky MacPherson** ... MacPherson, the grandson of legendary SU coach Dick MacPherson, is a candidate for Rimington Award, presented annually to the nation's best center ... MacPherson has played in all 37 games of his collegiate career, including the last 25 as a starter.



With 73 wins at Wake Forest, 13th year head coach **Jim Grobe** enters the 2013 season second on the school's all-time victory chart and only four shy of "Peahead" Walker's record of 77 set from 1937 through 1950 ... This year's Demon Deacon squad returns 17 starters and 44 lettermen from 2012 ... The cast of returnees includes All-ACC **WR Michael Campanaro**, who leads all active ACC players with 162 catches ... Senior **QB Tanner Price** has thrown for a career 6,666 yards and 39 touchdowns ... Defensively, Wake is led by **NG Nikita Whitlock**, a second-team All-ACC selection in 2012 who has been named to both the 2013 Bronco Nagurski and the Outland Trophy Watch Lists ... Whitlock finished last season with 51 tackles in 10 games, including 17 solo stops and has 28.5 career tackles for loss ... The Demon Deacons open the season with a Thursday night game vs. Presbyterian (Aug. 29) and a Friday night ACC road trip to Boston College (Sept. 6).



# ACC COASTAL DIVISION TEAM NOTES ACC



Duke's offensive line is loaded with veterans, as the projected first team has combined for 104 career starts ... Those starts are divided between veteran **Ts Takoby Cofield** (15 starts) and **Perry Simmons** (37 starts) and **Gs Laken Tomlinson** (25 starts) and **Dave Harding** (27 starts) ... **Matt Skura**, the projected starter at center, is the new kid on the block ... The redshirt sophomore sat out the 2011 season to grow and mature, then saw some action (125 snaps in 10 games) last season ... Overall, the Blue Devils return 32 players who started at least one game in 2012 and 17 who were regular members of the starting lineup ... **Kelby Brown**, voted the team's best linebacker in 2011, missed all last season with a knee injury and was limited in his work last spring ... But Brown now appears 100 percent healthy and hopes to figure into the mix as the Blue Devils prepare for the start of the 2013 season.



The Yellow Jackets home opener against Elon on Aug. 31 will kick off a season-long celebration of Historic Grant Field's 100-year anniversary ... Georgia Tech enters the 2013 season having finished .500 or better in conference play for 18 consecutive years – the longest such streak by any team nationally ... The Yellow Jackets' current streak of 16 consecutive bowl game appearances ranks fourth nationally behind fellow ACC member Florida State (31), Florida (22) and fellow ACC member Virginia Tech (20) ... head coach **Paul Johnson** enters his sixth season at Georgia Tech with a 40-26 record at the school ... Johnson has won at least eight games in 13 of his 16 seasons as a head coach ... Over the last 40 years, Georgia Tech's offense has registered a time of possession of 39:56 or longer six times. Two of those occasions occurred during the 2012 season (vs. Boston College and Georgia) ... Johnson's five previous Georgia Tech teams have rushed for a combined 20,362 – an average of 303.9 yards per game and a total of 11.3 miles.



Miami was chosen as the Coastal Division preseason favorite in the vote by media in attendance at the ACC Football Kickoff ... third-year head coach **Al Golden** welcomed 19 returning starters for the 2012 season ... The returnees include **QB Stephen Morris**, who won the skills competition at the Manning Passing Academy last month ... Morris started all 12 games under center a season ago, throwing for a career-best 3,345 yards and 21 touchdowns ... Morris' 3,415 yards of total offense in 2012 set a new single-season mark at Miami. He also became the first QB in school history to post multiple 400-yard passing games in a single season ... **RB Duke Johnson**, the 2012 ACC Rookie of the Year, finished third among ACC running backs last season with 947 rushing yards and ranked ninth nationally in all-purpose yardage at 171.67 per contest ... Johnson was joined on the Preseason All-ACC Team by senior **G Brandon Linder**, who was also named to the Outland Trophy Watch List.



The Tar Heels return all four starters from last season's secondary, including **S Tre Boston** and **CB Tim Scott**, both of whom earned honorable mention All-ACC honors in 2012 ... Senior **QB Bryn Renner** enters the season needing 2,922 passing yards to pass T.J. Yates (2007-10) as the school's all-time leader and 15 touchdown passes to move past Darian Durant's total of 68 (2001-04) as UNC's all-time leader in that category ... **TE Eric Ebron's** 40 catches in 2012 were a single-season high for a UNC tight end and quadrupled his total of 10 as a true freshman in 2011 ... UNC kickers have made 176 consecutive extra points, the third-longest active streak in the nation behind Texas Tech (215) and Washington (178) ... Returning **PK Thomas Moore** has contributed 50 consecutive PATs to the streak (12-of-12 last season and 38-of-38 in 2011) ... Syracuse holds the NCAA record for consecutive PATs with 262 (1978-89) ... **Larry Fedora's** eight wins in 2012 were the most by a Tar Heel first-year head coach in a regular season.



**DT Aaron Donald** and **WR Devin Street** have been among the Panthers' most highlighted and discussed players as Pitt prepares for its first season of ACC competition ... Donald has been named to watch lists for the Lombardi Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Bednarik Award, Ronnie Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Outland Trophy ... He also was selected a preseason All-American by Lindy's Sports and Phil Steele ... Street is a candidate for the Biletnikoff Award, given annually to the nation's top receiver ... Street enters his senior year with 151 career receptions to rank sixth all-time at Pitt ... He needs 28 more catches to surpass Latef Grim (178 receptions from 1998-2000) for the most in school history ... Street's 2,047 career receiving yards rank 10th at Pitt ... He needs 1,015 yards this season to eclipse Antonio Bryant (3,061 yards from 1999-2001) as the Panthers' career leader ... senior **S Jason Hendricks**, who led the Panthers in both tackles and interceptions last year, was voted to the Preseason All-ACC team.



Redshirt sophomore **QB David Watford** is prepared to take the reins as the Cavaliers open their season against visiting BYU on Aug. 31 ... Watford sat out all of the 2012 season ... In 2011, as Michael Rocco's backup, Watford completed 30 of 74 passes for 346 yards and three touchdowns, with four interceptions ... He ran 21 times for 42 yards as well ... The Cavaliers' starting offensive tackles are 6-6, 335-pound **Morgan Moses** and 6-6, 300-pound sophomore **Jay Whitmire** ... Moses, who started at right tackle last season, switched to the left side in the spring, replacing Oday Aboushi, now a rookie with the NFL's Jets ... After starting at right offensive guard in 2011, Luke Bowanko moved to center last season. The emergence of redshirt freshman **Jackson Matteo** at center during spring practice this year allowed the coaching staff to move Bowanko to left guard heading into this season ... **WR Tim Smith** is the only senior in the Cavaliers' receiving corps ... Smith enters the season with 71 career catches for 1,202 yards and nine TDs.



With 258 wins in 32 seasons, **Frank Beamer** enters the 2013 campaign as the career leader among active FBS head coaches ... The Hokies, who open against two-time defending national champion Alabama in the Chick-Fil-A College Kickoff at Atlanta's Georgia Dome on Aug. 31 (5:30 p.m., ESPN) have compiled a 142-52 record in televised games since the start of the 1995 season ... Redshirt senior **QB Logan Thomas**, who accounted for more than 3,500 yards total offense in 2012, looks to build on those numbers under first-year offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach **Scot Loeffler** ... **LB Jack Tyler** earned Preseason All-ACC recognition following a 2012 season in which he led the Hokies in tackles with 119 while earning first-team all-conference honors from the league coaches and second-team from the media ... The Hokies return nine defensive starters from 2012, though **CB Antone Exum** continues to recover from a knee injury suffered last January and will not be ready for the start of the season.

**Ones to watch:** UNC WR Quinshad Davis is coming off a freshman season in which he hauled in 61 passes for 776 yards and five touchdowns ... South Carolina junior All-America DE Jadeveon Clowney finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy voting last year and enters this season with 21 career quarterback sacks and 35.5 tackles for loss.

**Last meeting:** South Carolina 21, North Carolina 15 (2007) - QB Chris Smelley threw a career-high three touchdown passes in the first half, and No. 7 South Carolina withstood a late rally to beat North Carolina at Kenan Stadium. UNC QB T.J. Yates finished 22-of-42 for 285 yards against the nation's best pass defense, and WR Hakeem Nicks had eight receptions for 114 yards.

**Last meeting:** Wake Forest 53, Presbyterian 13 (2010) - Wake Forest had six rushing touchdowns in a 53-13 rout of Presbyterian in the season opener for both teams. RB Josh Harris scored twice, S Alex Frye returned an interception 44 yards for an early score and WR Devon Brown took an end-around 85 yards for a fourth-quarter TD -- the fourth-longest rush in school history. **Last meeting: Pitt 17, Florida State 16 (1983)** - QB John Congemi lofted a 20-yard scoring pass to the freshman WR Chuck Scales on the first play of the fourth quarter as Pitt, rallying from a 13-point deficit, edged Florida State. # The ACC & ESPN Thursday Night



## The ACC & ESPN Thursday Night: A Great College and ACC Tradition

When South Carolina hosts North Carolina next Thursday night (6 p.m.) at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia, S.C., the game will be the 84th contest involving an ACC team on ESPN on Thursday night. It will also mark the 11th appearance for North Carolina on the ESPN Thursday night package.

The game marks the first time the two teams have played on ESPN's Thursday night. They last met in 2007 in Chapel Hill, with the Gamecocks emerging with a 21-15 victory.

Overall, North Carolina is 6-4 overall on ESPN Thursdays, including a 5-3 record on the road. Overall, ACC teams are 14-9 against non-conference opponents on ESPN Thursday nights.

South Carolina will be facing an ACC team for the third time on ESPN's Thursday night package and for the third time to open the season on Thursday night. The Gamecocks downed NC State 34-0 in Columbia in 2008 and 7-3 in Raleigh in 2009.

The Gamecocks, ranked 6th this week by AP, are the highest-ranked non-conference opponent for an ACC team on ESPN's Thursday night package. UNC's last appearance on the ESPN Thursday night package was last year when it took a 37-13 decision at Virginia.

Miami has the highest winning percentage on nationally televised games on Thursday night of any current ACC school, having posted a 16-3 overall mark, an .842 winning percentage. The Hurricanes have been better at home, posting a 11-1 mark in the Old Orange Bowl (8-0) and at Sun Life Stadium (3-1). The only UM loss came in 2011, when Virginia snapped the Canes' 10-game home win streak with a 28-21 verdict.

Virginia Tech has won more nationally televised games on Thursdays than any other current ACC school, and the Hokies are equally effective at home in Lane Stadium (.733 winning percentage) and on the road (.727 winning percentage). Tech has won more Thursday ESPN road games (8) than any other ACC squad.

In all, after this week's game, ACC teams will have made 139 appearances on ESPN's Thursday night package.

Virginia Tech (26) and Georgia Tech (25) lead all ACC schools in appearances, followed by Miami (19), NC State (18), Maryland (13), Boston College (12), Florida State (12), Virginia (12), Clemson (11) and North Carolina (10).

Georgia Tech has hosted more games (18) than any other ACC school. The Yellow Jackets actually began the Conference's Thursday night tradition, which, more often than not, has featured high drama. Tech hosted Virginia on Sept. 19, 1991, at Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta, utilizing a 34-yard field goal by Scott Sisson on the game's final play to record a 24-21 victory.

There have been many other great moments in the series,

including the game on Oct. 25, 2007 when 2nd-ranked Boston College rallied to beat 8th-ranked Virginia Tech, 14-10, behind a pair of touchdown passes from QB Matt Ryan in the game's final two minutes and 11 seconds. That game still stands as the only ESPN Thursday night meeting of ACC opponents that were both ranked in the Top Ten nationally.

The 2009 season featured a pair of thrillers both involving North Carolina. The Tar Heels and Seminoles were involved in an offensive gut-wrencher, as FSU overcame a 24-6 third quarter deficit to capture a 30-27 triumph. A week later, UNC turned the tables, upsetting 14th-ranked Virginia Tech, 20-17, on the game's final play, a 22-yard field goal by UNC placekicker Casey Barth.

The 2010 match-up between Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech was also a classic; a see-saw battle which featured a dramatic 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by the Hokies' David Wilson with 2:23 remaining as the deciding play.

Perhaps the most memorable Thursday night moment and biggest upset on the Thursday night ESPN package was 24th-ranked Virginia's dramatic upset of 2nd-ranked Florida State in 1995. That game snapped the Seminoles' 29-game Conference winning streak, which began when FSU joined the ACC in 1992.

Miami still has claim to the highest-rated game on Thursday night, when it met 10th-ranked Houston in an early season showdown in 1991. The Hurricanes and Cougars drew a 6.5 national rating as Miami took a lopsided 40-10 triumph.

The highest-rated Thursday ESPN battle between two ACC teams was the 1995 Virginia-Florida State telecast, which resulted in a 6.1 rating.

This week's game is the first of five ACC Thursday ESPN contests this year. NC State hosts Clemson on Sept. 19, followed by Virginia Tech travelling to Georgia Tech on Sept. 26. North Carolina makes its second Thursday night appearance of the year on Oct. 17, when it hosts Miami and Georgia Tech travels to Clemson on Nov. 14 for the second 2013 Thursday night appearance by both the Yellow Jackets are Tigers.

Two ACC games have been televised by ESPNU on Thursday night. Wake Forest hosted Vanderbilt in 2005 and Clemson and Temple met in Charlotte in 2006.

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer is now the leading active head coach in the NCAA's FBS in career victories with a total of 258 triumphs in his 32-year coaching career. With a win over Rutgers in the Russell Athletics Bowl, Beamer passed former BYU head coach LaVell Edwards for 6th place on the all-time NCAA FBS coaching victory list. Penn State's Joe Paterno, who's NCAA adjusted total of 298, is next on the list in 5th place. Georgia Tech head coach Paul Johnson ranks 13th on the active FBS list with 147 career wins. Former Florida State head coach Bobby Bowden, who retired after the 2009 season, is now the NCAA FBS all-time leader with 377 victories.

## Johnson, Beamer, London Among Top 20 Active Coaches in Wins Per Season

The ACC has four coaches who rank among the Top 25 active football coaches in the NCAA in wins per season with five or more seasons as a head coach. Georgia Tech's **Paul Johnson** leads the way among ACC coaches, currently averaging 9.19 wins



per full season. Johnson's record puts him in 8th place nationally among active head coaches with five or more years of experience. Virginia Tech's **Frank Beamer** (17th, 8.06), Virginia's **Mike London** (tied for 18th, 8.00) and Clemson's **Dabo Swinney** (tied for 18th, 8.00) joins Johnson among the Top 25 coaches in the nation in the NCAA's FBS. Florida State's **Jimbo Fisher** is off to an impressive start in his career as well, averaging 10.33 wins a year in his first three seasons at the helm at Florida State. NC State's new head coach **Dave Doeren** is also off to a strong start, averaging 11.5 wins a year in his first two seasons at Northern Illinois.

## After Just Three Seasons Florida State's Jimbo Fisher Joining Select Company



Having completed only three seasons as head coach at Florida State, head coach **Jimbo Fisher** has already joined some select company among ACC football coaches. Fisher has compiled a 31-10 record (.756). His winning percentage has him in 5th place among all ACC head coaches after three seasons, ahead of such prominent figures as NC State's Lou Holtz, Clemson's Danny Ford, Maryland's Ralph Friedgen and Georgia Tech's Bobby Ross. The best mark recorded by an ACC head coach in his first three years in the league was by Fisher's predecessor at FSU, Bobby Bowden, who posted a 33-3-1 record. Maryland's Jim Tatum was 27-4-1 (.859) in his first three years with Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer third at 31-8-0 (.795).

## Clemson's Memorial Stadium Is Home Sweet Home for Tiger's Dabo Swinney



Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney has enjoyed coaching in the cozy and imposing confines of the Tigers' home field, also known as Death Valley. In his first four seasons as head coach of the Tigers, Swinney's teams have won 16 of the first 18 home ACC games, a winning percentage of .889. That stacks up pretty well with some of the great names in ACC coaching. Swinney's winning percentage has him 2nd among ACC head coaches. Another former Tiger coach, Ken Hatfield, has the highest percentage, posting a 12-1-1 mark in four seasons (.893). Legendary Florida State coach Bobby Bowden won more ACC home games than any other coach, with 62 triumphs in his 18 years in the league. His winning percentage of .861, is third-best. Bowden's successor at Florida State, Jimbo Fisher is on a pretty good pace himself, having won 10 of his first 12 ACC home games. Four Clemson coaches rank in the Top 10 including Hatfield (1st), Swinney (2nd), Danny Ford (8th) and the legendary Frank Howard (tied for 9th).

## North Carolina Sets Offensive Records In First Year Under Larry Fedora

North Carolina Head Coach **Larry Fedora's** fast-paced offense had his team scoring at a school-record pace in his first year in Chapel Hill. Ranked 8th nationally in scoring offense, averaging 40.6 points a game while also ranked 14th nationally in total offense, the Tar Heels:

■ Scored a school-record 66 points against Idaho on Sept. 29.

■ Topped the 60-point mark on two occasions for the first time in school history

■ Scored 48 points against Virginia Tech on Oct. 6, the most points for UNC against the Hokies in the 35 meetings between the two teams in football.

■ Set school records for most points, highest scoring average and highest average of total offense (485.6).

■ UNC's 487 total points were the 7th-highest single-season total in ACC history.

■ The Tar Heels' scoring average of 40.6 points per game was the 6th-best scoring average in ACC history.

■ The Tar Heels' 62 offensive touchdowns were tied for the 7th-highest total in ACC history



## NC State's New Head Coach Dave Doeren Among Nation's Winningest Coaches in 2011-12

New NC State Head Coach, **Dave Doeren**, who begins his first season as head of the Wolfpack this fall, has not wasted time in winning games in his first two years as a head coach at the FBS level. In fact, only one other coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision--Alabama's Nick Saban--has won more games than has Doeren in the past two seasons.

He guided Northern Illinois to a 23-4 mark in 2011 and 2012, including the school's first berth in the BCS bowl game, a slot in the 2013 Discover Orange Bowl this past January. Only Saban, among current FBS coaches, whose Crimson Tide teams have captured back-to-back national championships, posted more wins in the past two years than Doeren's teams at Northern Illinois. In all, three current ACC Coaches rank among the Top 11 coaches nationally in wins among current college coaches the past two years. Both Florida State's Jimbo Fisher and Clemson's Dabo Swinney have 21 wins in 2011 and 2012, tying Kansas State's Bill Snyder for the 8th.



## Duke Experiencing Success Under ACC Coach of the Year David Cutcliffe

Though he's only been the head coach at Duke for five seasons, David Cutcliffe, the ACC's 2012 Coach of the Year, has led the Blue Devils to 21 victories since coming to Durham in 2008.

That may not sound like a great record, except when you consider that it is more wins than the Blue Devils totalled in the 12 seasons before Cutcliffe came to Durham. Cutcliffe led the Blue Devils to a 6-7 mark in 2012, their first appearance in a bowl game since 1994 and came within a few yards of claiming the Blue Devils' first winning season in 18 years and their first bowl triumph since 1961.

■ In just the five years, Cutcliffe has been in Durham, he has already mentored a pair of quarterbacks who finished their careers ranked in the ACC's top seven of career passing yardage. **Thaddeus Lewis** (2006-09) threw for 10,065 yards, the second-highest total in league history and **Sean Renfree** (2009-12), threw for 9,465 career yards, the 7th-best total by an ACC player.

■ Also, under his guidance, Duke **WR Conner Vernon** became the all-time leading pass receiver in ACC history setting conference career marks for pass receptions (283) and pass reception yardage (3,749).

Syracuse junior **TB Jerome Smith**, who ran for 1,171 yards and an impressive 5.2 yards-per-carry average last fall for the Orange, ran for more yards in 2012 than any other ACC returnee. Next closest to Smith was Miami's Duke Johnson, who totaled 947 yards and a 6.8

per-carry average as a true freshman for the Miami Hurricanes. Smith combined with his teammate, sophomore Prince-Tyson Guley, who also ran for 830 yards, to accumulate 2,001 yards on 385 carries, a 5.2 average as 12 TDs. Maryland sophomore **Stefon Diggs** had a spectacular debut in 2012, earning first-team Freshman All-America honors from the FWAA as an all-purpose performer. Diggs set an ACC record for all-purpose yardage by a freshman, averaging 172.40 yards per game, breaking Clemson's Sammy Watkins' year-old record

and nudging out Miami's Duke Johnson for the honor. Despite missing one game during the season with injuries and being hampered in several others, Diggs recorded the 3rd-best receiving yardage total for an ACC freshman (848) and the 6th-best total in pass receptions (54). Diggs finished 8th nationally in all-purpose yardage; 9th nationally in kickoff returns (28.52); and 5th among all freshmen nationally in receiving yards per game (77.09).

## ACC Football Kickoff Media Selects Clemson as 2013 Favorite

GREENSBORO, N.C. -- Clemson, seeking its 15th Atlantic Coast Conference football title and its second in three years, is the preseason choice to win the Atlantic Division and defeat Miami in the 9th Annual Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game, according to a poll of media members attending this week's ACC Football Kickoff at the Grandover Resort.

Clemson, which leads all ACC teams with 14 conference championships, finished atop the media preseason poll for the second time since 1991. The Tigers have been picked to finish first seven times overall since the ACC preseason poll began in 1976.

Clemson senior quarterback Tajh Boyd was the overwhelming choice to repeat as ACC Player of the Year. The senior from Hampton, Va., was named on 105 of 120 ballots after a 2012 season in which he broke his own ACC single-season marks for touchdown passes (36) and touchdown responsibility (46). Boyd enters the 2013 season with 8,053 career passing yards and 73 touchdown passes.

Miami running back Duke Johnson, with four votes, placed second to Boyd in the 2013 ACC Preseason Player of the Year voting. Virginia Tech quarterback Logan Thomas and Clemson wide receiver Sammy Watkins received three votes apiece.

## Florida State, Clemson, UNC Headline 2013 All-ACC Preseason Football Team, Each With Four Players Selected

GREENSBORO, N.C. -- Reigning Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year Tajh Boyd of Clemson leads the 2013 Preseason All-ACC Football Team.

Boyd, who enters his senior season with 8,053 career passing yards and 73 career touchdown passes, was the overwhelming choice at quarterback in balloting by media in attendance at the 2013 ACC Football Kickoff.

Boyd is one of three players from ACC preseason favorite Clemson on the 25-member squad. Florida State led all schools with six players, and four from North Carolina were voted to the team.

Duke, Miami and Wake Forest followed with two selections apiece, while Boston College, Georgia Tech Maryland, Pittsburgh, Virginia and Virginia Tech each placed one player on the team.

Nine student-athletes named to the 2013 Preseason All-ACC Team were first- or second-team All-ACC offensive selections last season: Clemson's Boyd, Wake Forest wide receiver Michael Campanaro, North Carolina tight end Eric Ebron and tackle James Hurst, Florida State guard Tre' Jackson and center Bryan Stork, Miami running back Duke Johnson, Clemson placekicker Chandler Catanzaro and Maryland kick return specialist Stefon Diggs.

Seven members of the 2013 All-ACC Preseason defensive unit were first- or second-team All-ACC in 2012: Duke cornerback Ross Cockrell and punter Will Monday; Florida State cornerback Lamarcus Joyner and linebacker Christian Jones, North Carolina defensive end Kareem Martin, Wake Forest nose tackle Nikita Whitlock, and Virginia Tech linebacker Jack Tyler.

Boyd, who was named on 59 of the 65 ballots cast, joins his teammate, wide receiver Sammy Watkins and North Carolina's Hurst as repeat Preseason All-ACC selections from last season. Florida State's Joyner and Wake Forest's Whitlock are repeat Preseason All-ACC defensive selections from 2012.

Joyner, a former safety, was named to the 2013 Preseason All-ACC team at cornerback. Joyner received 43 total votes -- 32 at the corner and 11 at his former position.

Boyd is joined in the backfield of the Preseason All-ACC team by running backs Duke Johnson of Miami and James Wilder Jr. of Florida State.

Johnson, the 2012 ACC Rookie of the Year, placed third in the conference in rushing last season with 947 yards and ranked ninth nationally in all-purpose yardage at 171.67 per game. Wilder rushed for 635

yards and averaged 5.8 yards per carry. The pair placed 1-2 in the voting ahead of Syracuse's Jerome Smith, whose 1,171 yards last season ranks first among all returning conference team rushers in 2013. Smith and the Orange join Pitt in making their ACC debuts this fall.

The receiving corps includes Watkins, the 2011 ACC Rookie of the Year, and Wake Forest's Michael Campanaro, who leads all active ACC players with 162 catches. North Carolina's Eric Ebron received the nod at right end after hauling in 40 catches for 625 yards and four touchdowns in 2012.

Florida State's Jackson and UNC's Hurst are joined on the offensive line by FSU center Bryan Stork, Virginia tackle Morgan Moses and Miami guard Brandon Linder.

Clemson's Catanzaro enters the 2013 season having made good on 26 of his last 27 field goal attempts (.963), including a school-record streak of 20 straight three-pointers.

The defensive front features ends Martin of UNC and Georgia Tech's Jeremiah Attaochu, while Whitlock and Florida State's Timmy Jernigan man the tackle positions. Whitlock and Jernigan prevailed in a tight vote that also included Pitt's Aaron Donald, also a candidate for a number of preseason national awards.

The linebacking corps features Virginia Tech's Jack Tyler in addition to Florida State's Jones and Boston College's Kevin Pierre-Louis. Duke's Cockrell and FSU's Joyner are joined in the secondary by North Carolina's Tre Boston and Pitt's Jason Hendricks.

BC's Pierre-Louis ranked third among ACC players in tackles per game last season (9.4), while Virginia Tech's Tyler ranked fifth (9.2). Attaochu's 13 quarterback sacks tied for second among conference defenders. UNC's Martin tied for second in tackles for loss per game (1.29).

Pitt's Hendricks earned All-Big East honors in 2012 after registering 90 tackles and six interceptions. Duke's Cockrell tied for first in the ACC with five interceptions and third in passes defended (18). UNC's Boston was among a group of players with four interceptions in 2012.

Maryland's Diggs made a huge impact as a freshman last season, returning kickoffs 99 and 100 yards for touchdowns and piled up 172.36

## 2013 ACC Bowl Selection

### Bowl Championship Series

The winner of the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game will be selected to play in the Bowl Championship Series. Unless the winner of the Dr Pepper ACC



Football Championship Game is ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings and plays in the BCS National Championship Game, then the ACC Champion will serve as the host team of the Discover Orange Bowl in Miami, Fla. This year's Vizio BCS National Championship Game will be hosted by the Rose Bowl on Jan. 6 in Pasadena, Calif. The BCS may also select a second ACC team, if one is eligible for selection (Won at least nine regular season games and is ranked among the Top 14 in the final BCS

Standings), and there is an At-Large berth available and the team is selected by one of the four BCS Bowl Games—Discover Orange (only if the ACC Champion is in the BCS National Championship Game), Allstate Sugar, Tostitos Fiesta and the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio.

### After the BCS selections, then the selection order is:

1. Chick-fil-A Bowl, Atlanta
2. Russell Athletic Bowl, Orlando
3. Hyundai Sun Bowl, El Paso, Tex.
4. Belk Bowl, Charlotte, N.C.
5. Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl, Nashville, Tenn.
6. Advocate V100 Bowl, Shreveport, La.
7. The Military Bowl Presented by Northrop Grumman, Washington, D.C. and Annapolis, Md.
8. Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl, San Francisco, Calif.

### Conditional Agreement\*

\*If Pac-12 or BYU is unable to fill their obligations and ACC has an available team

### Conditions:

1. The runner-up of the ACC Championship Game, provided, is guaranteed not to fall further than the Hyundai Sun Bowl. The Sun Bowl will select the ACC Championship Game runner-up in any year that team is available to them.

2. Otherwise, if the bowl does not select the team available with the best Conference record, then it must choose a team that is within one conference win of the team (The "One-Win Rule") with the best conference record (ie. 5-3 to 6-2). The bowl may take a team that has more than a one game difference, only if the team is ranked more than five spaces above the team with the best Conference record in the final BCS Standings.

3. If, after all bowl selections have been made, and the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl has an opening due to the inability of either the Pac-12 Conference or BYU to provide a team, and the ACC has an available, eligible team, then the ACC will send a team to the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl

### Selection Time Frame

The Bowl Championship Series will announce its selections on the BCS ESPN Selection Show on Sunday, December 8. In conjunction with the BCS selections, each Atlantic Coast Conference affiliated bowl game will make their selections in the order specified above. The ACC, the Bowls and individual schools will announce the selections after all selections are completed on Sunday.

## ACC Divisional Tiebreaker

If more than one team in the same division is tied for the best winning percentage in its Conference games then, in order to determine the divisional champion, the procedures listed below will be followed.

### A. Two-Team Tie

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Winning percentage of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall winning percentage (divisional and non-divisional), and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last using the league's tie-breaking procedures.
4. Overall winning percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Combined winning percentage versus all non-divisional opponents.
6. Winning percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winning percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish within the division.
7. The tied team with the higher ranking in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings following the conclusion of regular season games. If both tied teams are not ranked in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings, the computer ranking portion of the Standings will be used, eliminating the high and the low computer ranking, and averaging the remaining rankings.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

### B. Three (or More) Team Tie

(Three team (or more) tiebreaker procedure will be used to break all ties to identify the Championship game representative. Once a team is eliminated from the tie, the tie-breaking procedures restart for the remaining teams. If the three (or more) team tie can only be reduced to two teams, the two-team tiebreaking procedure will then be applied).

1. Combined head-to-head winning percentage among the tied teams.
2. Winning percentage of the tied teams within the division.
3. Head-to-head competition versus the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference winning percentage, and proceeding through the division. Multiple ties within the division will be broken first to last, using the league's tie-breaking procedures.
4. Combined winning percentage versus all common non-divisional opponents.
5. Combined winning percentage versus all non-divisional opponents.
6. Winning percentage versus common non-divisional opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winning percentage) and proceeding through other common non-divisional opponents based upon their divisional order of finish.
7. The tied team with the highest ranking in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings following the conclusion of regular season games, unless the second of the tied teams is ranked within five-or-fewer places of the highest ranked tied team. In this case, the two-team tiebreaking procedure shall be applied between the top two ranked tied teams. If all tied teams are not ranked in the full Bowl Championship Series Standings, the computer ranking portion of the Standings will be used, eliminating the high and the low computer ranking, and averaging the remaining rankings.
8. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.



# The ACC and The Bowl Championship Series



## Bowl Championship Series

Heading into its 16th and final year of determining the National Championship in college football, the **Bowl Championship Series (BCS)** is a five-game arrangement that is designed to match the two top-rated teams and to create competitive match ups among eight other highly regarded teams in four other games.

The bowl games participating are the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, the Discover Orange Bowl, the Rose Bowl Game presented by Vizio and the Allstate Sugar Bowl. In addition, the BCS National Championship Game is played at one of the bowl sites, this year at Rose Bowl Stadium in Pasadena, Calif., on January 6, 2014.

The term "BCS conference" frequently is used incorrectly. Actually, all 10 NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences are "BCS conferences" because the BCS arrangement is managed by the commissioners of the 10 NCAA FBS conferences and the director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame. The conferences are Atlantic Coast, The American Athletic Conference, Big Ten, Big 12, Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, Sun Belt, Pacific-12, and the Southeastern.

Six conferences (ACC, American, Big 12, Big

Ten, SEC and Pac-12) have earned annual automatic qualification for the 2010-13 seasons by virtue of contracts to host the bowl games, and/or by having met a four-year metric based on competitive results (The ACC champion plays in the Discover Orange Bowl, the Big Ten and Pac-12 champs in the Rose Bowl presented by Vizio, Big 12 in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and SEC in the Allstate Sugar Bowl). Additionally, the highest-ranked champion of Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West, or Sun Belt conferences will be guaranteed a slot in a BCS game if that team is ranked 12th or higher in the final BCS standings, 16th or higher if its ranking is higher than that of a champion from one of the six conferences with automatic qualification. Other teams are eligible to be selected at large by a bowl game if they finish among the top 14.

The champions of the Big Ten and the Pac-12 will play in the Rose Bowl if they do not qualify for the National Championship Game. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl if those teams are not ranked No. 1 or No. 2 in the final BCS Standings.

## BCS Standings

The BCS Standings are composed of three elements that are weighted equally: the USA Today Coaches poll, 2) the Harris poll, and 3) the average of six computer poll rankings. The highest and lowest computer ranking is discarded each week with the computer average based on the remaining four rankings. The BCS Standings are compiled and released by the National Football Foundation eight times during the season, beginning this year on Sunday, October 20 and ending on BCS Selection Sunday, December 8. The first Harris Poll will be released on Sunday, Oct. 13.



## COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

Beginning with the 2014-15 season, college football will enter a new era when a postseason playoff will begin. The format is simple: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later. It will be the best of all worlds, and the biggest innovation to the sport in decades.

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game.

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

## The ACC and the BCS

The Atlantic Coast Conference has been a member of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) since its inception for the 1998 season. ACC Commissioner John Swofford, is the only Commissioner to twice serve as BCS Coordinator, having done so in the 2000 and 2001 seasons and again in the 2008 and 2009 campaigns, as the ACC successfully administered the BCS on two separate occasions. Swofford is also the last Commissioner to serve as BCS Coordinator. In 2009, the BCS group named longtime college administrator Bill Hancock to serve as the first Executive Director of the Bowl Championship Series. Hancock has since assumed the duties previously handled by the coordinator. Prior to being named Executive Director, Hancock served four years as the Administrator for the BCS.

## Bill Hancock, Executive Director Bowl Championship Series; College Football Playoff

Longtime athletics administrator Bill Hancock achieved a unique triple accomplishment at the upper echelon of intercollegiate athletics when he was named the first Executive Director of the College Football Playoff, which begins after the 2014 season. Previously, Hancock was named the first full-time director of the NCAA Final Four and then was named the first executive director of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) in 2009, a role he continues in this year until the completion of the BCS with this year's national championship game. Hancock served for 13 years as director of the NCAA's Division I Men's Basketball Championship--the three-week March Madness event that culminates at the Final Four. After a family tragedy, he retired in 2002 and for three years was the tournament's media coordinator on a consulting basis before being named BCS administrator in October of 2005. He is a 1972 journalism graduate of the University of Oklahoma and worked in sports information at his alma mater and also on the staff of the Big Eight Conference before being named director of the Final Four in 1989.

# ACC Overtime Games

## The ACC & Overtime

When Virginia Tech and Rutgers ended regulation tied at 10-10 in the Russell Bowl, it marked the 62nd game featuring an ACC team that has had to go to extra sessions. Of the 62 overtime contests, a large portion of them--26--have been played in the month of September. Games have gone into overtime for ACC teams a total of 14 times in November, while 12 have been played in October, three in August, five in December and two in January (2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl). Of the 62 overtime contests, 31 have been ACC games while 31 nonconference games have gone into overtime. The home team has a 34-20 advantage in the 54 games played on campus. The team which wins the toss has a 32-30 record. Forty-nine of the games were decided in the first overtime with nine games in double overtime and four in triple overtime.
