MIKE LONDON

HEAD COACH

Mike London enters his sixth season at Virginia with a team that returns 10 starters and more than 40 lettermen and a commitment to returning the Cavaliers to postseason play. The focus is on finishing after last year's team produced a 5-7 record that included several close losses that could have easily resulted in wins for UVa. Having relied on a number of underclassmen on the roster the past two years, London hopes that those talented, and now seasoned players, are ready to help the program turn the corner.

The Cavaliers face one of the nation's top schedules in 2015 with the season opener at UCLA and early home games against Notre Dame and Boise State in Scott Stadium. London preaches to his team that "To be the best, you have to beat the best!" and he has his charges eager to take on the challenging slate.

Knowing London's backstory, it is easy to understand why he is so optimistic as well as why his players enjoy and embrace his coaching approach.

A former Richmond police detective, London's time in law enforcement dealing with the entire spectrum of human emotions and actions has provided a wealth of experience that he draws on to assist players both on and off the field. There are few stressful situations he has not faced - including having a loaded pistol pointed at him and the trigger pulled, only to have the weapon malfunction and not discharge its potentially lethal round.

London also had the remarkable opportunity to save one of his daughter's lives when he was identified as a perfect match for her rare bone marrow disorder. That opportunity is one reason why London is an advocate of servitude and makes sure his players understand and embrace the concept of giving back through a variety of community services activities. One of the most visible is the team's annual bone marrow donor registration drive as part of the national "Get in the Game, Save a Life" initiative. During his time at UVa more than 600 names have been added to the national bone marrow registry.

London's biography includes plenty of chapters of football success on the field as well.

In the spring of 2014, defensive end Eli Harold was selected by the San Francisco 49ers and outside linebacker Max Valles later went to the Oakland Raiders to mark the 31st consecutive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

During the 2014 season true freshman safety Quin Blanding earned freshman All-America honors and was named the ACC's Defensive Rookie of the Year.

In 2011, London led Virginia to one of its most outstanding seasons as the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn



in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. Five of his players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrious Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media.

He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He defines the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years. Those results have continued to improve and during the spring of 2014, his players once again set a high mark for its GPA.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the

nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage. The 53-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/LINEBACKERS

MIKE ARCHER

Mike Archer is in his second season on Mike London's staff and in his fourth season at UVa. After spending the 2014 season as the safeties coach, Archer was elevated to associated head coach and will coach the linebackers starting in 2015. Archer joined London's coaching staff on Jan. 30, 2014 and returned to Virginia after spending the 1991 and 1992 seasons at UVa as the linebackers coach on George Welsh's staff.

Archer boasts 38 years of coaching experience, including four years as the head coach at LSU and seven years as an assistant coach in the NFL with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Archer's first season back on Grounds saw him overseeing a safeties unit that was one of the best in the ACC in 2014. Freshman All-American Quin Blanding was No. 2 in the ACC with 123 tackles and Anthony Harris was No. 6 with 108 stops. No other safety duo in the league combined for more tackles. Blanding led the nation's freshmen in tackles and was named the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year for his exploits. Harris was an All-ACC performer and signed a free agent deal with the Minnesota Vikings for the 2015 season.

Prior to his return to Charlottesville, Archer was the defensive coordinator for six seasons at NC State from 2007 to 2012. He served under former NC State head coach Tom O'Brien. Archer and O'Brien previously worked together at Virginia during the 1991 and 1992 seasons before O'Brien became the head coach at Boston College.

Current UVa associate head coach for defense/defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta also worked with Archer at NC State from 2010-12.

At NC State, Archer oversaw a defensive unit that picked off a school record 27 interceptions in 2011. The interception mark led the nation and tied as the second-best effort in ACC history. Archer's 2010 NC State defense held two opponents to negative yardage in rushing and ranked second in the league in rush defense. The Pack was also second in the ACC in sacks. The 2008 Wolfpack defense forced 28 turnovers, 20th in the NCAA. That mark included 17 interceptions which ranked 13th nationally. The 2007 Wolfpack defense ranked 25th nationally in passing efficiency defense.

Prior to his time at NC State, Archer spent seven seasons at Kentucky with a seven-year stint as the linebackers coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers breaking up his tenure with the Wildcats. Archer started at Kentucky in 1993 as the defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. In 1995 he was elevated to assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. In 1996 he left for the Steelers where he stayed through the 2002 season, helping Pittsburgh to four divisional championships. From 2003-06 Archer returned to Kentucky to be its defensive coordinator.

Kentucky's 2006 defense forced 28 turnovers, as the Wildcats ranked fifth nationally in turnover margin.

While with the Steelers, Archer coached a pair of two-time Pro Bowl selections (Jason Gildon, Levon Kirkland) and two other Pro Bowl selections (Joey Porter and Kendall Bell). Kendall Bell was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2001. Archer assisted a Steeler defense that led the NFL in rushing defense in 2002.

In 1987, at 34 years of age, Archer became the youngest Division I FBS head coach when he succeeded Bill Arnsparger at LSU. Archer came to LSU as the defensive backs coach in 1984 and was elevated to defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach for the 1985 and 1986 seasons. When Arnsparger left his post to become the athletics director, he handpicked Archer as his successor. In his three seasons as an LSU assistant, the Tigers posted a 26-8-2 mark and played in three bowl games.

Archer's first LSU team finished the season ranked No. 5 in both major polls with a 10-1-1 record, losing only to Alabama and tying Ohio State. It was LSU's first 10-win season in more than 25 years. Archer's Tigers followed up with an 8-4 record and a Southeastern Conference title in 1988. Archer posted a 27-18-1 head coaching record at LSU from 1987-90.

A 1976 graduate of Miami (Fla.), Archer started his coaching career with the Hurricanes in 1976 as a graduate assistant. In 1978 he was elevated to a full-time assistant coach. From 1979-83 Archer served as the defensive backs coach on Howard Schnellenberger's Miami teams, including the 1983 national championship squad.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH FOR DEFENSE/ DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/SAFETIES

JON TENUTA

Jon Tenuta is the associate head coach for the defense and the defensive coordinator. Tenuta joined Mike London's coaching staff on Jan. 3, 2013 after three seasons at NC State. The UVa alum returns to Charlottesville for the first time in a working capacity since being a graduate assistant for the Cavaliers in 1981 and 1982. Tenuta also worked with the linebackers in 2013 and 2014, but will coach the safeties in 2015.

Entering his 35th season of collegiate coaching, Tenuta has a wealth of FBS coaching experience, including being the defensive coordinator at various BCS stops: Kansas State, Ohio State, North Carolina, Georgia Tech and Notre Dame. Tenuta also served Marshall and SMU as defensive coordinator as well during the 1980s and has served as a defensive coordinator in 16 of his 33 seasons as a collegiate coach.

In 2014 Tenuta's defense featured seven starters that earned All-ACC honors. Highlighting the defensive was one of the ACC's best safeties units. Freshman All-American Quin Blanding was No. 2 in the ACC with 123 tackles and Anthony Harris was No. 6 with 108 stops. No other safety duo in the league combined for more tackles. Blanding led the nation's freshmen in tackles and was named the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year for his exploits. Blanding and Harris earned All-ACC honors along with Maurice Canady, Henry Coley, David Dean, Eli Harold and Max Valles.

During Tenuta's first season on Grounds he oversaw a defense that featured first-team All-American Anthony Harris, who led the nation with eight interceptions. The All-ACC first-team honoree was third on the team with 80 tackles in 2013. Under Tenuta's tutelage defensive lineman Brent Urban led the nation in pass breaks for a defensive lineman, despite missing four games with an injury.

Prior to UVa Tenuta came from NC State, where his defense included David Amerson, who led the nation in 2011 with 13 INTs.

Tenuta has coached in 16 bowl games during his career and served as the interim head coach for Georgia Tech at the 2007 Humanitarian Bowl. After he arrived at Notre Dame, he helped the Irish defense improve in all defensive categories and coached 2012 Heisman Trophy runner-up Manti-Teo to a freshman All-American season.

While at Georgia Tech, 18 Yellow Jacket defenders earned first- or second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference recognition and 18 players from his first four units were either drafted or signed to NFL free-agent contracts. In the six years Tenuta was in Atlanta, his defenses were ranked nationally in total, scoring and rushing defense, including 20th or better against the run the last five years.

In 2001, Tenuta guided the ACC's top-rated defense at North Carolina during his only season in Chapel Hill. Tenuta spent five seasons at Ohio State and he helped develop several All-Americans and first-round NFL draft picks. Ohio State's pass defense was consistently ranked among the nation's best during that span.

In 1989, he was an assistant coach at SMU, where he helped Forrest Gregg rebuild the program. Tenuta also has had stops at Maryland (graduate assistant), Vanderbilt (DBs) and Oklahoma (DBs).

Tenuta has coached more than 30 players who went on to play professional football. A three-year letterwinner as a defensive back at Virginia (1978, '79, '80), he won the team's John Acree Memorial Football Trophy and Kevin Bowie Award. Tenuta graduated with a degree in physical education and health in 1982. He met his wife, Dori, while at UVa. They have three sons: Zach, Matt and Luke. Son Matt is a left-handed pitcher in the Kansas City Royals' organization and opened the 2015 season with the Lexington Legends (Ky.) of the Class-A South Atlantic League.

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS

STEVE FAIRCHILD

Steve Fairchild enters his third season at Virginia as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Fairchild boasts 34 years of coaching experience at both the NFL and collegiate levels, including 18 seasons as an offensive coordinator.

During Fairchild's first season on Grounds he guided an offense that saw Kevin Parks rush for 1,031 yards and earn All-ACC second-team honors. Parks was the first Cavalier to rush for over a 1,000 yards since Alvin Pearman in 2004.

Prior to UVa Fairchild was the senior offensive assistant for the San Diego Chargers after a four-year stint as the head coach at Colorado State, which included the highest-ranked recruiting class in program history and a victory in the 2008 New Mexico Bowl.

At Colorado State, Fairchild also was the offensive coordinator (1997-2000) and quarterbacks coach (1993-96) during the Rams' football rise. From 1993-2000 Colorado State won the Western Athletic Conference three times and the Mountain West Conference twice and was nationally ranked at various times during that span. During Fairchild's four seasons as the offensive coordinator, three Colorado State players were honored as the league's offensive player of the year and the Rams won three bowl games. In 1997, quarterback Moses Moreno was the WAC offensive player of the year and helped Colorado State finish No. 1 in the league in total and scoring offense.

Fairchild has worked with many dynamic players in college football and the NFL. He was a part of San Diego State's high-octane offenses that were highlighted by running back Marshall Faulk and quarterback Dan McGwire. During Fairchild's three seasons at San Diego State from 1990-92, the Aztecs enjoyed three straight top-10 finishes in NCAA scoring and total offense categories. Fairchild's first stint at San Diego State was for the 1986 season as the Aztecs' recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach, working with second-round NFL selection Rob Awalt. Fairchild also owns a stop at New Mexico as the offensive coordinator from 1987-89 where the Lobos ranked No. 8 in NCAA pass offense and No. 29 in total offense in 1989. Under Fairchild's guidance Terrance Mathis became the first player to have more than 250 receptions, 4,000 receiving yards and 6,000 yards of total offense.

Fairchild spent eight seasons in the NFL. He worked as the offensive coordinator for the Buffalo Bills in 2006 and 2007, as quarterback J.P. Losman posted the 11th-best QB rating in the NFL in 2006 and passed for 3,051 yards. Prior to his stint with the Bills, Fairchild was the offensive coordinator for the St. Louis Rams from 2003-05. Teaming up again with Faulk, Fairchild and the Rams enjoyed three straight top-10 finishes in total offense, including the NFL's second-ranked scoring offense in 2003. Quarterback Marc Bulger was the 2003 Pro Bowl MVP. Fairchild's first NFL stint came in Buffalo in 2001 and 2002 where he was the running backs coach and boasted two Pro Bowl running backs, Larry Centers and Travis Henry. Centers is the NFL career reception and yardage holder for running backs.

Fairchild began his coaching career in 1982 as the offensive coordinator at San Diego Mesa Community College. After two seasons he moved to Ferris State as the offensive coordinator from 1984-85.

Fairchild is a 1981 graduate of Colorado State, where he spent three seasons as a quarterback and earned All-WAC second-team honors behind BYU's Jim McMahon. Fairchild also excelled in the classroom at Colorado State, earning first-team academic all-conference honors, the Merrill Gheen Award for athletic and academic achievement and the NCAA District Athletic Achievement Award. He earned a bachelor of arts in economics from Colorado State and later a master of education from Azusa Pacific in 1983.

The Decatur, Ill., native is married to the former Nancy A. Kolstoe. The couple has two daughters, Lindsey and Jill.

SPECIAL COORDINATOR/TIGHT ENDS LARRY LEWIS

Larry Lewis joined Mike London's coaching staff on Jan. 12, 2013 as the special teams coordinator and the running backs coach. Lewis has switched from running backs to the tight ends coach for the 2015 season. Lewis has 34 years of collegiate coaching experience, including an eight-year stint as the head coach at Idaho State. Lewis first started coaching special teams when he was an assistant on Mike Price's Weber State staff in 1981 and became one of the first college coaches to hold the title of special teams coordinator when he took on that role for Price's Washington State teams in the 1990s.

During Lewis' first season on Grounds he guided a running back corps that saw Kevin Parks rush for over a 1,000 yards since Alvin Pearman in 2004.

Lewis came to Virginia after working for Hall of Fame coach Chris Ault at Nevada in 2012. Ault announced his retirement in late December. Lewis served as the Wolfpack's special teams coordinator and running backs coach. Nevada averaged 271 rushing yards per game in 2012, the seventh-best average among FBS programs.

In his one season at Nevada, Lewis coached junior All-America running back Steffhon Jefferson, who rushed for 1,883 yards and 24 touchdowns. Both of those totals ranked second among FBS players in 2012. Jefferson was one of 10 semifinalists for the Doak Walker Award, presented to the nation's top running back.

Jefferson's rushing yardage and touchdown totals set Nevada and Mountain West Conference single-season records. He broke Colin Kaepernick's single-season rushing touchdown mark at Nevada.

The Wolfpack's special teams also showed improvement under Lewis. Nevada's Khalid Wooten led the Mountain West Conference and finished fourth in the nation in punt return average at 15.1 yards per return. Brock Kendall was sixth in MWC in kickoff returns at 23.4 yards per runback. Place kicker Allen Hardison converted nine of 10 field goal attempts and made 56 of 57 PATs. Chase Tenpenny averaged 43.3 yards per punt on 46 attempts. Wooten was a second-team all-conference selection, while Hardison earned honorable mention honors.

Lewis coached at Colorado State for four seasons before joining the staff at Nevada. After coaching the Rams' special teams and safeties for three seasons, he was promoted to associate head coach prior to the 2011 campaign and given the responsibility of coaching running backs and fullbacks, in addition to special teams.

At Colorado State in 2011, Lewis guided the Rams to top 25 rankings in punting and kick returns. As the Rams' running backs coach, he tutored Chris Nwoke, who was third in the Mountain West in rushing at nearly 95 yards per game. Lewis also had the No. 19 kick return unit in 2010 and the top punter in the Mountain West in 2008.

Lewis has produced a number of NFL players in his career, perhaps most notably All-Pro defensive end Jared Allen, who was the nation's top defensive player in I-AA (FCS) in 2003 at Idaho State.

As the Bengals' head coach from 1999-2006, Lewis guided Idaho State to a share of the 2002 Big Sky Conference title and the school's first of consecutive eight-win seasons, in 2002 and 2003, in the program's 101-year history. For a stretch from 2001-04, Idaho State was ranked in 22 of 23 national polls. His Bengals' teams produced 13 All-Americans, 127 all-conference selections and 41 academic all-conference awards.

Lewis was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year in 2002, when Idaho State notched its best record in 21 years and captured a share of its first Big Sky title in more than two decades.

That season, the Bengals had 14 first- and second-team all-conference players; they had just one only three years earlier, in 1999. The Bengals closed the year No. 16 in the national polls.

Prior to his tenure at ISU, Lewis spent 10 years at Washington State, where he served as defensive ends coach (1989-94) and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator (1995-98). During that period, WSU experienced unprecedented success and his linemen helped the school post the nation's No. 2 defense against the run in both 1993 and 1994.

The Cougars went to three bowl games, including the Rose Bowl at the end of a 10-1 season in 1997. In that contest, WSU nearly upset eventual national champion Michigan. It was Washington State's first Rose Bowl appearance in 67 years.

From 1981-88, Lewis coached at Weber State, where he began as a part-time assistant. Promoted to full-time status by head coach Mike Price prior to the 1983 season, Lewis coached outside linebackers from 1981-85, then wore two caps as recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach from 1986-88. In 1987, the Wildcats enjoyed what remains the best season in program annals, a 10-3 campaign that saw them advance to the national Division I-AA quarterfinals and capture a share of the Big Sky Conference championship. In 1981, his first year at the school, the 7-4 team snapped a string of 10 losing seasons.

Lewis began coaching after a stellar playing career at Boise State, where he lettered four times. After red-shirting in 1976, he was the team's most improved player as a freshman. As a starter at outside linebacker, he helped the Broncos win the 1980 NCAA Division I-AA national championship, on the heels of a 10-1 season in 1979 and a Big Sky championship in 1977.

During his professional tenure he has coached in the Copper, Alamo, Rose and New Mexico (twice) bowls and in the Division I-AA championships twice.

RECRUITING COORDINATOR/CORNERBACKS

CHIP WEST

Chip West enters his sixth season on the Virginia coaching staff. West, who coaches the Cavalier cornerbacks, took over the role of recruiting coordinator following the 2012 season and saw Virginia sign a top-30 class in February 2013 that featured the first five-star prospect in Mike London's tenure at Virginia. It was the third consecutive top-30 class for the UVA program.

The highly-energetic West has taken advantage of his personal and professional background in the Tidewater area to strongly enhance Virginia's recruiting efforts in that region. In February 2014 Rivals.com and Scout.com each named West its ACC Recruiter of the Year. West spearheaded a recruiting effort that landed UVA numerous top-rated recruits, including two of the nation's top-10 recruits. West was named the Atlantic Coast Conference's recruiter of the year for 2011 by 247Sports and was one eight finalists for the organization's national recruiter of the year honor.

As effective as West has been on the recruiting circuit, he has been equally successful as a position coach.

In 2012, sophomore cornerback Demetrious Nicholson was an honorable mention selection to All-ACC media and coaches teams. As a freshman in 2011, he was a second-team freshman All-American.

In 2011, senior cornerback Chase Minnifield earned All-ACC honors for the second straight year while being coached by West. Minnifield ended his career with 13 interceptions.

That same year, Nicholson, the state's high school player of the year in 2010, started all 13 games, recorded two interceptions and finished fourth on the team with 60 tackles.

In 2010 West coached Ras-I Dowling. Despite missing much of the season due to injury, Dowling was a second-round pick by the New England Patriots.

A Hampton, Va., native, West was the assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach for head coach Bobby Wilder at Old Dominion before joining the Virginia staff. He was responsible for recruiting the Hampton Roads and Tidewater areas for the Monarchs. ODU went 9-2 in 2009 in its first season as a NCAA FCS program.


Prior to joining the staff at Old Dominion, West coached at James Madison for three seasons (2004-2006) overseeing the defensive backs, including free safety Tony LeZotte, a 2005 All-American and Atlantic-10 Defensive Player of the Year, as well as the Atlantic 10 co-rookie of the year as a freshman. The Dukes won the NCAA Division I-AA national championship in 2004, finishing 13-2. In 2006 JMU returned to the FCS playoffs, losing in the first round at Youngstown State.

West coached the defensive backs at Fordham in 2003 when the Rams were 9-3. He served as the wide receivers coach at Colgate for four years and worked as a graduate assistant at West Virginia. Colgate shared the 2002 Patriot League title with Fordham, finishing with a 9-3 overall record and a 6-1 league mark. The Raiders led the Patriot League in 2002 in total offense, averaging 392.5 yards per game, including 215.0 yards per game passing. In 1999 Colgate won the Patriot League title and competed in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

As a graduate assistant at West Virginia for two seasons, West worked with the defense as the Mountaineers participated in the Carquest and Insight.com bowls.

West played football at Kecoughtan High School. He earned his bachelor's degree in computer information systems from Livingstone College, and his master's in physical education from West Virginia while working as a graduate assistant coach. West was an all-CIAA wide receiver at Livingstone.

He and his wife, Patrice, are the parents of five children: Zoe, David, Gwen, Justin and Jada.



ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/RUNNING BACKS

CHRIS BEATTY

Chris Beatty is an assistant head coach and running backs coach in his first season on Mike London's staff. Beatty joined London's staff on Jan. 14, 2015 after two successful seasons at Wisconsin as the Badgers' wide receiver coach.

Boasting FBS coaching experience at Wisconsin, Illinois, Vanderbilt, West Virginia and Northern Illinois, Beatty comes to Charlottesville with experience coaching various offensive positions, including serving as co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Illinois in 2012, running backs and slot receivers coach at West Virginia from 2008-10 and wide receivers coach at Vanderbilt and Wisconsin.

Beatty comes to UVa fresh off Wisconsin's 11-3 finish in 2014, including a 34-31 overtime win against Auburn in the Outback Bowl. Beatty's corps of wide receivers was efficient in the passing game and in the rushing game, blocking for Melvin Gordon during his record-breaking season.

During his 2013 campaign with the Badgers, Beatty helped senior WR Jared Abbrederis tie the Badgers' all-time record for career catches with 202 and finish his career with 3,140 receiving yards and 23 touchdowns, both second in school history. In his final season at UW, Abbrederis set the school record for receptions in a season with 78 catches and became the third receiver in school history to rack up 1,000 receiving yards in a season with 1,081.

Abbrederis, who went on to be selected by the Green Bay Packers in the 2014 NFL Draft, was a consensus first-team All-Big Ten selection and was named recipient of the Burlsworth Trophy as the nation's top player that began his career as a walk-on.

Prior to his one-year stint with the Illini, Beatty coached wide receivers and served as offensive recruiting coordinator at Vanderbilt in 2011. That followed a three-year stint as running backs and slot receivers coach at West Virginia from 2008-10, where he also served as the Mountaineers' director of recruiting.

Beatty got his start at the FBS level as Northern Illinois' running backs coach in 2007, taking over for former Wisconsin assistant head coach Thomas Hammock.

He began his collegiate coaching career as the offensive coordinator at Hampton, where he also coached quarterbacks and wide receivers in 2006.

Ten of Beatty's former players have gone on to the NFL, and he also mentored 14 all-conference performers.

A 1995 graduate of East Tennessee State, where he was a standout wide receiver, Beatty played professionally in the Canadian Football League before becoming a successful high school coach in Virginia. He led Landstown High School to a 40-2 record from 2003-05 and won a state championship with a team that featured current Buffalo Bills WR Percy Harvin.

While at Vanderbilt, he helped the Commodores win the 2011 Liberty Bowl, and he was part of three straight bowl appearances during his time at West Virginia. His stint with the Mountaineers also included the 2010 Big East championship.

While at West Virginia, Beatty coached running back Noel Devine, who rushed for more than 3,600 yards under Beatty's direction and earned a pair of All-Big East honors.

He also helped guide Northern Illinois running back Justin Anderson in rushing for 1,245 yards and eight touchdowns as a sophomore.

In his first season as a college coach, Beatty directed Hampton to the 2006 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference championship and a berth in the FCS playoffs. The Pirates ranked No. 7 in the FCS with an average of 34.7 points per game, with three of Beatty's wide receivers -- Dereck Faulkner, Onrea Jones and Marquay McDaniel -- eventually earning playing time in the NFL.

A native of Centreville, Va., Beatty and his wife, Kris, are the parents of son Aaron.

OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

DAVE BORBELY

Dave Borbely is the offensive line coach and is in his first season on Mike London's staff, and his fifth season at UVa overall. Borbely joined London's staff on Jan. 14, 2015 and returns to Charlottesville where he spent four seasons (2006-09) as the running game coordinator and offensive line coach. He moved on to Charlie Strong's staff at Louisville (2010-13) for four seasons before spending the 2014 season helping lead Colorado State-Pueblo to the NCAA DII national championship. He served as the running game coordinator and offensive line coach at both stops.

During his first stint at UVa, Borbely tutored senior offensive tackle Eugene Monroe to several 2008 All-America squads, including second-team honors by the Associated Press and Walter Camp Football Foundation. Monroe also received the Jacobs Blocking Trophy, given to the ACC's top blocker. In his time with the Cavaliers, Borbely also coached Branden Albert, a third-team AP All-American in 2007, as well as offensive guard Austin Pasztor in 2008 and 2009, who later was a second-team AP All-American in 2011. All three offensive linemen are now in the NFL.

After his four years at Virginia, Borbely moved on to Louisville for a successful four-year stint, helping aid the Cardinals to three Bowl game wins and a postseason appearance in each season (2010-13), including a 2013 Sugar Bowl victory over Florida, which came after a second straight BIG EAST title in 2012.

Over the Borbely's final two seasons at Louisville, the Cardinals went a combined 23-3 and were ranked amongst the nation's top 20 programs in both seasons. They went 12-1 in 2013 and posted a convincing 36-9 Russell Athletic Bowl win over Miami (Fla.) to cap the campaign.

In his time at Louisville, Borbely helped guide and develop two all-conference offensive linemen in 2010, 2012 and 2013 as well as Jake Smith, Louisville's first FWAA freshman All-American in 2011. Included in that bunch was walk-on Alex Kupper, now playing for the Houston Texans, and 2011 NFL Draft sixth-round selection Byron Stingily of the Tennessee Titans.

Prior to his first stint with UVa, Borbely spent four seasons as the offensive line coach at Colorado for Gary Barnett. His resume also includes coaching experience at Notre Dame, Stanford, Tulane, Temple, and Rice.

Borbely's wide-range of coaching experience has allowed him to develop an extensive recruiting base, including the Northeast and West Coast. He has coached for some of the top names in collegiate football including Barnett, Strong, Tyrone Willingham and Phillip Fulmer.

During Borbely's four years at Colorado, the Buffs made three bowl appearances and won the Big 12 Northern Division three times. In 2002, his first season with the Buffs, Colorado finished sixth in the nation in rushing. In 2005, he coached Mark Fenton, a first-team All-Big 12 performer who was one of six finalists for the Dave Rimington Award presented to the nation's top center.

Prior to his stint at Colorado, Borbely was the offensive line coach at Notre Dame from 1998 to 2001. While with the Irish, he coached in two New Year's Day bowls (1999 Gator and 2001 Fiesta). During each of his first three seasons with the Irish, the Notre Dame offense ranked in the top-30 nationally in rushing.

From 1995 to 1997 Borbely was the offensive line coach at Stanford where he helped the Cardinal to Liberty and Sun Bowl invitations following the '95 and '96 seasons. In 1996, Borbely had two linemen, Brad Badger and Nate Parks, selected in the NFL draft.

His previous assistant coaching stops included Tulane from 1992 to 1994, Temple from 1989 to 1991 and Rice from 1986 to 1988.

Borbely started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Evansville from 1981 to 1982. He was the freshman defensive line coach at Pennsylvania in 1983 and received his first coaching opportunity on the Division I level as a graduate assistant for Phillip Fulmer at Tennessee from 1984 to 1985.

A native of Hammond, Ind., Borbely earned his bachelor of arts degree in history from DePauw (Ind.) University and a master of arts in secondary education from the University of Evansville in 1982. At DePauw, he earned four letters in football and twice was named the team's top lineman.

Borbely and his wife, Bev, have three children - Joseph, Laura and Brian.

WIDE RECEIVERS

MARQUES HAGANS

Marques Hagans enters his third season as a full-time coach on Mike London's coaching staff after spending two years as a graduate coach, working with the offense. Hagans was named the wide receivers coach on Jan. 3, 2013.

Hagans helped Canaan Severin's rise in 2014 as the junior led UVa with 42 catches for 578 yards and five touchdowns after entering the season with six career receptions.

Hagans oversaw the emergence of freshman wide receiver Keeon Johnson in 2013. Despite not playing the first four games of a potential redshirt season, Johnson completed one of the best true freshman seasons in recent UVa history, catching 20 passes for 282 yards and a score in the final eight games of the season.

Hagans was a four-year letterwinner at UVa from 2002-05 and currently is No. 7 all-time in passing at UVa with 4,877 passing yards. He finished his career at No. 5, but has since been passed by Jameel Seweel and Marc Verica, the two starting quarterbacks to follow him in Charlottesville. Hagans in No. 5 all-time at UVa in total offense with 5,779 yards and his 2005 season ranks No. 3 all-time with 2,802 total yards. Only his predecessor, Matt Schaub, had better seasons (2002 & 2003) in the UVa annals in regards to total offense.

The St. Louis Rams selected Hagans in the fifth round (144 overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft. He spent three seasons with the Rams before being picked up by the Kansas City Chiefs for the 2009 campaign. Hagans finished the 2009 season with the Washington Redskins and was released in the summer of 2010 after injuring himself in off-season workouts.

Hagans is a native of Hampton, Va., and graduated from Hampton High School after spending two years at neighboring Bethel High School. As a junior at Hampton, Hagans led the Crabbers to the state championship in Group AAA, Division 5 of the Virginia High School League in 1998. Hampton advanced to the state semifinals in Hagans' senior season in 1999.

Hagans graduated with a degree in anthropology from UVa in 2005 and is currently finishing a graduate degree in professional studies.

Hagans resides in Charlottesville with his wife, the former Lauren Swierczek, a former Cavalier women's basketball player. The couple has two sons, Christopher Dex and Jackson Watford.

DEFENSIVE LINE

JAPPY OLIVER

Jerome "Jappy" Oliver is the defensive line coach and is in his second year at Virginia. Oliver joined Mike London's coaching staff on Jan. 13, 2014 after four seasons at the University of Buffalo.

Oliver boasts 36 years of collegiate coaching experience, including stops at Air Force, Buffalo, Navy, Notre Dame, South Carolina, and Vanderbilt. Oliver comes to UVa after four seasons as the assistant head coach, defensive line coach and professional football liaison at Buffalo where the Bulls are coming off a 2013 appearance in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, only the second bowl appearance in program history.

Oliver is reunited with defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta at Virginia. Oliver and Tenuta coached together at Notre Dame during the 2008 season.

In his first season at UVa, Oliver coached a defensive line in 2014 that featured Eli Harold, who the San Francisco 49ers drafted in the third round of the 2015 NFL Draft. Harold was a second-team All-ACC honoree and finished his UVa career No. 10 all-time with 36.5 tackles for loss. Defensive tackle David Dean also earned All-ACC honors (third-team) under Oliver's tutelage.

In Oliver's first season at Buffalo in 2010, he coached a defensive line that had 23.5 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks. His defensive line improved on those numbers in 2011 with 24 tackles for loss and 8.5 sacks. In 2012, Oliver coached the duo of Steven Means and Colby Way who combined for 21.5 tackles for loss and 13.5 sacks. Means was named second-team All-MAC. Way went on to be named a third-team All-MAC honoree in 2013 after making 32 tackles, including 8.5 for a loss and 5.0 sacks, and was drafted in the fifth round of the 2013 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Oliver came to Buffalo in 2010 after spending four years at Notre Dame as the Irish defensive line coach. From 2005-08, Oliver helped the growth of Irish defensive ends Victor Abiamiri and Chris Frome as well as defensive tackles Derek Landri and Trevor Laws. Abiamiri was a second-round pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles, while the Jacksonville Jaguars chose Landri that same year in the fifth round. Laws was drafted by the Eagles in the second round of the 2008 draft and became the earliest Irish defensive tackle selected since Bryant Young was taken in the first round 14 years earlier. Frome was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Chicago Bears in 2007.

Oliver spent the 2003 and 2004 seasons as defensive line coach under Lou Holtz at South Carolina, helping to achieve a noteworthy turnaround on the defensive side in 2004 as the Gamecocks finished with a national ranking of 20th in total defense (315.18 yards per game).

Oliver previously served on the staff of Air Force's Fisher DeBerry for eight seasons from 1995 through 2002, helping the Falcons to five postseason bowl appearances including wins in the Oahu Bowl (1998) and the Silicon Valley Bowl (2000).

During Oliver's eight years as defensive line coach at Air Force, the Falcons finished a combined 65-33 and ended up 25th in the final USA Today/ ESPN poll in 1997 after finishing 10-3, then 10th in USA Today/ESPN in 1998 after finishing 12-1. Air Force won the Western Athletic Conference Mountain Division title in 1998.

One of Oliver's prize pupils, Bryce Fisher, earned WAC Mountain Division Defensive Player of the Year honors in 1998. Fisher was also the team's most outstanding player in the 1997 Las Vegas Bowl, and was later drafted in the seventh round by the Buffalo Bills. Oliver also helped turn Shawn Thomas into one of the Academy's best defenders. Thomas finished his career ranked fourth in school history in tackles for loss and quarterback sacks. In addition to his work with the defensive line, Oliver also worked with the Falcon kickoff team as well as the extra point and field goal blocking units.

From 1991-94 Oliver served on the staff at Vanderbilt, where he helped the Commodores defense set school records for quarterback sacks in consecutive seasons. Vanderbilt also lowered its team rushing yards allowed in each of Oliver's four seasons in Nashville under head coach Gerry DiNardo.

He began his coaching career in 1978 at Davison (Mich.) High School (near his hometown of Flint) where he coached the defensive backfield and wide receivers. He returned to his alma mater, Purdue University, as a graduate assistant coach in 1979 and 1980 (working with the wide receivers, tight ends and offensive line) for head coach Jim Young - and helped the Boilers to wins in the Bluebonnet (1979) and Liberty (1980) Bowls and consecutive 10-2 and 9-3 marks.

He then coached at Eastern Michigan (offensive backfield and receivers) from 1981-82 and Northeastern (outside linebackers) in 1983 under head coach Paul Pawlak. Oliver coached defensive linemen at the Naval Academy from 1984-86 under head coach Gary Tranquill. He also has coaching experience at Grand Valley State (defensive line in 1988) and Western Illinois (inside linebackers in 1989-90).

Oliver is a 1978 graduate of Purdue University where he earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He lettered three years in football as a wide receiver (15 career receptions) and also spent one season as a reserve on the Boilermakers' basketball squad.

Oliver was a standout athlete at Southwestern High School in Flint, Mich., earning all-city and all-district accolades in both football and basketball. He was the city's athlete of the year in 1973 and captained teams in football, basketball and baseball.

He has one daughter, Candace, and a son, Justin.

SEAN CASCARANO GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Sean Cascarano is in his seventh season with the UVa football program and his second as a graduate assistant. He assists with the offense, primarily with the offensive line. Cascarano was a three-year letterwinner for the Cavaliers after serving as an offensive guard and offensive tackle from 2009-12.

The 2012 ACC All-Academic honoree missed the 2013 season with an injury after he was one of 11 players to start all 12 games for the Cavaliers in 2012. Cascarano spent the 2013 season with the football program as a student assistant, working primarily with the offensive line.

Cascarano is a native of Glenview, Ill., and graduated from Virginia in December 2013 with a bachelor degree in history. Cascarano is taking classes in the Curry School and is working on his Master of Teaching program.



ZACH TENUTA GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Zach Tenuta is in his second season as a graduate assistant football coach at Virginia. He works with UVa's defensive ends.

Tenuta came to Virginia after one season as a defensive assistant at Middle Creek High School in Apex, N.C. In his inaugural coaching season in 2013, Tenuta helped the Mustangs to a 12-3 record and an appearance in the 4AA state semifinal game.

A standout football and lacrosse player at Walton High School in Marietta, Ga., Tenuta continued his football-playing career at Marshall and Akron as a tight end.

Tenuta's parents, Jon and Dori, are both graduates of the University of Virginia. Tenuta has two younger brothers, Matt and Luke.

Tenuta is a 2013 graduate of Marshall with a degree in general studies. He is pursuing a master's degree at UVa.




DAQUAN ROMERO GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Daquan Romero is in his fifth season with the UVa football program and his first as a graduate assistant. He assists with the defense, primarily with the linebackers. Romero was a four-year letterwinner for the Cavaliers at linebacker from 2011-14.

Romero appeared in 46 career games with 27 starts. He concluded his career with 232 career tackles, 20 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks. In 2014 Romero was part of a defense that helped limit the nation's No. 5 rusher (Pitt's James Conner) and its No. 12 rusher (Miami's Duke Johnson) under 100 yards rushing. The 2014 season was Romero's most complete, making 86 tackles, 8.0 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks, causing two fumbles, recovering two fumbles, breaking up three passes and making his only career interception.

Romero graduated from Virginia in 2015 with a bachelor degree in African American studies. The Hampton, Va., native prepped at Phoebus High School before coming to Virginia.



BRIAN WETZEL GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Brian Wetzel joined the Virginia staff as a graduate assistant coach in 2015 and works with the offense.

A 2012 graduate of Allegheny College, Wetzel was a member of the Shenandoah University football staff in 2012. He was a volunteer assistant at Virginia in 2013 and 2014. He previously coached at Gar-Field (Va.) High School in 2010-11.

The Coudersport, Pa., native is currently working on a master's degree from Virginia's Curry School.



KYLE KING QUALITY CONTROL GRADUATE ASSISTANT

Kyle King is in his first season as a quality control graduate assistant after spending the 2014 season as a football operations intern with the Philadelphia Eagles.

King returns to Virginia where he was the lead student football operations assistant from 2010-14. King earned a bachelor of arts in government and media studies from Virginia in May 2014. Currently, King is working on a master of education from UVa.
