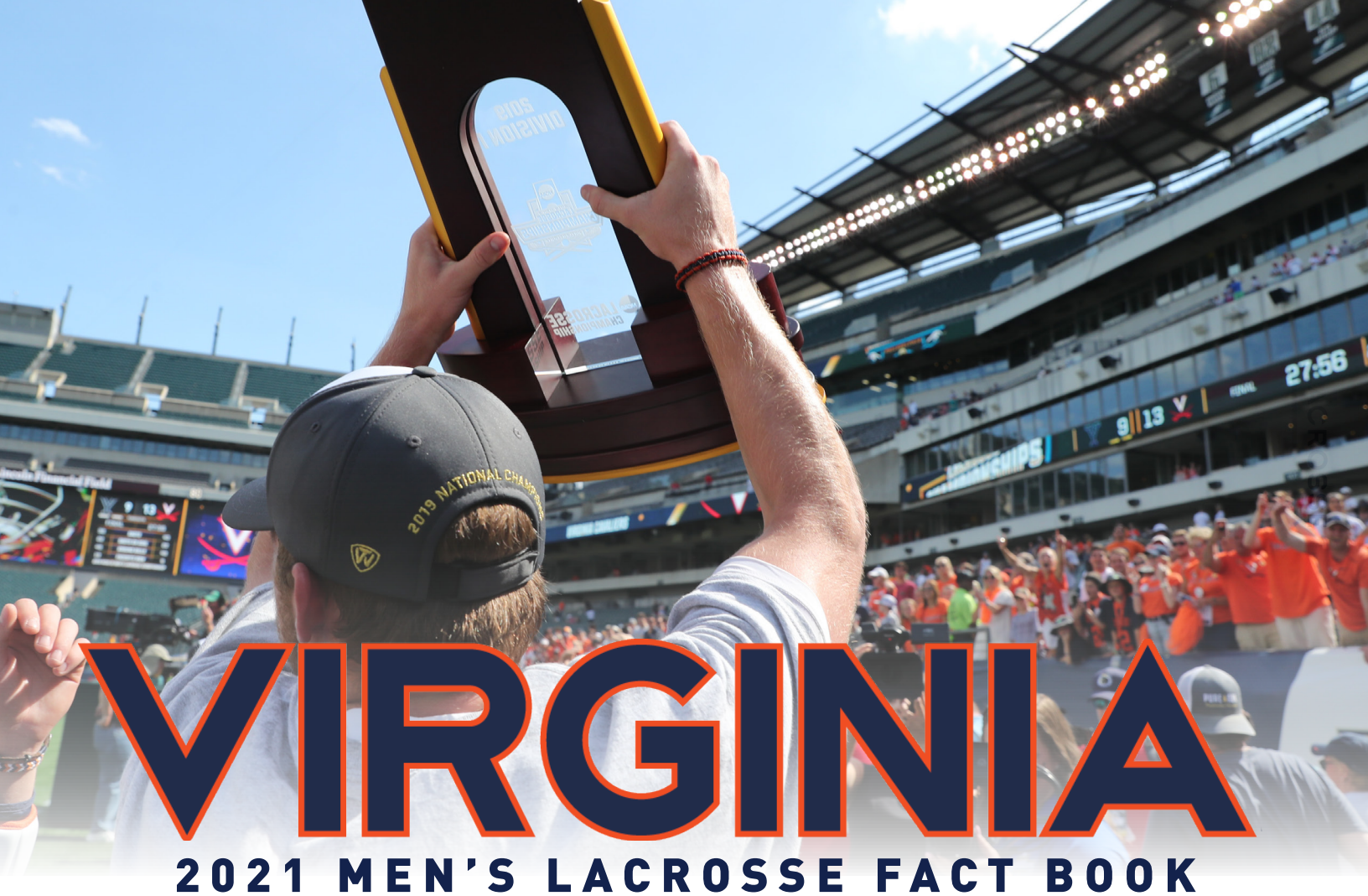

# LARS TIFFANY

## Tiffany Enters His Fifth Season at the Helm of the Cavaliers

Lars Tiffany is in his fifth season as the head coach of the Virginia men's lacrosse program after being named the 17th head coach of the Cavaliers on June 21, 2016.

UVA was 4-2 during the 2020 season before it canceled by the NCAA on March 12 due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19). The shortened season saw Michael Kraus become just the fourth Cavalier to reach the 100-goal, 100-assist mark for a career.

The 2019 season was a special one for Tiffany as he brought both NCAA and ACC titles to Charlottesville. Virginia tied a program record with 17 wins in 2019 as the Cavaliers finished 17-3, winning their first NCAA title since 2011 and first ACC title since 2010.

Virginia's offense hummed all season, finishing No. 7 in the country in three key categories: scoring offense per game (14.10), assists per game (8.60) and points per game (22.70). Virginia also finished No. 4 in the nation in scoring margin per game (3.85). Leading the way was Matt Moore, who became the first player in program history to record 40+ goals and 40+ assists in the same season. Moore finished No. 1 in the ACC and No. 8 in the nation with 89 points (46-43). Dox Aitken, a first-team USILA All-American for the second-straight season, broke his own single-season UVA record for points by a midfielder (52). Aitken also became the only midfielder in program history to reach 100 goals for a career. Ian Laviano led the ACC and was No. 9 in the nation with 51 goals, which ranks No. 4 all-time at UVA on the single-season ledger.

Ryan Conrad, a first-team USILA All-American, was named the Senior CLASS Award winner for 2019, the second student-athlete to win the coveted award under Tiffany (Brown's Jack Kelly, 2016). Conrad, a two-time captain, was MVP of the ACC Tournament and named to the NCAA All-Tournament team. He finished the year with 31 goals and 18 assists, which places him tied for No. 3 all-time at UVA in single-season points by a midfielder.

UVA was one of the nation's most feared riding teams. UVA's

opponents cleared at .711 percent for the season, which ranked No. 2 in the nation behind Cleveland State's .707 percent. UVA was also one of two programs to have a top 20 offense and defense, as the Cavaliers limited opponents to 10.25 goals per game, while scoring 14.10 per game. The scoring margin of 3.85 goals per game ranked No. 4 nationally and No. 1 in the ACC.

For the third year in a row, Tiffany's Cavaliers team ranked No. 1 nationally in ground balls (41.55) in 2019. Defensively in 2018, Virginia led the nation with 38.0 ground balls per game and in 2017 averaged 43.33 ground balls per game, averaging nearly seven more ground balls per game than No. 2 Brown (36.56), Tiffany's old program. Prior to Tiffany coming to UVA, his Brown squad in 2016 led the nation in ground balls as Tiffany's staff three years in a row has led the nation's best team on the ground. Goalie Alex Rode was named Most Outstanding Player of the 2019 NCAA Tournament after going 4-0 with 43 saves between the pipes. Rode recorded 18 saves against Duke in the NCAA semifinal round and posted 13 saves against Yale in the NCAA final. Freshman Petey LaSalla was stellar all season at the faceoff X, including going a perfect 6-of-6 in overtime periods. LaSalla, a College Crosse (SB Nation) Freshman All-American (1st), finished No. 1 in the ACC with 100 ground balls. He also was No. 2 in the ACC and No. 21 in the nation with a .587 faceoff winning percentage. LaSalla's 216 faceoff wins rank No. 2 in UVA's single-season record book.

In 2018, Tiffany's Cavaliers were No. 5 nationally in assists (7.72), No. 7 in points per game (20.33) and No. 7 in scoring offense (12.61). Michael Kraus became the third Cavalier in program history to reach 80 points in a season, finishing with 83, ranking No. 8 nationally. First-team All-American midfielder Aitken first set a midfielder program record with 51 points in 2018.

During Tiffany's first season on Grounds his Cavalier offense finished No. 1 in the ACC and No. 3 in the nation in three offensive



categories: goals per game (14.40), assists per game (9.13) and points per game (23.53). Aitken shattered UVA's freshmen midfielder record of 29 goals and 40 points. Aitken broke the goals record in eight games. Attackman Kraus was named ACC Freshman of the Year and was the only rookie on the All-ACC team after leading UVA with 34 goals and 56 points.

Tiffany came to Virginia with 12 years of head coaching experience. He spent 10 years at Brown, his alma mater. He led the Bears to Championship Weekend in Philadelphia in 2016 behind a 16-3 record. The 16 wins in 2016 was a program record for the Bears. Brown's offense was potent in 2016, leading the nation with 16.32 goals per game. Under Tiffany's tutelage, nine Brown Bears earned All-America honors in 2016, while Dylan Molloy was the recipient of the 2016 Tewaaraton Trophy and was named by the USILA its most outstanding player and attackman of the year. Brown goalie Jack Kelly was named the nation's most outstanding goalie and the winner of the 2016 Senior CLASS award for men's lacrosse.

Tiffany returned his alma mater to national prominence with Ivy League regular season titles in 2008, 2010, 2015 and 2016 and NCAA Championship berths in 2009, 2015 and 2016. Tiffany was named the New England Coach of the Year in 2008, 2009, 2015 and 2016 and earned Ivy League Coach of the Year honors in 2015 and 2016.

"Stepping into the seat as the head coach of the Virginia's Men's Lacrosse program brings both a tremendous exhilaration and responsibility," Tiffany said after being hired. "I am very fortunate to have been entrusted with this program. It is also clearly understood that the coaches and athletes of Virginia Lacrosse that have come before me have established a very high bar for measuring success in Charlottesville. My staff and I are eager to begin working with the men as we establish the principles and guidelines of our aggressive, fast-paced system of play that relies upon uncompromising fitness, competitive fire and a passion, and joy, for the game of lacrosse."

Tiffany guided his 2015 team to the number one seed in the Ivy League Tournament, an Ivy League championship and NCAA Tournament berth, changing the landscape of college lacrosse with a unique fast break offense that scored 237 goals, averaging 13.94 goals per game, fifth best in the nation.

Since taking over the Brown program in 2007, Tiffany transformed the program from one that was winless in the Ivy League in 2006 into one of the preeminent teams in the Ivy League and the nation.

Tiffany guided Brown to its second Ivy League Championship under his watch in 2010, while also earning a berth in the first-ever Ivy League Playoffs. His team also posted back-to-back winning seasons in 2013 and 2014.

In 2009, Tiffany coached Brown to its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997, before falling in overtime to Johns Hopkins in the NCAA First Round. His 2009 team posted a 12-4 record and was ranked as high as eighth nationally during the season, finishing the season as the 11th ranked squad in the nation.

Tiffany's 2008 squad captured the Ivy League title with a 5-1 league mark, posting an 11-3 record to earn the most wins at Brown since 1994. Brown, the number one ranked team in New England, finished 13th nationally in the final USILA coaches poll, with just six teams in the nation winning more games than the Bears.

In his first season at the helm of the Brown team, Tiffany turned the fortunes of the program in the right direction, guiding the Bears to a 7-7 record in 2007, and a national ranking as high as 18th.

Tiffany came to Brown from Stony Brook, where he was the head lacrosse coach in 2005 and 2006, posting an 18-13 overall mark. His 2006 squad finished second in America East with a 4-1 league mark and was ranked in the Top 20 in two weeks. In 2005, Tiffany's Seawolves appeared in the Top 20 for the first time ever, and were ranked as high as 14th nationally. Tiffany, the 2005 America East Coach of the Year, led Stony Brook to wins over Penn State and Rutgers, as his Seawolves boasted the number-one ranked man-up unit in Division I.

Tiffany arrived at Stony Brook after successful stints at Penn State, Dartmouth, Washington & Lee and LeMoyne. He spent his four years at Penn State (2000-2004) as the top assistant under head coach Glenn Thiel, and was involved in all facets of the lacrosse program as the team's defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator. Tiffany's defensive units were outstanding during his four years, and in 2002, the Nittany Lions led the nation in man-down defense.

Prior to coaching at Penn State, Tiffany was an assistant coach at Dartmouth College, where he spent the 1999 and 2000 seasons under head coach Rick Sowell. In his two seasons as defensive coordinator, the Big Green's goals allowed per game in Ivy League contests dropped from 15.3 to 9.0. Dartmouth earned its first share of the Ivy League title and a berth in the NCAA tournament in 2003.

Tiffany was an assistant coach from 1997-98 at Washington & Lee University. In 1998, the Generals went 13-3 and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament while finishing fifth in the USILA Division III national rankings.

Tiffany began his collegiate coaching career at LeMoyne College, where he served as an assistant coach of men's lacrosse and co-head coach of the women's lacrosse program from 1994-96. A native of LaFayette, N.Y., Tiffany graduated from LaFayette High School where he lettered in football, basketball and lacrosse. Upon graduation from Brown, he taught biology and coached lacrosse and football at the Robert Louis Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, Calif., from 1990-94.

A 1990 graduate of Brown, Tiffany was a two-time team captain and starter on defense for three years. Tiffany played for former Virginia head coach Dom Starsia at Brown. A Biology concentrator, Tiffany played on two Brown teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament (1987 & 1990). He was Co-MVP of the Brown squad that captured its first-ever NCAA playoff victory in 1990 (12-9 vs. UMass). Tiffany capped his career by playing in the North-South Senior All-Star game.

Lars and his wife, Tara, reside in Charlottesville with their daughter, Charlotte.

# SEAN KIRWAN

Sean Kirwan is in his fifth season at Virginia and his seventh season under Lars Tiffany.

UVA was 4-2 during the 2020 season before it canceled by the NCAA on March 12 due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19). The shortened season saw Michael Kraus become just the fourth Cavalier to reach the 100-goal, 100-assist mark for a career.

The third season under Kirwan's offense was a special one for the Cavaliers as UVA tied a program record with 17 wins, capturing NCAA and ACC titles in the process. Virginia's offense hummed all season, finishing No. 7 in the country in three key categories: scoring offense per game (14.10), assists per game (8.60) and points per game (22.70). Virginia also finished No. 4 in the nation in scoring margin per game (3.85). Leading the way was Matt Moore, who became the first player in program history to record 40+ goals and 40+ assists in the same season. Moore finished No. 1 in the ACC and No. 8 in the nation with 89 points (46-43). Dox Aitken, a first-team USILA All-American for the second-straight season, broke his own single-season UVA record for points by a midfielder (52). Aitken also became the only midfielder in program history to reach 100 goals for a career. Ian Laviano led the ACC and was No. 9 in the nation with 51 goals, which ranks No. 4 all-time at UVA on the single-season ledger.

In year number two under Kirwan in 2018, UVA finished No. 5 in the nation in assists per game (7.72) and No. 7 in the nation in both scoring offense (12.61) and points per game (20.33). Aitken first set UVA's single-season record for points by a midfielder with 51 points while earning first-team USILA All-American honors. Michael Kraus became the third Cavalier to tally at least 80 points in a season as he led UVA with 44 goals and 39 assists, earning second-team All-America honors. Moore was named ACC Freshman of the Year after scoring 19 goals and dishing out 15 assists.

During Kirwan's first season at UVA in 2017, his offense finished No. 1 in the ACC and No. 3 in the nation in three offensive categories: goals per game (14.40), assists per game (9.13) and points per game (23.53). Under Kirwan's guidance midfielder Aitken shattered UVA's freshmen midfielder record of 29 goals and 40 points. Aitken broke the goals record in eight games. Kraus was named ACC Freshman of the Year and was the only rookie on the All-ACC team after leading UVA with 34 goals and 56 points.

Prior to UVA, Kirwan spent two seasons at Brown running the offense under Tiffany. Under Kirwan's tutelage in 2016, the Brown offense was potent, leading the nation with 16.32 goals per game. Dylan Molloy was the recipient of the 2016 Tewaaraton Trophy and was named by the USILA its most outstanding player and attackman of the year. Kirwan helped change the landscape of college lacrosse in 2015 with a unique fast break offense that scored 237 goals, averaging 13.94 goals per game, fifth best in the nation.

Kirwan perfected his offensive approach at his alma mater, Tufts, guiding the Division III Jumbos' offense to an NCAA-leading 423 goals in 2014, the most all-time by any team in NCAA lacrosse history (all divisions). His

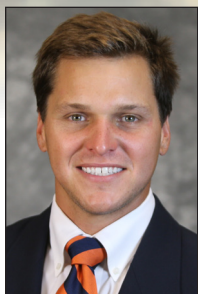
Tufts squad also led the nation in team goals and assists (251). Kirwan coached three 100+ point scorers, the first time in NCAA history that three players from one team scored over 100 points in the same season.

A native of New Jersey, where he attended Mountain Lakes High School, Kirwan graduated from Tufts in 2012, where he broke single season and career goal scoring records with 66 goals in 2011 and 150 career goals. An All-American in 2011 and 2012, he was also an Academic All-American and team captain in 2012 as well as winning the NCAA Division III National Championship with the school in 2010.

Kirwan and his wife, the former Taylor Smith of Guilford, Conn., reside in the Charlottesville area. The couple has one son, Cameron.

# KIP TURNER

Kip Turner is in his fifth season at Virginia and his 10th season under Lars Tiffany.

UVA was 4-2 during the 2020 season before it canceled by the NCAA on March 12 due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19). During the shortened season, goalie Alex Rode was No. 1 in the ACC and No. 16 in the nation with 13.17 saves per game and No. 2 in the ACC and No. 18 in the nation with a .552 save percentage. For the fourth year in a row in 2020, Turner helped UVA finish No. 1 nationally in ground balls per game (43.33).

For the third year in a row in 2019, Turner helped UVA finish No. 1 nationally in ground balls per game (41.55) as the Cavaliers tied a program record for wins (17) while capturing the NCAA and ACC titles. Overseeing faceoffs and goalies, two of Turner's pupils shined in 2019. Alex Rode was named Most Outstanding Player of the 2019 NCAA Tournament after going 4-0 with 43 saves between the pipes. Rode recorded 18 saves against Duke in the NCAA semifinal round and posted 13 saves against Yale in the NCAA final. Freshman Petey LaSalla was stellar all season at the faceoff X, including going a perfect 6-of-6 in overtime periods. LaSalla, a College Crosse (SB Nation) Freshman All-American (1st), finished No. 1 in the ACC with 100 ground balls. He also was No. 2 in the ACC and No. 21 in the nation with a .587 faceoff winning percentage. LaSalla's 216 faceoff wins rank No. 2 in UVA's single-season record book.

Turner also assisted in UVA leading the nation in ground balls in 2018 and 2017. In 2017, UVA averaged 43.33 ground balls per game which was nearly seven more ground balls per game than No. 2 Brown (36.56), Turner's previous coaching stop. Turner helped Brown lead the nation in ground balls in 2016 before he joined Tiffany in Charlottesville for the 2017 campaign.

In 2018, Turner oversaw the emergence of Justin Schwenk at the Faceoff X. Schwenk led the ACC and was No. 12 nationally with the .598 winning percentage. Schwenk also led the ACC in ground balls per game (5.71). Turner also was the face-off coach for Brown, developing Will Gural into an All-American and one of the top face-off men in the nation in 2015 and 2016.

In his first two years at his alma mater, Turner has aided in the development of freshmen goalies. In 2018, Rode led the ACC with 9.20 saves per game. In 2017, Turner aided in the development of first year goalie Griffin Thompson. Thompson went on to tie a UVA freshman goalie single-game record with 18 saves against Robert Morris.

At Brown, Turner helped develop All-Hvy goalies Matt Chriss and Will Round, as well as a slew of young goalkeepers on the Bears squad, including Kelly, who matured into an All-American and a unanimous first team All-Hvy selection. Turner also was the face-off coach for the Bears, developing Will Gural into one of the top face-off men in the nation in 2015 and 2016.

Turner also practiced his trade in the professional ranks, including leading the Chesapeake Bayhawks to two consecutive MLL Championships in 2012 and 2013. Turner was originally selected second overall in the Major League Lacrosse draft by the Boston Cannons, the highest goalie ever picked in a draft. He made an immediate impact, being named the Cannons' Defensive

MVP in 2008. A three-time MLL Defensive Player of the Week in 2010, Turner was named the MLL Goalkeeper of the Year for his outstanding play. Turner was also selected the starting goalie in the MLL All-Star game in 2013. After a nine-year stint in the MLL, Turner decided to retire in the spring of 2016.

A 2007 graduate of the University of Virginia with a bachelor's degree in government, Turner was a four-year letterwinner for the Cavaliers. He was the UVA defensive MVP in 2006, leading the Cavaliers to the ACC Championship and NCAA title. Turner was an All-ACC first team selection in 2007, and named to the All-ACC Tournament team in 2006 and 2007.

Turner was inducted into the Severn High School Hall of Fame in the spring of 2016 for his achievement in soccer, ice hockey and lacrosse. Turner is married to Emy Deyhle Turner and the couple has one daughter.

# 2020 SEASON IN REVIEW

## Game 1 Virginia 12, Loyola 9 Feb. 8 • Charlottesville, Va.

The No. 1 Virginia Cavaliers used a strong first half to outlast the No. 14 Loyola Greyhounds, 12-9, at Klöckner Stadium.

Cavalier goalie Alex Rode tied his career high with 19 saves, including 13 in the first half as Virginia built a 9-3 heading into intermission.

### HOW IT HAPPENED

UVA opened the game on a 4-1 run in the first quarter, netting goals by Ian Laviano, Matt Moore and two from Payton Cormier. Moore's unassisted score at 3:16 in the first capped the run. After Loyola scored an extra-man goal at 13:42 by Adam Poitras, via a Aidan Olmstead helper, The Cavaliers reeled off five-straight goals, taking a commanding 9-2 lead.

Peter Garno started the spurt with his first collegiate goal, while Moore scored two more goals and assisted another. Michael Bienkowski capped the run on a Laviano assist. The seven-goal UVA lead was insurmountable for the Greyhounds, despite finishing the game on a 7-3 streak

### FROM THE LOCKER ROOM

"I loved how physical we played today. We came out with really good energy. We probably had too many penalties because of that physicality and energy, but that's the style of lacrosse we want to play and we just have to rely on our man-down defense to be solid. We did a decent job man-down today, but boy, the guy behind us [Alex Rode] is who bailed us out and allowed us to breathe a little better with Alex Rode being such a wall in the cage. Seeing an extension of what he did last May, and we've seen that in practice and throughout the scrimmages, and it was really wonderful to see that come to fruition in the first game of 2020. Offensively you can see how we can go on big runs. Certainly not happy with how we played lacrosse in the second half offensively. Give credit to Loyola's zone defense and their goalie play, but I thought we became a little tight and we have to make sure we aren't going a little shorter with our possessions and that we're playing a little more free and looser." – Lars Tiffany

The No. 1 Virginia Cavaliers used a strong first quarter to outlast the No. 18 Lehigh Mountain Hawks, 12-8, at Klöckner Stadium.

Michael Kraus led the Cavaliers with four goals and one assist in the winning effort. The assist for Kraus gave him 100 for his career, making him the fourth Cavalier all-time to record 100+ career goals and 100+ career assists. He is also the 10th player in ACC history to accomplish this feat.

### FROM THE LOCKER ROOM

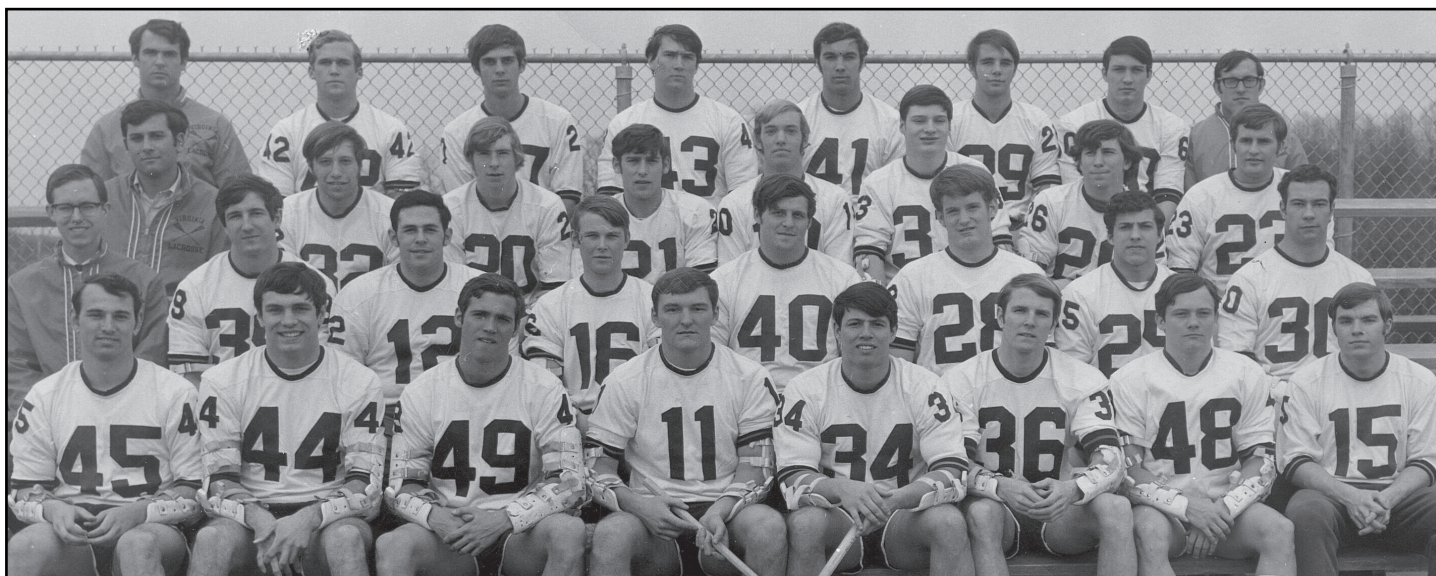

## ADMINISTRATION



### **JAMES E. RYAN** **University President**

James E. Ryan serves as the ninth president of the University of Virginia. A leading expert on law and education, Ryan has written extensively about the ways in which law structures educational opportunity. His articles and essays address such topics as school desegregation, school finance, school choice, standards and testing, pre-K, and the intersection of special education and neuroscience. Ryan is also the coauthor of the textbook "Educational Policy and the Law" and the author of "Five Miles Away, A World Apart," which was published in 2010 by Oxford University Press. Ryan's most recent book, "Wait, What? And Life's Other Essential Questions," based on his popular 2016 commencement speech, was published in 2017 by HarperOne and is a New York Times bestseller. In addition, Ryan has authored articles on constitutional law and theory and has argued before the United States Supreme Court.

Before coming to UVA, Ryan served as dean of the Harvard Graduate School of Education. In this role, Ryan increased the size, strength, and diversity of the faculty through new hires and promotions. He established the Harvard Teacher Fellows program, an innovative teacher training program for Harvard College seniors and recent alumni, and began a school-wide effort to reimagine its master's degree programs. Ryan oversaw an expansion of professional education, including the creation of two new online certificate programs, and launched Usable Knowledge, an online resource designed to broadly disseminate actionable research findings in education. He and colleagues also embarked on an ongoing effort entitled "Fulfilling the Promise of Diversity," intended to prepare students for careers working in diverse environments, and resulting in new courses, prominent speakers, and teaching workshops related to diversity and inclusion. Under his leadership, the school surpassed its campaign goal of \$250 million more than a year ahead of schedule, and raised the largest gift in the school's history, a \$35.5 million gift to establish the Zaentz Early Education Initiative.

Before his deanship, Ryan was the Matheson & Morgenthau Distinguished Professor at the University of Virginia School of Law. He also served as academic associate dean from 2005 to 2009 and founded and directed the school's Program in Law and Public Service. While at Virginia, Ryan received an All-University Teaching

Award, an Outstanding Faculty Award from the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia, and several awards for his scholarship. Ryan has been a visiting professor at Harvard, Yale, and the University of Auckland. He has also served on numerous education boards and commissions, including the U.S. Department of Education's Equity and Excellence Commission and the board of the Maya Angelou Public Charter School in Washington, D.C.

Ryan received his AB summa cum laude from Yale University and his JD from the University of Virginia, which he attended on a full scholarship and from which he graduated first in his class. After law school, Ryan clerked for William H. Rehnquist, the late Chief Justice of the United States, and then worked in Newark, N.J., as a public interest lawyer before entering into teaching. Ryan and his wife, Katie, who is also an alum of the UVA School of Law, have four children.



### **CARLA WILLIAMS** **Director of Athletics**

With a background as a student-athlete, coach and administrator, Carla Williams' approach to leading Virginia is forward thinking. Her focus is on providing opportunities for student-athletes to maximize their college experience while establishing a culture and support system for the sport programs to compete for championships. Above all, her commitment to academic excellence is unwavering.

Williams impact at UVA was recognized when she was named the Women Leaders in College Sports 2019 Administrator of the Year for all NCAA Division I FBS athletics programs

Williams wants student-athletes at UVA to grow, prosper and prepare themselves for their futures away from athletic competitions. To ensure that approach becomes a reality, she announced The Master Plan project in 2018 that will set the course for generations of future Hoos.

The \$180 million Master Plan addresses the immediate needs to upgrade facilities for the Cavalier football program and UVA Olympic Sports. Administrative buildings, sport performance centers and new playing surfaces will be the most visible phases of the project that also includes the demolition of University Hall.

The services and support areas encompassed within the project will have meaningful and lasting impacts on student-athletes in the form of leadership, ethics, stewardship, wellness and academic

achievement.

It is a plan that is aggressive in scope, but one that Williams feels is needed to ensure UVA's place among the nation's leading athletics departments. The end result will provide student-athletes an unsurpassed experience in terms of personal development.

During her short tenure as UVA's athletics director, Williams has witnessed a revival of the Cavalier football program and a history-making performance by the men's basketball team. Under coach Bronco Mendenhall, UVA's football program has gone from a two-win season in 2016 to winning the ACC's Coastal Division in 2019 and playing in the ACC Championship Game and the Orange Bowl

The Virginia men's basketball team won the program's first NCAA Championship in 2019, finishing the tournament with a run of three dramatic come-from-behind victories to cap an epic storyline after UVA exited the championship a year earlier as the first No. 1 seed to lose to a No. 16 seed.

The Cavalier men's lacrosse team captured its eighth national title in 2019 and helped UVA to an eighth-place finish in the Directors' Cup. Virginia also claimed the Capitol One Cup for men's sports in 2019, the second time it won the award since 2015.

In the classroom, UVA student-athletes have set record numbers (496 in 2020) for placement on the ACC Honor Roll, achieved highest grade point average totals in program history and been recognized by the NCAA for outstanding achievement on academic progress reports. A total of five UVA student-athletes were named their sport's respective ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2019-20. Williams' appointment at Virginia in October of 2017 made her the first female African-American athletics director at a Power Five conference institution. At the time, she was the fifth active female athletics director at that level.

Recently, Williams worked on the NCAA's NIL Legislation Solutions Group to examine student-athlete name, image and likeness rights and is a member of the NCAA Federal and State Legislation Working Group.

Prior to Virginia, Williams served as an athletics administrator at the University of Georgia for 13 years and was named deputy director of athletics in 2015. During Williams' tenure as an administrator at Georgia, its athletics teams won 16 NCAA team championships and 37 Southeastern Conference titles.



In her role as deputy director of athletics at Georgia, Williams was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the department and its \$127 million budget. She served as administrator for the Bulldogs' football and Lady Bulldogs' women's basketball programs and also had supervisory responsibility for academic support services, business operations, compliance, event management, external operations, facilities and new construction, human resources, sports facilitators (21 sports and 15 head coaches), sports medicine, strength and conditioning, student services and ticketing. She helped to oversee \$162 million in facility additions, upgrades and improvements for the UGA athletics program.

Williams served as the Georgia Athletic Association's liaison to the president's office, provost's office, general counsel, equal opportunity office and student affairs. She also served as the athletics department's deputy Title IX officer.

Williams has the unique background of competing, coaching and administering at the highest levels of intercollegiate athletics. She was an All-SEC guard on the basketball court, then helped recruit and coach some of the greatest teams in Georgia's history before moving on to become one of the highest-ranking female administrators in Division I athletics.

Williams began her administrative career at Georgia in 2004. She served as associate athletic director (2004-2008), senior associate athletic director (2008-2011) and executive associate athletic director (2011-2015) before being promoted to deputy director of athletics.

Prior to joining the Bulldogs' staff, Williams was an assistant director of athletics at Vanderbilt (2000-03) and an associate director of athletics (2003-04). She oversaw 11 men's and women's sports as well as the Commodores' CHAMPS/Life Skills program. From 1997-1998, Williams was coordinator for student-athlete development and life skills at Florida State. While completing her Ph.D. in sport administration, Williams was also a graduate assistant for athletic academic support from 1998-2000.

Williams was instrumental in Georgia's programming to enhance the lives of its student-athletes and prepare them for a life beyond athletics, including its comprehensive "The Georgia Way" program. She also helped build ties for Bulldog alumni, including the creation of UGA's NFL alumni development program. Her involvement at Georgia included serving as a member of the student-athlete conduct committee and student wellness committee. She was involved in general campus affairs which included serving on the University's

Terry College of Business board of directors and being active in numerous campus personnel search committees.

NCAA and national organization committee membership are a big part of Williams' resume. She served on the executive committee (2010-2014) for the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. She was a member of the Southeastern Conference's executive committee (2009-2011), participated on the NCAA women's basketball issues committee (2010-2014) and was an executive board member of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators (2007-2009).

A native of LaGrange, Ga., Williams was a three-year starter for the Lady Bulldogs from 1987-89. She finished her career with 1,115 points, 425 assists and 285 steals. Those tallies ranked No. 10, No. 2 and No. 3 among Georgia's career leaders at the completion of her career.

Williams was then an assistant coach on hall of fame coach Andy Landers' staff from 1991-96, including teams which reached the 1995 and 1996 Final Fours, finished as NCAA runner-up in 1996 and won the 1991 and 1996 SEC Championships. Following the 1995-96 season, Williams moved into administration and served as UGA's assistant director of compliance from 1996-97 before continuing her ascent up the administrative ranks at Florida State, Vanderbilt and Georgia.

Williams was an active member in her community, local schools and church and was on the board of directors for the Athens Area Community Foundation and LLL Community Group. She has served as a committee member for Oconee County School System projects and been involved in the Athens Clarke County Mentor Program.

In May 2015, Williams was recognized by the Girl Scouts of Historic Georgia as the Athens Woman of Distinction. That same year she was named one of the top-10 senior woman administrators in the NCAA by the website CollegeAD.org.

Williams and her husband Brian, who holds the title of associate professor of public policy at UVA's Frank Batten School of Leadership and Public Policy, have three children: daughters, Carmen and Camryn, and a son, Joshua.
