AIR FORCE (0-0) at No. 1 VIRGINIA (0-0) 11 a.m. ET, Saturday, February 5 Klöckner Stadium, Charlottesville, VA

Air Force opens the 2022 regular season against defending 2021 NCAA champions, No. 1 Virginia, Saturday morning, in Charlottesville, Virginia. The Cavaliers have won two straight NCAA titles.

LEADING FROM THE FRONT

Air Force seniors Quentin Carlile and Brian MIchael have been selected to captain the 2022 Falcons. Carlile is a two-time All-SOCON selection and a preseason All-ASUN selection, while Michael, with great charisma, was the leading face off man in 2021.

WELCOME BACK

Air Force returns six starters and 30 letter-winners from last season, highlighted by senior defender Quentin Carlile and 2021 leading scorers Ethan Grandolfo and Brenden Crouse.

The Air Force offense also returns junior attack man Brandon Dodd, who put himself on the map after going off on Duke at Koskinen Stadium (Feb. 1, 2020) in his freshman season. Dodd scored four goals and four assists in his collegiate opener, leading the Falcons to an upset victory. Dodd battled injury most of last season but is expected to be game ready at the open of 2022.

The Air Force defense returns 2022 preseason All-ASUN selection, Quentin Carlile, who was twice tabbed All-SOCON team. Q, as he is referred to by teammates, is responsible for the most career caused turnovers on the squad. Carlile is joined by sophomore defenders Chris Bardak and James Chastain who both played in all 13 games as freshmen, last season. The young duo combined for 24 caused turnovers in 2021.

In goal, the Falcons return Jason Rose who appeared in nine games, played eight games as goalie and started in goal the last four games. Rose was SOCON Defensive Player of the Week (Apr. 3) for a stellar game in the win against No. 15 Richmond, he earned USILA DI Team of the Week for the same performance. A 2021 SOCON All-Tournament Team selection, Rose maintained a 10.41 GAA and a .526 save percentage.

WELCOME TO THE ASUN

The ASUN Conference proudly announced the formation of ASUN Men's Lacrosse. This is the second time in nine years that the ASUN has built a new Men's Lacrosse conference. The partnership with the Southern Conference continues as the ASUN again builds opportunities for student-athletes.

The ASUN first built a Men's Lacrosse conference in Fall 2012 when it announced ASUN Men's Lacrosse with a founding membership of Furman, High Point, Jacksonville, Mercer, Richmond, and VMI. That group began play in the 2013-14 season and the Richmond Spiders earned an automatic bid into the NCAA Championship. Today, the ASUN announces a new group of six that includes Air Force, Bellarmine, Cleveland State, Detroit Mercy, Robert Morris, and Utah.

THE HARD WAY

Air Force's first four games of 2022 come against perennial top-15 teams. The Falcons played exhibitions against No. 5 Notre Dame and No. 4 North Carolina in late January. They continue the difficult path against back-to-back national champs No. 1 Virginia in the season opener, and follow up with an always-tough No. 12 Denver, January 12.

AT THE HELM

Bill Wilson enters his fourth season as the head lacrosse coach at Air Force in the 2022 season. Wilson, who served as the interim head coach in the 2018 season and took the helm of the program in 2019, has 13 years coaching experience at the Academy. He is 22-26 in three seasons as Air Force's head coach and is 63-68 in nine career years as a head coach.

2021 SEASON RECAP

Air Force lacrosse concluded the 2021 season with a 4-9 overall record and a 3-3 mark in the league. The Falcons made their fourth SOCON Tournament appearance in five seasons with the league. Air Force will be moving to the ASUN Conference in 2022. Three Falcons earned SOCON post-season honors in All-SOCON first-team selection Quentin Carlile, second-team selection Brenden Crouse. Ethan Grandolfo earned an All-Freshmen team nod for achievements in the cancelled 2020 campaign.

STAFF ADDITIONS

Air Force's leading all-time leading face-off man, Trent Harper, has joined the staff as a volunteer assistant coach while serving in the Air Force in Colorado Springs. Harper was a two-time first-team All-SOCON face off man and holds the Academy record for career face off wins (550, 2016-2019)

REPORTING FOR DUTY

The Falcons added 16 newcomers to the squad in 2022. Word around the practice field is some of these freshmen will see action early on.

PRESEASON ASUN

The ASUN Conference office has announced its 2022 Men's Lacrosse Preseason All-Conference awards Wednesday as voted on by the league's six head coaches. Air Force and Utah are expected to battle for the ASUN crown after both programs tied with 31 overall votes in the Preseason Coaches Poll.

The Falcons received three first-place nods while the Utes pulled in two and Robert Morris collected the final tally in the third position in the poll. Bellarmine is projected to finish in fourth place while Detroit Mercy and Cleveland State round out the rankings.

Robert Morris' Corson Kealey was selected as the ASUN Preseason Player of the Year, while the rest of the preseason superlatives were awarded to Jon Robbins of Bellarmine (Unanimous Preseason Defensive Player of the Year) and Robert Morris' Jake Boudreau (Preseason Midfielder of the Year).

HEAD COACH BILL WILSON

Fourth season, 13th at Air Force

Bill Wilson enters his fourth season as the head lacrosse coach at Air Force in the 2022 season. Wilson, who served as the interim head coach in the 2018 season and took the helm of the program in 2019, has 13 years coaching experience at the Academy. He is 22-26 in three seasons as Air Force's head coach and is 63-68 in nine career years as a head coach.

After leading Air Force to a 5-10 record in his interim year, coach Wilson guided the Falcons back to their winning ways in the 2019 campaign, going 10-5 on the season with a 6-1 mark

in Southern Conference play, garnering the team's third regular-season league title in four seasons with the conference. Under Wilson's guidance, the Falcons saw a USILA All-America honorable mention in Brandon Jones and seven players added to All-Southern Conference teams, highlighted by a Defensive Player of the year nod in Jones. Wilson was positioned for a winning season in 2020 after pulling off a 4-3 record prior to conference play, highlighted by an upset win at No. 7 Duke in the season opener. The remainder of the season was canceled due to the COVID-19 global pandemic. In the Falcons' last season with the Southern Conference, Wilson guided the team to their fourth SoCon tournament appearance in six seasons.

In 2017 Wilson played an integral role in program's success, assisting the Falcons to their second-straight SoCon championship title and the team's fifth visit to the NCAA tournament. In 2016 he helped Air Force to its highest national ranking to date (No. 8) and the program's longest win streak (15 games) for the team's best finish in program history. Air Force capped the record-breaking season at 15-3 with a perfect mark in conference action, notching an overtime upset over perennial powerhouse, Duke, en route to the program's fourth NCAA tournament appearance.

Wilson has had a hand in coaching all five of the program's Major Lacrosse League draftees. Erik Smith and Mike Crampton were drafted to the Boston Cannons and Colorado Mammoth, respectively, in the wake of the 2014 season. Following the 2016 campaign, Christopher Allen was drafted to the Charlotte Hounds, while Alex Warden was selected by the Denver Outlaws. In the 2019, Brandon Jones was drafted to the Denver Outlaws. Wilson is also a part of the staff that guided five Falcons (six times) to All-America honorable mention status.

Wilson was named the 2014 USILA Division I Outstanding Assistant Coach as he helped lead the program to unprecedented heights, leading the Falcons to their best season ever. The 2014 Falcons compiled an 11-6 overall record and secured their highest win total since 1988. The Falcons were able to clinch a share of the regular season conference title before going on to win the ECAC Tournament title, earning their first NCAA bid since 1988. Air Force went on to host Richmond in the NCAA play-in game, capturing its first NCAA tournament win in program history, before dropping a first-round match-up to defending national champion Duke.

Wilson came to the Academy in the summer of 2009 after spending six years as the head coach at Dartmouth College. During his tenure with the Big Green, he compiled a 40-44 overall record, while coaching nine first-team all-league players, one Ivy League Rookie of the Year, 18 first-team All-New England players and seven players selected in the Major League Lacrosse Draft. Signature wins for Dartmouth during Wilson's six-year stint include an upset of fourth-ranked Maryland in 2005, a pair of victories of top-10 ranked Notre Dame and a win over 10th-ranked league rival Princeton in 2008.

Wilson's coaching career began at Princeton University in 1995, where he helped coach the Tigers to the 1996 lvy League and NCAA championships. He then spent five years as the first assistant coach and defensive coordinator at Hofstra from 1997-2001, when The Pride made four trips in five years to the NCAA Tournament, reaching the quarterfinals in both 1998 and 2000.

Before taking over the helm at Dartmouth in 2004, Wilson served as the first assistant coach and defensive coordinator at Cornell in 2003, helping the Big Red to its first Ivy League title in 16 years.

A 1994 graduate of Loyola College, Wilson was a four-year letterwinner and four-year starter at defense for the Greyhounds. Wilson's teams at Loyola qualified for the NCAA Tournament each season, while advancing to the quarterfinals three times. He was also honored as a senior by earning a spot in the 1994 North-South All-Star game.

Wilson, a native of Syracuse, N.Y., graduated from West Genesee High School, where he was a two-sport athlete in hockey and lacrosse. In 1990, Wilson's teams won the New York State Class "A" championships in both sports. In 1989, he represented the Central region in the Empire State Games, earning a gold medal for lacrosse.

THE ACADEMY EXPERIENCE

The United States Air Force Academy offers a four-year program of instruction and experience designed to educate, train and inspire men and women to become officers of character, motivated to lead the U.S. Air Force in service to our nation. Each cadet graduates with a bachelor of science degree and a commission as a second lieutenant in the Air Force.

COURSE OF STUDY

Cadets are exposed to a balanced curriculum that provides the knowledge, skills and responsibilities essential to a career Air Force officer. The entire USAFA experience is integrated and mapped to achieve a set of desired outcomes in every graduate.

The core academic curriculum includes courses in basic sciences, engineering, social sciences and humanities. Cadets take additional elective courses to complete requirements for one of 32 major areas of study. About 50 percent of the cadets complete majors in science and engineering; the remainder graduate in the social sciences and humanities. Some of the most popular majors include management, aeronautical engineering, foreign area studies, history, behavioral science, civil engineering, astronautical engineering, electrical engineering and engineering mechanics.

FACULTY COMPOSITION

The majority of the Academy's faculty members, more than 500 total, are Air Force officers. They are selected primarily from career-officer volunteers who have established outstanding records of performance and dedication. Each has at least a master's degree and more than 55 percent have doctorates or other terminal degrees in their field of study.

Faculty members are intensely focused on cadet learning as an integral part of their officer development. The Air Force Academy has been ranked No. 1 in the nation for the most accessible and involved faculty.

About 30 percent of the faculty are civilians who bring great depth of disciplinary and educational expertise and provide academic stability and continuity. To provide greater contributions by a diverse faculty, the Academy has several distinguished visiting professors and endowed professors who serve one or more years. Officers from other services, as well as officers from allied countries are also members of the faculty. Distinguished civilian and military lecturers also share their expertise with the cadets during the academic year.

ATHLETIC PROGRAM

The Academy's athletic program is designed to improve physical fitness, teach athletic skills and develop leadership qualities. To achieve its goals, the Academy offers some of the most extensive physical education, intramural sports and intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation. Cadets take at least three different physical education courses each year.

MILITARY EDUCATION AND TRAINING

An air, space and cyberspace-oriented military education, training and leadership program begins with basic cadet training and continues throughout the four years. Seniors are responsible for the organizational leadership of the cadet wing, while juniors and sophomores seek to develop team and interpersonal leadership and instructional skills. Cadets are projected into as many active leadership roles as possible to prepare them to be effective Air Force officers.

Fundamental concepts of military organization -- drill, ethics, honor, Air Force heritage and physical training -- are emphasized the first summer during basic cadet training. Freshmen then study the military role in United States society as well as the mission and organization of the Air Force. Sophomores receive instruction in communication skills and juniors study the combat and operational aspects of the Air Force.

The Academy offers courses in flying, navigation, soaring and parachuting, building from basic skills to instructor duties. Some cadets may fly light aircraft with the Cadet Flying Team.

Summer training for cadets is divided into three, three-week training periods. There are a variety of programs available and each cadet is required to complete two training periods each summer with leave during the other period. All new cadets take six weeks of basic cadet training in their first summer.

Combat survival training is a required three-week program during cadets' second summer. For other second-summer training periods, cadets have options such as working with Airmen in an operational unit at an Air Force installation, airborne parachute training, soaring or basic free-fall parachute training. During their last two summers, cadets are offered leadership training as supervisors or instructors in the summer programs listed above.

Extracurricular activities also are an integral part of the education program. The ski club, drum and bugle corps, cadet chorale and forensics are just a few of the programs available.

HISTORY OF THE AIR FORCE ACADEMY

In 1948, a board of leading civilian and military educators was appointed to plan the curriculum for an academy that would meet the needs of the newly established Air Force. The board determined that Air Force requirements could not be met by expanding the other service academies and recommended an Air Force Academy be established without delay.

In 1949, then Secretary of the Air Force W. Stuart Symington appointed a commission to assist in selecting a site and on April 1, 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorized creation of the United States Air Force Academy. After considering 580 sites in 45 states, the commission narrowed the choice to three locations. The summer of 1954, Secretary of the Air Force Harold Talbott selected a site near Colorado Springs, Colo. The state of Colorado contributed \$1 million toward purchase of the property. In July 1955, the first Academy class entered interim facilities at Lowry Air Force Base, Denver, while construction began. It was sufficiently completed for occupancy by the cadet wing in late August 1958. Initial construction cost was \$142 million.

Women entered the Academy on June 28, 1976, as members of the class of 1980.
