QUICK HITTERS

THE ACC IS THE DEEPEST P4 CONFERENCE IN THE NATION

- The ACC has proven it is the deepest Power 4 conference this season:
 - 5 teams at 1 loss or fewer in conference play, tied for most among all FBS conferences.
 - 7 conference games have gone into overtime, the most by any conference since 2000.
- Nearly half (42.0%) of the ACC's conference games have been decided by a one-score final margin.
- The ACC has the strongest non-conference strength of schedule among all Power 4 conferences:
 - Scheduled to play 26 total P4 and Notre Dame non-conference games, the most among all FBS conferences.
 - Played 19 non-conference games versus P4 teams and Notre Dame to date, the most of any conference:
 ACC - 19: Big 12 - 14: SEC - 14: Big Ten - 12.
 - 7 games remaining against Power 4 teams, 3 more than the other three P4 conferences combined.
- The ACC has won plenty of high-profile games this year:
 - 6 different ACC teams have defeated an AP Top 10 opponent this season.
- 9 different ACC teams have defeated a Top 15 opponent.

2025 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

5 TEAMS IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF RANKINGS

- The ACC had five teams ranked in the second College Football Playoff (CFP) Rankings released on Nov. 11. Miami leads the ACC contingent at No. 15, followed closely by Georgia Tech at No. 16, Virginia at No. 19, Louisville at No. 20 and Pitt at No. 22.
- No. 15 Miami Climbed three spots from No. 18 after a key conference win, marking the Hurricanes' highest CFP ranking of the season.
- No. 16 Georgia Tech Moved up one spot from No. 17 following its second open week of the season.
- No. 19 Virginia Dropped five spots after a loss to Wake Forest, in which starting QB Chandler Morris was knocked out of the game in the second quarter due to an injury.
- No. 20 Louisville Also fell five spots after being upset by California, 29-26, in overtime.
- No. 22 Pitt Rose one spot from No. 23 following an open week before hosting No. 9 Notre Dame this Saturday, November 15, at Noon ET on ABC.
- The ACC is one of only three conferences with five or more teams ranked in this week's CFP Top 25.

5 TEAMS IN AP TOP 25 POLL

- For the first time this season, the ACC placed five teams in the Associated Press (AP) Top 25 Poll (Nov. 9).
- The ACC is one of only three conferences nationally with five or more teams ranked in this week's AP Top 25.
- In the Week 12 AP Poll, Georgia Tech leads the way at No. 14, followed by Miami (No. 16), Louisville (No. 19), Virginia (No. 20) and Pitt (No. 23), making its season debut in the rankings.
- Prior to this week, the ACC had four teams ranked in six different polls this season (Weeks 2, 6, 7, 9, 10, and 11).
- Georgia Tech has been ranked for nine straight weeks, entering the poll in Week 4 (Sept. 14).
- Miami has appeared in all 12 AP Polls this season and has been ranked for 29 consecutive weeks overall.
- Louisville is ranked for the fourth straight week, having rejoined the Top 25 on Oct. 19.
- Virginia returned to the AP Top 25 for the first time since 2019 in Week 6 (Sept. 28) and is now ranked for seven consecutive weeks.
- Pitt entered the Top 25 at No. 23 this week (Week 12), marking its first ranking since Week 7 of the 2024 season.
- SMU also received votes in the AP Top 25 Poll.

5 TEAMS IN AFCA COACHES POLL

- For the first time this season, the ACC had five teams ranked in the US LBM AFCA Coaches Poll (Nov. 9).
- The conference is one of just three nationally to feature five or more ranked teams this week.
- In the Week 11 poll, Georgia Tech headlines the group at No. 12, followed by Miami (No. 16), Virginia (No. 19), Louisville (No. 21), and Pitt (No. 23).
- Before this week, the ACC consistently placed four teams in the rankings for four consecutive weeks (Weeks 7–10).
- Georgia Tech has maintained a spot in the poll for nine straight weeks, first appearing in Week 4 (Sept. 14).
- Miami remains a model of consistency, ranked in every Coaches Poll this season and peaking at No. 2 in Week 7 (Oct. 12).
- Louisville holds a top-25 position for the fourth consecutive week, returning to the rankings in Week 8 (Oct. 19).
- Virginia continues its strong run, appearing in the poll for the seventh week in a row, currently sitting at No. 19.
- Pitt entered the Top 25 for the first time this year, coming in at No. 23.
- SMU also received votes in this week's poll.





#15 Miami (7-2, 3-2 ACC)

Extra, Extra!

- Miami MUST be ranked higher than Notre Dame. With identical records and similar metrics, the head-to-head win is the separating factor. The Hurricanes have more wins vs. Top 25, more wins vs. FPI Top 35 and more wins vs. SP+ Top 35 than Notre Dame. Miami also has a stronger remaining strength of schedule.
- UM ranks higher in ESPN's FPI than both BYU and Oklahoma and has more wins vs. FPI Top 35 teams, more wins vs. SP+ Top 35 teams and by far the best win against a CFP contender than both teams, with its win over No. 10 Notre Dame versus Oklahoma's best, Tennessee, and BYU's best, Utah.

#16 Georgia Tech (8-1, 5-1 ACC)

Quick Glance

- 1 of only 13 P4 teams with 8 or more wins
- 4 blowout wins by more than 14 points
- 3-0 in non-conference games on the season
- 2-0 in close games decided by 4 points or fewer
- 1-0 versus AP Top 25 teams (at time of game)
- 3 wins over teams above .500 on the season
- 10-game winning streak at home (5th-longest streak)
- #16 Strength of Record (ESPN)
- 1 of only 8 teams to rank in the top 30 in both red zone offense and defense

Extra, Extra!

- Georgia Tech is a better team than BYU, Oklahoma and Utah. To start, the Yellow Jackets have a stronger win (vs. No. 12-ranked team) than any of these teams (BYU vs. No. 23, Oklahoma vs. No. 14 and Utah vs. No. 17).
- With the same 8-1 record as BYU, GT has more blowout wins (+14 points), no blowout losses (BYU has 1) and a larger margin of victory versus their common opponent in Colorado.
- GT has a better record than Oklahoma (7-2), no blowout losses (Oklahoma has 1), scored more points versus their common opponent in Temple and has just as many blowout wins (4).
- GT has a better record than Utah (7-2), a stronger record in close games (2-0 vs. 0-1), and a stronger strength of record (ESPN).
- Georgia Tech is averaging 8.64 yards per play on first down this season, the most in the FBS. (Stats Perform)

#19 Virginia (8-2, 5-1 ACC)

Quick Glance

- High-quality road win over CFP contender Louisville
- 1 of just 8 teams with a road win vs. a CFP Top-15 team
- 1 of only 13 P4 teams with 8 or more wins
- 3 blowout wins by more than 14 points
- 3 wins in overtime on the year
- 2 wins versus SP+ Top 35 teams
- 2 wins versus FPI Top 40 teams
- 4 wins over teams above .500 on the season
- #33 Strength of Record (ESPN)
- 1 of 10 teams to rank in the top 20 of both 3rd-down offense & defense

Extra, Extra!

- QB Chandler Morris missed most of Saturday's game vs. Wake Forest (Nov. 8), leaving the contest after being on the receiving end of a personal foul on a late hit after having slid at the end of a long gain.
- The Cavaliers rank 28th in Sport Source's Team Offensive Ratings, and rank in the top 27 nationally in first downs, scoring offense and fewest turnovers lost.
- Virginia also has a top-25 defense in terms of defensive touchdowns, turnovers gained and interceptions.
- Virginia is one of five FBS teams that rank within the top 35 in the FBS in total offense per game (35th), rushing defense per game (30th) and takeaways per game (t-33rd). (Stats Perform)

#20 Louisville (7-2, 4-2 ACC)

Quick Glance

- Only team with a win on the road at a Top-2 opponent
- 2 wins against CFP Top 25 teams 1 of only 4 teams with multiple wins vs. such teams
- 2 wins versus FPI Top 35 teams
- 2 wins versus SP+ Top 35 teams.
- 2 losses both came in OT by a combined 6 points

Extra Extral

- Louisville's Isaac Brown missed the entirety of their game Saturday vs. California (Nov. 8). Isaac leads the nation in ypc (8.59) and has five (5) 100-yard rushing games, including a 200-yard game versus Boston College.
- Louisville has the same overall record as both Oklahoma and Utah (7-2), yet has more conference wins than either team and a stronger win than both schools with its win over No. 2 Miami, while Oklahoma beat No. 14 Tennessee and Utah beat No. 17 Cincinnati.
- The Cardinals are 1 of only 11 teams in all of FBS to rank in the top 30 in both rushing (22nd) and passing (28th) defense on the season.
- Louisville has scored 24 points or more in 23 straight games, a streak that currently leads all of FBS.

#22 Pitt (7-2, 5-1 ACC)

Quick Glance

- 5-game winning streak (8th-longest active streak in FBS
- 6 blowout wins by more than 14 points
- 1 of 10 teams with 6 or more wins by 15 points or more
- 3-1 record on the road in true away games
- 3 wins over teams above .500 on the season
- High-quality loss to CFP contender Louisville
- 8th in ESPN's Remaining Strength of Schedule rankings
- #13 in ESPN's Game Control Rankings

Extra, Extra!

- Pitt finishes the season with the strongest schedule in the country, facing No. 10 Notre Dame, No. 17 Georgia Tech and No. 18 Miami. Winning two of those three affirms Pitt is a playoff team.
- Pitt's defense is forcing 3-and-outs on 29.6 percent of defensive drives this season, the most in the ACC and ninth-most in the FBS. (Stats Perform)
- Pitt has scored 57 points off takeaways this season, the most in the ACC and tied for the 22nd-most in the FBS. (Stats Perform)
- The Panthers' defense ranks in the top 10 in all of FBS in rushing defense (3rd; 80.9 ypg), tackles-for-loss (5th; 7.8 pg) and fourth-down conversion percentage (8th; 33.3%).
- Pitt's offense ranks in the top 10 in all of FBS in yards per point (2nd; 10.76), points per minute (6th; 1.35), scoring offense (6th; 39.7 ppg) and passing offense (10th; 302.6 ypg).

SMU (7-3, 5-1 ACC)

Quick Glance

- High-quality win over CFP contender Miami
- 5-1 record in conference play
- 4 blowout wins of more than 14 points
- Only team in FBS to force a turnover in 10 games
- Only team in FBS to rank in the top five in both interceptions and fumble recoveries
- #23 in ESPN's Football Power Index Rankings

Extra, Extra!

- SMU has forced 26 turnovers this season, the most in the FBS.
- SMU has eight games this season with multiple takeaways, the most in the FBS. (*Stats Perform*)
- SMU has allowed opponents to score 65.8 percent of the time on red zone drives this season, the second-lowest mark in FBS behind only Ohio State. (Stats Perform)
- SMU's offense has scored 24+ points in 9 of 10 games on the season. The Mustangs have 13 touchdown drives of 2 minutes or shorter on the season.





ACC AVAILABILITY REPORTING

- The ACC announced on July 22, 2025, two new policies to enhance the safety and well-being of ACC student-athletes in the 2025-26 academic year.
- (1) Institutional event security plans will limit access to the competition area in football and men's and women's basketball
- (2) the availability status of student-athletes will be reported before each conference game in football, baseball, men's and women's basketball.
- Before each conference game, a team will disclose any student-athlete whose availability for the upcoming game is in question. A student-athlete can be listed on the Availability Report if their status is uncertain for any reason (e.g., injury or illness, academic or other eligibility issue, personal or family matter, etc.); however, only the status and not the specific reason will be publicly reported.
- In football, a report will be submitted two days before each Conference game (e.g., Thursday before a Saturday game) with an update on the day before the game and on game day.
- For each report submitted before game day, studentathletes will be designated as Available, Probable, Questionable, or Out for the upcoming game. Game Day Reports will be submitted two hours before each game. For this report, student-athletes will be designated as Available, Game Time Decision, or Out.
- All availability reports and the full conference policy will be available to the public and media on the ACC's website www.theACC.com.

* This policy is intended to help protect student-athletes and staff members from outside entities seeking to obtain inside information about availability and participation, including but not limited to injuries. It will also reinforce to athletes and staff the sensitivity of such information.

Statement from ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips, Ph.D., on the Future ACC Football Scheduling Model

"We have been incredibly intentional throughout our discussions on ACC Football, including the future of our conference schedule. Today, the Athletic Directors of the 17 football-playing institutions overwhelmingly supported a regular season schedule that includes nine conference games and a minimum of 10 games each year against Power 4 opponents. This positions the ACC as one of only two leagues committed to having every team annually play a minimum of 10 games against Power 4 teams. There will be additional discussions and more details to be determined, but today's decision showcases the commitment and leadership of our ADs in balancing what is best for strengthening the conference and their respective programs. As specified in the Conference constitution, the model will be presented to the Faculty Athletics Representatives for formal adoption."

ESPN'S COLLEGE GAMEDAY HEADED TO PITT

- ESPN announced Sunday, November 9, that its iconic college football pregame show, *College GameDay Built by The Home Depot*, will broadcast live from the North Shore of Pittsburgh on Saturday, November 15, from 9 a.m. to noon, ahead of the No. 24 Pitt Panthers' Week 12 matchup with No. 10 Notre Dame at Acrisure Stadium.
- This marks *College GameDay*'s first visit to Pittsburgh since Thursday, September 1, 2022, when the Panthers defeated West Virginia, 38–31, in the return of the Backyard Brawl.
- Prior to that, the show last appeared at a Pitt home game on a Saturday when the Panthers hosted Notre Dame on September 3, 2005.
- Overall, this will be the fourth time Pittsburgh has hosted the broadcast and the third time on a Saturday.
- This will be the second time *College GameDay* has traveled to an ACC campus this year after broadcasting live from Coral Gables, Florida, in Week 4 as the then-No. 4 Miami Hurricanes knocked off in-state rival Florida. 26-7.

EIGHT ACC TEAMS ARE GOING BOWLING

- The ACC already has eight teams eligible for postseason play with at least six wins.
- Georgia Tech was the first to secure a bowl berth, defeating Virginia Tech 35-20 on Oct. 11 (Week 7).
- Virginia followed, earning eligibility with a 22-20 win over Washington State on Oct. 18 (Week 8).
- In Week 9 (Oct. 25), Pitt (53-34 vs. NC State), Miami (42-7 vs. Stanford), and Louisville (38-24 vs. Boston College) all reached six wins.
- Week 10 (Nov. 1) saw SMU become the sixth team eligible after an overtime win over then-No. 10 Miami, 26-20.
- In Week 11 (Nov. 8), California upset No. 15 Louisville 26-20 (OT), and Wake Forest defeated No. 14 Virginia 16-9, both clinching bowl eligibility with Top-15 victories.

STRONGEST NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

■ At the start of the 2025 season, the ACC was scheduled to play 26 games against peer Power 4 conference opponents and Notre Dame in 2025, the most of any conference by at least eight games.

ALL EYES ON CORAL GABLES, CANES IN WEEK 4

- The spotlight returned to Coral Gables in Week 4 ,as ESPN's College GameDay Built by The Home Depot went live from the University of Miami as the undefeated Hurricanes hosted the Florida Gators in a primetime Sunshine State showdown on Saturday, September 20, at 7:30 p.m. ET on ABC.
- It marked the 26th time that Miami has played in a game featured on GameDay and the ninth time as the host site. It was also the fourth Miami-Florida matchup selected for GameDay, joining the high-profile meetings in 2002, 2008 and 2019, and just the first in Coral Gables.
- The Hurricanes welcomed GameDay back to Coral Gables for the first time since September 26, 2020, when then-No. 12 Miami hosted Florida State.
- In addition to ESPN's presence, the ACC Network's ACC Huddle was also live from Coral Gables, adding to the atmosphere surrounding the rivalry showdown between Miami and Florida.

- Belichick (six Super Bowl wins) and Reich (one) are the only two college football head coaches who have also won a Super Bowl as either a head coach or coordinator in the NFL.
- Several ACC programs also feature General Managers with deep NFL ties, including Ron Rivera (Cal), John Garrett (Duke), Michael Lombardi (North Carolina) and Andrew Luck (Stanford), along with a growing number of former NFL stars contributing across coaching staffs and player development roles.

ACC CONTINUES PARTNERSHIP WITH COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF FOUNDATION

- The ACC announced its plans to partner with the College Football Playoff Foundation (CFPF) again as part of this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week (September 13-20). The initiatives include support for this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week, Big Day for Teachers and the distribution of grant funds to support teachers in Charlotte.
- For the third straight year, the ACC will partner with a local Charlotte Mecklenburg School (CMS) to remodel a space that will directly benefit the school's students on a daily basis. In 2024, the conference worked with members of the Statesville Road Elementary administration, teachers and staff who were the recipients of a \$50,000 Extra Yard makeover. Additional details on this year's makeover will be announced in the future, as this will be the first year the conference will undertake two classroom makeovers.
- Since the inception of the ACC and CFP Foundation's partnership, over \$1.5 million has been given to support teachers in the ACC footprint.

2025 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SET FOR 8 P.M. ET

- The 2025 ACC Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. ET on Saturday, December 6, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina, on ABC. The league's football championship game will showcase the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.
- The 8 p.m. ET kickoff marks the 16th time in the last 17 years that the game will be held in primetime. Since its inception in 2005, a total of 14 different teams have competed in the championship game.
- Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has hosted 14 of the last 15 ACC Football Championship Games. The ACC, Carolina Panthers, and the Charlotte Sports Foundation have an agreement to keep the championship game in Charlotte through the 2030 season.
- The winner of the conference championship game has advanced to the National Championship Game or competed in the College Football Playoff in nine of the last 12 seasons, including both of the two participating teams last year, with the ACC being one of only three multi-bid leagues in 2024.

CLEMSON PICKED AS PRESEASON FAVORITE IN 2025 ACC FOOTBALL MEDIA POLL

- Defending ACC Champion Clemson has been selected as the preseason favorite to win the 2025 Atlantic Coast Conference football title, following a vote of more than 180 media members credentialed for the 2025 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- The Tigers are coming off a strong 2024 campaign in which they posted a 10–4 overall record, went 7–1 in conference play, and captured the ACC Championship title. Clemson also made its seventh College Football Playoff appearance and finished the season ranked No. 11 in the final AFCA Coaches Poll and No. 14 in the AP Poll.
- In the media voting, Clemson was picked to repeat as ACC Champion on 167 ballots.
- Miami received seven first-place votes, followed by Florida State with four, while SMU and Georgia Tech each garnered two. Virginia Tech received one first-place vote.
- Clemson led all teams with 3,083 points, while Miami (2,679) and SMU (2,612) were second and third, respectively. Georgia Tech (2,397) was picked fourth, while Louisville (2,370) came in fifth.
- Duke (1,973) was picked to finish sixth in the preseason predictions, ahead of Florida State (1,920) in seventh, North Carolina (1,611) in eighth, Pitt (1,571) in ninth, NC State (1,505) in 10th, Virginia Tech (1,412) in 11th and Syracuse (1,381) in 12th.
- Rounding out the preseason poll were Boston College (953) in 13th, Virginia (871) in 14th, California (659) in 15th, Wake Forest (576) in 16th and Stanford (426) in 17th

- Powered by a conference-best 11 selections, preseason favorite Clemson headlines the 2025 All-ACC Preseason Football Team. A total of 10 ACC programs were represented on the 27-player squad, which was voted on by over 180 credentialed media members at the 2025 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte.
- Behind Clemson, Pitt had three players named to the preseason team, while Duke, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Miami and SMU each had two. Florida State, NC State and Syracuse each placed one.
- This year's preseason squad includes 16 returning All-ACC honorees from 2024, including 10 first-team selections, five second-team picks and one third-team honoree. Notably, it features both of last season's ACC Rookies of the Year: Louisville running back Isaac Brown (Offensive) and Clemson linebacker Sammy Brown (Defensive).

KLUBNIK NAMED PRESEASON PLAYER OF THE YEAR

- Clemson senior quarterback Cade Klubnik was voted the 2025 ACC Preseason Player of the Year, receiving 146 votes.
- Klubnik is coming off a breakout 2024 season, leading the Tigers to an ACC title and a College Football Playoff berth. He accounted for 43 total touchdowns, completing 308-of-486 passes for 3,639 yards and 36 touchdowns, while rushing for 463 yards and seven scores. He ranked in the top 20 nationally in five major categories, including third in both passing touchdowns (36) and total touchdowns (43). His 21 passing touchdowns of 20-plus yards were the most in the FBS.
- Georgia Tech's Haynes King (9), SMU's Kevin Jennings (5), Miami's Carson Beck (4) and Virginia Tech's Kyron Drones (4) also received votes, as did eight other players.

ACC & ESPN/ACCN INTRODUCE ENHANCED REPLAY TRANSPARENCY FOR 2025 FOOTBALL SEASON

- For the 2025 season, audiences watching ACC officiated matchups on Friday night on either ESPN/ ESPN2 or ACC Network and ACC Network's primetime Saturday games will hear the real-time discussions among the Referee, instant replay official in the stadium, and the ACC's Collaborative Instant Replay Official located in the ACC's Game Day Operations Center in Charlotte.
- While the ACC began sharing Game Day Operations Center video with ESPN in 2023, sharing audio of the replay discussions represents a significant next step in transparency. Last season, the ACC conducted a limited experiment, allowing ESPN officiating analyst Matt Austin to listen to replay conversations during a November 21 Thursday night game between NC State and Georgia

NEW HEAD COACHES IN 2025

- After over two decades of dominance in the NFL, Bill Belichick was hired for his first-ever college head coaching job at North Carolina in December 2024. Widely considered one of the greatest coaches in football history, Belichick won six Super Bowls and 17 division titles over his time in the NFL, which also includes 333 career wins to make him the second-winningest head coach in NFL history, behind only Don Shula, who holds the all-time record with 347 total wins.
- Frank Reich was named Stanford's interim head football coach on March 31. The 36th head coach in program history, Reich is one of the sport's most well-respected offensive minds thanks to over 30 years in professional football, combining a 14-year playing career as an NFL quarterback with 18 seasons in various coaching roles. Reich was a member of six Super Bowl teams overall, four as a player with the Buffalo Bills (1991-94), and twice as a coach. Reich's six-year head coaching tenure included five seasons with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-22) before his final stop at the helm of the Carolina Panthers (2023).
- Jake Dickert was named the head coach at Wake Forest in December 2024, following the resignation of longtime head coach Dave Clawson. Dickert took over Washington State as interim head coach in 2021 and earned the permanent role, leading the Cougars for four years from 2021-24. In four seasons, Dickert compiled a 23-20 record (.534) and led the Cougars to three bowl games. The 2024 season proved to be his best work, going 8-4 in the regular season.

MONTGOMERY NAMED INTERIM HC AT VIRGINIA TECH

- Philip Montgomery is now the Interim Head Coach for the Virginia Tech Football program, taking over after head coach Brent Pry was fired following a 0-3 start to the 2025 season on September 14. Montgomery, who was Virginia Tech's offensive coordinator, will lead the team for the remainder of the current season.
- From 2015–22, Montgomery was the head coach at Tulsa, compiling a 43-53 record over eight seasons. His second year proved to be his best, as the Golden Hurricane finished 10-3, while the pandemic-shortened 2020 campaign also saw Tulsa capture an American Athletic Conference title.

FIRST ACC WINS AS HEAD COACH

- Wake Forest's Jake Dickert earned his first win as an ACC head coach in his debut, a 10–9 victory over Kennesaw State on August 29.
- North Carolina's Bill Belichick earned his first collegiate victory as head coach on September 6 with a convincing 20–3 win at Charlotte, marking the former six-time Super Bowl champion's inaugural win in college football and in the ACC.
- Stanford's Frank Reich picked up his first collegiate win as a head coach in the Cardinal's 30-20 win over Boston College in the two teams' season opener on September 13
- Virginia Tech interim head coach Philip Montgomery picked up his first win as an ACC head coach with the Hokies' 38-6 win over Wofford on September 20.

GT'S KEY HAS THE KEY VERSUS RANKED ACC FOES

■ Since Brent Key's first game as Georgia Tech's head coach (October 1, 2022), the Yellow Jackets have beaten seven (7-1) AP-ranked opponents as an unranked team, the most by any FBS team in that span.

DOEREN PICKS UP WEEKLY AWARDS IN WEEK 10

■ NC State head coach Dave Doeren picked up the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week honor and the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Week award for Week 10 after guiding NC State to a 48-36 win over No. 8 Georgia Tech on Saturday night at Carter-Finley Stadium. The victory marked the Wolfpack's highest-ranked win since 2012 and handed the Yellow Jackets their first loss of the season

BROHM GARNERS WEEKLY AWARDS IN WEEK 8

■ Louisville head coach Jeff Brohm was tabbed the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week and the Bear Bryant Awards Coach of the Week for Week 8, as the Cardinals defeated No. 2 Miami, 24-21, in Miami Gardens, Florida. The victory marked Louisville's first road win against an AP top-2 opponent in program history and matched the highest-ranked opponent the Cardinals have ever defeated.

HOOS' ELLIOTT EARNS TWO WEEKLY AWARDS IN WEEK 5

■ Virginia head coach Tony Elliott was named the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week and the Bear Bryant Awards Coach of the Week for Week 5 on September 29. The Cavaliers beat No. 8 Florida State, 46-38, in double overtime before a sold-out Scott Stadium. The victory marked Virginia's first home win over a top-10 team since 2005.

CUSE'S BROWN EARNS WEEKLY AWARD IN WEEK 4

■ Syracuse head football coach Fran Brown was named the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Week on September 23, following his team's significant 34-21 road victory over Clemson. It was the team's first victory in Death Valley and ended a five-game losing streak to the Tigers.

FSU'S NORVELL EARNS WEEKLY HONORS IN WEEK 1

■ Following the Seminoles' 31–17 win over No. 8 Alabama (Aug. 30), Florida State head coach Mike Norvell was named both the Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Week and the Dodd Trophy Coach of the Week for Week 1.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

OVERVIEW

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

RANKINGS

The selection committee ranks the schools based on the members' evaluation of their performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents.

THE BRACKET

The format of the College Football Playoff is built on a 12-team bracket. The 12 participating schools are the five conference champions ranked highest by the CFP selection committee, plus the next seven highest-ranked teams. The four highest-ranked schools will be seeded 1-4 and will receive a first-round bye. The remaining teams, including the fifth conference champion, will be seeded 5-12 based on their final ranking.

TRADITION

The New Year's holiday period and bowl games belong to college football. This season following the CFP First Round games on campus, the four Playoff Quarterfinal games will be played in the Cotton Bowl Classic, Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl. The following week, the Fiesta Bowl and Peach Bowl will host the Playoff Semifinals.

CHAMPIONSHIP MONDAY

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance during the regular season. No team automatically qualifies.

GOVERNANCE

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners and Notre Dame athletics director (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the CFP office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

A talented group of 13 high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee. Members of the committee are Chris Ault, Troy Dannen, Mark Dantonio, Jeff Long, Ivan Maisel, Chris Massaro, Randall McDaniel, Mack Rhoades (chair), Mike Riley, David Sayler, Wesley Walls, Carla Williams and Hunter Yurachek.

ACC TIEBREAKER POLICY

The Atlantic Coast Conference Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two (2) post-season eligible teams. The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game. If three (3) or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two (2) or more teams are tied with the second highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game. The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the home team for the Championship Game.

Two-Team Tie

- a. Head-to-head competition between the two tied
- b. Win-percentage against all common opponents.
- c. Win-percentage against common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
- d. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- e. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular-season games.
- f. The participant shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Three (or More) Team Tie

The three (or more) team tiebreaker procedure will be used to either (a) identify one championship game participant, (b) identify both championship game participants, or (c) eliminate team(s) from the tie. If the administration of the three (or more) team tiebreaker results in the elimination of team(s) from the tie, teams remain tied, and both championship game participants have not been determined, the tiebreaker procedure will restart for remaining tied teams.

- a. Combined head-to-head win-percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
- b. If all tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
- i. If all tied teams are not common opponents and no tied team defeated each of the other tied teams, but a tied team lost to each of the other tied teams, such team shall be eliminated and removed from the tie.
 - c. Win-percentage against all common opponents.
- d. Win-percentage against common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winpercentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
 - e. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- f. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
- g. The participant shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Conference games against otherwise post-season ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tie-breaker procedure.

 - · Women's Soccer: 4 of the final 4 teams; both teams in the championship.
 - · Volleyball: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - Women's Lacrosse: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - Men's Golf: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - · Women's Golf: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - · Women's Swimming & Diving: Top 2 teams in the team standings.
- ACC student-athletes won 32 individual NCAA Titles in 2024-25.

LEARFIELD Directors' Cup Standings

- Six ACC schools were ranked among the top 25, including three in the top 10, in the final Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings following the 2024-25 academic year. All 18 ACC programs finished in the top 75 of the final standings.
- This marks the 23rd consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final LEARFIELD Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina and Virginia have ranked among the top 30 nationally in each of the 31 years the Directors' Cup has been
- The ACC was one of only two conferences with every school among the final top 75 this year. This marks just the second time in the last decade in which every ACC team finished in the top 75 (2020-21 was the other occurrence).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC conducted its fourth annual Health and Safety Summit in May 2025, this time in Charlotte, North Carolina, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the second annual ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, North Carolina, in June 2025. The trek included 30 student-athletes across the league meeting with representatives and listening to panel discussions from five different categories including sports, real estate, finance/banking, consulting and government.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

ACC Student-Athletes Excel Once Again in NCAA APR Report

- Atlantic Coast Conference teams continue to demonstrate strong academic performance, as reflected in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) data released by the NCAA in May.
- Overall, the ACC average APR is 991, seven points above the NCAA Division I national average. Every team among the ACC's 28 sponsored sports exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930, while 114 ACC teams recorded a perfect score of 1000, including at least one team from each of the 18 member institutions. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930.

ACC Makes Another Strong Showing in NCAA Graduation Success Rates

• The Atlantic Coast Conference's collective high level of academic success is again reflected by the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report released in November 2024. The ACC's average graduation rate of 94 percent is four points higher than this year's national average of 90 percent.

ACC Again Leads the Way in U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Rankings

- For the 19th consecutive year, the Atlantic Coast Conference leads the way nationally among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report on September 23, 2025.
 - The ACC once again boasts the best average ranking among all FBS conferences, with an impressive 50.7 average, outpacing its peers for the 19th year in a row.
 - Two ACC institutions rank among the nation's top 10, making it the only FBS conference with multiple universities in the top 10.
 - Four ACC schools landed in the top 25, more than any other FBS conference.
 - · Six ACC schools are ranked in the top 30, leading all FBS conferences.
 - · A record 16 ACC schools are ranked among the top 75, the most of any FBS conference
 - 11 of the 18 ACC institutions either maintained or improved their position from last

FOOTRALL SUCCESS

The ACC has solidified its reputation as a powerhouse in college football over the last decade, producing elite teams, top-tier coaching talent and Heisman-caliber athletes.

Elite Presence on the National Stage

• In eight of the past 12 seasons, the ACC has been represented in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game—an elite streak that began with Florida State's thrilling 34-31 win over Auburn in the final BCS title game in January 2014 (2013 season).

Four CFP Teams, One Conference

- The ACC is one of the few conferences to have sent four different programs to the College Football Playoff:
 - Clemson (2015-2020, 2024)
 - Florida State (2014)
 - Notre Dame (2020, as a full ACC member during the pandemic season)
 - SMU (2024)

Playoff Success That Stands Out

• With six all-time College Football Playoff victories, the ACC ranks third nationally behind only the SEC (18) and Big Ten (11).

Unmatched Depth in Bowl Season

• The 2024 season saw a league-record 13 ACC teams earn bowl eligibility, tying for the most among all Power 4 conferences. This marks the 24th consecutive year the ACC has secured six or more bowl bids, excluding the unique 2020 season. The league has sent 10 teams or more to the postseason in seven of the last 11 years, and since 2014, ranks second among all conferences with 105 total postseason appearances.

Top Coaching Talent Across the Board

- Seven active ACC head coaches currently rank among the top 60 in the FBS in career winning percentage (at least one full season of coaching):
 - Dabo Swinney (Clemson)
 - Fran Brown (Syracuse)
 - Rhett Lashlee (SMU)
 - Mike Norvell (Florida State)

Heisman Pedigree

- Over the last 12 years, eight ACC players have finished in the top five of the Heisman Trophy voting a total of 10 times, including two winners:

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SUCCESS

Expanding the Field of Contenders

- With SMU making its first appearance in 2024, 14 different programs have now competed in the ACC Football Championship Game since it began in 2005—highlighting the league's depth and competitive balance.
- Clemson leads all schools with 10 appearances, followed by Virginia Tech and Florida State, each with six.

Champions Across the Conference

- Since the inaugural title game in 2005, six different schools have claimed the ACC Championship:
 - Clemson: 9 titles (most in league history)
 - Florida State: 5 titles, including the 2023 crown
 - Virginia Tech: 3 titles
 - Georgia Tech, Wake Forest, and Pitt: 1 title each

A Proven Draw in Charlotte

• The ACC Championship Game has been a major event in Charlotte, selling out five times at Bank of America Stadium—in 2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, and 2020—demonstrating the passion of ACC fans and the game's regional appeal.

Charlotte: The Long-Term Home of ACC Championship Football

• In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation solidified a 10-year partnership to keep the title game in Charlotte through 2030. The game will continue to be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday of December, maintaining one of college football's premier championship traditions.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

Another Impressive Draft Class

• The ACC saw 42 players selected in the 2025 NFL Draft, representing 15 different institutions across the conference. This ties the league's highest single-draft total since 2021 (not including Notre Dame's nine picks that year).

Consistent Pipeline to the Pros

• Since the 2000 NFL Draft, the ACC has produced 853 total draft picks, including 122 first-round selections—ranking third among all conferences in both categories.

Top-Three in Recent Draft Production

• Over the last 12 drafts (2013–2025), the ACC has had 469 players selected, the thirdmost of any conference during that span. Notably, the ACC has seen 40 or more players drafted in three of the last five years.

No. 1 Overall Picks: A Legacy of Excellence

- Current ACC programs have produced 17 No. 1 overall picks in the history of the NFL Draft. Most recently, Miami quarterback Cameron Ward was selected first overall by the Tennessee Titans in the 2025 NFL Draft. Several ACC schools have contributed multiple top picks over the years:
- Stanford: 4 (Bobby Garrett 1954, Jim Plunkett 1971, John Elway 1983, Andrew Luck 2012)
- Miami: 3 (Vinny Testaverde 1987, Russell Maryland 1991, Cameron Ward 2025)

Additionally, NC State's Roman Gabriel was selected No. 2 overall in the 1962 NFL Draft but was the No. 1 overall pick in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

Clemson leads series, 8-1-0 Last Meeting: Louisville, 33-21 (2024)

Notes:

- Louisville earned its first-ever win over Clemson in 2024. The Tigers lead the all-time series 8–1.
- This will be Clemson's final ACC game of the season before closing against Furman (Nov. 22) and at South Carolina (Nov. 29).
- A Clemson win would secure at least a .500 ACC record for the 27th straight season.
 The Tigers' 26-year streak entering 2025 is tied with Boise State for the nation's longest active run.
- Since Oct. 1, Clemson has averaged 34.4 points and 444.6 yards per game ranking 19th nationally in both categories.
- Louisville aims for its third Friday win of the season, having already defeated CFP contenders James Madison (8–1) and Miami (7–2).
- Louisville's Isaac Brown leads the nation with 8.6 yards per carry. The standout running back missed last week's overtime loss to Cal due to an injury at Virginia Tech.
- The Cardinals, a CFP contender, look to rebound after an OT loss to California. Both of Louisville's losses this season have come in overtime by a combined six points.

- This marks the 10th meeting between the teams as ranked opponents. When both are ranked, Pitt is 3-6 against Notre Dame.
- Ten of the last 14 matchups between the programs have been decided by single digits.
- Pitt faces one of the nation's toughest remaining schedules, with Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, and Miami — all ranked in the CFP Top 20 — to close the regular season.
- Since a Week 6 quarterback change, Pitt has won five straight. True freshman Mason Heintschel has led the offense to 40.0 points per game.
- Pitt is one of only 10 FBS teams with six or more wins by 15+ points.
- Notre Dame features one of the country's top running back duos in Jeremiyah Love and Jadarian Price — one of just three programs with two players owning nine or more rushing touchdowns this season.
- The Irish held Navy to 228 total yards last week, the eighth time since 2024 they've limited an opponent under 250 yards.

- The Cavaliers travel to Durham looking to bounce back from a 16–9 home loss to Wake Forest. Despite the defeat, UVA's defense limited the Demon Deacons to 203 total yards, including just 64 through the air.

- QB Haynes King, a Heisman Trophy candidate, leads the Yellow Jackets' offense. The dual-threat star ranks third nationally in scoring (10.5 points per game) and total offense (330.3 yards per game), and leads all guarterbacks with 14 rushing touchdowns.
