NO. 23 HOKIES FACE 10TH-RANKED DUKE BLUE DEVILS IN ACC HOME MATCH

Facing ranked foes, four straight, and all in top 10

- The Hokies are currently in a four-match stretch where they will face four straight ranked opponents, which marks just the fifth time in program history during the regular season and the eighth time overall.
- Three times Tech had a stretch of four straight, the last was Sept. 16-Oct. 1, 2016 (0-3-1), while its longest was a six-match span from Sept. 23-Oct. 17, 2010 - which included three straight against top 10 teams - at No. 1 North Carolina (L, 2-1), No. 7 Maryland (W, 1-0) and at No. 4 Boston College (W, 2-1).
- The team has never faced four straight programs ranked in the Top 10.
- All-time, Tech is 30-87-13 (130 games - 28.1 win percentage) against ranked foes. Under head coach **Chugger Adair** (nine seasons), the Hokies are 17-40-7 (32.0), while they were 13-47-6 (24.2) prior.

More on the Hokies versus ranked teams

- The Hokies' 1-0 win over No. 6 Virginia last year (Sept. 27) marked the team's first victory over a top 10 program since Nov. 8, 2013 - vs. No. 1 Virginia, 4-2 at the ACC Championship semifinal in Cary, N.C.
- Prior to the 2018 victory, the Hokies had not beaten a ranked foe in 14 attempts - since Oct. 4, 2015, when Tech went on the road and beat No. 22 Duke (4-2). The team was 0-9-5 between the two wins.
- Last season, the Hokies were 2-5-1 vs. ranked teams, last beating No. 17 Texas (1-0) on the road in the first round of the NCAA Championship, while they are 0-2-0 this season.
- In its history, Tech is 11-54-4 against programs ranked in the top 10, including, now, a 2-5-1 mark against teams with the No. 1 ranking.
- Tech's last four losses, and 8-of-9 have been to ranked teams, including three times last year to UNC.

Tech versus Duke (see more Page 2)

- All-time, Tech is 4-12-1 against Duke, which includes three straight losses to the Blue Devils, in which the Hokies have been outscored by a 9-0 count.
- In games at Thompson Field, the Hokies have won 3-of-7, including a 3-0 victory on Nov. 29, 2013, a win in the NCAA Championship quarterfinals that advanced Tech to its first ever College Cup appearance.
- The win was the start of a three-match winning streak that ended with the Hokies' last win over the Blue Devils on Oct. 4, 2015, a 4-2 decision in Durham.

McGlynn named a Senior CLASS candidate

- Tech's goalkeeper **Mandy McGlynn** has been named as one of 30 candidates for the 2019 Senior CLASS Award for her achievements both on and off the field, the organization recently announced.
- McGlynn is one of four goalkeepers to be selected to the initial list and the only ACC player chosen as a candidate. The Jacksonville, Florida native has already been named an All-ACC Preseason First Team member and earned a school record fourth ACC Defensive Player of the Week honor back on Sept. 17.
- The candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists and will be placed on the official ballot.

McGlynn's notable efforts last week

- At No. 1 Virginia, Mandy McGlynn held the Cavaliers scoreless until the 70:10 mark, which ended a consecutive scoreless streak of 398:33, a new program record for a single goalkeeper. The previous mark was held by Mallory Soldner, who posted a 383:37 straight scoreless streak from Sept. 2-Sept 14, 2003.
- At No. 9 Clemson, she posted a career-high (in a 90-minute match) 11 saves, which was the most since *Dayle Colpitts* had 11 on Aug. 27, 2010 against No. 9 Texas A&M in a 5-3 loss.

WHAT IS A HOKIE?

Probably the most frequently asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics and the answer dates back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With it came a contest held by the student body for writing a new cheer and senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull said the words had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. "Hokie" soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. Below is the "Old Hokie" yell:

JUST "VIRGINIA TECH", PLEASE!

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech." Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896. Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech. The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today. Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as "Virginia Tech." VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT, VA Tech or Virginia Tech University are **not recognized names and should not be used.**



Nine straight wins/unbeaten all-time

- For only the third time in program history, Tech opened its season with nine straight wins and finished its non-conference, regular season slate with a perfect record.

- The nine-match winning streak is tied for the second longest all-time and is tied for the second longest unbeaten streak in program history as well.

- Below are the longest stretches in program history.

Tech success under Adair while ranked

- As a ranked team under head coach Chugger Adair, the Hokies have an overall mark of 73-28-7 in 108 matches for a 70.8 winning percentage.

- As a ranked team against ranked opponents, Tech holds a 14-32-4 mark overall and are 11-24-3 under Adair. However, in such matches, Tech is 0-7-2 since a win at No. 22 Duke on Oct. 4, 2015.

- As a ranked team against an unranked opponent, the Hokies are 62-4-4 (91.4%) with losses coming to Ohio State (Nov. 20, 2015, 1-0 (n) and Sept. 1, 2016, 2-1), Wake Forest (Oct. 18, 2014, 1-0) and Nebraska (2011) with three of them in Blacksburg.

- In matches against unranked opponents overall, Tech holds a mark of 98-10-11 in 119 matches for an 87.0 winning percentage.

Starting Streaks for the Hokies

- During the 2018 season, five players started all 22 matches - seniors Jordan Hemmen, Kelsey Irwin, Mandy McGlynn and Jaylyn Thompson, and sophomore Emily Gray. Only Hemmen, McGlynn and Thompson have extended their streaks to all 11 this season.

- Thompson currently holds the longest consecutive starts streak on the team at 61 straight matches.

- The last Tech player to start at least 60 straight was Candace Cephers (2013-15, 82).

- McGlynn's streak is the second longest, now at 52 straight starts, while Hemmen has pushed her streak to 49 straight.

- Gray became the first freshman at the school to start every match since 2013 (Murielle Tiernan) and was at 32 straight before missing the match at Clemson last Sunday.

- From 2013-15, Tiernan went on to start the first 55 matches of her Tech career, while Kelsey Mitchell (2009-12) and Carmen Chestnut (1998-01) are the only Hokies (min. 75 games) to start every one of their matches at Tech - 88 and 77, respectively.

- Four others have started all 11 matches this year, sophomores Emmalee McCarter (31 straight), Molly Feighan (14 total) and Grace Sklopan (14 total) and redshirt-freshman Nicole Kozlova.

Tech's Ironwomen

- Irwin started 35 straight matches and played every single minute of them until this year's home opener.

- Dating back to Sept. 4, 2017 vs. Longwood, the last match she did not start, Irwin played the final 66:05 minutes of that contest and 3,302:05 straight minutes entering the season.

- In the waning minutes of the 3-0 Liberty win (Aug. 22), Irwin was taken out for the first time in 35 contests, ending her streak at 3,386:27.

- McGlynn's consecutive minutes streak is even longer, as she has not been subbed out since Aug. 25, 2017 - vs. the College of Charleston - a string of 48 straight matches.

- McGlynn did not play the final 14 minutes against the Cougars that day, but has played every one since - a streak of 4,496:43 straight minutes.

In 2018 Tech games, scoring first was critical

- In Tech matches last season, only once did the team that scored the day's first goal not go on to win the match, and that was then-No. 22 Georgetown, which resulted in a 1-1 draw on Aug. 19.

- Since then, the team that scored the match's first goal was 19-0, with the Hokies holding an 11-0 record while the opponents were 8-0, with one double overtime 0-0 tie in the mix (Sept. 2 at Georgia).

- In fact, once the first goal of a match had been netted, the team who scored never relinquished the lead and had gone on to register a shutout in 15 of those contests, with Tech earning eight of them.

- In all, Tech and its opponents combined for 19 shutouts in 22 matches last year (Tech 10, Opp 9), which surpassed the most prior of 17 in 2011 (Tech 11, Opp 6) in 23 matches played that season.

- The good news last year was that when the Hokies scored a goal, they are 11-1-1. This season, the Hokies are 9-1-0 when scoring a goal.

That trend ended against Yale

- Through five matches this season, the 2018 trends continued, as Tech scored first in each, never gave up the lead, won all five while posting four shutouts.

- So, the team scoring first, in a Tech game, had won the last 25 matches with 19 shutouts.

- That ended Sept. 8, when Yale took a 1-0 lead into halftime. Nicole Kozlova would score twice in the second half as the Hokies pulled out the 2-1 victory.

- It was the first comeback win for Tech since Oct. 15, 2017 at Notre Dame, when the Hokies scored twice in the second half after trailing 1-0 at the break.

- Between the two Tech comebacks, a span of 30 matches, the team that netted the first goal was 26-0-1 (with three double overtime ties).

- Of note, the last time Tech lost a game it was leading was Oct. 23, 2016, when Miami scored twice, the second in double overtime, to win 2-1 in Coral Gables.

Yale takes first lead on Tech

- It's worth noting, that with that Yale goal - in the 32nd minute - it marked the first time this season the Hokies had trailed in a match.

- In fact, except against the Bulldogs, Tech held at least a one-goal lead heading into the intermission before last weeks ACC matches.

- The latest goal scored by Tech in a match before last weekend was against Cincinnati (Aug. 25) with just 1:23 left before the break.

- No. 1 Virginia shut out the Hokies (Sept. 26) for the first time this season, while No. 9 Clemson held Tech without a goal until the 88th minute.

- Kozlova's goal in the 65th minute evened the match against Yale, meaning Tech had trailed for only 32:24 seconds its entire non-conference season.

- Of the 990 minutes of the 2019 season, Tech has led for 584:45 of that time (59.1 percent), while they've been level for 270:24 and have now trailed for 134:51 (13.6 percent).

THOMPSON FIELD HOME OF THE HOKIES

Thompson Field serves as the home of the Tech men's and women's soccer teams as well as the lacrosse team. Located in the center of the Tech athletics complex, the facility ranks as one of the finest for both soccer and lacrosse in the ACC.

Located across from Lane Stadium, the Hokies' football home, Thompson Field was completed in the fall of 2003 and dedicated in 2008 in the name of Sandra D. Thompson, a longtime supporter of women's athletics at Tech.

The field is a bluegrass playing surface and measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. It is equipped with an underground irrigation and drainage system that allows for it to be ready for play quickly following rainstorms.

The athletics department has gradually made improvements since the venue opened in 2003. The most recent updates to the complex includes new light fixtures and a video board for the start of the 2019 soccer season and access to upgraded team rooms for use during pregame and halftime of matches played at Thompson Field.

In 2005, workers completed a new restroom facility for the complex, and during the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium above the grandstand.

The approximately 900-square foot facility now includes one dedicated broadcast booth for ACC Network TV broadcasts. The area also has two covered areas on each end devoted to camera operations for these broadcasts. There is a similar booth on the opposite side of the center, where working media members who are covering the Hokies have access along with the opportunity for teams to record their video as well.

In the main area of the center is a large working area for game operations, which includes the scoreboard and video board, PA, official statistics and visiting school officials.

The climate-controlled facility contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletics website, hokiesports.com, to originate live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck.

Between each team's bench area is the Sandy D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a halftime room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations. This is also where the replay monitor is housed for ACC Broadcasts.

Thompson Field, which has been expanded since it was opened, now features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games.

Give McGlynn a lead, Tech is unbeaten

- In **Mandy McGlynn's** 67 career starts as Tech's goalkeeper, the team has never lost a game after giving her a lead (38-0-2).
- She did not play in the Oct. 23, 2016 Miami game
- the last time Tech lost a game it had led.
- Only four times with McGlynn as the starting goalkeeper has Tech taken a lead and relinquished it. The Hokies went on to win two of them, while earning a tie in the other two.

Opening the season with a pair of shutouts

- For only the third time in school history, the Hokies recorded back-to-back shutouts to start the season.
- Tech first accomplished the feat in 2012, while the 2014 squad posted three straight to start the year.
- The 2019 squad equaled the three straight shutouts and then set the school record for longest consecutive scoreless streak (by minutes) to start a season at 326:12 before allowing the first goal of the year in the 56th minute against Auburn (Sept. 1).
- The longest scoreless streak (by minutes) to start a season prior was 322:38 in 2014. Tech lost that streak on Aug. 31 in a 3-1 win at Ohio State (goal was scored in fourth match at 52:38).
- The third longest scoreless streak is 245:49 and ended on Aug. 24, 2012 in a 3-2 win at Nebraska (goal scored at 54:20). This streak included a double overtime win to start the year.

Goalkeeper scoreless streaks to start the year

- In the 2012 and 2014 seasons, Tech's starting goalkeeper was *Caroline Kelly*, meaning she had held the two longest scoreless streaks to start a year.
- Her longest consecutive stretch of minutes played is the 245:49 to open the 2012 season, because she was replaced in the second half of the third match in the 2014 season.
- That year's streak did reach 277:38 (non-consecutive) before she allowed the first tally of the year, but she played the first 225:00 consecutively.
- **Mandy McGlynn** bested both of those marks, setting the new school record at 326:12 straight scoreless minutes to start a season.
- Interestingly, she has posted a shutout in the season opener all four years at the school and went at least 129 minutes in each season before allowing goal No. 1 of the year.
- Her longest streak before this season was 171:52 that opened 2016, her freshman year.

McGlynn is ACC Defensive Player of the Week

- Announced by the ACC on Sept. 17, Tech's **Mandy McGlynn** was chosen as the ACC Women's Soccer Defensive Player of the Week after helping the Hokies remain perfect on the season.
- The honor was the fourth of her Tech career, which is the most ever for a women's soccer player at the school. McGlynn picked up her first on Oct. 3, 2017 as a sophomore, and was twice chosen last year (Aug. 21 and Oct. 2).
- The only other Hokie with multiple selections by the ACC is *Murielle Tiernan*, who earned the last of her three offensive awards on Sept. 6, 2016.
- McGlynn earned the honor after posting shutouts No. 5 and 6 of 2019 in Tech's 1-0 wins over the College of Charleston and UNCW at the Battle by the Beach in Wilmington, N.C.

Mance scores three times in four matches

- **Mikayla Mance** scored a goal in each of Tech's first two wins in the opening weekend of the season.
- Her first goal came in the 30th minute against Liberty (Aug. 22), the first insurance tally, in a 3-0 victory. It was her first goal since Sept. 7, 2017.
- Against Cincinnati (Aug. 25), just 83 seconds before halftime, Mance gave Tech a 1-0 lead with her second of the weekend, and the third of her career.
- Mance became the first Tech player to score a goal in the first two games of the season since *Murielle Tiernan* started off the 2015 campaign by scoring a goal in the first three matches of the season.

Seniors carry Tech in Athens

- Seniors **Lilly Weber** and **Bridget Patch** scored both goals in Tech's 2-0 win at Georgia (Aug. 30), while senior **Jaylyn Thompson** and graduate **Kelsey Irwin** had the two assists.
- **Mikayla Mance** and Irwin each scored against Auburn (Sept. 1) in a 3-1 win, with Mance netting the game winner (the third of her career), as seniors accounted for 4-of-5 goals tallied and 2-of-4 assists.

Two goals in one match

- Against Yale on Sept. 8, Tech faced its first deficit of the season, trailing 1-0. However, **Nicole Kozlova** found the back of the net twice in the second half to lift the Hokies to the 2-1 victory.
- Kozlova became the first player since **Kelsey Irwin** to score a brace for Tech. Irwin scored her two at Villanova on Sept. 7 of last year in a 3-0 victory.

Back-to-back game winning goals

- In scoring the game winner vs. Yale (Sept. 8), **Nicole Kozlova**, who also had the GW against Alabama (Sept. 5), became the first Hokie to score back-to-back game winners since 2016, but the 11th time since 2010 (by eight players).
- Tech's *Alani Johnson* was the last one to net back-to-back game winners, scoring hers on Aug. 26-28.

Kozlova is ACC Offensive Player of the Week

- Announced by the ACC on Sept. 10, Tech's **Nicole Kozlova** was selected as the ACC Women's Soccer Offensive Player of the Week after helping the Hokies remain perfect on the season with a pair of wins over Alabama (Sept. 5) and Yale (Sept. 8).
- She was the first Tech field player to earn an ACC Player of the Week honor since *Murielle Tiernan*, who earned the last of her three on Sept. 6, 2016.
- Kozlova is the third Tech freshman to garner the award since the Hokies joined the ACC. *Ashley Stinson* was the first, being named on Sept. 4, 2004, while *Marika Gray* was chosen on Sept. 10, 2007.

Kozlova converts PK at Clemson

- In the closing minutes of Tech's loss at No. 9 Clemson (Sept. 29), **Jordan Hemmen** was fouled inside the box on a free kick attempt, awarding the Hokies their first penalty kick since 2017 (*Alani Johnson*, Sept. 21, at Pittsburgh, missed).
- **Nicole Kozlova** converted her attempt to avoid the shutout and, in turn, score Tech's first PK in five tries (Tech had converted 23-of-25 PKs prior to that 0-for-5 stretch).
- *Candace Cephers* was the last Hokie to convert a PK, on Aug. 21, 2016 against Mississippi State.

Back-to-back-to-back game winners

- Just a week after Kozlova's efforts, **Emily Gray** equaled that feat by scoring back-to-back game winners for the Hokies at the Battle by the Beach in

Charles "Chugger" Adair

Virginia Tech Head Coach - Ninth Season



On December 7, 2010, Virginia Tech Director of Athletics Jim Weaver announced the hiring of Tech's fourth head women's soccer coach Charles "Chugger" Adair, the associate head coach for the team the previous five seasons. The 2018 season marked Adair's 13th season in Blacksburg and his eighth year as the Hokies' head coach. In that time, he's become the all-time wins leader in program history, ended the 2018 campaign with a 106-48-18 overall record, and became just the second soccer coach at the school to reach the 100-win milestone with the team's victory at Miami on Sept. 23 (Jerry Cheynet, 238 wins, 28 seasons for Tech men's soccer). He's also just the 10th women's soccer head coach to reach that mark in the ACC.

Prior to Adair's arrival on campus, the women's program just once (2004) made the postseason - playing a game in both the ACC and NCAA tournaments. Since, the team has qualified for six ACC tournaments, playing for the conference title twice (2008 & 2013), and earned eight straight bids to the NCAA championship (2008-15) - nine overall, as the Hokies made it back to the tournament in 2018. Tech has reached the Sweet 16 four times under Adair (2009, 2011, 2014, 2018), but enjoyed its greatest success in 2013. That record-setting season included the Hokies posting a school-record 19 wins (most by any soccer team at the school), playing for the ACC title and advancing to the NCAA College Cup, where their season ended with a 3-2 loss to Florida State in a national semifinal game.

Along with the great strides the Hokies have made on the pitch, the Tech women's soccer program is also known for producing outstanding students who are major contributors off of it. Each year, the Hokies boast a high team grade point average and have student-athletes who compete for state, regional and national academic recognition. In fact, during the 2017-18 academic season, the team posted a program-tying best ever team GPA of 3.53 in the spring semester. Also, in the past three years, both Ashley Meier (2015) and Alani Johnson (2017) have received an ACC Postgraduate Scholarship, with Meier also earning an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship as well. Lastly, in 2018, Heather Timothy became Tech's sixth women's soccer player to earn the Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Athletics - the highest designation handed out by the Tech athletics department

In his eight seasons at Tech, Adair has led his program to a winning record each year, but saw a streak of double-digit win totals come to an end in 2017 as the team posted a 7-6-5 mark, with the five ties setting a program record. Despite an 11-win season in 2016 - the team's ninth straight year with at least 10 wins - the Hokies saw their eight-year run of making the NCAA championship come to an end.

In 2018, Tech returned to the 11-win mark and the NCAA tournament and reached the Round of 16. Along the way, the Hokies were one of two teams to knock off a nationally-seeded team in the opening round - defeating No. 17 Texas (a four seed) 1-0 in Austin, Texas - the Longhorns lone home loss of the year. Another 1-0 victory, this one in double overtime, in round two over Arkansas advanced Tech to its fourth ever Sweet 16. The Hokies ended the year ranked in two major polls - 21st by the United Soccer Coaches and 23rd by Top Drawer Soccer. He was also on the sidelines as the Hokies played the program's 500th career match (August 19 versus Georgetown) and recorded its 250th career victory (Sept. 23 at Villanova).

In 2015, the Hokies went 15-4-2 and won their opening round game in the NCAA championship, while in the 2014 season, Adair led the Hokies to a 16-6 record and advanced to the Sweet 16 for the third time in school history. During that season, the Hokies set a school record for most goals in a season, with 62, and fewest goals allowed in a season, surrendering just 18, and reached a program-best No. 2 ranking in the country after starting the season at 10-0-0.

In their record-setting 2013 campaign, the Hokies beat three ranked teams during the regular season and then blew out then-No. 1 Virginia 4-2 in the ACC Tournament semifinals. They added two more ranked foes to their list of conquests when they downed West Virginia 1-0 and knocked off Santa Clara by advancing on penalty kicks in the NCAA Championships. The Hokies were a No. 1 seed in the tournament and hosted four games in Blacksburg. The Hokies scored a then school-record 56 goals, breaking the mark of 45 set by the 2012 team, and shut out 12 opponents, tying the mark also set by the 2012 squad. They finished the season with a school-best No. 4 ranking in the country.

In 2012, Adair, in his second season as the head coach, led the Hokies to a 13-6-1 record, which marked the program's fifth straight 10-win season. Tech's six losses were the fewest in program history, at the time, and 12 of the 13 wins were shutouts. The team started 9-0-0, climbing into the Top 10 in the national rankings for the first time in school history, reaching the No. 8 spot in late September. The Hokies played host to their first NCAA Championship game in Blacksburg, as they welcomed No. 14 Georgetown to Thompson Field, though it resulted in a 3-2 loss in overtime.

In Adair's first season as the head coach (2011), Tech matched its best finish in program history (at the time), making it all the way to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Championship. Adair led the Hokies to a 14-8-1 overall record, which included 11 shutouts.

Adair came to Tech in 2006 and served as the associate head coach under previous head coach Kelly Cagle for five seasons before being promoted. In Adair's first season as an assistant to Cagle, the Hokies suffered a losing season, but have not suffered a losing season since. In 2008, the Hokies advanced to the finals of the ACC Championship for the first time, falling to North Carolina 3-0, and in 2009, the Hokies won 16 games, then a school record, and earned a final ranking of No. 12.

Adair came to Tech after holding the associate head coaching position at UC Santa Barbara for two seasons. While at UCSB, his role involved all aspects of the soccer program, including recruiting, coaching, scouting, player management, community relations and camps. Prior to his arrival at UCSB, he worked a six-year stint as Youth Soccer Coach/ Assistant Director of Competitive Older Ages for the Del Mar Sharks.

He served as an assistant for the University of San Diego's men's soccer team from 1998-2000. From there, he spent a season as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's soccer teams at Pacific University in Portland, Ore.

Adair also possesses a great deal of playing experience, having played professionally for 10 years, including stints with the Los Angeles Galaxy of Major League Soccer and the U.S. National Futsal Team. He also spent time playing for the San Diego Sockers, Wichita Wings, Portland Timbers, San Diego Flash, Minnesota Thunder, Seattle Sounders, Milwaukee Wave, Carolina Dynamo and A.A. Ghent (Belgium) from 1993-2003.

Adair played soccer at the University of San Diego after transferring from San Diego State in the early 1990s. He earned All-America honors, was a two-year captain and helped USD to the NCAA finals, where the Toreros lost to Virginia. He scored 27 goals and had 23 assists in his three years at USD. He got his bachelor's degree in business administration from USD in 1993 and he received his MBA from USD in 1996.

Adair is married to the former Shelbylynn McBride, and they have a daughter, Callie Lynn and a son, Austin Tate. He also has two other daughters Alexandra and Madeline, and a son Jack

Wilmington, N.C.

- Gray scored her first two goals of the season, the first against the College of Charleston (Sept. 13) and the second vs. UNCW (Sept. 15) in 1-0 wins over both teams, to help Tech to the 2-0 weekend.

- With the performance, Gray was named the MVP of the tournament as the Hokies won it. **Jordan Hemmen, Grace Sklopan and Mandy McGlynn** joined her on the all-tournament team.

- Gray then matched Kozlova's brace with one of her own in Tech's 2-0 ACC home-opening win over Miami (Sept. 21), including another game winner.

- She became the first Hokie to score goals in three straight matches since **Murielle Tiernan**, who scored in five straight from Sept. 19 through Oct. 8, 2015.

- Gray also became the first Tech player to score three straight game-winning goals - **Murielle Tiernan**, who had four straight from Sept. 24-Oct. 8, 2015.

Two assists in one match

- **Emmalee McCarter** tallied a pair of assists in Tech's season-opening win over Liberty (Aug. 22), marking the first Hokie to have two assists in a match since **Lilly Weber** had two in a 2-0 win over James Madison on Aug. 28, 2016.

One assist in three straight matches

- **Molly Feighan** became the sixth Hokie this decade to register at least one assist in three straight matches, and the first since **Katie Yensen**, who accomplished the feat from Sept. 12-19, 2014.

- It has been eight seasons since a Tech player last had an assist in four straight matches and that was **Jazmine Reeves** from Aug. 28-Sept. 9, 2011. She actually had six in those four contests.

- Tech's all-time leader in assists, **Julian Johnson** (2006-09, 31) holds the record, as she went six straight matches with an assist (Aug. 25-Sept. 10, 2006), notching eight in that span.

Fast goal to start the season

- **Molly Feighan** scored the first goal of her career to open the Liberty contest (Aug. 22) just 8:43 into the match and it held for her first game winner as well.

- It was the fastest goal to start a season since 2014, when **Shannon Mayrose** found the back of the net at the 6:33 mark in Tech's 6-0 season-opening win vs. VCU, ironically, on Aug. 22 as well.

- During the 2018 season, Tech scored two goals faster than Feighan's, **Kelsey Irwin's** game-winner (5:38) vs. Notre Dame (Oct. 18) and **Allyson Brown's** game-winner (8:32) at Miami (Sept. 23).

Gray tallies fastest goal since 2014

- **Emily Gray** scored her first of the year against the College of Charleston (Sept. 13) in the first match of the Battle by the Beach in Wilmington, N.C.

- She put home a cross from **Kiersten Hening** just 4:57 into the contest, which held for the game winner in Tech's 1-0 win over the Cougars.

- It was the fastest goal scored by a Tech player since **Murielle Tiernan** found the net in a match against Georgetown (Nov. 21, 2014).

Other first-time goal scorers in 2019

- In all, four Hokies have tallied their first collegiate goal this season.

- **Mak Graham** scored the third in the 3-0 win over Liberty (Aug. 22), while **Nicole Kozlova** had the second in a 2-0 victory against Cincinnati (Aug. 25).

- **Emmalee McCarter** scored the first of her career vs. Auburn (Sept. 1), the first of the day in a 3-1 victory over the Tigers.

First-time assisters in 2019

- Tech's leader in goals in 2018, **Karlie Johnson**, as well as **Emma Steigerwald** each had an assist against Liberty (Aug. 22), marking the first of their Tech careers.

- In Athens, senior **Jaylyn Thompson** recorded her first collegiate point with an assist on the game-winning goal against Georgia (Aug. 30).

Team attack on the offense

- Nine different Tech players have scored this season, with starters accounting for 13 goals, and the reserves adding six.

- Five Hokies have scored a game winner this season, with three players notching at least two.

- The assists, which a total of 10 Hokies have at least one, are in favor of the starters, as well, registering 13 of the 17 so far.

McGlynn, again, named preseason All-ACC

- Senior **Mandy McGlynn**, who racked up a number of honors last season which included being named to the All-ACC First Team, a first for a Tech goalkeeper, has been named to the 2019 Preseason All-ACC Women's Soccer Team, as announced by the league office on Aug. 8.

- McGlynn was one of 11 student-athletes to make the preseason team, which was voted on by the conference's coaches. She was also named to the preseason team before the 2018 season.

- She was a 2018 United Soccer Coaches All-Atlantic Region Second Team member after starting 22 matches and playing 2,056:43, the second-most ever in a season at Tech.

- The Jacksonville, Florida native stopped 91 shots (seventh) for a 79.8 save percentage (eighth) and posted a 1.01 goals against average (T-fifth). She also recorded 10 shutouts (second), won 11 matches (T-third) and became the first Tech goalkeeper to play every minute of the season in goal since 2004 (Mallory Soldner, 1,800).

- She helped the Hokies make a return trip to both the ACC and NCAA Championship tournaments, a run that saw Tech reach the Round of 16 for the first time since 2014. She recorded back-to-back shutouts to open the NAACAs, which included a first round upset at No. 17 Texas.

- Entering the 2019 season, she was second all-time at Tech in wins (29), shutouts (22), goals against average (1.06) and save percentage (78.1), third in minutes played (5,262) and fourth in saves (221).

- The chart on the right displays where she currently stands in those career categories.

Tech in season and home openers

- Overall, the Hokies are now 17-7-3 in season openers, are unbeaten in 11 straight (10-0-1; had won nine straight before last year's season-opening 0-0 tie to San Diego) and are 8-0-1 under head coach **Chugger Adair**.

- In home openers, Tech is 8-0-1 under Adair and is unbeaten in 19 straight matches (15-0-4; had won 11 in a row before last year's home-opening tie)

dating back to 2001. Overall, the team has posted a 21-2-4 mark in home openers, losing just the 1993 and 2000 home openers.

- The Hokies are unbeaten at 7-0-3 when their season opener coincides with their home opener.

- Over the nine seasons under Adair, Tech has outscored its opponents 25-2 in season openers and 31-3 in home openers.

Tech results in ACC openers - overall, at home

- In its 16 years in the league, the Hokies are now 5-10-1 in ACC openers, which includes ending a four-match losing streak with their 2-0 win over Miami (Sept. 21). Before the win, Tech was outscored 10-1 the last four openers, however, those matches were at No. 7 Florida State (3-0, 2018), at No. 4 Duke (3-0, 2017), at No. 4 Virginia (2-0, 2016) and versus No. 3 North Carolina (2-1, 2015).

- In ACC home openers, the Hokies are now 8-7-1, which included a 1-0 win last year over No. 6 Virginia and now three matches against Miami - a 5-0 win in 2005 and a 1-1 tie in 2007.

- The Hokies are 4-4 in matches when the ACC opener is also their home opener

- Overall, Tech has been outscored 27-17 in openers, but in home openers they hold a 26-22 edge.

- When facing an unranked foe in ACC openers, the Hokies are 4-0 (9-1 scoring advantage) and are 5-0-1 (16-2) in ACC home openers.

Hokies success in August

- In its history, Tech now holds an overall mark of 44-9-8 in matches played in the month of August, including marks of 25-1-6 at home, 13-7-0 on the road and 6-1-2 in neutral site matches.

- The last time Tech lost in August before last year at Alabama (1-0, Aug. 30) was a neutral site game vs. Long Beach State (2-1) on Aug. 29, 2010 at the AggieLand Invitational Tournament in College Station, Texas.

- The previous road loss was two days earlier, against the host Texas A&M Aggies on Aug. 27 (5-3).

- Tech's lone home loss in the month was back on Aug. 27, 2000 - 3-2 to Seton Hall. The team is now unbeaten in its last 30 matches at home in the month.

Tech success under Adair - non-conference

- Tech has lost just 13 non-conference matches under head coach Chugger Adair, nine of those have been in the postseason.

- The four losses in the regular season include at Tennessee, Sept. 10, 2017 (3-1) and at Alabama Aug. 30, 2018 (1-0) and two matches in Blacksburg - Ohio State on Sept. 1, 2016 (2-1) and Nebraska on Sept. 9, 2011 (4-3, 2OT).

- In nine seasons under Adair, Tech is 65-4-6 in non-conference regular-season matches.

First time opponents in 2019

- Tech scheduled two new opponents for the 2019 season which the team had never faced before.

- The Hokies and Auburn Tigers faced off for the first time on Sept. 1 at a neutral site in Athens, Georgia - one of three SEC opponents for Tech this year. The Hokies came away victorious, 3-1.

- A week later (Sept. 8), Tech welcomed Yale to Blacksburg, the first ever Ivy League opponent to play the Hokies. Tech pulled out a 2-1 comeback win over the Bulldogs.

Battling the SEC

- For the second straight year, the Hokies faced an SEC opponent three times, however this year it was scheduled. Last season, it was two in the regular season and a match up in the NCAA second round.

- Dating back to that victory over Arkansas in 2018, Tech is now winners of four straight against the SEC, its longest streak.

Home weekend draws impressive crowds

- Helped out by move-in day in Blacksburg for Virginia Tech's largest freshman class ever, Tech's home opener on Aug. 22 against Liberty, a 3-0 victory, brought out the fourth largest crowd in Thompson Field history at 1,667 fans.

- The crowd for Sunday's game was a bit less, announced at 863, however that figure was greater than any home attendance during the 2018 season, and would have been the third largest crowd to watch a Tech women's soccer match last year - behind the 976 fans at Louisville (Oct. 25) and the 932 at Georgia (Sept. 2).

- Tech is averaging more than 1,000 fans a game this year, the most since the 2014 season, when the average attendance was 1,052.

- Side note: the announced crowd at this year's Georgia match (Aug. 20) in Athens was 1,687.

Hokies finish preseason with 2-0 record

- Tech played two scrimmages during the preseason and won both, shutting out Marshall 3-0 on Aug. 10 and defeating George Mason 2-1 on Aug. 17.

- At Thompson Field against the Thundering Herd, the Hokies held a 10-2 advantage in shots in the first half but the match was scoreless at the break.

- Holly Weber quickly changed that scoring 1:42 after the break and then 83 seconds later to put the Hokies up 2-0. Her first goal was off a pass from Mikayla Mance and Emily Gray set up the second.

- Allyson Brown provided the final tally five minutes later, off her own rebounded shot.

- Tech played three of its goalkeepers, with Mandy McGlynn getting a bulk of the time (42 minutes) and making a save, while Alice Hamel played 28 minutes and S.A. Phillips closed the game with one save.

- At George Mason, Tech needed a game winner from Emma Steigerwald, assisted by Sydney Ash, to break a 1-1 tie and leave Fairfax with the win.

- Stats were not kept in the match, however, Emmalee McCarter opened the evening's scoring in the second half as she scored the Hokies' first goal, assisted by Molly Feighan.
