



## ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE COMMISSIONER JIM PHILLIPS, PH.D.

### Monday, Nov. 14

"Moments ago, University of Virginia President Jim Ryan confirmed the tragic deaths of three UVA football student-athletes: Devin Chandler, Lavel Davis Jr. and D'Sean Perry. There are simply no words that can fully express our collective pain over their devastating and senseless loss.

Earlier this morning, I expressed to President Ryan and Director of Athletics Carla Williams that the ACC family stands ready in support of all members of the Cavalier family, and we will do whatever is asked of us in the days and weeks ahead. Our focus is on the young men and women impacted by this tragedy.

As I previously shared, the ACC is a family, and we are all heartbroken. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the families, friends, teammates and classmates of Devin, Lavel and D'Sean, and to the entire University of Virginia community."

## ACC NOTES

### 2022 SUBWAY ACC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME MATCHUP SET

■ Clemson (Atlantic Division) and North Carolina (Coastal Division) will meet in the 2022 Subway ACC Football Championship Game on Saturday, Dec. 3 at 8 p.m. on ABC. For the 12th time in the 18-year history of the event, the ACC title game will be played in Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium, home of the Carolina Panthers.

■ North Carolina clinched the Coastal Division with a 36-34 win at Wake Forest (Nov. 12), while Clemson clinched the Atlantic Division on Nov. 5. This is the earliest the matchup has been set since 2017 when Miami and Clemson clinched on Nov. 11.

■ Including shared titles, Clemson has earned nine Atlantic Division titles – 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019. Clemson also earned an ACC Championship Berth in a 2020 when the league competed without divisions. Clemson has won 20 ACC titles, including six in a row from 2015-2020.

■ North Carolina won at least a share of the Coastal Division for the second time. In 2015, the No. 8 Tar Heels earned the Coastal Division title and faced No. 1 Clemson in the championship game, falling 45-37. Carolina has won five ACC titles, but the last came in 1980.

### ACC NOTES

■ The ACC, which plays arguably the most difficult non-conference schedule in the country every season, has the second-most non-conference wins through 11 weeks.

■ The ACC has nine bowl eligible teams, which ties for the most of any conference.

■ The ACC Atlantic Division has six teams with a winning record, which is more than any other division in the country.

■ The ACC has 35 wins against teams with a .500 record-or-better, which ranks second among all Power 5 conferences.

■ Nineteen of the ACC's 46 conference games this season have been decided by 7 points or fewer.

## PREVIEWING WEEK 12

■ Five conference games and four non-conference matchups highlight week 12 of the ACC football schedule.

■ Bowl eligible teams Duke and Pitt kick off Week 12 in Pittsburgh (Noon, RSN). The Panthers have won 10 of the last 11 meetings, including the last five. Duke's most recent series win came in 2014 by a 51-48 score in double overtime. Duke and Pitt are each holding conference opponents to just 22.8 points per game.

■ A pair of non-conference games start at noon, including Louisiana at Florida State (RSN) and Virginia Tech at Liberty (ESPN+). Florida State, which has won three straight, leads the ACC in rushing offense and is second in total offense. The Seminoles have won three straight games by an average of 34 points. FSU is seeking its first eight-win season since 2016.

■ Following a thrilling come-from-behind win last week at NC State, Boston College travels to South Bend, Indiana, to face No. 20 Notre Dame (2:30 p.m./NBC). The Eagles seek to snap an eight-game losing streak versus the Fighting Irish. Notre Dame won 45-31 two seasons ago in Chestnut Hill. Boston College's most recent series win came in 2008. BC quarterback Emmett Morehead has thrown for more than 300 yards in each of the last two games.

■ Miami, which needs a win in one of its final two games to earn bowl eligibility, travels to Clemson Saturday (3:30 p.m./ESPN). Clemson has won the last three meetings between the schools by a combined score of 138-20, including a 42-17 win two seasons ago in Death Valley.

■ Louisville hosts NC State Saturday at 3:30 p.m. on ACC Network. Louisville had won four of six games versus the Wolfpack since joining the ACC prior to last season's meeting in Raleigh, but the Wolfpack tightened the series ledger with a 28-13 victory.

■ Virginia plays its final non-conference game of the season when the Cavaliers host No. 23 Coastal Carolina. Saturday's game will be the first-ever meeting between the programs and kicks off a three-game series.

■ Looking to keep its record unbeaten in conference action, North Carolina hosts Georgia Tech Saturday afternoon at 5:30 p.m. on ESPN2. The Yellow Jackets have won three of their last four meetings against the Tar Heels, including last season's 45-22 victory at Atlanta's Mercedes-Benz Stadium. Head coach Mack Brown can win his 100th career game at North Carolina. He won 158 games at Texas. Brown would be the only coach to win 100-plus games at multiple FBS schools.

■ In the prime time ACC Network game, Syracuse travels to Winston-Salem, North Carolina, to face Wake Forest (8 p.m./ACCN). The Demon Deacons have won the last two series meetings, including last season's 40-37 overtime victory.

## FOUR ACC TEAMS IN COACHES POLL; THREE IN AP POLL

■ Three ACC teams are ranked in the AP Top 25 poll (Nov. 13) – No. 9 Clemson, No. 13 North Carolina and No. 20 Florida State. NC State is the first team out of the poll and Duke is also receiving votes.

■ In the USA TODAY AFCA coaches poll, Clemson is No. 9, followed by No. 11 North Carolina, No. 20 Florida State and No. 25 NC State.

## STREAKS

■ Clemson's 39-game home winning streak is the longest in ACC history. The previous was Florida State's 37-game streak (1992-2001). No current Tigers have lost a home game at Clemson in their careers.

■ North Carolina's 6-game road win streak is the second-longest active streak in the nation. Georgia has won 10 straight on the road.

## NINE FROM ACC SECURE BOWL ELIGIBILITY

■ Nine ACC teams - Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Louisville, North Carolina, NC State, Pitt, Syracuse and Wake Forest - have secured bowl eligibility. Miami (5-5) must win one of its next two games to become bowl eligible. Georgia Tech (4-6) must win its next two games to earn a bowl spot. The ACC is tied for the most bowl teams among all conferences entering week 12.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup through 2025 includes the Cheez-It Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Military Bowl Presented by Peraton, New Era Pinstripe Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Holiday Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl and Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the Outback Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten. The league will also send a team to either the Gasparilla Bowl or Birmingham Bowl on an annual basis.

■ The ACC has earned at least six bowl bids in 22 consecutive seasons. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least 10 teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 91 postseason appearances.

## WEEKLY AWARD LIST RECOGNITION

■ **Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week, Davey O'Brian QB of the Week:** North Carolina's Drake Maye completed 31 of 49 passes for 448 yards and three touchdowns lift North Carolina to a 36-34 win over Wake Forest, 36-34. Maye completed passes to nine different receivers as the Tar Heels captured the ACC Coastal Division title and improved to 9-1.

■ Virginia Tech linebacker Dax Hollifield was recognized as the Defender of the Nation, the Charlotte Touchdown Club announced. The award honors a defensive football player from one of the Nation's Service Academies and Senior Military Colleges including: Air Force Academy, The Citadel, Coast Guard Academy, Naval Academy, Norwich University, Texas A&M University, Virginia Tech, VMI, and West Point.

### RECORD CHASE - DRAKE MAYE, UNC

■ North Carolina freshman QB Drake Maye has 34 TD passes and is on pace to set the ACC single-season record. Pitt's Kenny Pickett set the ACC record last year with 42.

■ Maye's 34 TDs are already the third most in ACC history by an ACC freshman quarterback. Florida State's Jameis Winston holds the ACC single-season freshman record with 40 in 2013 and North Carolina's Sam Howell had 38 in his freshman season in 2019.

■ NC State place-kicker Christopher Dunn now holds the ACC career record with 89 field goals. With two field goals against Boston College, he passed Florida State's Dustin Hopkins who had 88 from 2009-12. Dunn has also converted 196 of 196 career extra point attempts. He is attempting to become just the third player in ACC history to convert all of his extra points (minimum of 190 made). The others are Roberto Aguayo, Florida State, 2013-15 (made 198 of 198) and Nick Sciba, Wake Forest, 2018-21 (made 193 of 193).

■ Clemson place-kicker B.T. Potter is tied for the ACC career record with 222 extra points made. He moved past Clemson kicker Greg Huegel who made 218 from 2015-18.

### 2022 SUBWAY ACC CHAMP GAME SET FOR PRIME TIME

■ The 2022 Subway Atlantic Coast Conference Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. on ABC on Saturday, Dec. 3, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina. The game will feature the winner of the Atlantic Division vs. the winner of the Coastal Division.

■ This is the 13th time in the last 14 years that the game will be held in prime time, and 12 different teams have competed in the game since it began in 2005. Last season, No. 15 Pitt, behind the play of ACC Player of the Year Kenny Pickett, captured its first ACC football title with a 46-21 victory over No. 16 Wake Forest.

### AROUND THE ACC

▼ **Boston College:** Freshman Emmett Morehead has thrown for more than 300 yards in each of his first two games (vs. Duke and at NC State).

▼ **Clemson:** Clemson has now produced its 30th nine-win season in school history. It is Clemson's 13th under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, more than doubling College Football Hall of Famer Danny Ford (six).

▼ **Duke:** After clinching bowl eligibility last week, the Blue Devils locked up their first seven-win regular season since 2018 with a 24-7 win over Virginia Tech.

▼ **Florida State:** FSU ranks in first in the ACC in rushing offense, second in total offense and second in third-down conversions. The Seminoles lead the league with 213.6 rushing yards per game, which ranks 16th nationally.

▼ **Georgia Tech:** Georgia Tech won its fourth-straight game at Virginia Tech's Lane Stadium (2014, 2016, 2018, 2022). The Yellow Jackets became only the second visiting team to ever win four-straight games at Lane Stadium (Clemson).

▼ **Louisville:** LG Caleb Chandler started the 50th game of his career against Clemson, making him one of only four Louisville players to start at least 50 games. He trails the school record for most starts by one game.

▼ **Miami:** Jacurri Brown became first Miami true freshman to throw three touchdowns in his first start since Gino Torretta in 1989 and became the first Miami true freshman quarterback to start since Brad Kaaya in 2014.

▼ **North Carolina:** North Carolina has six road wins in a season for the first time ever. The Tar Heels are 6-0 in league play for the first time going 8-0 in 2015.

▼ **NC State:** MJ Morris became the first Wolfpack true freshman quarterback to start since Philip Rivers started the season opener on Sept. 2, 2000. In his first start, Morris finished 18-of-28 for 210 yards and three touchdowns and no interceptions to lead NC State to a rivalry game victory over Wake Forest.

▼ **Pitt:** Israel Abanikanda achieved his seventh 100-yard rushing game of the season in the win over Virginia. Abanikanda finished with 121 yards on 24 carries and his 18th touchdown of the season.

▼ **Syracuse:** Sean Tucker rushed for 52 yards on 14 attempts in the game and moved past Larry Csonka (1965-67), taking over fourth place on the all-time career rushing list with 2,951 career rushing yards.

▼ **Virginia:** Brennan Armstrong broke the ACC's record for passing yards by a left-handed quarterback against Pitt. He needed 17 yards to surpass Tanner Price (Wake Forest) coming into the contest. Armstrong's 9,034 career passing yards are the 12th most by a left-handed quarterback in FBS history.

▼ **Virginia Tech:** Tucker Holloway recorded a 90-yard punt return for a touchdown against Georgia Tech. It was Virginia Tech's first punt return score since Tavion Robinson's vs. Richmond (Sept. 25, 2021). It was the fourth-longest punt return score in school history.

▼ **Wake Forest:** Through 10 games, Wake Forest is averaging 36.6 points per game. Entering the 2022 season, Wake Forest is the only program in the ACC to average at least 30.0 per game in each of the last five seasons.

■ Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has been the site of 11 of the last 12 ACC Football Championship Games. In 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation reached an agreement to keep the game in Charlotte through 2030. Not including the 2020 game, which had limited attendance due to the pandemic, ACC Football Championship Games played at Bank of America Stadium have had an average attendance of nearly 70,000 fans. The ACC has the second-highest average attendance of any Power 5 conference championship game since 2010.

■ The winner of the conference championship game has gone on to play in the National Championship Game or compete in the College Football Playoff in eight of the last nine seasons, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

### AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

■ Three ACC student-athletes – the most of any conference – have been selected to the 2022 Allstate American Football Coach Association (AFCA) Good Works Team. Duke's DeWayne Carter, Florida State's Dillan Gibbons and Pitt's Deslin Alexandre.

### ACC COACHING NOTES

■ Four new football coaches have been hired in the ACC for the 2022 season: Duke's Mike Elko, Miami's Mario Cristobal, Virginia's Tony Elliott and Virginia Tech's Brent Pry.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Scott Satterfield (Louisville) rank among the top 30 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .810 winning percentage ranks second in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 274 victories.

■ Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney secured his 150th career win in the Cheez-It Bowl vs. Iowa State in 2021. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden as the only head coaches ever to lead an ACC program to 150 wins. It was Swinney's 11th bowl victory, which ties Bowden's record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program.

■ Two of the five active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.

■ Four current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown in 1996, Clemson's Dabo Swinney in 2015 & 2018, Louisville's Scott Satterfield in 2019 and Wake Forest's Dave Clawson in 2021.

### CLEMSON FAVORED IN 2022 ACC FOOTBALL PRE-SEASON POLL

■ Clemson is favored to claim the 2022 Atlantic Coast Conference football title for the seventh time in the last eight years, according to a preseason poll of 164 media voters.

■ The Tigers, who recorded their 11th consecutive double-digit win season with a 10-3 finish in 2021, were also chosen as likely Atlantic Division winners. Miami was picked to finish atop the Coastal Division following a 7-5 campaign last season that included wins in five of the final six games.

■ The 2022 ACC Preseason Poll was conducted via a vote of a media panel, including those who were credentialed for the ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.

■ Clemson was named the likely 2022 ACC champion on 103 ballots. NC State picked up 38 votes, followed by

Miami with eight and Wake Forest with four. Pitt (3), Virginia (3), Florida State (2), North Carolina (2), and Boston College (1) also received votes.

■ In the Atlantic Division preseason voting, Clemson led the way with 111 first-place votes and 1,080 total points. NC State, which was tabbed as the likely second-place finisher, picked up 44 first-place votes while accumulating 959 points.

■ Defending Atlantic Division Champion Wake Forest (six first-place votes, 783 points) was picked for a third-place finish this season, followed by Louisville (591), Florida State (two first-place votes, 509) Boston College (one first-place vote, 469) and Syracuse (201).

■ In the Coastal Division forecast, Miami received 98 first-place votes and amassed 1,036 total points. Defending ACC champion Pitt (38 first-place votes) was next with 911 points, followed by North Carolina (18 first-place votes, 823 points) and Virginia (six first-place votes, 667 points).

■ Virginia Tech (three first-place votes, 592 points), Georgia Tech (one first-place vote, 343 points) and Duke (220 points) closed out the voting.

■ Clemson was selected as the likely ACC champion in the media preseason poll for the fifth consecutive season and the eighth time in the last 10 years.

■ Miami was projected as the preseason Coastal Division champion for the sixth time and the first time since 2018. The Hurricanes' lone Coastal Division championship came in 2017.

■ The Atlantic and Coastal Division winners will meet in the 2022 ACC Football Championship Game on Saturday, December 3, at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium.

• The Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and the Fiesta Bowl are national semifinal sites for the 2022 season. There is no limit on how many teams from one conference can appear in the CFP. If the ACC Champion is in the top four of the final CFP rankings, it will play in one of the national semifinal games. Additional ACC teams could also be selected for the CFP or Goodyear Cotton Bowl as at-large representatives. If the ACC Champion is not in the top four of the final CFP rankings, it will appear in the Capital One Orange Bowl against the highest ranked available non-champion team from the Big Ten or SEC, or Notre Dame.

• The ACC and its bowl partners will make team selections based on several factors, including geographic proximity, avoiding repeat appearances and matchups, and regular-season won-loss records.

• **Capital One Orange Bowl** - The Capital One Orange Bowl will host the ACC Champion (or highest ranked ACC team not ranked in the top four) against the highest ranked available non-Champion team from the Big Ten or SEC.

## NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

■ No other conference won more NCAA national championships in 2021-22 than the ACC. The league's seven titles matched the conference's record in an academic year, which was set in 2009-10. The ACC brought home NCAA Championships in women's cross country (NC State), women's soccer (Florida State), men's soccer (Clemson), women's swimming & diving (Virginia), fencing (Notre Dame), men's tennis (Virginia) and women's lacrosse (North Carolina). Additionally, ACC student-athletes won 24 individual national titles in 2021-22.

■ The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.

■ The ACC has won three of the last nine football national titles and three of the last seven men's basketball national championships (most of any conference).

■ Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

## ACC SUCCESS IN 2021-22

■ Eleven ACC programs finished the 2021-22 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports, and 12 of 15 member schools captured either an ACC or NCAA Championship.

■ Six ACC schools placed among the top 25 of the final Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina finished sixth and was joined in the top 10 by Notre Dame, which placed eighth. Virginia (11th), Florida State (14th), NC State (17th) and Duke (21st) completed the ACC's top-25 contingent. Virginia Tech (33rd place), Louisville (34th), Wake Forest (45th) and Miami (50th) followed to give the ACC 10 institutions among the top 50. This marks the 20th consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.

■ The ACC had the most Honda Award winners of any conference in 2021-22 with four – Florida State's Jaelin Howell (soccer), Virginia's Kate Douglass (swimming), North Carolina's Jamie Ortega (lacrosse) and Louisville's Lauren Thibodeau (Inspiration Award).

## FOOTBALL SUCCESS

■ The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last nine years, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

■ The ACC placed 10 teams in football postseason bowl games in 2021. It is the 21st consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least 10 teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 91 postseason appearances.

■ Four ACC teams finished the 2021 season ranked in the AP Top 25. In the AP poll, ACC Champion Pitt finished No. 13, its highest ranking since 1982. The Panthers were followed by No. 14 Clemson, No. 15 Wake Forest and No. 20 NC State.

■ Pitt quarterback Kenny Pickett finished third in the voting for the 2021 Heisman Trophy. He is the seventh ACC player in the last nine years to finish in the top three, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of FSU and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020.


■ Led by unanimous first-team All-America offensive tackle Ikem Ekwonu of NC State, the ACC placed 12 players – representing eight different schools – on NCAA recognized 2021 All-America teams. Pitt led the league with four selections. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.

■ The ACC continued to establish itself as the Conference of Quarterbacks in 2021, and many of the leading players returned in 2022, including 10 players with at least nine career starts.

■ Ten different quarterbacks from ACC schools started at least one game in the NFL last season – most of any conference.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Scott Satterfield (Louisville) rank among the top 30 in the nation in career winning percentage. Entering the 2022 season, Swinney's winning percentage ranks second in the nation and Brown is second among all active coaches in wins.

■ The ACC announced a new football scheduling model that will go into effect beginning with the 2023 season. The new model is based on a 3-5-5 structure whereby each team will play three primary opponents annually and face the other 10 league teams twice during the four-year cycle, once at home and once on the road. The schedule allows for each team to face all 13 conference opponents home and away at least once during the four-year cycle.



## ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME & BOWL SUCCESS

■ In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that will keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

■ The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, 2020).

■ Eleven different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with eight appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (5).

■ The ACC is in the ninth year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team – either its champion or next available team – in all years when the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten or Notre Dame.

■ Six different ACC teams have played in the prestigious Capital One Orange Bowl since 2013 – Clemson in 2013 & 2015, Georgia Tech in 2014, Florida State in 2016, Miami in 2017, Virginia in 2019 and North Carolina in 2020.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup through 2025 includes the Cheez-It Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Military Bowl Presented by Peraton, New Era Pinstripe Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Holiday Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl and Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the Outback Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten. The league will also send a team to either the Gasparilla Bowl or Birmingham Bowl on an annual basis.

## ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

- Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 634 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 99 first-round picks, the second highest totals of any conference.
- Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft in Las Vegas, headlined by No. 6 pick Ikem Ekwonu (OL) of NC State to the Carolina Panthers. He was joined in the first round by Boston College OL Zion Johnson (17th, Los Angeles Chargers), Pitt QB Kenny Pickett (20th, Pittsburgh Steelers) and Florida State DE Jermaine Johnson II (26th, New York Jets). Clemson cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. was taken in the second round and North Carolina offensive guard Joshua Ezeudu and Virginia tight end Jelani Woods were third round picks. Fourteen ACC players were taken in rounds four through seven.
- Ekwonu is the first ACC offensive lineman taken in the top six picks since Virginia's D'Brickshaw Ferguson was taken fourth overall in 2006.
- The ACC has had 353 players selected since 2013 - the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in five of the last nine drafts. The ACC's 45 draftees in 2018 was its third-highest ever.
- Current ACC teams have had a total of nine players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) and Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) each had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

## ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE - Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2021-22 were the creation and recognition of the inaugural UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "Awareness to Action"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Selma and Montgomery, Alabama in July, 2022.
- The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Greensboro in May, in partnership with the ACC Sports Medicine Association, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, nutritionists, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The 2021 ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge used the series of 28 men's and women's games to bring awareness to the importance of mental health and to help to break down any stigma related to mental health struggles.
- In December, the first cohort of "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy" was completed. The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC's Professional Development Academy was completed in June and featured more than 60 student-athletes coming together as part of a four-week program. The Academy's curriculum, designed and delivered by student-athlete development administrators from ACC member institutions, assisted participants in identifying core values, developing circles of influence, establishing effective communication and leadership skills, and charting career plans.

## ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last eight years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.
- Ten of 14 ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA last November. That tied for the most among Power 5 conferences.
- The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Duke (96), Louisville (93), Pitt (93) and Boston College (92) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- For the 15th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report.
- ACC teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in January 2022. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR. In football, 11 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average 969 (second among peer conferences).

## ACC NETWORK

- Owned and operated by ESPN in partnership with the Atlantic Coast Conference, ACC Network (ACCN) and its digital platform ACCNX is a 24/7 national network dedicated to ACC sports that launched on August 22, 2019. ACCN televises more than 500 regular-season and tournament games from across the conference's 27 sponsored sports plus a complement of news and information shows and original programming. Together, ACCN and its digital platform, ACCNX, combine to feature more than 1,500 ACC events each year. ESPN has been televising ACC content since 1979 and has exclusive rights to every conference-controlled game across all sports and championships.
- Carriage agreements are in place with the following video providers: Comcast's Xfinity, Cox, DIRECTV, DIRECTV STREAM, DISH Network, Frontier, fuboTV, Google Fiber, Hulu+ Live TV, Mediacom, Optimum, Sling TV, Spectrum TV, Suddenlink, Verizon Fios, YouTube TV, members of the NCTC, NRTC and Vivicast, among others. All ACCN games will also be available on the ESPN App to authenticated subscribers. Fans interested in learning more about ACCN can visit <https://getaccn.com>.
- The ACC Network made its first-ever Road Trip in 2021, visiting each of the league's football programs on their respective campuses, which resulted in an hour-long primetime show that included interviews, behind the scenes footage, tour of the football facilities and much more. Following this year's ACC Football Kickoff, ACCN will embark on this year's Road Trip, which promises to bring even more during each school visit.
- During the season, ACCN's premier football program 'The Huddle' took to the road with appearances at NC State, North Carolina, Virginia Tech, Wake Forest, the Subway ACC Football Championship Game and the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl.
- Following the 2021 season, ACC Network took its coverage of ACC Football to new heights. This included a two-hour primetime show to unveil the 2022 ACC Football Schedule, broadcasting all 14 ACC Spring Games and exclusive coverage of signing days and pro days.
