KEY STORYLINES

THE SERIES

- The Hokies and Paladins have met twice, both instances occurring in Kristen Skiera's first two seasons at the helm of Tech's program.
- Both matchups have resulted in Virginia Tech victories, including a 21-10 win in their last meeting in Greenville, S.C. on March 15, 2022.
- Then-freshman Olivia Vergano had a career-high six goals in that 2022 meeting, followed by hat tricks from Sarah Lubnow and Sophie Student.
- The 21 goals scored by Tech in the first meeting tied for the most that meeting and the second-most by the Hokies in the Skiera era.
- Last year's meeting shows up tighter by margin of victory, although the Hokies led by 11 goals at one point in the fourth quarter before Furman scored six of the game's last seven goals in the final 10 minutes.
- Again, Vergano paced the Hokies with four goals, while Ella Rishko, Paige Tyson and Maura O'Malley recorded hat tricks.
- Sarah Gresham was dominant on the draw in the last meeting, hauling in 14 draw controls.

A WIN WOULD..

- Be Virginia Tech's second road win against a Big South opponent this season (Mercer).
- Keep Virginia Tech from dropping back-to-back games for the first time since Feb. 24 and March 5, 2023 (North Carolina and Syracuse).
- Move Virginia Tech to 13-9 on the road under Kristen Skiera.

LAST TIME OUT

- Virginia Tech suffered its first home loss of the season, 15-5, to No. 5 Syracuse on Saturday.
- With that result, all three of Tech's losses have come at the hands of top-five opponents.
- A slow start buried the Hokies, who surrendered six goals in the first quarter. Throughout the game, Tech had 24 turnovers - the most under Kristen Skiera.
- Tech benefitted from five different goalscorers: Caroline Little, Marie Cacciabauda, Grace New, Claire Schotta and Mia Pozzi.
- Syracuse had five players with multiple goals, including Emma Ward, who had three goals and three assists.

WEST BABYLON, STAND UP!

- Virginia Tech's offense has been led by a pair of West Babylon High School teammates in Kayla Downey and Olivia Vergano. The two were not only lacrosse high school teammates, but also played basketball and soccer throughout their childhoods together.
- Vergano is leading the way in goalscoring with 18 goals, while Downey has set the bar high with 21 assists through seven games.

RECORD WATCH

- Kayla Downey's 21 assists this season puts her tied for ninth all-time in a single-season, with Natasha Fuchs holding the crown with 36 in 2005.

MORE STORYLINES

ELITE COMPANY

- With Vergano's career numbers (104 goals) paired with Downey's (132 goals, 114 assists), the Hokies are one of 11 programs with at least one player at 100+ goals and at least one player with 100+ career assists.
- Joining the Hokies in that category: Notre Dame, Denver, Virginia, UAlbany, Northwestern, Lehigh, North Carolina, Maryland, Boston College and Syracuse.
- In the draw circle, Virginia Tech is the only program with two players at 45+ draw controls this season.

VERGANO SETS THE PACE

- Twice named an honorable mention All-American (Inside Lacrosse, 2022; USA Lacrosse Magazine, 2023), Olivia Vergano enters her third season with the Hokies on Saturday.
- Vergano's league honors have gradually increased in her first two seasons with Tech, as well. She was on the ACC's All-Freshman team in 2022 before being named second team All-ACC in 2023.
- In 2023, she was one of five players nationally (and the only in the ACC) to have 100+ draw controls and 50+ goals.

CLAIRE SCHOTTA BIG BREAK

- Senior Claire Schotta's goal against Syracuse put her at 17 for the season, which surpasses her previous single-season career high (16) that she set in 2023.
- With goals in every game this season, Schotta is riding an eight-game scoring streak that dates back to Virginia Tech's game against Syracuse in the ACC Tournament last year.
- Over her last five outings, the Charlottesville, Va. native is averaging 2.8 points per game.

GLAD TO HAVE YA HERE

- Virginia Tech is itching closer to getting its full rotation of players, as Lauren Render made her season debut last week against Boston College.
- The March 3 outing marked Render's first game since getting injured 11 games into her freshman season, in which she had seven goals and four assists at the time.
- Against Queens (N.C.) on February 21, freshman Isa Torres made her first career appearance for Tech.

WATCHLIST HOKIES

- Virginia Tech's Isa Torres and Zoe Stencil were represented on ILWomen's Power 100 Rankings for the Class of 2023.
- Torres was No. 28 on the list, while Stencil appeared on the Watchlist portion of the rankings.

SHUTOUT QUARTERS

- With their shutout second quarter against Elon, the Hokies have held three opponents scoreless in a quarter this season.

ONE-TWO PUNCH ON THE DRAW

- Virginia Tech is the only DI women's lacrosse program in the country with two players in the top-25 of total draw controls. Vergano is 14th nationally with 51 draw controls, while Gresham is 23rd with 45 draw controls.
- Both Sarah Gresham (111) and Olivia Vergano (106) broke the program's previous single-season draw control record in 2023, which was held by Tristan McGinley (96) in the 2018 season.

NEW FACES IN THE FOLD

- Ten Hokies have made their debuts for Virginia Tech through the first six games.
- Transfers Mackenzie Beam, Molly Dunphey and Kayla Downey made contributions in their first Tech appearances, while freshmen Marie Cacciabauda, Mia Pozzi and Zoe Stencil have represented the freshmen corp.
- Cacciabauda and Pozzi scored their first career goals at Mercer, while Stencil has earned reps off the bench with the defense.
- Lauren Kelly scored her first career goal for Tech against Queens on Wednesday.

WE'VE GOT HISTORY

- Two of Virginia Tech's transfers, Kayla Downey and Ainsley Malamala, have faced the Hokies in their careers.
- In 2022, Downey scored a goal and recorded an assist in Coastal Carolina's 17-6 loss to Tech.
- In 2023, Malamala started for Mercer in its 11-8 win Blacksburg.

GOAL-SCORING RETENTION

- Over the last six seasons, which dates back to Virginia Tech's first and only NCAA Tournament berth in 2018, the Hokies are returning the highest percentage of scoring in that span.
- In 2023, the Hokies scored the most goals in a season since the 2019 campaign.

YOU CAN COUNT ON GOLINI

- Coach Skiera often cites Sydney Golini as one of Tech's most under-appreciated players.
- The unsuspecting 5-4 defender typically picks up the opponent's toughest matchup on the attacking end and holds her own.
- A native of East Setauket, N.Y., Golini has an endless motor, which is often showcased in the Hokies' conditioning drills.

MORE STORYLINES

IT'S A SISTER THING

- The pair of Isa and Jocelyn Torres join Keelin and MC Byrne as sisters within the lacrosse program this season.
- Next year, Ella Rishko will be joined by her sister Lulu, who signed with the Hokies in November as part of their 2024 recruiting class.

MARY GRIFFIN RECOGNIZED

- Senior Mary Griffin has one of the most inspirational stories in college athletics.
- During the fall of 2020, Griffin was diagnosed with a neuroendocrine tumor on her pancreas. It was discovered after Virginia Tech medical personnel ordered a biopsy following Griffin experiencing pain in her side while conditioning.
- She had an operation in November 2020 to remove the tumor, her spleen and 40% of her pancreas.
- Just four months following her diagnosis, Griffin was back on the field competing for Virginia Tech in the spring of 2021.
- In June 2022, Griffin was honored with the 2022 Wilma Rudolph Student-Athlete Achievement Award by the N4A.

GRACIE FROM TEAM IMPACT

- Last spring, the team was paired up with Grace Fladhammer via Team Impact and welcomed her as part of their team.
- Team Impact is an organization that pairs children facing serious illness and disability with college sports team.
- "Gracie" is a big lacrosse fan, who participates in the local New River lacrosse league.
- In the fall, the Hokies had a "Signing Day" ceremony for Gracie, where she was able to have a photoshoot and sign her letter of commitment with the team after practice.



MS. DOWNEY

- While the other three transfers joined the Hokies in the fall, Kayla Downey remained in New York while she completed her student teaching requirements, as she aspires to be an educator one day.

THERE'S STRENGTH IN NUMBERS

- It seems obvious to state that the more goalscorers a team has, the more likely it is to win. However, it rings especially true for Virginia Tech and is a point of emphasis for the Hokies.
- Under Kristen Skiera, the Hokies are 21-5 when four or more players score multiple goals in a game and 10-2 when five players reach the same mark.
- Tech hasn't lost a game in which four or more players scored multiple goals since April 21, 2022. There have been 15 games in which that has occurred since that loss.

SPIDEY SENSES

- Sarah Gresham picked up the nickname "Spidey" during her freshman season and that has certainly stuck around.
- Grace New attributed to Gresham's ability to wrangle in so many draws as "spidey senses," and since then, her name has been forever changed within the Hokies locker room.

FIFTH-YEAR PRESENCE

- The Hokies' roster consists of seven fifth-year players, including three that have been with Virginia Tech throughout the entirety of their careers in Mary Griffin, Grace New and Paige Tyson.
- The trio of graduate student Hokies have a combined 115 appearances for Tech entering 2024.
- Joining those three is a quartet of transfers: Kayla Downey, Mackenzie Beam, Ainsley Malamala and Molly Dunphey.
- The four transfers have 218 combined starts in their career entering the 2024 season.
- Notably, four of the seven are defenders, while the other three are attackers.

ALL GOOD THINGS MUST COME TO AN END

- Fifth-year transfer Kayla Downey held a 22-game scoring streak heading into Tech's game vs. No. 1 BC.
- When the Hokies faced Downey's previous school Coastal Carolina in 2022, she scored once.

LONG ISLAND CONNECTIONS

- With the help of Northport, N.Y. native Shannon Jacobitti on staff, the Hokies have been able to build up a contingent of Long Island, N.Y. players.
- The Hokies expect big things of all four Long Island natives on the team: Olivia Vergano (West Babylon), Kayla Downey (Babylon), Marie Cacciabauda (Garden City) and Sydney Golini (East Setauket).

MORE STORYLINES

A SPECIAL BOND WITH A SPECIAL TEAM

- Head coach Kristen Skiera met with Virginia Tech women's basketball coach Kenny Brooks during her interview in Blacksburg and since then, has had a special bond with Brooks and members of his team.
- The women's basketball team made the Final Four in 2023, which served as inspiration for the lacrosse program which started a rebuild similar to the one that Brooks inherited when he came to Blacksburg in 2016.
- Furthermore, when Skiera was in the process of moving to the area, she temporarily lived next to star players and All-Americans Elizabeth Kitley and Georgia Amooore. The two created a bond with Skiera's family, including her daughter Cazlen. Both Kitley and Amooore can be seen often at Tech lacrosse games due to their close friendship with several players.
- In the fall, Brooks invited the lacrosse team to watch them practice.



SOUTHERN DRAW

- In order to have the nation's best one-two punch on the draw last season, the Hokies utilized an invention by Kristen Skiera's father, Steve Waagbo, who graduated from Virginia Tech with a degree in Civil Engineering.
- The "Southern Draw" is a contraption that allows the draw specialists to practice their draws without another individual matching up with them.
- Last year's initial prototype was made out of wood, but this year's version is composed of steel to last through outdoor conditions.

SOMETHING IS BREWING

- After Virginia Tech took No. 2 Syracuse to the wire in the ACC Championships quarterfinal last April, falling a few goals of the biggest upset college lacrosse would have seen that season, there was a special energy in the locker room. The result capped off a fourth loss by four goals or less to a top-12 ranked team in 2023 – in a sport which goals often come aplenty.

Skiera often speaks of the positive energy in the locker room after the Syracuse game - knowing that something special was brewing on a larger scale within the program.



HOKIES IN RED, WHITE AND BLUE

- Following their stellar freshman campaigns, Ella Rishko, Sarah Gresham and Jocelyn Torres were all selected to participate in the United States U20 team tryouts ahead of the World Lacrosse 2024 Women's U20 Championship in Hong Kong, China in August.
- Torres progressed passed tryouts and has been part of the country's training team roster, which will be cut down ahead of the summer competition.
- Virginia Tech's athletic trainer, Anne Bryan, was chosen to serve as the team's athletic trainer. She has attended tryouts and training camps along with the three players, and will travel with the team to Hong Kong.
- Head coach Kristen Skiera (2003) and associate head coach Shannon Jacobitti (2011) were members of past United States world championship teams when the competition fielded U19 teams.

Since being named head coach of Virginia Tech lacrosse on June 11, 2021, Kristen Skiera has conducted one of the more impressive turnarounds of a collegiate lacrosse program in recent time. Skiera, or “Waags” as she’s nicknamed in the lacrosse community, has improved Tech’s total and ACC win totals in both of her first two seasons.

Skiera was inspired to get into coaching after a successful two-time All-American, Tewaaraton semifinalist career at Duke, where she played had four Final Four appearances. She had the privilege of playing and working under two of lacrosse’s greatest ever coaches, Kerstin Kimel and Cindy Timchal, respectively.

The 2018 U.S. Lacrosse Greater Baltimore Chapter Hall of Fame inductee specializes in working with Virginia Tech’s attacking group, which has produced a pair of All-Americans in Sarah Lubnow and Olivia Vergano since Skiera arrived ahead of the 2022 season.

An Ellicott City, Md. native, Skiera oversaw Army women’s lacrosse’s transition from club to varsity sport, where she compiled a 46-40 record and developed 12 All-Patriot league players for the Black Knights.

Skiera resides in Christiansburg, Va. with her husband, Kyle, and their two daughters, Caslen and Lane.

Shannon Jacobitti is in her third season with Virginia Tech lacrosse after following Skiera from Army, where she held the same position on staff. In her role with the Hokies, Jacobitti directs the midfield and oversees the draw control training.

It was under Jacobitti’s watch in 2023 that two Tech players, Sarah Gresham (111) and Olivia Vergano (106) broke the program’s single-season draw control record.

An accomplished player in her own right, Jacobitti was a two-time Tewaaraton finalist and finished tied eighth all-time in NCAA history for goals.

MC Byrne joined Skiera’s initial staff at Virginia Tech in 2021, returning to the program that she played at from 2015 to 2019. In her role with the Hokies, Byrne oversees the defensive unit and worked with goalie prior to the arrival of assistant coach Taylor Paige.

Under her watch, four defenders have earned career highs in caused turnovers. As a player for Virginia Tech, she finished her career ranked third all-time in caused turnovers and sixth all-time in ground balls.

"[Skiera] is just always likes bringing the energy. I always say I'm so impressed [because] she could be so mad at us, then like 10 minutes later be like, "Okay, guys!
