ACC NOTES

GREATNESS JUST GOT GREATER

- The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1, 2023, to formally admit the University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford joined the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and August 2, 2024 (Cal and Stanford). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.
- The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially and create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men.
- Cal, SMU and Stanford will begin competing in the ACC across their respective sponsored sports starting this year, 2024-25.

GREATNESS IS WHAT WE DO

■ The ACC announced its new creative campaign, "ACCOMPLISH GREATNESS," a multi-part brand campaign highlighting the vast success of the ACC's athletics and academics alike ahead of the ACC's official college football season on Week 1 of last year. The campaign is set to commence its second year around the start of the 2024 ACC football season.

WEEK O TV VIEWERSHIP LOVE

- The 2024 college football season opener between Georgia Tech and No. 10 Florida State in the Aer Lingus College Football Classic Game in Dublin, Ireland, Week 0 (August 24) had 5.0 million viewers.
- The conference contest was the most-watched Week 0 game on any network since 2019. The viewership was up 40 percent over 3.56 million viewers that watched last year's Aer Lingus College Football Classic in 2023 between Notre Dame and Navy on NBC.

WEEK 1 TV VIEWERSHIP HISTORY

- The ACC was part of history on Saturday, August 31, as it was ABC's second-most-watched Kickoff Saturday on record. (ESPN PR)
- The ACC had teams in two of the three games that were part of the historical day in Clemson and Miami.

- The Clemson versus Georgia Aflac Kickoff Game in Atlanta was the most-watched Week 1 Noon Game on record, peaking at 9.5 million viewers.
- The in-state rivalry contest between Miami and Florida in Gainesville. Florida, was the most-watched Week 1 Late Afternoon Game since 2017.

THREE TEAMS RANKED IN LATEST AP TOP 25 POLL

- The ACC has three teams ranked in the AP Top 25 Poll this week (September 22), the same three teams that were in the poll last week. All three teams moved up in this week's poll - Miami (No. 7), Louisville (No. 15), and Clemson (No. 17).
- Miami is in the top 10 of the AP Poll for the third consecutive week this season. Prior to this year, the Hurricanes were last ranked in the top 10 at No. 9 in the Week 14 poll in the 2020 season (December 6, 2020). Sunday's No. 7 ranking is tied for Miami's highest ranking in the AP poll since October 4, 2020, when the Hurricanes also checked in seventh nationally.
- With their conference home wins last week | Louisville and Clemson both climbed up four spots this week.
- Three other teams received votes in the poll Boston College (55), Pitt (37) and SMU (2).

TRIO OF TEAMS RANKED IN MOST RECENT COACHES POLL

- Three ACC teams were ranked in the latest top 25 of the US LBM Coaches Poll (September 22) - Miami (No. 9), Clemson (No. 15) and Louisville (No. 17).
- Miami moved up two spots and into the top 10 at No. 9 this week, while Clemson jumped four spots and Louisville climbed up three spots, respectively, with their home conference wins last week.
- Four other ACC teams received votes in the coaches poll - Pitt (50), Boston College (15), Duke (14) and SMU (4).

ACC FIRST TO 800 WINS

- Clemson became just the 14th FBS program, and first ACC program, to win 800 games with its 59-35 home win over NC State in the Textile Bowl on September 21.
- Four other ACC schools in Virginia Tech (775), Pitt (765), Georgia Tech (759) and Syracuse (745) rank in the top 25 among the programs with the most all-time wins in FBS history.

WEEK 4 - LIGHTING OF THE SCOREBOARD

- Week 4 saw an ACC-record 743 points scored combined by the 16 ACC teams that played.
- Seven teams scored 40 points or more on the week, highlighted by 73 points from Pitt in a 73-17 win over Youngstown State.

ACC HISTORY CONTINUES - A FIRST FOR SMU

- Week 5 of the 2024 college football season will mark a historical one, as SMU will play its first conference game as an ACC member when the Mustangs host Florida State on Saturday, September 28, at 8 p.m. ET in Dallas, Texas.
- The Mustangs' ACC first comes one week after both Stanford and Cal played their first league game last week in Week 4, both of which came on the road.
- Stanford was victorious in its ACC opener, becoming the ninth current or former ACC program to win its first-ever league game.
- This week, SMU has the chance to join Stanford and seven other full-time schools - Duke, North Carolina, Maryland, Florida State, Miami, Louisville and Virginia Tech, as well as Notre Dame (2020) - in winning their first conference game as a member of the ACC.

- Cal was unable to win in its ACC opener, as the Golden Bears fell on the road at Florida State 14-9 on Saturday, September 21.
- Like Cal, SMU drew Florida State for its program's firstever ACC game on September 28. The Seminoles have been a team's first-ever conference opponent four times thus far, with the fifth coming versus SMU, the most by an ACC team, and has played the spoiler on most occasions, having gone 3-1 in those contests.

CLOSE CALLS CONTINUE IN ACC PLAY

- The ACC has been known for close games each year throughout conference play the last few years. Prior to the start of this season, the ACC had 73 league games decided by eight points or less over the last three years (2021-23).
- The 73 one-touchdown score games came over 168 total conference games during the three-year span, a mark of 43.5 percent.
- The trend has continued this season in 2024, as five of the eight ACC league games to date have been decided by less than eight points.

RETURNS FOR SCORES

- SMU scored three non-conference touchdowns by way of an interception return, fumble return and a punt return in the 66-42 win over in-state rival TCU for the Iron Skillet on September 21.
- The three non-offensive touchdowns were the most by the Mustangs in a single game since posting four non-offensive scores on three interception returns and a fumble return in a 72-42 win versus Houston on October 18, 2012.
- The interception return, fumble return and punt return for a touchdown by the Mustangs in the win over TCU marked the first time a team scored by all three of those returns in a single game since Virginia Tech accomplished that feat in a 59-7 win over North Carolina in 2017 (October 21, 2017).

SMU & CAL WIN IN DEBUTS AS ACC MEMBERS

- In its first game football game as an official member of the ACC, the SMU Mustangs outscored Nevada 16-0 in the fourth quarter to defeat the Wolf Pack 29-24 on August 24.
- One week later in Week 1, California defeated UC Davis 31-13 in the Golden Bears' first game as an official member of the ACC on August 31.
- SMU and Cal joined nine other schools in recording a win in their first-ever football game as a full-time member of the ACC.
- Stanford suffered a 34-27 loss to TCU in Week 1 (August 30) in its first football game as an ACC member.

- The ACC is the Conference of Quarterbacks, which was displayed across several preseason awards watch lists:
- 13 quarterbacks named to the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award preseason watch list, the most of any conference.
- 10 quarterbacks named to the Maxwell Award preseason watch list, no other conference had more.
- Eight quarterbacks named to the Davey O'Brien Award preseason watch list, no other conference had
- top-ranked group of quarterback transfers in 2024 by
- 13 QBs in the league enter the 2024 season with over 20 career TD passes and 3,500 career passing yards.
- Since 2018, the ACC has had at least one quarterback drafted in the first round in five different drafts — the only conference to do that.

- has thrown for over 15,000 yards passing in his career, making him the 13th player recognized by the NCAA to have reached that milestone.
- became the first ACC quarterback to throw for more than 300 yards and three touchdowns in the first four starts of his career in the last 25 years with another dominant outing at South Florida last week (September 21).
- the first Miami quarterback to begin a season with four consecutive 300-yard passing games.
- his 350-plus passing yards in the season debut are the most in a Miami debut by any Hurricanes' quarterback since at least 1980.
 - · leads all of FBS with 14 passing touchdowns.
- ranks second in all of FBS in passing yards with 1,439 and in passing yards per game at 359.8.
- ranks second in all of FBS in total offense per game with an average of 382.0 vards per game.
- has the second-best QBR rating (94.4) on the season per ESPN.

Kyle McCord - Syracuse

- the first guarterback in Syracuse history to throw for 300 yards or more in consecutive games, doing it in each of his first three starts for the Orange.
- · leads the FBS in completions per game with average of 28.67 per game.
- · ranks third in all of FBS in passing yards per game with an average of 358.0.
- ranks fourth in all of FBS in total offense with an average of 358.3 yards per game.

Eli Holstein - Pitt

- the first Pitt quarterback to win his initial four starts since Dan Marino in 1979.
- became the first freshman (redshirt or true) in Pitt history to throw for 300-plus yards in three consecutive games, his first three games of the season.

Cade Klubnik - Clemson

- · ranks ninth in all of FBS in completion percentage at 73.4 percent.
- has the third-best QBR rating (93.3) on the season per **FSPN**

Tyler Shough - Louisville

- ranks sixth in all of FBS in passing efficiency at 197.1.

ACC CONTINUES PARTNERSHIP WITH COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF FOUNDATION

- The ACC announced its plans to partner with the College Football Playoff Foundation (CFPF) again as part of this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week (September 14-21). The initiatives include support for this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week, Big Day for Teachers and the distribution of grant funds to support teachers in Charlotte.
- For the second straight year, the ACC will work with a local Charlotte Mecklenburg School (CMS) to remodel a space that will directly impact the school's students on a daily basis. Last year, the conference worked with members of the Winding Springs Elementary administration, teachers and staff as they were the recipients of a \$50,000 Extra Yard makeover. Additional details on this year's makeover will be announced in the future.
- Since the inception of the ACC and CFPF partnership, over \$1.2 million has been given to support teachers in the ACC footprint. During the 2023-24 school year, the CFPF and ACC supported over 4,000 students.

ACC FOOTBALL ON LABOR DAY

- Boston College and No. 10 Florida State capped off Week 1 of the 2024 college football season with a Labor Day showdown in ACC play on Monday, September 2, at 7:30 p.m. ET on ESPN.
- All 17 teams were in action over Labor Day weekend, August 29 through September 2, with 16 games spanning four days - Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Monday.

CAM WARD OF MIAMI NAMED PRESEASON POTY

- Miami senior quarterback Cam Ward was voted the 2024 ACC Preseason Player of the Year, which was selected via a vote of 170 media members who were among those credentialed at the ACC Football Kickoff.
- The nation's leading returner in passing yards per game this season, Ward finished the regular season last year leading the Pac-12 Conference with 323 completions while at Washington State in 2023. He ranked fourth in the country with an average of 311.3 passing yards per game and was sixth nationally with an average of 323.3 yards of total offense per game. Ward tallied seven 300-passing yard games, threw 25 touchdown passes, rushed for eight touchdowns and recorded five games with one rushing touchdown and at least two touchdown passes.
- Ward led the 2024 ACC Preseason Player of the Year balloting with 71 votes, followed by North Carolina running back Omarion Hampton. Clemson linebacker Barrett Carter received 15 votes, Virginia Tech quarterback Kyron Drones garnered 13 votes and Georgia Tech quarterback Haynes King received 12 votes, as 11 players received at least one vote for Preseason Player of the Year.

FLORIDA STATE FAVORED TO REPEAT IN 2024

- Florida State, the 2023 defending ACC Champions, has been picked to win the 2024 Atlantic Coast Conference football title.
- The 2024 ACC Preseason Poll was conducted via a vote of a media panel, including those who were credentialed at the ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- The Seminoles went 13-1 overall last season, including a perfect 8-0 record in conference play, on their way to winning the 2023 ACC title and the program's first ACC Championship since 2014. Florida State was predicted as the 2024 ACC champion on 81 ballots.
- Coming off a 9-4 season last year, which ended with five-straight wins, including a victory in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, Clemson garnered 55 first-place votes. Miami racked up 17 first-place votes, while NC State (8), Virginia Tech (5) and Cal (2) also received multiple first-place votes. Boston College and Georgia Tech each received one first-place vote.
- Florida State led all teams with 2,708 points, while Clemson was second with 2,657 points. Miami placed third with 2,344 points, and NC State captured fourth with 2,318 points. The next two teams were tightly bunched, with Louisville in fifth with 1,984 points and Virginia Tech in sixth with 1,968 points.

20TH ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SET FOR 8 P.M. ET

- The 2024 ACC Football Championship Game will be the 20th ACC Football Championship Game.
- The championship game will kick off at 8 p.m. ET on ABC on Saturday, December 7, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte. For the second consecutive season, the championship game will feature the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.
- This is the 15th time in the last 16 years that the game will be held in primetime. A total of 13 different teams have competed in the game since it began in 2005. Last season, No. 4 Florida State used a dominant defensive performance to defeat No. 14 Louisville 16-6 to win its fifth ACC Football Championship Game (2005, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2023) and its 16th ACC title.
- Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has been the site of 13 of the last 14 ACC Football Championship Games. In 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation reached an agreement to keep the game in Charlotte through 2030. Not including the 2020 game, which had limited attendance due to the pandemic, ACC Football championship games played at Bank of America Stadium have had an average attendance of nearly 70,000 fans. The ACC has the second-highest average attendance of any Power 5 conference championship game since 2010.
- The winner of the conference championship game has gone on to play in the National Championship Game or compete in the College Football Playoff in eight of the last 11 seasons, including two teams in 2020.

2024-30 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE MODEL ANNOUNCED

- The ACC announced its future football schedule model for the next seven years, 2024-2030. With the addition of the ACC's three new member institutions beginning this fall - Cal, SMU and Stanford - the new model will go into effect starting with the 2024 season.
- The new schedule will continue with no divisions. feature 17 schools and will increase the number of annual conference matchups from 56 to 68. The top two teams based on conference winning percentage will compete in the ACC Football Championship Game on the first Saturday in December at Bank of America Stadium.
- The approved format will continue to have each member institution play eight conference games per season, with all 17 teams playing each other at least twice over the next seven seasons - once at home and once on the road. The previous 14 conference teams from 2023 will play a total of three times each in California over the seven years, and none will travel west to California in back-to-back seasons.
- The new model protects 16 annual matchups. Of the 16 matchups, 11 were retained from the current 3-5-5 schedule model, two were restored rivalries from the divisional format in Miami-Virginia Tech and NC State-Wake Forest and the three new schools fill the remaining three. The annual protected matchups are Boston College-Syracuse, Boston College-Pitt, Syracuse-Pitt, North Carolina-Virginia. North Carolina-Duke. North Carolina-NC State, NC State-Wake Forest, NC State-Duke, Duke-Wake Forest, Virginia Tech-Virginia, Florida State-Clemson, Miami-Florida State, Miami-Virginia Tech, Stanford-Cal, Stanford-SMU, and Cal-SMU

- Swinney (99) is attempting to join Mack Brown (156), Kirk Ferentz (121) and Brian Kelly (103) as the only active FBS coaches to win 100 career home games, according to Stats Perform

ACC COACHING NOTES

- ACC head football coaches headlined the 2024 Dodd Trophy Preseason Watch List, as announced by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation and the Peach Bowl, as six coaches across the ACC were named to the preseason watch list, the most of any conference.
- The six head coaches hailing from the ACC included Jeff Brohm of Louisville, Mario Cristobal of Miami, Dave Doeren of NC State, Mike Norvell of Florida State, Brent Pry of Virginia Tech and Dabo Swinney of Clemson.
- Among active FBS head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Rhett Lashlee (SMU), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Troy Taylor (Stanford), Bill O'Brien (Boston College), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Jeff Brohm (Louisville) all rank among the top 50 in the nation in career winning percentage.
- North Carolina's Mack Brown is just one win behind Brian Kelly of LSU for the most career wins among all active coaches with 285 career wins.
- North Carolina's Mack Brown made college football history last season in 2023, becoming the first head coach to win 100 games at two different FBS schools. He recorded 158 wins at Texas from 1998-2013 and has posted 110 wins at North Carolina in what is now his 16th season in Chapel Hill.
- Clemson's Dabo Swinney owns 172 career wins, the eighth-most among active coaches. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden (173) as the only two head coaches to lead an ACC program to 150 wins or more.
- Two of the three active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.
- Four current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown (1996), Clemson's Dabo Swinney (2015 & 2018), Wake Forest's Dave Clawson (2021) and Florida State's Mike Norvell (2023).
- Four current ACC coaches have won over 100 games in their coaching careers - Mack Brown (North Carolina), Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Dave Clawson (Wake Forest) and Dave Doeren (NC State).

SYRACUSE, DUKE & BC HIRE NEW HEAD COACHES

- Fran Brown was named the 31st head coach at Syracuse on November 28, 2023, A native of Camden. New Jersey, Brown spent the past two seasons with Georgia (2022-23), including a part of the national championship team in 2022. He has also coached at Rutgers (2020-21), Baylor (2017-18), and Temple (2011-
- Manny Diaz was named the 23rd head football coach at Duke on December 7, 2023. The former Miami head coach, most recently served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Penn State for the past two seasons. In Diaz's 26 years of coaching, three have been spent as a head coach and 15 as a defensive coordinator.
- Bill O'Brien becomes the 37th head coach in Boston College history, it was announced on February 9, 2024. A 32-year coaching veteran in the college and professional ranks, O'Brien was elevated to his first head coaching post at Penn State in 2012. He guided the Nittany Lions to an overall record of 15-9 and 10-6 Big Ten mark during the span of two seasons while directing the program through a postseason ban. He was named the head coach of the NFL's Houston Texans in 2014, leading the franchise to a 52-48 record, four AFC South Division titles, and four playoff appearances - including two Wild Card round wins between 2014 and 2020. After his time in Houston, O'Brien returned to the college game as the quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator at Alabama under Nick Saban in 2021 and 2022

AROUND THE ACC

- ♦ Boston College: In the Eagles' win at home over Michigan State last week in the 11th Annual Red Bandanna Game to honor Welles Crowther '99, Treshaun Ward (102 yards) and Lewis Bond (102 yards) became the first BC duo with 100 rushing and 100 receiving yards since A.J. Dillion and Kobay White at Florida State on (November 17, 2018). Quarterback Thomas Castellanos has been efficient all season long, as he ranks third in the ACC and eighth nationally in passing efficiency at 193.2 on the year.
- ♦ California: In the Golden Bears' first-ever ACC game last week at Florida State, quarterback Fernando Mendoza passed for a career-high 303 yards in the loss. Mendoza connected with nine different players, marking the third consecutive game that the Golden Bears have had nine players or more with at least one reception. On defense, Cal extended its national lead to 10 interceptions when Miles Williams picked off Seminoles quarterback DJ Uiagalelei in the first quarter.
- ♦ Clemson: Clemson earned its 800th all-time win, becoming the 14th FBS program and first ACC program ever to win 800 games last week in a big way in the double-digit win over NC State. The Clemson offense has found its way over the last two games, as the Tigers have scored 50 points in back-to-back games for the first time since a four-game streak late in the 2019 season. The Tigers have totaled 500 yards or more of offense in back-to-back games for the first time since 2022 against Louisiana Tech and Wake Forest.
- ♦ Duke: The Blue Devils stand at 4-0 on the season and will aim for their first 5-0 start since a 7-0 beginning in 1994. Duke has already obtained consecutive 4-0 starts to a season for just the fourth time in program history and is looking for their fifth win of the season to record the third consecutive season with five or more wins for just the third time since 2012 and just the sixth time since 1950. Duke has won six consecutive games dating back to the end of the 2023 season. The winning streak is the longest active streak in the ACC and tied for the fourth longest nationally.
- ♦ Florida State: The Seminoles are the first conference game for SMU in the ACC this week, marking the second straight week that FSU is playing a team for its ACC debut after defeating Cal last Saturday (September 21). Florida State plays its first true road game this week, after opening the season in Dublin, Ireland, and then playing three straight home games. The Seminoles have won seven consecutive road games, which is tied for the sixth-longest active streak in the country.
- ♦ Georgia Tech: The Yellow Jackets suffered their first loss in six games against nationally ranked ACC opponents under head coach Brent Key last week at then-No. 19 Louisville. Against a Louisville defense that had nine sacks in its first two games, Georgia Tech did not allow a sack for the fifth-straight game to start the season. The Jackets' are one of just five teams that have not allowed a sack yet this season.

- ♦ Louisville: The Cardinals, known for their high-scoring offense, scored in all three phases for the first time since 2013, with an offensive touchdown, defensive touchdown and a special teams score in the home ACC win over Georgia Tech last week. Louisville ranks ninth nationally with an average of 6.4 yards per carry. The Cards also rank fourth nationally with seven runs of 20 or more yards and are fourth with four rushes of over 30 yards.
- ♦ Miami: The Hurricanes rank first in the ACC and fourth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 52.3 points per game over their first four games. The Canes' offense leads the ACC and ranks second nationally in total offense with an average of 605.0 yards per game, led by transfer quarterback Cam Ward who has spearheaded the ACC's number one and the nation's second-best passing offense at 405.0 yards per game through the air. Ward also leads all of FBS with 14 passing touchdowns and has passed for over 300 yards in each of his four starts for Miami.
- ♦ North Carolina: The Tar Heels totaled 616 yards of offense last Saturday (September 21), the most for the Tar Heels in a game since going for 644 against Syracuse last season. It was the 23rd time UNC has gained 600-plus yards. In his first start, quarterback Jacolby Criswell threw for a career-high 475 yards and three touchdowns. The 475 yards was the third-highest passing mark in a single game by a Tar Heel and also the most by a quarterback in all of FBS this season.
- ♦ NC State: NCSU head coach Dave Doeren's first stint as a head coach was at Northern Illinois in 2011 and 2012. He led the Huskies to two MAC titles (including the first one in school history) and never lost a home game in his two seasons as head coach. Since the beginning of the 2020 campaign, NC State is 20-1 when winning the turnover margin. In their two losses this season, the Wolfpack lost the turnover battle. The Pack has won each of the last 10 games when winning the TO margin.
- ♦ Pitt: The Panthers have started the year 4-0 for the first time since 2000 and only the second time since 1991. For the first time in program history, Pitt went undefeated in non-conference play for a season, having won each of its four non-conference games this year. Pitt's 194 points over the first four games are the team's second highest through four games since 2000, which was aided by 73 points in the home win over Youngstown State last week, the third most points recorded by a Narduzzi team in a game.
- ♦ SMU: In the Mustangs' 66-42 rout of TCU in the Iron Skillet rivalry game last week, SMU's defense scored two touchdowns and forced five turnovers, the most in a game for the Mustangs since 2015 against East Carolina. The five takeaways made it three games in a row with at least three turnovers forced for the Mustangs. There was also a punt return for a touchdown and three field goals on special teams to add to the offense's five trips to the end zone in the win. Brashard Smith broke out with four total touchdowns, including three rushing scores, both careerhighs, while racking up 190 all-purpose yards in the win.

- ♦ Stanford: The Cardinal is coming off its first-ever ACC win by beating Syracuse 26-24 on the road last Friday (September 20), handing the Orange its first loss of 2024. Stanford is 4-2 in road games since the start of last season, with three of those wins coming in conference play. Stanford's rush defense has been one of the best in the nation the last two seasons, allowing an average of just 36.4 rushing yards per game to opponents in wins since the start of the 2023 season, or 182 yards in five games. This season, Stanford's run defense ranks third in FBS and leads the ACC, allowing just 51.7 rushing yards per game.
- ♦ Syracuse: Wide receiver Trebor Pena has proven he is more than just a return specialist this season, as he has been the most frequent target for quarterback Kyle McCord on the offensive side of the ball. Pena leads the team in both receptions (22) and receiving yards (267). Last week in the loss to Stanford, Pena recorded career highs in both catches (10) and receiving yards (101) against Stanford. He ranks 11th in the nation in receptions per game (5.42) and 24th in receiving yards per game (89.0).
- ♦ Virginia: The Cavaliers found their offense via the run game in the road win at Coastal Carolina last week, as Virginia rushed for 384 yards, marking the first time that a UVA team has eclipsed the 300-yard rushing mark since 2018 versus Richmond. It was the most rushing yards in a game by a UVA offense since compiling 446 yards against San Jose State in 1998. Virginia accumulated 525 yards of total offense (384 rush, 141 pass) in the win last week, the most in a game under head coach Tony Elliott and the most since racking up 588 against BYU in 2021.
- ♦ Virginia Tech: Running back Bhayshul Tuten ran for 122 yards on 15 carries against Rutgers last time out, averaging more than eight yards per carry and scoring three times. Tuten has also eclipsed the century mark in rushing yards a total of five times in the last six games. The three rushing touchdowns tied his career high. The do-it-all back has scored in all four games this season and has eight scores on the year overall for the Hokies. The senior has now registered 43 career all-purpose touchdowns, including 33 rushing scores.
- ♦ Wake Forest: The Demon Deacons and head coach Dave Clawson thrive on special teams each year and it is no different this season. This season, Matthew Dennis is 6-of-6 in field goal attempts and a perfect 9-of-9 in extra points. Over the course of his career, Dennis is 32-of-40 on field goal tries, posting an 80.0 career percentage which ranks second in program history. Ivan Mora is having the best punting season of his career, averaging 47.4 yards per punt including four punts of 50-plus yards. His 42.0 career average per punt ranks fifth in program history.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

The selection committee ranks the teams based on the members' evaluation of the teams' performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results. and comparison of results against common opponents to decide among teams that are comparable.

Starting in the 2024 season, the format of the College Football Playoff is built on a 12-team bracket. The 12 participating teams are the five conference champions ranked highest by the CFP selection committee, plus the next seven highest-ranked teams. The four highest-ranked conference champions will be seeded 1-4 and will receive a first-round bye. The remaining teams, including the fifth conference champion, will be seeded 5-12 based on their final ranking

The New Year's holiday period and bowl games belong to college football. This season following first-round playoff games on campus, the four Playoff Quarterfinal games will be played in the Fiesta Bowl, Peach Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl. The following week, the Cotton Bowl Classic and Orange Bowl will host the Playoff Semifinals.

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night. This year's Championship game is on Monday, January 20, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta.

ACC TIEBREAKER POLICY

The Atlantic Coast Conference Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two (2) postseason eligible teams.

The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game. If three (3) or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two (2) or more teams are tied with the second highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game.

The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the number one seed for the Championship

A. Two-Team Tie

- 1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
- 2. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
- 3. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winpercentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through
 - other common opponents based upon their order of
- 4. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- 5. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
- 6. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

B. Three (or More) Team Tie

Three team (or more) tiebreaker procedure will first be used to identify one Championship Game representative. Once that team is determined, the tiebreaker procedures restart for the remaining tied teams.

- 1. Combined head-to-head win-percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
- 2. If all the tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
 - i. If all the tied teams are not common opponents, no tied team defeated each of the other tied teams, but a tied team lost to each of the other tied teams, such team shall be eliminated and removed from the tie.
- 3. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
- 4. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference winpercentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
- 5. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- 6. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
- 7. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

*Note: Conference games against otherwise postseason ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tie-breaker policies.

• Former Pac-12 teams, including Cal and Stanford, will be eligible for historical Pac-12 non-CFP bowl slots. If not selected by the CFP, Cal and Stanford will join all Pac-12 teams from 2020-2023 in populating the Alamo, Holiday, Las Vegas, Sun, L.A., Independence and ESPN Events bowl games.

ACC EXPANSION

- The ACC Board of Directors voted on September 1, 2023, to formally admit the University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference, Cal. SMU and Stanford joined the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and August 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions
- The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially and create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.
- Cal, SMU and Stanford will begin competing in the ACC across their respective sponsored sports starting this year, 2024-25. No FBS conference offers more than the ACC with 15 women's sports and 28 total sponsored sports.

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

- The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last 11 years, as Florida State defeated Auburn 34-31 in the final BCS National Championship game in 2014.
- The ACC has had three different teams reach the College Football Playoff in Clemson (2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020), Florida State (2014), and Notre Dame (2020), who played as a full member in 2020 during the pandemic season. The three different teams is tied for the most among all conferences.
- The ACC has the second-best record overall in the College Football Playoff by conference, as the league is 6-6 overall. The six wins are behind only the SEC (16).
- The ACC had 11 bowl-eligible teams in the 2023 season, the most among all Power 5 conferences. It marked the 23rd consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least nine teams to a bowl each year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 111 postseason appearances counting this season.
- Led by unanimous first-team All-America linebacker Payton Wilson of NC State, the ACC placed 12 players - representing eight different schools - on NCAA-recognized 2023 All-America teams. Florida State led the league with four selections, while NC State had two. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.
- Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mike Norvell (Florida State) Mack Brown (North Carolina), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Jeff Brohm (Louisville) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .798 winning percentage ranks eighth in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 282 victories, while Swinney is 10th with 170.
- · Seven ACC players have finished in the top three of the Heisman Trophy voting in the last 11 years, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of Florida State and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020, while Pitt's Kenny Pickett was third in 2021.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SUCCESS

- With Louisville making its first appearance in the championship game in 2023, 13 different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with nine appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (6)
- A total of six different schools have won an ACC Football Championship game since the inaugural title game in 2005. Clemson leads the way with eight wins, while Florida State follows with five championship game wins counting its victory in 2023. Virginia Tech has won the championship game three times, while Georgia Tech, Wake Forest, and Pitt have all won the title game once.
- The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, 2020).
- In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that keeps the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

- · Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 707 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 107 first-round picks, the second-highest total of any conference.
- Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft. North Carolina guarterback Drake Maye was the first ACC player selected, going No. 3 overall to the New England Patriots. Florida State defensive lineman Jared Verse was picked No. 19 overall by the Los Angeles Rams, Duke offensive lineman Graham Barton was taken No. 26 overall by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Clemson cornerback Nate Wiggins was selected No. 30 overall by the Baltimore Ravens.
- The ACC finished with 41 picks representing 11 different institutions in the 2024 NFL Draft. The 41 picks were the most in a single draft since the league had 42 players selected in 2021.
- The ACC has had 426 players selected since 2013 the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in six of the last 11 drafts.
- Current ACC teams have had a total of 16 players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. New conference member Stanford (Bobby Garrett, 1954, Cleveland; Jim Plunkett, 1971, New England; John Elway, 1983, Baltimore Colts; and Andrew Luck, 2012, Indianapolis Colts) has had four No. 1 overall picks. Cal (Steve Bartkowski, 1975, Atlanta; and Jared Goff, 2016, Los Angeles Rams), Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each have had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), SMU (Kyle Rote, 1951, New York Giants), Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) and Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) each have had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.



THIS IS THE ACC



NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

- No conference has won more NCAA national championships in the last three academic years than the ACC. The ACC has won 23 NCAA team titles since the start of the 2021-22 season through the 2023-24 season.
- ACC has won seven or more national titles in each of the last three years, marking the best run in ACC history. In 2022-23, the ACC won the most NCAA championships of any conference with a league-record nine. In both 2021-22 and 2023-24, the ACC has won seven NCAA championships.
- The ACC won seven NCAA National Championships in 2023-24, all in ACC-sponsored sports, the second-most of all conferences. The seven NCAA titles were won by seven different schools - the first time in ACC history.
- The ACC brought home seven NCAA Championships in 2023-24 in Women's Cross Country (NC State), Field Hockey (North Carolina), Women's Soccer (Florida State), Men's Soccer (Clemson), Women's Swimming & Diving (Virginia), Women's Lacrosse (Boston College) and Men's Lacrosse (Notre Dame). ACC student-athletes also won 22 individual national titles in 2023-24.
- The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.
- Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

ACC SUCCESS IN 2023-24

- The ACC won seven NCAA National Championships in 2023-24, all in ACC-sponsored sports, the second-most of all conferences. The seven NCAA titles were won by seven different schools - the first time in ACC history.
- A total of 11 ACC programs finished the 2023-24 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports - NC State (Women's Cross Country), North Carolina (Field Hockey), Florida State (Women's Soccer), Clemson (Men's Soccer), Notre Dame (Men's Soccer), Virginia (Women's Swimming & Diving), Notre Dame (Women's Fencing), Notre Dame (Men's Lacrosse), Boston College (Women's Lacrosse), Wake Forest (Women's Golf) and Florida State (Men's Golf).
- Six ACC schools placed among the top 25 of the final 2023-24 Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. Virginia led all ACC schools with a fifth-place finish and was joined by North Carolina among the top 10 in seventh place. Notre Dame (10th), Florida State (12th), Duke (17th) and NC State (21st) were also ranked in the top 25. The feat marked the 22nd consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.
- Over two-thirds of the ACC was bowl eligible, as 11 of the 14 teams made a bowl game. The 11 ACC bowl-eligible teams were the most among all Power 5 conferences and matched a conference-high from 2018.
- The ACC had a team in both the NCAA Men's and Women's Final Fours. The ACC also had three teams in the NCAA Men's Basketball Elite Eight and four teams in the NCAA Men's Basketball Sweet 16, both the most of all conferences.
- The ACC had four teams in the College World Series, which was tied for the most among all conferences. The conference had five teams in the NCAA Baseball Championship Super Regionals and five teams hosted a Regional in the NCAA Baseball Championship, both tied for the most among all conferences.
- The 2023-24 season also saw four ACC teams finish among the NCAA men's golf final eight at the 2024 NCAA Men's Golf Championship.
- The ACC had three Honda Award winners in 2023-24 North Carolina's Ryleigh Heck (Field Hockey), Florida State's Onyi Echegini (Women's Soccer) and Virginia's Gretchen Walsh (Women's Swimming & Diving).
- The 2023-24 academic year saw 12 different league members win a conference title, led by North Carolina (6), NC State (5), Florida State (4), Duke (3), Notre Dame (3), and Virginia (2) winning multiple conference crowns.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last nine years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.
- Eight ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA in December 2023.
- The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Boston College (97), Clemson (99). Duke (93), Louisville (96), Pitt (94), Virginia (91) and Wake Forest (93) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- For the 17th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report on Sept. 18, 2023.
- ACC teams continued to excel academically, again evident from the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in June 2024. Every team among the ACC's 28-sponsored sports exceeded the NCAA's required APR (930), while 96 ACC teams recorded a perfect score of 1000, including at least one from each of the 15-member institutions led by Notre Dame with 16 teams and Duke with 14 teams. The ACC's average of 991 was up two points from last year's 989, while football, men's basketball and women's basketball all increased as well.

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2023-24 were the third annual UNITE Award Class: the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "Civic Engagement"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Charleston, South Carolina, in July 2024.
- The ACC conducted its third annual Health and Safety Summit in May, this time in Charlotte, North Carolina, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the second ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, North Carolina, in May 2023. The trek included 30 student-athletes across the league meeting with representatives and listening to panel discussions from five different categories including sports, real estate, finance/banking, consulting and government.



C.O.R.E.

- The ACC Committee for Racial and Social Justice (C.O.R.E.) was created in June 2020 to support the ACC's commitment to social justice and racial equity. Members of C.O.R.E. include conference office staff members and campus representatives from each of the league's now 18 institutions. C.O.R.E.'s mission is to promote and encourage racial equity through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2023-24 were the third annual UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "Civic Engagement"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Charleston, South Carolina, in July 2024.
- The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Durham in May, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.

- Friday's contest will be the ACC opener for both teams. Miami holds a 25-15 advantage in the all-time series against Virginia Tech.
- · Miami's Cam Ward became just the 13th player in NCAA history to log 15,000 career passing yards, hitting the milestone against USF. Ward and Oregon's Dillion Gabriel are the only two active FBS quarterbacks with 15,000 yards.
- · Miami has been successful on both sides of the ball, boasting the No. 2 passing offense (405.0 yds/game) and is the FBS leader in sacks per game (4.00).
- · Virginia Tech has been successful at stopping the pass, boasting the No. 2 pass defense in the ACC (160.0 yds/ game). The Hokies have shut down teams in the red zone, allowing a score just 68.4 percent of the time - the secondbest in the ACC.
- VT's Brayshul Tuten leads the ACC and ranks sixth in the FBS with seven rushing touchdowns, including three against Rutgers.

- · Syracuse boasts the No. 4 passing offense in FBS football, averaging 358.0 yards per game.
- Kyle McCord ranks in the top 16 nationally in passing touchdowns (10), passing yards (1,074), passing yards per game (358.0), total offense (358.3), points responsible for (66) and points responsible for per game (22.0). He leads the nation in completions per game at 28.67.
- Fadil Diggs is averaging 2.0 tackles-for-loss per game, which ranks sixth in FBS football.
- Syracuse is one of 17 teams nationally with a perfect scoring record in the red zone this season.

- · The Wolfpack have controlled possession of the football, averaging an ACC-best 33:27 time of possession, which ranks 10th throughout the FBS.
- KC Concepcion has hauled in 6.8 catches per game this season, ranking second in the ACC. Concepcion is averaging 59.8 yards per game with three receiving TDs.
- NC State looks to wrap up non-conference play with a 3-1 mark. The Wolfpack's lone blemish in non-conference play came to Tennessee in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- · The Wolfpack will look to build on a strong fourth quarter in the Clemson loss, outscoring the Tigers 21-0 in the final frame. Kendrick Raphael logged 90 rushing yards and a touchdown, while CJ Bailey threw for 204 yards and a touchdown in his first start at quarterback.

- North Carolina has won five straight contests against Duke and three of the last five in Durham. The Tar Heels lead the all-time series. 64-41-4.
- Duke closed the non-conference slate at a perfect 4-0. marking just the fourth time in program history to start 4-0 in consecutive seasons.
- Duke wide receiver Jordan Moore hauled in a pass for the 30th consecutive game against Middle Tennessee. Moore's streak is tied for the longest in the ACC.
- North Carolina quarterback Jacolby Criswell passed for a career-high 475 yards in the loss to James Madison. 475 yards is the third-highest single-game total in UNC history and the most since Sam Howell's program record 550 against Wake Forest in 2020.
- Omarion Hampton ranks 12th in North Carolina history with 2,460 career rushing yards. He needs just 121 yards to crack into the top 10 all-time.

- · Stanford won its first-ever conference game as an ACC member on September 28 at Syracuse, 26-24. ACC Specialist of the Week Emmet Kenney hit a game-winning 39-yard field goal as time expired.
- · With a win, Clemson's Dabo Swinney would tie Bobby Bowden for the most career victories leading an ACC team. 173 of Bowden's 377 NCAA-recognized victories came as an ACC member while at Florida State.
- · Both Clemson and Stanford enter the game on a twogame winning streak with a 1-0 record in ACC play.
- · Clemson became the first ACC program and 14th FBS program overall, to win 800 games with its win on September 21 versus NC State.
- · Stanford leads the ACC and ranks third nationally in rushing defense, allowing just 51.7 yards per game. In Stanford's ACC opener, the Cardinal allowed just 26 rushing yards to Syracuse.

- Florida State's Shyheim Brown ranks second in the ACC and ninth nationally in tackles per game, averaging 10.7. Brown also ranks second in the league and fifth nationally in solo tackles per game with 6.3.
