

Helpful Tips for a Great Stay...

Guest Information, Daily Services and Arrival

Arriving to Trinity

Monday – Friday

- Front Gate and the Nassau Street entrance open at 7am and 8am, and remain open until midnight.
- After midnight, campus is only accessible via Front Gate. To enter, please knock on the wooden door at Front Gate and the Security Team will let you in.
- Don't forget your Guest ID (provided at check-in) and your room key as you'll need to show these to the Security Team.

Weekend & Bank Holidays

- Front Gate closes between 6pm and midnight.
- During this time, please enter Campus via the Nassau Street gate.
- After midnight, access returns to Front Gate. To enter, please knock on the wooden door at Front Gate and the Security Team will let you in.

Goldsmith Hall

- There is 24 hour access to Goldsmith Hall via Westland Row. Alternatively, residents may enter via campus and access Goldsmith Hall via the connecting footbridge.

Driving Into Campus

- Cars coming into College can drive in via Lincoln Place Gate.
- The gate is open weekdays 7am – midnight, and weekends and bank holidays 8am - midnight.

Housekeeping service rooms from 10am - 1pm Mon - Saturday.

Limited service on Sundays until 1pm.

Laundrette

Guests can avail of our laundrette service conveniently located beside the Dining Hall in Front Square.

Our laundrette is open 11am - 9pm, 7 days a week.

Access card is required to enter laundrette, please ask our Front desk team for one.

Our machines are operated using the Circuit UK laundry app. This allows guests to pay using their card and also allows guests to see the various wash/dry cycle options from their device. The total cost of 1 wash cycle and 1 hour in the dryer is €6.50. It is €4.50 for the washing machine and €2.00 for the dryer.

Things To Do Near Trinity

Douglas Hyde Art Gallery

Experience cutting-edge contemporary art at the Douglas Hyde Gallery. It's free to visit and open Wednesday to Sunday. Discover thought-provoking work from Irish and international artists, in a stunning exhibition space just steps from the Old Library.

St. Stephen's Green's Park

Expect plenty of aesthetic spots, from the tranquil Bog Garden to the elegant Victorian bandstand. See if you can find some of the park's sycamore trees, some of which date back to the 17th century. One of the park's standout features is its impressive collection of 15 statues and memorials, each with its own important contribution to Irish history, including Irish nationalist leaders and artists.

Dublin Castle

Dublin Castle is situated in Dublin City's historic centre on Castle Street.

Its exquisite State Apartments, the Chapel Royal, a 13th-century Tower, and some of the castle's medieval buildings and grounds are all located within the castle.

Saint Patrick's Cathedral

Just 15 minutes walking distance from the front gates of Trinity College Dublin. Its construction started in 1191, and has a history that dates back to 450 AD.

It is one of the few buildings left from the medieval city of Dublin, and a must-see during your visit.

Temple Bar

Temple Bars cobbled pedestrian lanes are filled with characterful shops, old-school pubs and restaurants. Visitors can enjoy a pint whilst listening to traditional live music and great food.

Whether you are solo or with a group of friends, the craic is always fantastic around Dublin's Temple Bar.

Molly Malone Statue

"In Dublin's fair City, where the girls are so pretty, I first set my eyes on sweet Molly Malone..." is the beginning to a song which pays a tribute to this iconic statue representing the legend of Molly Malone, one of the most renowned statues in Dublin.



Getting To Trinity

By Air

The airport is located about 10km north of the city centre. While there are no direct tram or train links, several transport options are available:

From The Airport

Aircoach and Dublin Express offer direct bus services to the city centre and key locations.

Dublin Bus operates affordable routes with multiple stops.

Taxis and ride-sharing services are available outside both terminals.

Car rentals are also an option for those looking to explore beyond the city.

For more details, check Dublin Airport or visit Transport for Ireland for public transport options.

Getting Around Dublin

Dublin is easy to navigate, whether you prefer walking, public transport, or cycling.

Walking

The city centre is compact and best explored on foot, with many attractions within a short distance.

Buses

Dublin Bus operates extensive routes across the city and suburbs. Contactless payment or a Leap Card is recommended for fares.

Luas (Tram)

Two tram lines (Red and Green) connect key areas, including shopping districts, business hubs, and suburban areas.

DART (Train)

The DART (Dublin Area Rapid Transit) runs along the coast, making it a great option for visiting seaside towns like Howth and Dun Laoghaire.

Bikes & E-scooters

Dublin has a city bike rental scheme (Dublin Bikes) and e-scooter rentals in some areas.

Taxis & Ride-sharing

Taxis are widely available, and apps like Free Now can be used to book a ride. Uber operates with licensed taxis rather than private cars.

Leap Card

A Leap Card offers discounted fares on buses, trams, and trains, making it a convenient option for visitors using public transport.



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
