Commodores locked in for 16-17 season

First-year head coach Stephanie White ready to lead team in different direction

The Vanderbilt women's basketball team enters the 2016-17 season with a new head coach, numerous new players and a new style.

Stephanie White arrives in Nashville for her first season with the Commodores after being named head coach on May 24. Becoming just the fifth head coach in the program's history, White is replacing former head coach Melanie Balcomb, who resigned in April after 14 seasons with the team.

White comes to Vanderbilt after spending two seasons as head coach of the WNBA's Indiana Fever. She led the team to the playoffs each season, including guiding the Fever to the 2015 WNBA Finals in her rookie season to become the first rookie coach in league history to take a team to the finals.

White's plan is to now bring an WNBA-style energy to the Vanderbilt program; a fast-paced tempo that she believes will be the formula to success and will allow the players, the fans and the Vanderbilt community to "lock in" to what the Commodores are doing.

"This is an outstanding opportunity for all of us -- myself, the coaching staff and the players," said White, "and it's going to be exciting. We are going to change the way we play.

"I am looking forward to doing anything and everything that we can to impact this community, the lives of the young women on our team and put a team on the floor that Vanderbilt will be proud of," said White.

During White's first season at the helm, she will oversee a Vanderbilt roster that includes five freshmen, who together formed one of highest-rated recruiting classes in the program's history.

The group was rated among the best in the nation by multiple publications, including being ranked No. 6 by Blue Star Basketball, No. 9 by Prospects Nation and No. 17 by ESPN HoopGurlz. The talented cast includes LeaLea Carter, Erin Whalen, Kayla Overbeck, Cierra Walker and Kaleigh Clemons-Green.

The newcomers will join forces with a solid group of returnees that is highlighted by seniors Marqu'es Webb and Minta Spears, along with sharp-shooting juniors Rachel Bell and Christa Reed, and redshirt junior Rebekah Dahlman.

"To be teaching a new system at a time when half of the team is new, I certainly don't think that's a bad thing," said White. "Everyone is going to be starting from ground zero. And I think that means that the freshmen will feel a little more comfortable because they'll know they aren't behind the eight ball, so to speak, in terms of learning the system. Having said all of that, I certainly don't think it's a hindrance to the returning players. You look at the skill sets that they have, and I fully believe they have the ability to play uptempo and to play with a little bit of freedom. The way we play is fun. And I think they are looking forward to it."

Vanderbilt posted an 18-14 record last season, representing the 31st time in the past 33 seasons that the Commodores have compiled a winning record -- an impressive stretch that dates back to the 1983-84 campaign.

Now, though, Vanderbilt is looking to return to its winning ways inside the conference. The Commodores finished in a tie for 11th place in the SEC last season, posting a 5-11 record for the second consecutive year. It was the third straight season in which Vanderbilt finished below .500 in the SEC -- a rare dip for a program that enjoyed 13 consecutive seasons with a winning conference record (from 2000-01 through the 2012-13).

White believes Vanderbilt is primed for big things in the days ahead, but knows that -- as with most any successful endeavor -- it's a process.

"It's about our drive to be the best that we can be," White said. "It's about getting better every single day. It's about doing things the right way. ... This is a university that attracts high achievers, and I certainly want to attract high achievers to our program.

"I am so excited about what's ahead," said White. "I have always had a passion to be a collegiate head coach -- and Vanderbilt is a perfect fit."

UPDATE ON THE COMMODORES

Vanderbilt enters the 2016-17 season with a new head coach and a new style. Stephanie White, who will make her Memorial Gym debut today, enters her first season with the Commodores after being named head coach on May 24.

Becoming just the fifth head coach in the program's history, White is replacing former head coach Melanie Balcomb, who resigned in April after 14 seasons with the team.

White comes to Vanderbilt after spending two seasons as head coach of the WNBA's Indiana Fever. She led the team to the playoffs each season, including guiding the Fever to the 2015 WNBA Finals in her rookie season to become the first rookie coach in league history to take a team to the finals. White's plan is to now bring an WNBA-style energy to the Vanderbilt program.

REMODELED ROSTER

Although Vanderbilt has a strong cast of experienced players -- including seniors Marqu'es Webb and Minta Spears -- the roster also has plenty of new names, with five freshmen being added to the mix.

Together, those five players -- LeaLea Carter, Erin Whalen, Kayla Overbeck, Cierra Walker and Kaleigh Clemons-Green -- formed one of highest-rated recruiting classes in the program's history. The group was ranked No. 6 by Blue Star Basketball, No. 9 by Prospects Nation and No. 17 by ESPN HoopGurlz on Signing Day of last season.

LOOKING BACK

Vanderbilt posted an 18-14 record last season but missed the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season after struggling through SEC play with a 5-11 record. Christa Reed, a junior, led the team in scoring at 11.6 points per game and Marqu'es Webb was the Commodores' top rebounder at 5.7 per contest. Minta Spears led the team in assists and minutes played.

THE SKINNY ON BELLARMINE

The Knights, from Louisville, Ky., are a Division-II program who compete in the Great Lakes Conference. Coached by Chancellor Dugan, Bellarmine posted an impressive 24-4 record last season (15-3 in the GLVC) and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA D-II Tournament. The team returns its top six scorers from last year's team.

WHAT'S AHEAD FOR COMMODORES

Vanderbilt will host its second, and final, exhibition game on Sunday, Nov. 6, against Union University at 2 p.m. The Commodores will then open the season on Nov. 11, playing Kennesaw State at 7 p.m.

TRADITION CONTINUES

Continuing their rich legacy of successful seasons, the Vanderbilt women finished the 2015-16 campaign with an 18-14 overall record.

It marked the 31st time in the past 33 seasons that the Commodores have compiled a winning record. The lone exceptions during that span were the 2014-15 season (when Vanderbilt finished 15-16) and 1998-99 (when the Commodores went 13-14).

MARQU'ES DOESN'T MISS

For the second season in a row, Marqu'es Webb put together a fantastic finish for the Commodores last year.

In the final 10 games of the season, she went 34-of-56 (60.7 percent) from the floor, and is averaging 9.0 points and 6.4 rebounds per game in that stretch. She reached double figures in scoring in five of the 10 games, including scoring 17 points on 7-of-9 shooting in a loss at Florida on Feb. 18.

Webb also put together some amazing numbers down the stretch during the 2014-15 campaign, shooting 68.2 percent -- going 28-of-41 -- during the final six games of the season. She averaged 12.3 points per game during that stretch, and reached double figures in five of the six games.

STAR POWER

Vanderbilt received steady contributions from a wide range of players last season. Here's a quick look at who did what for the Commodores:

◆ Sophomore sharpshooter Christa Reed averaged a team-high 11.6 points per game and shot 42.9 percent from 3-point range. Reed led the SEC and ranked among the NCAA's top-10 in 3-point accuracy for much of the season but didn't meet the minimum requirement at season's end.

◆ Point guard Minta Spears ranked seventh in the SEC in assists (4.0 apg) and ninth in the SEC in minutes played (32.8 mpg). Spears ranked No. 2 in the SEC in assist-to-turnover ratio in conference games at 1.7.

◆ Junior Marqu'es Webb was Vanderbilt's top rebounder at 5.7 per game. She averaged 6.4 rebounds in SEC games.

◆ Morgan Batey ranked 14th in the SEC among active players in career rebounds with 543 at the end of the season.

THE TRENDS

Despite the difficult days down the stretch, the Commodores ranked among the nation's best in several significant categories last season.

They were No. 12 in the country, and first in the SEC, in field-goal percentage at 45.9 percent, and were ranked 16th in the nation, and first in the conference, in 3-point accuracy at 36.9 percent.

On the defensive end, the Commodores surrendered 56.4 points per game, which ranked 32nd in the country and fourth in the SEC.

Vanderbilt held its opponents to less than 50 percent shooting from the floor in 26 of its 29 games regular-season games. The lone exceptions were South Carolina, Florida and Texas A&M.

The Commodores limited to 28.3 rebounds per game, which was easily the best mark in the conference.

GOOD THINGS COME IN 3s

Fueled by the sharp-shooting of sophomore Christa Reed, who shot 42.9 percent from long range, the Commodores enjoyed a strong season from behind the arc in 2015-16.

They made five or more 3-pointers in 21 of their 32 games, including making a season-high 10 shots behind the arc in the road win over Kentucky (when VU finished 10-of-24). Vanderbilt averaged 14.7 attempts per game from behind the arc for the year -- a sizable increase from the 2014-15 season, when they averaged only 10.6 attempts per game.

MEMORIAL MAGIC -- ALIVE AND WELL

With 10 victories at home last season, the Commodores continued to pile up gaudy numbers inside the confines of Memorial Gym. They have amassed an all-time record of 457-113 at the historic venue.

HEAD COACH STEPHANIE WHITE

Stephanie WHITE

Head Coach / First Season

Stephanie White was named the head coach for Vanderbilt women's basketball program on May 25, becoming just the fifth all-time head coach in the history of the Vanderbilt program.

Having enjoyed success at virtually level of basketball as a player and coach, White arrived at Vanderbilt after spending two seasons as the head coach of WNBA's Indiana Fever. White took the Fever to the playoffs in each of her two seasons, including a trip to the WNBA finals in 2015.

"The opportunity to lead Vanderbilt's women's basketball program is an opportunity that I simply could not pass up," White said. "The combination of Vanderbilt's culture, where achievement -- both on and off the court - is so highly valued, together with the institution's fan support, and a legacy of winning basketball to build upon, is incredibly exciting to me. I appreciate the support and understanding that I have received from the Indiana Fever, from management to the players, regarding my passion to coach college basketball at an elite institution."

White -- who played five seasons in the WNBA after a decorated playing career at Purdue -- was named head coach for the Fever in September 2014. In 2015, she guided the Fever to the WNBA finals, becoming the first rookie coach in league history to lead a team to the finals.

"Above all else, academics, research, scholarship, and service define the Vanderbilt experience, yet we also compete at the highest levels in athletics," Vanderbilt Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos said in announcing White. "Coach White's values align perfectly with those in our university community. I welcome Stephanie to Vanderbilt and look forward to working with her as she leads our women's basketball program to fulfill our goals and highest potential."

As a collegiate player, White enjoyed a highly successful career at Purdue, where she earned national Player of the Year honors after helping lead the Boilermakers to the 1999 NCAA championship as a senior. That season, she also received the Wade Trophy (given to the nation's top female player) and was named Big Ten Conference Player of the Year.

"Stephanie White has been a winner in every phase of her career," Vanderbilt athletic director David Williams said. "She was the nation's high school player of the year, she was the NCAA's Player of the Year on a national championship team and she led her WNBA team into the finals in her first year. She was an outstanding scholar. She wants to coach at Vanderbilt and we believe she is just the person to lead our program back into national prominence."

White averaged double-figure scoring in all four seasons of her college career, including 20.2 points per game as a senior. White was inducted into the Purdue Athletics Hall of Fame on April 21, 2006.

White was also a star in the classroom at Purdue. She was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and was an Academic All-American.

White has been coaching in the WNBA since 2007, and has also served as a college basketball analyst for ESPN and the Big Ten Network. She has covered the NBA's Indiana Pacers for FOX Sports Indiana.

She was an assistant coach with the Chicago Sky from 2007-2010, then joined the Fever staff as an assistant in 2011. She was promoted to associate head coach in 2014 before being named head coach after Lin Dunn's retirement.

Prior to coaching in the WNBA, White coached in the college ranks, serving as an assistant at Toledo (2005-07), Kansas State (2004-05) and Ball State (2003-04).

Before beginning her coaching career, White enjoyed a productive five-year WNBA career, spending one season with the Charlotte Sting and four with the Indiana Fever, before retiring in 2004.

At the completion of her four seasons with the Fever, she ranked third in games played (112) and 3-pointers (92), and fourth in scoring (684). She was named to the Fever's All-Decade Team that was announced in 2009.

White and her wife, Michelle, have three boys: Landon, age 5, and twins, Aiden & Avery, age 2.
