### FOOTBALL GETS BACK TO SEC ROAD SLATE AT VANDERBILT

Kentucky will visit Southeastern Conference Eastern Division foe Vanderbilt for a lunchtime matchup on Saturday. Kickoff is set for 12:21 p.m. ET at Vanderbilt Stadium.

Vanderbilt and Kentucky meet for the 86th time in school history. Kentucky leads the all-time series 41-40-4, and the Wildcats have won eight of the last 12 meetings, but Vandy has claimed the last two. VU leads the all-time series in games played in Nashville 25-19-2. Over 40 percent of the games played in the series have been decided by seven points or less.

Kentucky will look to bounce back from a 48-17 loss to No. 9 Missouri last Saturday. Vanderbilt is coming off its first win at Florida since 1945 last Saturday when they defeated the Gators 34-17.

Sophomore quarterback Jalen Whitlow is coming off a career day passing throwing for a career-high tying 225 yards and a rushing touchdown vs. Missouri.

Defensively, UK's pass rush ranks seventh in the league in sacks with 18. Junior defensive ends Za'Darius Smith and Alvin "Bud" Dupree rank seventh and ninth in the league in sacks. Avery Williamson has the third most tackles in the SEC with 82 tackles, as he is averaging 9.1 tackles per game.

### QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky is in its first season under head coach Mark Stoops, who was hired on Nov. 27, 2012. Since arriving, Stoops has reenergized the UK fan base and made a huge impression on the recruiting trail.
- Kentucky just played its fifth ranked opponent of the season last week vs. No. 9 Missouri. UK recently completed the toughest stretch of games in school history as the Wildcats faced four consecutive opponents that were ranked inside the AP top 20 starting with No. 7 Louisville, No. 19 Florida, No. 13 South Carolina and No. 1 Alabama (rankings at time game was played).
- UK has recovered 10 fumbles this season, ranking first in the SEC and ninth nationally. On the other side, UK has seven turnovers this season, which ranks second-lowest in the nation.
- Kentucky's "Air Raid" offense is averaging 358.9 yards per game and has a nice pass/run balance, completing nearly 60 percent of passes while averaging 4.4 yards per rushing attempt.
- The UK offense ranks third in the SEC and seventh nationally in fourth-down conversion percentage at 69.6%, while UK's 48 points against Alabama State was the most points UK has scored since 2010.
- Junior defensive ends Za'Darius Smith and Alvin "Bud" Dupree rank high nationally in sacks. Both players have 5.5 sacks this season, which ranks sixth-most in the conference. Dupree is fifth in the SEC and 31st nationally with 0.7 sacks per game, while Smith is eighth in the SEC and 51st nationally with 0.6 sacks per game.
- Senior linebacker Avery Williamson has picked up where he left off last season in tackles, ranking third in the SEC in total tackles (82) and second in tackles per game (9.1). The senior is 33rd nationally in tackles per game. He has led UK in tackles five times, including four games with 10-plus tackles.
- Joe Mansour is having a good year for Kentucky, sitting first in the SEC and 16th nationally in field goal percentage at 91.7%. Mansour is 11-for-12 this season with a long field goal of 45 yards.
- TraVaughn Paschal was named CFPA Honorable Mention LB of the Week after 3 TFL vs. Missouri.

- Named the 37th head coach of the Kentucky football program on Nov. 27, 2012
- First task as UK coach was to put together a bright and energetic coaching staff. Accomplished that feat by hiring two of the best up-and-coming coordinators in the game in D.J. Eliot and Neal Brown.
- Inherited a recruiting class ranked in the 60s by the national evaluation services before Stoops and Co. hit the trail hard to sign a top-30 class, securing the highest recruiting class ranking in school history.
- Offseason momentum paved the way for a school record 50,831 fans at UK's spring game - which was the sixth highest spring game attendance in the nation.
- Accomplished major defensive turnarounds at Arizona and Florida State. Full breakdowns at both places below.
- During Stoops' three seasons at FSU, the Seminoles went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.
- Developed many players to NFL careers, including Antoine Cason, Michael Johnson, Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph, Sean Taylor and Brian Lee.

## GAME NOTES VS. VANDERBILT

### SERIES RECORD VS. VANDERBILT

- Vanderbilt and Kentucky meet for the 86th time in school history.
- Kentucky leads the all-time series 41-40-4.
- Kentucky has won eight of the last 12 meetings between the two schools.
- Vanderbilt defeated Kentucky 40-0 last season in Lexington.
- Vanderbilt leads the all-time in games played in Nashville 25-19-2.
- The last time the two played in Nashville, the Commodores won 38-8. VU's victory over Kentucky in Nashville in 2011 was its first in Nashville over the Wildcats since 2003.
- The teams first meet in 1896, a 6-0 Vanderbilt victory in Nashville.
- The teams have met annually since 1953.
- The series has had a remarkable number of close games, as 35 of the 85 games (41.1 percent) have been decided by seven points or less, with UK leading the series 16-15-4 in those games.
- UK has shut out VU six times, while Vanderbilt has recorded 14 shutouts in the series history.
- Biggest UK win: 51 points (1978, 53-2 in Lexington) ... Biggest Vandy win: 50 points (1897, 50-0 in Nashville) ... Current streak: VU has won two.

### SCOUTING VANDERBILT

- Vanderbilt enters Saturday's game against Kentucky coming off one of the biggest wins in school history, defeating Florida in The Swamp for the first time since 1945. The Commodores are 2-4 in SEC play this season with wins against Florida and Georgia. Vanderbilt has won six straight games in November dating back to Nov. 2011.
- Vanderbilt has had a good year offensively averaging 32.1 points per game behind 402 yards of total offense per game. Senior quarterback Austyn Carta-Samuels leads the team in passing playing in seven games, although he has not played the last two games due to injury. Carta-Samuels has completed 65.5% of his passes for 1,672 yards and 10 touchdowns, while freshman quarterback Patton Robinette has played well completing 28-of-48 passes for 364 yards with three interceptions and one touchdown. Senior wide receiver Jordan Matthews is the leading receiver with 66 catches for 890 yards and five touchdowns, while fellow senior wide receiver Jonathan Krause has 32 catches for 608 yards and three touchdowns. Sophomore running back Jerron Seymour is the leading rusher with 479 yards on 94 attempts with nine touchdowns, while senior running back Wesley Tate has four touchdowns and 284 yards on the season.
- Senior safety Kenny Ladler leads the Vanderbilt defense with 68 tackles, including two interceptions and one pass breakup. Sophomore linebacker Darreon Herring is second on the team in tackles with 57 with eight pass breakups and one interception, while junior defensive end Kyle Woestmann paces the defensive line with 5.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks. The Vanderbilt defense has five interceptions on the year, forcing 23 fumbles and recovering 10.

- Kentucky has 10 players on its 2013 roster from the state of Tennessee in sophomore punter Landon Foster (Franklin), freshman quarterback Reese Phillips (Signal Mountain), freshman cornerback Cody Lewis (Alcoa), sophomore running back Dyshawn Mobley (Powell), junior fullback Darrell "D.J." Warren (Alcoa), senior linebacker Avery Williamson (Milan), senior tight end Patrick Ligon (Germantown), sophomore offensive lineman Shaquille Love (Harriman), senior tight end Tyler Robinson (Friendsville) and junior defensive tackle Christian Coleman (Milan).

**MILESTONES TO WATCH FOR ...**

- Senior running back Raymond Sanders has 1,482 career rushing yards and needs 2 more to tie Mike Fanuzzi for 17th on UK's career rushing list.
- Sophomore punter Landon Foster has 111 career punts, qualifying him for UK's career punt records. His career average of 42.3 yards per punt (111 punts, 4,698 yards) ranks him third all-time.
- Junior defensive end Bud Dupree has 14.5 career sacks, needing 2.5 more to tie for fourth most all-time in school history.
- DE Za'Darius Smith and Alvin "Bud" Dupree have 5.5 sacks this season needing just 3.5 more to tie for the fourth most sacks in a season in school history (Jeremy Jarmon 9 in 2007, Oliver Barnett 9 in 1988).

**MEILINGER SELECTED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME**

Steve Meilinger, a two-year first-team All-American who excelled at several positions on offense and defense for the Kentucky Wildcats, has been named to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Meilinger played at Kentucky from 1951-53 under Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant. Meilinger helped the Wildcats to a record of 20-10-3, including an 8-4 mark in 1951 that was capped by a Cotton Bowl win over Texas Christian. UK was ranked in the nation's top 20 all three seasons in the final Associated Press and United Press International rankings. He was a freshman (ineligible to play at that time because of NCAA rules regarding first-year players) on the 1950 Kentucky squad that went 11-1 and is the national champion according to the Sagarin Computer Ratings.

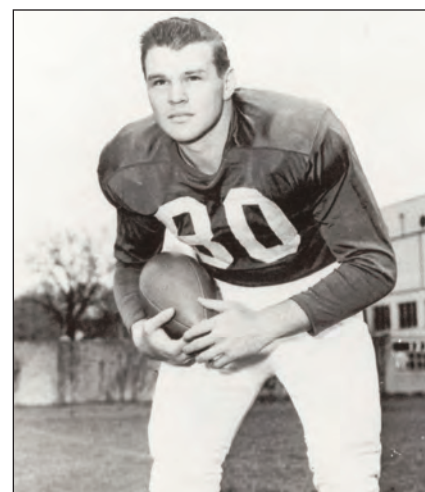
Known as "Mr. Anywhere" for the Wildcats, he split time between end, halfback and quarterback on offense; on defense, he played end, linebacker and defensive back – basically, every position on the field except the interior offensive and defensive lines, a remarkable combination. On special teams, he was a two-year starting punter and also returned punts and returned kickoffs.

Meilinger set Kentucky's career records for pass receptions, receiving yardage and touchdowns with 75 catches for 1,210 yards and 16 touchdowns. He also rushed 134 times for 714 yards and five TDs and passed for 127 yards and a TD. On defense, no tackle stats were kept during that era but he made six pass interceptions.

Meilinger was a first-team All-American as a junior by the Newspaper Enterprise Association and the All-Players team. He was first-team All-America as a senior according to the NEA, American Football Coaches Association/Colliers Magazine and the All-America Board.

On the league level, he was named first-team All-Southeastern Conference all three of his varsity seasons, the first of only five Wildcats in school history to be a three-time first-team All-SEC selection.

**2013 UK Opponents in Bold**

- Vanderbilt has two players on its 2013 roster from the Commonwealth of Kentucky in freshman kicker David Holtgrave (Louisville, Ky.) and freshman defensive back Ryan White (Louisville, Ky.)
- Ryan White was high school teammates at Trinity High School in Louisville, Ky., with Kentucky freshman defensive end Jason Hatcher.
- Kentucky offensive coordinator Neal Brown was a wide receiver at Massachusetts from 2001-02 while current Vanderbilt defensive line coach Sean Spencer was a defensive line coach for the Minute Men.

### LAST TIME VS. VANDERBILT

Quarterback Jordan Rodgers completed 18 of 29 passes for 220 yards, two touchdowns and one interception, and three different Commodores running backs scored rushing touchdowns, as Vanderbilt defeated Kentucky 40-0 in Commonwealth Stadium.

Rodgers drove Vanderbilt 71 yards on 11 plays to begin the game, ending with a 34-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Matthews on a fourth-down play. Kentucky responded with a drive to the VU 33-yard line but a 50-yard field goal try was missed. VU scored on three of its next four possessions to take a 27-0 lead into half-time.

Vanderbilt opened the second half with a touchdown drive to make it 34-0 and Casey Spear added a pair of fourth-quarter field goals for the final tallies.

Kentucky had three scoring opportunities in the second half, as a fumble recovery by Khalid Henderson, an interception by Ashely Lowery and an offensive drive put the Wildcats into Vanderbilt territory. However, the possessions ended at the VU 26-, 5-, and 33-yard lines as UK was stopped on downs.

The top Cat of the day was middle linebacker Avery Williamson, who had a career-high 20 tackles. He was the first Wildcat to reach 20 tackles since Chad Anderson had 21 stops vs. Georgia in 2003. Williamson also caused the fumble that was recovered by Henderson. Lowery had a career-high nine tackles to go along with his interception and linebacker Bud Dupree had nine stops, including a tackle for loss.

### ON THIS DATE IN WILDCAT HISTORY ...

- Saturday marks the 15th time in school history that the Wildcats have played a game on Nov. 16. Kentucky holds an all-time record of 8-6 on this date.
- The Wildcats first game on this date was a 5-0 loss to Central University back in 1901. UK's last game on this date was a 41-21 win over Vanderbilt in Lexington in 2002.
- Kentucky's has won two straight games on this date, with both wins coming vs. Vanderbilt in Lexington.
- Kentucky is 4-3 on this date vs. SEC teams.

### GETTING FRESH ...

- The Wildcats were one of the youngest teams in the nation last season and 2013 is no different as 14 newcomers to the 2013 squad, including eight true freshmen, have seen action this season. UK only has 15 seniors this season, which is the 18th-lowest number in the nation.
- In fact, UK had 11 first-time starters in the game against WKU, which is a school record for first-time starters in a game according to records kept back to the 1993 season.

### WHITLOW TAKES CONTROL OF STARTING JOB AT QUARTERBACK

- Sophomore quarterback Jalen Whitlow, who won the starting quarterback job out of fall camp, has again emerged as the leader at the position and has played very well in recent weeks.
- The sophomore had the best overall game of his career against Alabama State, rushing for a career-high 101 yards and two rushing touchdowns, while going 16-for-26 for 186 yards through the air with two passing touchdowns. Part of the big game was due to a 88-yard TD rush, which tied the second-longest rush in school history and is the longest run in Commonwealth Stadium history. It was also the longest rush in the SEC this season. Whitlow's two TDs passing and rushing marked the first time a UK quarterback has done that since Shane Boyd in 2004.
- Whitlow, who has started six games this season, started against Alabama before sustaining an injury that caused him to miss the rest of the Alabama game and a majority of the Mississippi State game. Whitlow did play briefly against Mississippi State, completing the only pass he attempted and rushing for 12 yards to spark a TD drive.
- Against Missouri, Whitlow threw for 225 yards, which tied his career high passing yardage in a game.

### DUPREE, Z. SMITH BECOMING STRONG DUO AT DEFENSIVE END

- Kentucky junior defensive ends Alvin "Bud" Dupree and Za'Darius Smith are becoming an impressive tandem on the defensive line this season. Both players have 5.5 sacks on the year while Dupree has 7.5 tackles for loss and Smith has 5.5 tackles for loss. Dupree, who has played one less game due to injury, is fifth in the SEC and 31st in the nation with 0.7 sacks per game, while Smith is eighth in the SEC and 51st in the nation in sacks per game at 0.6.
- Entering the 2013 season, a UK player had not recorded a sack in three straight games since 2007 with both Dupree and Z. Smith accomplishing that in the 2013 season. UK ranks seventh in the SEC in sacks this season with 2.0 sacks per game, which also ranks Kentucky 57th in the nation.
- Both players are approaching numbers in the UK record books. Dupree and Smith each need just 3.5 more sacks this season to sit tied for the fourth-most sacks in a single season in school history (9). Dupree has 14.5 sacks in his career needing just 2.5 more sacks to tie for the fourth most in a career in school history.

### WILLIAMSON, DUPREE NAMED MIDSEASON ALL-SEC BY PHIL STEELE

- Junior defensive end Alvin "Bud" Dupree and senior linebacker Avery Williamson have been honored for their first-half success in 2013 as Phil Steele College Football has tabbed the two defensive stars to the publication's Midseason All-Southeastern Conference Teams.
- Dupree was named a second-team defensive lineman, while Williamson was a second-team linebacker. The tandem sit second and first, respectively, in tackles this season. More on the two stars can be found in the defensive highlights.
- During the preseason the publication named Dupree a fourth-team preseason All-SEC honoree, while Williamson was tabbed second-team preseason All-SEC. Both players are on the College Football Performance Awards Defensive Awards Watch Lists, while Williamson is on the Butkus Award Watch List for nation's best linebacker.



# ***Commonwealth Stadium***

***On game day, Commonwealth Stadium often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.***

- The Wildcats are in their 41st season at Commonwealth Stadium.
- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 262 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. UK has a 138-120-4 record (.539) in Commonwealth.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 63,701 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance for 12 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years.
- The crowd of 71,024 vs. Florida on Oct. 20, 2007 was the largest crowd in the 40-year history of Commonwealth Stadium. The previous stadium record was 71,022 for the 1999 Tennessee game.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

### **Commonwealth Stadium Renovations on the Way:**

Kentucky has received legislative approval for a \$110 million renovation of football facilities, primarily Commonwealth Stadium. The stadium project features a new look for the exterior of the stadium, redesigned concourses, additional suites, a new press box and upgraded support facilities. Plans are in the design process, with construction expected to begin in 2014 and completion targeted for 2015. Shown above is an artist conception of what the stadium exterior might look like.

### **Facts and Figures on Commonwealth Stadium:**

Seating Capacity: 67,942, including the Commonwealth Suites. With game workers, media, etc., total attendance can exceed 70,000.

Video Boards: Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage.

Sound System: Sportsound system will deliver pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

Ribbon Boards: Commonwealth Stadium's interior seating bowl has LED ribbon boards, allowing fans a more enjoyable experience.

### **Game Day Experiences**

The "Cat Walk": Fans are encouraged to greet the team when the Wildcats arrive for the "Cat Walk." The team buses will arrive at the Nutter Field House approximately two hours and 15 minutes before the game and the players will make the "Cat Walk" to their stadium entry point at Gate 1. Fans are encouraged to line up on the sidewalk and cheer the players as they enter the stadium. A siren will be sounded while the team buses are on their way to the stadium. That's the fans' cue to proceed to the Cat Walk area to greet the team.

Wildcat Refuge: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Wildcat Refuge, located outside of the southwest corner (outside Gate 9) of Commonwealth Stadium. There are five giant inflatable games that are available two hours before kickoff.

UK Marching Band Will Parade Around Stadium: The UK Marching Band will parade around the stadium, beginning approximately one hour prior to kickoff. The band parade will begin at and return to Gate 4.

### WILDCAT OFFENSE MAKING THE "HOME RUN" PLAYS

- Kentucky head coach Mark Stoops and offensive coordinator Neal Brown have talked about the Wildcats needing to be a consistent offense with the ability to make the "home run" play. In just a few weeks in the new "air raid" offensive system, UK has showed improvements and is on pace to surpass last year's total of 10-plus yard plays.
- Kentucky had 10 plays of 30 yards or more in 2012, while the "air raid" offense has already passed that number with 16 in nine games this season.
- UK has 10 plays of 40 yards or more this season which is more than UK had all year in 2012 (4).
- UK has made the big play through the air and on the ground so far this season. Kentucky has four 40-plus yard rushing plays this season, which is more than the two UK had in 2012. UK has six 40-plus yard passing plays this season after having two in 2012.
- Below is a breakdown of "home run" plays this season and in 2012. Overall numbers are listed first, followed by rushing plays in parentheses () and passing plays in brackets []. More on "home run" plays can be found on the superlatives pages towards the end of the notes package.

### STOOPS' DISCIPLINE STARTING TO SHOW IN YOUNG WILDCATS

- Mark Stoops and the rest of the Kentucky coaching staff have been open and honest about trying to change the culture of UK football on and of the field. Although it's tough to measure that change through statistics, UK has improved in two areas since the start of the season that would lead one to conclude UK is playing more disciplined football.
- In Kentucky's first two games the Wildcats struggled with penalties, totaling 21 in two games played. However, in Kentucky's last seven games the Wildcats have only been flagged 28 times total.
- Turnovers were also a problem for Kentucky to start the season as UK committed six turnovers (two interceptions, four fumbles) in its first four games. UK has turned that around as well by not committing a turnover in four straight games (Oct. 5-Nov. 2), which was a school record. UK is tied for second in the nation in fewest turnovers.
- Kentucky committed a turnover against Missouri by fumbling in the second half, however, Missouri entered the game second nationally in turnover margin at +15 with the Wildcats winning the turnover battle against the highly ranked Tigers by recovering two fumbles.

### WILDCATS FACING ONE OF THE TOUGHEST SCHEDULES IN SCHOOL HISTORY

- The Wildcats consistently play one of the toughest schedules in the nation and 2013 has been no different for Mark Stoops and Co. According to The Associated Press poll, with rankings listed at the time the game was played, Kentucky has taken on No. 7 Louisville, No. 19 Florida, No. 13 South Carolina, No. 1 Alabama and No. 9 Missouri. UK's strength of schedule vs. teams played already is No. 20 in the nation according to the Sagarin Ratings in USA Today.
- In fact, UK's four consecutive games against AP top 20 teams is the most difficult stretch in school history. This is the first season UK has played four consecutive top-20 teams.
- According to the Nov. 10 rankings by the Associated Press and USA Today, UK has/will play five teams that are currently ranked in either poll, including No. 1/1 Alabama, No. 9/8 Missouri, No. 11/12 South Carolina, No. 19/13 Louisville and No. 25/rv Georgia.
- According to numerous online web sites and publications, Kentucky plays one of - if not the - toughest schedules in the country in 2013. In fact, GAMEDAYR.com and Fansided.com ranked UK's strength of sched-

ule No. 1 nationally this preseason, while 4DOWN20.com ranked it third-hardest and Phil Steele's College Football ranked it ninth-hardest before the season started.

- Of UK's 12 opponents this season eight played in a bowl game in 2012, including three in BCS bowls.

## OFFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

- Kentucky has scored on its first possession of the game four times this season, earning touchdowns against Miami (Ohio), Florida and Alabama State, and a field goal against Missouri.
- UK started the season by posting over 200 yards passing and rushing in consecutive games for the first time since 2010.
- The "home run" plays have led to quick drives this season as 16 of UK's 25 touchdown drives have had a possession time under three minutes.
- UK has converted 24-of-29 trips into the redzone this season with 16 touchdowns and eight field goals. One of the non-conversions was when UK allowed the game clock to expire and end the game with the ball on the five-yard line vs. Miami (Ohio).
- The Wildcat offense is 16-for-23 this season on fourth-down conversions, which ranks third in the SEC and seventh nationally. UK's 16 fourth-down conversions this season is already 13 more than UK had all of last season. The 16 successful attempts are also more than UK had total in 2011 (nine), 2008 (10) and 2007 (12).
- The offense has posted over 300 yards of total offense in seven of its nine games this season, marking the first time a UK offense has done that since the 2010 season.
- Six different UK players have scored rushing touchdown this season, which is the most UK has had since six players scored rushing touchdowns in 2010.
- Kentucky is currently averaging 4.4 yards per rush this season, which would be the fourth-highest yards per rush average for a UK offense since 1987 when UK had 4.9 yards per rush. The Wildcats had 4.6 yards per rush in 2010 and 4.5 yards per rush in 2009.
- UK is averaging 11.6 yards per reception this season, which would be the third-highest yards per reception average UK has had in the last 10 seasons. UK had 13.2 yards per reception in 2006 and 11.7 yards per reception in 2010.
- The Kentucky offense had not committed a turnover in four straight games entering its battle vs. Missouri, which was a school record. Kentucky is tied for the second-fewest turnovers in the nation.

### vs. Missouri:

- UK scored on its first possession of the game against the Tigers and again on its first possession of the second half. It marked the second game in a row that Kentucky has scored on its first possession of the game and first possession of the second half.
- Kentucky had a season-high time of possession of 37:26.

### vs. Alabama State:

- UK scored a season-high 48 points, which is the highest scoring output for Kentucky since scoring 49 against Charleston Southern on Nov. 6, 2010.
- Kentucky finished the game with 233 rushing yards, which is the second most rushing yards this season for UK. The Wildcat offense had 196 rushing yards in the first half, which was the most in the first half all season.
- Kentucky was a season-best on third-down conversions, going 8-for-17 (47-percent).

### at Mississippi State:

- Kentucky posted 325 yards of total offense against the Bulldogs, which is the most this season against an SEC team.
- UK rushed 40 times against Mississippi State for 160 yards and one touchdown. The 160 rushing yards was the most for UK this season against an SEC opponent.
- Kentucky ran 75 offensive plays against MSU, the most for the UK offense this season.

### vs. Alabama:

- The UK offense put together a scoring drive in the third quarter when quarterback Maxwell Smith connected with wide receiver Javess Blue for a 30-yard touchdown pass. The touchdown was the first given up by the Alabama defense since week two vs. Texas A&M. It was only the 10th 30-plus yard passing play the Crimson Tide defense had allowed on the season.

### at South Carolina:

- The Kentucky offense rallied for 21 fourth-quarter points, which is the second most points UK has ever scored in the fourth quarter in school history. It was also the second-highest scoring quarter for Kentucky this season.
- The Wildcat offense won the time of possession battle against the Gamecocks, marking the first time UK has won that battle this season.
- Kentucky went 4-for-4 with four touchdowns in the redzone against South Carolina.
- UK rushed for 123 yards in the game, which is the most UK has rushed against a USC defense since 2009.
- Kentucky's 28 points against South Carolina was the second-most points scored against the Gamecocks this season and the most USC has allowed at home since October of 2012. In fact, UK's 28 points is the third-

most points an opponent has scored at Williams-Brice Stadium dating back to 2007.

### vs. Florida:

- Kentucky scored on its first offensive possession of the game against the highly-ranked Gator offense, marking only the second time UF has allowed a team to score a touchdown on the first possession of the game.
- Kentucky started a ton of youth at its skilled positions against Florida. At wide receiver, UK started true freshmen Jeff Badet and Ryan Timmons, and junior college newcomer Javess Blue. Senior running back Raymond Sanders and true freshman running back Jojo Kemp started in the UK backfield, while sophomore quarterback Jalen Whitlow got the start under center.

### vs. Louisville:

- The Wildcats continued their strong rushing attack against the Cardinals, rushing 31 times for 162 yards for an average of 5.2 per attempt. UK has averaged at least five yards per rush in all three games this season.
- Jalen Whitlow and Maxwell Smith both threw for 100-plus yards against Louisville, marking the second consecutive game that has happened.

### vs. Miami (Ohio):

- Kentucky had one of the best offensive showings in school history in its home opener against Miami (Ohio), amassing 675 yards of total offense - which is the third-most total offense in program history and the most since 1998.
- Several other offensive stats stood out against Miami, including 413 passing yards being the most UK has earned since 2007, while its 262 yards rushing was the most since 2012.
- The Wildcats' 24 points in the first quarter vs. Miami (Ohio) was the highest-scoring first quarter in school history. UK scored on each of its first five possessions in the game.
- UK connected on an 88-yard touchdown play in the game, which is the fourth-longest pass play in UK history and the longest pass completion for UK since 2000 vs. Georgia when Jared Lorenzen connected with Derek Smith.

### vs. WKU:

- The Wildcats scored 26 points in their opener vs. WKU, rushing for 216 yards and passing for 203. It was the first time UK had rushed for over 200 yards and passed for over 200 yards since 2010 against Vanderbilt.
- UK also had 419 yards of total offense in the season opener, which was the most for a UK offense in a season lid-lifter since 2010.
- UK averaged 6.8 yards per rushing play in the WKU game. When the three quarterback sacks are factored out, UK averaged 8.0 yards per rush.
- The Wildcats scored 26 points in the season opener vs. WKU, which is the most in a season opener game for UK since 42 points to start the 2009 season.

### The Quarterbacks:

- Jalen Whitlow (more on him in previous note on page 7) has taken control of the starting quarterback spot for Kentucky, starting four of the last five games at the position. Whitlow took all reps against South Carolina - the first time UK had used just one QB in a game - and started vs. Alabama before an injury. Whitlow saw limited time vs. Mississippi State but has returned to play great the last two weeks with four touchdowns (two passing and two receiving vs. Alabama State) and a career-high tying 225 passing yards against Missouri.
- Against Alabama State, Whitlow rushed for 101 yards on 10 carries with two touchdowns, including a

88-yard touchdown rush, which was the second-longest rush in UK history and longest rush ever by a UK quarterback. Passing wise, Whitlow finished 16-for-26 with 186 yards and two touchdowns becoming the first UK quarterback since Shane Boyd in 2004 to throw two touchdowns and rush for two touchdowns in the same game.

- Whitlow is 84-for-130 this season for 915 yards and five touchdowns, while third on the team in rushing with 87 carries for 395 yards and a team-high six touchdowns. The sophomore ranks 12th in the SEC in total offense.

- Whitlow's lone interception, coming against Louisville, broke a streak of 160 consecutive passes without an interception - the second longest streak in school history.

- Whitlow started taking control of the QB job against South Carolina completing 17-of-24 passes for 178 yards and two touchdowns. Whitlow also led UK in rushing with 17 carries for 69 yards and a touchdown.

- Maxwell Smith has three starts this season sitting 70-for-129 for 873 yards and six touchdowns. Smith ranks 13th in the SEC in passing efficiency and 14th in the conference in passing yards per game. Smith got the start at Mississippi State and came off the bench to play the rest of the Alabama game for the Wildcats in a tough situation for the sophomore, who did not receive very many first-team reps in practice during the week.

- Smith's best game was 15-of-23 for 310 yards and three TDs in the win over Miami (Ohio). Smith threw a 48-yard, 56-yard and 88-yard touchdown pass against Miami, becoming the first UK quarterback since Tim Couch in 1998 vs. Louisville (48-yard, 56-yard and 57-yard) to throw three TDs of at least 48 yards. The 88-yard touchdown pass was the longest completion of his career and fourth-longest pass in UK history.

- Before the SC game, Whitlow and Smith shared the quarterback position this season. Offensive coordinator Neal Brown praised Smith following the USC game for helping UK game plan during the game against USC.

#### The Wide Receivers and Tight Ends:

- Junior-college transfer Javess Blue leads the team in receiving with 31 catches for 407 yards. He did not play against Alabama State due to an eye injury he sustained during warmups, but returned for Missouri with three catches for 62 yards, including a 53-yard reception. He caught an 88-yard touchdown vs. Miami (Ohio), the fourth-longest pass play in school history, and finished the game with six catches for 114 yards. Blue also caught a 30-yard TD pass against Alabama. He is averaging 13.1 yards per reception this season.

- True freshman Ryan Timmons is second on the team in receiving and has caught 27 passes for 295 yards and two touchdowns, including a season-high six catches vs. Florida. Timmons had a 14-yard TD grab in the corner of the endzone against South Carolina, while his second career touchdown was at Miss. State when he took a bubble screen 51 yards for a touchdown - the longest catch of his career. He did not play vs. Missouri due to injury.

- Alex Montgomery has caught 16 passes for 137 yards and two touchdowns. Montgomery is out for the year due to an ACL injury sustained vs. Alabama State.

- A total of eight different wide receivers/tight ends caught a pass against Miami (Ohio) - five of whom being newcomers. Of UK's 413 yards passing in the game, 298 yards were hauled in by those newcomers, which amounted to 72 percent of its production.

- Fellow true freshman Jeff Badet made his first career start in the game vs. the Redhawks and caught three passes for 80 yards, including an impressive 56-yard touchdown reception in which he broke several tackles to score. Badet, who has

missed some time due to injury, led UK in receiving against Alabama state with four catches for 48 yards.

- UK's leading receiver from last season, Demarco Robinson, caught five passes in the season opener. He is returning to form after recovering from a sprained ankle in the Miami game. Robinson caught a touchdown pass for UK vs. South Carolina, his second of the season. He is third on the team in receiving with 16 catches for 164 yards and two touchdowns.
- UK's tight ends corps combined for 69 yards vs. WKU, which is the most since UK's tight ends had over 80 yards receiving vs. Middle Tennessee State in 2008.
- Tight end Jordan Aumiller had a career game vs. Mississippi State with a career-high four catches for 28 yards. Aumiller also had a good game against South Carolina with three catches for 34 yards.
- Junior college transfer Steven Borden had a good game against Alabama State with a 38-yard touchdown catch - the first of his career. Borden's junior college teammate, wide receiver Joey Herrick, is seeing reps this season and has three catches for 22 yards.

#### The Running Backs:

- So far this season, UK's running backs have rushed 207 times for 960 yards and six touchdowns for 4.6 yards per carry.
- True freshman Jojo Kemp is first in rushing this season with 80 carries for 435 yards and two touchdowns. Kemp, who was UK's leading rushing against Louisville with five carries for 80 yards, had a career-long 47-yard carry against the Cardinals. Kemp had 63 yards against Mississippi State, including his first collegiate touchdown on a 14-yard carry. Kemp was second in rushing against Alabama State with 13 carries for 67 yards and a touchdown.
- Senior Raymond Sanders is second on the team in rushing with 404 yards on 92 carries and three touchdowns. Sanders had a season-high 98 yards in the opener vs. WKU and had 86 yards against Mississippi State. Sanders ranks in the top 20 all-time in rushing at UK.
- The Wildcats rushed for 216 yards vs. WKU, which is the most rushing yards for UK in a season opener since 2010. In all, Kentucky has rushed for 200 or more yards three times this season.
- Sophomore running back Dyshawn Mobley saw significant snaps at running back against Alabama State with eight carries for 36 yards, including a 20-yard rush..
- Kentucky's depth at running back took a hit before fall camp even began when it was announced that sophomore Josh Clemons would miss the 2013 season with an injury. However, UK looks to have plenty of consistent options to fill the void.

#### The Offensive Line:

- The UK offensive line has helped UK rush for an average of 4.4 yards per attempt this season.
- The UK offensive line limited South Carolina's defense to just four tackles for loss, which is the lowest TFL that USC had in a game at that point in the season. USC's two sacks against UK tied the lowest number they have had in a game this season.
- The offensive has helped Kentucky rush for over 200 yards in three games this season.
- Senior left guard Kevin Mitchell was named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week against Miami (Ohio) grading out at 90 percent by the UK coaching staff with nine knockdown blocks.
- Mitchell, left tackle Darrian Miller and right tackle Jordan Swindle have started every game.
- Three players have started at left guard and two at center. The current starters are Zach West at guard and redshirt freshman Jon Toth at center.

#### DEFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

- Kentucky's defense has limited the "home run" play this season, especially through the air, ranking eighth best in the nation by only allowing eight passing plays of 30-plus yards this season.
- The Kentucky defense showed great improvement in week two with an impressive outing vs. Miami (Ohio). Kentucky only allowed 122 yards of total offense to Miami (Ohio), which is the fewest since Samford had 102 in 2012 and the fourth-lowest total allowed in the last 25 years (since 1988). It is UK's third-lowest total allowed in the last 25 years to a FBS team.
- After the Miami (Ohio) game the coaching staff praised their players for being able to adjust UK's defensive game plan after the coaching staff noticed Miami (Ohio) running a different offense in pregame warmup than they had seen on tape in game prep.
- A total of 14 different players on the UK defense this season have posted five or more tackles in a game.
- Kentucky ranks sixth in the SEC in redzone defense, allowing opponents to only score 83 percent of the time they enter the redzone. Teams have traveled into UK's 20-yard line 36 times this season with 30 scores (25 touchdowns, five field goals and two missed field goals).
- Defensively coordinator D.J. Eliot has put an emphasis on creating more turnover this season and the defense has answered. UK has forced 16 fumbles this season, recovering 10 fumbles. The 10 fumble recoveries is already more than the eight UK recovered last season. In fact, 10 fumble recoveries ties the second most UK has had dating back to 2007. UK also had 10 in 2011 and 2007, while the Wildcats had 14 in 2008.

#### vs. Missouri:

- The UK defense limited Missouri to 203 passing yards, which was the second-lowest passing total Missouri has gained this season.

- Entering the game, Missouri was +15 in turnover margin with just four fumbles lost. The Wildcat defense forced and recovered two fumbles in the game. It was only the third time this season that a defense has forced two or more turnovers against MU.

**vs. Alabama State:**

- The Kentucky defense limited Alabama State to 297 yards of total offense, UK's second-best defensive showing of 2013.
- UK forced a season-high five fumbles in the game, recovering two ASU fumbles.

**at Mississippi State:**

- The UK defense had eight tackles for loss against Mississippi State, which is the most it has recorded this season. The eight TFL are the most in a SEC game for UK since it had eight vs. South Carolina on Oct. 8, 2011.

**vs. Alabama:**

- The UK defense held Alabama scoreless in the first quarter, marking the first time Alabama had been shut out in the first quarter this season. The Crimson Tide punted on their opening possession for only the second time this season. UK also forced and recovered two Alabama fumbles in the first quarter.
- UK had four pass breakups against Alabama, which ties the most it has had this season.

**at South Carolina:**

- The UK defense allowed 453 yards to South Carolina, but came on strong late holding the Gamecocks to just 103 yards of total offense in the fourth quarter. UK held South Carolina to 12 second-half points, its third fewest to date this season. SC tailback Mike Davis, who leads the SEC in rushing (614) and rush yards (122.8) per game was limited to 107 yards, his second-fewest total of the season.
- The Wildcats held the Gamecocks to 178 yards on the ground. The rushing output was South Carolina's fewest this season as they had been averaging 224.8 entering the game.
- Kentucky won the turnover battle against South Carolina forcing a fumble.
- Linebacker Avery Williamson finished the game with nine tackles. He now has a streak of 24 consecutive games with at least three tackles.
- Defensive end Alvin "Bud" Dupree made three tackles. He extended his streak of 20 consecutive games with at least three tackles. Dupree's quarterback sack in the second quarter extended his streak of four consecutive games with a sack. The last Wildcat with a sack in four straight games was Jeremy Jarmon in 2007.
- Freshmen Jason Hatcher and Blake McClain had the first quarterback sacks of their careers.

**vs. Florida:**

- The Kentucky defense limited Florida to 156 passing yards last Saturday, which was the second lowest passing yard total by the Gators on the season. UF also had its second-lowest total offense output against the Wildcats. UK only allowed Florida to score three second-half points, which was the lowest second-half scoring output by the Gators this season.
- UK had five tackles for loss against Florida, which is the second most UK has had this season. UK also made their first interception of the season against Florida with Josh Forrest earning his first career pick. Forrest returned the pick 39 yards.

**vs. Louisville**

- The UK defense limited Louisville to 250 passing yards in the game - UL's lowest output of the season.
- The Wildcats used a big personnel formation at times against the Cardinals, bringing in freshman defensive end Jason Hatcher as a linebacker.
- Kentucky had four pass breakups in the game, which is a season high. UK also had two tackles for loss, a quarterback hurry and forced a fumble.

**vs. Miami (Ohio):**

- The Kentucky defense had six sacks against Miami (Ohio).
- UK held Miami (Ohio) to 1-of-16 on its third down chances, the best defensive performance for Kentucky on third down since holding Georgia to 0-for-10 on third down in 2005.
- In all, 22 defensive players had tackles in the game with four different players recording tackles-for-loss and four different players recording sacks.

**vs. WKU:**

- In the opener vs. WKU, UK had two players with 10 or more tackles for the first time since Sept. 29, 2012 vs. South Carolina.
- The Kentucky defense was stiff on third down vs. WKU, only allowing the Hilltoppers to convert 2-of-10 third-down chances.

**The Defensive Line:**

- Junior defensive end Alvin "Bud" Dupree has 47 tackles, including a career game against Mississippi State with 13 tackles, two tackles for loss and a sack. Dupree's 13 tackles were the most by a UK defensive lineman since game-by-game records were available dating back to 1993. On the season, Dupree has 5.5 quarterback sacks, including a sack in six of the last seven games he has played, taking his career total to 14.5 sacks. Dupree had a streak of three or more tackles in 22 consecutive games played snapped last week vs. Missouri. Dupree missed the second half vs. USC due to injury and did not play vs. Alabama.
- Junior college transfer Za'Darius Smith has 5.5 sacks on the season to sit tied with Dupree for the team lead. He played well vs. Miami (Ohio) with three sacks,



the most for a UK player since Deion Holts vs. Indiana in 2003.

- Dupree and Smith have combined to provide UK with great pressure on the edge as the Wildcats rank seventh in the SEC and 57th nationally in sacks. More on Dupree and Smith can be found in the previous note on page 7.

- True freshman Jason Hatcher has played well this season. Hatcher, a native of Louisville, played well against South Carolina picking up his first career sack playing almost all the second-half snaps after Dupree left the game. He also had four tackles against the Cardinals in significant playing time. He recorded his first quarterback hurry against Miami (Ohio). Hatcher has 15 tackles and three QB hurries this season.

- Leading the defensive tackles are senior Tristian Johnson (24 tackles, 2.5 TFL, two pass breakups and two fumbles forced), senior Donte Rumph (24 tackles, 3.5 TFL, one sack), senior Mister Cobble (19 tackles) and junior Mike Douglas (21 tackles, one sack, 1.5 tackles for loss, one fumble recovered). Rumph had seven tackles and a sack vs. Mississippi State.

#### The Linebackers:

- Avery Williamson has 82 tackles, sitting third in the SEC in total tackles. He had a season-high 15 stops vs. Louisville. Williamson had two tackles vs. Alabama State snapping a streak of 26 straight games of three or more tackles. Williamson had 13 tackles, a fumble recovery and 0.5 TFL against Alabama. He has 276 career tackles. Williamson has double-digit tackles in 12 career games, including four games this season.

- Junior TraVaughn Paschal made his first career start vs. Miami (Ohio) at linebacker after starting the year as a backup defensive end. Paschal had seven tackles vs. the RedHawks with his first career sack. He responded with a career-high eight tackles against Louisville. Paschal had a good game vs. Missouri with five tackles, including three tackles for loss.

- Sophomore Khalid Henderson has 32 tackles on the season, including a career-high 10 in the opener vs. WKU. Henderson recorded his first career sack against Alabama State.

- Linebacker Josh Forrest made his first career pick against Florida, returning the interception 39 yards. Forrest has blocked a field goal and a punt this season.

#### The Defensive Backs:

- Kentucky limited Florida to 156 passing yards. Cornerback Nate Willis paced the Wildcats with a then-career-high seven tackles and two tackles for loss.

- The UK secondary had four pass breakups against Louisville, limiting the Cardinals to a season-low 250 passing yards. Ashely Lowery had three tackles against UL with a fumble recovery and a career-high two pass breakups.

- Freshman nickelback Blake McClain is second on the team with four pass breakups. McClain picked up his first career sack against South Carolina. He saw his first time as a nickelback in the opener with seven tackles and a fumble forced. McClain earned his first career start vs. Miami (Ohio) and had six tackles and a pass breakup. He also had seven tackles vs. Missouri

- Sophomore Fred Tiller, who earned his first career start vs. WKU, had seven tackles and a fumble recovery in the game. Tiller had a great game vs. Mississippi State with nine tackles, including two tackles for loss. He also played well against Alabama State with two pass breakups and a tackle for loss.

- Junior safety Eric Dixon started his first game vs. WKU with five tackles before seven tackles vs. Louisville. Dixon, who has shown an ability to fly to the ball and make big hits the last few weeks, had a career-high 10 tackles vs. Alabama. Dixon led UK with six tackles vs. Alabama State.

- At cornerback, sophomore Cody Quinn led the team in pass breakups last season with five but saw his first playing time of the season vs. Louisville with a tackle and a pass breakup. Quinn had seven tackles, 0.5 TFL and a pass breakup vs. Alabama. Freshman Jaleel Hytchye provides depth at the position with outstanding speed.

- Junior safety Ashely Lowery has played well this season with 30 tackles, three pass breakups and one fumble recovery.

## SPECIAL TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Senior placekicker Joe Mansour is in his first year as the primary placekicker and has performed well sitting 11-for-12 in field goals this season. He ranks first in the SEC and 16th nationally in field goals at 91.7%. Mansour has also handled the kickoffs with 43 kickoffs and eight touchbacks. Mansour had a great game vs. Mississippi State going 2-for-3 in field goals with makes from 45 and 44 yards.
- Thanks to Mansour's kickoffs and a strong performance by the coverage unit, Kentucky ranks fourth in the SEC and 32nd nationally in kickoff return defense.
- Kentucky executed a fake field goal for a touchdown against Florida with Mansour carrying the ball 25 yards for the touchdown. It was the first touchdown by a kicking specialist in Kentucky history. (Note that kicking specialists did not emerge until the late 1960s because of the substitution rules; in the mid-1960s and earlier, kicking duties were handled by a player who played another position.)
- Sophomore punter Landon Foster has continued to punt well after a strong freshman season. Foster has 50 punts this season for a 41.6 yards per punt average with eight kicks inside the opponents 20-yard line. Foster had a 58-yard punt vs. Miami (Ohio) and Alabama State which tied his career long. Foster punted five times for a 49.0 average against Alabama State.
- Javess Blue has handled most of the kickoff returns in recent weeks and has done well. Blue is averaging 22.9 yards per kickoff return. He ranks seventh in the SEC in kickoff returns and is 15th in the SEC in all-purpose yards.
- Junior Demarco Robinson has nine punt returns this season for a 11.7 yards per return average.
- Josh Forrest has blocked two kicks this season, a field goal vs. Louisville and a punt against Alabama State.

## RECORD-SETTING SPRING GAME IS SIXTH NATIONALLY IN ATTENDANCE

Everyone had heard about the way fans were gobbling up tickets to Kentucky's 2013 Blue/White Spring Game. It seemed a certainty that UK would set a school record for spring game attendance, but even the most optimistic experts could not have predicted the scene on the evening of April 13 in Commonwealth Stadium.

Fans came out early to tailgate, many of them taking advantage of a shuttle to and from Keeneland Race Course. When it was time for the Cat Walk, they lined up nine and 10 deep to cheer on the Wildcats as they walked into the stadium. Gates opened shortly after that and the stands were quickly full.

"I remember going out on the field and thinking, 'This looks like a game,'" Coach Mark Stoops said.

By the first quarter, an estimated 50,831 fans were in Commonwealth Stadium, shattering the previous school record for spring game attendance by more than 30,000. Just as impressively, the showing gave UK the sixth-largest attendance of any spring game in the nation.

They cheered as the Blue team held on for a 24-23 victory, giving the Cats a taste of what the atmosphere at Commonwealth will be like on Saturdays this fall.

As Stoops noted, the enthusiasm of the evening is still making an impact on Kentucky football. The coach has noted that recruits who were there on April 13 often commented on the fan turnout and energy.

## REMARKABLE RECRUITING

Of all the impact that new coach Mark Stoops and his staff have made in a short period of time, the largest mark undoubtedly has come in recruiting.

It didn't take long for Stoops and staff to establish themselves. Three weeks after being named head coach, Stoops inked two junior-college players, defensive end Za'Darius Smith and tight end Steven Borden. Smith was ranked as the nation's No. 1 strongside end by one national recruiting service. He ended spring practice as a starting end and Borden will be in the mix of receivers who will see game action.

When Stoops took over in late November, UK was ranked in the 60s by the national recruiting services. Despite the late start in recruiting, in only two months there were 14 new commitments and UK's ranking had soared to as high as No. 29 by Rivals.com.

## NEW COORDINATORS RIDING WAVE OF SUCCESS

Kentucky's new offensive and defensive coordinators, Neal Brown and D.J. Eliot, come to Lexington riding a wave of success in recent seasons.

Brown was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach the last three years at Texas Tech. In all three seasons, Tech ranked in the nation's top-seven teams in passing offense, top 15 in total offense and top 25 in scoring offense, and increased production in all three categories each year since 2010. TTU finished the 2012 season scoring 37.5 points per game, passing for 355.9 yards per game, and piling up 495.8 total offensive yards per game.

Eliot served as defensive ends coach under coordinator Mark Stoops the last three seasons at Florida State. The FSU defense zoomed from 108th in the nation in total defense in 2009, the year before their arrival, to second in the nation in that category last season. The 2012 FSU defense allowed a mere 254.1 yards per game.

With Stoops having resigned to assume the Kentucky head coaching post in December, Eliot took over as defensive coordinator for FSU during the 2013 Orange Bowl. FSU's opponent was Northern Illinois, which entered the game averaging more than 40 points and 485 yards per game. Under Eliot's guidance, the FSU defense limited the Huskies to only 10 points and 259 total yards.

Three UK seniors, running back Jonathan George, offensive guard Kevin Mitchell and linebacker Avery Williamson, enjoyed an interesting experience in May as the Wildcats traveled to Ethiopia for an educational/service trip.

Guided by UK senior associate director of athletics Jason Schlafer, the players visited families, played with children, distributed food and did work projects. George told the most poignant story.

"We visited a leprosy community and there was an older man who didn't have any legs," George recalled. "He walked around with flip-flops on his hands and he used his hands to get around with. We were bagging food and charcoal for the people and he came in and started helping with his hands. He helped us bag the food that wasn't just for him but for other people as well. He had a bike that he rode on and pedaled with his hands and that's how he got around."

## **WARFORD TAKEN IN THIRD ROUND OF NFL DRAFT**

## WESTERN KENTUCKY 35, KENTUCKY 26

AUG. 31, 2013 • LP FIELD - NASHVILLE, TENN.



Western Kentucky got ahead early and withstood a fourth-quarter Kentucky rally as the Hilltoppers won the season opener – UK's first game under new coach Mark Stoops – by a tally of 35-26.

The teams traded scores in the first half and WKU went into halftime with a 21-17 lead. WKU tallied three 3-yard touchdown runs while the Wildcats got a 22-yard field goal by Joe Mansour, a 19-yard touchdown run by quarterback Jalen Whitlow and a five-yard TD by running back Jonathan George. The Hilltoppers increased the advantage to 35-17 early in the fourth quarter before the Wildcats rallied.

Quarterback Maxwell Smith entered the game and directed a pair of scoring drives, ending with a 30-yard Mansour field goal and a 34-yard touchdown pass to

Demarco Robinson, but it was not enough as WKU held on to win.

Kentucky had good balance on offense, with more than 200 yards rushing and passing, the first time the Wildcats had done both in the same game since the 2010 season. As the starting QB, Whitlow completed 10 of 15 passes for 78 yards and also rushed for a career-high 75 yards and a touchdown. Smith completed 8 of 13 for 125 yards and a TD. Raymond Sanders led the ground game with 98 rushing yards.

Senior linebacker Avery Williamson led the Kentucky defense with 14 tackles, the ninth double-figure game of his career. He also had a fumble recovery, one of two fumbles recovered by the Cats. Linebacker Khalid Henderson had a career-high 10 tackles and caused a fumble.

Wide receiver Demarco Robinson turned in a fine all-around performance. He led UK in receiving with five catches for 69 yards, including a 34-yard TD, and also provided spark on special teams with two punt returns for 54 yards and a 24.7 average on kickoff returns.

## KENTUCKY 41, MIAMI (OHIO) 7

SEPT. 7, 2013 • LEXINGTON, KY.



Kentucky scored a school-record 24 points in the first quarter and never looked back in a dominating 41-7 victory over Miami (Ohio), which gave Mark Stoops his first win as a head coach.

Maxwell Smith, who made his first start since Sept. 2012, threw three long touchdown passes and Jalen Whitlow and Raymond Sanders each added scoring runs as Kentucky amassed 675 yards on the day, the program's third-most total offensive output in school history, and the most in 15 years.

Both Smith and Whitlow took plenty of snaps on the day, often rotating in and out of the game multiple times in the same possession during a first quarter in which the UK offense scored the first five times it took the field.

Whitlow capped a 7-play, 61-yard opening drive with a 9-yard rushing touchdown before Joe Mansour concluded UK's second possession with a 22-yard field goal. Jonathan George caught a 48-yard touchdown pass from Smith to make it 17-0 early and return the air raid sirens to Commonwealth Stadium.

Kentucky's defense dominated the first interval, holding Miami to two three-and-outs from the RedHawks' first three possessions, but a Kentucky muffed punt resulted in a Miami fumble return for a touchdown, the visitors' only score of the afternoon. UK quickly responded with touchdowns on the next two possessions, an 88-yard bomb from Smith to junior transfer wideout Javess Blue and a 5-yard scamper from Raymond Sanders, respectively.

After a scoreless third quarter Kentucky added 10 points in the fourth, a 21-yard Mansour field goal and another long pass from Smith, this time 56 yards to freshman wide receiver Jeff Badet.

Kentucky's defense enjoyed a banner day for D.J. Eliot's unit as a whole, recording six sacks – including three by Za'Darius Smith – and limiting Miami to just 1-of-16 on third-down. The UK defense allowed no scores on the day while holding Miami to only 122 yards of total offense.

## NO. 7/7 LOUISVILLE 27, KENTUCKY 13

### SEPT. 14, 2013 • LEXINGTON, KY.



The Kentucky defense got off to an impressive start holding seventh-ranked Louisville's high-powered offense to just 82 first-quarter yards, but three Wildcat turnovers were too much to overcome as UK fell 27-13 in front of 65,445 fans in Commonwealth Stadium.

Both teams traded field goals in the first quarter as dropped passes plagued the UK offense through the game's first few drives. Louisville put together an 11-play, 52-yard drive that ended with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Teddy Bridgewater to DeVante Parker at the end of the first half to take a 10-3 lead into the break.

Seniorise Perry opened the second-half with a 1-yard touchdown run, and he added a 36-yarder early in the fourth on the other side of a John Wallace 21-yard field goal to round out Louisville's second-half scoring.

Kentucky scored 10 fourth-quarter points as Joe Mansour kicked his second field goal of the game before Alex Montgomery caught a 3-yard touchdown pass from Jalen Whitlow to cap a 15-play, 75-yard drive midway through the final interval. Avery Williamson continued his strong senior season with a game-high 15 tackles, while Alvin "Bud" Dupree and TraVaughn Paschal added eight stops each including a half sack shared between Dupree and Za'Darius Smith.

Kentucky rushed for 162 yards on 31 carries, averaging 5.2 per attempt. Freshman Jojo Kemp ran five times for a career-high 80 yards, leading UK in rushing for the second straight game. The Wildcats have averaged at least five yards per rush in all three games this season.

Both of UK's quarterbacks, Maxwell Smith who started and Jalen Whitlow who played for most of the second half, passed for at least 100 yards each for the second-consecutive contest.

The No. 20 Florida Gators used a stout defensive performance and a ball-control offense to overcome the home Wildcats 24-7 in Commonwealth Stadium.

Entering the game second in the nation in total defense, Florida limited UK to 173 offensive yards. Meanwhile, the Gators controlled the clock by rushing for 246 yards and piling up 22 first downs.

Florida opened the game with a 7-play, 93-yard touchdown drive capped by a 2-yard scamper by Matt Jones, but Kentucky answered on its first possession of the game.

Having covered 50 yards in nine plays to start the game, the UK drive stalled at Florida's 25-yard line. Kentucky's field goal unit came onto the field with UK facing 4th-and-9, but holder Jared Leet flipped the ball over his head to kicker Joe Mansour, who took the ball down the right sideline for Kentucky's lone touchdown of the game.

Florida broke the tie with two touchdowns before the end of the first half. Trey Burton caught a 9-yard touchdown from quarterback Tyler Murphy, capping a 79-yard drive highlighted by Jones' 67-yard run two plays earlier. Murphy then completed a nine-play, 62-yard drive with a 5-yard touchdown rush to give Florida a 21-7 lead. Murphy finished the day completing 15 of 18 passes for 156 yards while Jones carried the ball 28 times for 176 yards.

Florida concluded the scoring with an Austin Hardin field goal to finish a 14-play, 64-yard drive midway into the fourth.

Avery Williamson, who leads the SEC in tackles, paced Kentucky with seven tackles. Nate Willis had a career day with seven tackles including two for loss. Alvin "Bud" Dupree also had seven tackles, including a sack. Linebacker Josh Forrest made the first interception of his career.

## NO. 13/12 SOUTH CAROLINA 35, KENTUCKY 28

### OCT. 5, 2013 • COLUMBIA, S.C.



Trailing South Carolina 27-7 in the fourth quarter, Kentucky rallied with three touchdowns but the Wildcats' comeback bid came up just short in a 35-28 loss in UK's first SEC road game of 2013.

South Carolina scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions of the game to take an early 21-point lead. UK answered on its third possession with a 14-play, 74-yard drive that took 6:42 off the clock and ended in a Raymond Sanders' 2-yard touchdown run before the Gamecocks added a field goal just before halftime.

South Carolina kicker Elliott Fry made another field goal to cap South Carolina's first drive of the second half before UK started its comeback. Jalen Whitlow led UK 75 yards in 12 plays on the next drive, which he finished on a 4-yard touchdown connection to De-

marco Robinson.

Kentucky's Malcolm McDuffen forced a South Carolina fumble on the ensuing kickoff return, which Dyshawn Mobley recovered at the SC 35-yard line. Five plays later Whitlow found freshman Ryan Timmons for his first career TD catch to bring UK within a score of the lead at 27-21.

South Carolina answered on its next possession as senior quarterback Connor Shaw led his team 89 yards in 7 plays to extend the Gamecocks' lead to 35-21. Whitlow continued to excel on UK's final drive, which he finished with a 1-yard sneak for a touchdown to make it 35-28, but South Carolina was able to run the clock out after recovering an onside kick attempt with 4:03 remaining.

Whitlow saw all the snaps at quarterback for the first time this season, finishing 17-of-24 passing for 178 yards and two touchdowns, while rushing 17 times for 69 yards and a score. UK's defense totaled three sacks, one by Alvin "Bud" Dupree – who had at least one sack for the fourth straight game – and one each by freshmen Blake McClain and Jason Hatcher.

Shaw was outstanding for the Gamecocks, throwing for 262 yards and one touchdown while adding 50 rushing yards and another TD. Workhorse tailback Mike Davis ran for 106 yards and two TDs to lead all rushers.

## NO. 1/1 ALABAMA 48, KENTUCKY 7

### OCT. 12, 2013 • LEXINGTON, KY.



Kentucky kept it close early, forcing a punt and recovering two timely fumbles inside its own red zone on Alabama's first three possessions to keep the score 0-0 through the first quarter, but the top-ranked Crimson Tide eventually proved too much as UK fell to the two-time defending national champions 48-7.

The loss closed out Kentucky's most grueling stretch in school history, a schedule of four straight Associated Press top-20 teams including No. 7 Louisville, No. 19 Florida and No. 13 South Carolina and the nation's No. 1 team, which has won three of the past four national championships.

After beginning the game with a punt and two lost fumbles on its first three possessions respectively, Alabama scored on its fourth drive with a Cade Foster 25-yard field goal, which kickstarted 24 second-quarter points as Kenyan Drake sandwiched 1-yard touchdown runs around T.J. Yeldon's 24-yard TD run. The Alabama offense continued its strong play in the third as Yeldon scored his second rushing touchdown on Alabama's first possession of the second half.

Maxwell Smith connected with Javess Blue for a 30-yard touchdown on the ensuing possession to get UK on the scoreboard. The TD was the first an opponent scored on the Alabama defense in four games, and Kentucky is the only team to reach the end zone through the air against the Crimson Tide other than No. 7/7 Texas A&M so far in 2013.

Alabama got another field goal late in the third quarter before McCarron threw his first TD of the evening early in the fourth, and Altee Tenpenny closed the scoring with a 7-yard rushing score with 1:41 to go.

Kentucky senior linebacker Avery Williamson finished with a game-high 13 tackles, marking his 11th career game with double-digit tackles, and extending a streak of 25 consecutive games with at least three tackles. Sophomore cornerback Fred Tiller recovered the first fumble, and forced the second of Alabama's two first-quarter fumbles.

## MISSISSIPPI STATE 28, KENTUCKY 22

### OCT. 24, 2013 • STARKVILLE, MISS.



Kentucky mounted a valiant second-half comeback from an 11-point halftime deficit, which came up just short with the UK offense reaching Mississippi State's 29-yard line before turning the ball over on downs during the final seconds of a 28-22 away loss.

After forcing a punt on UK's first drive, Mississippi State scored touchdowns on its first two possessions. Bulldogs' quarterback Dak Prescott's first touchdown pass was a 60-yarder to Malcolm Johnson before Jameon Lewis completed a 6-play, 75-yard, 2:36 drive with a 19-yard rush. The Bulldogs' first two scores came on each end of Kentucky's first score of the night, a 51-yard screen pass from Maxwell Smith to Ryan Timmons, which tied the game at 7.

Mississippi State made it 21-7 midway through the second quarter with 17-yard touchdown pass from Prescott to Lewis. UK got points on the board late in the first half, as a late drive put the Wildcats in range for a 45-yard Joe Mansour field goal with 31 seconds remaining.

Kentucky pulled to 21-19 in the third quarter as a Jojo Kemp 14-yard touchdown run came after a Wildcats' safety when the Mississippi State punter mishandled the long snap in his own end zone. Following Kemp's first-career touchdown, the Wildcats recovered an onside kick, but it was disallowed because of an offside penalty. Mississippi State took advantage of the ensuing good field position, with a halfback pass from Lewis to Prescott resulting in a touchdown and a 28-19 lead.

Mansour made a 44-yard field goal with 8:15 remaining to pull the Wildcats to 28-22, but the Wildcats could not complete the comeback attempt. Kentucky's final drive was stopped at Mississippi State's 29 when UK's fourth-down pass fell incomplete. Wildcat running back Raymond Sanders nearly broke away for a touchdown on what turned out to be a 6-yard run to convert a 4th-and-1 earlier in the drive.

Sanders led all rushers with 15 carries for 86 yards while Smith threw for 160 yards. Prescott paced the Bulldogs by completing 23 of 34 passes for 268 yards and two TDs. UK defensive end Bud Dupree, despite playing with an injured pectoral muscle, led all tacklers with a career-high 13 stops, including two tackles for loss and a quarterback sack.

## KENTUCKY 48, ALABAMA STATE 14

### NOV. 2, 2013 • LEXINGTON, KY.



Jalen Whitlow returned as Kentucky's starting quarterback in style, running for two touchdowns and throwing another two TDs in Kentucky's 48-14 Homecoming game victory over Alabama State.

Whitlow opened the scoring with an 88-yard TD dash on the second play of the game, as the run tied for the second-longest rush in school history and was the longest run in the 41-year history of Commonwealth Stadium. He finished with 101 yards on the ground to become UK's first 100-yard rusher in a game this season.

The two teams exchanged punts on the ensuing two possessions before Alabama State responded on the back of running back Isiaah Crowell, who finished an impressive drive with a 32-yard rushing TD.

But the Kentucky defense hunkered down from there, and Kentucky found the end zone the next three times it had the ball. Demarco Robinson recovered a Raymond Sanders' fumble in the end zone to put the Wildcats up 14-7. Whitlow hit Alexander Montgomery for a 6-yard TD pass and then Jojo Kemp capitalized on excellent field position off a blocked punt by Josh Forrest with a 7-yard scoring scamper.

Joe Mansour extended UK's lead to 31-7 at halftime as he made from 39 yards out as the clock expired before the break. He made another field goal from 29, before Whitlow had a rushing TD and a pass TD to Steven Borden to take UK to 48 points by the end of the third quarter.

Kentucky's 48 points was the most in a game since 2010 and the offense and set a school record with its fourth-consecutive game without a turnover. The Wildcat defense recovered two fumbles and limited the visitors to 297 total yards.

Jalen Whitlow tied a career high with 225 passing yards, but Maty Mauk also had a career day by throwing five touchdowns, four of them to Dorial Green-Beckham, in No. 9 Missouri's 48-17 win at Kentucky.

Kentucky forced Missouri to punt on the game's opening possession, and proceeded to move the ball 76 yards, in a drive which resulted in a Joe Mansour 21-yard field goal to give UK an early 3-0 lead. Kentucky would not score again in the first half, while the No. 9-ranked Tigers got hot and found the end zone on each of its final four possessions of the half.

Kentucky responded nicely to open the second half, as Whitlow's 1-yard TD capped a 13-play, 73-yard drive which took 5:31 off the clock. Raymond Sanders' 1-yard TD run brought the Wildcats within 35-17 late in the third quarter, but the Tigers tacked on two touch-

downs in the fourth quarter to finish the scoring at 48-17.

Whitlow finished the day by completing 17 of 27 passes for 225 yards and added 44 net rushing yards. Sanders had more than 100 yards from the line of scrimmage as he rushed for 34 yards and also caught four passes for 70 yards. Freshman nickelback Blake McClain paced the Wildcats' defensive effort with seven tackles while linebacker TraVaughn Paschal had five stops, including a career-high three tackles for loss.

For Missouri, Mauk completed 17 of 28 for 203 yards and five TDs, with Green-Beckham snagging seven balls for 100 yards and four scores. Henry Josey ran for 113 yards and two TDs, including an 86-yard run.
