'DORES HEAD EAST FOR TWO-GAME ROAD TRIP

The Commodores (3-6, 0-1 BIG EAST) head out east to play an old conference foe and meet a new conference rival while trying to snap a six-game losing streak.

On Wednesday, Vanderbilt will play No. 20 Johns Hopkins (6-2) in Baltimore for its final non-conference game of the season. The teams were charter members of the American Lacrosse Conference, which dissolved after last season. The Commodores hold a 10-6 edge in the series and have won eight of nine, including a 12-11 upset of No. 9 JHU. The Blue Jays, whose two losses have come to No. 2 Boston College and No. 16 Loyola University of Maryland, are riding a four-game winning streak. This will be VU's seventh straight game against a ranked foe.

On Saturday, the Commodores step back into the first season of BIG EAST Conference play and take on Georgetown (1-6) in Washington, D.C. Georgetown holds a 6-0 lead in the series but the teams haven't met since 2002. The Hoyas have lost four straight, and have also endured a tough schedule, playing four ranked foes.

Vanderbilt is coming off a 19-10 loss to No. 6 Florida in the BIG EAST opener on Sunday. The Commodores led by one goal twice early and five players scored two goals but eight straight goals by the Gators and seven total from Shannon Gilroy was too much to overcome.

HOMECOMING

Ten players are headed back home this weekend on the trip to Baltimore and Washington, D.C. Maryland has the largest representation of any state on the roster with nine players — Eliza Clemens (Ruxton), Meggie Ramzy (Lutherville), Mallory Schonk (Perry Hall), Kelly Chandler (Salisbury) Alexa Kunowsky (Severna Park), MacKenzie Lange (Sparks), twin sisters Kayla and Leah Peterson (Hagerstown) and Caroline Peters (Rockville). In addition, Sarah Wilcox will close to home on Saturday in D.C., as she hails from nearby Alexandria, Va.

SCORING TRIO

Juniors Mallory Schonk (22 goals) and Alexa Kunowsky (19) and sophomore Jill Doherty (15) have been a prolific scoring trio with a combined 56 goals. Schonk ranks second in the BIG EAST with 34 points and Doherty is fourth with 31. Doherty's 14 assists are second-most in the league. All three rank in the top 10 in goals per game. Schonk and Kunowsky are tied for the team lead with seven multi-goal games.

PETERSON WINS SECOND WEEKLY HONOR

For the second straight week, freshman Kayla Peterson was named the BIG EAST Rookie of the Week on March 24. The midfielder scored three goals, had an assist, three draw controls and two ground balls in games against No. 10 Louisville and No. 6 Florida. In her last four games, she has nine goals, eight draw controls, four assists and 13 points.

THWARTING THE ATTACK

Goalkeepers Callahan Kent and Maddie Kratz have combined for 81 saves to lead the BIG EAST with 9.00 saves a game. Kent has made 51 saves in eight games and six starts, including two 10-plus save efforts. Kratz has 30 saves in five games, including 10 saves against Penn in the snow and sleet.

TOUGH SCHEDULE

The gauntlet that was the month of March ends on Wednesday against No. 20 Johns Hopkins — VU's seventh and final game against a ranked team. All seven have come in succession, beginning with then-No. 20 Denver on Feb. 23. Sunday's game against No. 6 Florida was the team's third straight against a Top 10 team.

VU is in a stretch of eight games against teams that made the NCAA Tournament last year and started the season ranked — Denver, Penn, Stanford, Penn State, Louisville, Florida, Johns Hopkins and Georgetown. The 'Dores' strength of schedule ranks 17th in the country, according to laxpower.com.

LYNCHBURG, Va. — The game time temperature at Liberty on Sunday read 18 degrees. But a blistering wind chill made it feel much worse, more like four degrees.

Still, with proper precautionary measures taken by the team and athletic training staff to ensure Vanderbilt was prepared for the frigid temperatures, lacrosse coach Cathy Swezey didn't want her team to mention the word "cold" after they stepped off the bus.

The Commodores sure didn't take long to warm up.

Vanderbilt scored the game's first eight goals and pulled away in the second half for a 20-10 victory over Liberty on Sunday. Kelly Chandler and Alexa Kunowsky each tied career highs with five goals apiece as the Commodores improved to 2-0 for the first time since 2008.

"There were a lot of things to overcome in our victory today," Swezey said, "including really difficult weather, a highly aggressive Liberty team and outstanding goalkeeping by the Liberty keeper. I was happy to see us separate ourselves at the end of the game and show our composure and aggression when we needed to."

Vanderbilt jumped out to an 8-0 lead in the opening 15 minutes as Mallory Schonk and Chandler each recorded hat tricks during that span and Kunowsky added two goals.

Liberty (0-3) showed resiliency, cutting the lead to 10-6 at halftime and pulling within three goals less than a minute into the second half. The Commodores then regrouped and scored four of the next five goals to take a commanding 14-8 lead on Kunowsky's fifth goal on an assist from Schonk with 16:40 left. Caroline Peters scored with 5:05 remaining to push the lead to 19-9 and trigger a running clock.

The attack accounted for 15 goals with five from Chandler, a career-high tying four by Schonk, three from Doherty and a career-high three by Peters. Doherty had a personal best seven points with a career-high four assists. Peters also set a personal best with two assists and Emma Dagnes, Meggie Ramzy, Kunowsky and Schonk also had one assist.

"They needed to regain their composure," Swezey said. "When Liberty closed the door a little bit our kids started to get a little frantic. They needed to remember what was working in the first half. It wasn't a succession of quick goals. It was composed and waiting to find the right moment to get the shot by. Their goalie (Juliann Elmer) had 23 saves. She was outstanding and the game-changer for them."

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — With sunny skies and temperatures in the 60s, the Vanderbilt lacrosse team couldn't have asked for better weather in early February to open their season.

The Commodores couldn't have asked for a better season-opening performance, either.

Vanderbilt kicked open 2015 with an impressive 24-1 blowout victory over Kennesaw State on Saturday afternoon at the VU Lacrosse Complex. In the process, the Commodores set two program records. The 24 goals were the most in program history, besting the 23 scored against Binghamton on April 14, 2010. It was also the Commodores' largest margin victory in program history, eclipsing a 22-2 defeat of Denver on April 16, 2000.

Thirteen players scored, eight notched multiple goals and three recorded hat tricks. Junior Mallory Schonk led the way with a career-high six assists, which is the second-most in a single game in program history, in addition to three goals. Kelly Chandler and Meggie Ramzy also had three goals apiece as the Commodores led 17-0 at halftime and Kennesaw's lone goal came late in the second half.

"The thing we're most excited about is high of a level our team performed," Vanderbilt coach Cathy Swezey said. "To remain consistently strong for 60 minutes and to go as hard as they did I couldn't have asked for anything more."

It took only 24 seconds for the Commodores (1-0) to take the lead. Ramzy, a senior captain, scored the first of her career-high three goals on a pass from Schonk. A couple minutes later Alexa Kunowsky scored on a free-position shot to start a flurry of Commodore goals. Over the next 2:40, the 'Dores scored seven goals. It started with Kunowsky and then was followed by goals from Schonk, Jill Doherty, two by Emma Dagnes, Schonk again and then finally Sarah Wilcox.

Just like that, five minutes into the game, the Commodores led 8-0.

"The speed, the power, the aggression, right off the bat," Swezey said. "I told them at halftime to be able to coach a team without having to call many plays. It is just the maturity and experience that has finally happened for us. They showed that maturity right off the bat. To not have to run the game like I've had to the last two years was just really refreshing."

Doherty had two goals and two assists. Dagnes had two goals and an assist. Caroline Peters, Kunowsky and Wilcox also scored two apiece. For Wilcox, a junior, they were the first two goals of her career.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Vanderbilt lacrosse team wasted no time scoring the first goal in the Multipurpose Facility.

Just 11 seconds in, junior Kelly Chandler snagged the opening draw, raced 50 yards and fired a shot into the back of the net to spark the Commodores in their first game ever inside the state-of-the-art complex. Chandler's quick strike, along with a career-high nine draw controls, set the tone as Vanderbilt never trailed and led by as many as nine in the second half in a 16-9 victory over Boston University on Friday.

"Kelly is just so dominant on the draw and I think she really set the tone, including getting the first draw and scoring," coach Cathy Swezey said. "It set a huge tone for our team. It put us on offense quite a bit the first 20 minutes and that was big."

Mallory Schonk led the way with a career-high four goals for the second straight game as Vanderbilt improved to 3-0 for the first time since 2008. The Commodores are also on their longest winning streak since the 2012 season.

It was the first indoor lacrosse game ever for the Commodores, who had the benefit of moving indoors to the Multipurpose Facility as the VU Lacrosse Complex sat frozen in a massive sheet of ice. Below-freezing temperatures all week and on Friday didn't offer a break so Vanderbilt played inside as a boisterous crowd cheered from above on the second-floor balcony.

"It was great," Swezey said. "There was plenty of noise and just the energy of the whole facility — everything felt great."

Added Schonk: "Our field is in a sheet of ice so we would have been better off in ice skates rather than cleats today. It was awesome to get to play in here. We're really blessed to have this."

After Chandler's opening goal, Boston (1-1) tied it up a minute later. But the Terriers wouldn't get any closer as Schonk sliced in 40 seconds later for the first of four straight Vanderbilt goals. The Commodores actually scored six of the next seven goals to take an 8-2 lead. They kept BU an arm's length throughout, leading 11-5 at halftime.

The closest Boston got was within five goals when Mallory Collins, who scored a game-high five goals, found the back of the net 36 seconds into the second half. But Vanderbilt stay composed and answered with a flurry that pushed ahead to a commanding 15-6 lead. Schonk again started a stretch of four straight goals as Chandler, Meggie Ramzy and Caroline Peters also scored.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Every other shot went in for the Vanderbilt lacrosse team on Monday afternoon as the Commodores shot a respectable 50 percent from the field.

The problem was VU didn't possess the ball enough.

The Commodores mustered just 18 shots and committed 16 turnovers in a 13-9 loss to No. 20 Denver in the Multipurpose Facility. It was the first loss of the season for Vanderbilt, which had started 3-0 for the first time in seven years.

Vanderbilt (3-1) looked poised to make it four straight wins as it scored the first three goals of the game. But just more than halfway through the first half, Denver (2-1) had erased the deficit and pulled ahead. The Commodores briefly tied it but the Pioneers rattled off three more before halftime for a 7-4 lead, built up a five-goal lead in the second half and staved off a late Vanderbilt rally.

"We just didn't have possession," Vanderbilt coach Cathy Swezey said. "We turned the ball over a lot in the midfield. We did have some difficulty following some of the things we put in the game plan in our scout and that was a little frustrating for us as coaches. But I know our kids are working hard. I know they care a lot. I know they are passionate so I'm hoping we'll bounce back."

The start looked promising as the Commodores won the first four draw controls and took a 3-0 lead. Mallory Schonk scored in the third minute, Kelly Chandler slid in for a goal and then Jill Doherty found Alexa Kunowsky for the third goal at the 23:27 mark. But then the Pioneers switched up their technique on the draw control, flipping the ball out horizontally instead of playing a leaping game — a strength for Vanderbilt's Kelly Chandler, who entered the game ranked fifth in the country with 7.33 draws a game.

The move worked as Denver scored two goals in 54 seconds to pull within one with still 20 minutes left in the half. It looked like the Commodores would momentarily stop the run when Doherty sliced the defense for a nifty goal. But her score was waved off for a stick infraction as officials ruled the pocket was too deep. Within a few minutes, Denver scored twice to take the lead for the first time, marking the first time all season Vanderbilt has trailed.

Doherty would get the goal, scoring her eighth of the season at the 10:49 mark to tie the game 4-4. The score stay knotted for a while until Denver went on a flurry at the end of the first half that provided a big momentum boost. Kiki Boone, who led the Pioneers with three goals, scored the go-ahead goal with 3:21 to go in the half. Then Denver really provided the daggers, scoring twice in the last 45 seconds to take a 7-4 lead into halftime.

The Pioneers pushed the lead to five goals in the second half. The Commodores didn't quit though as senior captain Meggie Ramzynetted consecutive goals and Schonkdrove to the net to cut the lead to 11-9 with 5:36 left.

But Kunowsky's free position shot within the final three minutes was stopped by goal keeper Hannah Hook and Denver scored twice in the last 2:15 to seal the victory.

PHILADELPHIA — The Vanderbilt lacrosse team battled the elements, fought back from a three-goal deficit in the second half and appeared to be on the verge of a huge upset.

But the Commodores couldn't escape snowy Philadelphia with a win, as No. 12 Penn scored with four seconds left in overtime to hand Vanderbilt a 12-11 loss on Sunday at historic Franklin Field.

"It is frustrating to lose a game like this, and to lose to Penn three years in a row by one goal," Vanderbilt coach Cathy Swezey said. "But this year, to have the conditions be such a factor in the game... we'd love to play them again in dry conditions but that is just not the way it worked out. Our kids did step up. We were down by three at one point and we came back and tied the game. They fought their tails off. We had to scrap a big part of our game plan because of the weather but our kids adjusted pretty quickly to some of the changes we made. We were pleased with that as well."

The temperatures hovered in the low 20s all game, snow began falling two hours before the opening draw and later turned into sleet. Snow constantly had to be brushed away to make key lines visible and the artificial turf turned rather slippery, especially late in regulation and overtime.

Even so, Vanderbilt (3-2) battled back after trailing 9-6 with 22:21 left. The comeback started with Jill Doherty's fourth and final goal, when she sidarmed a wicked shot into the net with 18:06 left. Three minutes later Kelly Chandler tied it up on a pass from Doherty. The Commodores went in front, 11-10, with 10:29 left when Chandler found Alexa Kunowsky, who slashed a shot pastgoalkeeper Lucy Ferguson.

Penn's Tory Bensen, however, tied it up with 5:54 left. The Quakers looked like they had gone ahead with 48 seconds left in regulation on a free position shot but the goal was wiped away after a stick check. Vanderbilt had a shot to win at the end of regulation but Mallory Schonk's shot was stopped by Ferguson.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Vanderbilt lacrosse team absorbed the first blow and punched back. The Commodores just didn't have enough answers for high-scoring No. 11 Stanford.

After pulling within a goal four times in the first half, Vanderbilt succumbed to a scoring barrage from the Cardinal over the next 40 minutes and suffered a 22-11 loss on Sunday at the Multipurpose Facility.

"They got the start but we came right back and answered," Vanderbilt coach Cathy Swezey said. "We thought we made halftime adjustments that would help our kids rise to the occasion and they actually sat back more. This is just a bad lacrosse day for Vanderbilt. And Stanford, to their credit, had an exceptional day."

Stanford scored 73 seconds into the game and Vanderbilt (3-3) trailed the rest of the way en route to its third straight loss. The Cardinal jumped out to a 4-0 lead but Vanderbilt didn't back down. Caroline Peters got the scoring started with an unassisted and then Kayla Peterson took over. The freshman scored the first of three straight goals on a pass from Alexa Kunowsky. She then notched another unassisted and then scored her third and final goal on assist from Mallory Schonk to once again pull Vanderbilt within one.

The teams traded flurries of goals for the next 10 minutes, with Stanford leading 8-5 and then Vanderbilt's Meggie Ramzy and Emma Dages responding with goals 26 seconds apart to cut the deficit to 8-7 with 10:51 left in the first half. But that's when the undefeated Cardinal (4-0) began to pull away. After taking a timeout, Stanford came out firing and scored the game's next four goals for a five-goal lead. Peters responded with her second goal of the day and then Amanda Lockwood found the back of the net with 41 seconds left thanks to the second straight assist from Jill Doherty to trim the margin to 12-9.

Stanford, however, struck twice more, scoring with 28 and 14 seconds left to take a ton of momentum and a 14-9 lead into halftime. The late stretch at the end of the first half proved to be the difference as Stanford scored twice more just two minutes after the break and led by as many as 12 in the second half.

"It is tough as a coach, because we've coached them through these things," Swezey said of the two Stanford goals in the final 28 seconds of the first half. "We've gone over how to play people coming out of transition. We started playing on our heels and there was no reason for it then. It was a close game."

It was the first game for the Commodores without starting attacker Kelly Chandler, who ranked 10th in Division I with 5.60 draws a game. She tore her ACL in practice on Thursday and is out for the rest of the season. The junior plans to use a medical redshirt, which will give her two more seasons of eligibility. She was missed on Sunday as VU was beat on the draw 28-7, including zero draws in the second half. The bevy of draws led to plenty of opportunities for the Cardinal, who fired off 39 shots compared to Vanderbilt's 17.

The Commodores drew first blood and every time the Cardinals responded, Vanderbilt answered right back. In fact, the 'Dores didn't trail the entire half until the last 14 seconds.

But the second half was a different story. Playing their fifth ranked team in as many games, Vanderbilt couldn't keep pace with No. 10 Louisville and suffered a 16-9 loss on Wednesday afternoon.

Sophomore attacker Caroline Peters tied a career high with three goals and one assist but it wasn't enough as Vanderbilt suffered its fifth straight loss. The team mustered only two goals and six shots in the second half. It was a far cry from the first half in which the Commodores scored seven goals, notched the opening goal 39 seconds in and held a two-goal lead twice.

The Cardinals outscored Vanderbilt 8-2 after intermission and controlled the draw 8-3. Louisville midfielder Kaylin Morisette, who entered the game second in the country in draws per game, dominated the circle with 13 draw controls.

"We did our best to prepare for Morisette and her ability to control the draw, and we felt we did a great job in the first half," Vanderbilt coach Cathy Swezey said. "Unfortunately in the second half, she found her rhythm and it seemed to change the tone of the game. Our offense does need to be more consistent as this is the second game where we've only had two goals in a half."

The Cardinals (6-2) scored four of the first five goals after halftime to take a four-goal lead. Vanderbilt answered right back to pull within three with more than 18 minutes remaining. But that would be the last goal for the Commodores (3-5) as Louisville ended the game on a 4-0 run.

Freshman Kayla Peterson, the reigning BIG EAST Rookie of the Week who made her first career start, gave Vanderbilt an early 1-0 lead just 39 seconds in on a quick stick goal thanks to an assist from Jill Doherty. After Louisville tied it up, Peters and Alexa Kunowsky scored goals a minute apart for a 3-1 lead. Louisville once again knotted the game, but Vanderbilt pushed it to a two-goal lead thanks to goals by Emma Dagues and Mallory Schonk.

The Cardinals responded with two as well, but Peters scored on an assist from Amanda Lockwood for a 7-6 lead with 4:41 remaining. That would be the last lead for the Commodores. Kaylin Morisette scored one of her game-high five goals a minute later. Then, after Vanderbilt turnover, Faye Brust fired in a goal for an 8-7 Louisville lead with 14 seconds before halftime.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Turnovers and a barrage of first-half goals put the Vanderbilt lacrosse team in an inescapable hole.

It was not the sort of conference debut the Commodores were hoping for as they dropped the BIG EAST opener for both teams with a 19-10 loss to No. 6 Florida on Sunday at the VU Lacrosse Complex.

Vanderbilt turned the ball over 20 times - three more than its total number of shots. And Florida scored eight straight goals in the first half to turn a one-goal deficit into a seven-goal lead. Florida senior Shannon Gilroy, who entered the country tied for fifth in goals, scored a season-high seven goals.

The Commodores (3-6, 0-1) never recovered and lost their sixth straight — all to ranked opponents.

"As far as the turnovers go, I don't know if our kids just used to feeling somebody on their back or that kind of pressure," Vanderbilt coach Cathy Swezey said. "I know Gilroy had a lot of goals but I think she had quite a few caused turnovers (five), too. We just have to protect our sticks and take care of it and move the ball faster. Some of our kids just held the ball too long.

"As a coach, obviously losing is not fun. But I think I'd rather lose with technical errors than a lack of effort. Our kids are definitely putting it out there. They gave a lot of heart and worked really hard. It just didn't go our way."

Vanderbilt jumped out of the gate and scored first on a free position shot by Alexa Kunowsky less than two minutes in. After Gilroy answered, Caroline Peters put the Commodores back in front with an assist from Jill Doherty.

Then the Gators (7-4, 1-0) broke loose. Gilroy won the draw and scored 12 seconds after Peters. It was the first of two straight for Gilroy and started an 8-0 run that ended with a goal UF's Carli Marsh for a 9-2 lead with 6:40 to go in the half.

Vanderbilt struggled to get shots, mustering only two through the first 25 minutes of the game. Mallory Schonk stopped the drought with a free-position goal at the 5:23 mark. Freshman Kayla Peterson followed a couple minutes later with a goal on the first career assist from defender Gabrielle Nesi to cut the deficit to 9-4 going into halftime.

But Florida squashed any chance of a Commodore rally with three goals in the opening five minutes of the second half. Vanderbilt never got closer than six after that.

Doherty, Schonk, Kunowsky, Peters and Peterson all scored two goals apiece as Vanderbilt made an impressive 10 of 17 shots (58.8 percent). Doherty, Peterson, Nesi and Emma Dagnes each had an assist.

The Commodores picked up their second win over a ranked opponent this season with a 12-11 victory over the previously undefeated Blue Jays. Kelly Chandler scored four times and Mallory Schonk and Abby Wheeler each scored twice to lift the 'Dores past JHU (10-1, 1-1 ALC) on a rainy and soggy afternoon at the VU Lacrosse Complex. The Commodores have won eight of their last nine against JHU.

"I talked to my team a lot about creating history for our program and living up the big things we've done in the past and not letting our current record hold us back," coach Cathy Swezey said. "They did. They stepped up in such a big way. There were so many big performances on the field it is hard to single out one person. So many people did big things. A huge shoutout to our defense, though. We put in a specific game plan to try to handle this team. They have three big guns. Our team bought in and they did it. It was awesome."

Vanderbilt (4-6, 1-1) won its first game since an upset of No. 13 Stanford on March 2 thanks to a late first-half surge. The Commodores took a 2-0 lead early into the game thanks to two quick goals from Chandler. Hopkins answered and went in front 4-2. But Vanderbilt grabbed a 7-4 halftime lead with five goals in the last 5:06 of the half.

That included four goals in a 62-second span as Alexa Kunowsky started the spurt after picking up a rebound and firing back into the net. Wheeler scored 11 seconds later. Chandler gave the 'Dores the lead for good on an unassisted goal and then nine seconds later Wheeler scored again after Kunowsky won the draw control and dished out an assist. Schonk gave the 'Dores a three-goal lead with seven seconds left in the half when she scored on a free position shot.

The 'Dores led by as many as four goals twice in the second half but Johns Hopkins battled back in the second half. The Blue Jays pulled to within one, 12-11, with 2:11 left, won the ensuing draw control and called a timeout with two minutes left. Then junior Meggie Ramzy made arguably the defensive play of the day by checking John Hopkins' Haley Schweizer and causing a turnover. The ball plopped right into Alex Duckenfield's stick and the Commodores ran out the clock.

Seven Commodores scored with goals also coming from Jill Doherty, Emma Dagnes, Alexa Kunowsky and Amanda Lockwood. Doherty added two assists and Chandler, Kunowsky, Dagnes and Lockwood also had an assist. Chandler scored at least four goals for the fourth time this season. astonishing 16 goals.
