Vanderbilt hosts Kentucky this weekend in the Commodores Southeastern Conference home opener. The teams will open up on Friday at 6 p.m. and will continue on Saturday at 2 p.m. and Sunday at 1 p.m. Tickets are available through the Vanderbilt ticket office at (615) 322-GOLD or online at www.vucommodores.com

About Kentucky

Kentucky is 16-5 on the season and 1-2 in the SEC after dropping the opening series against Ole Miss in Lexington last weekend. The Wildcats defeated Xavier, 11-6, on Tuesday before heading to Nashville.

UK has been led offensively by preseason All-American junior second baseman Chris Bisson, who enters with a .390 average, adding two homers and 14 RBI. Senior centerfielder Keenan Wiley has hit .351 with four doubles, three homers and 17 RBI to help lead the way. The Wildcats are hitting .298 as a team with 29 homers and 159 runs scored in 21 games (7.6 per game).

Kentucky's rotation for the weekend will be junior left-hander Logan Darnell (3-1, 3.09 ERA) on Friday, freshman southpaw Taylor Rogers (3-1, 4.75 ERA) on Saturday and right-hander Alex Meyer (4-2, 6.51 ERA) on Sunday. The Wildcats have a 3.97 team ERA with 160 strikeouts and 71 walks in 188.0 innings pitched.

Defensively UK has made 33 errors on the year and has a .962 fielding percentage, 10th in the SEC.

Gray Named To Pitcher of the Year Watch List

Sophomore right-hander Sonny Gray was recently named to the College Baseball Foundation initial Pitcher of the Year Watch List for 2010.

This is the second award watch list that the Smyrna, Tenn., native has been named to including the Golden Spikes Award.

Gray is currently 3-2 with a 2.73 ERA with 33 strikeouts and 13 walks on the year. He was the tough luck loser last Friday against Alabama after giving up one earned run in 5.2 innings with four strikeouts and four walks. The sophomore played on the USA Baseball Collegiate National team over the summer and has already been invited back for the trials in June.

The Pitcher of the Year Award will be presented in Lubbock, Texas, on July 2 as part of the College Baseball Awards Show.

Corbin Coaching Milestones

Head coach Tim Corbin notched his 400th career victory in Wednesday night's win over Wright State. He has amassed 294 wins in eight seasons at Vanderbilt and 106 victories in five seasons at Presbyterian. Corbin is currently 12 wins behind Larry Schmittou (306), who is second on the school's all-time win list. The Commodores all-time wins leader is Roy Mewbourne who went 655-608-9 from 1979-2002.

Espo Power

Third baseman Jason Espo is having a great sophomore season at the plate, already surpassing his home run total of a year ago. As a freshman he hit .287 with four homers, 13 doubles and 42 RBI while starting in all 64 games played. This season Espo is hitting .391 with five homers, nine doubles and 28 RBI. He is the team leader with 10 stolen bases as well and is 7-for-18 (.389) with a homer, double and eight RBI.

Freshmen Anthony Gomez and Connor Harrell are making the most of their opportunities thus far this season and have earned more playing time for their performances on the field in the

Gomez, a middle infielder from New Jersey, is hitting .556 in 17 games, including nine starts. He has the team's longest hitting streak this year at 14 games and in five of those games he extended the skein in just one at bat. He is 10-for-20 (.500) in the last five games including an 8-for-12 (.667) showing against Alabama last weekend.

Harrell, an outfielder from Texas, is hitting .361 in 19 games, including 17 starts. He has a homer, eight doubles and 16 RBI and has played a steady outfield. Three of his last six hits have been doubles and he has five RBI in the last five games.

Giobbi named to Johnny Bench Award Watch List

Senior catcher Andrew Giobbi is on the official watch list for the 2010 Coleman Company-Johnny Bench Award.

The Portland, Maine, native has had an outstanding season thus far behind the plate, having thrown out 13 of 20 runners attempting to steal. He has also caught a pitching staff that has a stellar 2.94 team ERA, best in the SEC. This is the second year in a row "Gio" has been named to the watch list.

The watch list will be narrowed down to the semifinalists, whom will be announced May 19, 2010. Ballots will be sent to the national voting panel at the end of May for a vote to determine the three finalists. The finalists will be announced June 2, 2010 prior to the NCAA Regionals and Major League Baseball Draft. A final vote among the national committee will occur during the College World Series. All finalists will be brought to Wichita and the winner will be announced at the 13th Annual Greater Wichita Sports Banquet on July 1, 2010.

Commodore Tidbits

Vanderbilt's 18 wins is tops in the SEC entering weekend play ... VU is second in the SEC in hitting with a .350 batting average and leads the conference with a 2.94 team ERA ... Freshman infielder Anthony Gomez' team best 14 game hitting streak was snapped on Wednesday as was freshman outfielder Connor Harrell's nine game skein ... VU went 2-3 last week, splitting a midweek series with WKU before dropping two of three at Alabama over the weekend in the SEC opener ... Errors plagued the Commodores last week as nine mistakes led to 13 unearned runs in five games. VU fielded .954 on the week, while WKU and Alabama made just four between them for a .979 fielding percentage ... The Commodore bats did not have as strong a week, hitting .303 as a team with a homer, 11 doubles and 27 runs scored ... The pitching staff sported a 5.44 ERA and the strikeout to walk ratio was 34 to 28 in 43.0 innings ... Aaron Westlake was 9-for-23 (.391) in five games with two doubles, a triple and four RBI ... Connor Harrell was 7-for-19 (.368) with two doubles, three RBI and two runs scored ... Curt Casali returned to action after missing six games with the hamstring injury. He pinch hit in the Friday opener against the Tide, then started at DH in the final two games. He was 1-for-7 with two runs scored in his return ... Jack Armstrong continued where he left off last weekend against Ohio on the mound, allowing just one earned run in 6.1 innings against Alabama on Sunday. He picked the win to move to 3-0 on the year. He has allowed just two earned runs in his last 13 innings of work. Sonny Gray was the tough luck loser on Friday, allowing one earned run over 5.2 innings with four strikeouts against the Crimson Tide ... Closer Russell Brewer continues to impress, throwing 3.2 scoreless innings over two games on the week. He picked up his third save of the year with 2.2 innings of one-hit shutout relief against Alabama on Sunday. He has 15 saves in his career ... Corey Williams picked up his first collegiate win against WKU last Wednesday, throwing two innings of one-hit scoreless relief. He followed that up with his first collegiate save, throwing three shutout innings in closing out the 10-4 win over Lipscomb on Tuesday ... VU is 14-1 at home this season and are 68-60-4 against Kentucky in Nashville ... The Wildcats have two players from the Nashville area, junior Logan Darnell (Joelton, Tenn.) and Jordan Cooper (Shelbyville).

Commodores Picked To Finish Fourth In SEC East

Vanderbilt was picked to finish fourth in the Southeastern Conference Eastern Division as the league office released its annual preseason coaches poll today.

The Commodores received one first-place vote in the division with Florida, last year's division winner, garnering 64 of a possible 66 points from the coaches.

LSU is predicted to repeat as the 2010 Southeastern Conference baseball champions, as voted by the league's 12 baseball coaches in the 19th annual preseason SEC poll.

The Tigers, ranked No. 2 nationally in multiple preseason polls, seek to capture their league-leading 15th SEC Championship. The Tigers return eight position players with starting experience and 10 pitchers from their 2009 squad which claimed the NCAA National Championship.

Since 1996, the SEC has named a regular season champion as well as a tournament champion. Prior to 1996, the tournament champion was considered the SEC Champion.

In the overall SEC Champion vote, LSU received five of a possible 11 votes. Florida received four votes while Arkansas had three.

In addition to picking a preseason SEC champion, the league's head coaches voted a predicted order of finish in the SEC Eastern and Western Divisions. In the Eastern Division, Florida was the favorite with 64 of a possible 66 points. South Carolina came in second with 52 points and Georgia third with 42. LSU was favorite in the Western Division with a total of 63 points. Arkansas was second with 59, while Ole Miss, who shared the overall title last season with LSU, finished third with 39.

Commodores Had Longest Road Trip In College Baseball

As Division I baseball starts up this week across the country, one Vanderbilt record that will not be beaten is longest trip of the year. Vanderbilt traveled 6,648 miles to Tokyo, Japan and an additional 1,797 miles to Hong Kong over the Thanksgiving holiday week. Due to a generous gift by Vanderbilt alum Bill Kaye, the Commodores were able to fly to Japan and face four of the top teams in Japan's collegiate system. Along with the quality competition the kids were able to experience different cultures, each with their own unique traditions and histories. The team went 1-1-2 on the field and learned valuable lessons off the field as well.

HEAD COACH TIM CORBIN



In seven seasons at Vanderbilt, Tim Corbin has turned Vanderbilt into one of the national powers of college baseball and taken the program to unprecedented success with four straight NCAA regional appearances.

In 2009, Corbin took a young squad with seven new offensive starters and molded them into a team that finished with a 37-27 record and runner-up finishes in the Southeastern Conference tournament and the NCAA Louisville Regional.

The 2009 draft saw six Commodores selected, highlighted by junior pitcher Mike Minor's selection with the seventh overall pick by the Atlanta Braves. His selection marked the fifth time in the last three seasons a Vanderbilt player has been picked in the first round.

Corbin's overall record of 276-157 (.637) is third best in terms of wins at Vanderbilt, and first in terms of winning percentage for coaches with 100 games or more.

In 2008, Corbin guided the Commodores to their second straight 40-win season (41-22) and third consecutive appearance in the NCAA tournament. The Commodores battled through the first half of the season without the services of Preseason Player of the Year Pedro Alvarez and managed to record road sweeps over Mississippi State and Tennessee for the first time in school history.

The 2008 draft saw eight current Commodores selected, highlighted by Pedro Alvarez who was taken with the second overall pick by the Pittsburgh Pirates. Vanderbilt became the first school in draft history to have the first overall pick (David Price in 2007) and second overall pick in consecutive drafts, an indication of the talent Corbin has brought into the program over the last six years.

In 2007, Corbin guided the Commodores to their best season ever, finishing with a school record 54 wins. The team also achieved a No. 1 national ranking for the first time in school history and held that honor for 13 of 15 weeks during the regular season.

The Vanderbilt baseball team also swept through the Southeastern Conference, winning both the regular season and tournament crown for the first time ever, and it marked the first time an SEC team had done it since 1996. The team lost only one conference series the entire season against SEC West Division winner Arkansas in Fayetteville and avenged the series loss by defeating the Razorbacks in the SEC tournament title game.

The conference recognized Corbin for the work he had done, naming him SEC Coach of the Year. Corbin also picked up Co-National Coach of the Year by College Baseball Insider and regional coach of the year honors by the American Baseball Coaches Association.

The Commodores hosted their first ever NCAA regional as the No. 1 National Seed and arrived as a power in college baseball.

Corbin's success and methods of running the Vanderbilt program has earned him respect among the college and international baseball communities.

In the summer of 2006 he managed the USA Baseball National Team to a 28-2-1 record that culminated with a gold medal finish at the FISU (International University Sports Federation) World University Championship in Havana, Cuba. The .919 winning percentage set a new national team high and it garnered special recognition by the United States Olympic Committee.

In 2006 he guided a youthful Commodore squad to a 38-27 record and sixth-place finish in the rugged Southeastern Conference. The team was the youngest team in the league, with seven everyday starters being freshmen or sophomores. For the second time in three seasons, Corbin guided the team to the SEC Tournament Championship game and the young squad also gained valuable NCAA experience after advancing to the championship round of the Atlanta Regional.

The 2006 team posted impressive series wins over College World Series participant Georgia, Super Regional participants South Carolina and Ole Miss, and took series on the road against Florida and LSU. The team handed LSU its worst conference loss at home in school history in the process.

In addition to on the field successes, the baseball program itself has had significant upgrades to the facilities with a new fieldhouse, complete with new locker rooms for players, coaches and Commodore alums playing professional baseball. Also included are coach's offices, a classroom that overlooks Hawkins Field and a new weight room. New for 2009 are permanent seats in the outfield pushing Hawkins Field seating capacity to double the amount when Corbin arrived in 2003. These recent upgrades reinforce the

excitement and commitment made to the baseball program due to the successes Tim Corbin has achieved as well as those he will strive to accomplish in the future.

He has already pushed the program to its most successful season, rewritten a significant portion of its record book, and ascended to the ranks of Southeastern Conference and national powers. For him, such excellence has been a constant in a career that covers three decades in both the collegiate and international baseball ranks.

Corbin, along with his coaching staff, are a tireless group that saw their recruiting efforts pay in 2005 as their recruiting class was labeled the nation's best by *Baseball America*.

Professional baseball has also taken notice of the program as 28 VU players have been drafted over the last four years, including eight in 2008.

In 2005, Corbin directed the squad to its second consecutive 30-win season, an achievement that had not been done in over 15 years. The campaign was highlighted with series wins over Alabama, Mississippi, South Carolina and College World Series participant Tennessee.

In 2004, Corbin not only directed the Commodores to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 24 years, he guided them to their first-ever Super Regional as they swept through the Charlottesville Regional with victories over George Mason, Princeton and host Virginia. In the Super Regional they fell to the eventual national runner-up, Texas, but still carved out a piece of history as the first team in NCAA baseball history to make it that far one year after having finished with a sub-.500 record.

Along the way Vanderbilt racked up 45 wins, was the only team to rank among the SEC's top five in earned run average (first), batting average (fourth) and fielding percentage (first), and finished with a .703 winning percentage, which was third-best in the highly competitive conference, which sent nine schools to the NCAA Tournament. The Commodores' school-record .978 fielding percentage was second in the nation, and their 30 error-free games were 11 more than the previous season.

Before Corbin was hired as the 21st coach in program history, Vanderbilt had not earned a spot in the conference tournament in a decade. Not only has he led his team there twice, the Commodores made it to the 2004 championship game.

During the 2004 regular season, Vanderbilt swept a series against Mississippi State for the first time. It was one of three conference whitewashes and one of five series' wins in all.

His efforts earned him the 2004 Vanderbilt Coach of the Year award and a nomination for the Nashville Sports Council's Sports Person of the Year. Plus, a school-record five players were named to the SEC All-Tournament team, five players were drafted on the first day and seven VU players in all were chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft, topped by No. 6 overall pick pitcher Jeremy Sowers.

His first Vanderbilt team finished 27-28 overall and 14-16 in the SEC, good enough for second in the Eastern Division. It earned a conference tournament berth with a season-ending sweep of Tennessee capped by a dramatic ninth-inning rally in the finale. The overall and conference victory totals were the most by a first-year Vanderbilt coach and were made more impressive by the fact that the Commodores were 12-5 in one-run games.
