NO. 19 VANDERBILT FINISHES ROAD SCHEDULE AT SOUTH CAROLINA

The 19th-ranked Vanderbilt Commodores (19-9, 9-5 Southeastern Conference) play their final SEC road game of regular season when they battle South Carolina (14-13, 4-10 SEC) Wednesday at the Colonial Center. Tip-off is set for 6:30 p.m. CT. The contest will not be televised.

Vanderbilt can lock up the Eastern Division No. 2 seed in next week's SEC Tournament with a victory over the Gamecocks. A win Wednesday would make Commodore head coach Kevin Stallings only the second coach in Vanderbilt history to register three or more 20-win seasons (Roy Skinner - six 20-win campaigns). Stallings' 2003-04 squad went 23-10 en route to a Sweet 16 appearance in the NCAA Tournament. His 2004-05 unit went 20-14 and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NIT.

The Commodores are coming off a thrilling come-from-behind 67-65 victory over Kentucky on Sunday. SEC Player of the Year candidate Derrick Byars scored 21 of his game-high 26 points in the second half to lead Vanderbilt back from a 10-point second-half deficit. Byars rebounded his own missed free throw attempted and hit a floater with 26 seconds remaining to give the Commodores their first lead of the contest.

South Carolina has won two of its last three games after defeating Ole Miss 76-63 on Saturday. Tre' Kelley led the Gamecocks with 28 points and six assists. Vanderbilt defeated South Carolina 78-68 at Memorial Gymnasium on Feb. 14.

COLLEGE BASKETBALL EXPERTS TAB BYARS AS CANDIDATE FOR SEC PLAYER OF THE YEAR

A pair of college basketball experts has placed Vanderbilt's Derrick Byars on the radar for consideration for the SEC's Player of the Year award. CBS Sports broadcaster Clark Kellogg and ESPN.com senior college basketball writer Andy Katz both have said recently that Byars' strong play warrants his inclusion among the league's most elite players.

• Second in Scoring Since the Start of League Play

Byars enters play Wednesday second in the SEC in scoring since the start of league action with 19.2 points per contest. He is second only to South Carolina guard Tre Kelley's 20.7 average.

Continuing to make his case for SEC Player of the Year, Byars put together his best week in a Vanderbilt uniform two weeks ago. The University of Virginia transfer scored a career-high 32 points on 11-of-15 shooting to go along with seven rebounds in the Commodores' 78-68 win over South Carolina on Feb. 14. Three days later he tied Shan Foster for team-high honors with 24 points in Vanderbilt's 83-70 victory over No. 1 Florida on Jan. 17. Byars made 11-of-19 field goals against the Gators while tying his career high with eight assists and establishing a new personal best with five steals.

Byars has played a vital role in Vanderbilt's recent success, leading the Commodores in scoring in 10 of their last 13 games -- scoring 20 or more points eight times. His scoring streak started with a 25-point performance at home against then-No. 16 Tennessee on Jan. 10. Sunday against Kentucky, Byars scored 21 of his game-high 26 points in the second half, helping lead Vanderbilt back from a 10-point second-half deficit. Byars rebounded his own missed free throw attempted and hit a floater with 26 seconds remaining to give the Commodores their first lead of the contest.

The Memphis native, who transferred from the University of Virginia after two seasons, enters Tuesday ranked among the SEC leaders in six other statistical categories during league play, including field goal shooting (sixth at 49.8 percent), 3-pointers per game (tied for fifth at 2.46), steals (tied for sixth at 1.57) and 3-point shooting (eighth at 38.5 percent).

Outstanding Performances vs. Ranked Foes

Byars has performed well against nationally ranked opponents, averaging team highs for points (19.8), rebounds (4.9) and steals (1.8). He is shooting 53.6 percent from the field (60-of-112) and 37.5 percent from 3-point range (18-of-48) in Vanderbilt's eight games against ranked teams this season.

- Byars has led Vanderbilt in scoring in five of its last six games against ranked teams.
 - Posted 24 points on 11-of-19 shooting against then-No. 1 Florida on Jan. 17.
 - Recorded a double-double with 18 points and 10 rebounds at then-No. 21 LSU.
 - Scored 23 points with eight rebounds at then-No. 25 Kentucky on Jan. 20.
 - Tallied 15 points on 6-of-11 shooting against then-No. 10 Alabama.
 - Registered 25 points on 10-of-16 shooting with seven rebounds against then-No. 16 Tennessee on Jan. 10.

Accolades for Byars

- Tabbed the midseason SEC Player of the Year by Athlon Sports.
- Named National Player of the Week by ESPN's Dick Vitale and Colleg Insider.com after his performances against South Carolina and top-ranked Florida two weeks ago.
- Earned the SEC Player of the Week (Week 14) after shooting an amazing 64.7 percent from the field (22-of-34), 46.1 percent from 3-point range (6-of-13) and averaging 5.0 assists, 4.0 rebounds, and 3.5 steals in wins over South Carolina and top-ranked Florida. He netted a career-high 32 points against the Gamecocks and posted 24 points with a career high in assists (eight) and steals (five) against the Gators.
- Earned the SEC Player of the Week (Week 11) after he averaged 19.0 points and 6.0 rebounds while shooting 56.5 percent (13-of-23) from the field and 53.8 percent (7-of-13) from 3-point range while helping lead Vanderbilt to wins over nationally ranked Alabama and Kentucky. He registered 15 points and a trio of 3-pointers in Vanderbilt's 94-73 home victory over then-No. 10 Alabama on Jan. 17. He posted a game-high 23 points on 7-of-12 shooting from the field with four 3-pointers and a game-high eight rebounds in the Commodores' 72-67 win at then-No. 25 Kentucky on Jan. 20.

STALLINGS A FINALIST FOR NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Vanderbilt men's basketball coach Kevin Stallings has been named one of 15 finalists for the 2007 Jim Phelan national coach of the year award.

Stallings has directed one of the nation's top turnaround stories in college basketball this season, leading Vanderbilt back from a 1-3 start to an 19-9 overall mark, 9-5 record in the Southeastern Conference and national rankings in this

week's Associated Press poll (19th) and ESPN-USA Today poll (23rd).

The Commodores defeated top-ranked Florida 83-70 at Memorial Gymnasium on Feb. 17 to snap the Gators' nation-best 17-game win streak. The victory marked the Commodores' sixth win over a ranked opponent this season – tied with North Carolina and Southern California for the second most in the nation. Only UCLA has more victories over AP poll ranked opponents with eight.

Stallings is joined on the list by Jim Baron (Rhode Island), Tony Bennett (Washington State), John Calipari (Memphis), Billy Donovan (Florida), Mark Fox (Nevada), Billy Gillispie (Texas A&M), Seth Greenberg (Virginia Tech), Ben Howland (UCLA), Todd Lickliter (Butler), Chris Lowery (Southern Illinois), Gregg Marshall (Winthrop), Thad Matta (Ohio State), Bo Ryan (Wisconsin) and Cliff Warren (Jacksonville).

The Jim Phelan Award is given annually to the nation's top coach, as voted on by the 20-member panel. The winner will be presented with the award at the Final Four in Atlanta.

Prior to 2003 the award was known simply as the ColleagueInsider.com national coach of the year. It was renamed to honor longtime Mount St. Mary's head coach Jim Phelan who retired following the 2002-03 season.

Previous winners are Howland (2006), Tubby Smith (Kentucky, 2005), Phil Martelli (St. Joseph's, 2004) and Mark Slonaker (Mercer, 2003).

STALLINGS FOR SEC COACH OF THE YEAR

Vanderbilt's Kevin Stallings deserves consideration for the SEC Coach of the Year award. His efforts in helping the Commodores overcome adversity and adjust to a different formula for winning have Vanderbilt eyeing a return trip to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2004.

An already depleted frontcourt at season's start took a hit when starting center Alan Metcalfe went down with a broken left foot two games into the season. That caused Stallings to adjust his play of attack, and after a 1-3 start, the Commodores won nine of their next 10 prior to SEC play thanks to a game plan that took advantage of Vanderbilt's arsenal of 3-point shooters.

Starting the conference year slowly at 1-2 didn't stop the Commodores turnaround season. Instead, Vanderbilt won its next four league games — a Stallings era first — including three contests against ranked opponents.

- Since a 10-point loss at then-No. 1 Florida at the end of January, Vanderbilt has won four of its last six, including an 83-70 win over the Gators on Feb. 17 that snapped Florida's 17-game win streak.
- Vanderbilt's nine league victories entering Wednesday's game at South Carolina are the most by a Commodore coach since 1997. The Commodores have won 10 or more conference games only once since the league split into two divisions prior to the 1991-92 campaign.
- Stallings needs one more win to become only the second coach in Vanderbilt history to post three 20-win campaigns during a coaching tenure. Roy Skinner (1959, 1962-76) recorded six 20-win seasons.
- Stallings earned his 250th career coaching victory when Vanderbilt defeated No. 25 Georgia Tech, 73-64 on Dec. 9. In doing so, Stallings became the sixth active coach in the SEC to achieve 250 or more career coaching wins.
- Stallings moved into third place on Vanderbilt's all-time coaching wins list following the Commodores' 75-62 victory over Tennessee Tech in the second round of the San Juan Shootout. His career wins mark at Vanderbilt ranks behind only Roy Skinner (278) and Bob Polk (197).

FOSTER AMONG THE LEAGUE'S MOST TALENTED PERFORMERS

Vanderbilt wing player Shan Foster continues to prove himself as one of the top scorers in the SEC. The Kenner, La. native is enjoying another solid campaign after earning All-Freshman Team honors in 2005 and Coaches' First Team All-SEC honors a year ago.

Foster's Numbers in 2007

Foster ranks among the SEC leaders this season: tied for ninth in scoring (15.1), 11th in field goal shooting (45.1 percent), 14th in 3-point shooting (34.5 percent) and tied for 12th in 3-pointers made (2.07). He also is averaging a career-high 4.8 rebounds as a junior. He grabbed seven rebounds and handed out a career-high seven assists in VU's win at then-No. 25 Kentucky.

Foster's Impact

Foster has scored in double figures in 22 of Vanderbilt's 28 games, scoring 20 or more points eight times. He has made three or more 3-pointers 10 times. Foster has stepped forward in several key games for the Commodores. He scored 13 of his 24 points in the first half to help spark Vanderbilt against then-No. 1 Florida on Feb. 17. Foster was 5-of-10 shooting from 3-point range against the Gators. He also came through in the clutch with several key baskets, rebounds or defensive plays in wins at then-No. 25 Kentucky and No. 21 LSU.

Member of 1,000-point Club

Foster joined the 1,000-point club with a bang, tying a season high with 29 points in Vanderbilt's 74-69 win at Rice on Jan. 2. Foster netted 26 of his 29 points in the first half. For the game, Foster shot 11-of-17 from the field with five 3-pointers.

CAGE BOASTS OUTSTANDING SHOOTING SKILLS

Dan Cage has been a key component to Vanderbilt's turnaround this season providing the Commodores outstanding shooting from the perimeter alongside toughness on defense and valued leadership on and off the court. The 6-5, 214-pound guard was inserted into the Commodore starting lineup three games into the season when starting center Alan Metcalfe went down with a

fractured bone in his left foot at Wake Forest (Nov. 21).

Since Start of SEC Play

Cage has scored in double figures in 10 of 14 SEC games. He ranks second in the SEC in 3-point shooting percentage (.469) heading into play on Tuesday and is third in 3-pointers made per game (2.71) since the start of conference play.

Cage matched his career high with 19 points -- all in the second half -- against Georgia on Feb. 3, thanks in part to four 3-pointers. Earlier this season at Auburn, Cage tallied 19 points with five triples. Other top performances by Cage included: 15 points and seven rebounds in Vanderbilt's win over then-No. 16 Tennessee on Jan. 10 and 17 points thanks in part to five 3-pointers at Georgia on Jan. 13.

Cage helped Vanderbilt to a 72-67 at Kentucky on Jan. 20, scoring all of his 10 points in the second half. In fact, he netted seven points in the final 1:54.

Cage's Double-Figures Scoring Streak

Since Metcalfe's injury, Cage has helped Vanderbilt to 19 wins in its last 26 games as a starter, scoring in double figures for 12 consecutive games from Dec. 19 through Jan. 27. During his double-figures scoring streak, Vanderbilt lost only three games while Cage led the Commodores in 3-point shooting at 51.4 percent (38-of-74), free throw shooting at 90.9 percent (30-of-33), and ranked third on the squad in scoring with 14.3 points per game.

Outstanding Free Throw Shooter

- For the season, Cage has made 85.2 percent of his charity tosses (52-of-61). In fact, Cage has made 93-of-104 attempts (89.4 percent) since Dec. 1, 2004.

Vanderbilt's Derrick Byars scored a career-high 32 points on 11-of-15 shooting in a 78-68 win over South Carolina.

Vanderbilt (17-8, 7-4 Southeastern Conference) was 11-of-24 from 3-point range and had three other scorers in double figures -- Shan Foster and Alex Gordon with 14 each, and Dan Cage with 11.

South Carolina (12-12, 2-9) jumped out to a 12-4 lead behind the unlikely duo of Dominique Archie and Bryce Sheldon, who had 12 and 10 first-half points respectively.

The Commodores blanketed Tre' Kelley, the SEC's leading scorer in league games, by double-teaming him for most of the first half.

Byars carried a slow-starting Vanderbilt offense with 19 first-half points, 12 of those in a 30-13 Commodore run that gave Vandy a 34-25 lead.

But the Gamecocks' Kelley got free for two quick 3-pointers, then added a pair of free throws and a 2-pointer to cut the Vandy lead to 37-35 at halftime.

Vandy built the lead to 48-40 early in the second half, but the Gamecocks took a 57-55 lead on a layup by Brandon Wallace, who had a game-high 13 rebounds.

Byars followed with a 3-pointer and Vanderbilt never trailed again. Alex Gordon's two 3-pointers on back-to-back possessions, the last one giving Vanderbilt a 66-61 lead, were key down the stretch as Carolina never got within five again.

Kelley had 21 points, Sheldon 18 and Archie 15 to lead the Gamecocks.

Dan Cage scored 13 points and Vanderbilt rallied from a nine-point deficit to beat South Carolina 57-56.

The Gamecocks' Tarence Kinsey missed an 18-foot jumper just before the buzzer, and South Carolina (14-13, 5-9 Southeastern Conference) lost by one for the second consecutive game.

The Gamecocks were up 50-41 with 6:40 left, but Vanderbilt (14-13, 5-9) hit four 3-pointers and went on a 16-4 run. The Commodores were just 2-for-10 from beyond the arc in the first half.

Cage hit back-to-back 3-pointers in less than one minute and Derrick Byars scored on a layup to give VU a 57-54 lead with 1:36 left. Byars ended with 10 points, while Shan Foster had 11 points.

After Kinsey hit two foul shots with 1:02 left, the Commodores turned it over with 25.8 seconds remaining, setting up the Gamecocks final shot. Actually, South Carolina got two shots -- Kinsey missed a 3 with about seven seconds left then he failed to hit the rim from the corner just before the buzzer.

SCOUTING SOUTH CAROLINA

South Carolina (14-13, 4-10 SEC) has won two of its last three games, including a pair of victories at the Colonial Center.

The Gamecocks are led by guard Tre Kelley (20.7 ppg) -- the SEC's top scorer since the start of league play. He averaged 18.7 points on the season to go along with 5.0 assists and 2.6 rebounds per game. Brandon Wallace is close to averaging a double-double on the season. The 6-9 center is averaging 10.1 points and 9.4 rebounds. He ranks second in the SEC with 2.81 blocks per game this season and leads USC with 37 steals on the year.

COMMODORES RETURNED TO NATIONAL RANKINGS AFTER BEATING FLORIDA

The Vanderbilt men's basketball team returned to the national rankings last week following its 83-70 home victory over previously top-ranked Florida.

The Commodores were listed at No. 17 in the Associated Press poll and No. 21 in the ESPN-USA Today Coaches poll. It was the highest ranking for Vanderbilt in the AP poll since it received a No. 8 listing in the final poll of the 1993 campaign. The Commodores also climbed back in the ESPN-USA Today poll for the first time since the final rankings of the 2004 campaign that listed Vanderbilt at No. 25.

Earlier this season, Vanderbilt climbed into the Associated Press poll for the first time since 2004 with a No. 24 ranking in the Jan. 29 poll. After rising to No. 23 a week later, Vanderbilt slipped out of the AP poll following an 84-57 loss at Tennessee on Feb. 10.

Heading to South Carolina Wednesday, Vanderbilt is listed at No. 19 in the AP poll and 23rd in the ESPN-USA Today poll.

COMMODORES AMONG NATION'S BEST VERSUS RANKED OPPONENTS

Vanderbilt's six wins against nationally ranked foes (AP poll) ranked among the most in the nation heading into play on Monday. The Commodores won a school record five consecutive games against ranked teams earlier this season -- including three in an eight-day stretch against then-No. 10 Alabama (94-73); at then-No. 25 Kentucky (72-67) and at then-No. 21 LSU (64-53) -- before losing at top-ranked Florida on Jan. 31. The previous school record for one season was three set four times, last during the 2000 campaign.

• The Commodores tied the school record for consecutive home wins against ranked opponents when they upset top-ranked Florida, 83-70 on Feb. 17. Vanderbilt also won four consecutive home games against ranked opponents during the end of the 1999 season and the start of the 2000 campaign. Vanderbilt topped No. 22 Arkansas (73-69) and No. 19 Florida (71-70 in overtime) at Memorial Gymnasium during the 1999 season before defeating No. 6 Florida (87-77) and No. 24 LSU (65-62) in its first two home contests against ranked opponents during the 2000 season.

WHAT A TURNAROUND

THREE-POINT WEAPON

Vanderbilt features one of the most talented and deepest collection of 3-point shooters in the nation. Nine different Commodores have made a 3-pointer this season while four players have made 40 or more triples on the year.

- Vanderbilt enters the week as the only squad in the SEC with four players who have made 40 or more 3-pointers this season: Dan Cage (65), Derrick Byars (61), Shan Foster (58), and Alex Gordon (43).

- The Commodores lead the SEC, averaging 9.07 3-pointers made on the season and 9.50 3-pointers during league play.

- Vanderbilt ranks third in 3-point shooting percentage for the season (.374) and second since the start of SEC play (.383).

- Dan Cage, Derrick Byars and Shan Foster rank among the SEC's leaders in 3-point shooting percentage and 3-pointers per game (for all games).

- Dan Cage is second in the SEC in 3-point shooting (44.5 percent) and ranks sixth in 3-pointers per game (2.32) since the start of league play.

- Vanderbilt made 10-of-21 3-point attempts (47.6 percent) against top-ranked Florida on Feb. 17. The 10 made 3-pointers and 47.6 percent shooting from beyond the arc were season highs for a Gator opponent.

- Vanderbilt set season-highs for 3-pointers made (15) and 3-point shooting percentage (.536) against Alabama on Jan. 17. The then-10th ranked Crimson Tide entered the contest ranked second in the SEC in 3-point shooting defense (.275). The 15 made 3-pointers against Alabama are tied for the most by an SEC team this season.

- Three days later, the Commodores made 11-of-23 attempts (47.8 percent) from beyond the arc against then-No. 25 Kentucky on Jan. 20. The Wildcats entered the contest ranked third in the SEC in 3-point shooting defense (.295) and surrendered season highs in 3-pointers (11) and 3-point shooting percentage (.478) by a Kentucky opponent.

BYARS & FOSTER MAKE UP TALENTED WING TANDEM

Vanderbilt features one of the SEC's top wing tandems in senior Derrick Byars and junior Shan Foster. Byars, a two-time SEC Player of the Week, ranks fifth in the SEC averaging 16.8 points. Foster, named First Team All-SEC by the league's coaches in the preseason, is 10th in the league with 15.1 points per game.

- Byars or Foster have led Vanderbilt in scoring in 19 of 28 games this season, including 14 of the last 16.

- The duo has combined for 95 points in Vanderbilt's last two home games -- posting a collective 48 points against then-No. 1 Florida on Feb. 17 and 47 points against Kentucky on Feb. 25. Against the Gators, the tandem scored a game-high 24 points each and combined to shoot 20-of-35 (57.1 percent) from the field. Against Kentucky, Byars netted a game-high 26 points while Foster poured in 21 points with four 3-pointers.

- The duo also has posted similar numbers in field goal shooting (Byars - 47.6 percent; Foster - 45.1 percent); 3-point shooting (Byars - 37.2 percent; Foster 34.5 percent) and rebounds (Byars - 4.8; Foster - 4.8).

- Both have raised their game to another level recently.

Byars has led Vanderbilt in scoring in 10 of its last 13 games. Foster has come through in the clutch with several key baskets, rebounds or defensive plays in wins at then-No. 25 Kentucky and No. 21 LSU. He scored 13 of his 24 points in the first half to help spark Vanderbilt against then-No. 1 Florida on Feb. 17.

- Foster is averaging a career-high 4.7 rebounds this season. He grabbed seven rebounds and handed out a career-high seven assists in Vanderbilt's win at then-No. 25 Kentucky on Jan. 20.

- Vanderbilt's 67-65 win over Kentucky gave the Commodores four consecutive wins over the Wildcats, matching Vanderbilt's longest win streak in the series. The Commodores also won four consecutive games over Kentucky from 1973-74.
- Vanderbilt hit 10 3-pointers against the Wildcats, marking the fourth consecutive game the Commodores have made 10 or more triples. Vanderbilt has made 10 or more 3-pointers in nine league games this season.
- Kentucky's 58.1 percent field goal shooting was the best by a Vanderbilt opponent this season.
- Vanderbilt's 16 offensive rebounds were its most since grabbing 17 at Auburn on Jan. 6.
- Vanderbilt forced Kentucky into 22 turnovers on the afternoon, matching the season-high for a Commodore opponent. Florida also recorded 22 miscues one week earlier in Vanderbilt's 83-70 over the then-No. 1 Gators.
- The victory marked the 650th win all-time at Memorial Gymnasium (55th year).

NEXT GAME: ARKANSAS

Vanderbilt closes out the 2006-07 regular season Saturday when it plays host to Arkansas. Commodore fans will salute seniors Derrick Byars, Dan Cage and Ted Skuchas prior to tip-off.

Arkansas won last year's meeting 78-66 in Fayetteville. Jonathon Modica led the Razorbacks with 19 points. Vanderbilt's Shan Foster led all scorers with 22 points and four 3-pointers.

The Razorbacks lead the all-time series 11-7. Vanderbilt holds a 6-3 lead in Nashville.

3-POINT STREAK NOW IN 20TH SEASON; VU ONE OF THREE TEAMS TO HIT A TREY IN EVERY GAME SINCE 1986-87 SEASON

Vanderbilt has made a 3-pointer in 658 consecutive games entering today's contest. The Commodores rank second only to UNLV (660) for the longest streak in Division I basketball.

Vanderbilt, UNLV and Princeton (573) are the only three schools in college basketball to have made at least one 3-pointer in every game played since the 3-point line was implemented for the 1986-87 season.

FOSTER JOINS 1,000-POINT CLUB

Shan Foster joined the 1,000-point club with a bang, tying a season high with 29 points in Vanderbilt's 74-69 win at Rice on Jan. 2.

Foster netted 26 of his 29 points in the first half, an out-pet that nearly surpassed Rice's point total for the half of 27. For the game, Foster shot 11-of-17 from the field, including 5-of-8 from 3-point range.

The junior from Kenner, La. joined the 1,000-point club in his 78th game as Commodore, tying Perry Wallace for 17th among the fastest players to join the elite club.

Among Commodores who played during or since the adoption of the 3-point line (1986-87), Foster is the second fastest Commodore to reach 1,000 points, behind only Billy McCaffrey. The Duke transfer joined the club after only 50 games as a Commodore.

METCALFE RETURNS TO THE COURT

Vanderbilt junior forward Alan Metcalfe made his first appearance on the court in over a month when he played eight minutes against Alabama A&M on Dec. 29.

Metcalfe missed 10 games and 37 days after breaking the second metatarsal in his left foot midway through the second half of Vanderbilt's 88-78 setback at Wake Forest on Nov. 21.

Metcalfe was averaging 5.5 points and 3.5 rebounds before the injury.

RODRIGUEZ JOINS COMMODORES AS A WALK-ON

David Rodriguez joined the Vanderbilt basketball squad as a walk-on Commodore head coach Kevin Stallings announced prior to Alabama A&M game on Dec. 29.

The 6-2, 180-pound sophomore guard from Sarasota, Fla. averaged 15 points, six rebounds and three assists as a senior at Out-of-Door Academy, a class 1-A school in Sarasota. He helped lead the Thunder to the District championship as a junior and was named the team's most valuable player as a sophomore and junior. He served as co-captain of two Thunder squads as a junior and senior.

Rodriguez, who wears No. 2 for the Commodores, played the final two minutes of Vanderbilt's 86-47 win against Alabama A&M.

Rodriguez joins junior Aubrey Hammond as one of two walk-ons on the Vanderbilt roster.

FOSTER CLIMBING VANDY CHARTS FOR 3-POINTERS MADE & ATTEMPTED

Junior swingman Shan Foster (217) has moved past former Commodores Matt Freije and Mario Moore into sixth place on Vanderbilt's career list for made 3-pointers. Foster ranks eight in career 3-pointers attempted with 540.

The Kenner, La. native led the Commodores a year ago in 3-pointers made (90) and attempted (217). His 217 attempts from beyond the arc ranked fourth in the SEC. (charts follow)

NWANKWO REMAINS A VALUED COMMODORE

College Park, Md., native Davis Nwankwo will watch today's game from the Vanderbilt bench after a heart condition — detected following his collapse at a practice last March — concluded his college playing career.

Nwankwo, played in 23 games, scoring 12 points and grabbed 30 rebounds last season as a redshirt freshman for the Commodores.

Nwankwo was advised to give up his athletic playing career following diagnosis of an enlarged heart condition known as hypertrophic cardiomyopathy. He suffered cardiac arrest during a practice session on March 6 leading up to Vanderbilt's appearance at the SEC Tournament.

Vanderbilt athletic trainer Mike Meyer revived Nwankwo after administering one shock from an automated external defibrillator (AED) and two rescue breaths. For his quick and steady response Meyer later was named the "Above

and Beyond" Division I Athletic Trainer of the Year by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA).

Nwankwo is believed to be only the second college athlete revived with this heart condition.

Considered a medical hardship, Nwankwo remains a student at Vanderbilt and attends Commodore practices. He will be present at all home and road contests.

METCALFE SHARES GRIEF IN TOLEDO'S LOSS

Vanderbilt junior forward Alan Metcalfe shares in the grief felt by the Toledo basketball program following the tragic loss of center Haris Charalambous earlier this fall.

The 21-year old reserve center for Toledo passed away on October 9 after collapsing near the start of a morning conditioning session.

Metcalfe and Charalambous were teammates in England as members of both the "Manchester Magic" Senior League Team and the England Junior National Team from 2000-2003.

Charalambous played in 23 games and averaged 0.8 points and 0.8 rebounds in 5.4 minutes for Toledo last season. Metcalfe is from St. Helens, England while Charalambous was a native of Manchester.

COACHES TAB FOSTER FIRST TEAM ALL-SEC

Vanderbilt junior swingman Shan Foster was named Preseason First Team All-Southeastern Conference by the league's coaches.

Foster, who earned a similar postseason award from the coaches last year, ranks as the league's third-leading returning scorer, averaging 15.9 points a year ago. Foster finished his sophomore campaign ranked among the SEC's leaders in 3-pointers per game (second with 3.00), 3-point shooting percentage (fourth at .415), and field goal percentage (ninth at .451).

"Shan is very deserving of the award," head coach Kevin Stallings said. "For the better part of two years he has been very consistent and has proven to be one of the league's best players. Preseason awards are nice but postseason honors have more meaning. I wouldn't be surprised if both Shan and Derrick (Byars) were on the list at the end of the season."

SEC MEDIA PICKS COMMODORES FOURTH IN EAST

Vanderbilt was picked to finish fourth in the SEC Eastern Division by media attending the league's annual media days, Oct. 25-26, in Birmingham, Ala.

The Commodores received 138 points to finish behind defending national champion Florida (30), Kentucky (62) and Tennessee (84). South Carolina (146) was chosen fifth while Georgia (149) ended up sixth. Florida earned 28 of 29 first-place votes to win the division and 21 votes to be crowned the overall champion.

Alabama edged LSU in voting to win the Western Division title. The Crimson Tide received 16 votes to LSU's 13 votes.

HISTORIC MEMORIAL GYMNASIUM NOW IN 55TH SEASON

Storied Memorial Gymnasium is in its 55th season as the host venue of Vanderbilt basketball. The SEC's most historic hoops setting has played host to more than 800 men's contests as well as the 1984 and 1991 SEC Tournaments and 40 men's and women's NCAA Tournament contests (since the early 1980s).

As the oldest gymnasium in the SEC, Memorial Gymnasium is renown for its end zone benches, raised floor and unique atmosphere. It was dedicated in 1952 as a memorial to all Vanderbilt men and women who served in World War II. It was built by the late master architect Edwin Keeble, who was commissioned to build a combination gymnasium/concert hall.

MEMORIAL GYMNASIUM TOUGH ON NON-CONFERENCE FOES

- Vanderbilt has won 89 of its last 95 home games against non-conference opponents.
- The Commodores are 69-6 against non-conference opponents at home during the Kevin Stallings era.
- Since the 1990 season, Vanderbilt owns a 136-13 non-conference record at home (.913 win percentage).
- The Commodores own an all-time record of 649-183 (.780 win percentage) in Memorial Gymnasium since the building opened for the 1952-53 campaign.
- VU won 40 consecutive non-conference home games from the 1996 season to the 2001 campaign.
- Vanderbilt won a school record 17 home games during the 2004-05 season.
- The Commodores have posted five undefeated seasons at home and won 10 or more games at the site in 19 of the past 20 seasons.

Head Coach Kevin Stallings announced Nov. 10 that center A.J. Ogilvy, guard Keegan Bell and forward Andre Walker have signed national letters of intent to attend Vanderbilt and play basketball for the Commodores beginning in the fall 2007.

“This is the start of a class that would be comparable to or even better than our current junior class,” Stallings said. “We’re off to a good start and look forward to signing one or maybe two more prospects.”

Ogilvy, a 6-10, 250-pound big man from Canberra, Australia, is in his third season attending the Australian Institute of Sports where he has developed into one of the nation's premier post players. He averaged 16.5 points, 9.7 rebounds and 3.0 blocks in the 2006 Under-20 Nationals.

Ogilvy was named to the Oceania Under 19 Championship All-Star team after averaging 15 points, 10 rebounds and two blocks while competing in the 2006 qualifying series against New Zealand.

Other accolades for the Australian include representing the country at the Youth Olympics and being named the

2005 New South Wales Junior Basketball Player of the Year.

Ogilvy picked Vanderbilt over New Mexico, UNLV and St. Mary's.

“Some people have considered A.J. the best big man from Australia since Andrew Bogut,” Stallings said. “He’s a very exciting signee for us. He’s almost seven-foot tall, moves very well and has a strong physical presence inside.”

“He will come to us as one of the most complete post talents we’ve recruited at Vanderbilt.”

Bell, a 6-1, 180-pound floor leader from Hazel Green, Ala. is listed among the nation's top 25 point guards by both Rivals.com and Scout.com. Bob Gibbons All-Star Report lists Bell as the 60th-best overall prospect.

Bell averaged 25 points and 11 assists as a junior at Bob Jones High School where he earned First Team All-State, All-Metro and All-Area accolades last season. He will play his senior campaign at Hazel Green High School.

Bell selected Vanderbilt over LSU and Ole Miss.

“Keegan has all the instincts you’d expect from someone who grew up in a basketball family,” Stallings said of Bell whose father, Dan, has been a successful high school coach Alabama and Division I coach in Louisiana. “Keegan is an excellent ball handler and passer who possesses exceptional shooting skills and good quickness.”

Walker is a 6-7, 210-pound forward from Flossmoor, Ill. The versatile Walker averaged 15 points, 8.2 rebounds and 2.6 assists at Homewood-Flossmoor High School as a senior last season. He is currently playing a post-graduate year at Brewster Academy, a prep school in Wolfeboro, N.H.

Named one of the most complete players in Chicago by the Chicago Tribune, Walker helped lead the Vikings to the Illinois Class 2A sectionals in both his junior and senior seasons. In summer 2005, Walker was a member of a Chicago Ferrari squad that won the 17-and-under AAU National Championship.

Walker chose Vanderbilt over Arizona State, Colorado and Seton Hall.

“What sets Andre apart is his ability to shoot the basketball,” Stallings said. “He has great range and an easy release. He’s got a body similar to Derrick Byars and is a great ball handler and passer for someone his size. He had foot surgery in the summer that limited some of his recruiting, but we feel fortunate to get him. He should be a good addition to our program.”

The Bucs' Kenya Swader cut the lead twice to 14-8 and 16-10, but that was the closest the game got.

Foster hit three more 3-pointers for a 37-15 lead and the Commodores stretched it to as much as 48 points in the second half.

It was the first time the Commodores scored more than 100 points since November 23, 2001, and the largest margin of victory and most points scored during the eight-year Kevin Stallings era at Vanderbilt.

Ross Neltner added 15 points and Derrick Byars added 14 for Vanderbilt. Blake Mishler had 12 points to lead ETSU (5-5), followed by Mike Smith with 10 points and 9 from Swader.

The Commodores hit a season-high 15 3-pointers in 28 attempts and shot 58 percent overall in pulling off their second home upset of a ranked team in eight days. They beat then-No. 16 Tennessee 82-81 on Jan. 10.

Vandy (12-6, 2-2 Southeastern Conference) never let Alabama (14-3, 1-2) get close after the opening minutes in handing the Tide a ninth straight loss in Nashville. Alabama hasn't won in Memorial Gym since 1990 under coach Wimp Sanderson.

The Tide missed its first four shots and last led 14-12 after a basket by Richard Hendrix. That was it as Vanderbilt just kept hitting shots in taking a 54-37 halftime lead and the Commodores were up by as many as 25 points in the final minutes.

Derrick Byars scored 15 points for Vanderbilt, while Ross Neltner added 14 and Alex Gordon and Dan Cage each had 12.

Mykal Riley led Alabama with 21 points, while Jermareo Davidson added 18, Hendrix 14 and Alonzo Gee 11. Ronald Steele, who had been averaging 10.5 points, had only five.

Gordon hit a 3 that put Vandy up to stay at 15-14 with 14:00 left in the first half. Davidson hit two jumpers that kept Alabama within 19-18, but the Commodores went on a 9-2 run highlighted by George Drake's dunk.

The Commodores, who had only one turnover through the first 18 minutes, pushed their lead into double digits.

Vandy was 21-of-31 from the field, including 9-of-15 from 3-point range, in the first half. The Commodores cooled off a bit in the second half but not enough to let Alabama back in the game.

Foster's fifth 3-pointer put Vandy up 68-46 with 15:06 to go.

Derrick Byars and Shan Foster each scored 24 points and Ross Neltner added 15 points as Vanderbilt snapped the nation's longest winning streak by upsetting top-ranked Florida 83-70 at Memorial Gymnasium.
 Florida (24-3, 11-1) had won 17 straight games and needed a victory to clinch at least a share of the SEC's Eastern Division and the overall league title. They also had won seven straight against the Commodores.
 But Vanderbilt (18-8, 8-4) -- one of the country's best against ranked opponents this season -- won for the seventh time in nine games by outshooting the Gators 57.1 percent to 44 percent from the field. They took the lead in the first half and led by as much as 16 points late.
 The win was the Commodores sixth against ranked opponents and third in a row against No.1 team at home.
 Joakim Noah led Florida with 15, and Corey Brewer and Al Horford each had 13 as the Gators had a season-high 22 turnovers. The Gators had been shooting 53.7 percent, but they struggled from the start when they hit only two of their first nine shots. They last led midway through the first half, 13-12, on a pair of free throws by Horford.
 Vanderbilt led 35-27 at halftime, the second-fewest first-half points scored by Florida this season.

Vandy was up 46-33 when Florida tried to make its customary run with seven straight points. Horford's two free throws pulled the Gators within 46-40 with 14:08 to go.
 Foster answered with a three-point play. Taurean Green hit a 3 for Florida, and Foster hit another 3. Brewer followed with a 3 to pull within 52-46. Ted Skuchas dunked for Vandy, and the Commodores started pulling away. The Gators never got closer than eight the rest of the way.

Byars' bucket gave Vanderbilt (19-9, 9-5 Southeastern Conference) its first lead of the game at 66-65. Kentucky (19-9, 8-6) then turned the ball over and was forced to foul Shan Foster who made one 1-of-2 free throws with nine seconds left. Kentucky's Ramel Bradley drove the lane, was triple-teamed and threw up a shot that missed. Time expired in the scramble for the ball.

Byars scored 21 of his game-high 26 points in the second half and Foster poured in 21 points thanks in part to four 3-pointers as Vanderbilt rallied from a 10-point second-half deficit. The victory marked the Commodores' 13th consecutive home win and gave Vanderbilt as many as nine wins in SEC play for the first time since the 1997 campaign. With the victory, Vanderbilt tied its longest win streak over Kentucky in series history at four games.

Bobby Perry led Kentucky with 18 points and Jodie Meeks added 15 as the Wildcats outshot Vanderbilt 58 percent to 41 percent. But the Commodores scored 20 points off Kentucky's 22 turnovers.
