YALE TALE

The Bulldogs kick off 2015 with a trip to the Music City to face Vanderbilt on Saturday. Tip off is slated for 2 p.m. EST (1 p.m. CST) at Memorial Gym, and the game will be televised on the SEC Network Plus.

There were a number of memorable moments in 2014 for Yale, who won at Harvard last February, finished second in the Ivy League and advanced to the championship game to the CollegeInsider.com post season tournament. That success has carried over to the first part of this season. The Bulldogs are 10-4 overall, which includes impressive road wins at defending national champion UConn, Kent State and Vermont. With 10 wins and three more non-league games remaining, Yale has a chance to enter Ivy League play with the most overall victories in school history. The 1991-92 and 2011-12 teams both had 10 wins when the Ivy season kicked off.

The game in Nashville is a homecoming for Jack Montague, who is from nearby Brentwood, Tenn. Yale practiced at Brentwood High School after arriving in town on Thursday. Montague, the district, region and county player of the year at Brentwood HS, has started all 14 games, is among the nation's leaders in three-point percentage (.515) and is averaging 9.9 points which is third on the team. He hit the winning shot in the upset of UConn, a three-pointer from the corner with 1.7 seconds left that lifted Yale to a 45-44 win. It was the No. 1 play of the day on ESPN's SportsCenter that night.

Montague, who attended camp at Memorial Gym as a youngster, went to several Vandy games with his close family friend Mario Moore, who played point guard for the Commodores. Montague is also close friends with Vanderbilt guard Nathan Watkins, who also is from Brentwood but attended a different high school.

HISTORY LESSONS

Yale and Vanderbilt are playing for the first time since 1984, an 87-72 Commodore victory. In all, the teams have met five times, all in Nashville, and Vanderbilt holds a 4-1 advantage in the series. Yale's victory came in the first meeting, 31-23 in 1907.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Yale University, founded in 1701, is the third oldest college in the United States and one of the foremost research universities in the world. First known as the Collegiate School, it changed its name in 1718 to honor benefactor Elihu Yale.
- In 1889, Yale students adopted the first college mascot, Handsome Dan, a ferocious and enthusiastic fan at early football games. Handsome Dan inspired Cole Porter to write Yale's famous fight song, "Bulldog, Bulldog." Today, the original Handsome Dan continues his reign from the lobby of Payne Whitney Gymnasium. Yale students also adopted the first school colors (1853), fielded the first cheerleaders (1890) and developed the first school fight song (1892).
- Five U.S. Presidents have ties to Yale. William Howard Taft (1878), George H.W. Bush (1948) and George W. Bush (1968) all received their undergraduate degrees from Yale, while Gerald Ford (1941) and Bill Clinton (1973) are both graduates of Yale Law School.
- Chris Dudley, who played 16 seasons in the NBA, is a 1987 Yale graduate. He was a three-time first team All-Ivy selection for the Bulldogs, and in his career with the Cleveland Cavaliers, New Jersey Nets, New York Knicks, Phoenix Suns and Portland TrailBlazers scored 3,473 points and collected 5,457 rebounds.

SCOUTING VANDERBILT

The Commodores (9-3) have won four of their last five games, including a 70-55 win at Saint Louis on New Year's Eve. Vanderbilt shoots 51.4 percent from the field, 40.2 percent from three-point range and 71.4 percent from the foul line. Three players average double figures in scoring, led by Damian Jones at 16.4 ppg. Yale is the second Ivy League opponent for the Commodores, who beat Penn 79-50 on Dec. 22.

TOWNSEND A RHODES SCHOLAR

The weekend of Nov. 22-23 turned out to be quite memorable for forward Matt Townsend. It began in New York where he interviewed as a Rhodes Scholar finalist. Late Saturday, after two rounds of interviews, he learned he had received the prestigious honor, one of just 32 awarded. Later Saturday, he hopped a flight to Cleveland to rejoin his teammates for the final game of the Men Against Breast Cancer Classic. And what did he do for an encore on Sunday? How about making all five of his shots from the field, including a driving layup that gave Yale a 59-58 lead with 1:12 left in a game the Bulldogs would go on to win 66-59 over Kent State.

Townsend is certainly a deserving Rhodes Scholar. He has maintained a 4.0 grade point average through six semesters and has earned numerous other accolades for his work in the classroom, including being elected to the Yale Phi Beta Kappa society as a junior, one of only eight juniors at Yale selected.

The Rhodes Scholarships are the oldest and most celebrated international fellowship awards in the world. Each year, 32 young Americans are selected as Rhodes Scholars, through a decentralized process representing the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Rhodes Scholars are chosen not only for their outstanding scholarly achievement but for their character, commitment to others and to the common good, and for their potential for leadership in whatever domains their careers may lead.

DUREN NOMINATED TO ALLSTATE GOOD WORKS TEAM

Javier Duren, who helped start #TeamSober to provide an alternative to the harmful drinking culture on the Yale campus, is one of 251 nominees for the 2015 Allstate NABC and WBCA Good Works Teams. This prestigious community service award recognizes a distinguished group of student-athletes who have demonstrated a commitment to enriching the lives of others and contributing to the greater good in their communities. Based on a twitter hashtag, #TeamSober seeks to provide a community of individuals who enjoy having fun at social functions but are comfortable and confident with themselves to not feel as if they have to consume alcohol in order to be accepted by their peers. Each member is held accountable by a pledge which they must sign at the beginning of each school year stating they will abstain from the consumption of alcohol if they are under 21 but allows drinking in moderation for those over 21 years of age.

YALE PICKED SECOND IN IVY LEAGUE PRESEASON MEDIA POLL

If the preseason prognosticators are to be believed, the Yale men's basketball team is in for another successful season. The Bulldogs were picked second in the Ivy League preseason poll by a select panel of media representatives. Defending champion Harvard is the unanimous favorite. The Crimson garnered all 17 first-place votes (136 points). Yale was second with 108 points followed by Columbia (94), Princeton (88), Brown (75), Dartmouth (47), Penn (39) and Cornell (25). Yale has finished higher than projected in seven of the last nine years, including last season when they were picked third and finished second.

THREE FORMER BULLDOGS PLAYING PROFESSIONALLY

Three former Bulldogs are already into their professional seasons. Greg Mangano '12 is with Karhu Kauhajoki in Finland, Reggie Willhite '12 is in Germany with Finke Baskets Paderborn and Sam Martin '13 is playing for the Durham Wildcats in England.

There is a long list of players that have earned professional opportunities during James Jones' tenure as the head coach at Yale. Edwin Draughan '05 recently retired after a long and very successful career, playing mostly in Switzerland. In addition, Ted Smith '00 (England), Matt Minoff '04 (Israel), Paul Vitelli '04 (Italy), Dominick Martin '06 (Spain), Matt Kyle '08 (Portugal), Caleb Holmes '08 (Iceland), Ross Morin '09 (Switzerland), Paul Nelson '10 (Romania, Slovakia) and Eric Flato '08 (England) have all played overseas. Alex Zampier '10 (NBA D-League), Travis Pinick '09 (NBA D-League) and Neil Yanke '01 (tryout with Los Angeles Lakers) had opportunities in the United States.

BULLDOGS ADOPT 14-YEAR-OLD RILEY MACK THROUGH FRIENDS OF JACLYN FOUNDATION

There is a new member of the Yale men's basketball family this season. The team has adopted 14-year-old Riley Mack through the Friends of Jaclyn Foundation.

Mack, who was diagnosed with a brain tumor at age 3 and moved to Connecticut from Florida, was officially introduced to the team on Sept. 24 in the locker room by Denis Murphy, the founder of the Friends of Jaclyn Foundation. This was the 520th adoption for the program, which unites college teams across the country with children who have brain tumors.

Murphy started Friends of Jaclyn after his daughter was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor at the age of nine in March of 2004. He saw how the relationship Jaclyn had with members of the Northwestern women's lacrosse team helped her brave the odds, while enriching the lives of the student-athletes as well.

James Jones, The Joel E. Smilow, Class of 1954 Head Coach of Men's Basketball at Yale, presented Riley with a Yale jersey and sweatshirt. In addition, Riley has his own stall in the team's locker room, complete with his nameplate.

BULLDOGS EARN NABC TEAM ACADEMIC AWARD

Yale was honored by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) with a Team Academic Excellence Award. The award, created by the NABC Committee On Academics, recognizes outstanding academic achievement by a team with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better for the 2013-14 season. Yale was one of only two Ivy League schools to be honored.

HEAD COACH JAMES JONES

James Jones, who begins his 16th season at the helm of the Yale program in 2014-15, is one of the most successful coaches in Ivy League history. Jones' 117 Ivy victories are the fourth most in league history, and his 209 overall wins are the third most. In addition, Yale has a .557 winning percentage in league games during his tenure, by far the highest in school history.

Jones, the longest tenured coach in the Ivy League, is the winningest coach in school history. He surpassed Hall of Fame Coach Joe Vancisin, who led Yale to 204 victories, when the Bulldogs beat Holy Cross on Mar. 22, 2014. Presently, only 19 other coaches in all of Division I have been at their institution longer than Jones has been at Yale.

The Bulldogs have won at least 10 Ivy games twice during Jones' tenure and have had a fourth-place or better finish in the Ivy League for 14 straight years. Jones has guided Yale to the postseason three times - the 2002 NIT and the 2012 and 2014 CollegeInsider.com Tournament. The Bulldogs reached the championship game of the CIT in 2014.

Jones was named the CollegeSportsMadness.com Ivy League Coach of the Year in 2014 after guiding the Bulldogs to 19 wins and a second-place Ivy League finish. In addition, he was a finalist for the 2014 CollegeInsider.com Ben Jobe Award, which is presented annually to the top minority coach in Division I men's basketball.

In 2001-02, Jones led the Bulldogs to their first Ivy League title since 1962-63 and the first postseason tournament victory in the 107-year history of Yale basketball. The team won 21 games, the second most in the modern era of Yale basketball, and reached the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. Jones' success did not go unnoticed. He was named the Ivy League Coach of the Year by Basketball America and CollegeInsider.com. Following Yale's weekend sweep of Penn and Princeton that season, Dick Vitale selected Jones as his Coach of the Week.

Jones was named Yale's 22nd head coach on Apr. 27, 1999, and he immediately put his stamp on the program as the Bulldogs more than doubled their Division I win total from the previous season and improved to fifth place in the Ivy League. In 2000-2001 the turnaround continued as Yale entered the final weekend of the regular season in the hunt for the Ivy League championship. The captain of the 2000-01 team, Neil Yanke, signed a free agent contract with the Los Angeles Lakers in 2004. Jones recruited Yanke to Yale as an assistant coach and then was his head coach for two years.

In 2001-02, Jones guided the Bulldogs to one of the most memorable seasons in school history. Yale finished 21-11 and earned a share of the Ivy title with Penn and Princeton. The Bulldogs upset Rutgers in the first round of the NIT before falling to Tennessee Tech at the New Haven Coliseum in front of the largest crowd ever to watch Yale Basketball in New Haven. In the process the Bulldogs set five school records. The 2,394 points scored was a new mark, topping the 2,089 scored by the 1948-49 team. The Bulldogs also set new records for three-pointers made (228) and free throws made (558).

Several of Jones' players have gone on to play professionally overseas, including Ted Smith (England), Matt Minoff (Israel), Paul Vitelli (Italy), Dominick Martin (Spain), Matt Kyle (Portugal), Caleb Holmes (Iceland), Ross Morin (Switzerland), Eric Flato (England), Greg Mangano (Spain) and Edwin Draughan (France). In addition, Alex Zampier (NBA D-League), Travis Pinick (NBA D-League) and Reggie Willhite (NBA D-League) have had professional opportunities in the United States.

Draughan, who graduated in 2005, was one of the most successful players in Yale history. He finished seventh all-time at Yale in scoring with 1,413 points and second in steals and fifth in assists. Mangano also made his mark at Yale under Jones' tutelage. Mangano, a two-time first team All-Ivy selection, is Yale's all-time leader with 213 career blocked shots. In addition, he was invited to the 2012 Portsmouth Invitational and played for Team USA at the 2011 World University Games in China.

Five assistant coaches who worked under Jones have gone on to become head coaches - Rob Senderoff (Kent State), Isaiah Cavaco (Oberlin), Mark Sembrowich (Academy of Arts University), Mark Gilbride (Clarkson) and Ted Hotaling (New Haven).

One of Jones' goals when he took the job was to upgrade Yale's schedule, a promise he has delivered on. In 2013, nationally ranked Florida visited the John J. Lee Amphitheater. The Bulldogs also have hosted Stanford (2008), Wake Forest (2003) and Penn State (2001) during his tenure. In addition, Yale has played in numerous prestigious tournaments under Jones, including the preseason NIT, the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic and the inaugural Guardians Classic.

Jones has enjoyed remarkable success against major conference opponents. In 2008-09, Yale knocked off Oregon State, the school's first win ever over a Pac-10 opponent. Jones also has enjoyed victories over schools from the ACC (Clemson, Boston College), Big East (Rutgers), Big Ten (Penn State) and Atlantic 10 (Rhode Island) during his tenure.

Jones has gained experience with USA Basketball in his time at Yale as well. He served as an assistant coach to Villanova's Jay Wright for the 2007 USA Basketball Men's Pan American Games Team, helping tutor Georgetown's Roy Hibbert, Michigan State's Drew Neitzel and Indiana's D.J. White. In 2006, Jones was selected by the USA Basketball Men's Collegiate Committee, chaired by Syracuse's Jim Boeheim, as a court coach for the 2006 USA Men's U18 National Team Trials.

Jones also has shared his insight with college basketball fans, serving as a guest analyst on the CBS College Sports Television Network on a number of occasions.

In addition to his coaching duties, Jones has been active in the New Haven community. Each summer he runs the James Jones Bulldog Basketball Camp. In 2002 he was the recipient of the President's Award from the Greater New Haven NAACP at its 85th Freedom Fund dinner.

As an assistant coach at Yale for two seasons from 1995-97, Jones gained a great understanding of Ivy League basketball. He returned to Yale as head coach after two years as an assistant coach at Ohio University, where he was primarily responsible for coordinating the Bobcats' recruiting efforts and developing the post players. In 1998-99 he helped guide Ohio to an 18-10 overall record and a berth in the Mid American Conference Tournament semifinals. At Ohio, he recruited Brandon Hunter, who was a second round pick of the Boston Celtics in the 2002 NBA draft.

A Long Island, N.Y., native, Jones served as an assistant basketball coach for five seasons (1990-95) at his alma mater, the University at Albany (N.Y.). In his final two coaching seasons at Albany, he helped lead the team to a 44-11 record and two appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including reaching the Elite Eight in 1993-94. His primary responsibilities included recruiting, scouting, supervising the fall conditioning program and advising team members on academic matters. The team was 93-40 during his five seasons on the bench.

Jones graduated from Albany in 1986 with a bachelor's degree in communications and in 1995 earned his master's in educational administration. As a player at Albany, Jones was captain of the freshman team and was selected as the team's Freshman of the Year. He played for and coached with the legendary Dr. Richard Sauers, one of only seven collegiate coaches to win more than 700 games.

Jones is an active member of several organizations, including the National Association of Basketball Coaches and the Black Coaches Association.

Before entering the coaching profession, Jones served as an executive account manager at NCR Corporation in Albany, N.Y., where he managed a \$1.5 million sales territory.

James' younger brother Joe spent seven seasons the head coach at Ivy League rival Columbia and is currently the head coach at Boston University.
