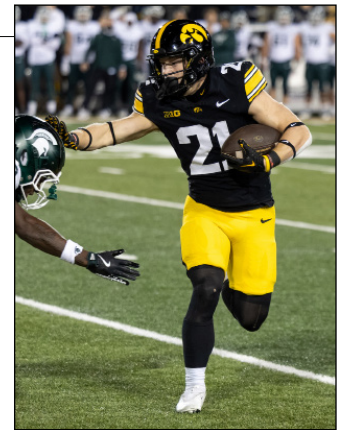

1ST & 10

- Iowa accepted an invitation to the 2025 ReliaQuest Bowl for the sixth time in program history and first since 2018.
- The Hawkeyes have qualified for a bowl game in 13 straight seasons.
- Iowa is currently one of four teams in FBS to have won at least eight games in each of the last 10 completed seasons (Alabama, Georgia, Ohio State). The Hawkeyes have won 9+ games 10 times under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa's four losses in 2025 have come by a combined 15 points (3, 5, 2, 5).
- The Hawkeyes had two players earn consensus All-America honors in center Logan Jones and return specialist Kaden Wetjen. It is the third straight year the program has had multiple consensus All-Americans.
- Jones was a unanimous consensus All-American and the program's second recipient of the Rimington Trophy. Iowa is the only school in the nation to have a unanimous consensus All-American every year since 2021.
- Iowa's offensive line won the Joe Moore Award for a second time in program history. The award honors the nation's top offensive line.
- Wetjen was named the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year for a second straight season. He is the first two-time recipient in conference history.
- Wetjen, a Jett Award finalist, is No. 1 in the nation in combined return yards (965). He is the only player in Big Ten history to have three punt return TDs and a kick return TD in the same season and the only player in the nation to have both a KR and PR touchdown in 2025.
- Iowa had 21 players earn All-Big Ten recognition, including four first-team All-Big Ten selections, and four different players garner All-America honors.
- QB Mark Gronowski holds Iowa's single season records for most rushing yards by a quarterback (491) and most rushing touchdowns (15). He has a record 57 career victories as a collegiate QB.
- Gronowski scored a touchdown in Iowa's first 10 games this season. The streak was the longest by a Big Ten quarterback all-time. His 15 total rushing TDs are tops in the Big Ten, seventh-most nationally and tied for the second-most among FBS quarterbacks. The 15 rushing TDs are a single season record by an Iowa quarterback and the second-most in Big Ten history.
- PK Drew Stevens has made 74 career field goals -- the most in program history. He is also second in school history in career scoring (342).



Graduate Kaden Wetjen is the first two-time recipient of the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year. He is also a Jett Award finalist.

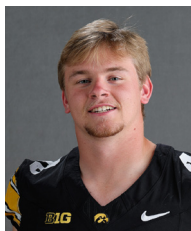

IOWA'S BOWL HISTORY

The Hawkeyes are making their 38th bowl game appearance and their seventh appearance in the ReliaQuest Bowl (formerly Outback). It is Iowa's first trip to Tampa since the 2018 season.

- The Hawkeyes last trip to the ReliaQuest Bowl resulted in a 27-22 victory over Mississippi State when WR Nick Easley had eight catches for 104 yards and two touchdowns en route to MVP honors.
- Iowa is 3-3 all-time in the ReliaQuest Bowl (W, 37-17 vs. Florida, 2004; L, 31-24 vs. Florida in 2006; W, 31-10 vs. South Carolina in 2009; L, 21-14 vs. LSU in 2014; L, 30-3 to Florida in 2017; W, 27-22 vs. Mississippi State in 2019).
- The Hawkeyes have won four of their last seven bowl games. Iowa is 18-18-1 all-time in bowl contests.

THE SERIES

- Iowa and Vanderbilt will meet for the first time in program history.
- The Hawkeyes are 14-20 all-time against current members of the Southeastern Conference, including 8-10 against SEC opponents in bowl games.

ALONE AT THE TOP

Kirk Ferentz is in his 27th season as Iowa's head football coach. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football and the all-time winningest coach in Big Ten Conference history. Ferentz won his 206th game as a member of the Big Ten on Sept. 13, 2025, against UMass, to pass Ohio State's Woody Hayes atop the prestigious list. He currently has 212 career victories.

- Ferentz has 134 Big Ten wins, which rank third all-time, trailing Hayes (153) and Michigan's Bo Schembechler (143).
- Ferentz won his 200th career game at Iowa State in 2023. He is the 27th coach at an FBS institution to reach the 200-career win milestone and the 99th coach across all divisions. Former Hawkeye head coach Hayden Fry finished his career with 236 victories.
- Ferentz has 10 career bowl game victories, which tie Joe Paterno for the most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference.

Special teams coordinator LeVar Woods will be coaching his final game with the Hawkeyes on Dec. 31 in the ReliaQuest Bowl. Woods, a former Hawkeye player and 18-year member of the Iowa coaching staff in different capacities, will join the Michigan State coaching staff as the assistant head coach/special teams coordinator under Pat Fitzgerald.

CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICANS

Graduate center Logan Jones earned unanimous consensus All-America honors, while graduate return specialist Kaden Wetjen was a consensus All-American. The duo became Iowa's 34th and 35th consensus All-Americans during the 2025 season.

- Jones was a unanimous consensus All-American, earning first-team honors by Walter Camp, AP, The Sporting News, FWAA and AFCA, while Wetjen was a first-team selection by Walter Camp, The Sporting News and FWAA, while being a second-team selection by the AFCA.
- Jones is the 17th unanimous consensus All-American in program history.
- Iowa is the only school in the nation to have a unanimous consensus All-American every year since 2021. The Hawkeyes have six unanimous All-Americans since 2021.
- Nineteen of Iowa's 35 consensus All-Americans have come during the Kirk Ferentz era.
- The Hawkeyes have had multiple consensus All-Americans eight times in program history, including each of the last three seasons (1981, 1984, 2002, 2003, 2017, 2023, 2024, 2025).

2025 IOWA FOOTBALL

- The Hawkeyes have had three Sporting News All-Americans in each of the past three seasons (2023, 2024, 2025).
- Iowa has had a FWA All-American (first or second team) in 13 straight seasons, dating back to 2013, the second-longest active streak in the country (Alabama, 17). During the streak, a Hawkeye earned first team honors 18 times and second team five times.
- Iowa has had multiple FWA All-Americans in each of the last seven seasons (2019-25).
- Over the last four seasons, Iowa has had 10 FWA All-Americans, second only to Ohio State (12).
- The Hawkeyes have had a special teams All-American five of the last seven seasons.
- Iowa led the nation with four Pro Football Focus All-Americans.

THE BEST LINE IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

Iowa's offensive line consisting of center Logan Jones, guards Beau Stephens and Kade Pieper and tackles Gennings Dunker and Trevor Lauck has been named the recipient of the Joe Moore Award, given to the nation's top offensive line.

- It is the second time Iowa has received the award (2016, 2025) and the Hawkeyes have been a semifinalist four times (2016, 2020, 2024, 2025).
- The Hawkeyes are one of three schools to earn the distinction more than once, joining Alabama and Michigan.
- Iowa's offensive line is one of eight schools nationally to start the same five players in every game this season. It is the first time the Hawkeyes have started the same five players on the O-line since 2013.
- The Hawkeye offensive line, which had all five players earn All-Big Ten honors and three earn All-America recognition, has given up 16 sacks in the team's 12 games.
- Iowa was the only school to have three offensive linemen earn AP All-Big Ten honors.
- Jones (50 starts), Dunker (37 starts) and Stephens (33 starts) have combined to start 120 games in their collegiate careers.
- Guard Beau Stephens led all Power Four guards with an 88.3 PFF grade and his 92.9 pass-blocking grade is the best among all guards in America. He did not allow a sack or hit allowed and had only three pressures surrendered all season.
- Guard Kade Pieper's 82.7 grade leads all FBS right guards. He was the only right guard in the nation with 80.0-plus grades as a run-and-pass-blocker and he didn't allow a sack on 293 pass-blocking snaps.
- The first, and only, accepted holding penalty against an Iowa offensive lineman this season occurred in Game 10 against USC (Gennings Dunker in the final drive of the first half).

THE TOP CENTER IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

Senior Logan Jones became the second Hawkeye all-time to win the Rimington Trophy, presented to the nation's top center.

- Jones, who has started all 12 games and 50 career contests, anchors Iowa's offensive line that is the Joe Moore Award winner as the nation's top unit. He has served as an Iowa captain each week this season, he is the top-rated center in the country by Pro Football Focus (by nearly two points) and he has not been flagged for an offensive holding penalty in 2025.
- Jones is the only center in America who has top-five marks as a pass blocker (second) and run blocker (third).
- He joins Tyler Linderbaum (2021) as Iowa's Rimington Trophy honorees. The Hawkeyes are one of four schools (Ohio State, Michigan, Alabama) to have multiple Rimington Trophy recipients.

LOJO: OUTLAND TROPHY FINALIST

Senior Logan Jones is one of three finalists for both the 2025 Outland Trophy, presented annually to the nation's best interior lineman on offense or defense.

- Jones was selected as the Outland Trophy National Player of the Week on Oct. 28 following the Hawkeyes' 41-3 victory over Minnesota.
- Iowa has had four past winners of the Outland Trophy: Brandon Scherff (2014), Robert Gallery (2003), Alex Karras (1957) and Calvin Jones (1955). Tyler Linderbaum (2021) and Daviyon Nixon (2020) were finalists, while Tristan Wirfs (2019) and Mike Devlin (1992) were semifinalists.

WEJTEN: JETT AWARD FINALIST

Senior Kaden Wetjen, the 2024 Jett Award recipient, is one of five finalists to repeat as the award winner in 2025. The Williamsburg, Iowa, native leads the country in combined return yards (by 231) for a second straight season. He has 894 combined return yards (356 kickoff, 538 punt) through 11 games. Wetjen is No. 1 in the NCAA in punt returns (28.3) and punt return TDs (3) and fourth in kickoff return touchdowns (1). The 28.3 punt return average is currently tops in Big Ten history and the three punt return TDs in 2025 are tied for the third-most in a single season in league history.

- Wetjen's 90.3 return grade leads all Power Four players and his 95.5 punt return grade is the highest every by a player in the PFF College era.
- Wetjen is joined as a finalist by Louisville's Caullin Lacy, Texas' Ryan Niblett, Notre Dame's Jadarian Price and South Carolina's Vicari Swain.

GRAVES: WILLIAM V. CAMPBELL TROPHY FINALIST

Senior Aaron Graves was a finalist for the 2025 William V. Campbell Trophy, the premier scholar-athlete award. He is one of 16 finalists for the award from a pool of 180 candidates nationwide. For being a finalist, Graves is a NFF National Scholar-Athlete and receives an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship.

- He is the eighth Hawkeye to be named an NFF National Scholar-Athlete.

GRAVES: POP WARNER AWARD FINALIST

Senior Aaron Graves was one of five finalists for the Pop Warner College Football Award. The honor established in 2010 and honors a player who has made a positive impact on the field, in the classroom, and in the community, and who serves as a role model to Pop Warner's young student-athletes.

WEJTEN REPEATS; BIG'S TOP RETURNER

Graduate Kaden Wetjen became the first player two-time recipient of the Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year since the award was introduced in 2015. The Williamsburg, Iowa, native leads the nation with 965 combined kick return yards (by 260 yards), while ranking first in punt return yards (28.3). Wetjen is the only Big Ten player to have three punt return and one kickoff return touchdown in the same season.

MORE NOTABLES

- Iowa had five former Hawkeyes -- Cooper DeJean, Jack Campbell, George Kittle, Tyler Linderbaum and Tristan Wirfs -- named to 2025 NFL Pro Bowl rosters. The five selections are tied for the second-most among collegiate schools behind only Georgia (6).
- The Hawkeyes have won 97 games since 2015. Only 10 teams nationally have more victories than Iowa since 2015 -- Alabama, Ohio State, Georgia, Clemson, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Michigan, Oregon, Penn State and LSU (by one).
- The Hawkeyes became bowl eligible in the Week 9 win over Minnesota. Iowa is eligible for the 13th consecutive season and for the 23rd time in the last 25 seasons.
- The Hawkeyes rallied from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to defeat Michigan State in Week 13 inside Kinnick Stadium. Iowa has two second-half comeback victories this season (Penn State).
- Senior Drew Stevens drilled a 44-yard field goal as time expired to give the Hawkeyes a Senior Day victory over Michigan State in Week 13. It was Stevens' fourth career game-winning field goal.
- Since 2015, Iowa has won nine games on a field goal in the final 30 seconds of the fourth quarter, three more than any other FBS team over that period.
- Iowa has sold out 28 consecutive games in Kinnick Stadium.
- The Hawkeyes have rushed for 200+ yards in five games this season and 12 times under OC Tim Lester.
- The Hawkeyes are 21st in the country in fewest turnovers lost (12).
- The Hawkeyes have outrushed their opponent in nine of the 12 games in 2025.
- Iowa's passing defense held back-to-back opponents (82 at Wisconsin; 93 vs. Penn State) under 100 yards passing for the first time since 2023 (Northwestern, Rutgers). The unit has held four teams under 100 yards and eight teams below 150 passing yards in 2025.
- The Hawkeye win over Penn State was the program's fourth all-time victory against a team that was ranked in the AP Preseason top two and first since 2017.

- Hidden yards... Iowa's punt return unit is tops in the nation, averaging 29.2 yards per game, while the kickoff return unit is 10th (25.55). Kaden Wetjen is No. 1 in the nation in combined kick return yards (965).
- In its three Big Ten rivalry trophy games, Iowa beat Wisconsin, Minnesota and Nebraska by a combined score of 118-19. The Hawkeyes forced three turnovers in back-to-back games in consecutive wins over the Badgers and Gophers.
- The Hawkeyes have won four consecutive games over Wisconsin for the first time since 2002-06. Iowa has held the Badgers to 10 points or less in four straight and in five of the last six meetings.
- Iowa continued its domination over Nebraska, winning for the third consecutive year and 10th time in the last 11 contests. The Hawkeyes have won seven straight games in Lincoln dating back to 2015, the second-longest streak by a Husker opponent all-time (Oklahoma, 8).
- Iowa's defense has held five opponents under 250 yards of total offense this season and has allowed seven points or less in four contests.
- Iowa has won the time of possession battle in nine of 12 regular season games. The only games where the opposition had a longer T.O.P. was Rutgers in Week 4, Penn State in Week 8 and Michigan State in Week 13.
- First-year Iowa starting QB Mark Gronowski won his 57th career game in the Week 14 victory at Nebraska, extending his NCAA record (all levels).
- Since returning from injury, sophomore RB Kamari Moulton has rushed for 783 yards on 153 carries with four touchdowns in nine games. He now leads the team with 783 rushing yards in 10 contests. Moulton went over 1,000 yards for his career in Week 9 vs. Minnesota.
- Iowa posted its first shutout of the season in a 37-0 road victory at Wisconsin in a battle for the Heartland Trophy in Week 7. The 37 points are the team's most ever scored in Madison.
- Iowa's offense finished with a season-high 422 yards of total offense and 47 points in Week 3 against UMass. It is the fourth time under OC Tim Lester that Iowa has gone over 400 yards and the 47 points were a high under the second-year OC.
- The Hawkeye rushing attack ranks 45th in the nation (fourth in the Big Ten), averaging 177.8 yards per game. The Hawkeyes have rushed for 200+ yards in five games in 2025 and 12 times during Lester's tenure.
- Iowa is 39-2 when scoring 21+ points since 2020. Since the start of the 2015 season, Iowa is 84-6 when leading by eight points at any point in a game.
- Iowa is 65-2 when leading by 14+ points since 2015. The two losses came against Michigan State (2020) and USC (2025).
- The Hawkeyes scored 20 points in the first quarter in Week 3 against UMass -- the most in an opening quarter since Oct. 16, 2016, at Purdue. Iowa scored 31 in the first half in Week 9 versus Minnesota -- the most in a half since 2021 at Maryland.
- Iowa is one of seven programs nationally to have posted 12 straight winning seasons (Alabama, Boise State, Clemson, Georgia, Iowa, Memphis, Ohio State).
- Since 2020, Iowa is 18-9 in road games and the Hawkeyes have posted a winning road record dating back to the start of the 2018 season (24-13 record).
- Iowa's defense has allowed fewer than 400 yards in 49 of the last 53 games and 15 or fewer points in 29 of their last 52 games. The Hawkeyes have held 13 teams without a touchdown since the start of the 2022 season.
- Iowa has played 16 games decided by a single possession since the start of the 2023 season. The Hawkeyes are 8-8 in such games.
- The Hawkeyes are 164-8-1 when allowing 10 points or less since 1970 and 397-59-19 when allowing 10 points or less all-time.

COMEBACK HAWKS

- Iowa has rallied from 10 points down in the second half to win games against Penn State and Michigan State this season.
- In Week 8 against the Nittany Lions, Iowa trailed, 21-10, in the third quarter before rallying for a 25-24 win. In Week 13 against the Spartans, the Hawkeyes trailed 17-7 in the fourth quarter before rallying for a 20-17 win.
 - It is the first time since the 2021 season that Iowa has rallied from 10-points down in the second half to win two games – trailed 20-10 in third quarter against Penn State; won 23-20; trailed 21-6 in third quarter at Nebraska; won 28-21.
 - The 2021 win over the Huskers is the last time Iowa trailed by double digits (12 points) in the fourth quarter before rallying for the victory.
 - It is the first time since 2009 that Iowa overcame two double-digit deficits at home to win football games. The Hawkeyes trailed UNI by 10 and Indiana by 21 points that year.

TIGHT GAMES

Iowa has played 139 games in the Ferentz era in games decided by one score or less. The Hawkeyes are 68-71 (.489) in such contests. Over the past two-plus years, Iowa has won eight of 16 games decided by eight points or fewer.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

A NEW QB1

South Dakota State transfer Mark Gronowski took over the reigns as Iowa's QB1 in 2025. The Naperville, Illinois, native came to Iowa City with an impressive collegiate resume.

- Compiled a 49-6 career record as a Jackrabbit with the 49 wins, tying the FCS record for most wins by a quarterback.
- 2023 Walter Camp Award recipient, which is the FCS Heisman... Walter Camp Award finalist in 2024.
- Led South Dakota State to two FCS National Championships in 2022 and 2023.
- Passed for 10,309 yards and 93 touchdowns and rushed for 1,767 yards and 37 touchdowns at South Dakota State.
- Gronowski is one of 16 quarterbacks nationally to start at least one game in three consecutive seasons.
- Graduated with both his bachelor and master's degrees in mechanical engineering from South Dakota State.

GRONOWSKI IN 2025

Graduate Mark Gronowski has completed 150-of-240 attempts for 1,529 yards and eight touchdowns in 12 games this season. The Illinois native also has 491 rushing yards (second-most on the team) and is leading the team with 16 touchdowns (15 rushing, 1 receiving).

- His 15 rushing touchdowns are No. 1 in the Big Ten and ninth nationally. They are tied for the third-most by a QB in the nation.
- In Week 3 against UMass, Gronowski completed 16-of-24 passes for a season-high 189 yards and two touchdowns. He completed a pass to 12 different receivers in the game.
- In his first career Big Ten game at Rutgers, Gronowski completed 12-of-18 attempts for 186 yards while rushing 13 times for 55 yards and scoring three touchdowns.
- In Week 8 against Penn State, Gronowski rushed for 130 yards on nine attempts -- the most ever by an Iowa quarterback -- and scored two touchdowns. He had a 67-yard run in the fourth quarter to set up the go-ahead touchdown.
- Gronowski had a 29-yard touchdown pass to Reece Vander Zee in Week 9 vs. Minnesota. It was the team's longest touchdown pass of the season to date.
- Gronowski had 117 of his 147 passing yards in the fourth quarter and finished with 57 rushing yards in Iowa's come-from-behind 20-17 win over Michigan State in Week 13. He completed his final four passing attempts for 67 yards, including a 13-yard game-tying touchdown.
- In the regular season finale at Nebraska, Gronowski completed 9-of-16 passes for 166 yards and a touchdown, while rushing 13 times for 64 yards and two touchdowns – his third multi rushing TD game this season.
- Gronowski has had both a passing and rushing touchdown six times this season -- Week 1 versus UAlbany, Week 3 versus UMass, Week 9 vs. Minnesota, Week 11 versus Oregon, Week 12 at USC and Week 14 at Nebraska. He has 32 such games in his collegiate career.
- Gronowski has led three fourth-quarter game-winning drives (at Rutgers, Penn State, Michigan State) – the most by a Hawkeye quarterback since Ricky Stanzi had four in 2009.
- He has 11,837 career passing yards, 2,258 career rushing yards, 101 career passing touchdowns and 52 career rushing touchdowns.

AIR, RUSH, CATCH

Graduate Mark Gronowski threw a 2-yard touchdown pass to Dayton Howard; he rushed for a 1-yard touchdown and caught a 5-yard touchdown pass from WR Reece Vander Zee in Week 12 at USC. He became the seventh Big Ten player (fifth Big Ten quarterback) to accomplish the feat this century and is believed to be the first Hawkeye to complete the trifecta in the same game.

- Gronowski's TD reception is the first by a Hawkeye QB since Matt Sherman caught a pass from Tim Dwight against Minnesota in 1994.
- The touchdown reception was the second of Gronowski's career.

MOST WINS AS A STARTING QB

Graduate Mark Gronowski has won 57 career games as a starting quarterback -- the most amongst signal callers all-time (all levels). He passed Boise State's Kellen Moore (50) for the most wins in FCS/FBS and Grand Valley State's Cullen Finnerty (51) for most victories at all levels.

ANOTHER DIMENSION

Graduate quarterback Mark Gronowski gives Iowa's offense another dimension with his legs. Through 12 games, the Illinois native is second on the team with 491 rushing yards on 120 attempts. He also has a team-best 15 rushing touchdowns, which are the most by an Iowa quarterback in a single season all-time and tied for the fifth-most in school history.

- Gronowski is No. 1 in the Big Ten and ninth nationally in rushing touchdowns (15) and fifth in total touchdowns (16) this season, while ranking 32nd in total points scored (96).
- In the regular season finale at Nebraska, Gronowski rushed for 64 yards and two touchdowns. His rushing total gave him 491 yards this season, breaking Iowa's single season quarterback rushing record that was set by Ken Ploen (487) in 1956.
- Gronowski finished with 130 rushing yards and two touchdowns in the Week 8 win over Penn State. The 130 rushing yards are the most ever in a game by an Iowa quarterback. His 67-yard rush in the fourth quarter set up Iowa's go-ahead touchdown and was the team's longest run of the season.
- He is the first Hawkeye QB to rush for 100+ yards since Butch Caldwell in 1972.
- Gronowski had 54 rushing yards (before sacks) on a career-high 16 rushing attempts in Week 2 at Iowa State and 55 rushing yards on 13 carries and scored three touchdowns in Week 4 at Rutgers. The three touchdowns are the most by an Iowa quarterback since Matt Rodgers had three against Cincinnati on Sept. 15, 1990. The last Iowa QB to even have two rushing touchdowns in a game were Brad Banks (2002) and C.J. Beathard (2015).
- Gronowski had a rushing touchdown in each of his first 10 games of the 2025 season and he has three multi-touchdown games this season. The 10 straight games with a rushing touchdown was a Big Ten single-season record.
- He was the first FBS quarterback with a rushing TD in each of his first 10 games since Houston's D'Eriq King in 2018 and the first Power Conference QB with a rushing TD in each of his first 10 games.
- His 15 rushing touchdowns are the second-most in Big Ten history by a quarterback in the last 30 years, trailing only Michigan's Denard Robinson (16).
- Gronowski has had both a passing and rushing touchdown six times this season and in 32 games in his collegiate career.

Iowa's offense finished with 435 yards of total offense in the Week 3 victory over UMass. The Hawkeyes had a balanced attack, finishing with 201 rushing and 234 passing yards, which led to 47 points – the most points under OC Tim Lester and the most by the Hawkeyes in Kinnick since 2020 versus Michigan State (49).

- Iowa has had 400+ yards of total offense four times under Lester (492 vs. Illinois State, 462 vs. Troy, 422 vs. Wisconsin, 435 vs. UMass). The Hawkeyes are 4-0 when going over 400 yards under Lester.
- The Hawkeyes put up 40 points three times during the 2025 season (47 vs. UMass, 41 vs. Minnesota, 40 at Nebraska). The unit has scored 40+ seven times during Lester's tenure.

GETTING POINTS

The Hawkeye offense has been efficient in the red zone, scoring points 93.5 percent of the time, which ranks second in the Big Ten and seventh nationally. Iowa has been in the red zone 46 times and has come away with points 43 times (33 touchdowns, 10 field goals).

BADGER BEATDOWN 2.0

Iowa finished with 37 points and 319 yards of total offense in a 37-0 road victory at Wisconsin in Week 7. The 37 points are Iowa's most points scored in Madison in program history.

- Iowa has scored 79 points in back-to-back wins in the series, the most in a two-game stretch all-time.
- The Hawkeyes' rushing attack churned out 210 yards, the most allowed by Wisconsin's defense in 2025. Iowa has rushed for 200+ yards in three consecutive meetings in the series.

IOWA IN OVERTIME

Iowa holds a 7-5 record in overtime games. Iowa won its first overtime contest, defeating Penn State 26-23 on Nov. 4, 2000, in State College, Pa. BALL CONTROL

Iowa's offense is averaging 31:20 in time of possession through the first 12 games of the 2025 season, which ranks 29th nationally. The unit is fueled by a rushing attack that averages 177.5 yards per game.

- Iowa has won the time of possession battle in nine of the team's 12 games.
- The Hawkeyes have three scoring drives that have surpassed eight minutes this season and three drives that have gone 16 plays.
- In Week 2 at Iowa State, the Hawkeyes had 16-play scoring drives on consecutive possessions in the second and third quarters. The 16-play, 85-yard touchdown drive in the second quarter was Iowa's longest scoring drive (by plays) since the 2021 season (20 plays, 95 yards vs. Kent State).
- The 16-play, 77-yard scoring drive in the third lasted 9:28. It is the longest scoring drive (by time) under Ferentz and Iowa's first 9+ minute scoring drive since Nov. 1, 2003, against Illinois (18 plays, 77 yards, 9:06).
- Iowa had a season-long 93-yard drive for a go-ahead fourth-quarter touchdown in Week 11 against Oregon. It was a 16-play drive that covered 6:45.

OFFENSIVE GROWTH

Iowa's offense averaged 15.4 points during the 2023 season and that mark went up to 27.7 points in 2024 under first-year offensive coordinator Tim Lester. The Hawkeyes went from 132nd in the nation in scoring offense to No. 72. The team is currently 59th in scoring offense (28.9) through 12 games in 2025.

KAMARI'S BACK

Iowa's season-opening starter – RB Kamari Moulton – has led the running backs in rushing in each of the last nine games after missing back-to-back contests because of injury. The Florida native is leading the team with 783 yards on 156 attempts – 5.0 yards per carry – with four touchdowns.

- Moulton had a season-high 99 yards in the Week 8 win over Penn State and 96 yards and one touchdown in the Week 7 road win at Wisconsin.
- He finished with 93 yards and a season-high two touchdowns in the road win at Nebraska, which included a season-long 34-yard run in the second quarter. The two touchdowns tied his career high.

GROUND & POUND

The Hawkeyes churned out 310 yards on 53 rushing attempts as a team in the season-opening victory over UAlbany. Along with Xavier Williams' 122 yards, sophomore Terrell Washington, Jr., had 69 yards on 15 attempts and junior Jaziun Patterson had 47 yards on seven carries.

- The 310 yards are eighth most in a game under head coach Kirk Ferentz. The 53 rushing attempts are tied for the 10th most.
- Iowa has rushed for 200+ yards five times this year and 12 times in OC Tim Lester's Hawkeye tenure.
- Iowa has depth in the running back room as five different players have rushed for 150 or more yards through 12 games – Kamari Moulton (783), Mark Gronowski (491), Jaziun Patterson (299), Xavier Williams (260) and Nathan McNeil (169).

WETJEN IS 1 OF 1

Graduate wide receiver Kaden Wetjen scored on a 20-yard rushing touchdown on an end around in Week 3 against UMass. The rushing touchdown put Wetjen in an exclusive company.

- The Williamsburg, Iowa, native became the first player in Iowa history to score a rushing, receiving, punt return and kickoff return touchdown. Both the rushing and receiving scores have occurred this season.
- He is also the only player in the nation to accomplish the feat in 2025 and the first in the NCAA since 2009.

DJ EMERGES

Redshirt freshman tight end DJ Vonnahme has emerged as Iowa's No. 1 tight end in 2025. The Breda, Iowa, native has had two or more receptions in six of the team's last seven games to close out the regular season. He has 19 catches for 253 yards and two touchdowns during the stretch.

- Vonnahme had a 3-yard touchdown reception in Week 11 versus Oregon. It was the first touchdown by a Hawkeye tight end this season. He had a career-high 59 receiving yards at USC and had another career day at Nebraska, finishing with three receptions for 91 yards, which included a career-long 35-yard touchdown and a career-long 43-yard reception.
- Vonnahme is tied for the team lead with 22 receptions and has a team-best 288 receiving yards this season.

RVZ RETURNS

After missing the first five games with a foot injury, sophomore WR Reece Vander Zee made his season debut in Week 7 at Wisconsin. In seven games, the Rock Rapids, Iowa, native has 11 catches for 186 yards and one score.

- He had a 29-yard touchdown in Week 9 against Minnesota for his fourth career TD. At the time, it was Iowa's longest touchdown reception of the season. In Week 12 at USC, Vander Zee had a 5-yard touchdown pass to Mark Gronowski and in Week 13, he caught two passes for 46 yards, including a clutch 29-yarder along the sideline to set up Iowa's game-winning field goal.

SPREADING THE WEALTH

Iowa's top receiver has 22 receptions this season, but the unit is spreading the wealth. The Hawkeyes have 12 different players with five or more receptions and 18 different players with at least one catch.

HAWKEYES IN THE NFL

Iowa football players have a long tradition of being well prepared for professional football following their college playing careers. Today, 39 Hawkeyes are on NFL rosters.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

CONSISTENT D

- Iowa's defense ranks seventh in the nation in passing defense (158.2), eighth in total defense (270.6) and scoring defense (14.7), ninth in first down defense (183) and 24th in rushing defense (112.4) through 12 games in 2025.
- The defensive unit has limited big plays, yielding just seven runs of 20+ yards and eight pass plays of 30+ yards.
- Iowa's defense has surrendered just four scoring drives of 80 yards or more through 12 games.
- The Hawkeyes allowed just one touchdown over the first three games against UAlbany, Iowa State and UMass. Iowa held two of its first three opponents under 200 yards.
- Iowa limited UAlbany to 177 yards in the season opener, including just 33 yards in the second half. The Great Danes had 43 rushing yards and nine overall first downs.
- In Week 2, the Hawkeyes limited Iowa State to 238 yards and 16 points. The Cyclones entered the game averaging 39.5 points and 421 yards of total offense.
- In Week 3, Iowa held UMass to 34 yards in the first half, 119 yards in the game and eight first downs. It was the fewest yards allowed in a game since 2018 against Maryland (115) and the fifth fewest allowed in a game under Ferentz. The eight first downs are tied for the ninth fewest allowed in a game under Ferentz.
- The Hawkeye defense limited No. 11 Indiana to a season-low 20 points and 337 total yards. The Hoosiers entered the game averaging 54.8 points and 588.5 yards.
- Iowa's defense limited Oregon to 18 points – 23.3 points below its season average – and 373 total yards – 110 yards below its average. The Hawkeyes also kept USC (360) to 147 total yards below its season average (503).
- Iowa's defense has allowed just 69 points in the second half this season and six touchdowns. The unit didn't allow a third-quarter touchdown until Week 8 and has allowed just 36 points in the third quarter.

STIFF RUN D

The Hawkeyes' rushing defense has held three opponents under 50 yards and five opponents under 100 yards. Iowa is seventh in the Big Ten and 24th nationally in rushing defense, allowing 112.4 rush yards per game.

X: DPOW

Senior Xavier Nwankpa was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week on Oct. 20 following the Hawkeyes' come-from-behind win over Penn State. The Pleasant Hill, Iowa, native tied a career high with 10 tackles, had an interception and return to the 1 and forced a fumble. It was Nwankpa's first career honor.

- X is tied for second on the team with 69 tackles to go along with one interception and two forced fumbles. He has 42 tackles over his last six games.

GOOSE EGG

The Hawkeyes notched their first shutout of the season, blanking Wisconsin, 37-0, in Week 7. It was Iowa's first shutout against the Badgers since 1996, the first in Madison since 1929 (and third all-time) and sixth overall in the all-time series.

- It was also the first time Wisconsin has been shutout at home since 1980 against Michigan.
- The shutout was the 18th all-time under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- The Hawkeyes limited Wisconsin to 209 yards of total offense in the game, the fewest for the Badgers in the series since 1996 (128 yards) and forced a season-high three turnovers.

MINNESOTA MAULING

Iowa's defense stifled Minnesota in the Week 9 victory, intercepting three passes and allowing just 133 yards of total offense. The 133 yards are the fewest allowed the Gophers since 2008 and are the ninth fewest in a game under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

- Iowa didn't allow a first down until the second quarter in the game.
- The rush defense surrendered just 24 yards on 25 attempts, as Minnesota had negative rushing yards until late in the fourth quarter.
- Iowa surrendered only a third-quarter field goal en route to the 38-point win – the largest in the series since 2008.
- The Hawkeyes have held the Gophers to 14 points or less in four straight meetings and in five out of the last six contests.

NEW LBs STEPPING UP

Graduate linebacker Karson Sharar is leading the team 78 tackles, including a team-high 10 tackles for loss, through the first 12 games of the 2025 season. The Iowa Falls, Iowa, native has three double-digit tackle games – a career-high 10 tackles in Week 4 at Rutgers, Week 11 versus Oregon and Week 13 against Michigan State. He also had three TFL, one sack and two hurries against the Spartans. Sharar finished with nine tackles and a team-best 2.5 TFL in the Week 8 win over Penn State.

- Junior Jayden Montgomery has started Iowa's last six of the last seven games against Wisconsin, Penn State, Wisconsin, Oregon, USC and Nebraska. He had a career-high eight tackles in Week 11 versus Oregon and seven stops at Nebraska.

THE D

Iowa's defense has ranked in the top 20 nationally in scoring defense in each of the last 10 seasons.

- The Hawkeyes have allowed fewer than 20 points per game in nine consecutive seasons.
- Iowa has ranked in the top 20 in scoring defense in six consecutive seasons.

HONORARY DOUGHBOYZ

Graduate LB Jaxon Rexroth recorded Iowa's first interception of the season and the first interception of his career in Week 4 at Rutgers. The Cedar Rapids, Iowa, native came down with a deflection off the hand of DE Max Llewellyn to set up the team's game-clinching touchdown.

- Two defensive linemen – Bryce Hawthorne and Aaron Graves – recorded the first picks of their careers in Week 7 at Wisconsin. Hawthorne made a diving interception off a Brian Allen deflection and Graves picked off a pass in the flat and returned it 35 yards, narrowly missing a "big man TD" as he was tackled at the 1-yard line.
- LB Cam Buffington notched his first career interception in Week 9 against Wisconsin.

DA DOUGHBOYZ ARE BACK

Iowa's defense got two interceptions from its defensive backfield in the Week 8 win over Penn State and three more (two by DBs) in Week 9 against Minnesota.

- Senior Deshaun Lee had a diving pick (the second of his career) in the second quarter and he had a pass breakup on the Nittany Lions' final offensive play to clinch the Hawkeye victory. Senior Xavier Nwankpa recorded his first interception since 2023 (third of his career) in the second quarter and returned it 28 yards to the 1 to set up an Iowa touchdown. Nwankpa also had a forced fumble and tied a career high with 10 tackles in the victory.
- Sophomore Zach Lutmer and senior TJ Hall both recorded picks against the Gophers. Lutmer snatched his interception and returned it 34 yards for his first career collegiate touchdown.
- Lee recorded his second INT of the season in Week 11 against Oregon and Lutmer snatched his team-leading third pick Week 13 versus Michigan State.

NEXT MAN IN

With senior DB TJ Hall sidelined with an injury, redshirt freshman Rashad Godfrey, Jr., stepped up for the Hawkeyes in the secondary in Week 14 at Nebraska. After playing a total of 44 snaps in Iowa's first 11 games, the Florida native was in on 45 snaps against the Huskers and he produced.

- Godfrey paced the team with a career-high nine tackles in the 40-16 Hawkeye win and he had a forced fumble in the fourth quarter at the 1-yard line. Iowa's secondary held the Huskers to 69 passing yards in the game.

CLUTCH KOEN

DB Koen Entringer has two double-digit tackle games this season. He had a career-high 11 stops in the Week 8 win over Penn State and 10 tackles (seven solo), including a career-best two TFL, in Week 5 against Indiana. The Michigan native made a pair of key fourth-down stops in the second and fourth quarters for an Indiana turnover on downs.

- Entringer is tied for second on the team with 69 tackles and 3.5 TFL. He also has four pass breakups, one hurry and a fumble recovery in Week 2 at Iowa State.

HALL: CB1

Senior T.J. Hall has established himself as Iowa's top defensive back in 2025. The California native has a team-high eight pass breakups to go along with 39 tackles and one pick. He posted a career-high three pass breakups in Week 2 versus Iowa State and Week 4 at Rutgers and notched his first interception of the season in Week 9 versus Minnesota.

- Hall missed Iowa's Week 13 and Week 14 games against Michigan State and Nebraska because of injury.

LUTMER IS EVERYWHERE

Sophomore Zach Lutmer is leading the team lead with three interceptions in 2025. His three picks rank 10th in the Big Ten (60th nationally). He tallied his first interception in Week 5 against Indiana and returned it 38 yards into Hoosier territory. His second pick came in Week 9 against Minnesota and he returned it 34 yards for his first collegiate touchdown and his third INT came in Week 13 against Michigan State.

- The Rock Rapids, Iowa, native is fourth on the team with 68 tackles to go along with 5.5 TFL, one sack, one fumble recovery and six pass breakups, including a career-high three at Rutgers.

BALL HAWKS

- Iowa has had at least one interception return for a touchdown in each of the last 18 seasons and 23 of the last 24. It is the second longest active streak in the nation.
- The program's current streak began with an Amari Spivey pick 6 in 2008.
- There have been 56 pick 6s in program history with 42 coming under Kirk Ferentz and only three came prior to Hayden Fry. Thirty-nine have come inside Kinnick Stadium and four in bowl games.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

THE WIZARD FROM WILLIAMSBURG

Longtime columnist Mike Hlas deemed Iowa's Kaden Wetjen "The Wizard from Williamsburg". Wetjen is most certainly going down as a historic Hawkeye. The Williamsburg, Iowa, native is unquestionably the top returner in Iowa football history and is one of the most electrifying players in college football.

- Punt return average of 28.3 yards in 2025 is No. 1 nationally and currently No. 1 in Big Ten history
- Three punt return touchdowns in 2025 are tied for the third-most in a single season in Big Ten history, which includes a 95-yarder vs. UMass that tied a Big Ten record
- Four career punt return touchdowns – tied for third-most in Big Ten history (No. 2 in Iowa history behind Tim Dwight's five)
- 182 punt return yards vs. UMass – fourth-most in Big Ten history
- Currently has a 17.9 career punt return average (52 returns, 929 yards) – ranks No. 1 in Big Ten history. His 929 career yards are 10th-most in Big Ten history.
- His 538 punt return yards in 2025 are an Iowa record and the seventh-most in Big Ten history
- 100-yard kickoff return touchdown vs. Rutgers – tied a Big Ten record
- 27.6 career kickoff return average – Currently ranks No. 3 in Big Ten history
- First player with three punt return touchdowns and a kickoff return touchdown in a single season in Big Ten history
- Six career combined kickoff/punt return touchdowns – Iowa record, passing Hawkeye great Tim Dwight (5)
- Six career 100+ yard combined return games
- 2024 recipient of the Jet Award. . . Iowa's first honoree. . . no player has ever won the award twice
- First two-time recipient of the Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year, given to the top return specialist in the Big Ten Conference
- Only player in the nation with a punt and kickoff return for a touchdown in both 2024 and 2025. . . also has a receiving and rushing touchdown in 2025

WEJ MAKES HISTORY; NAMED B1G SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Graduate Kaden Wetjen made history in Week 3 when he returned a punt 95 yards for a score in the third quarter of the Hawkeyes' 47-7 victory over UMass. The return tied a Big Ten and Iowa record (Michigan State's Al Brenner at Illinois, 1966 and Iowa's Bill Happel vs. Minnesota, 1984) and was the longest punt return in Kinnick Stadium history, besting Bob Longley (94 vs. Oregon in 1949).

- Wetjen finished with a career-high 216 return yards (182 punt and 34 kickoff) and a career-high 236 all-purpose yards. The 182 punt return yards are the fourth-most in a single game in Big Ten history, trailing Maryland's William Likely (233 in 2015), Iowa's Nile Kinnick (201 in 1939) and Iowa's Keonte Martin-Manley (184 in 2013).
- His 45.5 return average (minimum three punts) against UMass is the third highest average in Big Ten history, trailing Wisconsin's Earl Girard (52.7 vs. Iowa, 1947) and Martin-Manley (44.7 vs. Western Michigan, 2013).
- He was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week on Sept. 15.

WEJ AT IT AGAIN

Graduate Kaden Wetjen was at it again in Week 4 at Rutgers when he returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown to tie an Iowa and Big Ten record.

- It was the sixth 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in school history and the second of Wetjen's career (vs. Missouri, 2024 Music City Bowl). He is the second Hawkeye to return an opening kickoff for a touchdown (C.J. Jones vs. USC in the 2003 Orange Bowl).
- It was the 45th 100-yard kickoff return in Big Ten history and the 25th in a league game (first since 2023).
- He is now tied for the most kickoff return touchdowns in school history with two, joining Derrell Johnson-Koulianos, Ihmir Smith-Marsette and Kahlil Hill.
- Wetjen was named the Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week on Sept. 22 – his second straight and third career honor.

ANOTHER WETJEN MASTERPIECE

Graduate Kaden Wetjen had a 62-yard punt return for a touchdown in Iowa's Week 13 win over Michigan State en route to being named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week for a third time this season (fourth time in his career). It was his third punt return touchdown this season and the sixth combined return touchdown in his career – the most in Iowa history.

- Wetjen finished with 166 combined return yards in the game with his 40-yard return in the fourth quarter setting up Iowa's game-tying touchdown.
- It was the third straight home game against Michigan State that Iowa has had a punt return touchdown – Charlie Jones in 2020, Cooper DeJean in 2023 and Wetjen in 2025.

ALL-TIME PUNT RETURN TDS

Graduate Kaden Wetjen recorded his third punt return touchdown of the 2025 season when he took a 64-yarder to the house in Week 13 against Michigan State. His second punt return score came in Week 9 against Minnesota – from 50 yards out.

- Wetjen has three punt return touchdowns in 2025, which are tied Iowa's single season school record (with Tim Dwight, 1997). The total is tied for second in Big Ten history with Michigan's Gene Derricotte (1947), Dwight and Nebraska's De'Mornay Pierson-El (2014). Ohio State's Ted Ginn, Jr., holds the record with four punt return touchdowns in 2004.
- Wetjen has four punt return touchdowns during his Hawkeye career, which are the second-most in school history. He is tied for third in Big Ten history with four punt return scores, trailing Dwight (5) and Ginn, Jr. (6).

COMBINED RETURN TOUCHDOWNS

Graduate Kaden Wetjen has six returns for touchdowns – four punt, two kickoff – in his career. The total is the most by a Hawkeye returner in program history, passing Tim Dwight (5).

KADEN "THE JET" WETJEN

Graduate Kaden Wetjen was named the recipient of The 2024 Jet Award, which honors the most outstanding return specialist in college football. He was the first Hawkeye to receive the distinction.

- Wetjen was named the Rodgers-Dwight Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year in 2025, becoming the first two-time recipient in the award's history.
- The Williamsburg, Iowa, native is leading the nation in combined return yards (by 260 yards) for a second straight season. He has 965 combined return yards (427 kickoff, 538 punt) through 12 games. Wetjen is No. 1 in the NCAA in punt returns (28.3) and punt return TDs (3) and fifth in kickoff return touchdowns (1).

- His 538 punt return yards are an Iowa record, passing Ramon Ochoa's 495 in 2003. His total is seventh-most in Big Ten history behind Neal Colzie, 679 (Ohio State, 1973), Bob Hoernschemeyer, 635 (Indiana, 1943), Steve Breaston, 619 (Michigan, 2003), De'Mornay Pierson-El, 596 (Nebraska, 2014), Bill Hillenbrand, 561 (Indiana, 1941) and Pug Rentner, 547 (Northwestern, 1931).
- He is the only player in the nation to have both a kickoff and punt return for a touch-down this season and he was the only player to accomplish the same feat in 2024.
- Wetjen led the country by a wide margin in 2024, finishing with 1,055 combined kick return yards. He ranked first in the FBS in kickoff return yards (727) and second in punt return yards (328). Wetjen had two returns for scores in 2024 -- a 100-yard kickoff return against No. 19 Missouri in the Music City Bowl and an 85-yard punt return in the win over Northwestern.

- Wetjen and Tim Dwight are the only players in school history with multiple 80+ yard return touchdowns (Dwight 3, Wetjen 3).
- Wetjen has six career games with 100+ return yards as a Hawkeye. He had 100+ yards in three straight games (Washington, Michigan State, Northwestern) in 2024 -- a first by a Hawkeye since at least 1978.

STEVENS IS NO. 1

- Senior Drew Stevens made two field goals in Week 8 against Penn State to pass Nate Kaeding for the most career field goals made in program history. He has currently made 74 career field goals during his four-year Hawkeye career.
- The South Carolina native is 20-for-26 in field goal attempts this season. His 20 makes are tied for a career-high and for the sixth-most in a single season in program history. He is 17th in the NCAA (third in the Big Ten) in field goals per game (1.67).
 - Stevens made a career-long 58-yard field goal in Week 11 against Oregon to tie an Iowa and Kinnick Stadium record. The 58-yarder is tied for the third-longest field goal in the nation this season.
 - Stevens made a game-winning 44-yard field goal as time expired to give the Hawkeyes a 20-17 Senior Day victory over Michigan State in Week 13. It was Stevens' fourth career game-winning field goal (21-yarder with 28 seconds left in road win at Minnesota in 2022, a 53-yarder in road win over Northwestern at Wrigley Field in 2023 and a 53-yarder as time expired in a win over Nebraska in 2024).
 - Stevens has 12 career makes from 50+ yards – an Iowa school record.
 - He made 15 consecutive field goals from Week 10 of the 2024 season to Week 3 of the 2025 season.
 - Stevens is currently sixth in Big Ten history with his 74 career field goals.

- Stevens connected from 28 and 55 yards in the victory over the Great Danes. The 55-yarder is tied for the fifth longest kick in school history. He also made a 54-yarder against UMass and Indiana.
- Stevens enjoyed a breakout 2024 season, making 20-of-23 field goals, which were a career high and the sixth-most in program history. He was 5-for-5 from 40-49 yards and had four makes from 50+.
- He tied Kyle Schlicher's program record that was set in 2004, making five field goals in the road win at Maryland on Nov. 23. The five makes also tied the SECU Stadium, which led to him being named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week.

- Two of Stevens' makes came from 54 and 50 yards, making him the first Hawkeye since Tim Douglas (at Illinois, 1998) to make multiple 50+ yard field goals in the same game.
- Stevens has four career games where he has made at least four field goals.
- For his career, Stevens has made 73-of-92 field goal attempts (79.3 percent) and is 116-of-118 on PATs. He is 12-of-17 from 50-59 yards in his Hawkeye career.
- Stevens' brother, Jack, is a kicker at Washington State. He spent his freshman season at South Dakota State.

STEVENS ASCENDS IN CAREER SCORING

Senior Drew Stevens has scored a team-best 97 points in the first 12 games of the 2025 season, which are the 11th-most in a single-season in program history.

- He now has 342 career points, which are second-most all-time in program history.

DAKIN SOLID IN YEAR 2

- Sophomore Rhys Dakin is averaging 43.2 yards on 39 punts in 2025 with nine 50+ yarders, 16 punts inside the 20 and 18 punts being fair caught. In Week 2, Dakin had a career-long 65-yard punt at Iowa State.
- For his career, 25 of Dakin's punts have traveled 50+ yards.
 - Dakin averaged 44.1 yards on 64 punts in 2024, which ranked fourth in the Big Ten and 24th nationally. The Australian, who hails from the same hometown of Melbourne as former Hawkeye Tory Taylor, earned FWAA Freshman All-America honors for his efforts.
 - Thirty-three of Dakin's punts in 2024 were fair caught, 29 were downed inside the 20 and 16 traveled 50+ yards. Only five of his punts were touchbacks.

BLOCK-A-PA-LOOZA

- Iowa has blocked a pair of kicks this season, which are 17th-most in the NCAA this season.
- Redshirt freshman Preston Ries got his hand on a punt in the fourth quarter of Iowa's season-opening win over UAlbany. The Monticello, Iowa, native is the first Hawkeye since Yahya Black in 2023 to block a punt.
 - Graduate Ethan Hurkett blocked a field goal in Week 4 at Rutgers, giving the Hawkeyes a blocked field goal for a third straight season. It was Hurkett's first career block.

SPECIAL TEAMS SAFETY

- Iowa's special teams unit recorded the team's second safety of the season in Week 14 at Nebraska. (The first was an Indiana safety when it ran out of the end zone on the game's final play.)
- Following a Rhys Dakin punt that was muffed inside the 10 by Nebraska's Jacory Barney, Jr., senior linebacker Karson Sharar laid the wood Barney, Jr., jarring the ball loose. The Huskers then recovered in the end zone.
 - Iowa has had a safety in five straight seasons, dating back to the 2021 season.

TEAM NOTES

IOWA FOLLOWS THE RULES

The Hawkeyes are a tough, disciplined team under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa are second in the nation in fewest penalties (34) and fewest penalties per game (2.83) and third in fewest penalty yards (338) and fewest penalties per game (28.17).

FRESHMEN TRACKER

Iowa has played 24 redshirt or true freshman this season. The six true freshmen to see the field include: Nathan McNeil (8), Iose Epenesa (3), Lucas Allgeyer (2), Thomas Meyer (2), Jacob Wallace (2), Apollo Payne (1) and Caden Buhr (1).

HERE COMES THE BRIDE

- Three Hawkeyes -- Aaron Graves (Aubrey Hahn), Logan Jones (Amber Aesoph) and Ethan Hurkett (Megan Callahan) -- were married on three consecutive weekends in late June and early July this summer.
- Graves and Hahn welcomed their son, Grayson, to the world on Nov. 27 -- the day before Iowa faced Nebraska in Lincoln.

HAWKEYE FREAKS

Three Hawkeyes -- offensive linemen Logan Jones and Kade Pieper and linebacker Preston Ries -- are ranked in Bruce Feldman's Freaks List for the 2025 season. Jones comes in at No. 7 after holding position records with a 36.6-inch vertical, 1.53 10-yard split and 4.09 shuttle. He also has a 470-pound hang clean. Pieper is 22nd as he boasts the program's fastest short shuttle for guards at 4.13 seconds, while also having a 37.4 vertical jump and a 1.52 10-yard dash -- both records. Ries is No. 50 after recording the program linebacker record with a 630-pound squat and 41.4 vertical jump and 1.45 second 10-yard split.

HAY BALE CHAMP X 2

Sophomore Kade Pieper defended his title as the Solon Beef Days Hay Bale Toss champion on July 18. He won his first crown, clearing 12 feet in 2024 and improved on his mark with a toss of 13 feet in 2025. Pieper joins fellow offensive lineman Gennings Dunker as a back-to-back champion. He won the event in 2022 and 2023.

2025 IOWA FOOTBALL PLAYER COUNCIL

The 2025 Player Council includes graduates Jacob Gill, Aaron Graves, Mark Gronowski, Jaden Harrell, Ethan Hurkett, Logan Jones, Hayden Large, Jeremiah Pittman and Jaxon Rexroth, senior Gennings Dunker and Addison Ostrenga, juniors Koen Entringer and Jayden Montgomery and sophomores Zach Lutmer and Kamari Moulton.

- The purpose of the group is to assist in formulating policies and being involved in team decision-making throughout the year. Players were selected following coaching staff and player input.

- Epenesa's brothers, A.J. and Eric, played at Iowa from 2017-19 and 2021-24, respectively. DE Drew Campbell is the younger brother of Hawkeye All-American LB Jack Campbell.
- WR Alex Eichmann's grandfather, Richard "Dick" Gibbs, played at Iowa from 1965-66.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,332 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 709-585-39 (.547). That includes a 441-231-16 (.652) record in home games, a 269-353-23 (.434) record in games away from Iowa City, a 372-397-25 (.482) mark in Big Ten games and a 325-196-15 (.619) record in Kinnick Stadium.

- Iowa is 3-1 in trophy games during the 2025 season, falling 16-13 to No. 16 Iowa State in the Iowa Corn Cy-Hawk Series, winning 37-0 at Wisconsin in a battle for the Heartland Trophy, dominating Minnesota, 41-3, to retain the Floyd of Rosedale and blasting Nebraska, 40-16, to win for the third straight year (and seventh straight time in Lincoln).
- Iowa is 36-15 in its last 51 trophy games (includes bowl games and conference championships). The Hawkeyes are 32-11 in their last 43 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin).

BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001

- The Hawkeyes are bowl eligible for the 23rd time in the last 25 seasons. Iowa accepted an invitation to the 2020 Music City Bowl, but the game was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz won the 10th bowl game of his career in the Hawkeyes' 21-0 win over Kentucky in the 2022 TransPerfect Music City Bowl, tying Joe Paterno (10) for most bowl wins as a member of the Big Ten Conference. Ferentz has a 10-10 bowl record.
- Eighteen coaches have won 10 or more bowl games in their career. Among active coaches, only Dabo Swinney (12) and Kyle Whittingham (11) have more bowl wins than Ferentz.
- Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (16), Wisconsin (12), USC (12), Oregon (11), Penn State (11) and Minnesota (11) have more bowl wins (including FBS Playoffs, BCS championship game and CFP), than Iowa. Iowa is 18-18-1 all-time in bowl games. The following are the records for Big Ten teams in bowl games since 2001:

BIG TEN PERFECTION

- University of Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz has twice navigated the Big Ten regular season schedule with an undefeated record. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2002 and shared the Big Ten championship with Ohio State. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2015, winning the Big Ten West Division title.
- Since 1954, when the conference schedule expanded to seven games, only seven Big Ten coaches, including Ferentz, have multiple undefeated Big Ten seasons. They include: Duffy Daugherty (Michigan State; 1965, 1966), Ferentz (Iowa; 2002, 2015), Jim Harbaugh (Michigan; 2022, 2023), Woody Hayes (Ohio State; 1954, 1957, 1968, 1970, 1975); Urban Meyer (Ohio State; 2012, 2013); Bo Schembechler (Michigan; 1971, 1980, 1989); Jim Tressel (Ohio State; 2002, 2006).

IOWA WAVE REMAINS NO. 1

For a second straight year, the "Iowa Wave" is USA Today's Readers' Choice Award Best College Sports Tradition. Surpassing some of the greatest traditions in college sports, 70,000+ Hawkeye and football fans alike turn their attention from the field to the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital overlooking Kinnick Stadium. At the end of the first quarter, fans wave to pediatric patients and their families watching the game, creating a moment of connection and hope.

HEAD COACH KIRK FERENTZ



Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his 27th season as Moon Family Head Football Coach at Iowa. He is the dean of NCAA Division I football coaches and is the winningest coach in Big Ten Conference history. His contract runs through the 2029 season.

- Named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015). Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year awards.
- Guided Iowa to Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, and Big Ten West Division titles in 2015, 2021 and 2023.
- Named Woody Hayes, Eddie Robinson, and Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year in 2015
- Was a finalist for the Maxwell Football Club, Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award.

- Ferentz became the all-time wins leader in Big Ten Conference history, passing Ohio State's Woody Hayes, on Sept. 13, 2025, in a win over UMass. He has 134 Big Ten wins, which are the third-most all-time, trailing only Hayes (153) and Bo Schembechler (143).
- Named the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Iowa made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, and one CFP Bowl (2016).
- Iowa has played in 12 January bowl games with five January bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl, 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl).
- Fourteen different players have won 16 national awards during Ferentz's tenure.
- Iowa has posted an 203-105 (.666) overall mark and a 131-77 (.630) Big Ten record since 2001. Ferentz has placed in the top half of the conference 19 times, including Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, a second-place finish in 2009, and West Division titles in 2015, 2021 and 2023.
- At Iowa, Ferentz holds an overall record of 212-128 (.623) and a 134-91 (.596) mark in Big Ten games. He is Iowa's all-time winningest football coach with 212 wins. In 27+ seasons as a college head coach, he holds a career mark of 224-149 (.601), giving him the most wins among active head coaches.
- The only Division I head coach to coach three sons at the same college. Brian was a Hawkeye letterman from 2003-05, James was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line before graduating in May, 2013 and Steve was a senior offensive lineman in 2016.
- James Ferentz, retired following an eight-year NFL career in 2024. He is currently an assistant offensive line coach for the New York Giants. Steve Ferentz is in his third season on the coaching staff at the University of South Dakota (outside linebackers coach), while Brian Ferentz is in his first season as the tight ends coach at Fresno State.

PHIL PARKER'S IOWA DEFENSE

• Phil Parker was named the recipient of the Frank Broyles Award and the AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year in 2023. He was also named PFF's top defensive coordinator in college football in April, 2023.

• Since Parker took over as Iowa's defensive coordinator, Iowa is second in the Big Ten and fourth nationally in points (18.74), first in the Big Ten and fourth nationally in total offense (318.99), first in the Big Ten and second nationally in yards per play (4.76) and the unit leads the nation in interceptions (205) and is fifth in interceptions returned for touchdowns (29).

• Iowa's defense allowed 400 yards or less in 49 of the last 53 games.

• The Hawkeyes led the nation in fewest yards per play allowed on defense in consecutive seasons -- 3.99 in 2022 and 4.08 in 2023.

• Iowa's defense has allowed fewer than 20 points per game in nine consecutive seasons -- the longest active streak in the nation. The next closest streak is three by Alabama, Michigan, Oregon and Penn State.

• Iowa is 18-4 under Parker all-time when returning an interception for a touchdown.

• The Hawkeyes have top-six scoring defenses nationally in four of the past six years. The scoring defense has ranked in the top 20 in the nation in each of the last 10 years.

• Iowa's 3.986 yards per play during the 2022 season were the lowest by any team at the FBS level since Florida State's 3.853 in 2012.

• Iowa's 270.8 yards per game surrendered in 2022 was the fewest by an Iowa defense since 1981.

• Iowa has 255 interceptions since the start of the 2009 season -- third-most nationally in that span. The "BallHawks" had a school record 25 interceptions in 2021.

• A principle of Parker's defense is to limit explosive plays, forcing the offense to sustain a drive. Iowa surrendered just 15 explosive plays out of 883 defensive snaps over 13 games during the 2022 season.

• Iowa has had six players win the Big Ten Tatum-Woodson Defensive Back of the Year since 2012: Micah Hyde, 2012; Desmond King, 2015; Josh Jackson, 2017; Amani Hooker, 2018; Riley Moss, 2021, Cooper DeJean, 2023).

IOWA PROGRAM NOTES

- The Hawkeyes have earned bowl eligibility in 23 of the last 25 seasons. Iowa is 10-10 in bowl games since 2001. Only Ohio State (14) and Wisconsin (12) have more bowl wins among Big Ten teams since 2001. The Hawkeyes are 18-18-1 in 37 bowl games. Iowa has won five January bowl games under Ferentz.
- Iowa is the only school to have two head football coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current coach Kirk Ferentz (212-128) replaced Fry and is in his 27th season. Ferentz also served as Iowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.
- Iowa won the Big Ten West Division title in 2021 and 2023 to earn a spot in the Big Ten Championship Game. The Hawkeyes played in the Big Ten title game for the first time in program history on Dec. 5, 2015. Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009. Iowa (8-0, 2002; 8-0, 2015) is one of three Big Ten teams to post a perfect mark in conference play since 1998 (BCS era), joining Michigan State (1) and Ohio State (5).
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls five times since 2002, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004. The Hawkeyes finished 2015 ranked ninth in the AP Poll and 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In the Big Ten, only Ohio State has more top 10 finishes since 2002.
- Since 1936 when the first AP Poll was released, Iowa has appeared in the poll 356 times, the fifth highest total in the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Wisconsin, and MSU). Iowa has been the top-ranked team in the country 11 times.
- Iowa set a school record with 12 wins in 2015. The Hawkeyes won 11 games in 2002 (11-2), and 2009 (11-2). In 2009, Iowa started 9-0 and won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.
- Iowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for the first time in school history.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015) and was named National Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2015. Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year honors. Iowa's Hayden Fry and Penn State's Joe Paterno both won the award three times.
- Iowa has had 16 individual national award winners under head coach Kirk Ferentz. They include Brad Banks (2002 Davey O'Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back); Brandon Scherff (2014 Outland, Top Lineman), Desmond King (2015 Jim Thorpe), Josey Jewell (2017 Lott IMPACT), T.J. Hockenson (2018, Mackey, Top Tight End), Tyler Linderbaum, (Rimington, Top Center), Jack Campbell (Campbell Trophy, Butkus Award), Tory Taylor (Ray Guy), Kaden Wetjen (Jett Award) and Logan Jones (Rimington).
- Iowa's offensive line earned the Joe Moore Award in 2016, an honor bestowed upon the top offensive line unit in the country.
- Iowa is the only school in the nation with a consensus All-American in the last seven seasons.
- Iowa's football record in the 2000 decade was 80-45 (.640), a record that ranks as the best decade in Iowa football history, based on total wins. Iowa posted a record of 77-40-4 (.652) during the 1980's and the Hawkeyes were 62-53-2 (.538) in the 1990's. Iowa was 81-49 (.623) from 2010-19.
- Iowa had 47 wins from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in school history.

IOWA FOOTBALL AND THE NFL

- The Hawkeyes have had 224 former players in the NFL since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first year as head coach (94 draft picks/135 free agents).
- Iowa has produced 34 first-team NFL All-Pros -- 16th-most among collegiate programs.
- Iowa had five players named to CBS Sports Top 100 list of the NFL's top stars for the 2025 season -- the most in the Big Ten and the fourth most in the nation. (Tristan Wirfs, 20; George Kittle, 25; Tyler Linderbaum, 53; Cooper DeJean, 85; Sam LaPorta, 86).
- Former Iowa consensus All-American Cooper DeJean helped the Philadelphia Eagles win Super Bowl LIX. DeJean intercepted Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes and returned the theft 38 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. It was DeJean's first interception in the NFL. DeJean became the youngest player in NFL history to score a defensive touchdown on his birthday (regular or postseason).
- Tampa Bay OL Tristan Wirfs made NFL history, becoming the first player to earn first-team All-Pro honors as a right tackle and left tackle. He was joined on the NFL Pro Bowl roster by George Kittle and Tyler Linderbaum.
- At least one Iowa Hawkeye has been selected in every NFL Draft since 1978 (47 consecutive years).

- Iowa has had 13 First Round NFL Draft picks under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- Iowa had two first round picks in the 2023 NFL Draft -- LB Lukas Van Ness (Packers) and LB Jack Campbell (Lions). It is the fourth time in program history Iowa has had two players selected in the first round.
- C Tyler Linderbaum and TE Sam LaPorta were named to the 2023 Pro Bowl. LaPorta was also a second-team All-Pro selection. TE George Kittle was first-team All-Pro in 2023.
- OT Tristan Wirfs and TEs George Kittle and T.J. Hockenson were both selected to the Pro Bowl in 2022. Wirfs and Kittle were Second Team NFL All-Pro selections.
- Two former Hawkeyes -- Jake Gervase and Alaric Jackson -- were members of the Los Angeles Rams' 2022 Super Bowl champion team.
- OT Tristan Wirfs earned first-team All-Pro and was a Pro Bowl selection in 2021.
- TE T.J. Hockenson (eighth overall, Detroit) and TE Noah Fant (20th overall, Denver) became the first tight ends from the same school to be drafted in the first round of a single NFL Draft (2019).
- OL Brandon Scherff (Washington) was named first-team All-Pro in 2020. TE T.J. Hockenson (Detroit), TE George Kittle (San Francisco) and Scherff (Washington) were named to the 2020 Pro Bowl.
- TE George Kittle (San Francisco) was a first-team All-Pro in 2019. OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) was named second-team All-Pro that same season.
- DB Desmond King (Los Angeles Chargers), LS Casey Kreiter (Denver), TE George Kittle (San Francisco), and OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) were named All-Pro in 2018.
- Over the past 25 years, 216-of-261 (83 percent) of Iowa's senior starters have been drafted in the NFL or signed NFL free agent contracts.
- Iowa has had 10 first round picks in the last 15 NFL drafts -- OL Bryan Bulaga, 2010; DE Adrian Clayborn, 2011; OL Riley Reiff, 2012; OL Brandon Scherff, 2015, TE T.J. Hockenson, TE Noah Fant, 2019; OL Tristan Wirfs, 2020; OL Tyler Linderbaum, 2022; LB Lukas Van Ness, 2023, LB Jack Campbell, 2023.
- Iowa had six players drafted in the 2012 NFL Draft, which tied for the most in the Big Ten and tied for fourth in the country.
- Former Hawkeye Marshal Yanda (Baltimore OL) was an eight-time Pro-Bowler (2011-16, 2018, 2019) and was named NFL All-Pro in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019. He retired following the 2019 season.
- In NFL 2011 regular season statistics, former Hawkeye linebackers Chad Greenway (Minnesota) and Pat Angerer (Indianapolis) finished third and fourth, respectively, in tackles. Greenway was named to the Pro Bowl in 2012 and 2013.
- Three former Hawkeyes were involved in the 2012 Super Bowl. DB Tyler Sash played for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants, while LB Jeff Tarpinian was on the injured reserve roster of the New England Patriots. Former Iowa center Brian Ferentz, now is his 11th year on staff and sixth as Iowa's offensive coordinator, was New England's tight ends coach.
- Former Iowa DB Sean Considine and OL Marshal Yanda won Super Bowl rings with the 2012 Baltimore Ravens in the 2013 Super Bowl.
- Former Iowa LB James Morris (injured reserve) earned a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots in 2015. Former TE Tony Moeaki played for the Seattle Seahawks in the same game.
- Former center James Ferentz was a member of the 2016 Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos.
- Former DT Jonathan Babineaux played for the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl LI. Former DE Adrian Clayborn and former DB Charles Godfrey were on the Atlanta injured reserve roster.
- Former OL Cole Croston was on the New England Patriots roster in Super Bowl LII. Former C James Ferentz and WR Riley McCarron were on the Patriots practice squad.
- Former DL Adrian Clayborn (active), OL James Ferentz, WR Riley McCarron (injured reserve), and OL Cole Croston (practice squad) earned Super Bowl rings as members of the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LIII.
- Former LB Anthony Hitchens and LB Ben Niemann played for the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs in 2020. Former QB C.J. Beathard, TE George Kittle, and OL Ross Reynolds were on the NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers.
- Former OL Tristan Wirfs was the starting right tackle as a rookie for the 2021 Super Bowl champion Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Former DL Anthony Nelson was a reserve defensive end for the Bucs. Former LB Ben Niemann and LB Anthony Hitchens were on the AFC Champion Kansas City Chiefs.
- Entering the 2025 season, every Iowa senior starting tight end (19) under Kirk Ferentz has been drafted in the NFL or signed by an NFL team. The NFL has employed 22 Iowa tight ends since 1999 (14 drafted/8 free agents).
- All 11 members of Iowa's starting defensive unit in 2008 were either drafted or signed to NFL free agent contracts following the draft.

IOWA NOTES

- The victory is No. 205 for head coach Kirk Ferentz, moving him into a tie with Ohio State's Woody Hayes for the most wins in Big Ten Conference history.
- Iowa has won its last five and 11 of its last 12 season openers dating back to the 2014 season.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- RB Xavier Williams notched his first career 100-yard game, finishing with 122 yards on 11 carries and one touchdown. He had 94 yards on six attempts in the first half.
- Williams is the first Iowa freshman to record a 100-yard game in his debut since Shonn Greene against Ball State in 2005 (116 yards, 18 att., 1 TD). The 122 yards are the most by a Hawkeye freshman since at least 1970 in their debut.
- He scored on a 3-yard touchdown run in the second quarter for his first career touchdown.
- Williams rushed for 14, 27 and 3 yards on his first three career rushing attempts on the nine-play, 68-yard scoring drive. He had a career-long 43-yard run on the following possession.
- It is the second straight season Iowa has had a freshman record a 100-yard game (Kamari Moulton at Maryland).
- QB Mark Gronowski completed 8-of-15 attempts for 44 yards with one touchdown – a 2-yarder to Kaden Wetjen.
- It was Gronowski's 94th career passing touchdown.
- He also had a 1-yard touchdown run in the third quarter – his first score as a Hawkeye and 38th career rushing TD.
- For the game, Gronowski rushed 11 times for 39 yards with one touchdown.
- It was also Gronowski's 50th career win as a starter.
- QB Hank Brown had a 1-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter – his first career rushing touchdown.
- WR Kaden Wetjen caught a 2-yard touchdown reception on fourth-and-goal in the second quarter. It was Wetjen's first career receiving touchdown and third career score.
- PK Drew Stevens connected on a 28-yard field goal in the first quarter and a career-long 55-yarder in the fourth. The make moved him into sole possession of third place on Iowa's all-time field goals list with 56.
- The 55-yarder is tied for the fourth-longest in program history and is the longest by a Hawkeye since 2015 (Marshall Koehn vs. Pittsburgh, 57 yards).
- Stevens is now 9-of-13 for his career from 50+ yards.
- Stevens' nine points gives him 255 for his career, moving him into sixth place all-time in the record books.
- LB Preston Ries had a blocked punt in the fourth quarter – Iowa's first blocked punt since 2023 (Yahya Black vs. Northwestern).

MISCELLANEOUS

- Iowa rushed for 310 yards in the game – the most in a season-opener since 2002 (376 vs. Akron).
- It is the second time in the last six contests the Hawkeyes have surpassed 300 rushing yards (329 vs. Wisconsin).
- It is the eighth time under OC Tim Lester that Iowa has had 200+ rushing yards.
- The Hawkeyes scored the final 31 points in the game after trailing 7-3.
- Iowa's defense limited UAlbany to 177 yards of total offense – the fewest in a season opener since 2022 (120 yards).
- The Hawkeyes limited two teams under 200 yards of total offense in 2024.
- Iowa held UAlbany to 33 total yards of offense in the second half.

- The victory is No. 206 for Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz, making him the winningest coach in Big Ten Conference history.
- The Hawkeyes have won six straight home night games inside Kinnick Stadium dating back to the 2022 season.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- WR/KR Kaden Wetjen had a 95-yard punt return for a touchdown in the third quarter. The return ties a Big Ten and Iowa record (Michigan State's Al Brenner at Illinois, 1966 and Iowa's Bill Happel vs. Minnesota, 1984) and is the longest punt return in Kinnick Stadium history, besting Bob Longley (94 vs. Oregon in 1949).
- It was his second career punt return for a touchdown and his third career return touchdown (two punt, one kickoff).
- Wetjen is now tied for second in school history with two punt return touchdowns (with Martin-Manley and Kahlil Hill).
- Wetjen and Tim Dwight are the only players in school history with multiple 80+ yard punt return touchdowns (Dwight 3, Wetjen 2).
- Wetjen finished the game with a career-high 216 return yards (182 punt and 34 kickoff) and a career-high 236 all-purpose yards.
- The 182 punt return yards are the fourth-most in a single game in Big Ten history, trailing Maryland's William Likely (233 in 2015), Iowa's Nile Kinnick (201 in 1939) and Iowa's Kevonte Martin-Manley (184 in 2013).
- It was his fourth career game with 100+ return yards as a Hawkeye.
- Wetjen had a 20-yard touchdown run on a reverse in the first quarter for his first career rushing touchdown.
- Wetjen is believed to be the first player in Iowa history to have a rushing, receiving, punt return and kickoff return touchdown in his career.
- QB Mark Gronowski completed 16-of-24 attempts for a season-high 179 yards and two touchdowns. He also had a rushing touchdown.
- Gronowski moved past 10,500 career passing yards in the game (10,615) and he has 96 career passing touchdowns.
- Gronowski has scored a rushing touchdown in each of Iowa's first three games, giving him 40 career rushing scores.
- The victory was Gronowski's 51st as a collegiate quarterback, passing Boise State's Kellen Moore for the most wins in FCS/FBS. It tied Grand Valley State's Cullen Finnerty for most wins overall.
- He completed passes to nine different receivers in the game.
- QB Hank Brown completed 5-of-7 attempts for 55 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. It was his first career passing touchdown as a Hawkeye.
- WR Seth Anderson had touchdown receptions from 20 and 3 yards on Iowa's first two possessions. He had three receptions for 26 yards.
- Anderson is the first Hawkeye to have two touchdown catches in a game since Reece Vander Zee against Illinois State in the 2024 opener.
- He is the first Iowa player to have two receiving touchdowns in the first quarter since Maurice Brown had two against Akron on Aug. 31, 2002.
- It is Anderson's second career two touchdown game as his first came at Charleston Southern as a freshman in 2022.
- WR K.J. Parker had a 2-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter. It was his first career reception and touchdown.
- K Drew Stevens went 2-of-3 on field goal attempts, making from 54 and 27 yards. The 54-yarder was his 10th career 50+ yard field goal (and third career 54-yard make).
- Stevens did miss from 38 yards, which snapped a string of 15 consecutive makes dating back to last season.

- Iowa scored 20 points in the first quarter -- the most in the opening quarter since Oct. 16, 2016, at Purdue.

- The victory moves the Hawkeyes to 5-0 all-time against the Scarlet Knights and 3-0 in Piscataway.
- The win is No. 207 for Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz, the most in Big Ten Conference history.
- The game was played in front of a record crowd of 55,942 at SHI Stadium.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- WR/KR Kaden Wetjen tied an Iowa record with a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown on the game's opening kickoff.
- It is the sixth 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in school history and the second of Wetjen's career. He is the second Hawkeye to return an opening kickoff for a touchdown (C.J. Jones vs. USC in the 2003 Orange Bowl).
- Wetjen has returned a punt and kickoff for a touchdown in 2025. He was the only player in the nation to accomplish the feat in 2024.
- It is Wetjen's second career 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown (2024 Music City Bowl vs. Missouri) and it is the 45th 100-yard return for a touchdown in Big Ten history (25th in a league game and first since 2023).
- He is now tied for the most career kickoff returns for a touchdown in school history with two, joining Derrell Johnson-Koulianos, Ihmir Smith-Marsette and Kahlil Hill.
- He has four career combined return touchdowns (two punt, two kickoff), which are tied with Hill for the second-most all-time. He trails only Tim Dwight (5).
- It is Wetjen's second straight and fifth career game with 100+ return yards.
- He finished with 183 all-purpose yards to lead the team.
- QB Mark Gronowski completed 12-of-18 attempts for 186 yards and he had a career-high three rushing touchdowns.
- He is the first Hawkeye QB to have a rushing touchdown in four straight games since Larry Lawrence had a four-game streak to end the 1968 season.
- The last Iowa QB to rush for three touchdowns was Matt Rodgers against Cincinnati on Sept. 15, 1990.
- The victory is Gronowski's 52nd as a collegiate quarterback, making him the winningest QB in college football history (all levels).
- RB Kamari Moulton returned from injury to tally his first touchdown of the season -- a 6-yarder in the first quarter.
- It was Moulton's sixth of his career.
- He led Iowa in rushing with 68 yards on 14 attempts to go along with three receptions for 21 yards.
- WR Dayton Howard had a career-long 42-yard reception in the fourth quarter on Iowa's go-ahead touchdown drive.
- LBs Karson Sharar and Jaden Harrell combined for 19 tackles.
- Sharar had a career-high 10 tackles to record his first career double-digit tackle game. It is the first such game by a Hawkeye this season.
- LB Jaxon Rexroth recorded Iowa's first interception of the season and the first of his career.
- DBs Zach Lutmer and TJ Hall had three pass breakups, tying career highs.
- DL Ethan Hurkett blocked a 29-yard Rutgers field goal attempt in the third quarter. It is his first career block.

- DB Zach Lutmer recorded his second career pick with three minutes to go in the fourth quarter.
- It was Iowa's second interception of the season and Indiana's Fernando Mendoza's first of the season.
- QB Mark Gronowski completed 19-of-25 passes for 144 yards in the game. He also had a rushing touchdown in the second quarter.
- Gronowski left the game early in the fourth quarter because of injury and didn't return.
- He was 7-of-10 passing on third downs for a combined 50 yards and a total of five first downs.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- QB Mark Gronowski completed 10-of-18 attempts for 138 yards and one touchdown. He also had 12 rushes for 25 yards and one touchdown.
- He had a 3-yard touchdown pass to D.J. Vonnahme in the second quarter. It was his fifth touchdown pass of the season.
- He had a 3-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter – his ninth consecutive game with a rushing score.
- Gronowski has 12 touchdowns this season, which is the most rushing touchdowns by an Iowa quarterback in program history.
- His nine straight games with a touchdown is a Big Ten record for the most consecutive games with a rushing touchdown by a QB in a single season. Indiana's Antwan Randle El scored in nine straight games, spanning the 1998 and 1999 seasons.
- TE D.J. Vonnahme had a 3-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter – the first of his career and the first by an Iowa tight end this season.
- RB Kamari Moulton finished the game with 23 rushes for 87 yards.
- He has led the RB room in rushing in five straight games.
- DB Deshaun Lee had an interception in the end zone in the first quarter – his second pick of the season.
- LB Karson Sharar had a career-high 10 tackles -- his first career double-digit tackle game.
- LB Jayden Montgomery had a career-high eight tackles.
- K Drew Stevens made a 58-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, tying both a Kinnick Stadium (Michigan State's Jonathan Kimm, 2023) and Iowa school record (Tim Douglas, at Illinois, 1998).
- It is Steven's 12th career field goal from 50+ yards, extending his school record.
- He now had 71 career field goals, extending his school record. It is also tied for the seventh-most field goals in Big Ten history.
- With the five points, Stevens now has 324 career points, tying Mike Meyer for second place in career scoring in school history.

MISCELLANEOUS

- The Hawkeye defense recorded its 10th interception of the season in the game.
- Iowa has recorded at least one interception in each of the last six games.
- Iowa's defense has given up 20 points or less to every ranked opponent it has played this season.

IOWA NOTES

- It is the first time Iowa has lost consecutive regular season games since 2022.
- The Hawkeyes' four losses have come by a combined 15 points – all to ranked opponents.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- QB Mark Gronowski had a passing, receiving and rushing touchdown in the game. He completed 12-of-19 attempts for 132 yards with one touchdown and one interception, had nine rushes for 29 yards and one touchdown and a 5-yard receiving touchdown (the second of his career).
- He is the seventh Big Ten player (fifth Big Ten QB) since 2000 with a pass TD, rush TD and a receiving TD in the same game.
- Gronowski's TD reception is believed to be the first by a Hawkeye QB since Kyle Sherman vs. Minnesota in 1994.
- Gronowski had a 2-yard touchdown pass to Dayton Howard – his sixth of the year -- in the first quarter. The score was set up by a 44-yard completion to Jacob Gill – Iowa's second-longest pass play of the season.
- He had a 1-yard touchdown run in the second quarter – his 10th consecutive game with a rushing touchdown.
- He is the only player in the nation to score a touchdown in every game.
- His 10 straight games with a touchdown is a Big Ten record for the most consecutive games with a rushing touchdown by a QB in league history. He is the first FBS quarterback with a rush TD in each of his team's first 10 games since Houston's D'Eriq King in 2018 and the first Power Conference QB with a rushing TD in each of his first 10 games.
- Gronowski has 13 touchdowns this season, which are the most rushing touchdowns by an Iowa quarterback in program history.
- Gronowski has had a rushing and passing touchdown in five games this season and in 31 games in his collegiate career.
- WR Reece Vander Zee had a 5-yard touchdown pass to Gronowski on a reverse pass trick play in the second quarter. Vander Zee was a former high school quarterback.
- RB Kamari Moulton finished with a team high 90 yards on 15 attempts.
- He has led the running backs in rushing in six straight games.
- WR Dayton Howard had a 2-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter – his first touchdown reception of the season and the second of his career.
- TE DJ Vonnahme had four catches for a career-high 59 yards in the game – the most by a Hawkeye TE this season.
- He has six catches for 102 yards over his last two games.
- DB Xavier Nwankpa and DB Zach Lutmer combined for 16 tackles – eight apiece – to lead the team.
- K Drew Stevens scored three points in the game – all via PATs – to move to into sole possession of second place on Iowa's all-time scoring list. He has 327 career points.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Iowa's offense scored on its opening possession for the second time in its last three games and fourth time overall this season. The Hawkeyes drove 69 yards over seven plays for the touchdown.
- Iowa's 13-point halftime lead (21-10) was the largest home halftime deficit for USC in the Lincoln Riley era.
- Iowa OL Gennings Dunker was flagged for a holding penalty on the final drive of the first half. It was the first accepted holding penalty by an Iowa offensive lineman this season (10 games in).
- It is just Iowa's second loss in its last 40 games when scoring 21+ points since 2020 and just the second loss since 2015 when leading by 14+ points (64-2 record).
- Iowa won the toss and elected to receive. The Hawkeyes have played 338 games under head coach Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened the game on offense 248 times (159-89). The Hawkeyes have opened the game on defense 90 times (51-39).

IOWA NOTES

- Iowa rallied from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit – its second come-from-behind win this season (Penn State).
- The Hawkeyes have won at least seven games 21 times under head coach Kirk Ferentz.
- The win is No. 211 for Ferentz – the most in Big Ten history.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- K Drew Stevens had a game-winning 44-yard field goal as time expired to give Iowa the 20-17 victory.
- It is his fourth career game-winning field goal (21-yarder with 28 seconds left in road win at Minnesota in 2022, a 53-yarder in road win over Northwestern at Wrigley Field in 2023 and a 53-yarder as time expired in a win over Nebraska in 2024).
- His 73 made field goals in his career are the sixth most in Big Ten history.
- He scored eight points in the game, giving him 335 points in his career (116 PAT, 69 FG) – second-most all-time.
- WR Kaden Wetjen had a 62-yard punt return for a touchdown in the first quarter – his third punt return for a touchdown this season. The three punt return touchdowns are tied for the most in the nation.
- Wetjen's three punt return touchdowns are tied for the third-most in a single season in Big Ten history, joining Michigan's Gene Derricotte (1947), Iowa's Tim Dwight (1997) and Nebraska's De'Mornay Pierson-El (2014). Ohio State's Ted Ginn, Jr., holds the single season record with four.
- It is Wetjen's sixth career combined return (four punt return, two kickoff return) for a touchdown – the most in Iowa history. He was previously tied with Tim Dwight with five.
- His four-career punt return touchdowns are tied for the third-most in Big Ten history and are one behind Tim Dwight (5) in the Iowa record books.
- It is the third consecutive punt return for a touchdown in Kinnick Stadium against Michigan State – Charlie Jones (2020), Cooper DeJean (2023) and Kaden Wetjen (2025).
- He finished the game with 165 combined return yards – his sixth career game with 100+ return yards.
- Wetjen's 17.5 career punt return average (53 returns, 929 yards) is currently No. 1 in Big Ten history.
- QB Mark Gronowski finished 12-of-22 for 147 yards and one touchdown to go along with 11 rushes for 57 yards.
- It is the first game this season without a rushing touchdown.
- 117 of his 147 passing yards came in the fourth quarter.
- He completed his final four passing attempts of the game for 67 yards, including the game tying touchdown.
- WR Jacob Gill had a 5-yard game-tying touchdown in the fourth quarter. It was his first touchdown of the season and his third as a Hawkeye.
- RB Kamari Moulton finished with 18 carries for 77 yards.

- Iowa has won three straight and 10 of the last 11 games over Nebraska.
- The Hawkeyes have won seven straight games in Lincoln dating back to the 2015 season.
- Iowa went 3-1 in trophy games in 2025 and is 32-11 in its last 43 rivalry trophy contests.

- Gronowski had a 35-yard touchdown pass to D.J. Vonnahme in the first quarter – his longest passing touchdown of the season.
- He had a 1-yard touchdown run in the second and a 6-yarder in the third – his 14th and 15th rushing TDs (16th overall) on the season.
- He has had a rushing touchdown in 11 of Iowa's 12 regular season games.
- Gronowski's 15 rushing touchdowns are the most by an Iowa quarterback in program history.

- It is Moulton's second career two touchdown game (Western Michigan, 2023).
- Moulton had a season-long 34-yard run in the second quarter – the second-longest rush by an Iowa running back this season.
- It was Moulton's third and fourth touchdown this season (eighth and ninth of his career).
- Moulton has led the position group in rushing in each of the last nine games.
- TE D.J. Vonnahme led Iowa's passing attack with three receptions for a career-high 91 yards and one touchdown.
- He had a career-long 35-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter and a career-long 43-yard catch in the third quarter.
- It was his second touchdown of the season and career.

- It is Iowa's second safety of the season (Indiana) – the most since 2023 (3 safeties).
