

Take the leaky toilet test!



Remove toilet tank lid carefully. Peel off one dye strip and drop in toilet tank (not bowl).



Wait 20-30 minutes without flushing toilet.



Check water in toilet bowl. If blue dye shows up in toilet, you have a leak.



Repair leak by replacing flapper, or call a licensed plumber.

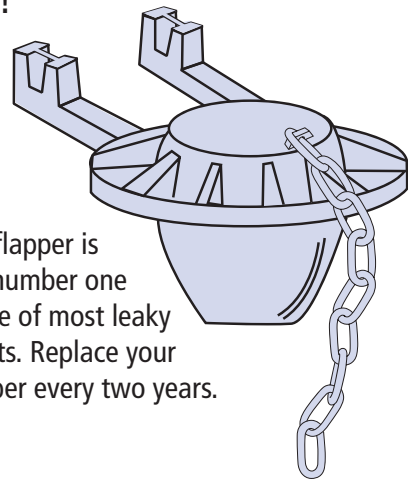
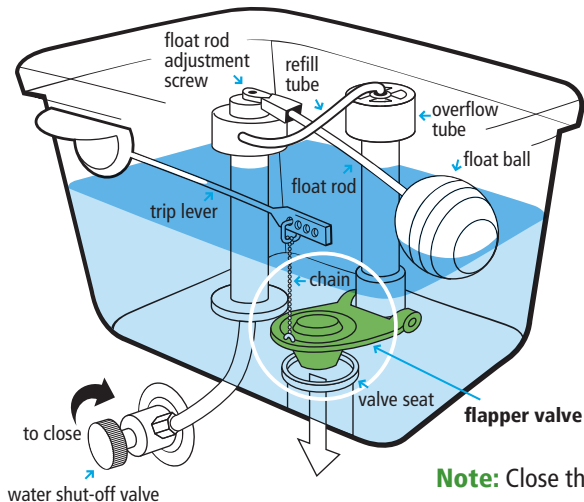

Find a leak? Check your toilet flapper first.

1. Rub the bottom of your flapper with your finger. If the rubber is peeling, the flapper should be replaced.
2. Take your old flapper with you to the store when purchasing a replacement. This ensures you get the right part for the job.
3. Install your new flapper and take the Leaky Toilet Test again or call a licensed plumber to ensure you've stopped the leak.

Even a minor toilet leak can waste 200,000 litres of water in a single year.*
That's enough water to fill a large swimming pool!



The flapper is the number one cause of most leaky toilets. Replace your flapper every two years.

Note: Close the water shut-off valve before making any repairs
