

Big Sky Ranch Ministry

(June 2017 - April 2018) John Spencer, pastor

Greetings in the name of Jesus:

Had I been asked a year ago to foresee and describe what Big Sky Ranch Ministry would look like today, my description would not have accurately portrayed what has actually come to be known as Big Sky Ranch Ministry.

I will attempt to explain. The goal of BSRM at the onset was to take the Good News of Jesus onto the ranches in this district. The ranch setting was to be where the Gospel was proclaimed. The BSRM would set up an ongoing time for this circuit-type ministry to as many ranches that time would allow. As of the date of this report, BSRM has made over 21 personal contacts of ranches in the District and as of the date of this report, BSRM has set up zero (0) on-ranch-site "Gatherin's."

Instead, God has expanded the goal of BSRM which has opened many other doors for us. And while the original goal of setting up on-ranch-site Gatherin's continues in earnest, God is blessing in many other Western Heritage Culture venues.

BSRM has set up the following preaching/teaching sites:

- *A monthly Cowboy Gatherin' at the Jersey Lilly Bar and Restaurant in Ingomar, Montana.
- *A monthly Sunday morning Gatherin' Service from November thru April for the Central Wyoming Cutting Club in Thermopolis, Wyoming.
- *Sunday morning Cowboy Church Gatherin' at the High School Rodeos in Vaughn, Great Falls, Three Forks, Ennis, Deer Lodge and Darby, Montana.
- *Preach and sing at the Billings, Montana Three Day Horse Sale.
- *Preach and sing at a Cowboy Church in Billings.
- *Invocation at the Crow Agency, Montana Indian Rodeo Fair.
- *Pray for the cowboys as we worked cattle on the Poison Spider Ranch in Wyoming during the fall gather.

It is difficult in an arena setting to "count noses" however; we have had the opportunity to personally minister to approximately 388 souls in 14 settings for an average of 28 people per setting. BSRM has taken in \$600 in offerings.

We have also been privileged to speak and sing at many of our Nazarene Churches on the District.

There were also **experimental** changes in the way we do things. Changing our "Sunday School" into Life Groups and changing the times, cancelling some activities and starting others, holding life-groups on Wednesday evenings with dinner and even running a "bus" to pick up children... was a major change in how we do business.

But there have been so many exciting things. What has been dubbed "Freaky Friday" and headed up by Barb O'Bannon has impacted the lives of kids, not only from our church but from the Victor Community as a whole. It has also been an important ministry to some of the parents and relatives of these kids as they've watched as our church has ministered to their children. What has been happening in that ministry is very exciting.

We've also observed continued growth in the ministry of the food pantry, supervised by Bill and Roxanne Gouin. Needs are met and Grace is shared as the pantry group works with community members when they are in need. Watching kindergarteners from Victor School pull gobs of turkeys from Victor School to the pantry with their little red wagons is quite a sight. One can only imagine the full impact this ministry has on these children and on the people they provide for.

Having John and Monica Spencer step up and accept God's call for them to Youth Ministry and to reconnect with the Featherstone's and work with Bill in getting this ordained minister back into service in this church are exciting works of God. We're looking forward to what the Lord has in store for all of these pastors. Then... to have 9 people commit themselves to the church through membership (plus 2 transfers from inactive to active) that's exciting.

We're looking forward to more great things in the coming year.

I have some difficulty writing this year's report. As I review the year I find myself with mixed emotions. I recognize the ministries God is truly working in and yet I look at the Church and feel somewhat discouraged with the lack of numerical growth we hope for. Our Small Groups continue to be strong in fellowship and discipleship with 8 different groups meeting this year. Attendance is always steady but with little to no growth.

Other ministries we have begun this year include:

- We now have a Home school community group with average of 27 students plus parents that meets once a week for group projects.
- We have an after-school program meeting one day a week called 'WYLDE LIFE" for Middle school students that averages 20.

 Also, a Holistic Health Clinic that is opened Bi-Monthly for 3 days with an average of 20 patients per day.

Our Teens started Bible Quizzing this year coached by Sharon Bradburn, who thought she was going to set back and kind of retire from Church work but God put His thumb in her back and she faithful answered is leading. We joined forces with POWELL Harvest Community and went on to represent the District in the Regionals at NNU.

Our special events grew to busting proportions. Our Fall Family Festival saw over 300 adults and children come through the church doors with the promise of more this fall, we tried to tone down our 4th of July but learned the community has come to expect us to celebrate that night. With again over 300 on the church lawn we recognize it will become a yearly ministry.

We received new members and sadly let some move away. We had no baptisms this year but anticipate making up for that this year. Our visitors remain a highlight for us throughout the summer. On one particular Sunday we had a family from Tennessee, Washington, Maine, Arizona and 25 Teens from Norway!

2 years ago, I began to use Archery as a ministry tool and the Lord has opened the door for me to minister in a number of ways both in the Community and across the nation as Lori and I have traveled to compete.

So, while the church congregation hasn't seen much growth the ministry of the Church is reaching out and we are looking forward to what the Lord will do this year.

"If". It's such a powerful word. Ten or so years ago we were faced with the question of "if our church disappeared would our community notice?" This was a challenging question and caused us to take a renewed look at how we as a church were impacting our community. As I look at that question today I am still challenged by it, but also proud to say that at least more of our community would notice.

In this last year, we reached into our community in several ways. Our Facility is being used free of charge on a weekly basis by at least five different groups. This is a huge impact to individuals and organizations who can't find adequate space or don't have funding in their budgets to pay for rentals. Just a few weeks ago Quality Life Concepts held their "prom" here. This is what they told me, "Even though our clients were begging for us to do it, due to budget cuts we did not have the funding to do it this year. Then we thought, well let's call the Nazarene Church and see if we can make it work." This is the influence we have asked God to give us. We want to be a place that our community looks for help. The simple act of allowing our building to be used has greatly expanded our influence. Our missions team organized the giving of teaching supplies to the teachers at Valley View Elementary. We provided everything from basics, to printer cartridges, to head lamps. In the end we

gave them everything on their "Christmas wish lists", as well as a glimpse of Jesus' love and support of their efforts.

Once again, our basketball camp reach well over 100 kids, and our block party was a "loud" success when we were blessed to have the band Set for the Fall perform. Many neighbors came to see and participate in what we were doing. One guy said he heard it over his lawn mower and just had to come see. Our sponsorship of a baseball game was fun for the whole family. This year we sponsored a Hockey game, and honestly, I was surprised and excited to see how many of our church family participated, what a fun night! I'm already looking forward to next year. (As well as another shot at shooting the puck through that little hole.)

In the fall, I was very proud of our participation in the Study "Messy Grace". It was a polarizing topic but I believe we discovered that we can have tough conversations and grow from them. As a church body I know we were challenged by how we should respond to those different then us. As individuals I believe some real growth happened by just listening and discussing with each other. Also, October 14 we partnered with A21 in their freedom walk to raise awareness of human trafficking around the world. I don't know that I've ever been prouder than when we made up over 50% of those walking. We followed that with a Freedom Sunday. A Sunday dedicated to how the church should respond to this issue in our own community as well as around the world. This communicated to the community that areas of justice are important to the Church of the Nazarene.

This past year we had the privilege of baptizing seven people and receiving twelve people into membership. Our Children's and Youth ministries have grown, as well as our over-all discipleship ministry numbers. As a community we are seeing lives transformed.

God has done and is doing amazing things here. It makes me wonder, if he wanted or wants to do more? Our quick answer is "of course he did and does". If is a powerful word. If he did, why didn't he? If he does, why won't he? 2 Chronicles 7:14 says,"¹⁴ if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." Notice that it's, "if my people", that's us right? What I see here is "If" can mean everything or it can mean nothing, as far as what God does. "If", is a powerful word. As we move into the next year, let us assume he wants to do more and will do more, and IF we position ourselves as he has told us to, imagine the kingdom impact we might have. May our efforts always come from this humble position as we continue to "Bridge the Gap between people and God through Christ like service and love." I guess the question to ask now is, "If our Church sticks around, will our community notice?"

Hi-Line Church of the Nazarene Hi-Line Network Report, Chad McKenzie, Pastor

We started off the year meeting a young family that would teach us a lot over the course of the year. They had just moved to Havre. The mother is ex-Hutterite. The Father avoids reportable income because of child support issues. The daughter always greets you with a hug. I drove a long way to help remove their personal belongings from a house where the relationship with their former landlord was tense. Neither has a driver's license and it took most of the year to get documents so the father could get a state I.D. I'm not sure he has yet taken the time to get it. We have helped with resumes, applications, rides to interviews, studied driving laws, connections to community resources for food, power, housing etc. We have talked late at night through anxiety and fears. We have been to doctor's appointments. Most Sunday's and Wednesday's the mother and child would be with us for worship or Bible quizzing and dinner. Not all is resolved nor is all lost.

Over the course of last summer, I would meet with a man who used to guide for big game in the mountains and also is a graphite pencil artist. We had met at the farmer's market the previous year while I was hunting for dill. He desired to be baptized. He had allowed the actions of others to turn him away from church gatherings but still held faith. After studying weekly for several months, we set a date and baptized him in the spillway of Fresno Dam September 8th. It was chilly but not yet frozen. A few weeks later he helped me show the previously mentioned family how to butcher and package a donated Muley buck. This spring he is initiating a ministry with his wife to mentor people in gardening and processing food so that people may have food security.

Through the fires and Nazarene Compassionate ministries, we finally met the Graff family. We had heard through homeschool connections that there was a family who used to do Nazarene bible quizzing. A rancher from the Elko, Nevada COTN wanted to help with the fire relief effort by sending hay. John Graff had been an executive pastor in Grandview, Washington and still has ties to the agricultural ministries of NCM. John and the district were contacted to help facilitate the rancher's donation. Once made aware of each other's

presence we made efforts to meet. In February John agreed to use his skills as the Hi-Line ministry coordinator. We have been meeting weekly since to develop and implement a plan to minister to the entire Hi-Line.

Ministry plans led John and I to seek a meeting with the local Salvation Army Director. While meeting with her a man came in who is in one of the rehabilitation programs connected to the Drug Court. At this point he was a self-described atheist. After working with the director and others for months he came in that day facing surgery the next day. The spirit used this opportunity and gave us the word to lead him to Christ during the appointment. I now sit in a group meeting with him and others every week.

Not many weeks later I was visiting a church that my evangelist neighbor attends. After service we were visiting on the street when a young woman of 18 asked if the church would meet that night. It would not but we invited her to our home fellowship now held in the evenings. We picked her up and my neighbor came that night and shared his personal testimony. She accepted Christ at our dining room table. She was in a domestic violence shelter at the time. We have continued to mentor her spiritually and in life skills. She has recently had the opportunity to join the teen challenge program. She currently is rejecting that opportunity. Her entire life she has had little stability. The thought of staying in one place for a year is difficult for her to consent to. We will continue to offer support to her as she navigates life where having a voice in where or who she stays with is now her choice. Obviously not all can be summed up in a year of ministry. Why we haven't even spoke about going to General Assembly to have 3 young men compete in the World Quiz.

We saw the sale of our building and the transition to a home church fairly smoothly; experiencing the Holy Spirit in our different kind of meeting. We celebrated Communion with excitement this past year, trying to regularly celebrate it at least once a month. Our Supply Pastor from Billings, Steve Clark (and Connie), have lovingly served for the last couple of years. They made the trek from Billings to Livingston each month, and back to Billings for their weekly service at a local nursing home at 2:00. On August 21st we held a reunion of sorts, for our last Church family service in our old building. Many visited who had attended in years past, and we had a celebration dinner afterward. The Enterprise (local newspaper) ran a story on it, but the weather was uncooperative, but God's Spirit revived me that night! Our desire was to love our local community in such a way that the Mission Valley KNOWS that the Church of the Nazarene exists in this community. I am grateful to report that the Church of the Nazarene not only exists, but it is thriving in the Mission Valley!

Our average attendance is up from 49 last year to 52 this year. We gained three members by their profession of faith. We baptized 5 people, most of whom are from the same family. But, most importantly, through our outreaches we saw many people come to faith in Jesus Christ.

We had Vacation Bible School last summer (the first for us in a long while) with the help of a Work and Witness team from Oregon. The last night of the Vacation Bible School we showed the "Jesus Film" and 8 children prayed to accept Jesus into their lives! We hosted Master Illusionist Scott Humston in the fall with school assemblies and evangelistic services at our church. Over the course of the weekend around 400 people came to the services at the church. Of those who attended almost half of them were visitors to our church! God did amazing work that weekend!! 20 people professed a first-time commitment to Christ, while many others received an assurance of their salvation, prayed to "get things right with the Lord," and prayed for other special requests they had. That weekend was quite an investment of our time and resources, but the Kingdom of God did benefit from that investment!!

In September our church board voted to move forward with a satellite campus in Polson, Mt. A family heard about our vision and that family donated enough money to rent a conference room at the Red Lion Inn for one day a week for six months! That family doesn't even live in our area! Many doors were opened for this opportunity, from the place to meet, to relationships with hotel staff, to the music. On February 11, 2018 we had our first service at our satellite campus, known as Movement Church of the Nazarene. We have been slowly, but steadily growing in attendance at that location and are doing our best to be the Body of Christ in that area of our valley. At the same time, we have seen blessing after blessing at our campus in Pablo and its ministry to that community. We have seen new children come, new families attend, and other families return to us. God has indeed shown us that "Faithfulness Produces Fruitfulness!"

This upcoming year we are challenged to "Connect the Community." This year, God has challenged us to be more intentional with our follow up and our ability to connect with each other and to connect with our world.

My family and I have only been in Sheridan for a few months but we have been blessed to see a movement of God's transforming power in that time. As a Church we decided to surrender our preferences for God's priority and we made some big changes, to put it lightly. In an effort to be more relevant to our younger community, we voted to sell our pews and invest in chairs for our sanctuary. God blessed our surrendered hearts and provided us a buyer at just the right time. We changed our music, painted the walls, and remodeled the foyer all to see new life come into God's kingdom. We also voted as a church to change our name to 'Summit Nazarene', with the purpose of being relevant to our community. Our mission statement at Summit Nazarene is: Moving lives upward: As we Elevate Jesus in our corporate and 24-7 worship, Engage the world through service and mission, and to enlarge our faith through community and small groups. We have started Koinonia life groups for all ages and a new children's ministry in conjunction with our "Young Families" Koinonia group. We have been averaging 55 total people who are participating in life groups and Sunday School.

It has been a great honor to serve as the Pastor of Summit Nazarene. On multiple Sundays our altars have been lined with people bringing their requests and brokenness to God. Our church has had three individuals confirm that they experienced salvation during our worship services. Many others have recommitted their lives or deepened their commitments to Christ. Autumn, a middle school student, has been coming with one of our students. Her parents are uninterested in church but allow her to go as long as they don't have to take her. One Sunday she raised her hand when I gave an altar call and later that day a Children's church worker gave her a Bible and told her that she should write

important dates on the cover page. Autumn quickly wrote down the date in which she gave her life to Christ. Autumn is at church whenever we have the doors open.

Donnie Horsely also gave his life to Jesus in one of our services. Through family Donnie has had a connection with our church for many years. For many years he ignored God's tug on his heart but a few weeks ago he stopped wrestling with God and decided to surrender to him. Donnie has been recently diagnosed with terminal cancer. He said that he believes his diagnosis was God's act of mercy on his life, offering him a final chance to accept Jesus as Lord and savior of his life. He now lives with an Eternal Kingdom perspective and is sharing his faith with his family and friends. Our church has been profoundly blessed by the new life God has allowed us to be a part of. Sidney Church has been blessed since the beginning of our ministry here, with the mission of being a 'sending' church. Since we have arrived, nearly all the people we have introduced to Jesus have moved to other cities or states. Nevertheless, we know that we have been instrumental in sending witnesses to the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ everywhere these folks have gone.

This year has seen us sending yet again, but this time in far greater numbers than we have in the past. In fact, we have said good-bye to 9 families who have moved out of state, and one that has moved out of town. We have two more families planning similar moves as well as a single young gentleman. As you can imagine, this have been bittersweet. We rejoice always in the grace of God, and in the gift of being allowed to send these missionaries to these other cities, where ever they are, but we also miss our loved ones terribly.

This exodus has also impacted our church in the following areas:

- Finances: Many of the families that have moved were actively supporting our church. That said, we are still over budget for our WEF giving, which we consider a barometer of the spiritual vitality of our congregation.
- Children's ministries: As the number of our kids has shrunk, other families with kids have sought churches in the area better able to serve their children.
- Our Youth Group currently runs two, and our Girls Club ministry also averages between 3 - 4 kids.

Our overall attendance has dropped in a matter of months from 65 on average to 21. The good news is that there are plenty of good seats to be had. We are working to attract unchurched persons in the community, and are meeting with some success, though it is a slower going process than we would like.

We continue to have a core group of believers who committed to the mission and message of the Church of the Nazarene and are willing to work their guts out to promote it! I couldn't be prouder as a pastor of our people!

We are convinced that God has a bright future in store for our church's mission to Richland County, and we are excited to participate with Him in the building of His holy Kingdom!

This vision board will continue to look at what we are currently doing and make suggestions for adjustments as we move forward. The vision board will also begin to develop future goals and help us be on track to accomplish them. In the past, we have tried to do this with our Church Board but haven't been as effective as we'd like to be so hopefully this new vision board will give us more of a focus.

Meanwhile, we have continued to try to find ways to serve our community. Each month we purchase a set amount of Grocery Cards and Gas Cards. As people come to the church with a need in either of these areas, we are able to provide some short-time relief. Once this set number of cards is given out, we can't give any more until the next month when we purchase more.

We also continue to support local compassionate ministry efforts by helping the

Salvation Army, The Comea Shelter (homeless shelter), and Family Promise (Family Homeless program), Cancer Comfort Baskets, Cheyenne Day of Giving, and more. In addition to these, we continue to support and provide information for other Global NMI programs: alabaster, Crisis Care kits, School Pal Paks, Special Offerings, NMI Books, and more.

The effort and time that they have put in to each of their departments has increased ten-fold. We are striving in each area of ministry to not be numb to the world around us. The amazing story that we are seeing is that those multiple marriages that were "over" are actively healing or healed. The hands and feet that were tied are now free to do His will.
