SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: Harriet

John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said: "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world . . . " John 1: 29-34

Among the year's most powerful and rousing movies is **Harriet**, the story of Harriet Tubman, one of the most extraordinary freedom fighters in American history. She's played with passion and grit by actress Cynthia Erivo.

She was born Araminta Ross on a farm in Buckstown, Maryland, in 1849. As a young woman of 27, she is promised her freedom in the will of the owner of her estate. The heirs, however, renege on that promise and plan to sell Araminta — "Minty" as she is called — "down river" to a plantation in the Deep South where she would be forever separated from her husband and family. Despite the odds against her, Minty pulls off a daring escape, even leaping from a bridge when she is cornered by the dogs and men on horseback who are quite literally hunting her down. At great risk, Minty makes it to Philadelphia, building a new life for herself with the help a supportive community of black abolitionists. As many emancipated slaves would do, Minty takes a new name to mark her new life as a free woman: Harriet.

But Harriet can't rest easy, knowing that her people continue to endure doomed lives as slaves. So she returns again and again to Maryland's Eastern Shore, often in disguise, to guide other slaves — including her parents and sister — to freedom. The dangers increase with each trip — but so does Harriet's guile and resourcefulness.

Harriet Tubman would make 13 missions and guide 70 slaves to freedom, becoming one of the most successful conductors on the "Underground Railroad."

Harriet's success in bringing slaves to freedom makes her a marked woman in slave states. As slaveholders increase the bounty on her, Harriet's friends in Philadelphia urge her not to return to Maryland. But Harriet will not hear of it.

"God's time is always near," Harriet Tubman responds. "He set the North Star in the heavens; He gave me the strength in my limbs; He meant I should be free . . .

"Now I've been free, I know what a dreadful condition slavery is. I have seen hundreds of escaped slaves, but I never saw one who was willing to go back and be a slave."

In her crossing to freedom, Harriet Tubman realizes God's call to her: to bring other slaves to freedom and to work to end the institution of slavery. In Baptism, we "cross over" to the life of God; we are re-born in God's grace and called to take on the work of God's Christ: to testify to God's presence in our midst, to proclaim the justice and peace of Jesus' Gospel, to stand with the poor, the rejected and the forgotten — with the certain hope and assurance that the Spirit of God — our own "North Star" — leads us. Harriet Tubman mirrors the prophetic witness of John the Baptist, who gives his life to proclaim the presence of the "Lamb of God" in our midst. Like John the Baptizer, we have been called in Baptism to "testify" to the presence of the Lamb of God in our midst. Our "testimony" can be declared in less vocal but no less effective vehicles: in our unfailing compassion for others, in our uncompromising moral and ethical convictions, in our attempts (however small and simple) to bring forgiveness and reconciliation to those around us, with the vision and commitment of "prophets" like Harriet Tubman.

YOU ARE INVITED TO SERVE AT MASS

At Mass, Christ is present in the Readings and the Eucharist and Christ is present in all Ministers. The "action" of Ministry brings Christ present to the assembly. The Ministers are the conduit to Christ's presence at the Mass. God invites all of us to His table, to the Eucharist to receive Him. And we come, all of us, with our weaknesses and struggles, to hear the Word of God and receive his strength and forgiveness in the Eucharist. Father Rick and parishioners, who serve at Mass, are doing what Jesus taught us – serving others. We ask you to consider serving at Mass, in whatever way suits you.

ALTAR SERVERS

Altar Servers can be a family or a couple or a single person. The tasks can be modified to accommodate the amount of participants. Altar serving involves leading the procession in and out of Mass with the cross and setting the altar at the offertory time.

EUCHARIST MINISTERS

Ministers of the Eucharist assist Father with the distribution of Holy Communion. Serving the Host or the cup is special as you are blessed to bring Jesus to others as well as connect with parishioners individually.

MUSIC MINISTRY

We so appreciate those parishioners who share the gift of song that God has blessed them with. With three different Masses the music ministry welcomes more people to be involved as a musician or a singer. For anyone who has a talent of music we hope you will consider participating.

READERS

We want readers who feel comfortable being in front of the congregation and have the talent to speak with inflection, slowly and audibly to proclaim scripture.

Please consider being an Altar Server, Reader, Eucharist Minister or part of Music Ministry. With any position, you will be trained and instructed so you feel comfortable in your service. You also have complete control over what Mass time and how often you serve.

Scheduling is tailored to our personal availability. Every minister has easy access to the schedule on line. Each of us provide specific dates when we are available. We also can limit how often we serve. Even once a schedule is active, and a conflict arises, it is a simple matter to request a sub.

THE LAMB OF GOD

Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. (John 1:29)

We hear these words at every Mass as the Host and Chalice are raised for all to see. They are so familiar that perhaps they have lost some of their force. So let's take a closer look at this marvelous invitation.

Behold. Don't just glance. Behold. Look deeply, carefully, and prayerfully. Look with the expectation that you will discover something important. Trust that Jesus wants to reveal himself to you.

Behold, the Lamb of God. What are you beholding? God's greatest gift to the world - to you. You are beholding Jesus, the one true sacrifice sent from heaven. He is the spotless Lamb, innocent of all sin and meek and gentle of heart. He has come so that you can pass over from death to life, from slavery to freedom.

You are no longer bound by it. Jesus has borne it away and you can walk away from it toostep by halting step as you continue to place your faith in him.

THE CITY OF GOD

Bridgeport is a gritty, working-class neighborhood on Chicago's South Side, the busy and bustling home to some 30,000 mid-income families of every nationality and culture.

Bridgeport is also home to a Benedictine monastery.

The Monastery of the Holy Cross is the only urban monastery in the country. At the invitation of the Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, the community of ten monks took over a parish that had closed in 1989 when the archdiocese shuttered dozens of churches and schools to cut costs.

Most monasteries are located in the country and so are able to farm and raise animals, but, living in the city, the Bridgeport monks had to find another way to make ends meet. So they purchased a run-down house adjoining the monastery that was rife with drug dealing and transients. They re-furbished the two-story building to create Ascension House, a retreat house and B&B.

As the monks gather for prayer eight times a day and carry on their work of prayer and hospitality, city life presses on around them. Family houses adjoin the monastery's property. On a summer afternoon, next door, hidden behind a weatherworn fence, children noisily splash in a pool. In the alley behind the church, a middle-aged man rolls out his lawn mower from his garage, and a cable company tech in a hard hat ascends into the air in a truck's bucket. Just north of the church is a small park and a nondescript, brick grade school. The rest of the street is a hodgepodge of businesses: a liquor store, a diner, an auto repair garage. While city life hums in the background, the monks quietly go about their work and prayer life. The Benedictines' presence is a living sign of God's presence in the city amid the noise, the constant commerce, the violence, the entrenched poverty.

The monks welcome all to come and pray and sing with them. From their open door, the Kingdom of God is breaking into the city and the world.

In the midst of a busy city neighborhood, a community of monks proclaim by their quiet lives of prayer and work what John proclaims in today's Gospel: that "the Lamb of God" is in our midst. The challenge of our lives is to see and hear the compassion of God in the busyness of our lives, to uncover and lift God's grace that goes largely unnoticed in the course of our days. We often find ourselves rushing through our lives, too preoccupied and distracted in the pursuit of wealth and status to "behold" our lives' true joy and fulfillment; in our obsession with what we don't have we overlook the reality of what we do have. May we "behold," with eyes of faith and spirits of hope, the Lamb of God among us - and within us.

PASSING THE CATHOLIC HEART WORKCAMP TORCH: A CHANCE FOR A LIFE-CHANGING EXPERIENCE

In 2003, Bill Harrison and Judy Wade took 8 teens to Catholic Heart Workcamp in Rockford, IL. Our son, Zach, was one of those brave kids who said "yes" to serving others. When he returned home, he said that he wanted to go again the following summer asked, "Mom, will you help?". I freely admit I was hesitant to commit to one more thing, but his enthusiasm convinced me to step up. One of the most impactful decisions I have ever made. Now I am asking for you to step up. It's my time to ask, "WILL YOU HELP?".

For 17 years I have had the life-changing experience of joining just under 500 teens and adults from our community in living our Baptismal call to love thy neighbor. I could have never imagined this amazing faith journey when I first told Zach I would help. It has humbled and enriched me. I also know that this week-long service mission trip has made a lasting impression on most of those who were brave enough to say "yes". I want someone else to have this experience!

This has been a difficult decision. But when we learned that our daughter in New Hampshire was expecting her first child, and our third grandchild, I knew it was time to ask for help. So, I am asking. I am happy to meet/have a conversation with anyone who might be interested. I will walk you through the paperwork process and always be a phone call away from assisting you with this mission.
