18TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: “Winnowing”

“You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?” **Luke 12: 13-21**

The first “winnowing” took place when she moved from her home of 40 years into a two-bedroom apartment. Goodbye to the sewing machine, the wicker picnic basket, the dining room table, the Schwinn bikes. Now, at the age of 91, another move — and in all probability, her last: into a small studio apartment in an assisted-living facility near her daughter. She was overwhelmed by all she accumulated, so she entrusted her daughter with this last “winnowing.”

Obviously, most of the furniture would not go to the new place. But the hardest decisions regarded her wardrobe. She loved clothes and her walk-in closet was the size of a small room. When she liked something, she bought it in multiples. For her, new clothes felt like fresh starts, a longer and more certain future. Some things were easy to discard: the dresses for special occasions, the pantsuits for a working life, the hiking boots, the beachwear were no longer needed; she would never be wearing heels again. And some things were easy to keep: the pull-on stretch jeans and black pants were workhorses.

Her daughter had learned from her mother’s rehab stay that everything should go together, because aides often choose the outfit of the day in a hurry, as they have several elderly residents to dress every morning. And the more nicely put together her mother was, the more positive attention Mom would receive. It’s superficial, sure, but real. Black stretch pants, a colorful cardigan or a light-weight fleece vest — Mom was more likely to be treated as the adult she was. Everything had to be flexible and comfortable. Think layers. Pockets for tissues. Everything should stretch.

Finally, the “winnowing” was completed and Mom moved into her new home: a sleek miniature of her two-bedroom apartment, which had been a reduced version of her three-bedroom home. For her daughter, the work of “winnowing” was a learning experience for her own life. She writes:

“I almost started to envy the minimalism I was creating for [my mom], the curated photo albums, books, mementos, and art, none of it so valuable it would have to be worried over. Her final years would be airy with freedom. After her lifetime of working hard, creating order, fulfilling the needs of herself and others, I didn’t want her to have to fret about possessions ever again — taking care of them, or feeling burdened by their weight and claim on her . . .

“She never missed what was missing; all the important things stayed. Most of all, she was free to expand in other ways. When I dropped by to visit after her evening meal, served in the communal dining room, she’d say, ‘Do you know I get invited to a restaurant every single night?’ I told her I knew. I told her how glad I was she was getting out and about.”

Today’s Gospel is more than an indictment of wanton consumerism; it’s a challenge to consider how we use things, the value we place on “stuff.” Often a thing’s true worth has nothing to do with its monetary value — a particular thing’s value is how we can use it to realize and express the love of God in our midst. Jesus calls us to take inventory of our lives and the things that “clutter” them and refocus on the treasures of God: compassion, mercy, forgiveness, peace. Jesus’s parable of the rich man’s barns is an invitation to make “winnowing” of our possessions not just a practical task as we move from one stage our lives to the next, but a spiritual exercise of “freeing” ourselves of things in order to center, with gratitude and humility, on the true things of worth in our lives.

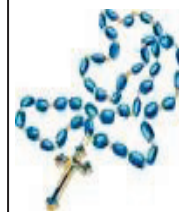
18TH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME

LIVING ONE WITH THE POOR—YOU THINK SO . . . ?

What would it take for the average American family to live the life of poverty experienced by so many families in the world?

Begin by stripping the family home of furniture. Beds, chairs, lamps, TV sets, silverware — everything. Leave a few blankets, a kitchen table, and a wooden chair. Take away the clothing bureaus and the clothes. Each family member can keep one article of clothing, and only the head of the household, the family's principal bread-winner, is permitted a pair of shoes.

In the kitchen, take away all the appliances. Leave a small bag of flour, some sugar and salt, a few moldy potatoes, a handful of onions, and a dish of dried beans. The meat, the canned goods, the crackers, the candy all go.

Next, strip the bathroom, shut off the running water, and turn off the electricity in the house.

Then, take away the house itself.

But this is just the start. There's also the lack of telephone, newspapers, firefighters, hospitals, paved roads, or doctors. The nearest school is three miles away, reachable only by foot, and consists of two classrooms.

Finally, money. Allow every family member a cash hoard of five dollars, which will prevent the family breadwinner from experiencing the tragedy of the Iranian peasant who went blind because he could not afford the \$3.94 he mistakenly thought he needed to receive admission to a hospital where he could have been cured.

This is poverty in our world.

If we stop to consider how many families live in poverty today, the very idea of building barns and storage units to store our possessions is obscene. In the parable of the rich man's barns, Jesus is challenging us to realize the riches we possess and to embrace a spirit of gratitude to God for our many blessings that compels us not to store them away but share them with those who have little or nothing. The most tragic kind of poverty is the emptiness of a life filled with "things" but possessing nothing of God — love, forgiveness, compassion, gratitude. God has given us this precious brief but wonderful life in order to discover how to love one another as God loves us: totally and completely, without condition nor limit.


