FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....



Dear Friends,

As our nation is grappling with racial tensions once again, and our political pundits are busy giving varied opinions and solutions, we can learn many wonderful lessons from the Scripture readings of this Sunday. By declaring through the prophet Isaiah (the first reading), "*My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples,*" God reveals the truth that in His eyes there is no distinction among human beings on the basis of race, caste or color. The long-expected Messianic kingdom was intended not only for the Jews but for all nations as well. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 67) rejects all types of religious exclusivity: "*Let all the peoples praise You, O God; ...For You judge the peoples with equity and guide the nations upon the earth, so that Your saving power may be known among all the nations.*" In the second reading, Paul explains that, although the Jews were the chosen people, most of them denied the promised Messiah, and, consequently, God turned to the Gentiles who received mercy through their Faith in Jesus. In the Gospel story, Jesus demonstrates that salvation was meant for the Gentiles as well as for the Jews by healing the daughter of a Gentile woman as a reward for her strong Faith.

Overemphasis on Difference can blind us to our common humanity. Our human instinct, most of the time, is to erect protective barriers between ourselves and those who we perceive as different from us. Instead of respecting differences, certain attitudes and rhetoric can devalue and stigmatize them. Jean Vanier, the world renowned philosopher and theologian, stated: "*It is the human heart and its need for communion that weakens the walls of ideology and prejudice. It leads us from closedness to openness, from illusion of superiority to vulnerability and humility.*"

The best way to reduce the harmful exclusion that so many people experience today would be to have the attitude of Jesus who taught us the expansive and universal nature of the "Kingdom of God," in contrast with the theory that salvation was offered first to the Jews and only then to the rest of the world. Although God set the Hebrew people apart as His chosen race, He included all nations in His plan for salvation and blessed all families of the earth in Abraham (Genesis 12:1-3). This universalist theme, proclaimed in today's Scripture readings, is something we need to reclaim in the present disturbing trends caused by some who assert superiority over the inherent value of all peoples. Jesus teaches us not mere tolerance, but acceptance and understanding people who are different.

Our parish community has been a model of this. Let us continue this good tradition of being a welcoming and hospitable community.

AUGUST NOTES FROM THE GARDEN

130 pounds of peaches were harvested from the Project Earth Garden last week! The peach tree is heaving a sigh of relief and her newly unburdened branches are finally able to lift from the ground. She was very generous this year. We have picked more than 60 pounds of green beans to date. The bushes look green and healthy and have now set a second wave of blossoms. Onions and some of the potatoes will be harvested soon along with more beets. Fresh peaches, green beans, beets, tomatoes and some kale were all delivered to Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen this week. A new batch of broccoli seedlings go in next weekend as well as another planting of beets and some fall peas. Come out and see the Amaranth ("red spinach") we have growing. The large red-leafed plants are topped with beautiful red flower plumes. Many know it as a cut or decorative flower but the leaves have been eaten since ancient times and are full of niacin and calcium. The flowers contain thousands of seeds that are used by some cultures to make a type of flour. The small leaves are often served fresh as in a salad and the larger leaves can be cooked and seasoned like spinach. The community garden beds are filled to the brim and overflowing with good things to eat and the sunflowers are towering over the beds with their beautiful sunny yellow blooms. Come out and see the wonders in the garden--you won't be disappointed!

SUNDAY REFLECTION: "WE ARE NEVER AMONG STRANGERS..."

Jesus said to the Canaanite woman, "It is not right to take the food of children and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Please, Lord, for even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters." Matthew 15: 21-28

Many years ago, in a Thailand village, a Buddhist woman named Malai became a Christian at the request of her husband. The village's strict and overly scrupulous priest at the time, a missionary, told Malai that she must never again go inside a Buddhist temple because that would give people the impression that she was not a sincere Christian.

Her elderly mother continued to practice Buddhism. Malai would take her mother to the temple gate, but faithful to the injunction of her pastor, she had to ask strangers to take her mother inside the temple itself and help her light the incense sticks and worship. In Thai society, to take care of one's elders was a sacred responsibility. It broke Malai's heart that she had to rely on the kindness of strangers to assist her mother and could not help her herself. But she obeyed her pastor.

One day while waiting for her mother to return from going inside the temple on the arm of a stranger, Malai began to cry. A Buddhist nun who was sweeping the forecourt of the temple saw her. The nun stopped her sweeping and gently took Malai's arm. The nun asked what was wrong. Malai explained that as a Christian she could not go inside the temple to assist her elderly mother as she prayed. The nun stared for some time at the ground and then responded:

"Those who recognize the Holy and are moved to worship it, are never among strangers, no matter what their religion happens to be. And those who are moved by the Holy to be compassionate are already one family. Do not let your heart be so troubled . . . Mercy has given you the opportunity to allow someone else to perform an act of compassion towards your mother. Is that not beautiful?"

Malai's encounter with the Buddhist nun mirrors the Canaanite woman's exchange with Jesus. In our common search for God in our lives, the labels and stereotypes that separate different classes and religions collapse; the search for meaning and purpose - what the Buddhist nun calls "the Holy" - transforms "strangers" into a community and "family" dedicated to the good of all. Just as the wisdom of the Buddhist nun transforms Malai's perspective of those who help her mother, Jesus' compassion for the Canaanite woman and his healing of her daughter breaks down the wall between Gentile and Jew. The call to discipleship demands that we look beyond labels and stereotypes to realize that every one of us is a child of God, brothers and sisters all.

"YES, BUT NOT WITH THAT BUNCH!"

Billy Graham once told of an incident that happened a long time ago when teachers could talk about religion in the classroom. A teacher was talking to her class of young boys, and she asked, "How many of you would like to go to Heaven?" And all the hands instantly shot into the air at once, except one. She was astounded. She asked, "Charlie, you mean you don't want to go to Heaven?" He said, "Sure, I want to go to Heaven, but not with that bunch!" Unfortunately, that is how many religious groups feel about one another. Consider the Middle East, in parts of Lebanon, Christian militias fighting each other and in Syria and Iraq extremist Muslims driving all Christians from their territories on pain of death, unless they convert; and the never-ending conflict between Arabs and Jews.... All three great Faiths in that part of the world trace their origins through the patriarch Abraham. All three of them honor the Mosaic Law. All three are monotheistic. And yet as the political walls of this world come tumbling down, the religious walls seem to grow higher and higher. How tragic. Today's Gospel tells us how Jesus healed the daughter of a Gentile woman in spite of the religious prejudice of his fellow Jews for the Gentiles.

"WHO IS YOUR MOST FAVORITE CHILD?"

A professor of mine once told me the following story: I'm one of thirteen children. One day when I was playing in the street of our hometown, I got thirsty and came into the house for a glass of water. My father had just come home from work for lunch. He was sitting at the kitchen table with a neighbor. A door separated the kitchen from the pantry and my father did not know I was there. The neighbor said to my father, "Joe, there's something I wanted to ask you for a long time. You have thirteen children. Out of all is there one that is your favorite, one that you love more than all the others?" I had pressed my ear against the door hoping against hope it would be me. My father said: "That's easy. That's Mary the twelve-year-old. She has got braces on her teeth and feels so awkward and embarrassed that she won't go out of the house any more. Oh, but you asked about my favorite. That's my twenty-three-year-old Peter. His fiancée just broke their engagement and he is desolate. But the one I really love most is little Michael. He's totally uncoordinated and terrible in any sport he tries to play. But of course, the apple of my eye is Susan. Only twenty-four, living in her own apartment, and developing a drinking problem, I cry for Susan. But I guess of all the kids.... and my father went on mentioning each of us thirteen children by name.

The professor ended his story saying: "What I learned was that the one my father loved most was the one who needed him most at that time. And that's the way the Father of Jesus is: He loves those most who need Him most, who rely on Him, depend on Him, and trust Him in everything. All that matters is trust. God doesn't wait until we have our moral life straightened out before He starts loving us." (Brennen Manning, taken from *Lion and Lamb*)

RELIGIOUS FANATICISM

A Jewish professor of psychology said of his tradition, "If there are ten Jewish males in a city, we create a synagogue. If there are eleven Jewish males, we start thinking about creating a competing synagogue." A Baptist police officer had a similar tale. He said, "One Baptist family in a neighborhood witnesses until they bring another family to Christ. Then they form a Church, and start witnessing to the rest of the community. When another family joins, they have a schism and form a rival Church." According to a Presbyterian homemaker, her communion was a little like vegetable soup. "We have," she said, "the OPs, RPs, BPs, and Split Peas!" And a Methodist businessman complemented these tales with an apocryphal tale of a man from his Faith community who had been shipwrecked for years on a small island. When found by a passing ship, rescuers asked him why he had constructed three huts, since he was there by himself. "Well," he replied, "that one is my home, that one is my Church, and that one is my former Church." Today's Gospel tells us how Jesus extended his healing mission to the Gentiles too.
