

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends.

Yes Thanksgiving Day is over, but not the Thanksgiving spirit! How do we keep the spirit of Thanksgiving round the year? It is easy to limit thanksgiving to major occasions or events. But we can be conscious of little things for which we can be grateful. Last Sunday was the "World Day of the Poor," a new annual celebration established by Pope Francis at the end of the Jubilee Year of Mercy. What is considered a luxury by the poor in underdeveloped countries is a very ordinary thing that we take for granted here. Even though I myself come from a well-to-do family in South India, we have no hot shower! So when I go home, I need to carry hot water in a big bucket from the kitchen to the bathroom for a hot shower! Thus each time I enjoy a hot shower here at the residence, it has become a habit for me to thank God for it. Similarly the poor in many parts of the world do not have running water at home, multiple pairs of shoes and sandals, dress for all occasions.

That's why I told our Junior High students two Sundays ago, as they were preparing the shoe box for the Operation Christmas Child Shoe Box program, that the things they are putting into that shoe box are very ordinary stuff (pencils, soap, bracelet, bandana, pencil sharpener, duct tape, glue sticks, deck of cards, etc.) that are unavailable to those poor children. All of us can say thank you to God for these everyday things. And if that sounds too mundane or boring, try this: at the end of the day before sleeping, make a mental list of what you are grateful to God for that day. It will be a very good practice for us to always keep a positive attitude of gratitude.

Today's Feast of the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (formerly known as Feast of Christ the King) is the signal that the Church's calendar year is coming to an end and that we are about to start the new year! Thus the First Sunday of the New Year in the Liturgical Calendar is next Sunday as we begin the season of Advent! It is good for us to know that today's feast was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 as an antidote to secularism, a way of life which leaves God out of man's thinking and living and organizes his life as if God did not exist. The feast is intended to proclaim in a striking and effective manner Christ's royalty over individuals, families, society, governments, and nations. May we all recognize this truth and continue our efforts to honor Jesus by living his values in our lives.

WHO ARE THE TERRORISTS OF GOD'S KINGDOM?

These provide new and exciting challenges, new opportunities for us to do, ourselves, what is right and to live out the Truth of Jesus Christ our King, neither compromising with sin nor passing judgment on the motives or guilt of any of our brothers and sisters, but loving and praying for all of us. To ensure that Jesus is always the King of our hearts, we need to make a great commitment to Him and to back that commitment with the necessary sacrifices, conviction, hard work and daily, serious prayer.

HOW DOES THE BREAD AND WINE CHANGE INTO THE BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST?

During the Eucharistic prayer, the priest asks God to send the Holy Spirit and transform the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. This is called transubstantiation. It is the conversion of the substance of the Eucharistic elements into the Body and Blood of Christ at consecration, with only the appearances of bread and wine still remaining.

IS JESUS A KING? YES, BUT A UNIQUE KING!

The New Testament tells us that Jesus is the long-awaited king of the Jews. In the Annunciation, recorded in Lk.1:32-33, we read: "The Lord God will make him a King, as his ancestor David was, and he will be the King of the descendants of Jacob forever and his Kingdom will never end." The Magi from the Far East came to Jerusalem and asked the question: (Mt 2:2) "Where is the baby born to be the King of the Jews? We saw his star... and we have come to worship him." During the royal reception given to Jesus on Palm Sunday, the Jews shouted: (Lk 19:38) "Blessed is the King, who comes in the name of the Lord." When Pilate asked the question: (Jn 18:33) "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus, in the course of their conversation, made his assertion, "You say that I am a King. For this was I born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the Truth. Everyone who belongs to the Truth listens to My Voice" (John 18:37).

A unique King with a unique Kingdom: Jesus Christ still lives as King, in thousands of human hearts all over the world. The cross is his throne and the Sermon on the Mount is his rule of law. His citizens need obey only one law: "Love others as I have loved you" (John 15:12). His love is selfless, sacrificial, kind, compassionate, forgiving and unconditional. That is why the preface in today's Mass describes Jesus' Kingdom as "a Kingdom of truth and life, a Kingdom of holiness and grace, a Kingdom of justice, love and peace." He is a King with a saving and liberating mission: to free mankind from all types of bondage so that we may live peacefully and happily on earth and inherit Eternal Life in Heaven. His rule consists in seeking the lost, offering salvation to those who call out to him and making friends of enemies.

KING WHO CONQUERED DEATH!

Worldly kings do not have this power. Their last enemy is death, which ends their power, wealth, and prestige. In Vienna there is a crypt under a Capuchin church. In this crypt are buried 140 Kings, Queens, Princes and Princesses. Each sarcophagus is sculptured in steel. The largest is a double tomb for Maria Theresa and her husband. On each sarcophagus was carved a cross and the Royal crown. On each corner of one sarcophagus was a skull wearing a crown. The message was clear: Death was king! Even kings are conquered by death. But the King of God's realm lives in spite of death. And so we, as Christians belonging to Him, have no fear of death, for by the power of His cross, death was defeated for us all.

HIGH WAY SUPER SAVIOR!

A Church in Ohio did it with a large icon--a 62-foot-tall statue of Jesus with upraised arms, installed in a cornfield just north of Monroe, Ohio on Interstate 75. The statue--dubbed "Super Savior"-- was erected by the Solid Rock Church, in Middletown. Here is what is interesting. Traffic fatalities on this notorious stretch of road have dropped dramatically since the Super Savior statue was raised. SUNDAY REFLECTION: Putting a Price Tag on Life

The parable of the sheep and the goats: "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25: 31-46

Attorney Kenneth Feinberg served as special master of the Federal September 11 Victim Compensation Fund. He was charged with dispensing money to the families of each person who died in the 9/11 terror attacks. It was, to say the least, a daunting job. Feinberg began administering the funds using a formula based on legal precedent that considered the individual victim's age, dependents, financial assets - and earning potential. The value assigned to those lost lives varied dramatically: as little as \$250,000 for blue-collar workers to as much as \$7 million for CEOs. The process had a dramatic effect on Feinberg himself. He found his personal convictions coming into conflict with the law. In an essay on NPR [May 25, 2008], he said of the work:

"The law required that I give more money to the stockbroker, the bond trader and the banker than to the waiter, the policeman, the fireman, and the soldier at the Pentagon. This is what happens every day in courtrooms throughout the nation. Our system of justice has always been based on this idea: that compensation should be directly related to the financial circumstances of each victim. "But as I met with the 9/11 families and wrestled with the issues surrounding the valuation of lives lost, I began to question this basic premise. Trained in the law, I had always accepted that no two lives were worth the same in financial terms. But now I found the law in conflict with my growing belief in the quality of all life. "Mr. Feinberg, my husband was a fireman and died a hero at the World Trade Center. Why are you giving me less money than the banker who represented Enron? Why are you demeaning the memory of my husband?""

Attorney Feinberg realizes that his response was unconvincing. He was following the law, just as juries did every day. But grieving families couldn't hear it - and, Feinberg said, "I didn't believe it myself." Two years later, Kenneth Feinberg was asked again to design and administer a compensation program: a privately-funded compensation system established for the families and victims of the Virginia Tech shootings. This time citizen Feingold trumped lawyer Feingold: All victims - students and faculty - received the same compensation. "I have resolved my personal conflict and have learned a valuable lesson at the same time," Kenneth Feingold says. "I believe that public compensation should avoid financial distinctions which only fuel the hurt and grief of the survivors. I believe that all lives should be treated the same."

The true value of every human life is the light of the divine that each one of us possesses; our worth is found in the love of God that our lives reveal to the world. Before God, we stand as brothers and sisters; before God, the distinctions of class and culture that separate us disappear; before God, we are all loved without condition and limit. Attorney Feingold, in the difficult role of administering the two compensation funds, realizes that a legal standard cannot measure a true person's "worth," that a life well-lived and faithful has little to do with assets and earning potential. Jesus' parable of the sheep and the goats challenges us to see the world in the light of God's compassion: as a community that is centered in the holiness of God that dwells within every man, woman and child; a community that sees deeper than the externals of race, nationality, culture and language in order to behold the love of God animating the lives of all who draw breath; a community that reflects the compassion and mercy of God in our care for one another.
