FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends,

Next Sunday is the 4th Sunday of Advent but it is also the eve of Christmas! Such proximity happens rarely. That means Christmas is just one week away! Too sudden, we might feel. Not ready, we might cry out! But let us not panic! Instead, we can take hold of the situation, in the words of Julian of Norwich, the medieval Christian mystic who said, "All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of thing shall be well."

There are many different activities that we have both at home and here in the Church that help us live the Advent and Christmas experience. But how we wish for more people to join us! One special intention we had been praying for during our First Friday Holy Hour is for God to touch the hearts of our friends and family members to return to Church. Together with prayer, God needs our active help in this matter. That can be done by our personal invitation. Now is the right time to invite to Church someone you care about. How do you invite? Asking a question would work, "Would you like to come to our church for Christmas Mass?" That simple question may provide motivation for someone who may be missing a parish community. You could offer to accompany them to any of the Christmas Masses. Or even just hand them an invitation card that we have provided in the Narthex to make it nice and simple. Christmas is a wonderful time to reach out to others.

So please take a card or two from the Narthex if you have someone in mind to invite to our Church. By this small gesture, you are doing your part. Leave the rest to God.

Don't think that you will come across as being self-righteous by inviting them. Remember this advice of St. Paul the untiring missionary: "He who started a good work in you will see it to completion on the day of Christ Jesus." (Philippians 1:6). Isn't your desire to have a loved one return to God's family a good thing? Yes it is. So let us do our part and leave it to God to bring that good desire to its completion in God's time!

ARE YOU A HAPPY CHRISTIAN?

There is a story told about a man from Louisville, Kentucky, who had to travel to St. Louis on business. This was years ago when Christians kept Sunday as a very special day. For this man, "keeping the Sabbath," also meant not riding the trains on Sunday. Thus, after he finished up his business late Saturday night, he had to stay over in St. Louis until the following Monday morning. On Sunday morning, he left the hotel looking for a place to worship. The streets were quite deserted, but finally he saw a policeman and asked him for directions to the nearest Church. The stranger thanked the policeman for the information and was about to walk off when he turned and asked the policeman: "Why have you recommended that particular Church? It looks like a Catholic Church. There must be several Churches nearby that you could have recommended." The policeman smiled and replied: "I'm not a Church man myself, but the people who come out of that Church are the happiest looking Church-people in St. Louis and they claim that they have received Jesus and they are happily taking him to their homes. I thought that would be the kind of Church you would like to attend." The Scripture for today reminds us that every Sunday in every Christian church must be a Gaudete Sunday or "Rejoice Sunday."

GIFT ADULT FORMATION- WHAT'S NEW?



ADVENT SUNDAY REFLECTION: He Excelled in Forgery!

John was sent from God . . . to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him.

John 1: 6-8, 19-28

Thousands of French Jews during World War II owe their lives to a dry cleaner's teenage apprentice. Adolfo Kaminsky was 18. Barely escaping internment in a French concentration camp, his father had arranged for his family to adopt false identities and go underground. He sent Adolfo to pick up their new papers from a member of the French resistance. When the resistance member learned that Adolfo had worked at a dry cleaner's, he asked Adolfo if he knew how to "bleach" ink. Adolfo said he did: with lactic acid. Adolfo showed him how to erase the permanent blue ink that marked official documents with the word "Jew." And so began the career of one of the greatest forgers in France during the war. Kaminsky forged perfect identity cards, passports, food ration cards, and birth and marriage certificates. Kaminsky went on to form a team of forgers who created a lab right under the nose of the Nazis in narrow attic in Paris. The neighbors thought they were all painters.

Kaminsky proved to be a genius at using everyday items to create documents that fooled even the most suspicious Nazi official: sewing machines to make "official" looking perforations, salvaged metal to fabricate perfect rubber stamps and watermarks. But there was little joy in it for Kaminsky and his colleagues: "The smallest error and you send someone to prison or death. It's a great responsibility. It's heavy. It's not at all a pleasure." It is estimated that Adolfo Kaminsky's forgeries saved the lives of as many as 14,000 Jewish men, women and children. After the war, Kaminsky spent the next 30 years forging documents for those fleeing every major conflict of the mid-20th century, from the Algerian war of independence to the anti-apartheid struggle in South Africa.

Adolfo Kaminsky never took any payment for his forgeries. He earned a modest living as a photographer. Now 92 years old, Kaminsky is only now telling his story, at his daughter's urging. He says what drove him was his hatred of oppression and injustice against the innocent. He is humbled and happy his work brought freedom and life to so many: "I saved lives because I cannot deal with unnecessary deaths. All humans are equal, whatever their origins, their beliefs, their skin color. There are no superiors, no inferiors . . . "I did what I had to do when I had to . . . and I was lucky to be able to do it."

A young man uses what he learned working at a dry cleaner to "make straight" a horribly crooked path; he risks his life to use his skill to "cry out" against the "desert" of injustice and oppression destroying his country and killing his people. We are all called to this kind of "prophetic" work: to use whatever skills and resources we possess to bring hope into prisons of despair, joy into deserts of sadness, love into hearts and spirits of stone.

WHY IS TODAY "GAUDETE SUNDAY?"

Today is called "Gaudete Sunday" because today's Mass (in its Latin, pre-Vatican II form), began with the opening antiphon: "Gaudete in Domino semper" --"Rejoice in the Lord always." In the past, when Advent was a season of penance, the celebrant of the liturgy used to wear vestments with the penitential color of purple or violet. In order to remind the people that they were preparing for the very joyful occasion of the birth of Jesus, the celebrant wore rose-colored vestments on the third Sunday. (By the way, we have a similar break--Laetare Sunday-during the Lenten season). Today we light the rose candle, and the priest may wear rose vestments, to express our joy in the coming of Jesus, our Savior. The primary common theme running through today's readings is that of encouraging joy as we meet our need for the preparation required of us who await the rebirth of Jesus in our hearts and lives. The second common theme is that of bearing witness. The prophet Isaiah, Mary and John the Baptizer all bear joyful witness to what God has done and will do for His people.

WHY IS IT CALLED THE MASS?

The word Mass comes from the Latin word missa, which means to send. The Mass prepares us spiritually and sends us out to live as authentic followers of Jesus Christ in our everyday lives.

After the Lectio Divina Opening prayer, Pastoral Council had the following items:

- The Council listened to Greg Wilson who spoke about his years in social ministry.
