FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends.

As you read this, I am, God willing, having a nice time with my parents at home in Kerala, South India, and certainly with some real hot weather! During these three weeks of my annual vacation, I am happy and grateful to our Fr. Bill Mickiewicz and Fr. Hugh Grace who graciously agreed to offer the weekend Masses in my absence.

Last Sunday the Catholic Church in the United States began keeping the National Migration Week which culminates this Sunday with the World Day of Migrants and Refugees. It is important for us to remember that for nearly a half century, the US Catholic Church has celebrated National Migration Week, which is an opportunity for the Church to reflect on the circumstances confronting migrants, including immigrants, refugees, children, and victims and survivors of human trafficking. The theme, "Many Journeys, One Family," draws attention to the fact that each of our families have a migration story, some recent and others in the distant past. Regardless of where we are and where we came from, we remain part of the human family and are called to live in solidarity with one another.

Tomorrow is the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr – the Baptist minister and civil-rights activist, who had a seismic impact on race relations in the United States, beginning in the mid-1950s. The King holiday is seen as a day to promote equal rights for all Americans, regardless of their background. Treating all with our God-given dignity and respect is still a challenge for us. That's why the US Bishops Conference recently established an Ad Hoc Committee Against Racism. Here's what the Bishops said:

"Racism has rightly been called America's original sin. It remains a blot on our national life and continues to cause acts and attitudes of hatred, as recent events have made evident. The need to condemn, and combat, the demonic ideologies of white supremacy, neo-Nazism and racism has become especially urgent at this time. Our efforts must be constantly led and accompanied by prayer - but they must also include concrete action. The Executive Committee of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops expresses full agreement with His Eminence Daniel Cardinal DiNardo, USCCB President, in creating the Ad Hoc Committee Against Racism. We also pledge our enthusiastic support to the new committee and its chairman, Bishop George Murry, SJ, as he leads the committee in its work. May God give you, Bishop Murry, the members of the committee, and all those who will support you, the grace and courage to combat this manifestation of evil in our time. May He grant success to the work of your hands. And, through your work and that of many others, may He bring healing and peace to our nation."

We thank God that we are a jubilant community, welcoming and hospitable towards all! Let us continue our efforts to eradicate any form of discrimination or prejudice in our thoughts and actions.

DEANERY PASTORAL COUNCIL: A NEW WAY TO LIVE OUR CATHOLIC FAITH

It's been almost 6 years since I was asked by Fr. Len Rusay to lead a new undertaking, the formation of a new type of council. By now, most of our parishioners are well aware of the existence of our own St. John Neumann Pastoral Council, and over the last decade, many have faithfully and selflessly served at the parish level

After serving 4 years working at establishing and serving on our Pastoral Council, I became involved in a new council format: A Deanery Pastoral Council (in our case, a council comprised of two members from each of the 12 Hunterdon County Catholic Parishes). The idea for this cross parish collaborative process grew out of the Synod directed by Bishop Emeritus Paul Bootkoski, and requested by the lay members of that process.

The process of establishing the Deanery Council has been slow but steady. Initially, due to the uncertainty of the need for a Deanery wide council, many Pastors resisted the appointment of council members. However slowly, and with the support of Fr. Abraham (who was appointed as the religious representative to the council), we obtained full representation and undertook the process to identify opportunities for cross parish cooperation. Our mission statement, one of our first accomplishments, defines our purpose:

The mission of the Round Valley Deanery Pastoral Council is to foster collaboration among our regional Catholic family by exchanging ways to communicate and share insights that lead our parish communities to greater spiritual growth, knowledge of our faith, and sharing of resources.

Some of our major accomplishments include: meeting of the Directors of Religious Education, meeting of the music ministers, production of a Christmas advertisement in the HUNTERDON OBSERVER to promote county wide service attendance, hosting of a youth concert (Array of Hope, attended by over 400 at Immaculate Conception Parish), and our currently scheduled presentation by Fr. James Martin, S.J., well known author and national commentator. This presentation will be held on February 15 at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish in Whitehouse Station. It is my sincere hope that many of our parishioners will seize the opportunity to attend this Lenten program, "A Lenten Reflection on Jesus." There will be no admission fee (free will donations accepted), and several of Fr. Martin's books are available for sale. The Church can accommodate over 600 attendees!

For me, the process of establishing this new council concept has been a mixture of satisfaction and personal growth, combined with a dose of frustration. I have made some wonderful friends who willingly contribute their time and talent to this new idea. But things change very slowly in the Church. Establishing a true collaborative communication process between the laity, a pastor, and groups of pastors takes time. What motivates me to continue this journey is that we, the laity and religious, are the Body of Christ, and it is our responsibility to find new ways to strengthen that Body.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: From Body to Soul!

John was standing with the two disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, "Behold, the Lamb of God." The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus. Jesus turned and saw them following him and said to them, "What are you looking for?"

John 1: 35-42

In his career as a forensic pathologist, Dr. Thomas Andrew thought he had seen it all - but nothing like this. The opioid crisis, he says, is the worst drug epidemic in U.S. history. With 64,000 overdose deaths last year nationwide - a staggering 22 percent jump over the previous year - it is little wonder that overdoses, the leading cause of death among Americans under 50, are reducing life expectancy. These deaths are also straining the staffs and resources of morgues like the one Dr. Andrew directed in New Hampshire - especially New Hampshire, which has more deaths per capita from synthetic opioids than any other state. Dr. Andrew is no longer satisfied with cataloguing the escalating drug toll. He wants to try, in his own small way, to stop it.

After two decades as New Hampshire's chief medical examiner, Dr. Andrew retired last month. But he's not done: His plan is to go from exploring the mysteries of the dead to exploring the mysteries of the soul. In a sharp career turn, he's entering a seminary program to pursue a theology and ministry degree. His ultimate plan is to minister to young people, helping them stay away from the drugs he has found to be the cause of so many deaths. "After seeing thousands of sudden, unexpected or violent deaths, I have found it impossible not to ponder the spiritual dimension of these events for both the deceased and especially those left behind," Dr. Andrew says. Dr. Andrew developed an appreciation for the essence of life by seeing its fragility. Most of the nearly 5,800 people he examined on his stainless-steel autopsy table "woke the day they died oblivious to the fact that it would their last on earth."

In the morgue, Dr. Andrew learned to cope with the full immersion of death by compartmentalizing what he saw and "locking it away." But after a while, he found, one is bound to ask, What's all this about? What am I contributing here? What difference does this make? "You realize you've got x amount of gas left in the tank, and either I could choose to limp through this another 10 years and see where this goes on the accounting end, or I could finally attack this by way of extension ministry to youth, outside the four walls of a church. If you can instill moral and ethical values in young people that it can somehow help to inoculate them from that other so-called friend of theirs who's going to come up to them in middle school with the weed or the pill or heaven forbid that packet of powder, then you have maybe saved that one starfish off the beach."

Throughout our lives we wrestle with the question that Dr. Andrew has asked in his work as a pathologist and that Jesus asks of his prospective followers: What are you looking for? The answer is not to be found in instant gratification or amassing things; what we want our lives to become begins in the values of the heart and soul, in the happiness we choose to embrace. The Jesus we will meet in Mark's Gospel in the weeks ahead is the very word of God made human for us and like us in order to show us how to realize the love that God breathed into our souls at birth, the love that makes us completely human as God envisioned us to be.

YOU NEVER INVITED ME IN 20 YEARS!

Two men, who had been business partners for over twenty years, met one Sunday morning as they were leaving a restaurant. One of them asked, "Where are you going this morning?" "I'm going to play golf. What about you?" The first man responded rather apologetically, "I'm going to Church." The other man said, "Why don't you give up that Church stuff?" The first man asked, "What do you mean?" His partner said: "Well, we have been partners for twenty years. We have worked together, attended board meetings together, and had lunch together, and all of these twenty years you have never asked me about going to Church. You have never invited me to go with you. Obviously, it doesn't mean that much to you." (John A. Stroman, *God's Downward Mobility*, CSS Publishing Company) Don't get yourself in that fix. Don't let others think your Faith doesn't matter that much to you.

SOMETHING NEW


