FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends.

This week during the 5:30pm Mass and the 10:30am Mass we have a Rite called 'Scrutiny' for the 'Catechumen' who are in the RCIA process in our parish. Are all these strange terms for us? I think we will all remember

that RCIA stands for the "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults." This year we are privileged to have our parishioners Chris, Shannon, Jennifer, Michelle, Tanya and Michelle in the RCIA session that meets weekly to prepare themselves to receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation) at the Easter Vigil this year. 'Catechumen' is the term used for an unbaptized person who is attending this preparation in RCIA, and 'Candidate' is the term used for a baptized person who did not receive Eucharist or Confirmation.

Today we have the rite called 'scrutiny' which, as the official Book of Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, explains, is " meant to uncover, and then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life." (no.141) Essentially, it is composed of prayers of intercession and the laying on of hands so that the Holy Spirit may be invoked that they are freed from the spirit of evil. This rite is celebrated purposefully at Mass, so that the whole congregation is given the opportunity to pray for and support those preparing for the Easter sacraments and to make the point that conversion is not only a personal matter but a communal commitment.

As I invite you to pray for our Catechumens and Candidates, let me remind all of us that this Rite of Scrutiny is also an opportunity for the rest of us, to selfexamine and see the need for healing in our weakness, detect the sinful habits in our lives and to nourish the good within us so that we can bear good fruits for Christ. Lent is the time to learn from our mistakes of over-indulgence in food, drink. drugs, gambling, promiscuity, anger, revenge, gossip, slander, criticism or any other addictive habit that may keep us from coming to the *living waters* of a right relationship with God. We all have our short list, don't we? And we all know, honest to God, what it is we need to leave behind before we come to the Living Water and the Bread of Heaven – as the Samaritan woman of today's gospel shows us. May this be a time for reinforcing our decision to live the Lenten discipline we chose always trusting in Jesus who is our best friend (John 15:15).

Parish News A DIFFERENT APPROACH TO FASTING!

Lenten fasts have a tendency to be oriented toward things like giving up food or television. But there are many other creative ways we can welcome Jesus' healing touch this Lent. Below are some suggestions you may want to consider.

Fast from anger and hatred. Give your family an extra dose of love each day.

Fast from judging others. Before making judgments, recall how Jesus overlooks our faults.

Fast from discouragement. Hold on to Jesus' promise that he has a perfect plan for your life (Jer. 29:11).

Fast from complaining. When you find yourself about to complain, close your eyes and recall some of the little moments of joy Jesus has given you.

Fast from resentment or bitterness. Work on forgiving those who may have hurt you.

Fast from spending too much money. Try to reduce your spending by ten percent and give these savings to the poor.

May the Lord "who began a good work in you bring it to completion" (Philippians 1:6). Happy Lent!

IS THERE MORE THAN ONE WAY TO HEAVEN?

Around the world of religion today, there are about 2 billion Christians, 1 billion Muslims, 750 million Hindus, 334 million Buddhists, 18 million Jews, and a growing number of people who declare no religious allegiance at all. Once upon a time, religious tolerance consisted of Baptists having a worship service with Methodists or a Protestant marrying a Roman Catholic. Now a Hindu may be your next door neighbor or a Baha'i may be dating your daughter. All of us down in our hearts are trying to decide whether we love or hate Muslims. The religious marketplace has become complex. At the crossroads of Faith, we Christians must now consider our relationships with people of other religions. Tibetan leader, His Holiness Dalai Lama says, "All religions are essentially the same in their goal of developing a good human heart that we may become better human beings." As the conversation between Jesus and the woman at the well described in today's Gospel becomes intimate, the woman creates distance by introducing a religious debate: "Is there more than one way to Heaven?" Jesus clarifies that He who she is talking to is the Messiah. Later in the same gospel Jesus reaffirmed that He is the way, the truth and life (John 14:6).

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS INDICATOR!

On 3rd February 1959, 10.000 meters above the Atlantic, Captain Lynch took a last look at the flight panel of the Boeing 707. The co-pilot was studying a map. Captain Lynch decided to stretch his legs, thinking that the worst was over. Shortly after leaving Paris they had run into a 120-kph headwind. But by now they had climbed above the storm. The captain made his way down the aisle. Just then the Captain felt the right-wing tip and he was thrown against the seats on the right hand side. At the same moment all the lights in the plane went out. Next, he found himself lying on the floor. But then he realized it was the ceiling he was on. The Boeing was on its back. He began to make his way back to the cockpit. He decided to try to hold the plane at 2,000 meters. The co-pilot had been knocked unconscious. He came to again and he and the captain managed to bring the Boeing to the horizontal. A few more seconds and the plane would have crashed. The whole incident lasted four minutes. What caused it? While the co-pilot was studying the map, he did not notice the blue light on the indicator panel warning that the automatic pilot had stopped working. God has given us an indicator panel to guide us through life. That indicator panel is the Commandments. The Commandments are a gift from God to help us enjoy life by not getting lost along the way.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: "Unleavening"

It's the custom in Jewish households just before Passover to remove all the *chametz*, the leaven, from their homes. It means getting rid of any food made of grain and water that is allowed to ferment and rise: bread, cereal, cake, cookies, pasta, beer. *Chametz* is the opposite of *matzo*, the unleavened flat bread eaten by the Israelites the night before their escape from Egypt.

On the last days before Passover, Jewish families thoroughly clean their homes especially the kitchen - of every bit of *chametz*. Because chametz is such a big part of our diets, getting rid of chametz is not a simple task. Every carpet is vacuumed and every floor is swept. Every surface is scrubbed clean with boiling water. Some parents hide pieces of bread throughout the house and, the night before Passover, send their children to find them, to make them part of the ritual of Passover house cleaning.

Whatever food with *chametz* is found is either given away or burned. A separate set of pots, dishes and cutlery are brought out for Passover.

The point of the Passover "unleavening" is to experience again the "newness" of what God has done: freeing his people from slavery and bringing them into a new land of promise and hope. This act of preparing for Passover invites Jews to remove the "spiritual" leaven from their lives as well as the physical stuff. If leaven is the agent for making bread rise, think of *chametz* as the puffy, overextended, inflated parts of our ego. Passover calls us to clean away those distractions and let go of our illusions about ourselves and embrace, instead, the spirit of the humble *matzo*.

As we prepare this Lent to celebrate Christ's "passing over" from the cross to resurrection, may we embrace the spiritual practice of "unleavening" of our Jewish brothers and sisters: to sweep away the *chametz* of business-as-usual that distracts us and takes our time and energy away from realizing the love of God that is at the center of Christ's death and resurrection; to set aside the time to enter fully and prayerfully the Easter mysteries to understand anew the meaning of Jesus' passion in our own lives. Over this second half of Lent, may we "sweep our houses" of the unnecessary and distracting chametz in our lives and embrace the humility and joy of the *matzo* in order to fully experience Easter re-creation in our hearts and homes.
