FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends.

In the name of all of you, I am very happy to welcome our dear Bishop Checchio to our Parish Community. His desire to preside at our 10:30 Mass this Sunday is another sign of his pastoral outreach to be in touch with all the parishioners of the Diocese as its Chief Shepherd.

Though today is "Laetare Sunday" (Rejoice Sunday), one could argue that the past week's weather did not give us much to rejoice about. The vast majority of us had to suffer lots of inconveniences due to the prolonged power outage and another storm that followed it. Such an experience helps us all the more to appreciate the relevance of this Rejoice Sunday: the love God has for us is stronger than any trials, hardships, or sufferings we endure because God's love is constant while all the rest is temporary. That itself is cause for joy. Yes, let us rejoice, as the first word in the introductory antiphon for today's Liturgy, (based on the words of Isaiah 66:10) reminds us.

Today's gospel gives us further reason to rejoice. John 3:16 is probably the best loved verse in the Bible and it has been called "everybody's text" and the "Gospel of the Gospels." "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." This is the summary of the Gospel message of salvation through Christ Jesus. This text is the very essence of the Gospel. It is certainly good news that God loved the world so much! It tells us that the initiative in all salvation is God's love for us. As St. Augustine puts it: "God loves each one of us as if there were only one of us to love." It also explains to us the universality of the love of God. After the great flood, God made the covenant not only with us humans, but also with the earth and all living creatures (see Genesis 9:8-15). This is why we Catholics consider the world as good; the earth is good. Let us rejoice and do everything in our power to preserve this goodness within us and radiate it to the world around us.

WHY CONFESSION? WEDNESDAY MARCH 14TH 7PM

Penance, aka confession, is the sacrament of the forgiveness of sin. You can't beat it for convenience. It's available practically whenever. Tell a priest you want to go to confession and you'll get his attention. One bishop I know was cornered on an airplane. Another passenger figured out what was going on and asked if he could confess too. It must have been an interesting game of musical seats. An interesting question for priests might be: Where was the strangest place you ever administered the sacrament of penance? The answers I've gathered include "in a sports bar, at a graduation party" and "on the golf course, walking up the fairway." Confession has benefits. Here are two:

- 1. Confidentiality guaranteed. There's nothing like confessing your sins to someone guaranteed not to tell anyone else. Sometimes you need to talk in absolute confidence. Even under subpoena, a priest can't tell anyone what's said to him in confession. He can't even hint at it. Now that's confidentiality.
- 2. Housekeeping for the soul. It feels good to be able to start a clean life all over again. Like going into a sparkling living room in your home, it's nice when clutter is removed even if it's your own.

THE MOST FAMOUS QUOTE FROM THE BIBLE!

A number of years ago, these two verses, John 3:16 and John 3:17, took on extraspecial meaning for many Bible readers. You may recall the episode. It involved our astronaut program. Space engineers were designing space suits for the command module pilot and the lunar module pilot. A part of the design of each space suit was an umbilical cord, consisting of a long flexible tubing. The purpose of the umbilical cord was to supply oxygen to the astronauts when they "walked" in space or passed from one module to another. The suit receptacle into which the command pilot's cord fit was called J 3:16. Designer Frank Denton said he named the two suit receptacles after the two gospel passages: John 3:16 and John 3:17. Just as J 3:16 and J 3:17 supply the astronauts with what they need to survive in their journey from one module to another, so John 3:16 and John 3:17 supply us with what we need to survive in our journey from earth to heaven.

NICODEMUS IN ART

One of Rembrandt's most famous etchings portrays the scene. The limp, dead body of Jesus was slowly taken down from the cross. Joseph of Arimathea, dressed as the person that he was, in all his finery, stands close by. In the darkness, further away, veiled in shadow as only Rembrandt could do it, with his face lined in sorrow, is Nicodemus. He is holding in his hands the linen cloth in which Jesus' body would be buried. The Gospel says that Nicodemus also brought with him a mixture of spices, myrrh and aloes, "about a hundred pounds". One wonders what Nicodemus must have been thinking as he stood there, waiting for the body of Christ to be taken down from the cross. Obviously, much was going on in his life -- this wealthy man, bringing fine linen and a bountiful amount of expensive spices to anoint the body of one who had died as a common criminal. Was he still mystified as he had been when Jesus told him that he must be born again? Was he still puzzled by the response of Jesus when he pressed his question about how one could be born again? Jesus' answer had been totally unsatisfying for his rational mind: "The Spirit blows where it wills -- you feel it, and you hear the sound of it -but you don't know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit."

NEW JOY IN PRAYING AS A FAMILY!

Mother Teresa was interviewed on American television a few years ago. She said, "It is very, very important, that the families teach their children to pray and pray with them." Then she added, "And we have enough reason to trust God, because when we look at the cross, we understand how much Jesus loved us. It is wonderful to be able to come to Jesus! That's why God made Him – to be our bread of life, to give us life! And with His life comes new life! New energy! New peace! New joy! New everything! And I think that's what brings glory to God, also, and it brings peace." Then she said, "I've seen families suffer so much, and when they've been brought to Jesus, it changes their whole lives." I have also seen lives changed by the power of the cross. Have you? *Today's Gospel gives a parallel between the bronze serpent erected by Moses to heal the Israelites bitten by snakes and Jesus raised on the cross to save mankind.*

SUNDAY REFLECTION: Nicodemus learns how to be born again

Nicodemus, the wealthy Pharisee and member of the Sanhedrin, meets Jesus by night and begins a long religious discussion. But Jesus interrupts him, stating that he had to be reborn. This confused him totally. How can a person be reborn from his mother again! Jesus clarified that he meant rebirth by water and the Spirit as an essential condition for entering the Kingdom of God. Jesus explains to him that Nicodemus must believe Jesus' words because he is the Son of God. Jesus further explains God's plan of salvation by referring to the story of Moses and the brazen serpent. He also reveals the Good News that God will show His love for mankind by subjecting His own Son to suffering and death.

One rainy Sunday afternoon, a little boy was bored and his father was sleepy. The father decided to create an activity to keep the kid busy. So, he found in the morning newspaper a large map of the world. He took scissors and cut it into a good many irregular shapes like a jigsaw puzzle. Then he said to his son, "See if you can put this puzzle together. And don't disturb me until you're finished." He turned over on the couch, thinking this would occupy the boy for at least an hour. To his amazement, the boy was tapping his shoulder ten minutes later telling him that the job was done. The father saw that every piece of the map had been fitted together perfectly. "How did you do that?" he asked. "It was easy, Dad. There was a picture of a man on the other side. When I put him together right, the world was right."

A person's world can never be right until he or she is right, and that requires the miracle of new birth. Don't you dare stop asking God for the experience of new birth until you can shout from the housetops, "Through Jesus Christ, God has fundamentally changed my life!" This is what Nicodemus had to learn from Jesus.

The renewal of the Spirit comes when we work with Him to be liberated from the bondage of evil habits by using the Divine strength we receive through prayer, Bible reading and frequenting the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Holy Eucharist.

2018 BEREAVEMENT GROUP TO MEET AT ST. JOHN'S

There will be a series of interrelated bereavement seminars at St. John Neumann beginning March 20th. John Cole, transition professional, will facilitate the sessions. This short-term program has been highly rated as helpful by past participants. The conversations will take us from understanding loss and normal reactions to steps, guided by faith, towards acceptance and the recreation of hopeful lives. While a primary focus is the death of a significant other, those who have experienced severe loss because of divorce, separation, or other substantial life altering events are welcomed. All sessions are on Tuesdays and start at 7 p.m. The dates of the seminars will be March 20, 27; April 10, 17; May 1, 8. Please note that each session builds on the prior one.
