FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends,

Should we say, "Lent is over, Alleluia!" or "He is Risen, Alleluia!"? We can truly be happy that our Lenten efforts can be celebrated with Easter, the most important feast of Christians. Easter brings so many promises of God to us: life is stronger than death, love can overcome hate, goodness ultimately triumphs over evil, and eternal glory with God in Heaven is our destiny.

The historical evidence for Jesus of Nazareth is both long-established and widespread. Besides the personal testimony of many in the New Testament, Jesus is mentioned by Jewish and Roman historians, as well as by dozens of Christian writings. These establish the historicity of Jesus beyond doubt. Compare that with, for example, King Arthur, who supposedly lived around AD500. The major historical source for events of that time does not even mention Arthur, and he is first referred to 300 or 400 years after he is supposed to have lived. The evidence for Jesus is not limited to later folklore, as are accounts of Arthur. Hence any challenge to the reality of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus is not entertained in educated circles.

But the resurrection of Jesus from the dead is not simply a fact of history to be retold at Easter. The retelling we had these past days of the Holy Week is meant to remind us that this happy mystery is to be lived everyday. We congratulate our parishioners who received the Easter Sacraments during the Vigil Service. Their joyful expectation bore fruit as they are now full-fledged members of our parish community. Their joy is reminiscent of the joy of the disciples and early Christians who realized that Jesus was alive and well!

Like the first disciples, we too know that Jesus is not found among the dead but among the living. He lives among us whenever we gather in His name: not only when we celebrate the Eucharist or for Lenten faith sharing groups, but also when we come together for every association or ministry meeting and whenever we organize any parish event or activity. He is present in our homes when we gather as a family not only for meals or prayer, but also for any family event. When we reach out to the less fortunate and help people in need, it is the hand of Jesus that we lift up. In these and many other ways, we give witness to the mystery of Jesus living among us. Indeed, we become the Body of Christ for the world.

Let us experience more of that Easter Joy! Easter Blessings to you and to your dear ones! Yes, we are an Easter People!

JESUS IS UNIQUE!

E.P. Sanders (Jewish NT scholar, professor at Duke): "On a spring morning in about the year 30 C.E., three men were executed by the Roman authorities in Judea. Two were 'brigands' ... the third was executed as another type of political criminal. He had not robbed, pillaged, murdered, or even stored arms. He was convicted, however, of having claimed to be 'king of the Jews'-a political title. Those who looked on... doubtless thought that... the world would little note what happened that spring morning... it turned out, of course, that the third man, Jesus of Nazareth, would become one of the most important figures in human history." [The Historical Figure of Jesus (Penguin Books, 1995) 1.]

EASTER SUNDAY REFLECTION: Unlocking the Music!

"You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified. He has been raised; he is not here." Mark 16: 1-7

He was a software engineer by profession - but music was his passion. An accomplished pianist, he composed marvelous pieces. He wrote his first song to impress a girl in his class. And she was impressed. They were 15. They married five years later and have been together 46 years. Then one day he sat down at the piano to play. He started a song, but stopped. How did it go? He couldn't remember. It happened again and again. It was the first sign that he had Alzheimer's disease. All those years, he never wrote or recorded any of his songs. Every note and phrase and chord progression were in his head. And soon it would be lost forever. Another piece of this husband and dad would be lost.

One day, his daughter confided to her best friend what was happening to her father. Her friend was an extraordinary musician and pianist: she possessed the rare of gift of being able to hear a piece of music once and play it. She offered to work with her friend's father to reconstruct his music. After much prodding, the father agreed. Each time they met, he would play whatever notes he could remember and she would play them back; she would suggest various paths and would begin reconstructing the piece. She immediately understood his music - she found hints of themes, counter themes, harmonies and rhythms. She found his music beautiful - and worth saving.

For two years they worked together every other week. With the help of some of her musician friends, they recorded a CD of his music. She also convinced him to compose one last song. With her help, he composed a piece called "Melancholy Flower." The Oregon Repertory Singers included it in their 2016 Christmas concert. For the first time, one of his songs would be performed in public. Despite all that Alzheimer's had taken from him, the music of his soul would live on.

The compassion and dedication of a young musician helps preserve the music locked in the brain of its composer suffering from Alzheimer's. Her work is the work of Easter: to open tombs; to restore life to the lost, the despairing, the forgotten; to free the dead from the shackles of hopelessness. The empty tomb of Easter morning is God's vindication of his Son's life among us: that no tomb can contain the mercy and hope of God. May we be about the work of Easter: to unlock the music of God's peace in our lives that has for too long been entombed by fear, anger and hurt.

If someone challenges you to prove the resurrection of Jesus, here are TEN good answers: (1)Jesus himself testified to his Resurrection from the dead (Mark 8:31; Matthew 17:22; Luke 9:22). (2) The tomb was empty on Easter Sunday (Luke 24:3). Although the guards claimed (Matthew 28:13) that the disciples of Jesus had stolen the body, every sensible Jew knew that it was impossible for the terrified disciples of Jesus to steal the body of Jesus from a tomb guarded by an armed, 16-member Temple Guard detachment. (3) The initial disbelief of Jesus' own disciples in His Resurrection, in spite of His repeated apparitions, serves as a strong proof of His Resurrection. Their initial disbelief explains why the Apostles started preaching the Risen Christ only after receiving the anointing of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. (4) The transformation of Jesus' disciples: Jesus' Resurrection and the anointing of the Holy Spirit transformed men who were hopeless and fearful after the crucifixion (Luke 24:21, John 20:19), into men who now were confident and bold witnesses to the Resurrection (Acts 2:24, 3:15, 4:2). (5) Neither the Jews nor the Romans could disprove Jesus' Resurrection by presenting the dead body of Jesus. (6) The Apostles and early Christians would not have faced martyrdom if they were not absolutely sure of Jesus' Resurrection. (7) The Apostle Paul's conversion from a persecutor of Christians to a zealous preacher of Jesus supports the truth of Jesus' Resurrection (Galatians 1:11-17, Acts 9:1, Acts 9:24-25, Acts 26:15-18). (8) The sheer existence of a thriving, empire-conquering early Christian Church, bravely facing and surviving three centuries of persecution, supports the truth of the Resurrection claim. (9) The New Testament witnesses do not bear the stamp of dupes or deceivers. The Apostles and the early Christians were absolutely sure about the Resurrection of Jesus. (10) If Jesus had not been raised bodily from the dead, Christianity would never have survived as a Messianic movement on a lie!

HE IS RISEN INDEED!

You probably do not remember the name Nikolai Ivanovich Bukharin. Many years ago, he was one of the most powerful men on earth. A Russian Communist leader, he took part in the Bolshevik Revolution of 1917. He was the editor of the Soviet newspaper *Pravda* and was a full member of the Politburo. His works on economics and political science are still read today. There is a story told about a journey he took from Moscow to Kiev in 1930 to address a huge assembly of Communists. The subject was atheism. Addressing the crowd, he attacked Christianity, hurling insults and arguments against it. When he had finished, he looked out at the audience. "Are there any questions?" he demanded. Deafening silence filled the lectern. After surveying the crowd, he shouted the ancient greeting of the Russian Orthodox Church: "CHRIST IS RISEN!" The crowd stood up and shouted in a thundering voice: "HE IS RISEN INDEED!" Amazed and dejected, Bukharin left the stage in silence. Finally, he had learned the lesson that Faith in Christ's Resurrection was deeply rooted in his Russian Orthodox Communist followers!




