#### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK....

Dear Friends.

As you know, six of our parishioners Shannon, Michelle, Jennifer, Chris, Tanya and Michelle received the Easter Sacraments during the Easter Vigil and you may have seen their pictures in the narthex with "Congratulations to our neophytes." I was glad when some of you asked me last Sunday the meaning of "neophytes." A Neophyte (its Greek root means the newly planted) is a person who has been initiated as full members of a religion like Christianity or Judaism or one who has joined a religious order. In our context, a neophyte is one who has been incorporated into the fullness of the life of the Church as the Body of Christ. The highlight of these six friends of ours was the reception of the Easter Sacraments. Now they enter into the final phase of the RCIA process which is known as Mystagogy, which simply means learning about the mysteries. The RCIA instruction no.244 says: "This is a time for the community and the neophytes together to grow in deepening their grasp of the paschal mystery and in making it part of their lives through meditation on the Gospel, sharing in the eucharist, and doing the works of charity. ...."

What is interesting is that the Church's focus of the mystagogy is us, the Community into which these six have been incorporated! This means that mystagogy is a time for us all to grow in understanding the paschal mystery. Hence we see the Easter/Paschal Candle lit at every Mass. The Sundays after Easter are named 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Easter, 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Easter, etc. The entire purpose of the RCIA process is to lead the participants into a relationship of communion and intimacy with Jesus.

This is another way of saying that we are all called to be holy. On April 9, the Vatican released the latest Apostolic Exhortation from Pope Francis: *Gaudete et exsultate* (Rejoice and be glad): On the call to holiness in today's world. In his third Apostolic Exhortation (following *Evangelii gaudium* and *Amoris laetitia*) Pope Francis explains his intention: "My modest goal is to repropose the call to holiness in a practical way for our own time." We will reflect more about this short (under 40 pages only) but important document which is easily readable in one sitting!

Let us remember that we are the models and torchbearers of Christian witness and experience to the neophytes as well as to all those we meet in our daily living. The Sunday Mass is key to a successful mystagogy because the three ways mentioned above – meditation on the Gospel and sharing in the Eucharist which leads us to the works of charity – are meant for the whole community's full, conscious and active participation. Our Sunday worship here at St. John's is truly vibrant, participative and prayerful as we experience fellowship with God and with one another in love and joy. Let us continue this good practice and make mystagogy a fruitful time for all of us.

#### A SCIENTIST WHO PRAYED THE ROSARY!

A train was racing for Paris. In one of its compartments two men sat opposite each other. The first was a young medical research student who was bored by the long journey. The other was an old man reciting his rosary with closed eyes. The young researcher began to ridicule the old man for his superstitious beliefs. He then went on to tell of the wonders of medical science. The old man just nodded, smiled and continued his prayer in spite of the humiliating comments of his fellow passenger. When they reached the Paris station, the old man enquired where the youngster was going. The young man proudly announced that he was going to attend a lecture by the world-famous scientist, Louis Pasteur. The old man took out a visiting card from his pocket, gave it to the young man and bid him farewell. The card read: "Dr. Louis Pasteur, Academy of Science, Paris."

Pride and prejudice often blur our vision and occasionally blind us to reality, leading us to wrong judgments as it happened to the apostles in today's Gospel. The same Jesus who, in the Upper Room, prepared his disciples for their preaching and witnessing mission, is present with us in the Eucharistic celebration. He invites us to share in the "Liturgy of the Word of God" and in "The Liturgy of Bread and Wine." In the first part of the Mass, Jesus speaks to us through the "Word of God." In the second part, He becomes our spiritual food and drink. Thus, today's Gospel scene is repeated every Sunday on our parish altars. Like the early disciples, we come together to repent of our sins, express our thanks for the blessings we have received, listen to God's words and offer ourselves to God on the altar along with our gifts of bread and wine. We also share in the spiritual food Jesus supplies, and we are sent to share his message with the entire world.

#### "THAT'S IT!"

There is a beautiful love story. It concerns the love of Paul Tournier, one of the world's most beloved and respected Christian doctors, for his wife Nelly. In one of his books, Tournier describes how he and Nelly were able to talk about death after her first serious bout with coronary thrombosis while they were in Greece. She knew how gravely ill she was and that a second attack could leave her severely handicapped or could even be fatal. Their last month together was a time of intimate sharing. On the last day she said to him, "Perhaps it would have been better if I had died of my heart attack a month ago." Tournier responded, "And yet my Greek colleagues have done a good job. They saved your life. You are glad of that." "Yes, of course," she said, "if I can get back to Geneva and see my children and grandchildren." She was silent for a moment, and then added, "But if I had died, I should be in Heaven now, and I should be meeting your parents." Tournier was touched by this. He writes, "You see, she also married my expectation of Heaven!" He replied to her, "Well, when you arrive in Heaven, my parents will thank you for having been the wife that you have been for their son." It was to be Tournier's last words to her. A moment later she put her hand on her heart and exclaimed, "That's it!" He asked, "Are you sure?" She answered "Yes." And she was in Heaven. #### SUNDAY REFLECTION: Bill's Last Gift, Best Gift

"...a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." Luke 24: 35-48

Thirteen years ago, Tracy Grant's husband of 19 years was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer. Tracy became Bill's faithful caregiver. Over the course of seven months, her husband Bill "went from beating me silly at tennis to needing my help to go to the bathroom." It was a difficult, stressful and exhausting time, but Tracy, a deputy managing editor at The Washington Post, writes that those seven months were the time in her life when she felt "most alive." "I was 42 years old. I had become a respected professional, a responsible and, I hope, loving parent. But I had to discover the reason I was on this earth. During those seven months, I came to understand that whatever else I did in my life, nothing mattered more.

"I discovered that the petty grievances of an irksome coworker, a child with the sniffles, or a flat tire pales in comparison with the beauty of spontaneous laughter, the night sky, the smells of a bakery. There were moments of joy, laughter, and tenderness everyday - if I was willing to look hard enough. I found I could train myself to set my internal barometer to be more compassionate than callous. "In the days following Bill's diagnosis and brain surgery, being his caregiver required me to be the best reporter I knew how to be. I found clinical trials and talked to oncologists in Texas, Pennsylvania, and New York. It gave me a sense of purpose, and it gave Bill comfort - and a few chuckles - to overhear me reading the riot act to some insurance rep who'd told me a treatment wouldn't be covered."

And now, 13 years after Bill's death, Tracy looks at those last seven months with gratitude. ". . . I haven't started a foundation to cure cancer. I haven't left the news business to get a medical degree. I work. I try to be there for my sons. I will never again have that high a purpose. But every day, I try again to be the person I became during those seven months. I try to be a little less judgmental, a little more forgiving and generous, a little more grateful for the small moments in my life. I am a better person for having been Bill's caregiver. It was his last, best give to me."

Wherever and whenever true love is present, resurrection is experienced. Tracy experiences that sense of resurrection in her caring for her husband and it changes her in profound and beautiful ways. And, whether she realizes it or not, her loving generosity is a "witness" to the possibilities for such resurrection in her life and the lives of those she loves.
