

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Friends,

Few weeks ago we offered Mass for our moms and celebrated them. Today, as we celebrate Father's Day, we are doing the same - offering our dads, living or dead, on the altar of God during this Holy Mass and invoking our heavenly Father's blessings on them. At a time when the Fathers' role in the family and in the society is not fully appreciated, it is good that today we can celebrate, congratulate and pray for the men who continue to reflect the Divine qualities of fatherhood as they lovingly establish, nourish and maintain their families.

Lucille Ball, who became one of America's top comedic actresses with the 1950s TV show I Love Lucy, did a remarkable TV interview with Merv Griffin shortly before her death. He asked her a very serious and pointed question: "Lucille, you've lived a long time on this earth and you are a wise person. What's happened to our country? What's wrong with our children? Why are our families falling apart? What's missing?" Lucille Ball answered without hesitation: "Papa's missing. Things are falling apart because Papa's gone. If Papa were here he would fix it."

Her pertinent comment has been confirmed with some recent studies that have demonstrated how important a father is to his child's development. Children with fathers present have lower rates of delinguency, drug and alcohol use, teen pregnancy, and so on, than those with absent fathers. The father's presence is also a significant positive factor in children's getting a college education, finding a satisfying job, and making a lasting marriage. Psychotherapists today are saying that both parents are vitally important to the stable development of their children; the mother's input is invaluable in the formative pre-adolescent years but the father's most important influence is at adolescence. Single mothers tell us that it is terribly difficult to teach their children about the meaning of God the Father Who seems so impersonal because their children have been abandoned by their natural fathers. Adolescent daughters long to hear from their fathers that they are beautiful and loved. In fact, a girl's choice of partner and satisfaction in marriage is often directly related to the relationship she has had with her father.

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the vital importance of the father's role comes from the fact that, with his wife, he cooperates with God the *Creator* in bringing a new human life into the world. There is no power greater than that (#2367). I invite us all to have a look at a few Biblical references to fathers: Genesis 2:24, Exodus 20:12, Ezekiel 19:19-20, Sirach 3:1 16, Matthew 19:16-22, John 1:14, 2 Cor. 6:16-18, Ephesians 6: 1-4, 1 Thess. 2:11 - 12.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: A Bowl of the Seasons

"[The kingdom of God] is like a mustard seed . . . the smallest of all the seeds on earth [but] springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade." Mark 4: 26-34

The bowl sat on the piano in the center of their farmhouse. Their mother had placed a large fluted glass vase in the center; the vase was large enough to hold entire branches. The bowl reflected the unfolding of each season: silver pussy willows in March, apple blossoms in May, ivory dogwood and magnolia branches in the summer, oak leaves in the fall, holly and red berries at Christmas. The bowl was her pride and the seasonal centerpiece of the house - but she insisted that the bowl hold only what she and her children cut and gathered from the land around them. Gifts of flowers from family and friends would be placed elsewhere in the house; the bowl in the heart of their home was reserved for the beauty around them.

Filling the bowl during the year was a family adventure. Writing in The Boston Globe [March 28, 2018], Leila Philip of the College of the Holy Cross, remembers those walks with her mother and siblings:

"Like most things in a large family, getting out of the house involved a great deal of bustle and excitement, and hullabaloo - the finding of socks and boots, hats and lost mittens, the calling of the dogs, does someone have clippers? - then off we'd go.

"When I was younger, I thought my mother's insistence of never buying cut flowers was another facet of her inherited thrift. A child in the Depression, a teenager at the outbreak of World War II, a professor's daughter, my mother was generous, but rarely bought luxuries. It wasn't until she died that I realized that her bowl and our seasonal walks through the farm were her way of teaching us how to have a connection to the natural world around us, and an awareness of the seasons, our planet's movement, and ours, through time. "It's been a year since my mother died, and I'm nowhere near ready to let her go. I walk down our road to a neighbor's farm, looking for glimmers of silver pussy willows in the swamp, the way my mother taught me."

A mother teaches her children to appreciate the gifts of God in their midst in their walks on their farm and through the woods and pond near their home. The bowl and its contents reflected the spirit of gratitude for the lives each member of the family had been given by God and the bounty of the earth to sustain their lives. Jesus calls us to embrace the joy of such gratitude: though we "know not how" God makes the grain grow and the sun rise and the rain fall, we do know <u>why</u>: all of creation, the perfect and complete love that is and of God that compels God to set all of creation into motion and to breathe that love into our souls and set us on this life of ours.

<u>RCIA</u>

If you came for the Easter Vigil, you saw some of our adult parishioners receiving the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Communion. They had undertaken a process known as the *Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)* for about 10 months. There are weekly gatherings where people come together to share, grow, and understand the Catholic faith. These are not classes but a faith-sharing group.
