FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Friends.

This is the sixth year the Knights of Columbus Council 10627 High Bridge has presented the Joseph F. Labuta Memorial Scholarship Awards to our parish high school seniors. We are grateful to the Knights who chose three of our parish youth for this year's award: Elizabeth Upwood (attending Clemson University in the fall of 2018), Clare Hulseman (attending Loyola University, Baltimore in the fall of 2018) and Ciara Regan (attending George Washington University, Washington, D.C. in the fall of 2018). Last Saturday at the 5:30 Mass, Steven Bauernfeind, our parishioner and scholarship representative, explained that the Joseph F. Labuta Scholarship recognizes council brothers' family high school graduates and/or graduates of church parishioners who show above average academic proficiency, outstanding community service dedication, and a need-based situation for scholarship consideration.

While we applaud such positive signs of our youth making right choices about their education and future career plans, we are also very conscious of the negative signs that cause much sadness. I am referring to the opioid epidemic that has gripped our nation which made President Trump declare it a national emergency. When we know the statistics we will know the magnitude of the problem which has affected our area too!

According to recent data, approximately 90 people in the United States die every single day from opioid overdose, and more than 2 million people are currently struggling with prescription opioid abuse. Abuse of prescription opioids also leads to use of illegal opioids, as people begin to experience difficulty obtaining prescription refills and fight against the crippling feelings of withdrawal. An estimated 6 percent of people who abuse their prescription opioids go on to use heroin, and a startling 80 percent of heroin users report taking prescription opioids first.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention now estimates the annual economic burden of opioid abuse in the United States has reached \$75 billion and continues to climb. Included in this estimate are costs of medical treatment, creation and maintenance of addiction programs, lost job productivity, and criminal justice intervention.

While national agencies and organizations are trying to implement ways and means to address this crisis, our own diocese of Metuchen has announced an initiative to offer healing and spiritual help for those families affected by the opioid crisis. There will be a Mass of Healing on June 27 at 7pm at the St. John Neumann Pastoral Center in Piscataway. I was asked if we would be willing to host a similar Mass at our church on the evening of August 31 and I willingly agreed. I request you to think of friends or neighbors you know who will benefit from this initiative and do invite them. More details will be coming forth next month.

WELCOME TO FR. ANTONY MBANEFO

The Mission Office of the diocese of Metuchen has assigned our parish to the Maranatha Caring Mission (MCM) of Nigeria. Fr. Anthony Mbanefo is representing and speaking about MCM which was established to provide free medical clinics in the developing countries, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, provide clean water to the thirsty, and other works as the Spirit directs. The people in the area are predominately peasant farmers who live in impoverished, abject and unhealthy conditions, and lack health care. Eye disease is very prevalent in Umueje and its surrounding towns in Nigeria. Several patients are suffering from one eye disease or the other and the majority of these patients are susceptible to cataracts. This is because Umueje and its surrounding towns are mostly riverine communities so that RIVERRBLINDNESS or onchoceriasis and filariaris are prominent in the area due to the parasites from the water. The majority of these rural dwellers are peasant farmers producing rice and cassava with crude implements. During the harvesting and processing of rice and cassava, their eyes are often affected in some circumstance, the injury sustained to the eye lens leads to traumatic cataracts. Our generosity, as we have proved in the past, will go a long way in helping share and spread the love of Jesus to the less privileged in this part of our world.


2018-2019 GIFT REGISTRATIONS NOW DUE

Know how to locate the readings in the Missal. Many people have difficulty hearing during Mass or perhaps there are distractions in the church. It is much easier to focus when following along and reciting the prayers while reading the missal.

Choose a good seat. Just like attending a concert where everyone wants to be up close to the action, do the same when attending Mass.

Homily Notebook. Take along a little notebook to jot down thoughts, ideas or insights about the homily. They may be teaching and talking points for your family later on in the day or even the week.

Church Chat. When families take a moment to prepare prior to attending Mass, wonderful things can happen! During the drive home and throughout the week family members can share and discuss their thoughts about the homily or the start of a liturgical season. A simple question, "What did you learn from today's homily that can help you (fill in the blank)?" can be a good talking point.

DO YOU HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT THE CATHOLIC FAITH?

If you have ever considered becoming Catholic or know someone who may be interested, there is a process to help you discern whether it is what you want to do. RCIA stands for Rite of Christian Initiation. Every year teams in parishes meet with unbaptized persons and those baptized into other faiths to discuss and learn about the Catholic faith. The first stage is called Inquiry and simply put, is a time for you to ask any and all questions about God and the church. This is the period to help you find out if you are interested in becoming Catholic. So please don't think you have to know this is what you want to do. The Inquiry phase helps in that discernment. WHAT'S IN A NAME?

William Shakespeare in his play Romeo and Juliet wrote, "What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell just as sweet." Actually, in Biblical names there was often a rich meaning in the name. When the time came to circumcise this child, neighbors and relatives expected him to be named after his father, Zechariah. But his mother insisted, "No, he is to be called John." "The name, "John," in Hebrew is "Yehohanan." It means "The Lord is gracious," or maybe better, "The Lord shows favor." The birthday of John Baptist relates to the birth of Jesus. The Church selected the time of the winter solstice to celebrate the birth of Jesus because from that time the days gradually grow longer; the amount of daylight increases. The Church selected the time of the summer solstice to celebrate the birth of the Baptist because from this time the days gradually grow shorter; the amount of daylight diminishes. This symbolizes the words of the Baptist in speaking of Jesus, "He must increase while I must decrease"

POINTING THE WAY LIKE JOHN

Mother Teresa relates this incident from her life. Once a man came to the home for the dying in Kalighat, and just walked straight into the ward. Mother Teresa was sitting there. A while later the man came to Mother and said to her, "I came here with so much hate in my heart; hate for God and hate for man. I came here empty and embittered, and I saw a Sister giving her wholehearted attention to that patient there and realized that God still lives. Now I go out a different man. I believe there is a God and he loves us still." That sister paved the way for God in that embittered man's life. John the Baptist, as foretold by the prophet Isaiah was the voice that was making the way straight for the Lord. He facilitated the coming of Jesus. He paved the way for Christ's coming by his austere life, preaching and death.

JOHN'S BIRTHDAY IN CHURCH HISTORY AND TRADITION

This is one of the oldest feasts on the Church calendar. In the early Church, as in medieval times, this was one of the biggest feasts of the year. As was done on Christmas, three masses were offered, one at midnight, and two in the morning. All over Europe, fires were lighted on mountains and hilltops on the eve of this feast. The people had parties and lit bonfires in honor of John because our Lord called him a "burning and shining lamp" (John 5:35). These fires, sometimes called St. John's fires, were lit on St. John's Eve and burned until at least midnight. These fires were also a sign of Christ the Light, and a reminder that we, too, are called to be a light for the world. In Catholic sections of Europe, people prayed together to Saint John for his intercession that the summer might be blessed in homes, fields, and country. Finally, they performed some of the traditional folk dances, usually accompanied by singing and music. In addition to celebrating around outdoor fires, other customs included decorating one's home with flowers, making floral wreaths (which were sometimes sent down a river as a symbol of Jesus' baptism), placing sprigs of St. Johnswort around the house much as we do Palm Sunday palms, and eating strawberries. This feast placed three months after the feast of the Annunciation, and six months before Christmas, also served the useful purpose of supplanting the immoral pagan feasts of the Summer solstice. St. John the Baptist was highly honored throughout from the beginning. Proof of this is, among other things, the fact that fifteen churches were dedicated to him in the ancient imperial city of Constantinople.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: A PROPHETIC "NO!"

"He will be filled with the Holy Spirit even from his mother's womb, and he will turn many of the children of Israel to the LORD their God." Luke 1: 5-17

Nearly 740 doctors in Quebec have done something seldom seen in modern medicine - or in any professional field, for that matter: They turned down a pay raise.

This past February, the doctors, residents and medical students petitioned the provincial government in Quebec to take money that would have been used to increase their incomes and give it to nurses and other health care workers who are dealing with crushing workloads and limited resources. The pay raises amount to just under two percent. But the group of doctors - a small minority within Quebec's medical community - believes turning back the raises is a first step in changing a medical system that has revolved too much around physicians and hospitals at the expense of patient care and services. The doctors call the proposed pay increases "indecent" in light of the growing awareness of the low pay and heavy workload among Quebec's nurses, who are forced to work repeated overtime, sometimes mandatory, because of a chronic lack of staff. In their petition to the government, the doctors wrote:

"These increases are all the more shocking because our nurses, clerks and other professionals face very difficult working conditions, while our patients live with the lack of access to required services because of the drastic cuts in recent years . . We, Quebec doctors, are asking that salary increases granted to physicians be canceled and that the resources of the system be better distributed for the good of the health care workers and to provide health services worthy of the people of Quebec."

The stand by these doctors can only be described as "prophetic": putting aside one's own interest for the sake of the greater good, placing justice and compassion before personal profit and gain. Their stand (which has not been welcomed by all doctors in the province of Quebec) mirrors the spirit of John the Baptizer, the last great prophet who heralds the coming of God's Christ, Jesus of Nazareth, who reveals God's Kingdom of mercy, justice, reconciliation and peace. As John was called, so are we all called to the work of the prophet - "one who proclaims." In baptism, God calls each one of us to be agents of integrity; illuminators of the light of truth in every dark and hidden place; consciences of our homes, our schools, our workplaces. As we celebrate the birth of John, the last great prophet and herald of the Christ, may we recommit ourselves to the call of our baptisms to be prophets of God's mercy and justice along our own highways and Jordan Rivers.
