FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Friends,

Have you faced rejection and obstacles? That is the theme written all over the readings of this Sunday. The first reading shows God calling Ezekiel as His prophet to preach to obstinate and rebellious Israelites in exile in

Babylon but warning him that he would have to face rejection and persecution for giving God's message. St. Paul, in the second reading, gives us the same warning from his experience that not only the prophets, but the apostles and missionaries also will have to encounter hardships and rejection in their preaching mission. Today's Gospel selection (Mark 6:1-6) shows us that many people of Jesus' hometown of Nazareth did not accept him as a prophet because they knew him and his family too well. The history of Christianity is replete with myriads of such prophets who responded to God's call and faced rejection and obstacles.

One such courageous person is a North American saint whose feast is this coming Saturday, July 14: Kateri Tekakwitha. Born in 1656 near Auriesville, New York, Kateri Tekakwitha was the daughter of a Mohawk chief. She had a childhood bout with smallpox that left her with permanent facial scars and diminished eyesight. Known as the Lily of the Mohawks and the Flower of the Algonquians, Tekakwitha was the first Native American to be canonized.

Her life changed in 1675 when she met Jesuit Father Jacques de Lambertville. She sought an education in Christianity, and she converted to the Roman Catholic faith and was baptized on Easter Day in 1676. She took the name Kateri for Saint Catherine of Sienna and declared a lifelong vow of virginity. But her family rejected her: first for her disfigurement, and then for her adherence to Christianity. In 1677 she took up residence at the Jesuit mission just south of Montreal. There, she prayed tirelessly for the conversion of her people and undertook many forms of penance in the development of her personal piety. Although she didn't have access to formalized convent life or instruction regarding holy orders, she and her mentor, Anastasia, her close friend, Marie-Therese, and several other young women committed to practicing their faith together as a community. On Wednesday, April17, 1680, at twenty-four-years-old, Kateri Tekakwitha died during Holy Week. She is believed to have uttered as her last words, "Jesus, Mary, I love you."

Four US shrines honor St. Kateri Tekakwitha, and numerous churches, schools, and institutions are named for her in the United States and Canada. She is an example of perseverance and trust in God when she was treated cruelly as an outcast in her village. We too are called to be prophets of truth and justice. As prophets, our task is to speak the truth and oppose the evils in our society without condoning or encouraging sinful behavior even in our dear ones. Let us also acknowledge, appreciate and encourage the prophets of our time who stand for truth and justice in our society with the wisdom of God in their heads, the power of the Holy Spirit in their words and the courage of God in their actions.

DO YOU HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT THE CATHOLIC FAITH?

If you have ever considered becoming Catholic or know someone who may be interested, there is a process to help you discern whether it is what you want to do. RCIA stands for Rite of Christian Initiation. Every year teams in parishes meet with unbaptized persons and those baptized into other faiths to discuss and learn about the Catholic faith. The first stage is called Inquiry and simply put, is a time for you to ask any and all questions about God and the church. This is the period to help you find out if you are interested in becoming Catholic. So please don't think you have to know this is what you want to do. The Inquiry phase helps in that discernment. "NO" TO GOD DUE TO FEAR OF REJECTION

John Quincy Adams, the sixth president of the United States and the son of a former President, reportedly said that he would rather clean filth from the street than become the President. The Old Testament tells us that most of the prophets shared John Quincy Adams' hesitation about their calling, probably for fear of rejection or failure. Moses tried to convince God that he stammered and, hence, could not become Israel's leader. Jeremiah complained to God that he was too voung. The prophets trembled at the trials ahead of them and that with good reason. (II Chr 36:16, Jer 2: 30, Am 2:12, Mt 23:37, Lk 13:34, I Thes 2: 15, Heb 11: 32 ff.). Jeremiah was threatened with death several times, thrown into a dry cistern, imprisoned, dragged off to exile in Egypt, and, perhaps most painful of all, was forced to watch the destruction of Jerusalem, because its inhabitants would not listen to his message. At least twice in his lifetime, the prophet Elijah gave the warning of God to King Ahab concerning the king's promotion of idolatry. As a result, Elijah was forced to flee into the wilderness where he suffered great privation (I Kg 16: 29- 17: 3; I Kg 18: 16 - 19: 4). Today's Gospel gives another example of why the prophets did not jump for joy at their career prospects. It describes in five sentences how the people of Nazareth turned from amazement to furious indignation at Jesus' statement of the truth hinting that he was the promised Messiah. Speaking God's truth is a risky business even today. It results in arrests and persecution in Communist and Islamic countries. Insulting the religious beliefs and practices of Christians is perpetrated in developed countries in the name of the freedom of speech.

HAVE YOU EXPERIENCED REJECTION?

The book *Crossing Over* is the story of the rejection one woman faced when she fell in love with a person outside the Amish Community and ran away to marry him. Ruth Garrett had always been a little rebellious, but not even she could imagine the pain she was about to experience from being shunned by her family and community. Rejection – even the word, has a foreboding sound. Yet, it is an experience with which most, if not all of us, are familiar. Everybody experiences rejection sometime. It may come from a boss, from a peer, from a lover, from a Church, even from strangers who communicate clearly that you are not welcome in certain circles.

Today's Gospel (Mark 6:1-6), explains how Jesus experienced rejection from his own people. Many people of Jesus' hometown Nazareth did not accept him as a prophet because they knew him and his family. They knew that he was a carpenter with no schooling in Mosaic Law and that he could not be the promised Messiah who would come from Bethlehem as a descendant of David's royal family. Besides, they were angry when Jesus did not work any miracles in Nazareth, chided them with prophetic courage for their lack of faith and warned that he would go to other people to do his preaching and healing ministry.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: THE DECISION TO HOPE

God knows, these days there are reasons enough for cynicism. Many of us feel let down by the institutions we thought we could trust. We have been betrayed, disappointed and outraged too many times to simply hope. Jim Wallis is a theologian and founder of **Sojourners**, a Christian-based social justice advocacy group. He writes in his best-selling book **God's Politics** that the obstacle of faith is the fundamental choice between cynicism and hope. "First, let's be fair to the cynics. Cynicism is the place of retreat for the smart, critical, dissenting, and formerly idealistic people who are now trying to protect themselves. They are not naive. They tend to see things as they are, they know what is wrong, and they are generally opposed to what they see . . . They know what is going on, and at one point, they might even have tried for a time to change it. But they didn't succeed; things got worse, and they got weary. Their activism, and the commitments and hopes that implied, made them feel vulnerable. So they retreated to cynicism as the refuge from commitment . . .

"Cynicism does protect you in many ways. It protects you from seeming foolish to believe that things could and will change. It protects you from disappointment. It protects you from insecurity because now you are free to pursue your own security instead of sacrificing it for a social engagement that won't work anyway. Ultimately, cynicism protects you from commitment. If things are not really going to change, why try so hard to make a difference? Why become and stay so involved? Why take the risks, make the sacrifices, open yourself to the vulnerabilities? "Perhaps the only people who view the world realistically are the cynics and the saints. Everybody else may be living in some kind of denial about what is really going on and how things really are. And the only difference between the cynics and the saints is the presence, power, and possibility of hope . . .

"More than just a moral issue, hope is a spiritual and even religious choice. Hope is not a feeling; it is a decision. And the decision for hope is based on what you believe at the deepest levels - what your most basic convictions are about the world and what the future holds - all based on your faith. You choose hope, not as a naive wish, but as a choice, with your eyes wide open to the reality of the world just like the cynics who have not made the decision for hope."

In today's Gospel, Jesus' hearers cannot believe that such "wisdom" can exist in their midst, that the justice and peace Jesus envisions are simply not possible. They are isolated by their cynicism; hope is beyond their reach, and so they reject Jesus with scorn and ridicule. Jesus calls us - dares us to embrace "prophetic" hope: to change our perspective, our belief systems, and ourselves in order to realize the possibilities we have for creating God's kingdom of peace and compassion for all his sons and daughters in this time and place of ours.

SMILE WITH YOUR FAMILY

Rejection resulting in the resignation: There was a feud between the Pastor and the Choir Director of a Southern Baptist parish.

The first hint of trouble came when the Pastor preached on **Dedicating oneself** to service and the Choir Director chose to sing: *"I Shall Not Be Moved".* Trying to believe it was a coincidence, the Pastor put the incident behind him.

The next Sunday he preached on **Giving.** Afterwards, the choir squirmed as the director led them in the hymn: "*Jesus Paid It All*" By this time, the Pastor was losing his temper. Sunday morning attendance swelled as the tension between the two became public.

A large crowd showed up next week to hear his sermon on the **Sin of Gossiping**. Would you believe the Choir Director selected: "*I Love To Tell the Story*"? There was no turning back.

The following Sunday the Pastor told the congregation that unless something changed **he was considering resignation**. The entire church gasped when the Choir Director led them in: "*Why Not Tonight?*"

Truthfully, no one was surprised when the **Pastor resigned a week later**, explaining that Jesus had led him there and Jesus was leading him away. The Choir Director could not resist singing: *"What a Friend We Have In Jesus.*"

CAN GOOD COME OUT OF TRAGEDY?

A young boy of 9 was sitting in his father's workshop watching his dad work on a harness. "Someday Father," said Louis, "I want to be a harness-maker, just like you." "Why not start now?" said the father. He took a piece of leather and drew a design on it. "Now" he said, "take the hole-punch and hammer out this design, but be careful that you don't hit your hand." Excited, the boy began to work, but when he hit the hole-punch, it flew out of his hand and pierced his eye! He lost his sight in that eye. Later, as fate would have it, sight in the other eye failed. Louis was now totally blind. A few years later, Louis was sitting in the family garden when a friend handed him a pine cone. As he ran his sensitive fingers over the cone, an idea came to him. He became enthusiastic and began to create an alphabet of raised dots on paper so that the blind could feel and interpret. Thus, Louis Braille in 1818 opened up a whole new world for the blind. What is it that Jesus intends to do during his three years of ministry? It is this: To open up a whole new world for you and for me. To bring us out of our poverty that has long held us down and to restore vision that you and I have long since lost.

REJECTED POLITICIANS WHO NEVER GAVE UP!

Winston Churchill: This Nobel Prize-winning, twice-elected Prime Minster of the United Kingdom wasn't always as well regarded as he is today. Churchill struggled in school and failed the sixth grade. In 1894, the rhetoric teacher at Harrow in England wrote on a 16-year old's grade card: "A conspicuous lack of success." The name on the top of the card was that of young Winston Churchill. After school he faced many years of political failures, as he was defeated in every election for public office until he finally became the Prime Minister at the ripe old age of 62.

<u>Abraham Lincoln</u>: While today he is remembered as one of the greatest leaders of our nation, Lincoln's life wasn't so easy. He received no more than 5 years of formal education throughout his lifetime. In his youth he went to war as captain and returned as the lowest rank of a private! Lincoln joined politics and had 12 major failures before he was elected the 16th President of the United States of America.

OPIOID PROBLEM IN OUR COUNTY IS RISING!

Published reports say that the opioid problem in Hunterdon county continues to rise. Last year, there were 54,572 opioid prescriptions filled here, according to the New Jersey Office of the Attorney General. In 2016, 20 people died from drug overdoses in the county, mostly involving opioids, according to the New Jersey Office of the State Medical Examiner, up from eight people dying from overdoses four years earlier. As no community is immune to the opioid epidemic, the government and non-government agencies are spreading greater awareness of prevention and solution of this crisis, the Catholic Church is offering healing opportunities for those impacted by it.
