How do we deal with popular misunderstandings and misperceptions? For instance the myth that Friday the 13 is an unlucky day! It is only once or twice a year that Friday the 13th occurs in the calendar. If you are a superstitious person, you would have noticed that last Friday was one such! Is there any truth to it as many people consider it a day when bad things can happen? NO! I remember my driver's test was scheduled on a Friday 13th in January many years ago. The Parish Secretary told me to reschedule it for another date as she was very sure that Friday 13th was totally an inauspicious day for my test. I refused. And I passed the test! So for me, Friday the 13th is a lucky day!! After all, Friday is TGIF!! Ancient Mayans of Central America were the most advanced culture in all of the Americas. They considered the number 13 sacred. It is heartening to see today a sizable number of optimists who embrace Friday the 13th and the number 13. They shrug off the superstition and buy lottery tickets with the number 13 in it.

Similarly, some people think that God "stuff" is the prerogative of priests, nuns, deacons and other church leaders who are "called" by God. Today's scripture readings unmistakably correct that view. Amos was not a priest, but simply a farmer, an ordinary man living in a small town a few miles south of Bethlehem. That sounds a lot like us - simple ordinary men and women - and yet God called Amos to deliver a very important message to the people of Israel. Perhaps the most amazing part of Amos' story is not his message, but that he simply listened and obeyed. He didn't come up with a list of excuses or reasons why he was not the right man for the job. He simply responded to God's call with courage and faith. Jesus chose very ordinary men and sent them to spread His good news to all. The disciples, all simple ordinary men, grasped this truth and were able to share the good news of Jesus with power and effectiveness well beyond anything they could ever have imagined. God used each of them just like He has planned to use each of us. That's why the Church teaches us clearly that sharing good news is not to be left to priests, nuns, deacons and other church leaders, because all of us are called by God to proclaim God's mission. Yes, we are ministers.

Last two Sundays, during the 10:30 Mass, we heard the testimonies of our youth who went for service projects. I wish the whole community could hear their testimonies. Hence in today's bulletin you can read what Caroline Pietri of our parish shared about her impressions and insights from the Catholic Heart WorkCamp she attended in Cumberland, MD. Next Sunday, we can read about the experience of Jessica Brynildsen who went to Malawi, Africa.

As I have made it clear many times, we can respond to the call of Jesus by simply speaking about the good things we appreciate about our parish. Speak about the positive experience you have after a Sunday celebration, or after enjoying a parish event or program. Then invite someone to our Sunday worship or to attend any of our many parish events. You have already become a missionary for Jesus.

CAROLINE PETRIE ON THE CATHOLIC HEART WORKCAMP

Hi everyone I am Caroline Petrie and last week was my third year attending Catholic Heart Work Camp. Catholic Heart has always been the highlight of my summer, but each year has brought about different experiences. This year, I was a little bit nervous for camp. Not because I was leaving home, sleeping on a classroom floor, or sharing bathrooms and showers with a lot of people. I was afraid that this year's Camp wouldn't live up to my high expectations.

Last Year, Catholic Heart Work Camp at North Arlington, New Jersey, was one of the best experiences I've ever had. Between the friends I made that came with saint Johns and the connections I made with my group members along with the nuns we served, that week was truly full of memories and I grew a lot in my faith. However, when we first got to Maryland, Kelly, who is one of the head CHWC staff members, said that the returning campers should try to be open minded toward a different experience. And I tried just that.

On the first day of service this year, Team 42 and I were assigned to go to an 84 year old widow's house, whose name was Shirley. However, when we first walked into her home, we were shocked as her house was probably one of the cleanest houses I've ever seen. We spent the whole day looking for various tasks to complete such as washing dishes, cleaning bathrooms, mopping floors, washing curtains, and most importantly, talking with Shirley. Although my group may have flooded the bathroom and broke a few curtain rods along the way, we were all laughing, even Shirley. At the end of the day seeing Shirley give our team builder the biggest hug made me realize that God truly called us to her home for a reason. We were there to give her company and bring energy into her home, not just to clean it. This also made me realize that the connections and relationships you make with your residents and each other is just as important, if not more important, than the actual physical service you do. Toward the end of the day while I was mopping her bedroom, Shirley came in and showed me one of the dresses she made by sewing. I told her that it was incredible and asked how she did it. She responded by saying "when a challenge comes my way, I just try to put my best foot forward". That stuck with me, especially when my group had to accomplish more challenging tasks the rest of the week.

So during the other three days of service, my team joined another team that was located at a Catholic retreat facility that consisted of 412 acres of land. Here my group and I mainly painted fences and demolished what were once closets. Whether we were working and making small talk or joking around during lunch, I was able to form a bond with my work group that I will never forget.

Although the major aspect of Catholic Heart WorkCamp is the work and service, I find that the time spent at program and back at home base is a very valuable part of the experience. Whether you are dancing to music sung by the one and only tom young at program, meeting and forming relationships with campers across the country during free time, or laughing to the point of tears with your roommates when it is past the 10:30 curfew, you are strengthening and forming relationships that fill each and every camper with energy that allows everybody to grow in their faith and have a lot of fun! The growth in relationships, passion, and faith truly allow everybody to echo God's love toward their residents and one another.

If you are considering coming to Catholic Heart at all, just do it. You will make amazing friendships, discover your faith, and receive a sense of fulfillment that no words can describe. Lastly, I would like to thank all of the chaperones. Without them we wouldn't have been able to have the wonderful experience that Catholic Heart gave us all. Thank you all and thank you to everyone who made Catholic Heart Work Camp 2018 a week to remember!

SUNDAY REFLECTION: UNFINISHED HOUSES

Jesus sends out the Twelve two by two to preach and heal. Mark 6: 7-13 Education Across Borders is a nonprofit group that organizes volunteers to build homes for the poor in the Dominican Republic. Every summer, teenagers and young adults join the group for two-week service trips. Their initial enthusiasm wanes a bit on the first day when they begin work on a house and realize they will never see it finished. Why can't we finish the house? they ask. Weren't we good enough? Didn't we work hard enough? Will the poor resent us for "failing" this project? John McLaughlin, who directs Education Across Borders, explains to them that service work, if it is to last, must be about accompaniment more than accomplishment. That unfinished house is a tangible reminder that there is still much to be done. McLaughlin remembers one group from an American parish who came focused on the work of completing the house. They rose before dawn and worked ten or more hours every day in the tropical heat. They left disappointed that "we didn't get done as much as we wanted."

"But 'getting a lot done' was never the point," McLaughlin says. "Keeping up such an industrial pace had all but precluded [the students] from learning Dominicans' names, speaking Spanish or having their assumptions - about the causes and structures of poverty, for example - challenged. No emotional risk was involved for the students . . . little transformation could take place for anyone." Another group McLaughlin worked with got little done because of constant downpours every afternoon. "We lost many hours of building time that week, but the students took the opportunity to talk more with the villagers, including Etienne, a young immigrant from Haiti . . . Several students went to great lengths to embrace him, plodding through long, piecemeal Spanish-English-Creole conversations, sharing their meals with him and even, in the case of one volunteer, giving him a church-suitable shirt (in a culture that values appearance highly) so that he could attend Mass for the first time.

"That Sunday, Etienne sat among the students at the service and afterward joined in the *despedida*, the traditional send-off party. The sun came out, and stayed out; perhaps we should have spent the day on the construction site, to make up for lost time. But by then the students knew, without me telling them, where they were most needed. They were in the community center, dancing not with each other, but with their new Dominican and Haitian friends. . . . "Service is fundamentally about relationship," McLaughlin has discovered. "Yes, it involves mixing concrete or ladling soup, but it also means walking with and listening to the suffering, sharing stories and laughter, tears and prayers. Understanding service as accompaniment reminds us to whom the house really belongs, and to Whom we really belong." [From "Unfinished Houses: Building the kingdom on God's time" by John J. Just as he sends forth the Twelve, Jesus sends us forth with our "walking sticks," not to build or rule or dominate but to heal, comfort and encourage. Our own service to others, Jesus says, should be centered not in efficiency or results but in mercy, humility and gratitude. Let us build houses for the poor, but first may we welcome them into our homes and communities; let us feed the hungry, but first make places for them at our tables; let us reach out to the lost and troubled, but first recognize them as our brothers and sisters in Christ.

OPIOID PROBLEM IN OUR COUNTY IS RISING!

Published reports say that the opioid problem in Hunterdon county continues to rise. Last year, there were 54,572 opioid prescriptions filled here, according to the New Jersey Office of the Attorney General. In 2016, 20 people died from drug overdoses in the county, mostly involving opioids, according to the New Jersey Office of the State Medical Examiner, up from eight people dying from overdoses four years earlier. As no community is immune to the opioid epidemic, the government and non-government agencies are spreading greater awareness of prevention and solution of this crisis, the Catholic Church is offering healing opportunities for those impacted by it.
