FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Friends.

Many of you must have already read the beautiful letter of our Bishop Checchio about the clergy sexual abuse crisis which is snowballing into a bigger crisis casting aspersions into the credibility of those in the highest positions of church leadership including Popes, past and present. There is more sadness, frustration, shame and outright anger towards the church leaders for these repugnant sins and for the cover-up. Thank you for the feelings and reactions some of you shared with me:

- -"I was happy to read your thoughts in the bulletin. Yes much further contemplation and discussion will be needed to wade through the complexity of what we have here. I will hold off on any judgments myself as I too am an engaged passenger in this process alongside you trying to understand..."
- -"The problem must be openly recognized, and then openly dealt with."
- -"This is all so disillusioning. I love my church and you as our pastor.
- -"I spend so much time fund raising only to have much of it go to the diocese that is part of the problem. What to do with all this?"

Yes I do hear these and many more sincere reactions which I know are coming out of a genuine concern for the true Church of Jesus Christ. When someone told me, "I don't feel like being part of this sinful Church anymore," I replied quoting last Sunday's gospel: "As a result of this, many of his disciples returned to their former way of life and no longer accompanied him. Jesus then said to the Twelve, "Do you also want to leave?" Simon Peter answered him, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God." (John 6:65-69).

Peter's reply reminds us why we love and stay with our Church: because of our faith in Jesus Christ. Not because of our liking or disliking a particular priest, bishop or pope. When one part of our body is sick and in pain, we do not despise the whole body and reject it, instead we come to the aid of that suffering part with a healing solution. If we apply that analogy to the Church, then the call to be responsible members of the Church as the consecrated People of God through our baptismal call is our right and duty. We can make our anger and frustrations known, together with suggestions for solution.

Even Archbishop Carlo Vigano, the former Vatican Nuncio (Ambassador) in Washington, DC., who accused many top Vatican officials including Pope Francis of cover-up, tells this to the whole church: "Even in dismay and sadness over the enormity of what is happening, let us not lose hope! We well know that the great majority of our pastors live their priestly vocation with fidelity and dedication." I'm also very happy that Pope Francis does not shy away from this issue. Just last week in Ireland during the World Meeting of Families, he spoke in very strong language about this "grave scandal caused by the abuse of young people by members of the Church charged with responsibility for their protection and education. The failure of ecclesiastical authorities – bishops, religious superiors, priests and others – adequately to address these repugnant crimes has rightly given rise to outrage and remains a source of pain and shame for the Catholic community. I myself share those sentiments."

I invite all of us to prayerfully consider having a respectful conversation about this even as we reflect on the words of St. Peter: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God."

WAS ST. PAUL AGAINST WOMEN?

Today's second Reading (Ephesians 5:21-32) has this line: "Wives should be subordinate to their husbands as to the Lord." Elsewhere he asks women to be silent in the church. These and other similar writings of Paul make us wonder if he was against women's equality and intent on subordinating women to men. But an objective study of Paul's letters show that he was not. His letters are pastoral in nature, addressed to the specific needs and questions of particular communities and therefore certain particular local situation cannot be applied universally. Keep in mind also, Paul was a man of his day, shaped by the patriarchal attitudes of Greco-Roman and Jewish cultures toward women. As Craig S. Keener (*Paul, Women and Wives, Marriage and Women's Ministry in the Letters of Paul*, Hendrickson Publishers, Inc., Peabody, MA: 1992) has observed, centuries before the New Testament Period, Aristotle argued that men were naturally superior and therefore fit to rule over women. Plato described a woman's virtues as taking care of the home and obeying her husband. Was the Ephesians author simply following the lead of others before him?

Furthermore, many biblical scholars agree that Ephesians was not written by Paul himself, but by a later leader who assumes his mantle of authority. And it is notable that such insistence on subordination of women is not found in any of the authentic Pauline letters. Rather, we find sayings that point toward equality and mutuality, such as: "In the Lord woman is not independent of man or man independent of woman. For just as woman came from man, so man comes through woman; but all things come from God" (1 Cor 11:11-12); also 1 Cor 7:4: "The wife does not have authority over her own body, but the husband does; likewise, the husband does not have authority over his own body, but the wife does." A careful, open-minded rending of the text will prove otherwise. St. Paul in the second reading, actually advises husbands and wives to "defer to one another out of reverence for Christ" (v. 21).

The best measure of Paul's egalitarian sensibility lies in the way he talks about different Christian women. Paul was no lone ranger in his apostolic ministry, and many of his co-workers were women. Looking at the passages in Paul's letters and in the Acts of the Apostles in which these women are mentioned, one finds a great sense of collegiality and many examples of women given authority. NOT WILLING TO BREAK SABBATH, BUT ...

Dr. Laura Schlessinger, a psychologist, is appalled by the culture of moral relativism that has pervaded our society. In her book, *How Could You Do That?* Dr. Laura tells of a call from a young woman who was living with her fiancé. The young woman's future mother-in-law was insisting that the woman and her son move closer to her home. What was the problem with that? The young woman claimed to be an Orthodox Jew, and she complained that if she moved closer to her future mother-in-law's home, then she would be too far away from the synagogue. Instead of walking to Sabbath services, she would then have to drive, which would be breaking the Sabbath law. Dr. Laura couldn't get the young woman to understand the inconsistency between observing one tenet of her faith-honoring the Sabbath--but not caring if she violated another--the prohibition against living with her fiancé out of wedlock. It's not unusual for people to espouse one thing and to do something entirely different.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: A Better Neighborhood Than You Think...

"...the things that come out from within are what defile." Mark 7: 1-8, 14-15, 21-23

She was driving home late one rainy evening; her kids were asleep in the back seat. When she exited the highway and was approaching her street, she saw a car stalled on the side of the road. The hood was up, the car's flashers were on and a man was bent over the engine. A few feet away, a young woman held an infant in her arms and a toddler clung to her legs, shivering. She pulled over and asked if she could help or call someone.

The man looked to his wife, whose eyes were wide with fear, and then focused his attention back on the car. "No, thank you," he said tersely. "My brother will be here soon." "Well, you can at least use a little more light," she said as she opened her trunk and offered a flashlight to the man. She turned to his wife and said: "Please, sit in the car. I've got the heat on. You'll be more comfortable there." After some gentle coaxing, the woman agreed. The woman seemed to be almost afraid of her. To try to put the woman at ease, she pointed out her house that was just down the road. After a while, the brother arrived and helped the husband get the engine running again. The wife looked at her for the first time and quietly thanked her.

A few days later there was a knock on her door. It was the young mother standing on the porch holding a bouquet of flowers and a tray of cookies. "To thank you for your help the other night," the woman said. She invited the woman in and made coffee. "I wanted to apologize to you for the other night," the woman began. "You were kind to stop and help and we treated you as if you were a criminal. We're new to the area, and everyone had warned us that this neighborhood was in the 'bad part of town.' When you came along, we didn't know if we could trust you. But your kindness made us feel safe for the first time in our new home."

The good within one woman's heart changes the less-than-good "outside" of her. Her offer of help transforms a family's fear of their new environs in a "bad part of town" to a place of welcome. The kind of human being we are begins in the values of the heart, the place where God dwells within - but the evil we are capable of, the hurt we inflict on others, the degrading of the world that God created also begins "within," when God is displaced by selfishness, fear, anger, hatred. May God instill in us his spirit of compassion and justice, enabling us to transform the "bad parts" of the world outside of us into the "good" of God's Kingdom that begins within each of us.

MOVE FROM LIPS TO HEART!

He led the Portland Trailblazers to their first NBA championship. Then he moved on to the Boston Celtics. Now he's a television basketball announcer. It makes all the difference in the world if your heart is in what you're doing! A lot of us are trying to live our lives with our hearts in nothing or, we should say, with nothing in our hearts. We have Christ on our lips, but He's never made that journey further down. That's why we are bored. How do we move Christ from our lips to our hearts? That is the question which today's Gospel asks us.

MOTHER TERESA VS PRINCESS DIANA

Will the media also recall that someone else who died twenty-one years ago, a little nun in Calcutta known to the world as Mother Teresa? It has been said that Mother Teresa chose the wrong week to die, overshadowed by the death of the young princess. But maybe that's the way it should be. Nothing could better reflect how warped the values of the world are. Mother Teresa wasn't accompanied by a billionaire playboy when she passed from this life to the celestial kingdom. She wasn't being driven in a high-speed luxury car. She lived and died serving the least and the lowest. She lived and died glorifying God and serving her neighbor. There's nothing wrong with little girls aspiring to grow up to be princesses. How much better, though, if all of us aspired to be more like Mother Teresa! There's nothing wrong with pomp and circumstance. There's even nothing wrong with ceremonies linked to the washing of hands, even though doctors say a little dirt is good for you, unless the ceremony of washing hands causes you to look down on those who don't observe such ceremonies, or unless you have clean hands but an impure heart.

EXCERPTS FROM THE POPE'S TALK IN DUBLIN

Dear Brothers and Sisters, good evening!

I am grateful to all of you for your warm welcome. It is good to be here! It is good to celebrate, for celebration makes us more human and more Christian. It also helps us to share the joy of knowing that Jesus loves us, he accompanies us on our journey of life, and each day he draws us closer to himself.

In any family celebration, everyone's presence is felt: fathers, mothers, grandparents, grandchildren, uncles and aunts, cousins, those who cannot come and those who live too far away. Today in Dublin we are gathered for a family celebration of thanksgiving to God for who we are: one family in Christ, spread throughout the world. The Church is the family of God's children. A family in which we rejoice with those who are rejoicing, and weep with those who grieve or feel knocked down by life. A family in which we care for everyone, for God our Father has made all of us his children in Baptism. That is one reason why I keep encouraging parents to baptize their children as soon as possible, so that they can become part of this great family of God. We need to invite everyone to the party!

You, dear families, are the vast majority of the People of God. What would the Church look like without you? It was to help us recognize the beauty and importance of family, with its lights and shadows that I wrote my Exhortation Amoris Laetitia on the joy of love, and wanted the theme of this World Meeting of Families to be "The Gospel of the Family, Joy for the World". God wants every family to be a beacon of the joy of his love in our world. What does this mean? It means that we, who have encountered God's saving love, try, with or without words, to express it in little acts of kindness in our daily routine and in the most hidden moments of our day.

That is what holiness is all about. I like to speak of the saints "next door", all those ordinary people who reflect God's presence in the life and history of our world (cf. Gaudete et Exsultate, 6-7). The vocation to love and to holiness is not something reserved for a privileged few. Even now, if we have eyes to see, we can see it being lived out all around us. It is silently present in the heart of all those families that offer love, forgiveness and mercy when they see the need, and do so quietly, without great fanfare. The Gospel of the family is truly joy for the world, since there, in our families, Jesus can always be found, dwelling in simplicity and poverty as he did in the home of the Holy Family of Nazareth.
