FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Friends,

The Parish Picnic! What a wonderful time we all had last Sunday! Thanks be to our loving God who graciously held off the threatening clouds, giving us a great time to enjoy as our parish family. The cold water in the river did not deter even the kids from wading through knee-deep water for our traditional duck race. The celebration included a magic show for children (which had even adults mesmerized!), water balloon throw, 9-square game, hoolahoop practices, corn hole throws, face painting, kids playhouse inflatable, live singing, and more. The food and drink, together with a variety of desserts we shared kept our appetite fully satisfied all the time. The dedicated selfless service of so many of our parishioners, many of them working quietly, made me all the more proud to be part of this great family of St. John Neumann. May this spirit inspire more families to join our parish family.

Mention of families makes me want to speak again about the abuse crisis that is very much present in most everyone's thoughts. Recently I read a great article titled: "Why do I raise my children in this broken, hurting church?" Expressing her sadness, frustration and anger at the horrific revelations of abuse and the prolonged cover-up, Kerry Weber, the author, wondered why she and her family still went to Church on Sundays. She said her answer came from an unexpected source. The priest who baptized her son two years ago had asked her and her husband to do an exercise in preparation for baptism: "Write a letter to your baby and tell him what you hope for him in the faith." She went back to that letter and read it and she got the answer as to why she still continues to be a committed Catholic. Then she commented: "In a broken and hurting church, it is good to remember that the church as an institution is not why we are here or what we are here for. Yet we are responsible for it, and that means holding it accountable and working to make it more truly reflect the kingdom of God."

It is in this spirit of holding the Church leaders accountable that we began the first step here at St. John's: setting aside some time, at the beginning of the monthly meeting of every ministry or committee in our parish, to have a conversation about this disturbing topic. This offers a forum for our people to share whatever feelings they have about the present painful and hurting situation in the church. I expanded it to have similar conversation during our Catechists meeting, and at both the GIFT sessions for parents. The participants felt that it was a very meaningful and helpful exercise.

The Parish Pastoral Council made a very practical suggestion in order to reach out to those who may not have got this chance: anyone can write his/her feelings, ideas and suggestions about this sad topic and either drop it in the suggestion box placed at the very entrance of the Church as you open the front door, or email it to me at abraham@ccsjn.org These can be collectively sent to the Bishop. I hope many will use this opportunity to express what you feel. As I said, this is the first step. Being more aware of the rightful role of the laity is the next step without which accountability cannot even be asked for. That is the duty of every parishioner to educate oneself about the Church's own encouragement about lay participation and lay empowerment through our baptismal consecration as the People of God. Let us all take this journey together.

2018 FALL BEREAVEMENT GROUP AT ST. JOHN'S

TUESDAY EVENINGS FROM OCTOBER 23 THROUGH NOVEMBER 27

There will be a series of non-denominational, interrelated bereavement seminars at St. John Neumann, Califon, NJ, beginning October 23rd. John Cole, a professional in the transitioning process, will facilitate the sessions. This short-term program has been considered very helpful by past participants who have experienced personal loss. The conversations extend from understanding loss and normal reactions to steps, guided by faith, towards acceptance and the recreation of hopeful lives. While a primary focus is the death of a significant other, those who have experienced severe loss because of divorce, separation, or other substantial life altering events are welcomed. All sessions start at 7 p.m. The dates of the seminars will be October 23 and 29, November 6, 13, 19, and 27.

Please note that each session builds on the prior one. Attendance at all six sessions would be best to derive optimal benefit. All sessions are in the upper floor of the parish office building, unless participant mobility issues arise.

EXPERIENCING PARIS AS A CATHOLIC (AND A TEENAGE GIRL!)

(Ciara Regan is our parishioner who wrote this reflection after her Paris visit)

It's Sunday, my third full day in Paris. I'm five hours behind on time, trapped in the patterns of New Jersey but enamored by the city of lights, lights that are on all night. My mother's alarm goes off at eight. I hear her groan next to me in bed and the sheets rustle as she turns it off. Moments later, I feel her warm hands on my shoulder, shaking me from my sleep. I'm groggy and grumpy, but I am excited for what we are about to experience. We walk three blocks from our hotel in Montpamasse, a trendy area in the southern part of Paris. Just steps from our hotel is a beautiful church with stained glass windows and aged cobblestone. The mass times announcements outside are written completely in French, but I can understand, as I have studied the language for four years.

The church is breathtaking inside. Dark wood pews line the entire building, a building so big that I cannot see the altar clearly without my glasses on. Endless rows of candles line the sides, resting under stained glass masterpieces. An old organ groans a hymn from above. People file in slowly, typical chic and fit Parisians who have likely walked numerous blocks in their heels and dress shoes. Greetings are exchanged in complete French, a fact that does not go unnoticed by my mother.

The Mass begins, completely in French, as expected. We are tourists blending into the daily routine of the city. This activity is not booked, paid for, or part of a tour. It isn't commercial or a check on a bucket list. It isn't meant for us to take pictures to show our friends. Instead, it is meant to fill our spiritual side, and we are doing so alongside residents of this beautiful city where we are only visitors.

When the priest begins his homily, I gasp to myself when I can piece together his words and understand him. However, the greatest shock comes when we join hands to recite the *Our Father*. For those readers who do not know me, I attended an all girls Catholic high school, which meant we prayed before every class began. Even in French class, we put our hands together and recited a prayer, but always in French. It began with the simplest, the *Glory Be*. By sophomore year we were saying the *Hail Mary*, and once I was a senior, I could say the *Our Father*, sans cheat sheet. So, when we join hands, it is my time to put all those years of French to good use. Not only am I using the language in the country it was meant for, but I am practicing my faith in a different language, still speaking to God. My heart grows warm and I feel truly proud as I speak along with the room full of true French Catholics.

As the mass draws to a close, I smile and whisper "Au revoir, bon journée!" to the woman next to me, filled with new confidence in my own voice. Today, I saw a different side of Paris, a side that the majority of tourists don't get to see. Most people are too preoccupied to stop their trips and wander along side streets into a non-English friendly church on a Sunday morning, but my mother and my decision to do so gave me insight into true French lifestyle in the way of religion. I brought my faith with me across the Atlantic, and then home again.

SUNDAY REFLECTION: It's Downhill from First Grade, Kid...

"If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off."

Mark 9: 38-43, 45, 47-48

In a recent episode of the daily comic strip 'For Better or For Worse' by Lynn Johnston [October 14, 2017], six-year-old Lizzy has had a bad day at school and she confides to her father: "Daddy - why don't some kids get along with other kids? Sometimes, when you think someone's your friend, they're really not. Some kids do mean things for no reason. Kids fight over dumb stuff. They pick on each other. They don't share - an' they say things about other kids that aren't true. "I can't wait till I'm grown up . . . grown-ups don't do things like that to each other."

Lizzy turns to walk away, leaving her dad with a stunned, sad expression on his face that says, *Oh, Lizzy, if you only knew* . . .

Jesus challenges all of us adults to consider the values and faith we are modeling for our "little ones": what our public policies, our social and cultural institutions, our political and religious rhetoric reveal about the world we are building that we are handing on to them. The great responsibility of our baptisms is to show our children the purpose that our faith gives to our lives, to help those alienated from God re-connect with their sacred, to reveal the love and mercy of God to those who do not know God. To teach with conviction without judgment, to guide by example rather than by dogma, to inspire by generosity instead of sermons is to transform our world one generation at a time, to establish the reign of God one stone upon another.

DID YOU SIGN UP TO JOIN SMALL GROUPS?

Small groups, in fact, are where much of the theology taught in our pulpits begins to be fleshed out in conversation and action. The implications of the Biblical passages come alive when we hear how each member of the group shares his/her story of struggling to make sense of God's will in their own lives. The sharing of struggles and challenges, joys and triumps provide a great mutual spiritual support.

Small faith-sharing groups also meet a very practical and human need: the need to belong. We are communal creatures: we were made by a community of love called the Trinity and because community is our origin, we'll always find life and direction within a community better than we will on our own. That means small groups deliver deeper friendships that double as accountability. When people know you, really know you, your life becomes far more transparent, including your short-comings and imperfections. Others learn to read you and will call you out for those areas you wish to improve, creating opportunities to deal with real life difficulties as they surface. This is part of what we should expect from good friends.

So, why not sign up if you have never tried this small group experience?

DID JESUS MEAN THAT WE SELF-MUTILATE!!??

Our hands become instruments of sin according to what we touch and how we touch, in lust or greed or violence. Our feet are used for sin according to the places we have them take us. Our eyes become doorways for sins according to what we choose to look at or refuse to look at. However, it is important to understand that, in todays Gospel passage (Mark 9:45-48) When Jesus mentions about "plucking out an eye or cutting off a hand," He is not speaking literally. We have more sins than we have bodily parts. Besides, even if all offending parts were removed, our hearts and minds -- the source of all sins-- would still be intact. Hence, these sayings are actually about our attitudes, dispositions, and inclinations. Jesus is inviting us to integrate our bodies into our following of Christ, so that our hands become instruments of compassion, healing and comfort, our feet help us to bring the Gospel to the world, and our eyes learn to see the truth, goodness and beauty all around us.

By these startling words about self-mutilation, Jesus also means that we must cut out of our lives all practices that keep us away from God, and retain only those habits that draw us closer to God. Jesus is setting before all his disciples the one supreme goal in life that is worth any sacrifice. That goal is God Himself and His will for our lives, which alone leads us to everlasting peace and happiness. Just as a doctor might remove a limb or some part of the body in order to preserve the life of the whole body, so we must be ready to part with anything which causes us to sin and which leads us or others to spiritual death. Billy Graham has a fantastic way of summing up this Gospel message by concluding his Crusades with a final challenge: "Decide! Cut away anything that prevents you from a radical decision for Jesus Christ!"

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
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
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
