ANOTHER YEAR HAS BEGUN

Another year has begun. We've marched past Christmas, and Lent waits around the corner. Presents unwrapped, privation not yet present. Perhaps this is an appropriate time to reflect on the time between birth and renewal, Christmas and Easter. These feasts celebrate the boundaries of Jesus' earthly time with us, but the Lenten season reminds us of the abstinence he maintained and temptation he suffered after baptism. The miracle at the wedding at Cana, taking place after his forty days in the desert, provides a fitting balance to his time of want.

According to the Gospel of John, while Jesus, his disciples, and friends gathered to celebrate the marriage of a couple from the town, Mary, mother of Jesus informed her son that they had run out of wine. Concerned for the community and the couples wedding celebration, Mary asked her son to help. Jesus, although feeling it was not yet his time, obeyed his mother and had the servants fill containers with water and brought them to the chief steward. The water had been turned into wine, the best of all wines to be shared by all. Jesus, in performing this first miracle for his mother revealed his glory, beginning the journey of he and his disciples and their belief in him.

We can choose to interpret this story in any number of ways. As this was the first of the public miracles attributed to Jesus it coincides with the start of his ministry. But it also marks the transition from impoverishment to the promise of a bountiful future. We wander in the desert, suffer deprivation and temptation, then emerge from having nothing, to having water, to having wine. Note that this narrative proceeds from a state of isolation to a celebration of marriage in a community. This could be our community, notwithstanding the difference of two millennia. A clear message, that of hope. The best is yet to come.

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:

When Sturdy Love is What You Need...

"Everyone serves good wine first, and the when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." John 2: 1-11

Michelle was at work when a friend texted the link to a newspaper article from her hometown newspaper. It included a photo of an icy Montana highway, a pickup with the hood smashed in and a blue Subaru Outback that had been cut cleanly in half. According to the story, the woman who had been driving the Outback was their former high school classmate Deirdre. Deirdre survived, but her three-year-old daughter Zoe was killed.

The tragedy dredged up painful memories for Michelle. Three years before, Michelle and her husband, Eric, lost their 22-month son, Seamus, when they were struck in a crosswalk by a careless driver. Michelle writes that their marriage became "like a ship that had weathered a bad storm — grateful and relieved to be afloat, but the damage was extensive."

The couple had just become parents again. The twins, a boy and a girl, had just turned one and the family was about to celebrate Christmas for the first time in three years. "Having more children did not reduce the sadness that had become the identifying feature of our marriage, but it did force our hearts to expand to accommodate other, happier emotions," Michelle remembers.

Michelle had not talked to Deirdre in 20 years. Michelle wasn't sure what to do. One afternoon, while the twins were napping, Michelle retrieved from the basement a wicker basket of cards they had received when Seamus died. *There are no words . . . You are in our hearts . . . I cannot imagine your pain.* No one can think of the perfect thing to say at such times. But Michelle remembered the comfort the notes had brought her, and so decided to send Deirdre a note. To her surprise, Deirdre replied by e-mail and the two were soon regularly exchanging texts. In April, Michelle had a trip planned to Montana, and they arranged to meet.

Michelle and Deirdre greeted each other with a hug. There was no small talk. Walking together through the streets of Deirdre's neighborhood, they talked about watching their children die, moving easily between medical terms and "mother" terms. Michelle asked Dierdre how her marriage was holding up. And Dierdre opened up about the struggle her husband was having over the decision to withdraw care for Zoe. Michelle listened, giving Deirdre space to voice her fears, and then offering the assurance of a wife and mother who had been through the same devastating experience herself, and found the way to move on.

Michelle later wrote that she hoped Deirdre would discover what she learned: "that grief is exactly as painful as you think it will be, but with time you will learn to love your sadness because of the tiny shoots of joy and gratitude that sprout around it, like new growth on scorched earth.

As she drove home from Deirdre's, Michelle "thought about the comfort of sturdy, unglamorous things, my marriage among them. Ours may not be a great love story, but set against a backdrop of cruel nature and boundless beauty, I didn't need it to be."

Good marriages, imperfect but "sturdy," manifest the love of God at its most powerful: love that enables spouses to navigate together life's hard roads of fear, heartache and illness. As ministers of the marriage sacrament, wives and husbands, in their love for one another, help all of us to recognize the great love of God the Father made real for us in the person of his Christ, the Bridegroom. Throughout Scripture, God speaks of his love for humanity in terms of espousal; Christ, who performed his first miracle at a wedding, called himself "the Bridegroom" who comes to bring his people to the wedding feast of the Father. Spouses, in their "sturdy" love centered in selfless trust, are living signs to all of us of the hope of God's great wedding banquet.

On vacation with her family in Montana, a mother drove her van past a church in a small town and pointing to it, told the children that is was St. Francis' Church. "It must be a franchise," her eight-year-old son said. "We've got one of those in our town too."

FROM POLITICS TO REAL LIFE

They were at the same rally — but for different reasons.

Joe Weidknecht was there, wearing the signature *Make America Great Again* baseball cap, to support the president he believed in. Amina Amdeen was a student at the University of Texas. A Muslim, she wears the traditional hajib. She was at the rally to protest administration policies.

At one point, Amina saw this guy, Joe, surrounded by a group of angry, threatening marchers, who were all wearing masks. One grabbed Joe's *Make America Great Again* hat and was about to set it on fire. As Amina describes it, something "snapped inside of me because I wear a Muslim hijab. And I've been in situations where people tried to snatch it off my head." Amina rushed toward Joe, screaming at his attackers to leave him alone. She tried, unsuccessfully, to rescue Joe's hat.

The incident gave the two a chance to talk about their lives and discovered that they had much in common: Amina was born in Baghdad and moved to the United States when she was ten; as a Muslim girl in Middle School, she stood out in almost every way you can. Joe was home-schooled as a youngster and found the transition to public high school difficult and isolating. His political views have cost him friends, as well.

Joe says, "I don't think we could be any further apart as people. And yet, it was just kind of this common that's-not-OK moment." Amina is "genuinely the only Muslim person I know. It's not that I've actively avoided [others], it's just, I've never been in a position where I can interact for an extended period of time." Until their unexpected meeting, Joe says his view of the Muslim community was based on what he saw on the news.

Amina responds: "I feel like a lot of times in the media you don't see the normal Muslims, the ones who listen to classic rock, like I do. You don't meet that Muslim . . . I'd like for this [moment] to encourage other people to engage in more conversations with people you don't agree with."

In an unexpected time and place, two very different people experience a new insight and understanding of the other's life. They become much more than the stereotypes and labels which others assign to them. They have gone from the "water" of anger and distrust to the "new wine" of empathy and respect. Jesus' changing simple water into choice wine is a fitting first sign of what Jesus has been sent by God to do: to transform our world from the brokenness of sin and the deadness of despair into God's banquet table of generosity, hope and healing. In Christ, the "watered-down wine" of fear and self-centeredness is replaced with the "new wine" of compassion and gratitude for the life God has given us, of honor and respect for every human being as a child of God, of the justice, mercy and peace of God, the Host of the great Wedding Feast.
