HISTORY OF ST. VALENTINE

In the early martyrologies, three different St. Valentines are mentioned, all sharing Feb. 14 for a feast day. Unfortunately, the historical record is sparse. The first St. Valentine was a priest and physician in Rome. He along with St. Marius and his family comforted the martyrs during the persecution of Emperor Claudius II, the Goth. Eventually, St. Valentine was also arrested, condemned to death for his faith, beaten with clubs, and finally beheaded on Feb. 14, AD 270. He was buried on the Flaminian Way. Later, Pope Julius I (333-356) built a basilica at the site which preserved St. Valentine's tomb. Archeological digs in the 1500s and 1800s have found evidence of the tomb

of St. Valentine. However, in the thirteenth century, his relics were transferred to the Church of Saint Praxedes near the Basilica of St. Mary Major, where they remain today. Also, a small church was built near the Flaminian Gate of Rome which is now known as the Porta del Popolo but was called in the 12th century "the Gate of St. Valentine," as noted by the early British historian William Somerset (also known as William of Malmesbury, d. 1143), who ranks after St. Bede in authority.

The second St. Valentine was the Bishop of Interamna (now Terni, located about 60 miles from Rome). Under the orders of Prefect Placidus, he too was arrested, scourged, and decapitated, again suffering persecution during the time of Emperor Claudius II.

The third St. Valentine suffered martyrdom in Africa with several companions. However, nothing further is known about this saint. In all, these men, each named St. Valentine, showed heroic love for the Lord and His Church.

The popular customs of showing love and affection on St. Valentine's Day is almost a coincidence with the feast day of the saint: During the Medieval Age, a common belief in England and France was that birds began to pair on Feb.14, "half -way through the second month of the year." Chaucer wrote in his "Parliament of Foules" (in Old English): "For this was on Seynt Valentyne's day, When every foul cometh ther to choose his mate." For this reason, the day was dedicated to "lovers" and prompted the sending of letters, gifts, or other signs of affection.

Another literary example of St. Valentine's Day remembrances is found in Dame Elizabeth Brews "Paston Letters" (1477), where she writes to the suitor, John Paston, of her daughter, Margery: "And, cousin mine, upon Monday is St. Valentine's day and every bird chooseth himself a mate, and if it like you to come on Thursday night, and make provision that you may abide till then, I trust to God that ye shall speak to my husband and I shall pray that we may bring the matter to a conclusion." In turn, Margery wrote to John: "Unto my right well beloved Valentine John Paston, Squyer, be this bill delivered. Right reverend and worshipful and my right well beloved Valentine, I recommend me unto you, full heartily desiring to hear of your welfare, which I beseech Almighty God long for to preserve until His pleasure and your heart's desire." While speaking of the amorous flavor of Valentine's Day, no mention is made of the saint.

While it seems that the exchange of "valentines" is more the result of secular custom rather than the memory of St. Valentine, and that the celebration has been further paganized with cupids and the like, there is a Christian message that should be remembered. The love of our Lord, depicted beautifully in the image of His most Sacred Heart, is a sacrificial, self-less, and unconditional love. Such is the love that each Christian is called to express in his own life, for God and neighbor. Clearly, St. Valentineno matter which oneshowed such a love, bearing witness to the faith in his dedication as a priest and in the offering of his own life in martyrdom. On this Valentine's day, looking to the example of this great saint, each person should offer again his love to the Lord, for only by doing so can he properly love those who are entrusted to his care and any other neighbor. Each person should again pledge his love to those loved ones, praying for their intentions, promising fidelity to them, and thanking them for their love in return. Never forget Jesus said, "This is my commandment: love one another as I have loved vou. There is no greater love than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (Jn 15:12 -13). St. Valentine fulfilled this command, and may we do the same.

FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:

Rediscovering my daughter through Instagram

"Put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch . . . " When Peter saw [the catch], he fell at the knees of Jesus and said, "Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man." Luke 5: 1-11

Loving a 15-year-old daughter can be heart-wrenching. The little girl you spent a decade and a half nurturing and feeding and picking up after and dropping off and helping with homework and braiding hair and supervising play dates and fighting battles and holding hands to cross the street suddenly shuts you out of her life. She's busy with school and clubs and projects, and when she has free time she would rather be out with friends. You hear snippets of her life ringing from her upstairs room, conversations and laughter, favorite songs occasionally played in the car from her iPhone. You feel you are losing her.

Paulina was as remote as a 15-year-old could be from her mother. Not only did she worry for Paulina as most parents do, but Paulina's mom missed being part of her life. Then one day, Paulina's mom ran into Maddie, a friend of her older son who was away at college. After chatting about school, Maddie asked, "How's Paulina?"

"Good, I think," she said, mentioning that Paulina was taking a photography class taught by professionals. "She loves photography. Hates her math teacher."

Then Maddie, eyes wide, asked, "Have you seen her Instagram feed?"

Mom started to panic. All she could think of were other parents she had spoken to whose daughters' feeds were filled with revealing photos. Oh God, she thought. Here it comes.

"No," I said. "Why?"

"It's amazing," Maddie said. "She's a great photographer. She has over a thousand followers."

Paulina's mom was stunned. A thousand followers?! That night, she worked up the nerve to ask Paulina if she could follow her on Instagram. Miraculously, her daughter said yes, shrugging as she walked up the stairs to her room. Mom grabbed her phone, and suddenly, there it was: Paulina's life. In black-and-white and full color. Beautifully framed photos of her friends, of their Brooklyn neighborhood. Paulina had a wonderful eye for finding the unique in the simple, the wondrous in the everyday.

Paulina's mother writes: "[Through her photography] I was able to be with Paulina out in the world again, to see what she sees, to virtually stand beside her and witness the people and places she moves through, in nearly real time. Not in a parent-policing role, but in a wonderful-world sort of way.

"... there was the photo she posted of herself as a little girl among autumn leaves, wearing a checkered skirt, pink leotard and green high-tops.

"Wish I was still a little kid, the caption read.

"So I wasn't the only one," her mom says.

Love compels us to venture out on the "seas" of the new and different, to leave the safe harbor of our own perspective to cast our nets into the "deep water" of another's world. Paulina's mom carefully and sensitively ventures out into that "deep water" of social media and re-connects with her daughter. Jesus challenges us to put aside our own fears and anxieties to dare to lower our nets into the "deep water" of patience and understanding, the treacherous sea of reconciliation and selfless generosity. It often demands risking our own security and comfort and putting aside our discouragement and exhaustion; it can require us to keep "fishing" despite the criticism and doubts of the many who have returned to shore. Confident of God's grace and wisdom, we can set out in our own small boats and cast our fishing nets — despite the long night already passed — to bring in the "catch" of God's forgiveness and peace.

"CALL MY DAD"

Theologian Father Ronald Rolheiser tells this story in his book Sacred Fire: A Vision for a Deeper Human and Christian Maturity:

A couple was going through a difficult time in their marriage. There was talk of separation. The husband was unwilling to go to any counselling; his way of coping was to disappear, making himself scarce from the family.

At one point, their 13-year-old daughter went to a mall and shoplifted an item that she neither wanted nor needed and was caught in the act. She was alone, so her little crime was not intended to impress friends. The store decided not to press charges, but wanted to teach the young girl a lesson, so they had a police officer come in and talk to her. After lecturing her on the seriousness of what she had done, the officer asked her for her parents' phone number so that he could call her mother to come to pick her up.

But the young teen had already prepared a different response: Reaching into her pocket, she pulled out a piece of paper with her father's phone number at work, handed it to the officer, and said: "Here's my dad's phone number. I want him to come here and pick me up."

When confronted by our failings and the possibilities of God's grace to move beyond them, we react like the dad who disappears, unable to face our need for such grace, or we react like Peter, embarrassed by our unworthiness for such grace. But that is the mystery of God's love: that nothing we do or have not done makes us deserving of God's love; we can only embrace it with humility and gratitude. The daughter wants his dad to come home and work to save a family who loves him; Jesus assures Peter to put aside his fears of unworthiness and follow him. We often expect too little from our relationship with God; we're convinced that we're neither good enough nor wise enough in church protocol to consider ourselves "religious." But that is exactly the "mystery" of God: that God loves us despite ourselves. Thomas Merton observed that "the root of Christian love is not the will to love but the faith that one is loved by God . . . irrespective of one's worth . . . The revelation of the mercy of God makes the problem of worthiness something almost laughable . . . no one could ever, alone, be strictly worthy to be loved with such a love — [such a realization] is a true liberation of spirit."
