CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

THE CELEBRATION OF THE CHRISTIAN MYSTERY

What does the word liturgy mean?

1069 The word “liturgy” originally meant a “public work” or a “service in the name of/on behalf of the people.” In Christian tradition it means the participation of the People of God in “the work of God.”⁵ Through the liturgy Christ, our redeemer and high priest, continues the work of our redemption in, with, and through his Church.

1070 In the New Testament the word “liturgy” refers not only to the celebration of divine worship but also to the proclamation of the Gospel and to active charity.⁶ In all of these situations it is a question of the service of God and neighbor. In a liturgical celebration the Church is servant in the image of her Lord, the one “*leitourgos*";⁷ she shares in Christ's priesthood (worship), which is both prophetic (proclamation) and kingly (service of charity):

The liturgy then is rightly seen as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ. It involves the presentation of man's sanctification under the guise of signs perceptible by the senses and its accomplishment in ways appropriate to each of these signs. In full public worship is performed by the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ, that is, by the Head and his members. From this it follows that every liturgical celebration, because it is an action of Christ the priest and of his Body which is the Church, is a sacred action surpassing all others. No other action of the Church can equal its efficacy by the same title and to the same degree.⁸

Liturgy as source of life

1071 As the work of Christ liturgy is also an action of his *Church*. It makes the Church present and manifests her as the visible sign of the communion in Christ between God and men. It engages the faithful in the new life of the community and involves the “conscious, active, and fruitful participation” of everyone.⁹

1072 “The sacred liturgy does not exhaust the entire activity of the Church”;¹⁰ it must be preceded by evangelization, faith, and conversion. It can then produce its fruits in the lives of the faithful: new life in the Spirit, involvement in the mission of the Church, and service to her unity.

Prayer and liturgy

1073 The liturgy is also a participation in Christ's own prayer addressed to the Father in the Holy Spirit. In the liturgy, all Christian prayer finds its source and goal. Through the liturgy the inner man is rooted and grounded in “the great love with which [the Father] loved us” in his beloved Son.¹¹ It is the same “marvelous work of God” that is lived and internalized by all prayer, “at all times in the Spirit.”¹²

2019 SPRING BEREAVEMENT GROUP

Tuesday Evenings from April 2 through May 14

Personal loss can be a challenging time. How we manage is unique to each of us. There will be a series of six (6) non-denominational, interrelated and supportive bereavement seminars at St. John Neumann, Califon, NJ, beginning April 2nd. John Cole, a professional in the transitioning process, will facilitate the sessions. This short-term program has been considered very helpful by past participants who have experienced personal loss. The conversations extend from understanding loss and normal reactions to steps, guided by faith, towards acceptance and the recreation of hopeful lives. While a primary focus is the death of a significant other, those who have experienced severe loss because of divorce, separation, or other substantial life altering events are welcomed. All sessions start at 7 p.m. The dates of the seminars will be April 2, 9, 16, 30, May 7 and 14.

Please note that each session builds on the prior one. Attendance at all six sessions would be best to derive optimal benefit. At this time, all sessions will be in the upper floor of the parish office building, unless participant mobility issues arise.

SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT: "A pretty good kid . . ."

While [Jesus] was praying, his face changed in appearance and his clothing became dazzling white. Luke 9: 28b-36

"Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it!" Luke 13: 31-35

You'll think it when you're watching your son or daughter play on their school team. You'll see their determination, the skill they have worked so hard to develop that gets better and sharper with every game, and their selflessness to pass the ball or the buck or throw the tough block or hit the sacrifice for the good of the team — and it will hit you. Or you'll realize it when you see your child run to the assistance of someone in need, bend down to help another kid up, or say just the right words to bring peace and healing to a difficult situation.

You may actually **say** it when you're sitting next to the love of your life as your child makes the same promise to the love of their life that the two of you made to each other when you were their age. In that moment, you will see yourselves in them.

You **will** say it amid the joys and tears as you meet your first grandchild. As you caress the child, you will look over at the child's mom and dad — still and always, your child. And you will look at your spouse and say, maybe without using words, "You know, we raised a pretty good kid."

Our lives are filled with such moments of transfiguration: when the love of God bursts forth in our lives; when we are aware and assured that we are loved and cared for and about; when the light of the "holy" illuminates the ordinary and every day, breaking through the clouds of fear and darkness of despair that sometimes engulf us. In the event we have come to call Jesus' "transfiguration," the three disciples actually realize the divinity — the very life and love of God — that exists within the person of Jesus. That "divinity" exists within each one of us, as well, illuminating our perspective with the wisdom of God, inspiring us to embrace Jesus' example of humility and selflessness in service to others, compelling us to realize God's kingdom of justice and peace in this time and place of ours.



"ON THE BASIS OF SEX"

God raises up prophets in every time and place, including our own. Director Mimi Leder's new film **On the Basis of Sex** tells the story of one unlikely prophet, Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

Justice Ginsburg's road to the U.S. Supreme Court was an uphill climb, but she managed to succeed despite the stifling male culture of the 1950s, 60s and 70s. She was one of only nine women in a class of 500 men at Harvard Law School — and it was made clear to her that her presence was not welcomed. Ruth was smart enough to let her considerable talent and skill speak for her. Ruth went on to complete her law degree at Columbia, graduating first in the class, but was turned down by every major New York law firm because of her gender.

In Ruth's corner, then and forever, is her husband and fellow attorney Marty Ginsburg. The story of their wonderfully supportive marriage is central to the movie. When she and her husband Marty are both students at Harvard, Marty is diagnosed with testicular cancer. Ruth attends his classes as well as her own, taking notes at both sets of classes and typing Marty's papers as he dictates them to her — all while nursing Marty and caring for their baby daughter. Marty recovers and becomes Ruth's champion, encouraging her when her legal career falters and she turns to teaching at Rutgers. Their life together mirrors the loving partnership that Ruth seeks in the law for all women and their families.

While teaching at Rutgers, Ruth looks for a case to take on that might be the start to overturning centuries of statutes unfair to women. Marty hands her just such a case: the person being discriminated against on the basis of sex is a *man*. While Marty has the experience and is the "right" gender to address the court, he insists that Ruth employ her own considerable legal skills and her unequalled understanding of the issue to argue the case.

Ruth's handling of the case is a major victory for the rights of women in the United States. "We're not asking you to change the country," Ruth argues prophetically before the three-judge panel, "We're asking you to protect the right of the country to change."

Both Ruth Bader Ginsburg's career and her marriage mirror the call of the prophet: advocating for the victims of injustice in the face of vehement opposition to established special interests and living in the integrity of his or her own life the principles at the heart of such advocacy. May our Lenten observance open our consciences and hearts to recognize the prophets in our "Jerusalems" calling us to realize God's vision of creating "cities of peace," as well as our own baptismal calls to be "prophets" of God's justice and reconciliation in our own families and communities, in our places of work and prayer.
