### THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT: "The Green Book"

The parable of the fig tree.

Luke 13: 1-69

The award-winning film **The Green Book** is the true story of the unlikely friend-ship between a black world-class pianist and the white Bronx nightclub bouncer he hires to drive him on a tour of cities in the segregated South of the 1950s. But what about the title — "the Green Book"?

The Green Book was actually called "The Negro Motorist Green Book": a listing of businesses across the country that welcomed African American travelers. The first edition was published in 1936 by Victor Green, a postal worker who lived in Harlem. The Green Book included restaurants and motels that would serve black motorists. It also warned of towns and cities that were hostile to African Americans, who were taking to the road in record numbers in the 1930s and early 40s, as more jobs for blacks were opening up around the country. And they kept The Green Book at hand. If there were no Green Book listings along the route they were driving, they didn't stop.

Often a safe place to stay was a room in someone's house, like Harriet Cornwell's house in Columbia S.C. The Rossonian Hotel and Lounge was one of 80 such accommodating businesses listed in the Denver area. Great musicians like Duke Ellington and Billie Holiday stayed at the Rossonian — these legendary artists were welcome to play downtown, but not welcomed to stay. And South Boston can boast of Charlie's Sandwich Shop, opened by two Greek immigrants, Charlie Poulos and Christi Manjourides, in 1927. Charlie's was the first restaurant in Boston that served all races.

In the 1948 edition of **The Green Book**, publisher Victor Green wrote: "There will come a day sometime in the near future when this guide will not be published. This is when we as a race will have equal opportunities and privileges in the United States."

Green, who died in 1960, didn't live to see that day come, when the Civil Rights Act passed in 1964 mandated the end of segregation. Publication of **The Green Book** ended in 1967. It's largely forgotten now, its legacy underestimated: that there were, during this ugly part of American history, business men and women who refused to buckle to racism and welcomed all to their establishments.

The first part of today's Gospel points to the evil of marking people by some arbitrary measure of sin or evil, of segregating or isolating classes of people by race or religion because of a false sense of superiority or fear of social pressure. God "rides" with those who are rejected and scorned by the self-righteous and the avaricious; God "stops" at those places who welcome all his daughters and sons with respect and peace.

## 2019 SPRING BEREAVEMENT GROUP

Tuesday Evenings from April 2 through May 14

Personal loss can be a challenging time. How we manage is unique to each of us. There will be a series of six (6) non-denominational, interrelated and supportive bereavement seminars at St. John Neumann, Califon, NJ, beginning April 2nd. John Cole, a professional in the transitioning process, will facilitate the sessions. This short-term program has been considered very helpful by past participants who have experienced personal loss. The conversations extend from understanding loss and normal reactions to steps, guided by faith, towards acceptance and the recreation of hopeful lives. While a primary focus is the death of a significant other, those who have experienced severe loss because of divorce, separation, or other substantial life altering events are welcomed. All sessions start at 7 p.m. The dates of the seminars will be April 2, 9, 16, 30, May 7 and 14.

Please note that each session builds on the prior one. Attendance at all six sessions would be best to derive optimal benefit. At this time, all sessions will be in the upper floor of the parish office building, unless participant mobility issues arise.

## A RARE GIFT

Sarah Gray was three months pregnant with identical twin boys when she and her husband, Ross, learned that one of them suffered from anencephaly, a fatal birth defect. Six months later, Thomas and Callum were born; Callum survived, but Thomas died six days later. Sarah and Ross decided to donate Thomas' tissues and organs to science research. They were able to donate his liver, his cord blood, his retinas and his corneas.

A short time later, Sarah was on a trip to Boston. She remembered that Thomas' corneas had gone to the Schepens Eye Research Institute at Harvard. She and Ross had signed away any rights to future information about the donation. But she decided there was nothing to lose by calling.

"I donated my son's eyes to you a couple of years ago," Sara explained to the receptionist at Harvard. "I'm in town on business for a couple of days. Is there any chance I can stop by for a ten-minute tour?"

The woman who answered paused. "I've never had this request before." The woman asked Sara to hold for a moment; finally, someone came on the line and said she would be welcomed. The next day, Sara met one of the researchers at the lab. The researcher said that an infant's eyes "are like gold to us." Thomas' cells were still being studied at the lab as they developed treatment for a number of different eye ailments.

The warm and grateful welcome she received gave Sarah "the bug." So she and Ross arranged visits to the other three labs around the country where their little boy's tissues had been sent. At Duke University, they learned that Thomas' blood was part of a study on how anencephaly develops. Scientists at the Cytonet lab explained how Thomas' liver was being used to develop lifesaving therapy for liver disease. And at the University of Philadelphia, the Rosses saw how Thomas's retinas were a Godsend to researchers looking for ways to treat retinoblastoma, a deadly cancer of the retina.

For Sarah and Ross and Callum, the donation of Thomas' tissue was no longer an abstract "nice thing to do." The extraordinary good of Thomas' gifts became something real to them. Their feelings of grief turned into pride. Their son and brother was with them in this life-giving work.

Sara and Ross Gray model the generosity of heart and spirit of optimism of the gardener in Jesus' parable. Like the gardener who sees some hope for the struggling fig tree, the Rosses are able to see beyond their grief to make some good come from their little boy's death. As God's mercy and compassion know no end, we are called to embrace the faith of the gardener: to work and re-work our own small plots and realize its harvest of compassion and grace.
