FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT: Letters of Condolence

"Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."

Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.

John 12: 1-8

For 27 years, Walter Jones represented eastern North Carolina in Congress. He died this past February 10 on his 76th birthday, after a long illness. His colleagues in the House remembered him for his courage, his integrity and his kindness.

And his letters.

And not just any letters.

For the last 14 years, Jones made it a point to write letters to Americans whose spouse, daughter or son was killed in Iraq or Afghanistan. Many of them included personal handwritten notes he wrote in his Greenville office late at night.

"My heart aches as I write this letter for I realize you are suffering a great loss," most letters would begin.

Jones' letter-writing began in 2003 after he attended the funeral of Marine Sgt. Michael Bitz, who was killed that March, not long after the Iraq war began. During the ceremony, the sergeant's two-year old son, Joshua, dropped a toy. A young Marine in dress uniform reached down to pick it up and hand it back to Joshua.

"And the boy looked up at him, and the Marine looked down, and then it hit me," the congressman would remember. "This little boy would never know his daddy."

Jones' grief at this scene led to a dramatic political conversion against the war, putting him at odds with President Bush and his own party. Congressman Jones had voted in favor of the war – and his vote haunted him.

"I will never forget my mistake because people died because of my mistake," he said. "I bought into believing that President Bush didn't really want to go to war. That's how naïve I was . . . I could have voted no, and I didn't."

He also acknowledged that facing re-election kept him from voting his conscience. "In my heart, I believe I let God down."

"... I felt the guilt, but also the pain of voting to send [Janina Bitz'] husband as well as thousands of other military to a war that was unnecessary," he said. "Obviously, the majority of these families will never know me and vice versa. But I want them to know that my heart aches as their heart aches."

Before writing to a family, Jones would obtain permission from a military liaison who makes sure that family members want condolences from a congressman they likely never heard of. Then, from a desk drawer in his office in Greenville, he retrieved the same black ink fountain pen that he used since he began this ritual. In some cases, he sent letters to multiple relatives of a single soldier.

At the time of his death in February, Walter Jones had written 11,266 such letters. Janina Bitz-Vasquez, the widow of the Marine whose funeral triggered Jones' epiphany, said she's honored that Jones continued to honor the families of dead service members. More importantly, she said, it "sets a standard for taking personal responsibility and accountability" for other political and military leaders.

Congressman Jones was not alone in voting for the war in Iraq and his vote would not have changed the course of the war, but in holding himself accountable to families, the late congressman mirrors the integrity and sense of personal responsibility that Jesus demands from those who have brought the adulteress before him. True conversion begins by taking ownership of our mistakes and shortcomings and the impact they have on those around us. We cannot take on the demons of the world until we confront the demons in our own hearts; we cannot pass sentence on others until we judge our own lives; we cannot change what is beyond us until we change what is within us; we cannot lift up the fallen until we realize that we, too, are fallen; we cannot raise others to health and hope until we seek our own healing.

WHAT IS EASTER TRIDUUM?

"Triduum" is a Latin word referring to a three-day period of prayer, usually in preparation for an important feast or in celebration of that feast. Easter Triduum is the liturgical name for the last three days of Holy Week: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday with Easter Vigil whereby we enter the joy of Easter Sunday. Here's a preview of how it is celebrated here at St. John's, as narrated by our parishioners Joann Gardner and Barbara Gates:

Holy Thursday: Our Sacred Triduum starts with the traditional Seder Meal on Holy Thursday, celebrated by the Confirmandi. These students enjoy the ritual meal that has been prepared by their parents. They are taught the meaning of the Seder meal (with bitter herbs, egg, lamb shank, salt and Elijah's Cup) according to the Hebrew custom.

If you have not attended a Holy Thursday Mass, you should try to be there. It is the time when the Oils of Chrism are presented to the Priest and Congregation after our representative has attended the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral in Metuchen and brings them to St. John's. During this Mass the priest performs the washing of the feet, a very humbling experience. As an extension of this act and to remind us that we all are Christ to one another, those whose feet were washed then wash the hands of the rest of the community. This practice, that is unique to St. John's, really makes us all participants in this sacred rite. At the conclusion of the Mass, the Blessed Sacrament is taken to the beautifully flower-decorated Seton Room where parishioners come in turns to "watch and pray" with Our Lord until midnight.

Good Friday: In the afternoon our Confirmation students present the Living Stations of the Cross outside. This presentation is quite moving as parishioners follow the path of Jesus on the road to His death on the cross. The students enact vignettes at each station and the congregation join in prayer, song, and meditation along the way. The students always do a splendid job.

At night, there is a solemn service in the church. The atmosphere is somber with low lighting and music. We hear readings from the Old Testament and the Gospel (the Passion Narrative), and there is time for reflection during the intercessions. After the intercessions, we each venerate the cross with a bow or a kiss. This service is not a Mass because there is no consecration of hosts, but communion is received with the extra Eucharist from the Mass on Holy Thursday. At the end of the service, we depart the church in prayerful silence.

Holy Saturday: This is the day of prayer and waiting. The Easter Vigil begins at 8 pm when it is still dark. The congregation moves outside to the unique Easter Bonfire. We then process into the Church with the Paschal Candle lit. We use candles lit from the Paschal Candle and as the vigil progresses, the Church is flooded with light representing new life. It is at the Easter Vigil that the Catechumen and the Elect receive the sacraments of initiation as full members of the Catholic Church. It is a spiritually uplifting experience. Consider being a part of this most holy and inspirational time at St. John's.

CHRISM MASS



Monday, April 15, 2019 - Cathedral, Metuchen

On Monday, April 15, 2019 Bishop James Checchio will celebrate the Chrism Mass with the priests of the Diocese. At this Mass, the Bishop will bless the Holy Oils which each parish receives for the rites of anointing. Saint Ambrose [340-397] began this custom - which we now call the Chrism Mass - in his Cathedral in Milan. The Holy Oils, which are used to sanctify the Faithful, have been channels of holiness for centuries! The Oil of Catechumens is used to anoint the chest of infants and hands of adults before their Baptism; the Oil of the Sick is used on the forehead and hands of the infirm in the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick; and Sacred Chrism is used to anoint the head of the newly baptized, the foreheads of confirmandi, the hands of a priest at his ordination, the

head of the a bishop at his ordination, and the altar and walls of new churches. At the Mass, all priests make a **Renewal of Commitment to Priestly Service**, recommitting themselves to their Bishop and to their ministry to God and His People; the Bishop and all Priests then ask the people for a pledge of their prayerful support. All are strongly encouraged to join in the ancient, grace-filled Chrism Mass at the Cathedral of St. Francis of Assisi in Metuchen at 4:00 p.m.

Our parishioners Tom Klawunn and Patti Rittman will attend this Mass to receive the Holy Oils for our Parish which will be presented here at the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday.
