

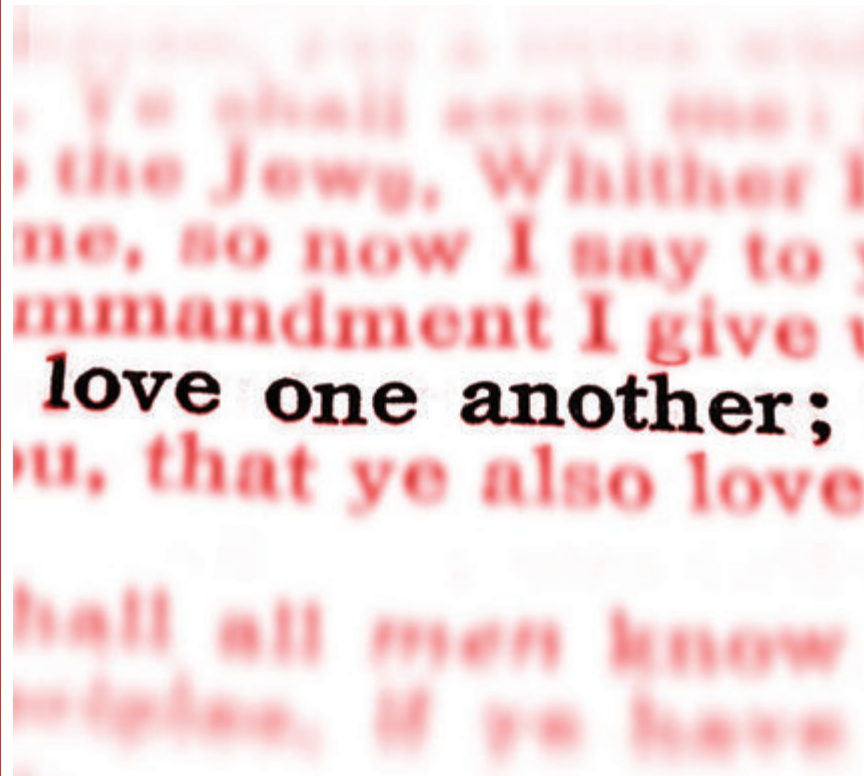

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: Nametags

"I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another."
John 13:31-33a, 34-35

She pins the nametag the admissions office has given her to her polo shirt with the school logo on it. Two years ago she was in their place: she was a new student, leaving home to begin the college chapter of her life. She knows those conflicting feelings of excitement in embarking on something new and fear that you might fail; anxious to be on your own — and anxious that you might crash and burn. But she made it safely and successfully through her first two years, and now the school has asked her to be part of the orientation for the incoming freshmen class. For her, this nametag is a sign of welcome and hope at all the possibilities before them.

He scribbles his name on the sticker. That in itself is an act of courage. But he wants people to know where he stands. He knows he will face a lot of heat for being part of this demonstration, but this issue speaks to his conscience and he knows he will regret not standing up for the poor, the disenfranchised, the vulnerable, the belittled. Just sticking this nametag to his jacket as the march begins is a call for justice.

Putting on nametags as they come into the house is a strange thing to do. They grew up in this house. Mom and Dad have lived here for most of their 50 years of marriage. Now they come back regularly, leaving their own families, to come home to help their mother. Dad has Alzheimer's and Mom wants him to be at home as long as possible. A few months ago they began wearing the nametags to help their dad remember: *I'm Doreen, your daughter. I'm Richard, your son. Even: I'm Paul, your next-door neighbor.* They can't help but tear up as they place the tags over their heads each time they visit, but they realize that wearing this nametag is the cost of love.

A simple thing like a nametag can be the sign of God's love in our midst: love lived by Jesus in his time among us, love perfected in his death and resurrection. Such love often asks us to do what is difficult and counter-intuitive, requiring of us a humility and generosity that places the needs of others before our own. In the Gospel, Jesus reveals a God of compassion and forgiveness, a God who breathes life into us and puts this marvelous creation into motion out of a love that is too complete and perfect to comprehend. In his "commandment" to love, Jesus articulates the only adequate, meaningful response we can make to God's love: to try to love as God loves. When we can see beyond our own fears and doubts, when we are able to embrace the needs and hopes of another — spouse, child, or friend — that love becomes a reality.

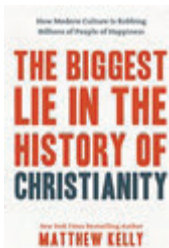
SPRING PLANTING--PROJECT EARTH GARDEN

HOW TO ANSWER THE PHONE LIKE A GROWN-UP . . .

The phone rings for the sixth time in less than an hour. She knows who it is. It's her mother — again. It's 8 o'clock on a cold spring night. It has been a long day: her five-year-old has been a handful since she got up, and she has been on crutches for seven weeks, recovering from surgery.

A stroke claimed her mother's brain, leaving her dogged by paranoia and in a fog of dementia. Every call is a challenge: the same conversation again and again, the same reassurance that her mom is not be evicted from her home, the same insisting that she had just been to see her mother just the day before.

She held it together for the first five calls, but she doesn't think she can handle a sixth. But she picks up the phone again. Her patience deserts her and she quickly finds herself yelling at her mother—or the woman who used to be her mother.

Worn out, she flops on the couch, frustrated and angry—at herself.

That's when her five-year old comes over and asks, "Can I talk to Grandma Ellie?"

She hands over the phone to her daughter.

"Hi Grandma!"

She hears her mother exclaim through the receiver.

"Sweetheart! How are you? Did you go to school today?"

What is this? All she said was "Hi Grandma" and her mother sounds like a person fully alert to the heartbeat of a normal day.

"Yes Grandma, and today was share day and I brought my Wonder Woman bracelets."

"Can you put it on speaker?" she whispers to her daughter.

She obliges, and out of the phone comes a waterfall of good cheer. Her mother tells her how much she loves her and how lovely her voice sounds. Then:

"I hope I'll see you soon?" Her mother makes her plea for a promise of companionship.

She hears her mother's voice differently now. She softens as she watches her little girl handle her fragile grandmother with such deftness.

"Oh, that's wonderful darling!"

"Tell me, did you go to school today?" She already asked that, but her daughter doesn't miss a beat.

"Yes Grandma, I went to school and we had share day. I brought my Wonder Woman bracelets."

"You did? How wonderful!"

"Do you want me to sing you a song? I know three songs from 'Annie.'"

And then the little girl sings.

It is an epiphany for her:

"I listen to my daughter crooning to her grandmother, caring for her with exquisite patience. I spend so much time wishing she had a 'real' grandmother, wishing she knew my 'real' mother. In this moment, I see that she does have a real grandmother, and she does have a real relationship with her . . .

"When they hang up, after many kissing noises, I tell my daughter it is bath time. She wildly protests, but I draw the bath anyway. I am still Mommy after all, and she is still five.

"And yet tonight, she taught me how to answer the phone like a grown-up."

Jesus' commandment to love can be most difficult when it comes to those we love most: when our patience is all but gone, when our hurt is most raw, when our frustration and exhaustion make us most susceptible to striking back. But, as this mom learns from her five-year-old, patient, humble, generous love grows stronger the more it is tested, endures and remains steadfast the more it is pulled, continues to heal and forgive the more it is engaged. Our very identity as disciples of Christ is centered in such persistent and constant love; our faithfulness in imitating the compassion and forgiveness of the Risen One is lived in our openness of heart and spirit to love selflessly, completely and unconditionally, as God has loved us in his Christ.

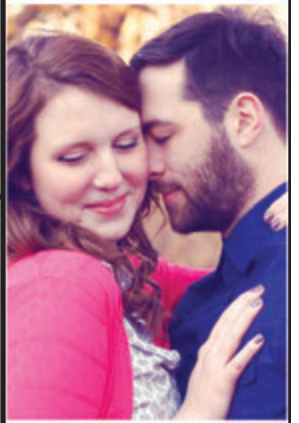
