SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: Outstanding in his field

“The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you.” John 14: 23-29

In an essay in **The Boston Globe** [March 24, 2019], Sandra Ebejer writes about her five-year-old son Nate’s short-lived baseball career.

It’s a hot summer day and Nate’s team is playing. While kids as young as three are hitting and catching like mini-pros, Nate is in the outfield watching a worm in the dirt. Instead of running to third, Nate is spinning like a top. Nate is into everything that’s going on in the field — except the game. And that’s been Nate’s whole approach to team sports.

Time and again, his parents have talked about pulling him out of sports altogether, but they believe that athletic activities are critical to a child’s development physically and socially. So they endure long afternoons like this one, including the annoyance of other parents as Nate screws up another play or becomes the predictable third out to kill a rally.

Mom keeps repeating to herself the mantra *He’s just a kid, he’s having fun*, but it’s not helping. She’s embarrassed for him — and *by* him. She wants Nate to stop fooling around and do what the coach tells him.

Between innings, the coach gives the kids a break to grab a drink. Nate walks toward his mom, then abruptly stops, pivots, and heads to the bleachers. With a cheerful smile, he picks up a dropped toy and hands it to a baby who’s been screaming since the game began. He takes a moment — a moment no one else thought to take — to make a silly face and give a cheerful wave. The baby’s cries turn to giggles and he slurps on his toy, grateful for the attention. Then Nate skips happily over to his mom for a hug and a sip of water.

And that’s when it finally hits her:

“My son is not screwing up. He’s not doing anything wrong. We have placed him in a setting where he is never going to thrive. He’s not interested in sports and doesn’t care to understand the rules of baseball or hockey or soccer. It’s simply not in his wiring. His priority is to experience life as a five-year-old, to savor each playful, joyful moment and bring happiness to other kids . . .

“After the exchange between my son and the baby, I feel a twinge of shame. How could I have let his personality embarrass me? How dare I allow strangers’ exasperation to affect my pride in my son? And why did I place the rules of a sport above his desire to be himself?

“Watching the next inning unfold, I smile as Nate shakes his behind to make a teammate laugh. I clap and give a loud whoop when his team scores, and I allow the warmth of the day to wash over me.”

The good heartedness of Nate reminds us that the peace of God is given on our God’s terms, not ours. Peace, as given by Christ, is a perspective that shapes all our actions, behavior and values; it is peace that is centered in our selfless love for others, comfort that is found in realizing God’s presence in our very midst in the love of others. We want “peace” that makes it possible for us to move forward with our plans for our lives; the “peace” we envision is the result of the world working the way we want it to. But the “peace” of the Risen Christ challenges us to put aside our own self-obsessed agendas and need to control in order to take on the Gospel that places forgiveness and reconciliation, justice and community, before all else. Five-year-old Nate realizes that Christ’s peace is found in the joy of the world around him and revealing that joy for those whose lives are anything but. So maybe Nate isn’t meant to be the next Mike Trout or Mookie Betts — maybe he’s called to be something greater.

NOTES FROM THE GARDEN

We had a beautiful day for spring planting on May 18. Many hands made light work and a new mechanical seeder for carrots worked great. Plan a visit the garden to see what we are growing this year. The amaryllis planted by the First Communion children are sending up buds--come take a look. We have been picking loads of asparagus--10-15 pounds per week since mid-April. Cutting will continue until June 1. They will be served fresh at SHIP's Galley Soup Kitchen twice this month. Allium, pansies and poppies are in bloom right now. Asiatic Lilies and roses are not far behind. We will have our annual strawberry harvest in early June. Many of the folks who have community garden beds help with this task but picking is open to all members of the community. Please contact Anne Germino at project-earth@ccsin.org by May 28 if you would like to help. All of the strawberries are donated to SHIP or Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen in New Brunswick. We will need help with picking as well as delivery to the soup kitchens.

WHAT WERE THE WORDS . . . ?

The news spread like wildfire around the university. The three-year-old son of a graduate student and his wife was killed by a drunk driver.

Instead of holding a visitation at a funeral home, the young couple invited people to come to their apartment. Phil is also a grad student who had become friends with the dad. On his way to their apartment, Phil tried to imagine what to say. *I'm so sorry for what happened* sounded so uninspired. *My prayers are with you* sounded like a cop-out. *If there's anything I can do* sounded pointless.

When Phil arrived, the door to the couple's second-floor apartment was open. Some 30 classmates and faculty members were standing quietly in the living room. A few were talking with the couple, others were eating cookies and drinking coffee.

The grieving dad looked up and saw Phil standing there and quickly walked over to greet his friend, and then engulfed him in a hug. Phil hugged his friend back, as best he could.

Say something! Now is the time to come up with the right words! But Phil couldn't utter a sound. Nothing sounded sufficient or authentic. Phil hugged his suffering friend tighter and then they finally let go of each other. Phil nodded good-bye and soon left. Phil felt awful, convinced that he had failed as a friend.

Two weeks later the father was back on campus. After class, he walked over to Phil, grabbed his hand, and shook it earnestly. "Phil, I want to thank you for what you said to me at our apartment. I'll never forget it."

Phil had no idea what he had said. But it soon became clear to Phil: there had been eloquence in the simple act of being present.

Whenever we act out of compassion, the Advocate is at work in our midst; whenever we put aside our own fears of inadequacy to reach out to someone in need, the Holy Spirit is moving among us. That Spirit enabled Phil to "speak" peace and blessing to his grieving friend without words, to offer support and comfort, though empty-handed. The Spirit, the Advocate, is present in our care often without our realizing it, enabling us to make the justice and mercy of the Gospel a reality in our own here and now — all we have to do is let love lead.

STOP INFANTICIDE!

Some states are proposing laws to expand abortion AND to repeal laws providing specific protections for babies born alive after surviving an attempted abortion. (In a successful abortion, the life of the baby in the womb is ended and this is never morally acceptable. We continue to promote laws to protect babies in the womb). A particular piece of legislation - The Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act (S.311/H.R.962), would provide protections nationwide to help prevent newborns from being killed or being left alone to die.

Sadly, the United States has failed to pass the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act (S.311/H.R.962), which protects babies who survive an attempted abortion from infanticide. But there is still hope for this bill!

If the US House of Representatives passes the bill, it would put significant pressure on Senators who voted against the bill to reconsider their vote. Tell your US Representative that ALL new born babies deserve care & a chance for life!


