33RD SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME

Reading, writing, remembering

- "... the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down . . .
- "... I myself shall give you a wisdom in speaking that all your adversaries will be powerless to resist or refute." Luke 21: 5-19

Every so often she receives an e-mail or voice-mail or text or Facebook message: a quick message, a name and contact. The final sentence is always the same: "Do you remember me?"

"Of course I do," she responds. "How could I forget you?"

For most, she can remember exactly where that person sat in her classroom and who sat next to them. She can picture their faces, maybe hear their voices. Some are wisps in her memory - maybe she'll recall the year or grade or school.

She started teaching when she was 22. Teaching turned out to be more of a challenge than she realized. Every student required something different from her, and that could change by the hour. Problems at home, fights with friends, hunger, fear — they all showed themselves differently. Some students strove for excellence; some seemed intent on disruption. Some students competed for the best grades; some refused to do any work at all. Some students had tons of friends; some longed for one. She tried to notice all of it and manage it as best she could, while working on all that needed to be taught and learned.

There were the highly memorable hallway fights and fire drills and field trips, the field days and test days and assemblies. But it was the daily schedules, the mundane routines, that brought teacher and class together.

"For ten months a year, I'd revolve around them, circling their desks, saying their names, knowing their handwriting. We'd read together, crack up together, and bicker together. I learned when to push and when to be gentle. I knew who needed extra help and who could probably teach the class themselves. I'd try to calm the class clown and get the quiet ones to talk. Sometimes we laughed all day, and other times I drove home crying. As the year went on, we would function as a group, mostly accepting all of one another's needs and quirks. Then June came, and they gleefully broke ties . . . "

She would welcome a new class in the fall and her now former students would move on to new grade levels and schools. She seldom saw them again. She occasionally reads or hears about them in the news. Sometimes it's good; most times, devastating. Some are gone, others found trouble; some made their mark. She prays that most of them have made their way.

But when one contacts her, she tells them all the good things she remembers about them. She tells them that she could never forget. At one time they were in her class. But always, they are hers.

This good and dedicated teacher is the light that shines in the midst of violence and despair; she is the sign of God's faithful presence in the wars and storms that Jesus foretells in today's disturbing Gospel. Compassion and mercy, justice and forgiveness are the lasting treasures of the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom that is created in our own homes and classrooms and churches. It is not our portfolios and resumes that matter in the end, but the simple good we do that transforms lives that is our true and lasting legacy. May God grant us the wisdom to realize what a great and lasting world we can build if we put aside our attitudes and avarice that limit our vision to the ephemeral to embrace God's grace to build such a sacred world.

MIRROR NEURONS

Have you ever heard of mirror neurons? They're those tiny little cells in our brains that fire up whenever we're around someone else. Sometimes very faintly, but other times with great force, these neurons prompt us to imitate whomever we are with. When we see someone happy or sad or angry, it's our mirror neurons that help us share in that person's feelings and thoughts. St. Paul told the Thessalonians that he and his companions tried to be role models. It was "so that you might imitate us" he wrote. Paul knew that the Thessalonians had a much better chance of staying close to the Lord if they saw other people trying to do the same thing. He knew that our environment can have a very strong effect on the ways we think, the values we adopt, and the priorities we set for our lives. We are meant to live in community. We need the example of fellow believers to help us grow in our faith. And just as important, our brothers and sisters need the witness of our faith for their growth. The more we see holiness in action, the more encouraged we will be to keep pursuing Jesus ourselves.

GOODBYES AND LETTING GO

A physician, an expert in palliative care, was giving a presentation on the process of preparing to die.

He began by asking participants to make three lists: First, they were to write down five possessions that gave them pleasure; second, five activities that gave them joy; and third, the five people they loved most in the world.

After the audience completed their lists, the doctor began talking about a hypothetical patient, a woman whose days were filled with the usual routines, jobs and stresses of everyday life. But after she discovered a lump in her body, there came a cascade of medical interventions: first, a biopsy, then surgery, radiation, and chemotherapy. After a year, it became clear that the treatments weren't working, and the oncologist told her to get her affairs in order. She entered hospice care, and gradually her world shrank to the size of her bedroom.

And throughout the story, the doctor periodically paused to ask participants to cross an item of their lists.

The possessions and activities went first, of course. Each was a choice: Which would I have to give up more, my laptop or my car? Biking or walking? Then it came time to start crossing off people, each decision an agonizing, **Sophie's Choice** dilemma. By now it was clear where this exercise was heading and most participants, even the men, were borrowing tissues from the women who were organized enough to keep a packet in their purses. By the time the physician's hypothetical patient died, everyone has gone through a similar shedding of what they held dearest, leaving the audience the emotional equivalent of wet noodles.

This stripping away of possessions, status, and relationships happens to everyone as they die — and will one day happen to each one of us. Even though we believe that death is not the ultimate end, we can't deny that, in the short term, there's plenty of sadness to go around. Jesus makes clear in today's Gospel that our entire lives are a series of "deaths": of letting go, of changing, of adapting to a new set of circumstances. But we believe that every "death" can result in some form of resurrection: a new understanding, a new insight, a new appreciation. Today's Gospel should not terrify us or deflate our sense of hope, but make us aware of the things of the world that will one day be gone and the lasting things of God that are the means of peace and joy as we journey from this world to the next.
